IN THE CHAIR.

The Committee of Management have the honour to present to the Governors and Subscribers the Report and Balance Sheet for the year 1909.

The above tables show that although the ordinary expenditure is considerably less than that of the previous year it is still in excess of the ordinary income. It is perfectly obvious, therefore, that to efficiently maintain the work of the Hospital without getting into debt or drawing on Capital, some new source of revenue must be found.

As legacies are not a reliable source of income, the great need of the Hospital is increased permanent support, and it is earnestly hoped, therefore, that new annual subscriptions will be forthcoming.

The Hospital has benefited during the year by a legacy of $\pounds 1,000$ from the late Charles Blyth, Esq.

Collections made at the various churches have amounted to £281 3s. 3d., as against £258 3s. 4d. in 1908.

The Committee must again express regret that the receipts from collecting boxes show a decrease, as compared with 1908, of £215 18s. 8d. This is partly owing to the general decrease in the contents of the boxes caused by unemployment, and partly on account of the sum of £104 appearing under the item "Entertainments," the amounts derived from the same sources having been included last year in the boxes.

EXPENDITURE.

Mrs. Swan has again shown her appreciation of the Hospital by giving further donations amounting to £400 towards the expenses of the Ophthalmic Wards. This amount nearly covers the cost of maintenance of these wards, and the Committee desire to express their very grateful thanks to Mrs. Swan for her continued interest and generosity.

The Committee's thanks are also due to the following donors— Friendly Societies' Carnival and Fete (including concert), £105; King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, £100; The Rev. F. R. Cocks, £100; Richmond Theatre Matinee, per Mr. George Dance, £75 17s. 6d.; Cricket Match, per Mr. T. Richardson, £69; Mrs. Porteous, £52 (in addition to £4 10s., her annual half-crown collection); The Rev. M. E. Welby, £51; The Worshipful Company of Grocers, £50; "T. F. K.," £21; Mid-Surrey Golf Club, £20 13s. 6d. (including Christmas collection); Sir Charles Burt, £20; Charles W. How, Esq., £15; Messrs. R. McAlpine & Son, £11 3s. 6d.; The Trustees of Mr. Henry Smith's Charity, £10 10s.; R. L. Lundgren, Esq., £10 10s.; Alfred Burton, Esq., £10 10s., and William Sandover, Esq., J.P., £10.

The Committee have had under consideration the question of structural improvements and additions to the Lavatories adjoining the "Cambridge" and "Mary Adelaide" Wards. They have passed the plans and specifications, and called for Tenders. The cost of the undertaking will be £520. It is anticipated that only about £150 of this amount will be required to be taken from the general funds of the Hospital, the balance being promised by several generous donors. King Edward's Hospital Fund have allocated a sum of £150 on condition that the work is carried out.

The Committee have invested the sum of £498 16s. by the purchase of £500 Canada 31 per cent. Inscribed Stock.

Mr. Walter Rowland has resigned his position as Collector to the Hospital, a post he held with much credit for seventeen years. To fill the vacancy, the Committee have appointed Mr. Arthur F. André as Clerk-collector, on salary instead of commission.

It must be pointed out here that part of Mr. André's salary will have to appear under the sub-heading "Commission," and part under "Management Official Salaries," to conform with the Uniform System of Accounts.

The Committee have to regret the loss by death of Mr. Alfred Rixon and Professor Hulme. Both gentlemen were liberal supporters of the Hospital, and active members of the Committee, and their loss will be greatly felt.

Dr. Bernard E. Potter has been appointed Hon. Refractionist to assist Dr. Blair in the work of the Ophthalmic Department.

The Members of the Committee retiring by rotation are Mr. Ashby, Mr Brooks and Mr. Westbrook, who however, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election, with the exception of Mr. Ashby, who is removing from the neighbourhood.

The revision of the Out-Patients' Department has been under the consideration of the Committee with a beneficial result, and it is hoped that Subscribers and Governors will only give tickets to those who cannot afford to procure advice and medicine at their own expense.

The Committee are pleased to announce that several ladies on the Committee of the Central Aid Society have intimated their willingness to provide for the after care of patients leaving the Hospital, and this offer has been gratefully accepted.

Sir Max Waechter, D.L., J.P. (the President), and Lady Waechter paid a visit to the Hospital at Christmas, and kindly distributed the gifts and toys from the Christmas tree.

In conclusion, the Committee desire to thank the Honorary Medical Officers for their valuable services, the friends of the Hospital for the generous gifts received during the year, and the members of the Staff for the able manner in which they have managed their respective departments.

ABSTRACT OF THE RULES.

87. In-Patients, if considered suitable by the House Surgeon, shall be admissible on presenting their tickets of recommendation at the Hospital before Twelve o'clock at noon, such tickets to remain in force for six weeks only.

88. ACCIDENTS and urgent cases shall be admitted at all times, without letters of recommendation.

89. When there shall be want of room in the Hospital for the admission of all persons duly recommended and qualified to be In-Patients, preference shall be given to cases admitting of the least delay.

91. No woman pregnant (except in extraordinary cases, such as accidents, or where some surgical operation is required), no insane person, no person subject to chronic epilepsy or suffering from any infectious disease, confirmed consumption, or any disease that be judged incurable, shall be admitted as an In-Patient.

92. Whenever any person, duly recommended as an In-Patient, cannot be admitted for want of room, or be either rejected as ineligible, or discharged for irregularity, a letter to that effect shall be sent to the person by whom the Patient has been recommended.

93. In-Patients may be visited on Sundays, Wednesdays and Fridays, between the hours of two and four p.m., and no provisions shall be allowed to be taken into the Hospital, except by the permission of the House Surgeon. Should any visitor be detected taking anything out of the Hospital, or introducing anything contrary to the rules, he or she will be strictly prevented from entering in future. Donors and Annual Subscribers receive Tickets of Recommendation for In-Patients and Out-Patients according to the following scale :--
