REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1938.

-

S in former years this Report begins with an acknowledgment of the debt we owe, first to the Doctors for the ungrudging help given to the Hospital; secondly to the Matron and the Nurses who spend themselves unsparingly in their care of the patients. The many letters which reach us from grateful patients show how much they appreciate the care and attention received while in the Hospital.

Last year attention was called to the increase in the work of the Hospital as compared with that of a few years ago. This is particularly noticeable during the past year in the **Out-Patients' Department**—as the following figures show :—1934, 228 ; 1935, 509 ; 1936, 715 ; 1937, 687 ; 1938, **1384.**

Cases treated during 1938. Total number of Patients Treated, 1587; In-patients, 203; Out-patients, 1384. Major Operations, 31; Eye Cases, 186; Ear, Nose, and Throat (including 26 operations), 305; Accidents, 114; Minor Operations, 71; Medical Cases, 68; Dental Cases, 29; Other Cases (including Daily Dressings and Treatment) 783. Total, 1587.

The Patients came from the following districts :—Swanage, 1,206; Corfe Castle, 60; Langton, 178; Kingston, 3; Worth, 14; Studland, 13; Other places, 113. Total, 1587.

The Committee are very grateful indeed to Mr. Campbell Shaw and Mr. Roy Salkeld for the work they do with Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat cases. The benefit to patients is very great, as they avoid the long wait which is almost inevitable at the Bournemouth and District Hospitals.

The Private Wards. The Committee wish to draw attention to the reduction in the charges for the Private Wards, and to the further reduction and advantages to which subscribers of $\pounds 5$ 5s. 0d. and $\pounds 3$ 3s. 0d. are entitled (see page 22 of this Report).

Special Efforts. THE 1938 HOSPITAL BALL, organised by the Swanage Chamber of Trade, with Mr. Gathercole as Hon. Secretary, was very successful, and realised £38 4s. 7d. for our funds.-

POUND DAY, kindly arranged once more by Mrs. Field,

brought in 913 lbs. weight of goods. The Swanage Dairies were placed at her disposal by the Manager, Mr. W. H. Smith, to whom our thanks are due, as well as to Messrs. Robson & Son who also received goods, and to Mr. Marshallsay, who again conveyed the goods to the Hospital free of charge.

THE FLAG DAY in August realised £93 7s. 5d.

A TREASURE HUNT, organised by The Sunday Pictorial, brought in £17 2s. 4d.

THE B.B.C. Western Regional contributed £1 1s. 0d.

The Committee once more are desirous of expressing their thanks to the very kind friends who undertake the management of the special efforts and so contribute to our funds, but valuable as is the assistance we get from these sources, the amount thus received is uncertain and fluctuating. Our first requirement is a certain income and a larger income, so we must again appeal for more—many more !—annual subscribers.

The attention of subscribers is called to the form of agreement at the end of this Report which enables the Hon. Treasurer to recover the income tax paid on the amount subscribed by those who enter into this covenant. That this may be of substantial help is evidenced by the Report of the Royal United Kingdom Beneficent Association which recovered £335 last year, and was able to grant extra pensions. Under this agreement a subscription of £5 5s. 0d. becomes £7!

Special Gift. Mr. James Day very generously gave £50 to the Hospital in September last as a thank offering for peace. The Committee intend to devote the money to the installation of an automatic stoking apparatus which will effect a considerable saving in fuel, and will also save labour.

Those kind friends who constantly make presents of fruit, vegetables, eggs, and other welcome gifts are deserving of our grateful thanks.

Hospitals Aid Association. We are pleased to report that this is continuing its steady progress; but, as we stated last year, we cannot expect the members joining to increase as rapidly as formerly. However, before another year closes we should reach the 1,000 mark. Our very best thanks are due to the collectors, and the employers in the various firms who collect the weekly contributions from their employees. There are many more who could help in this way, and still further advance the progress of the Association.

The Eye Department, and the Nose, Ear and Throat Department are a great boon to our members, who are constantly recommended by their doctors to have the advice of a specialist. How great a boon it is is shown by the great increase in the number of out-patients treated last year. **Finance.** The Accounts show that ordinary expenditure for 1938 exceeded ordinary income by £187 11s. 9d. Taking the three years to 31st December, 1938, the total deficit (excluding from income legacies, special gifts, and the proceeds of the Chairman's appeal in 1937) amounts to nearly £500, and the position is causing the Committee much anxiety. Although the legacies have been received without any restrictions, the Committee feel that these sums should, if possible, be applied to improvements and additional equipment; but owing to the financial difficulties of recent years it has been necessary to use the legacies to meet ordinary expenditure.

There was an increase of $\pounds 42$ in ordinary income for 1938 compared with 1937, but expenditure has unfortunately increased by $\pounds 119$, chiefly owing to the higher cost of salaries and wages, and repairs. The Committee feel that it is essential to keep the premises in first class order, and $\pounds 60$ was spent in 1938 in renovating wards and general maintenance of property; this was more than in the previous year, but is equal to the average expenditure on property repairs over the last five years.

The Committee decided to apply a special anonymous gift of $\pounds 10$ to the purchase of instruments urgently required for our Ear, Nose, and Throat Department. Of this, $\pounds 4$ 11s. 0d. was spent in 1938, and the balance in the current year.

In 1934 and again in 1937 an urgent and widespread appeal for more financial support was sent out by the Chairman, and it is clear that a similar effort must be made in 1939. "Similar" and yet obviously one which must be made stronger and more personal.

At the Annual Meeting plans must be discussed and set on foot to bring the needs of the Hospital—by organised effort and personal canvas—to the notice of all residents in Swanage. and in all the villages served by the Hospital.
