# To the Chairman and Members, Richard Murray Hospital Joint Board

I present the Twenty-fourth Annual Report on the work of the Hospital during the year 1946.

There have been some changes in the membership of the Board. Mr. J. G. Wilkinson and Mr. P. Ferguson were nominated by the Trustees and Governors of the Hospital to fill the two vacancies in the Board's complement occasioned by the deaths of Mr. Alex. Elliot and Mr. J. Roxby Surtees, respectively, and Mr. E. Colgan was nominated by the County Council to succeed Mr. J. Mascall (deceased).

There have been no changes in the medical staffing of the Hospital, and Dr. Ewen has continued to serve as Acting House Surgeon.

In spite of every endeavour to secure the services of midwives for the Hospital no success was achieved and, as a direct result, the maternity wards had to be closed on 10th May, 1946. In the meantime, to assist the County Council in establishing a mental treatment service, the Board has granted the temporary use of the maternity wing to serve as a clinic until it reverts to its normal use.

The Minister of Health has renewed his approval of the Hospital for the treatment of tuberculosis for a further period expiring on 31st December, 1947, and the arrangement with the County Counci<sup>1</sup> for the admission of patients requiring treatment for surgica<sup>1</sup> tuberculosis has been renewed until 15th July, 1947. The Board has given careful consideration to the processon of a public supply of electricity to the Hospital, and has recommended the County Council to provide for an estimated expenditure of £940 in its estimates for the financial year ending 31st March, 1948.

The National Fire Service has undertaken a survey of the fire precautions at the Hospital, and has made certain recommendations for reducing the risk of fire.

Various improvements at the Hospital carried out during the year include the removal of the remainder of the blast walling erected during the war, the repair of the manual service lift, repair of the floor of the anaesthetic room, and the renewal of the floor of the operating theatre, while the usual periodical inspections of the "Iron Lung" and the X-ray and electrical apparatus have been carried out.

The Joint Board adopted the recommendations of the National Joint Council for Staff of Hospitals and Allied Institutions in England and Wales with reference to the salaries and conditions of service of certain non-nursing employees of the Hospital. The recommendations so far as wages are concerned came into force on the 1st April, 1946, and the conditions of service took effect from the 1st November, 1946.

The total number of admissions to the Hospital during the year was 394, which is 232 cases less than in the previous year due, in the main, to the fact of closing the maternity wards. Of these, 323 were admitted to the surgical wards and 71 to the maternity wards, the comparable figures for 1945 being 288 and 338 respectively. The average stay per patient in the surgical wards was 9.42 days, and in the maternity wards 12.9 days, compared with 10.8 days and 12.7 days, respectively, during 1945. year was 442, which is a decrease of 285 cases compared with the figure for the previous twelve months.

In the maternity wards 71 babies were born to 71 mothers, there being no sets of twins. During 1945 there were 342 births.

There were 4 deaths during 1946, which represents a death rate of 1.015% of the admissions, compared with a rate of .48% during the preceding year.

The surgical out-patient department attendances show an increase, the number being 853 compared with 798 for 1945. The number of re-attendances was 469. The out-patient attendances in the maternity department were 156 and the re-attendances 145 while those registered in the gynaecological department were 146 and 47, respectively. The total out-patient attendances at the Hospital during the year therefore numbered only 1,816, as compared with 2,415 for last year.

The work of the X-ray department has been continued throughout the year, the number of radiographs being 289 for 201 patients : the figures for 1945 were 327 for 236 patients.

As we have not yet been fortunate enough to secure the services of a masseur or masseuse, the work in the physio-therapy department has been limited to 72 electrical treatments during the year.

The efforts of the Special Appeals Committee and the Hospital Auxiliary Committee in building up the funds which are so important a factor in the efficient functioning of the Hospital again deserve special mention. The sum raised by the Special Appeals Committee for this year amounted to £291 14s. 8d. and that raised by the Hospital Auxiliary Committee £916 10s. 0d. The goodwill www, and the regular financial support given to the Hospital throughout the year both by industrial organisations and individuals, has been an outstanding feature, and this fact is recorded with gratitude.

Attached hereto are certain medical data relating to the work of the Hospital during 1946, the Matron's report, and the Hon. Treasurer's financial statement.

In conclusion, I offer sincere thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Joint Board, to Matron and her staff, the Hon. Treasurer, and all who have helped me during the year of this Report.

# INUAL REPORT OF CONSULTING OBSTETRICIAN AND GYNAECOLOGIST.

494 obstetrical and gynaecological attendances were recorded in the out-patient department during the year under review, while 71 obstetrical cases and 71 gynaecological patients (including 1 case of abortion) were admitted to the Hospital and received treatment. 71 babies were born to 71 mothers, there being no sets of twins. The average daily number of occupied maternity beds was 8.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF MATRON.

I beg to present my report for the year 1946.

NURSING STAFF.—The increasing difficulty of obtaining nurses is creating many problems. At the moment I have a grave shortage of probationers and trained staff and I am one Sister and three midwives short.

Owing to the difficulty of obtaining midwives the grievous step had to be taken on 10th May of closing the Maternity Department.

DOMESTIC STAFF.—Two maids left to be married and as the maternity wards had closed I have not replaced them.

LAUNDRY.—This department continues to work satisfactorily.

HOUSEKEEPING.—The average number of persons fed per day during the year was 38. The average cost of feeding patients and staff was  $1/6\frac{1}{2}d$ . per day.

JAM.—We did not make any jam, but a quantity of fruit from the garden was bottled.

EQUIPMENT AND RENEWALS.—Replacements of bedding, clothing and other equipment have been made and all appear to be in good condition.

GARDEN.—We have had a fair supply of fruit and vegetables.

HENS AND DUCKS.—The hens and ducks laid 1,883 eggs. We now have 9 hens and 6 ducks and I would suggest that we buy 6 more hens. REFRIGERATORS.—These continue to give every satisfaction.

LINEN LEAGUE.—Although the immediate need for infants, clothing is not urgent these ladies continue to attend and to make garments.

THE SPECIAL APPEALS COMMITTEE continues to be very helpful.

I beg to acknowledge with much pleasure the help I have received from the members and officials of the Hospital, from the nursing and medical staffs and from the many friends who continue to give us loyal support.
