## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS.

---

The Board of Governors of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York presents the following report of the Society for its one hundred and eighteenth year.

The annexed Medical Report, with accompanying statistics, will give a clear idea of the work that has been accomplished by the Society during the past year.

An examination of the donations received during the past year shows a falling off from the previous year. In view of the increased cost of everything necessary to the operation of the Hospital, and the many repairs necessary to the Hospital Building and equipment, it is absolutely imperative that the friends of the institution and the public come to its assistance. Efforts have been made by sending out personal letters and by appeals to bring the work of this Hospital before a large number of people.

During the past year, as hitherto, Mr. John Pierpont Morgan, by his most generous support, has made it possible for the Board of Governors to meet the annual cost of running the Hospital. The Board, however, looks with confidence to ever increasing interest on the part of the public spirited citizens of New York, and trusts that they will rally to the support of this work; and by annual subscriptions and gifts, or by benefactions through their wills, make it possible to support the Hospital without leaning so heavily, as has been the case in the past, upon Mr. Morgan.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has been extremely helpful, and the interest of its members has done much to enable the Hospital to accomplish its work. A full account of its work is made a part of this report.

The thanks of the Board of Governors are gladly extended

to all of those, who, by their gifts of money, or by donations of clothes, flowers, fruit, books, magazines, etc., helped in the Hospital's work. The Board wishes to express its deep appreciation to Mr. Henry Clay Frick who has given five thousand dollars to endow a bed in perpetuity. The Board wishes to emphasize the importance of this form of assisting the work of the institution.

The record of the Society in its Outdoor Department during the past year has been extremely good, and the Board of Governors feels much pleased that this large volume of work has been so successfully and satisfactorily handled.

All persons who at any time may desire to visit the Hospital in order to obtain information as to the details of its work, or who would like to examine the manner in which the Hospital is being conducted, will be gladly received, and full details will be given upon application being made to the Superintendent at the Hospital Building.

## MEDICAL REPORT.

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The beneficial objects of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital are the relief and care of destitute women unable to procure necessary medical assistance and nursing during the period of their confinement. As it has been found that a great many other women would benefit from proper hospital care which could not be included in the destitute class provision is made for all self-respecting women to partake of the advantages of the Hospital as patients by the payment of whatever fee they can afford. This scheme has been adopted with very beneficial results, both as regards the Hospital and the patients. In addition to the philanthropic objects the Hospital has also continued to serve as a centre for the teaching of practical obstetrics to both graduate and under-graduate students as well as trained nurses.

During the past year the Hospital has confined 6266 women of which 3052 were in the Outdoor Department and 3214 in the Indoor Department. This total number constitutes over ten per cent of all the cases reported to the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Borough of Manhattan during the year 1916. As many of these cases were reported to the Board of Health as having been confined by midwives, the number confined by the staff of this Hospital would probably also have been taken care of in large part in this manner unless such hospital facilities were provided. We continue in the belief that the deplorable features of poor midwife practice will in time be overcome by the growth of this and similar institutions. It will be noted that the total number of cases delivered is less than in the preceding year, which must be accounted for to some extent by the diminished immigration which results from the presence of the war in Europe. Whether the greater pros-



perity among the working class has had anything to do with their failure to resort to hospital care is a question that would be difficult to answer. There are undoubtedly, however, a great many women in the district served by the Hospital who are unacquainted with the advantages offered by the same and it is hoped that such an extension of clinical facilities as were mentioned in last year's report of the Medical Board will be developed in the near future.

It is necessary in the conduct of a large institution where a great many patients must be cared for with a minimum expenditure of time that many women are necessarily discharged before the possibility of the various complications of labor have been eliminated. In order to provide for proper post partum care the gynecological class was established several years ago to which all patients are referred for the treatment of any complications that may develop subsequent to the birth of the child. These classes are held on four days of the week under the supervision of the attending surgeons and have been well patronized. In addition to this feature of post partum work, attention may also be called to the inauguration by the Ladies' Auxiliary of a follow-up system by means of graduate nurses, who, through the medium of direct visits to patients in the Outdoor Department before their discharge from the service, are able to advise and direct these women in the care of themselves and their babies.

The Hospital is greatly indebted to the Ladies' Auxiliary for the efficient support extended by this medium, full summary of which is incorporated in this report. This feature constitutes one of the more modern developments of hospital work that serve to bring institutions in the closest possible relation with their clientele and aids in making them an essential part of the social fabric.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has continued its good work during the past year in rendering assistance to the patients in their homes, providing them when necessary with food, clothing and fuel.

The Endowment Fund for the study of puerperal fever so generously provided by Mrs. Helen Hartley Jenkins has continued to furnish resources for this important work.



The Pathological laboratory has been conducted in such a manner as to maintain a close relation with the clinical departments of the Hospital. A considerable number of very valuable contributions have emanated from this department during the past year.

The "Bulletin" has continued its publication and is now in its 10th volume, having maintained for itself the favorable reception accorded to the early numbers.

The Babies' Class has continued to minister to infants of less than two years of age whose mothers have been confined by the Hospital service. The work of the visiting nurse has continued to be of great assistance to the physicians in charge of the Babies' Class. The influence of this particular feature of the Hospital work in combating the high mortality among young infants must be regarded as an important one and deserving of special commendation.

The various members of the Attending Staff of Surgeons have held series of public clinics for visiting physicians which are of great value as sources of instruction in practical obstetrics.



## WORK OF THE SOCIETY IN 1915-1916.

### RELIEF WORK.

In the year October 1, 1915 to September 30, 1916, the Society, in the two branches of its service, treated **7,445** cases. The number of births was **6,337**. The number of births in the Borough of Manhattan, according to the returns from the Health Department, was **61,661**, the Society thus caring for over ten per cent of the entire number of confinements in the borough.

The number of applicants for treatment was **8,101**. In the Out-Door Department the number of applications was **3,701** the number treated **3,428**, the number of confinements **3,052**. The number of applications for treatment in the hospital **4,400** the number received **4,017** and the number of confinements **3,214**. The ambulance service brought to the hospital **578** cases. In all its departments the Society has worked to the full limit of its resources. The demands upon it are shown by the following table:

Of **5,902** patients concerning whom information was obtainable **5,596** lived in front, and **306** in rear tenements; **286** patients resided in basements, **568** on stoop floors, **1,204** on first floors, **1,144** on second floors, **1,113** on third floors, **789** on fourth floors, **798** on fifth floors and **364** not noted.

Husbands unemployed in **1,547**.

#### EDUCATIONAL WORK.

The Medical Department has given instruction to **97** undergraduate and **97** graduate students. A three months course has been given to **286** nurses.

#### LADIES' AUXILIARY.

The Ladies' Auxiliary reports **150** members. Its agents made **21,555** visits, distributed **20,123** garments, and aided **3,475** families with food or assistance in household duties.

#### FINANCES.

The cost of conducting the Hospital, the Out-Door Department and the Sub-station has been **\$224,961.38** including the Private Pavilion (**\$34,770.24**), as stated in the itemized statement of expenses, an increase of **\$32,389.20**.

## CHARTER OF THE SOCIETY OF THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

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*An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, passed March 1, 1799, chapter xxiii. Laws of 1799.*

WHEREAS, THOMAS PEARSALL, JOHN CHRISTOPHER KUNZE ROBERT LENOX, CORNELIUS RAY, ARCHIBALD GRACIE, JOHN STARK ROBERTSON, HENRY REMSEN, WILLIAM HOUSTOUN, ANDREW HAMERSLY, JOHN CHARLTON, DAVID M. CLARKSON, WILLIAM JAUNCEY, J. C. VANDEN HEUVEL and others, influenced by principles of benevolence and charity, associated as an institution, under the style of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, for the useful purpose of establishing an asylum for the reception of women in a state of pregnancy who are unable to procure the necessary medical assistance and nursing during the period of their confinement in child-bed, by their petition presented to the Legislature, have prayed to be incorporated, the better to enable them to carry into effect the salutary object of their institution; therefore;

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly.* That all such persons as now are, or hereafter shall be, members of the said institution, shall be and hereby are ordained, constituted and declared, forever a body corporate and politic, in fact and in name, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York" and by that name they and their successors shall and may have continual succession, and shall be persons in law, capable of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, defending and being defended, in all courts and places whatsoever, in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever; and that they and their successors may have a common seal, and



may change and alter the same at their pleasure; and also that they and their successors, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," shall be in law capable of purchasing, receiving, holding and conveying any estate, real or personal, for the use of the said corporation. *Provided* that the lands, tenements and hereditaments which it shall be lawful for the said corporation to hold shall be only such as shall be requisite for the purpose of erecting a public building and such houses or other buildings as may be suitable and necessary to the nature of the said institution, or such as shall have been *bona fide* mortgaged to it by way of security, or conveyed to it in satisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its business, or purchased at sales, on judgment which shall have been obtained for such debts; and with regard to all such lands, tenements and hereditaments so to be held by the said corporation as aforesaid, except such as may be for its immediate accommodation as aforesaid, or such as it may hold by way of mortgage, and whereof the actual possession shall be and remain in the mortgagors, their heirs or assigns, the said corporation shall be bound to sell and dispose of the same respectively within five years after it shall acquire the same, and shall not be capable of holding the same after the expiration of the said five years.

*And be it further enacted.* That all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same shall be deemed and taken for members of this corporation, and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot, by and from the said subscribers; that the following persons (that is to say) Thomas Pearsall, John Christopher Kunze, Robert Lenox, Cornelius Ray, Archibald Gracie, John Stark Robertson, Henry Remsen, William Houstoun, Andrew Hamersly, John Charlton, David M. Clarkson, William Jauncey, J. C. Vanden Heuvel, shall be the present governors of the said corporation, and shall continue in office until the second Wednesday in April, in the year one thousand and eight hundred, when a new election shall be made at the hour and place, to be appointed by the said governors; that the election for governors after the year one



thousand and eight hundred, shall be held annually on the second Wednesday of April, at such place and hour as the majority of the governors for the time being shall appoint, of which election, public notice shall be given by the said governors for the space of one week, in two of the daily newspapers printed in the said City. That if any vacancy shall happen among the said governors (so elected) by death, resignation or removal, such vacancy shall be filled by a special election for the purpose, to be held in the same manner as the annual elections are made and at such time and place as shall be provided for by the by-laws of the said corporation, and in case it should happen that an election of governors should not be held on any day when pursuant to this act it ought to have been made, the corporation shall not for that cause be deemed to be dissolved; but it shall and may be lawful, on any other day, to hold an election of governors in such manner as the by-laws of the said corporation shall prescribe.

*And be it further enacted.* That the governors shall not take or receive any compensation for their services; and for the time being shall have power, to make and prescribe such by-laws, rules and regulations, as to them shall appear needful and proper touching the management and disposition of the stock, property, estates and effects, of the said corporation, and touching the duties and conduct of the officers of the said corporation, and touching all other matters as appertain to the business, ends and purposes, for which the said corporation is by this act instituted; and shall also have power to appoint an apothecary, house pupils, matron, stewards, nurses and servants, for carrying on the business of the said institution.

Provided, that for the appropriation or disposal of any of the capital stock, a number not less than seven shall constitute a quorum, of which number the president, or, in his absence, the vice-president of the board, to be appointed in virtue of this act, shall be one, provided also, that such by-laws, rules and regulations shall not be repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States, or of this State.

*And be it further enacted.* That the governors, at their first meeting, and also at the first meeting in every year next after the said annual election on the second Wednesday in April,



shall elect by ballot, from their number a president, vice president, a treasurer and a secretary, and that the officers thus elected, shall immediately enter upon their respective offices and hold the same until the next election of governors, and it shall be the duty of the president or vice-president to preside at all meetings of the governors.

*And be it further enacted:* That the governors shall propose at one meeting and elect by ballot at the next a number of physicians, not exceeding four, to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution, and that the said physicians remain in office until the next election for governors, after which time they are to be annually elected.

*And be it further enacted.* That this act shall be and hereby is declared to be a public act, and shall be construed in all courts and places benignly and favorable for every beneficial purpose herein intended.

*Chapter 468, Laws of 1897.*

*An ACT to amend chapter twenty-three of the Laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine entitled "An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York." relative to subscriptions, the election of subscribers as members, and the elections of physicians and surgeons.*

Became a law May 17, 1897, with the approval of the Governor; passed three-fifths being present.

*The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

SEC. 1. Section two of chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, that all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same, shall be deemed and taken as members of this corporation provided such subscription is received by the society, and such subscribers are elected members of the said society by the board of governors thereof, in



such manners as shall be provided by the by-laws of the said society; and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot by a majority of the governors from the said subscribers.

SEC. 2. Section five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, that the governors of the said society, or a majority of them, shall immediately after the annual meeting of the society in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution; and in case of a vacancy or vacancies, to elect other physicians or surgeons in their places.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.



**BY-LAWS**  
OF THE  
**SOCIETY OF THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL OF THE**  
**CITY OF NEW YORK**

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**CHAPTER I.**

**ELECTION OF GOVERNORS.**

1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governors on the second Wednesday of April in each year for the purpose of choosing by ballot by a majority vote of the existing governors, from the members of the Society, thirteen governors who shall manage and conduct the property and concerns of said corporation for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected. The hour and place for the holding of such meeting shall be fixed by the Board from time to time.

2. A vacancy among the Governors may be filled at any Stated Meeting of the Board by a majority vote of a quorum of the Board.

3. A person subscribing to the funds of the Society a sum not less than five dollars, provided his subscription is accepted by the Board, upon being duly nominated and elected by the Governors, may become a member of the Society.

A person subscribing at one time to the funds of the Society the sum of five thousand dollars shall become a Patron of the Society, and any person so subscribing the sum of five hundred dollars shall become a Benefactor of the Society.

4. No person shall be eligible for the office of Governor unless he shall have so subscribed to the funds of the Society at least three months previous to an election.



## CHAPTER II.

1. If any Governor shall be absent from three successive stated meetings of the Board, or from three successive stated meetings of any committee of which he shall be a member, his place as Governor may be vacated.

## CHAPTER III.

## MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS.

1. The Board of Governors shall hold stated meetings on the first Tuesday of each month, except in the month of April, when the Annual Meeting for the election of Governors for the ensuing year as provided in Chapter I shall be held. The hour and place of meeting shall be from time to time appointed by the Board.

2. Special Meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, or on a written requisition of two Governors.

3. A number of not less than five shall be a quorum for the transaction of ordinary business; but for the appropriation or disposal of any of the property or money of the Society, except for the payment of necessary expenses, a number of not less than seven shall be necessary to constitute a quorum, of which number the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall be one.

4. At the stated meeting in April of each year, the Board shall elect from its number, by ballot, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and shall appoint the following standing committees, namely:

1. A Finance Committee, to consist of three Governors.
2. An Executive Committee, to consist of five Governors.
3. A Committee on Nominations, to consist of three Governors, to whom shall be referred the names of all candidates who may be proposed for election to the office of Governor, and of all nominations for vacancies occurring in any of the other offices of the Society, whenever they may occur.
4. A Law Committee, to consist of three Governors.



5. The following shall be the order of business at the meetings of the Board.

1. Reading of the Minutes of last meeting.
2. Reading of the Minutes of Standing Committees.
3. Reports of officers of the Board.
4. Reports of Standing or Special Committees.
5. Unfinished business.
6. Miscellaneous business.

## CHAPTER IV.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

1. The President, or Vice-President, together with the Secretary, may, on authority of the Board, upon the payment of the principal and interest of any Bond and Mortgage held by the Society, execute a certificate of satisfaction thereof, or an assignment of the same without recourse.

2. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the Society, which shall be deposited in a Bank or Trust Company to be designated by the Board, and he is authorized to receive the interest or dividends on all securities and to give receipt therefor. In case of his absence or disability, the President or Vice-President is authorized to receive such interest and dividends.

3. The Treasurer shall keep books of account, and at each stated meeting shall make a report of the several sums by him received and expended.

4. The secretary shall have the custody of the records and papers of the Society, other than the securities and medical records; he shall keep fair and accurate minutes of the proceedings of the Board, and notify the Governors of the meetings. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal of the Society.

## CHAPTER V.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

1. The Finance Committee shall, from time to time, give directions to the Treasurer in regard to the investment of the funds of the Society, and no change shall be made in any



investment without the authority of the said committee. They shall, as often as once in six months, examine the Treasurer's accounts and make a report to the Board of the condition of the finances of the Society.

2. The Finance Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

## CHAPTER VI.

### CUSTODY OF SECURITIES.

1. All securities shall be kept in a Safe Deposit Company to be selected by the Board, to which access shall be obtained by the Treasurer when accompanied by a member of the Finance Committee.

2. A Record Book shall be kept in which all visits to the safe deposit box shall be entered, with full particulars of the object of the visit. This entry shall be signed by the visitors, and the Record Book shall be submitted to the Board at each meeting.

## CHAPTER VII.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The Executive Committee shall have the supervision of all buildings and improvements belonging to the corporation, and shall hold stated meetings at least once in each month, and as often as the exigencies of business may require.

2. They shall audit the bills on receiving them from the Superintendent, and make a draft on the Treasurer for the amount of the same. At their succeeding meeting they are to examine all such bills to see that they are duly receipted. They shall notify the Superintendent each month of the total amount of money which may be expected for all running expenses during the following month.

3. They shall keep a book of minutes, and enter therein such business as may come before them, which book must be laid before the Governors at every monthly meeting.



4. The Committee may direct the expenditure of money or clothes for the relief of patients who from extreme poverty or circumstances of peculiar distress, may need such aid.

5. Whenever they think it necessary that a special meeting of the Governors should be called they shall apply for that purpose to the President, or in his absence, to the Vice-President. In the absence or inability of both to act, such meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

6. The Executive Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

1. The Board of Governors, or a majority of them shall immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Board in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefits of the Institution, and to conduct the educational and medical work of the Hospital. In case of a vacancy or vacancies, the Board of Governors, or a majority of them shall elect other physicians or surgeons to fill the same.

2. No Surgeon, officer, nurse or servant of this Institution shall accept any gift or bequest from or on behalf of any patient in the Wards or Out-Patient Department.

#### CHAPTER IX.

Persons may endow beds in the Society's Hospital as follows: By a payment of \$5,000, a bed may be endowed in perpetuity; by a payment of \$3,000, a bed may be endowed for one life; by a payment of \$250, a bed may be endowed for one year. Persons so endowing beds shall have such rights, in respect to naming patients to the Society for treatment, as the Governors, shall, from time to time, prescribe.



## CHAPTER X.

## AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS.

1. Any alteration or amendment of these by-laws must be proposed in writing at a stated meeting of the Governors, but cannot be acted upon until a subsequent stated meeting; when the same may be adopted provided a majority of the Governors shall approve thereof.

2. These by-laws shall take effect immediately, and all other by-laws of the Society are repealed.

Three dozen robes for patients, 36 yards gray flannel for hoods to be worn by patients out on the roof garden, plants for solarium and roof garden, a number of abdominal binders and elastic stockings have also been supplied by the Committee. Patients have been cared for before and after confinement by the State Aid Association, Emergency Shelter, Margaret Strachan Home, St. Andrew's Convalescent Home, Salvation Army Home and St. Barnabas House. The Gramercy Nursery has cared for little children while their mothers have been in the hospital. The Committee has also furnished stationery to patients, transportation to their distant homes, and orthopaedic appliances when required.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE II.

Committee II reported as follows:

The out-patient work of the Ladies' Auxiliary, which is in the care of Committee II has been carried on as usual during the past year. Our agent has a list sent her each morning by the hospital, of all babies born in their homes in the past twenty-four hours.

We have cared for 3,475 new babies and their mothers during the year. The four cleaning women in our employ are sent to these homes daily with sheets, baby clothes and cleaning material. They make the mother as comfortable and clean as possible, give the room a thorough cleaning, and often cook the dinner for the rest of the family. They visit each case daily until the mother is up, doing all they can to help the household. Our agent goes once to every case, and more often if she thinks necessary. She has had a very small monthly allowance during the past year for emergency relief, and has found it almost a necessity, for many times a bottle of milk and loaf of bread from the corner grocer has meant more than any amount of help in the future.

Twenty thousand, one hundred and twenty-three visits have been made, and 14,357 garments have been given out. We have expended \$2,960.97.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE III.

Committee III reported as follows:

During the year from February 23, 1915, to February 22, 1916, this Committee—which consists of Mrs. W. P. Hamilton, Chairman, and Mrs. Townsend Lawrence, Vice-Chairman—has cut out from material purchased by itself, and had made by various benevolent and industrial societies, 13,806 garments. Two thousand, one hundred and seventy-five of these were distributed through Committee I to patients leaving the hospital, and 11,631 through Committee II among the out-patients. In addition it has supplied 3,493 unsewed garments, such as baby bands, binders, diapers, etc. It has also had cut out from the material supplied by the hospital, for use in the wards, 3,493 garments.

The total expense for material has been \$699.48 which, as the appropriation is \$800, leaves a balance of about \$100.

There are now on our shelves, garments ready for distribution, 1,554; cut out and ready to be sent to be made 1,074; and 29 pieces of material. The garments are made by the following societies:

Master Courter Dickinson, a grandson of one of the most valued members of the Auxiliary, contributed fifteen fans and four pairs of blankets, and the committee has also had a contribution of one dozen robes, gray flannel for hoods, and plants for the roof garden from Committee I.

Mrs. J. Pierpont Morgan gives work regularly each month to a protege of hers to whom bundles of work are sent every month to be made up. This, of course, helps greatly.

The Committee is very anxious to increase its membership and begs that ladies, willing to give an hour a week to cutting out and preparing clothing to be sent to the various societies to be made up, will send their names to Mrs. Townsend Lawrence, 122 East 76 Street.

### REPORT OF BABIES' CLASS.

From October 1, 1914, to September 30, 1915, a great deal of interesting work was done in the Babies' Class. The visiting nurse, whom you so kindly supply, made 1,339 visits in the homes of the tenement-house babies which are scattered all over Manhattan and the Bronx. This number is considerably in advance of the number of calls she made the previous year.

The nurse has done an inestimable amount of good by giving the mothers the personal object lessons they need in the home care of their babies. It is only in this way that we can really reach an ignorant mother. Instructions given by a doctor in a crowded dispensary service very often make little or no impression on the mother, but as soon as she actually sees the treatment supplied in the right and simple way in her own home, she is then able to understand what she is expected to do for her child, and is most anxious and eager to do what is right, in the great majority of cases.

The special fund allowed us for aid in the homes of the babies has been greatly appreciated. We have used it for the following purposes:

Milk for the babies where special top milk formulas had to be given.

Cereals, as barley and oat flour, when the parents were too poor to buy these.

Dextri-maltose and milk sugar, needed in modifying the milk for the very poor babies.

Cooking utensils for the preparation of the babies' food in the homes. Many times the pots and pans used by the family are entirely unfit for the preparation of the babies' food.

Little cotton suits for the premature babies.

Abdominal bands for very poor babies.

Lime water.

Cream dippers.



Mustard for use in making mustard plasters.

Cheap tea kettles for use in giving inhalations for croup and bronchitis.

Coal and wood in emergency cases, while waiting for the proper society to investigate the cases.

Carfares for mothers who are too poor to attend the clinics as often as is necessary.

Special medicine for babies, when it is really needed and cannot be obtained from our druggist.

Also numerous other small articles in emergencies for special cases in great need.

Having this fund for *immediate* use in relieving great want, is one of the most helpful things connected with our work. In a great many cases we feel it has been the actual means of saving a life. The nurse always uses it with discretion and the gratitude of the families helped is often very touching.

During the past summer we sent 54 mothers with their babies to the country or seashore and directed many more to apply to various charities sending mothers and babies away. We also gave out ice tickets and tickets for day trips on the boats devoted to such service.

One of our most grateful mothers is a Cuban woman who has been coming to the class for a year and a half with a very delicate little baby who has heart disease. We almost despaired of saving this child for many months, but she has gradually grown stronger, and now at the age of 18 months is almost like any normal baby. A new baby has just arrived in this family, and, as the father has been very ill for some time, we have had to help them considerably, using our special fund for this purpose.

Another interesting family is that of a tiny Hebrew baby. The baby is premature—a seven months' child—and was very tiny at birth. The mother was dangerously ill for a long time and the wee baby was cared for by neighbors and the little twelve-year-old sister. The baby had to be brought up on the bottle and our nurse made many calls at this home. The little sister has always been greatly interested in the preparation of the food and care of the baby. She is the only one in this family who can speak and understand English,



so she acts as interpreter, and it is very remarkable to hear her give such intelligent information about the baby when she is questioned by the doctors in the class. She is so proud of the good progress being made by the baby, and can hardly wait to have him weighed every week to see how much he has gained. He has done very well indeed and is a credit to the little sister's care.

Among our babies is a little Japanese girl now nearly one year old. She helped support the family by acting in a moving picture play of "Madame Butterfly" for a film company. Her grandmother in Japan is very anxious to see her and has sent the father some money to bring the baby to Japan this summer. The mother is an American woman and says she will not go to Japan, but the father intends to take the baby himself rather than to dissappoint his old mother.

### AN APPEAL TO THE PUBLIC.

To give the proper care to the women confined in their homes, the auxiliary was obliged to add three visiting nurses to its staff of workers. These nurses visit each case from 3 to 4 times, where they find the patient is alone and receiving no care from family or friends, also they are endeavoring to give prenatal instruction and to teach the mothers to make some preparation for the child.

The following is an example of the conditions the nurses often find:—

Room cold and dirty.

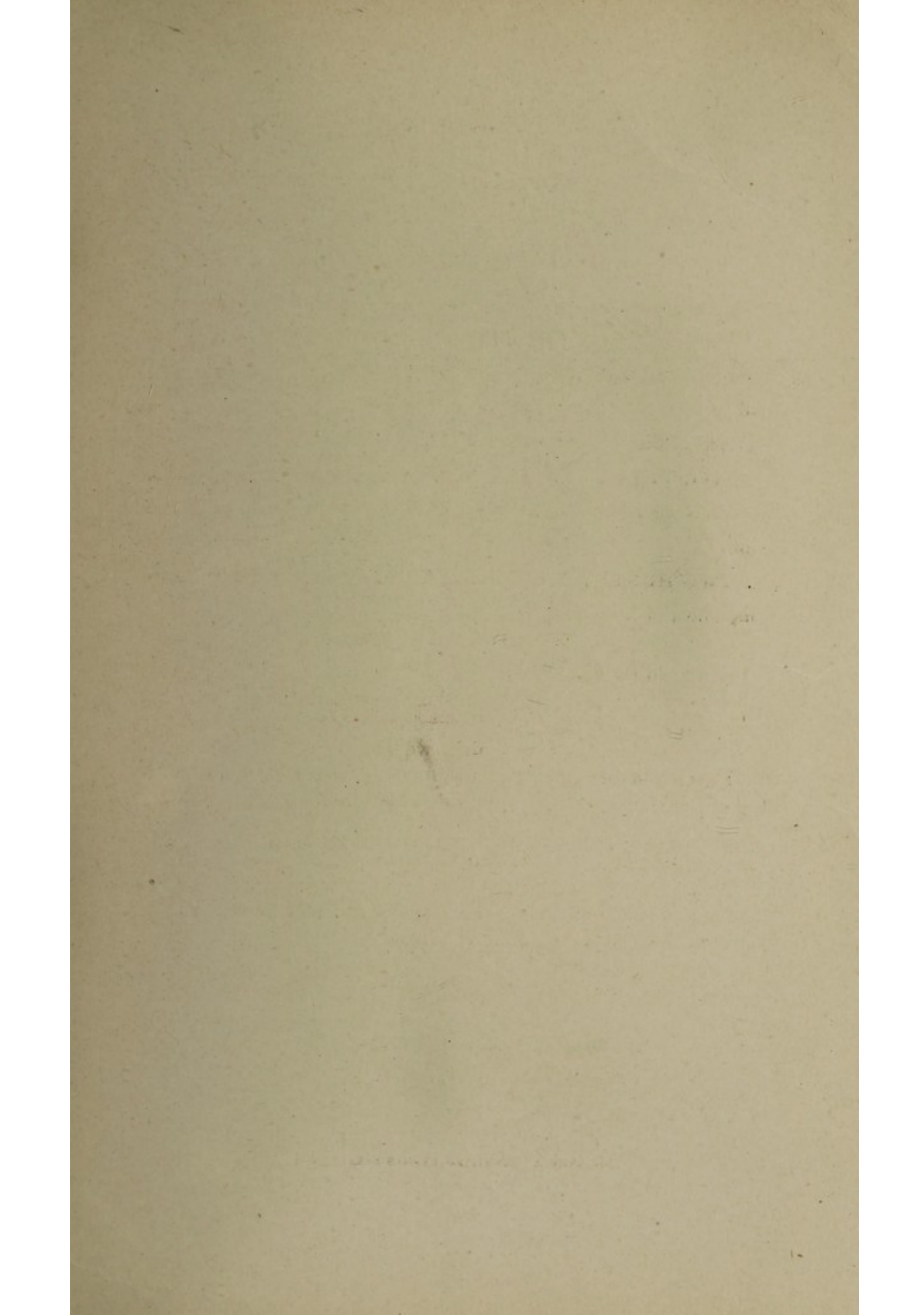
Husband in the Hospital.

The janitor and a boy of 11 years occasionally did what they could for her. Our nurse bathed the patient and changed her bed with clean sheets, which we provide. Also clothes for the baby which she found wrapped in a soiled shirt the mother being too poor to buy any clothing whatsoever for it.

This case was given daily care while necessary.

This work which is most important has added about \$4000 to the other expenses of the auxiliary and owing to the very small sum that was made at the annual Costume Ball on Jan. 11th, we find ourselves obliged to appeal to the public for some special contributions to carry on this work, which is absolutely necessary to the welfare and health of these mothers and children.
