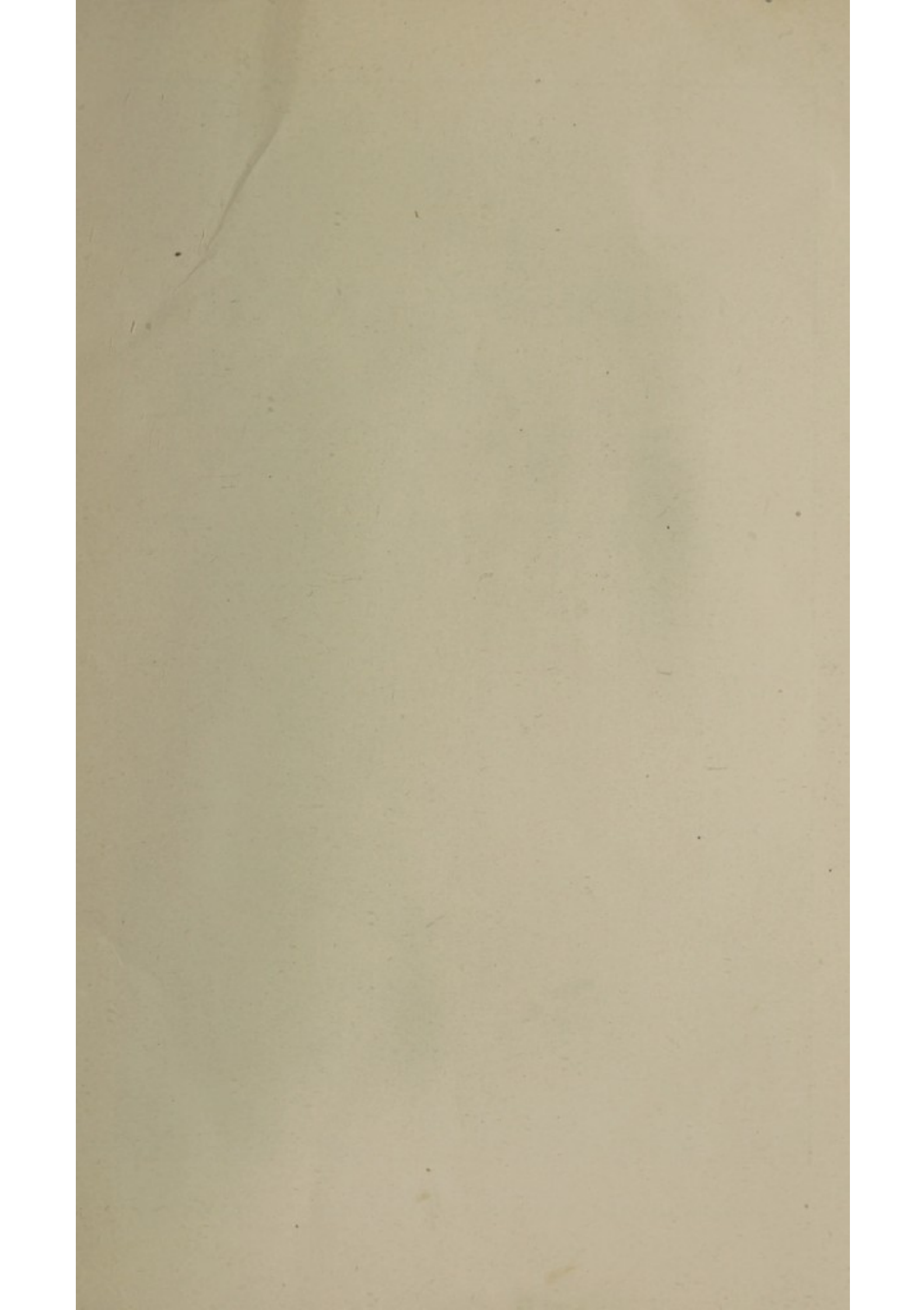

Report of the Board of Governors

The Board of Governors of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital submits herewith its report for the 130th fiscal year of the Society, ending December 31, 1928.

The Board records with sorrow the death since the last report of two of its members, Mr. Elbert H. Gary and Mr. Francis R. Appleton. Both of these gentlemen had been Governors of the Hospital since 1909 and had been deeply interested in its affairs.

In quality and amount the maternity service rendered by the doctors and nurses has equaled the record of preceding years, and the high standard of efficiency which has characterized this service is an eloquent tribute to the ability and devotion of the staff. The educational work conducted by the institution has also continued to be of great significance and value. The details of both of these activities are set forth in the statistics attached to this report. The Governors acknowledge gratefully what has been accomplished by all the members of the medical and hospital staffs. To them are due the admirable results recorded in this report.

The constant aid of the most efficient Ladies' Auxiliary has been of great value, and their continued interest in and devotion to this important branch of the Hospital's work are warmly appreciated by the Governors.

During the year an important agreement was made by the Governors with The Society of the New York

Hospital. As a result the Lying-In Hospital will be included in the medical centre of the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical College Association, and as soon as the new buildings are completed will move from its present site to the maternity building at the southwest corner of Seventieth and Exterior Streets. In consideration of the Governors of the Lying-In providing, through generous friends, the cost of this new maternity building and adequate additional endowment for maternity work, the New York Hospital has supplied a site for the building and agreed to erect the building and to operate permanently therein the Lying-In Hospital, including its educational work, to an extent at least equal to its present scale and standard of efficiency. In view of that contract the Governors of the Lying-In Hospital thought it best to resign, and their successors have been elected. These successors will do their best to continue the admirable work, both in hospital operation and medical education, which has been so ably conducted, and to allow no diminution either in the amount or the quality of that work. They feel that the community owes an immense debt to the retiring Governors for their untiring efforts and supreme generosity in making this notable hospital service possible for so many years.

There is interesting historic precedent for this new affiliation between the two Hospitals. The Lying-In Hospital started its work in August 1799 in the house No. 2 Cedar Street, but the income from its funds proving insufficient to maintain a separate hospital, an agreement was made in January 1801 with the New York Hospital, by which that institution was to receive the Lying-In income and to establish and

maintain a Lying-In ward in the New York Hospital building on Broadway between Duane and Worth Streets. The Lying-In Governors had free access to the ward and were also given a room for their meetings. This arrangement continued from 1801 to 1827 when the Lying-In ward was closed and the Lying-In Hospital Governors withdrew.

Medical Report



THE report of the medical and educational activities of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, from January 1, 1928 to December 31, 1928, inclusive, is herewith submitted.

In all Departments the Society has worked to the full capacity of its resources. Throughout the entire personnel there is evident a spirit of good co-ordination, co-operation and team play, actuated by the endeavor to improve results in the work of the hospital as a whole. A greater service is being rendered than is readily realized, not only to this community but to the nation. It is much to have given thousands of women and their children good obstetrical care. It is far more to have provided practical training for doctors and nurses in this, as yet, too neglected branch of medicine. As these doctors and nurses go out from the training which the Lying-In has given them, they become widely scattered in this and other countries, especially Canada. A considerable number of doctors who began their training in obstetrics with us are professors of this branch in medical schools in different cities; others are heads of or workers in obstetrical departments of hospitals. The nurses become directresses of training schools and supervisors in obstetrical departments. Both doctors and nurses serve not only the poor in their localities but all grades of society. They undoubtedly do much towards raising the standard of care given to patients, and exert no small influence in procuring maternity hospitals and better facilities for teaching, and the home and hospital care of patients during childbirth.

During the past year, five thousand seven hundred and forty-five patients have been treated, not including new born babies and those visiting the dispensary classes. Of these, five thousand were confinements, among whom were many seriously ill and complicated cases such as toxemias, serious cardiac and pulmonary conditions, a few infections and a considerable number who required major operations; and yet, all but twenty-five of these

women were discharged from the hospital alive. The various clinics have been well conducted and attended. The Babies' clinic under the direction of Doctor Emelyn L. Coolidge has earned and still deserves highest praise for its life-saving work for babies and the education of mothers. The ante-partum clinics at the substation and at the hospital; the post-partum, gynecological, syphilitic and cardiac clinics are doing good and helpful work and deserve much credit. The training school for nurses, under the direction of L. J. Napier, R. N., is maintained at a high standard of excellence and efficiency. This is a much more difficult thing to accomplish than in a general hospital, owing to the short term of service and frequent changing of graduate and under-graduate pupil nurses; and also to the fact that the service is as active by night as by day, caring for what amounts to emergency cases. The laboratory has maintained its usual standard of good work and reliability. The X-Ray department is undergoing reconstruction, and is being modernized under the direction of Doctor Harry M. Imboden, Roentgenologist to the hospital. Fuller statistics are to be found in the succeeding pages and in the reports of heads of different departments.

Great and rapid progress is being made in teaching and providing facilities for the care of obstetrical patients and yet, there are far too many doctors practising this branch of medicine who do not believe in or do not realize the importance of close supervision of women during pregnancy, and who attend confinements and the after care of such patients in a hurried, careless and surgically unclean manner. As an example of the results of closer supervision, in the eight years from 1914 to 1922, the incidence of convulsions was reduced from 11.4 to 1.6 per thousand cases confined in the Lying-In Hospital by recognition and treatment of the early symptoms of toxemia. These results have been maintained. Other complications have been proportionately reduced by a like course. Such results are being obtained in maternities of the better sort, and in the cases of careful and well equipped private obstetricians. No small factor in arriving at these results is the co-operation of the "instructed" patients who are periodically examined and advised in the ante-partum clinics. These women note the care exercised during labor and the lying-

in period, and before leaving the hospital they are given class instruction, thereafter returning to the babies', post-partum and other clinics. They seek this instruction eagerly as something of value to themselves and their children. The under-graduate medical students serve for a period of three weeks, employing their time in ward rounds, delivery and operating rooms, the ante-partum clinics and in the out-door department where they deliver patients under supervision of members of the house staff and attending surgeons. The course for graduate pupils is one entirely of observation, limited according to the wish of the pupil from a few days to several months. Many of these pupils make it a practise to return to the hospital every year or two. The interne staff receives the most valuable training. Appointments are for periods of four months each, except in the case of the house surgeon to the out-door department who serves for six months. Thus, there are two house surgeons appointed each year to the out-door department and six to the in-door department. These men have had from two to three and in some cases four years hospital training prior to their appointment to the Lying-In. These positions are much in demand, and it is conservative to estimate that every year at least two hundred well trained candidates apply for the six places on the in-door staff. Not infrequently all of these vacancies are filled for two or more years in advance. The assistant house surgeons serve for three months in the out-door department and one month in the wards where they receive good training. The requirements as to previous hospital training are not as exacting as in the case of house surgeons, yet many of these assistants have had considerable hospital experience. During the past year the following have availed themselves of this training:

The attending staff is made up of nine attending surgeons, one

adjunct attending and a chief surgeon. All but one of the above have, in years gone by, served as house surgeons in this hospital. Several are rather young in years of service on the attending staff, the others have for many years been caring for large numbers of normal and abnormal obstetrical patients and demonstrating this work for doctors and nurses. It is not for us to speak of the character of work and results obtained in the Lying-In—they must speak for themselves. We can, however, state with assurance that there is no other group of attending surgeons of like number in America, possibly not anywhere, who have had and continue to have such opportunities to acquire experience, trained judgment and operative skill in clinical obstetrics. These men are working together loyally and with enthusiastic and sustained effort.

In February, 1923, the development of obstetric analgesia was begun at the Lying-In Hospital and has been in constant use up to the present time in suitable cases, having been employed in some twelve thousand instances, leaving no doubt that it is safe for mother and child and of great value. We must believe from frequent letters and verbal reports that this method is being employed more widely and with increasing satisfaction by those who are responsible for the care of women in childbirth. It has met with adverse criticism and some opposition. Any radical change that is worth while has been treated in the same way. It is not perfection but it is progress. Not long since, eight patients were seen in two rooms in the hospital in different stages of progressing labor. No out-cry was heard. They were being treated with analgesia and at least relieved of much of their pain. We know of no other safe method of treating such patients which will produce like results.

The Ladies' Auxiliary continues its helpful work in providing means for carrying on the Babies' clinic with its nurses; scrub women who are employed cleaning up homes in the out-door department when mothers are confined to bed, and providing clothing for those in need. Through the social service worker, patients are followed up after they cease to require obstetrical care, and where necessary, mothers and children are placed in homes or suitable institutions. Further details of the work of

the Ladies' Auxiliary will be found in the reports of the various committees.

In the merging of the Lying-In and New York Hospitals there has come a readjustment in the Board of Governors of the former. As this change took place, and it was realized that the men who had given of their time, ripened experience, means and sympathetic, helpful care for years in carrying on this work, were to give place for others, we could not escape a poignant sense of loss. The present board, all Governors of New York Hospital—men of affairs with long experience in hospital management have assumed their duties and are giving assistance and support in a way that is very much appreciated. The Governors' fiscal and executive representative, the medical superintendent, a one time interne of the hospital, is worthy of special mention. His knowledge of medicine, long years of service in the hospital, his acquaintance with the details of its history and those who have been connected with it; his close touch with the work and his experience have made him a valued officer, co-worker and counselor.

Report of Nurses' Training School

More students were admitted to the Lying-In Hospital during the year 1928 than during the previous year, in spite of the fact that two schools discontinued affiliations. Several schools sent their pupils very irregularly because of the shortage of third year pupils, illness, etc. One school discontinued affiliation because of the opening of an Obstetrical Department of their own, the second because this hospital allows no remuneration to the affiliating nurse.

The student classes on the whole have been larger, the Post-Graduate applicants have increased. It is interesting to note the number of Post-Graduate students who have been sent to us from General Hospitals with the understanding that they will return as supervisors in their own Obstetrical Departments. It has been our privilege, on completion of their courses, to place a number of our graduate students in hospital positions. There has been a noted increase in the number of recent graduates in the private duty field of Obstetrics.

We have put much thought and effort into the revision of our Curriculum and teaching methods. The suggestions and co-operation of our Staff of Lecturers, the support and encouragement of our Chief Surgeon and Supervising Nurses in the improvement of our nursing technique are fully appreciated. Without this interest and co-operation, advancement in this work would be impossible.

Supervisors' Staff meetings have been held monthly, at which the nursing problems of the hospital have been discussed with much interest. The result of these meetings has been most gratifying. Most helpful suggestions for the improvement of our services have been offered and better co-operation between departments has been secured.

We believe the opportunity in our Out-Patient Department for nursing in the homes of patients has been invaluable for our students. While the amount of work done has been less than last year, we believe the quality has improved.

Statistics

During the year ending December 31st, 1928 the Society admitted to the two branches of its service 5,745 cases. The number of births was 5,065. The number of births in the Borough of Manhattan according to the returns from the Health Department was 42,382 of which 38,169 were reported by physicians, 4,213 by midwives and others. The Society cared for over 11% of the entire number of confinements in the Borough and more than 13% of those treated by physicians. The total number of applications for treatment was 6,052. In the Out-Door Department the number of applications was 1,511, the number treated was 1,331, the number of confinements was 1,175. The number of applications for treatment in the Hospital was 4,541; the number treated was 4,581 and the number of confinements was 3,825. The ambulance service brought to the Hospital 124 cases. In all its departments the Society has worked to the limit of its resources. Detailed figures showing the Hospital's work during the year will be found in the following pages.

Of the 4,360 patients concerning whom information was obtainable, 4,248 lived in front and 112 resided in rear tenements. 102 patients resided in basements, 376 on stoop floors, 693 on first floors, 934 on second floors, 637 on third floors, 517 on fourth floors, 660 on fifth floors and 1,714 not noted.

On the whole the year 1928 has been a good one for babies. We have not had so many seriously ill babies as usual, this with the fact that we now charge a small fee for treatment, accounts for the slightly lower figures given above.

Many of the poorer classes of New York families, are moving into the suburbs, as they can take advantage of the very moderate rentals and easy payment plans to purchase homes there, that are now being offered to them. Some years ago this class of people could not be induced to leave New York City, no matter how small and uncomfortable their homes might be. Now they are fast becoming educated to the fact that fresh air and sunshine mean everything to their babies and they are willing to go where these can be obtained. They have heard so much about rickets and the necessity of sun baths and fresh air for the prevention and cure of this disease that they welcome the opportunity the cheaper real estate developments give them, to bring their babies up in the sunshine out of the crowded city. We have patients who come to our Babies' Clinic from many of these suburban places, but naturally they cannot come quite as often as if they lived nearer by.

We had two special vaccination classes this year and vaccinated 188 babies for smallpox. The toxin-antitoxin for preventing Diphtheria is given regularly each session the Clinic is held.

The Ultra-Violet ray lamp has been used regularly except during the warmest months. The sun is then considered enough as a preventive and curative agent for the average case of rickets. Mothers are instructed how to give sunbaths out of doors as long as the weather permits.

We have given free milk, free ice and trips into the country or to the seashore as usual this past year to mothers having babies who need this special help and cannot obtain it otherwise.

Several Volunteer workers have greatly assisted us in taking histories, interpreting and giving the violet ray treatments under the supervision of one of our doctors. We are very grateful to them for this help.

Charter of the Society of the Lying-in Hospital of the City of New York

An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, passed March 1, 1799, chapter xxiii. Laws of 1799.

WHEREAS, THOMAS PEARSALL, JOHN CHRISTOPHER KUNZE, ROBERT LENOX, CORNELIUS RAY, ARCHIBALD GRACIE, JOHN STARK ROBERTSON, HENRY REMSEN, WILLIAM HOUSTOUN, ANDREW HAMERSLY, JOHN CHARLTON, DAVID M. CLARKSON, WILLIAM JAUNCEY, J. C. VANDEN HEUVEL and others, influenced by principles of benevolence and charity, associated as an institution, under the style of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, for the useful purpose of establishing an asylum for the reception of women in a state of pregnancy who are unable to procure the necessary medical assistance and nursing during the period of their confinement in child-bed, by their petition presented to the Legislature, have prayed to be incorporated, the better to enable them to carry into effect the salutary object of their institution; therefore

Be it enacted by the People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly. That all such persons as now are, or hereafter shall be members of the said institution, shall be and hereby are ordained, constituted and declared, forever a body corporate and politic, in fact and in name, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York" and by that name they and their successors shall and may have continual succession, and shall be persons in law, capable of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, defending and being defended, in all courts and places whatsoever, in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever; and that they and their successors may have a common seal, and may change and alter the same at their pleasure; and also that they and their successors, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," shall be in law capable of purchasing, receiving, holding and conveying any estate, real or personal, for the use of the said corporation. *Provided* that the lands, tenements and hereditaments which it shall be lawful for said corporation to hold shall be only such as shall be requisite for the purpose of erecting a public building and such houses or other buildings as may be suitable and necessary to the nature of the said institution, or such as

shall have been *bona fide* mortgaged to it by way of security, or conveyed to it in satisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its business, or purchased at sales, on judgment which shall have been obtained for such debts; and with regard to all such lands, tenements and hereditaments so to be held by the said corporation as aforesaid, except such as may be for its immediate accommodation as aforesaid, or such as it may hold by way of mortgage, and whereof the actual possession shall be and remain in the mortgagors, their heirs or assigns, the said corporation shall be bound to sell and dispose of the same respectively within five years after it shall acquire the same, and shall not be capable of holding the same after the expiration of the said five years.

And be it further enacted. That all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same shall be deemed and taken for members of this corporation, and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot, by and from the said subscribers; that the following persons (that is to say) Thomas Pearsall, John Christopher Kunze, Robert Lenox, Cornelius Ray, Archibald Gracie, John Stark Robertson, Henry Remsen, William Houstoun, Andrew Hamersly, John Charlton, David M. Clarkson, William Jauncey, J. C. Vanden Heuvel, shall be the present governors of the said corporation, and shall continue in office until the second Wednesday in April, in the year one thousand and eight hundred, when a new election shall be made at the hour and place, to be appointed by the said governors; that the election for governors after the year one thousand and eight hundred, shall be held annually on the second Wednesday of April, at such place and hour as the majority of the governors for the time being shall appoint, of which election, public notice shall be given by the said governors for the space of one week, in two of the daily newspapers, printed in the said City. That if any vacancy shall happen among the said governors (so elected) by death, resignation or removal, such vacancy shall be filled by a special election for the purpose, to be held in the same manner as the annual elections are made and at such time and place as shall be provided for by the by-laws of the said corporation, and in case it should happen that an election of governors should not be held on any day when pursuant to this act it ought to have been made, the corporation shall not for that cause be deemed to be dissolved; but it shall and may be lawful, on any other day, to hold an election of governors in such manner as the by-laws of the said corporation shall prescribe.

And be it further enacted. That the governors shall not take or receive any compensation for their services; and for the time being shall have power, to make and prescribe such by-laws, rules and regulations, as to them shall appear needful and proper touching the management and disposition of the stock, property, estates and effects, of the said corpora-

tion, and touching the duties and conduct of the officers of the said corporation, and touching all other matters as appertain to the business, ends and purposes, for which the said corporation is by this act instituted; and shall also have power to appoint an apothecary, house pupils, matron, stewards, nurses and servants, for carrying on the business of the said institution.

Provided, that for the appropriation or disposal of any of the capital stock, a number not less than seven shall constitute a quorum, of which number the president, or in his absence, the vice-president of the board, to be appointed in virtue of this act, shall be one, provided also, that such by-laws, rules and regulations shall not be repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States, or of this State.

And be it further enacted. That the governors, at their first meeting, and also at the first meeting in every year next after the said annual election on the second Wednesday in April, shall elect by ballot, from their number a president, vice-president, a treasurer and a secretary, and that the officers thus elected, shall immediately enter upon their respective offices and hold the same until the next election of governors, and it shall be the duty of the president or vice-president to preside at all meetings of the governors.

And be it further enacted. That the governors shall propose at one meeting and elect by ballot at the next a number of physicians, not exceeding four to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution, and that the said physicians remain in office until the next election for governors, after which time they are to be annually elected.

And be it further enacted. That this act shall be and hereby is declared to be a public act, and shall be construed in all courts and places benignly and favorable for every beneficial purpose herein intended.

CHAPTER III.
Chapter 468, Laws of 1897.

An ACT to amend chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine entitled "An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," relative to subscriptions, the election of subscribers as members, and the elections of physicians and surgeons.

Became a law May 17, 1897, with the approval of the Governor; passed three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

SEC. 1. Section two of chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, that all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same, shall be deemed and taken as members of this corporation provided such subscription is received by the society, and such subscribers are elected members of the said society by the board of governors thereof, in such manner as shall be provided by the by-laws of the said society; and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot by a majority of the governors from the said subscribers.

SEC. 2. Section five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, that the governors of the said society, or a majority of them, shall immediately after the annual meeting of the society in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution; and in case of a vacancy or vacancies, to elect other physicians or surgeons in their places.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

BY-LAWS
of the
Society of the Lying-in Hospital
of the City of New York

CHAPTER I.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS

1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governors on the first Tuesday of April in each year for the purpose of choosing by ballot by a majority vote of the existing Governors, from the members of the Society, thirteen Governors who shall manage and conduct the property and concerns of said corporation for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected, the hour and place for the holding of such meeting shall be fixed by the Board from time to time.

2. A vacancy among the Governors may be filled at any Stated Meeting of the Board by a majority vote of quorum of the Board.

3. A person subscribing to the funds of the Society a sum not less than five dollars, provided his subscription is accepted by the Board, upon being duly nominated and elected by the Governors, may become a member of the Society.

A person subscribing at one time to the funds of the Society the sum of five thousand dollars shall become a Patron of the Society, and any person so subscribing the sum of five hundred dollars shall become a Benefactor of the Society.

4. No person shall be eligible for the office of Governor unless he shall have so subscribed to the funds of the Society at least three months previous to an election.

CHAPTER II.

1. If any Governor shall be absent from three successive stated meetings of the Board, or from three successive stated meetings of any committee of which he shall be a member, his place as Governor may be vacated.

CHAPTER III.

MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS

1. The Board of Governors shall hold stated meetings on the first Tuesday of each month. The hour and place of meeting shall be from time to time appointed by the Board.

2. Special Meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, or on a written requisition of two Governors.

3. A number of not less than five shall be a quorum for the transaction of ordinary business; but for the appropriation or disposal of any of the property or money of the Society, except for the payment of necessary expenses, a number of not less than seven shall be necessary to constitute a quorum, of which number the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall be one.

4. At the stated meeting in April of each year, the Board shall elect from its number, by ballot, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and shall appoint the following standing committees, namely.

1. A Finance Committee, to consist of three Governors.

2. An Executive Committee, to consist of five Governors.

3. A Committee on Nominations, to consist of three Governors, to whom shall be referred the names of all candidates who may be proposed for election to the office of Governor, and of all nominations for vacancies occurring in any of the other offices of the Society, whenever they may occur.

4. A Law Committee, to consist of three Governors.

5. The following shall be the order of business at the meetings of the Board.

1. Reading of the Minutes of last meeting.

2. Reading of the Minutes of Standing Committees.

3. Reports of officers of the Board.

4. Reports of Standing or Special Committees.

5. Unfinished business.

6. Miscellaneous business.

CHAPTER IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. The President, or Vice-President, together with the Secretary, may, on authority of the Board, upon the payment of the principal

and interest of any Bond and Mortgage held by the Society, execute a certificate of satisfaction thereof, or an assignment of the same without recourse.

2. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the Society which shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors, and he is authorized to receive the interest or dividends on all securities and to give receipt therefor. In case of his absence or disability, the President or Vice-President is authorized to receive such interest or dividends.

3. The Treasurer shall keep books of account, and at each stated meeting shall make a report of the several sums by him received and expended.

4. The Secretary shall have the custody of the records and papers of the Society, other than the securities and medical records; he shall keep fair and accurate minutes of the proceedings of the Board, and notify the Governors of the meetings. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal of the Society.

CHAPTER V.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The Finance Committee shall have power, from time to time, to direct the purchase, sale or exchange of investments of the Society and may authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and under the seal of the Society all necessary papers in connection therewith, and no change shall be made in any investments without the authority of said Committee. They shall as often as once in six months examine the Treasurer's accounts or cause the same to be examined.

2. The Finance Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER VI.

CUSTODY OF SECURITIES

1. All securities shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors. Securities so deposited to be withdrawn only upon the written order of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital when signed and countersigned by any two of the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary or Treasurer, or upon the signature of any one of the above officers, when countersigned by any other Governor of the Society.

CHAPTER VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. The Executive Committee shall have the supervision of all buildings and improvements belonging to the corporation, and shall hold stated meetings at least once in each month and as often as the exigencies of business may require.

2. They shall audit the bills on receiving them from the Superintendent, and make a draft on the Treasurer for the amount of the same. At their succeeding meeting they are to examine all such bills to see that they are duly receipted. They shall notify the Superintendent each month of the total amount of money which may be expected for all running expenses during the following month.

3. They shall keep a book of minutes, and enter therein such business as may come before them, which book must be laid before the Governors at every monthly meeting.

4. The Committee may direct the expenditure of money or clothes for the relief of patients who from extreme poverty or circumstances of peculiar distress, may need such aid.

5. Whenever they think it necessary that a special meeting of the Governors should be called they shall apply for that purpose to the President, or in his absence, to the Vice-President. In the absence or inability of both to act, such meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

6. The Executive Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER VIII.

1. The Board of Governors, or a majority of them, shall, immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Board in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefits of the Institution, and to conduct the educational and medical work of the Hospital. In case of a vacancy or vacancies, the Board of Governors, or a majority of them shall elect other physicians or surgeons to fill the same.

2. No surgeon, officer, nurse or servant of this Institution shall accept any gift or bequest from or on behalf of any patient in the Wards or Out-Patient Department.

CHAPTER IX.

1. Persons may contribute toward the endowment of beds in the Society's Hospital by the payment of a sum not less than \$7,500, the annual income from which will be applied to the cost of maintaining a free bed in one of the wards so far as such income will suffice to pay such cost. Persons making such payments shall have such rights in respect to naming patients to the Society for treatment as the Governors shall from time to time prescribe.

CHAPTER X.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

1. Any alteration or amendment of these by-laws must be proposed in writing at a stated meeting of the Governors, but cannot be acted upon until a subsequent stated meeting; when the same may be adopted provided a majority of the Governors shall approve thereof.

2. These by-laws shall take effect immediately, and all other by-laws of the Society are repealed.

REPORT OF IN-PATIENTS' COMMITTEE

(Com. I)

November 13th, 1927—November 17th, 1928

In the year just completed this committee proposes to give a brief resumé of its activities during this time, mentioning some of the difficulties encountered as well as results achieved.

Through the courtesy of co-operating agencies we have been able to give excellent care to 187 patients.

Eighty-one women were placed in homes after their discharge from hospital.

There were about 1, 172 ward rounds made and 1,501 office interviews.

604 cases have come under our care—126 unmarried—118 deserted or separated—351 married—9 widows.

Another great demand upon this department is the temporary placement of children during the mothers' stay at the hospital, as it is difficult to ascertain the exact time of confinement, but which has been successfully dealt with through the immediate help of the Children's Welfare Federation.

The unmarried mother is still a difficult problem as it is not easy to secure reliable information both from the girl and her family. It requires the use of the utmost caution to safeguard their best interests.

The question of when an unmarried mother shall keep her baby and when it shall be given up has been and still will be a most difficult one which only can be solved upon an individual consideration of each and every case. This we have been able to care for satisfactorily through the co-operation of various agencies with follow up work, and every effort is made to keep the babies with their mothers.

REPRESENTATIVE CASES

Patient 1. C. C., age 22 years, unmarried. Girl seemed fond of her baby but was influenced by her mother who advised her to surrender the

child for adoption. Girl's step-father was willing to have her return home without the baby. On the advice of a Psychologist who said girl is a Dull Normal with a Mental age 13, the baby was placed at board and girl went to her own home. After a rest she returned to her former place of employment where she had worked as a file clerk for seven years. Girl was given about a month to make up her mind as to what she wished to do about the child. She decided she would like to keep in touch with him. An effort was made to locate the father of the child without success. Through the Department of Public Welfare the baby was placed in a private boarding home where he is at present. Girl visits him twice a month. He is having good care and is a good natured, attractive baby. He has made a slow steady gain and is normal weight. A nurse visits him once a week. His mother hopes to be able to take him home when he is older.

Patient 2. A. M., age 24 years, unmarried, discharged to State Charities Aid. Girl very anxious to surrender her baby for adoption. She however, consented to remain with the child until they were both stronger. She took care of her and each day became more interested. She was homesick for her family but could not take her baby home. Although she had given a history of marriage she admitted after a few days that it was false. Mother and baby were sent to the country and while there girl communicated with her family and told them about her child. Her brother and sister called immediately to see her and assured her that they all wanted her at home. After two months she returned home and the baby was placed in a nearby nursery where mother visited several times a week. When the child was 10 months old she was taken home where she now is the pet of the grandparents and several uncles and aunts. Girl has returned to her former employment as saleswoman in a dress shop. The baby is bright and attractive and is normal weight. Both mother and baby are in good physical condition.

Patient 3. M. B. age 20 years, unmarried. Girl very anxious to keep baby and plan made where this could be accomplished. After discharge from hospital both mother and baby placed in temporary shelter. Girl secured position and the baby cared for during the day in the nursery of the shelter. This plan enabled the girl to have her baby during the night and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays. She took a great interest in her baby and gave him good care. He was nursed for six weeks. When he was about 5 months old he had an intestinal disturbance and was a patient at St. Luke's Hospital. He had one transfusion. When discharged he was placed in a private boarding home where he had special care until he returned to his mother in about five weeks time. He made a rapid recovery from his illness. He is a bright, happy baby, and in good physical condition.

REPRESENTATIVE CASES

Case No. 1. B. B., 285 Grand Street, New York City.

Mother of four children, including nursing baby. Mother a janitress of tenement in which she resided. She worked up to the day she was confined, then the thirteen year old son assumed the responsibility. Her husband has been drinking for the past six years, not physically unable to work. Home conditions very poor. Post-partum care was given for nine days, cleaner sent in, and family referred to the C. O. S. for financial aid.

Case No. 2. V. R. New York City.

Family of six, including a new born baby. Father worked in fish market when he was able. Out of work now, owing to rheumatism and heart trouble. Lying-In Hospital doctor reported mother in exhausted condition owing to lack of food. Catholic Charities gave financial aid. Nursing care given for nine days and baby clothes sent by Lying-In Hospital.

Case No. 3. N. K. 98 Willet Street, City.

Patient had five children, including a new baby. Husband, a laborer, has been sick for two years. The mother and children were without food. Neighbors had been donating soups, tea, etc. A nurse from the Lying-In Hospital gave a small sum of money to aid in immediate relief.

Upon investigation, this case was found to be a former one of the C. O. S. The supervisor of that organization and the supervisor of the Lying-In Hospital Outdoor Service visited the family. Immediate aid was given by the C. O. S. The Mother and children were sent to Caroline Rest a short time later.
