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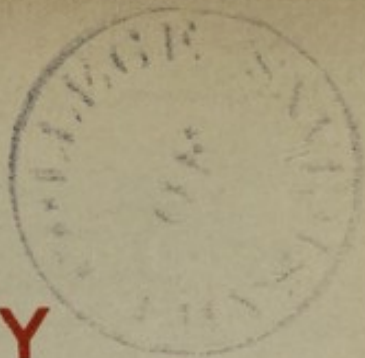

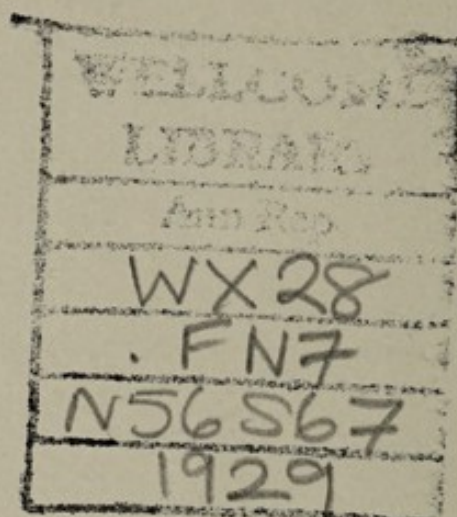

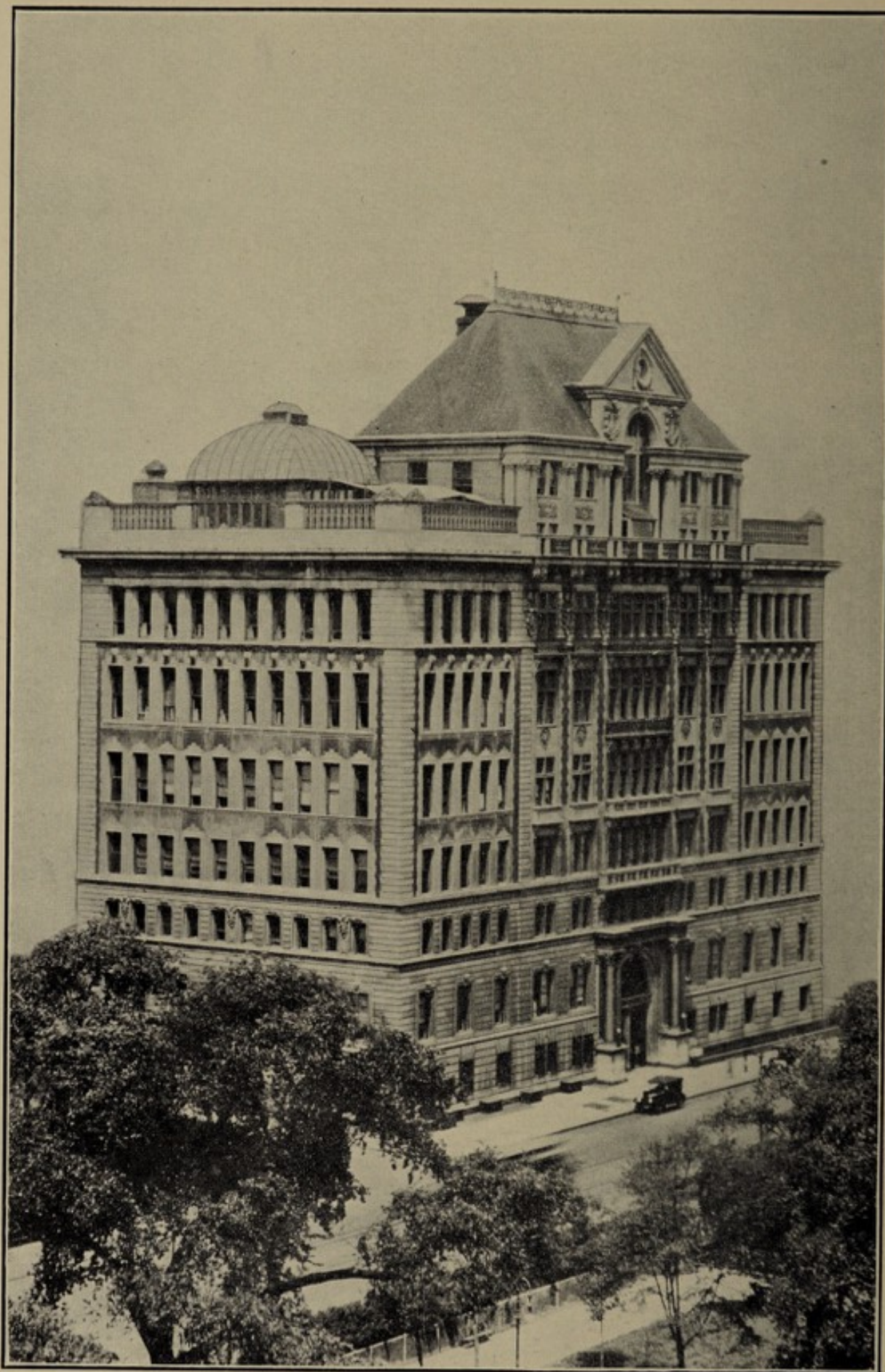

## Report of the Board of Governors

The Board of Governors of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital submits herewith its report for the 131st fiscal year of the Society, ending December 31, 1929.

While the amount of the maternity service rendered by the doctors and nurses is a little less than in the preceding years, the high standard of efficiency which has always characterized this service has been admirably maintained. The reasons for this slight diminution in the demand for such service are set forth in the report of the Chief Surgeon. As he shows, the educational work of the Hospital has diminished neither in amount nor quality. The Governors again gratefully acknowledge all that has been accomplished by the members of the medical and hospital staffs. To these devoted workers we are indebted for the admirable results recorded.

The Chief Surgeon sets forth our obligation in this regard, but the Governors wish to emphasize the able and devoted accomplishment of the Chief Surgeon himself. His wise and guiding influence is seen in all that the institution has accomplished.

The activities of the Ladies' Auxiliary have continued as efficiently and successfully as ever. Their continued participation in this essential branch of the Hospital's operations is highly appreciated by the Governors.

During the year a contract of sale of the property on Second Avenue between 17th and 18th Streets was



made by the Lying-In Hospital with the New York Skin and Cancer Hospital. The latter institution, which has conducted its large and valuable work at the northeast corner of Second Avenue and 19th Street, found it necessary to have substantially enlarged accommodations. Instead of constructing a new set of hospital buildings on another site it was decided to buy the spacious and well constructed Lying-In Hospital. Possession of this building will be given the Skin and Cancer Hospital when the Lying-In Hospital moves to its new building now in process of construction at 70th and Exterior Streets.

## Medical Report



THE report of the medical and educational activities of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, from January 1, 1929, to December 31, 1929, inclusive, is herewith submitted.

The number of cases treated is somewhat smaller than during 1928. This is notably true of the out-door department. The diminishing demand for such services as the hospital offers to patients seeking confinement and obstetrical care in their homes has been in progress for the past fifteen years and will probably continue. We need not seek far to find the reason for this change. Immigration has practically ceased. The population which we served has largely moved to other parts of the city and families are smaller. Thousands of tenements in our district have been converted into shops and places of business, while bridge approaches and street widening have displaced many others. More maternity hospitals and departments have come into existence. The people who now occupy the district are different racially, not so poor, and more of them are able to pay for the services of private physicians. The out-door maternity departments in this and other cities are passing through a similar experience. The quality of service which the Lying-In provides has no way deteriorated. Cooperation and friendly team-work are outstanding features throughout the entire personnel of the hospital, with unyielding endeavor to do better work and secure better results. More of our patients recover rapidly without fever or other complications. Eclampsia, the convulsive form of toxemia, has almost disappeared in patients whose pregnancies have been supervised by the hospital.

Seven years have passed since we began to develop and employ obstetric analgesia. This method had its origin in the Lying-In Hospital. We can assert that it is an agent which is safe and of great value, and that it does decidedly alleviate the pain incident to child-birth. It is not yet conceivable that the delivery of a child can be an entirely painless and, at the same time a safe



process for the mother and baby. In a few cases we have patients who know nothing of their labor from within a few minutes after medication has begun and yet delivery goes on undelayed. Thousands have received great relief and in no instance have we met with unfavorable results which could be attributed to the use of analgesia. We have our full share of complicated cases, many of whom require radical and operative treatment; that some die is inevitable, but many recover. During the past year there have been an unusual number of cases complicated by badly damaged hearts; a large proportion of these, although desperately ill, have been carried through, to ultimate obstetric recovery.

The premature nursery is worthy of note. The percentage of loss of these infants has been materially diminished, and more of them, developed sufficiently to give promise of surviving, are saved. Mainly this result is obtained by the plan of the nursery, its cribs, method of safely maintaining a proper temperature, circulating fresh air and the general care and method of feeding. No small factor is the devoted care given by attendants who spend their whole working time in this service and are not changed about from place to place at short intervals.

It is now forty years since the work of the out-door department began under an organization known as the Midwifery Dispensary. During the first year—1890, it confined 199 women in their homes, the second year 955, and when it merged with the Society of the Lying-In Hospital in 1893, there were records of something over 2600 confinements. At the time of the merger, the older organization gave its name, charter, board of governors and a considerable much needed fund. Thus far we have not been able to learn that the Lying-In Hospital did any obstetrical work or had a medical staff from the time that relations were severed between it and the New York Hospital; nor, are we able to find authentic record that New York Hospital treated maternity cases or was affiliated with any other organization which did this work after the dissolution of the arrangement between it and the Lying-In. The Midwifery Dispensary, as its part of the combination, supplied a going organization with an active attending, consulting and resident staff, pupils and a rapidly increasing



demand for its services. Space does not permit of a history of the phenomenal changes and improvement in the teaching and practice of obstetrics which have taken place during the past forty years. In 1890, there were only a few out-patient obstetric departments in the country whereas now there are many. It is safe to say that there are one hundred or more hospital beds available now for maternity cases where there was but one at that time. Hundreds of medical students were graduated and began practice without any clinical knowledge whatsoever of obstetrics.

Some twenty years ago an independent investigator reported that the Lying-In Hospital in New York ranked fourth in the list of maternities of the world reckoned by the number of patients confined. The active work began on January 1, 1890, as the Midwifery Dispensary, with headquarters in two small tenements at No. 312 Broome Street. We had no telephone. As if to inculcate the idea that obstetricians should not sleep much or comfortably, the resident physician was provided with a bed which had been donated, and was much too short; the remainder of the staff and students being lodged in double deck beds. The fuel supply was gathered somewhat after the plan of the Israelites' manna in the wilderness. Each week day, except Saturday, we bought a bucket of coal and a bundle of kindling. On Saturday the supply was doubled. Added to this there was a gas log in the office which sometimes functioned. Not infrequently the entire staff were called out to active duty in the tenements and at such times the establishment was locked, a card being tacked on the door stating where the resident physician could be found. As stated, the work grew rapidly. One month we confined 357 women in the tenements. Later, with the in-door department, we treated in one year over seven thousand cases, sixty-three hundred of whom were confinements, and in the forty years this hospital has confined more than one hundred and seventy thousand women, some ninety thousand in their own homes. In fancy we sometimes see the many thousands of doctors, medical students and nurses who have been trained, and patients who have been treated in the Lying-In, gathered into one vast assemblage. To this number would be added children and grandchildren. Whatever its shortcomings, and we recog-



nize some of them, the Lying-In Hospital in New York has held a position which is unique in this country. It has done pioneer work and has undoubtedly been an influence to stimulate better obstetric teaching and practice and the development of other maternities which in turn do excellent work in education and the care of patients.

During the past year the hospital has treated 5,443 obstetrical or allied cases. There were 4,653 confinements with 4,695 births, including plural births. In following pages will be found detailed statistics, reports of the various departments and clinics which are self-explanatory.

Some idea of the educational work of the hospital can be obtained by careful study of the following table:

House surgeons.....	9
Assistant house surgeons.....	38
Graduate pupils.....	45 from 36 Colleges
Undergraduate pupils.....	117 from 19 Colleges
Nurses.....	188 from 44 Training Schools

The nine house surgeons have had two or three and in some cases more years of training as internes, chiefly in surgery, before taking up the intensive four months' training in obstetrics as house surgeons in the Lying-In Hospital. This work is so exacting that, should the course be prolonged to six months, it is probable that a considerable number would break down before finishing. This has occurred in a few instances during the four months' course. Yet these positions are eagerly sought, and it is rare for a house surgeon to leave the hospital without giving assurance that he has acquired a training of great value. In a degree somewhat less this holds true of the training given assistant house surgeons. These forty or more internes who serve as house surgeons and assistant house surgeons, each year constitute our best post-graduate class. The course for graduate pupils is one entirely of observation and ward rounds. They are under no control and remain for a short or long period as suits their convenience. Under existing conditions this number is not liable



to increase. Years ago there was no other place in the country, apart from Lying-In, where these doctors could see as great a number and variety of cases in a short time. Now, there are many new maternity hospitals and departments scattered over a wide area, which means an increased capacity for training young doctors and nurses in good obstetric practice, and greater facilities for the better care of patients. Not long since, one of our older post-graduates who has been accustomed to return every year or two stated:—"The doctors in my city would like to come to Lying-In. They are busy and it is three days to New York. It is twelve hours to another large city where they can now secure this experience." Even though the hospital may lose somewhat by this change we look upon it with grateful hope. We find it reassuring to note that greater interest is being evidenced in this very important branch of medicine, and that the public are gradually becoming educated to an appreciation of the value of good obstetric care. We believe that much of the teaching, practice and results in this country are unexcelled, and it may very well be that the time will come when the oft repeated stigma:—"For the country as a whole there has been no improvement in obstetric results for the past quarter of a century"—will be erased. The course for undergraduate pupils is of three weeks' duration. They serve the first week in the hospital and the last two weeks in the out-door department, making visits and attending births under supervision of an attending surgeon and members of the interne staff. This is in no sense adequate clinical training, but it should add meaning and an understanding interest to their theoretical teaching in the medical schools. Pupils and post-graduate nurses, under the supervision of the Directress of the training school, are given a course difficult to excel in the time allotted for it.

Statements which appeared in last year's report concerning the attending surgeons, Directress of Nurses, Chief of the Babies' Clinic and their staffs remain true today. They are doing excellent work. The Ladies' Auxiliary, as indicated by their report, is conducting work of great value to the hospital. Much credit is due the Medical Superintendent and those whom he



directs, for his part in the smooth and efficient running of the hospital. If briefly stated, we nevertheless sincerely appreciate the great part which the Governors take in their helpful supporting attitude.

## Report of Nurses' Training School

The year 1929 has been a progressive one in the Nursing Department of the Hospital. There has been little sickness and the number of nurses received from the affiliating hospitals has been consistent.

The same number of Post Graduate students was admitted during the year as in 1928, but we have noticed a decided improvement in this group of students. Most of them have very definite reasons for seeking this service, namely, better knowledge of Obstetrics for use in the supervising field.

The students as a whole have been unusually enthusiastic and cooperative in the application of new methods we have incorporated in our teaching program. Most encouraging results have been achieved in the care of our patients and in the attitude of the students toward the study of Obstetrics.

The opportunity offered in the service of the Out Patient Department has been sincerely requested by the majority of the students and 151 received this training. There were 475 antepartum and 2192 postpartum visits made in the homes by the students; they also assisted at 205 deliveries in the homes of patients. The students in the clinics talk to the mothers regarding their personal hygiene, using the demonstration outfit to help them plan their layettes and the equipment necessary for home delivery and the care of babies. This contact with patients is most valuable for the nurses, giving them a different point of view to that usually acquired in hospital wards.

In addition to our regular staff of nurses, the services of 69 graduates were required to care for ill patients, 42 were called for adults, 14 for infants and 13 to relieve on the floors when large classes were leaving—a total of 258 days service from this group.

Miss Mary S. Power gave a series of lectures at this hospital to the supervising nurses of Willard Parker, Manhattan Maternity and Lying-In Hospitals. These lectures covered a wide range of subjects important in practical supervision and were well attended and appreciated by these nurses.



The cooperation and loyalty of the staff nurses has been noteworthy; exceptional demands have been made on them and they have met their additional responsibilities efficiently. The monthly meetings held by the supervising nurses have been productive of many helpful suggestions. Improvement in ward procedure has been worked out and discussion of costs of ward supplies has made the requisitions of these materials more economical.

The support given the Nursing Department by the Chief Surgeon and the Staff of Lecturers has enabled us to progress along many lines. Their understanding of our particular problems in a constantly changing nursing service has facilitated greatly the work in this hospital.

Through the generosity of a friend of the nurses, one hundred dollars worth of new books were added to the reference and fiction libraries of the school. These are a valuable addition and, with a new radio which was given to the nurses by the hospital, have been very popular.

Owing to the opening of an Obstetrical Department at St. Francis Hospital in Poughkeepsie, that hospital discontinued their affiliation. Charlesgate Hospital, in Cambridge, Massachusetts, discontinued theirs because of the expense involved in sending the students to New York.

During the year 190 students were admitted, 145 were pupil nurses and 45 Post Graduate nurses. One pupil was recalled to her own school, two resigned, and three Post Graduate students left before completion of the course.

## Statistics

During the year ending December 31st, 1929 the Society admitted to the two branches of its service 5,443 cases. The number of births was 4,695. The number of births in the Borough of Manhattan according to the returns from the Health Department was 40,741 of which 37,011 were reported by physicians, 3,730 by midwives and others. The Society cared for over 11 per cent of the entire number of confinements in the Borough and more than 12 per cent of those treated by physicians. The total number of applications for treatment was 5,567. In the Out-Door Department the number of applications was 1,302, the number treated was 1,126, the number of confinements was 1,000. The number of applications for treatment in the Hospital was 4,265; the number treated was 4,306 and the number of confinements was 3,653. The ambulance service brought to the Hospital 58 cases. Detailed figures showing the Hospital's work during the year will be found in the following pages.

Of the 3,985 patients concerning whom information was obtainable, 3,954 lived in front and 31 resided in rear tenements. 83 patients resided in basements, 348 on stoop floors, 884 on first floors, 857 on second floors, 704 on third floors, 505 on fourth floors and 581 on fifth floors and 23 not noted.

# Charter of the Society of the Lying-in Hospital of the City of New York

*An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, passed March 1, 1799, chapter xxiii. Laws of 1799.*

WHEREAS, THOMAS PEARSALL, JOHN CHRISTOPHER KUNZE, ROBERT LENOX, CORNELIUS RAY, ARCHIBALD GRACIE, JOHN STARK ROBERTSON, HENRY REMSEN, WILLIAM HOUSTOUN, ANDREW HAMERSLY, JOHN CHARLTON, DAVID M. CLARKSON, WILLIAM JAUNCEY, J. C. VANDEN HEUVEL and others, influenced by principles of benevolence and charity, associated as an institution, under the style of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, for the useful purpose of establishing an asylum for the reception of women in a state of pregnancy who are unable to procure the necessary medical assistance and nursing during the period of their confinement in child-bed, by their petition presented to the Legislature, have prayed to be incorporated, the better to enable them to carry into effect the salutary object of their institution; therefore

*Be it enacted by the People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly.* That all such persons as now are, or hereafter shall be members of the said institution, shall be and hereby are ordained, constituted and declared, forever a body corporate and politic, in fact and in name, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York" and by that name they and their successors shall and may have continual succession, and shall be persons in law, capable of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, defending and being defended, in all courts and places whatsoever, in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever; and that they and their successors may have a common seal, and may change and alter the same at their pleasure; and also that they and their successors, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," shall be in law capable of purchasing, receiving, holding and conveying any estate, real or personal, for the use of the said corporation. *Provided* that the lands, tenements and hereditaments which it shall be lawful for said corporation to hold shall be only such as shall be requisite for the purpose of erecting a public building and such houses or other buildings as may be suitable and necessary to the nature of the said institution, or such as



shall have been *bona fide* mortgaged to it by way of security, or conveyed to it in satisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its business, or purchased at sales, on judgment which shall have been obtained for such debts; and with regard to all such lands, tenements and hereditaments so to be held by the said corporation as aforesaid, except such as may be for its immediate accommodation as aforesaid, or such as it may hold by way of mortgage, and whereof the actual possession shall be and remain in the mortgagors, their heirs or assigns, the said corporation shall be bound to sell and dispose of the same respectively within five years after it shall acquire the same, and shall not be capable of holding the same after the expiration of the said five years.

*And be it further enacted.* That all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same shall be deemed and taken for members of this corporation, and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot, by and from the said subscribers; that the following persons (that is to say) Thomas Pearsall, John Christopher Kunze, Robert Lenox, Cornelius Ray, Archibald Gracie, John Stark Robertson, Henry Remsen, William Houstoun, Andrew Hamersly, John Charlton, David M. Clarkson, William Jauncey, J. C. Vanden Heuvel, shall be the present governors of the said corporation, and shall continue in office until the second Wednesday in April, in the year one thousand and eight hundred, when a new election shall be made at the hour and place, to be appointed by the said governors; that the election for governors after the year one thousand and eight hundred, shall be held annually on the second Wednesday of April, at such place and hour as the majority of the governors for the time being shall appoint, of which election, public notice shall be given by the said governors for the space of one week, in two of the daily newspapers, printed in the said City. That if any vacancy shall happen among the said governors (so elected) by death, resignation or removal, such vacancy shall be filled by a special election for the purpose, to be held in the same manner as the annual elections are made and at such time and place as shall be provided for by the by-laws of the said corporation, and in case it should happen that an election of governors should not be held on any day when pursuant to this act it ought to have been made, the corporation shall not for that cause be deemed to be dissolved; but it shall and may be lawful, on any other day, to hold an election of governors in such manner as the by-laws of the said corporation shall prescribe.

*And be it further enacted.* That the governors shall not take or receive any compensation for their services; and for the time being shall have power, to make and prescribe such by-laws, rules and regulations, as to them shall appear needful and proper touching the management and disposition of the stock, property, estates and effects, of the said corpora-



tion, and touching the duties and conduct of the officers of the said corporation, and touching all other matters as appertain to the business, ends and purposes, for which the said corporation is by this act instituted; and shall also have power to appoint an apothecary, house pupils, matron, stewards, nurses and servants, for carrying on the business of the said institution.

Provided, that for the appropriation or disposal of any of the capital stock, a number not less than seven shall constitute a quorum, of which number the president, or in his absence, the vice-president of the board, to be appointed in virtue of this act, shall be one, provided also, that such by-laws, rules and regulations shall not be repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States, or of this State.

*And be it further enacted.* That the governors, at their first meeting, and also at the first meeting in every year next after the said annual election on the second Wednesday in April, shall elect by ballot, from their number a president, vice-president, a treasurer and a secretary, and that the officers thus elected, shall immediately enter upon their respective offices and hold the same until the next election of governors, and it shall be the duty of the president or vice-president to preside at all meetings of the governors.

*And be it further enacted.* That the governors shall propose at one meeting and elect by ballot at the next a number of physicians, not exceeding four to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution, and that the said physicians remain in office until the next election for governors, after which time they are to be annually elected.

*And be it further enacted.* That this act shall be and hereby is declared to be a public act, and shall be construed in all courts and places benignly and favorable for every beneficial purpose herein intended.



Chapter 468, Laws of 1897.

*An ACT to amend chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine entitled "An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," relative to subscriptions, the election of subscribers as members, and the elections of physicians and surgeons.*

Became a law May 17, 1897, with the approval of the Governor; passed three-fifths being present.

*The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:*

SEC. 1. Section two of chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, that all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same, shall be deemed and taken as members of this corporation provided such subscription is received by the society, and such subscribers are elected members of the said society by the board of governors thereof, in such manner as shall be provided by the by-laws of the said society; and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot by a majority of the governors from the said subscribers.

SEC. 2. Section five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, that the governors of the said society, or a majority of them, shall immediately after the annual meeting of the society in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution; and in case of a vacancy or vacancies, to elect other physicians or surgeons in their places.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.



**BY-LAWS**  
of the  
**Society of the Lying-in Hospital**  
of the City of New York

CHAPTER I.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS

1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governors on the first Tuesday of April in each year for the purpose of choosing by ballot by a majority vote of the existing Governors, from the members of the Society, thirteen Governors who shall manage and conduct the property and concerns of said corporation for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected, the hour and place for the holding of such meeting shall be fixed by the Board from time to time.

2. A vacancy among the Governors may be filled at any Stated Meeting of the Board by a majority vote of quorum of the Board.

3. A person subscribing to the funds of the Society a sum not less than five dollars, provided his subscription is accepted by the Board, upon being duly nominated and elected by the Governors, may become a member of the Society.

A person subscribing at one time to the funds of the Society the sum of five thousand dollars shall become a Patron of the Society, and any person so subscribing the sum of five hundred dollars shall become a Benefactor of the Society.

4. No person shall be eligible for the office of Governor unless he shall have so subscribed to the funds of the Society at least three months previous to an election.

CHAPTER II.

1. If any Governor shall be absent from three successive stated meetings of the Board, or from three successive stated meetings of any committee of which he shall be a member, his place as Governor may be vacated.



## CHAPTER III.

### MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS

1. The Board of Governors shall hold stated meetings on the first Tuesday of each month. The hour and place of meeting shall be from time to time appointed by the Board.

2. Special Meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, or on a written requisition of two Governors.

3. A number of not less than five shall be a quorum for the transaction of ordinary business; but for the appropriation or disposal of any of the property or money of the Society, except for the payment of necessary expenses, a number of not less than seven shall be necessary to constitute a quorum, of which number the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall be one.

4. At the stated meeting in April of each year, the Board shall elect from its number, by ballot, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and shall appoint the following standing committees, namely.

1. A Finance Committee, to consist of three Governors.

2. An Executive Committee, to consist of five Governors.

3. A Committee on Nominations, to consist of three Governors, to whom shall be referred the names of all candidates who may be proposed for election to the office of Governor, and of all nominations for vacancies occurring in any of the other offices of the Society, whenever they may occur.

4. A Law Committee, to consist of three Governors.

5. The following shall be the order of business at the meetings of the Board.

1. Reading of the Minutes of last meeting.

2. Reading of the Minutes of Standing Committees.

3. Reports of officers of the Board.

4. Reports of Standing or Special Committees.

5. Unfinished business.

6. Miscellaneous business.

## CHAPTER IV.

### DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. The President, or Vice-President, together with the Secretary, may, on authority of the Board, upon the payment of the principal



and interest of any Bond and Mortgage held by the Society, execute a certificate of satisfaction thereof, or an assignment of the same without recourse.

2. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the Society which shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors, and he is authorized to receive the interest or dividends on all securities and to give receipt therefor. In case of his absence or disability, the President or Vice-President is authorized to receive such interest or dividends.

3. The Treasurer shall keep books of account, and at each stated meeting shall make a report of the several sums by him received and expended.

4. The Secretary shall have the custody of the records and papers of the Society, other than the securities and medical records; he shall keep fair and accurate minutes of the proceedings of the Board, and notify the Governors of the meetings. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal of the Society.

## CHAPTER V.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The Finance Committee shall have power, from time to time, to direct the purchase, sale or exchange of investments of the Society and may authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and under the seal of the Society all necessary papers in connection therewith, and no change shall be made in any investments without the authority of said committee. They shall as often as once in six months examine the Treasurer's accounts or cause the same to be examined.

2. The Finance Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

## CHAPTER VI.

### CUSTODY OF SECURITIES

1. All securities shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors. Securities so deposited to be withdrawn only upon the written order of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital when signed and countersigned by any two of the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary or Treasurer, or upon the signature of any one of the above officers, when countersigned by any other Governor of the Society.



## CHAPTER VII.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. The Executive Committee shall have the supervision of all buildings and improvements belonging to the corporation, and shall hold stated meetings at least once in each month and as often as the exigencies of business may require.

2. They shall audit the bills on receiving them from the Superintendent, and make a draft on the Treasurer for the amount of the same. At their succeeding meeting they are to examine all such bills to see that they are duly receipted. They shall notify the Superintendent each month of the total amount of money which may be expected for all running expenses during the following month.

3. They shall keep a book of minutes, and enter therein such business as may come before them, which book must be laid before the Governors at every monthly meeting.

4. The Committee may direct the expenditure of money or clothes for the relief of patients who from extreme poverty or circumstances of peculiar distress, may need such aid.

5. Whenever they think it necessary that a special meeting of the Governors should be called they shall apply for that purpose to the President, or in his absence, to the Vice-President. In the absence or inability of both to act, such meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

6. The Executive Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

## CHAPTER VIII.

1. The Board of Governors, or a majority of them, shall, immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Board in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefits of the Institution, and to conduct the educational and medical work of the Hospital. In case of a vacancy or vacancies, the Board of Governors, or a majority of them shall elect other physicians or surgeons to fill the same.

2. No surgeon, officer, nurse or servant of this Institution shall accept any gift or bequest from or on behalf of any patient in the Wards or Out-Patient Department.



## CHAPTER IX.

1. Persons may contribute toward the endowment of beds in the Society's Hospital by the payment of a sum not less than \$7,500, the annual income from which will be applied to the cost of maintaining a free bed in one of the wards so far as such income will suffice to pay such cost. Persons making such payments shall have such rights in respect to naming patients to the Society for treatment as the Governors shall from time to time prescribe.

## CHAPTER X.

### AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

1. Any alteration or amendment of these by-laws must be proposed in writing at a stated meeting of the Governors, but cannot be acted upon until a subsequent stated meeting; when the same may be adopted provided a majority of the Governors shall approve thereof.

2. These by-laws shall take effect immediately, and all other by-laws of the Society are repealed.

November 18th, 1928—November 16th, 1929

During the year 1929 this committee has cared for 882 cases—127 unmarried women—132 deserted or separated—623 married—3 widows.

One hundred and thirteen patients received convalescent care.

One hundred and forty-eight children received temporary care.

Eighty-seven women were placed in homes after their discharge from hospital.

One thousand one hundred ward visits were made and one thousand three hundred and sixty-three office interviews.

#### REPRESENTATIVE CASES

Case No. 1. C. M., 78 Catherine St., New York City.

Patient has four children including the new baby. Husband was committed to a mental institution during the early months of the patient's last pregnancy; and since then family has been cared for by the city.

Lying-In Hospital gave clothes for baby. Nursing care given for eight days and cleaner sent in.

Case No. 2. E. S., 418 West 17th St., New York City.

Patient was referred to Out-Patient Department by the Nursery and Child's Hospital.

Family has been cared for by the Catholic Charities for the last two years. During that time patient had several operations for varicose veins.

Husband has been unable to work for eight months due to injuries received to arm and body from burns. Patient said his clothing caught fire from a lighted cigarette, but seemed reluctant to discuss it further. He was treated at Bellevue Hospital for eight weeks and is now able to take light work.

St. Vincent De Paul Society supplies family with food and provides the six children with clothing. Bellevue Social Service gave baby clothes. Nursing care given for seven days.

Case No. 3. A. I., 625 West 42nd St., New York City.

Family of seven children living in three very poorly kept rooms. The house is very old and there is no gas or electric light, so they are using oil lamps. Patient's husband is past sixty and a heavy drinker; unemployed most of the time. Both parents are very shiftless and take little interest in their children or home. The oldest, a boy eighteen years of age, seems to be the only one contributing toward the up-keep of the home. He is a printer making twenty dollars a week.

Hudson Guild is looking after the welfare of the children. Cleaner sent in for eight days and nursing care given.

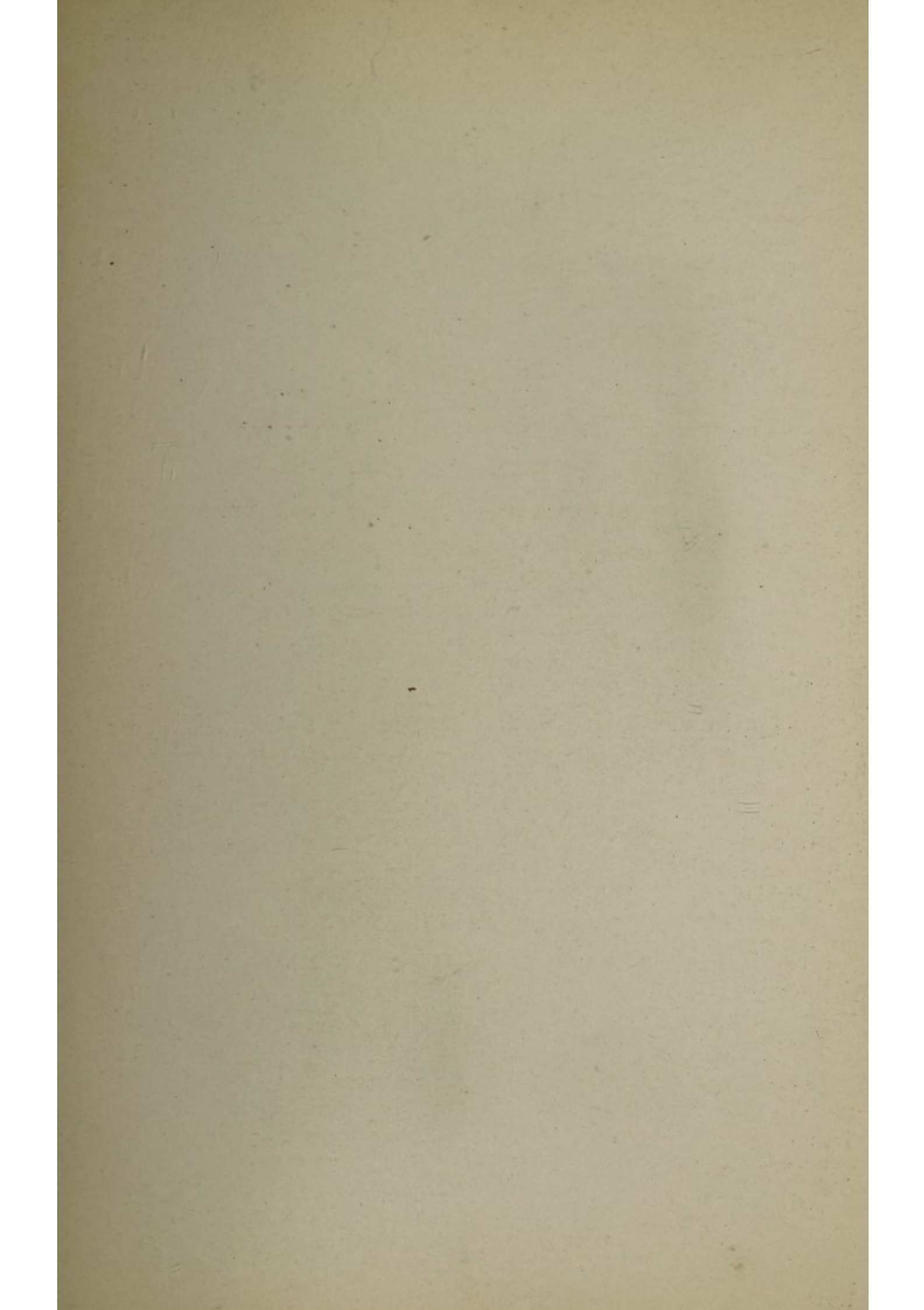
