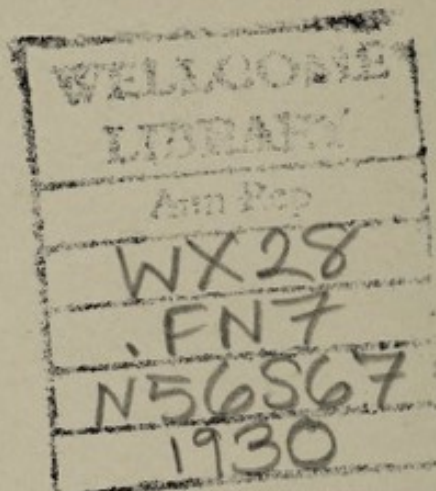

Report of the Board of Governors

The Board of Governors of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital submits herewith its report for the 132nd fiscal year of the Society, ending December 31, 1930.

The amount of the maternity service rendered by the institution during the year is only slightly less than the record of the preceding year, and has been characterized by the notably high standard of efficiency with which this service has always been performed. The educational work of the Hospital has been about the same in amount. For these most gratifying results in an economic period of extraordinary difficulty the Governors are deeply indebted to the members of the medical and hospital staffs.

Our distinguished Chief Surgeon, Dr. Asa B. Davis, in his report for 1929, described with some detail the operations of the institution during preceding years, and in the Governors' report for that year a special tribute to his able and devoted accomplishment was set forth. To our great sorrow, on August 13th, 1930, Dr. Davis' immensely valuable life came to an end. His impressive funeral service was held in St. George's Church, Stuyvesant Square, on the morning of Friday, August 15th, and was largely attended.

To succeed Dr. Davis, Dr. James A. Harrar, our senior Attending Surgeon, was elected Chief Surgeon. From his attached report it appears how well he, his associates, the Nursing Department and the entire

hospital staff under the able guidance of the Medical Superintendent have continued the admirable performance of the invaluable service to the people of the city which has so long characterized the efforts of the institution.

The activities of the Ladies' Auxiliary have been unabated, and we are deeply indebted to them for all that they have accomplished.

The construction of the new Lying-In Hospital at the southwest corner of 70th and Exterior Streets has been proceeding actively, and it is hoped that before the end of 1932 we shall be established in that new and carefully designed building.

Medical Report



HAVE the honor to present the report of the medical and educational activities of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, from January 1st, 1930 to December 31st, 1930 inclusive.

A report of this kind would not be complete without recording the losses which our medical staff sustained. Dr. Asa B. Davis, Chief Surgeon since 1918 and Dr. William A. Morgan, Attending Surgeon, died during the year. Both served most faithfully in conducting the affairs of the Hospital and in planning for the betterment of its service and management. We are endeavoring to continue the definite conservative policy laid down by Dr. Davis and it is a source of satisfaction to be able to report that the Associate Attending Surgeons recently appointed, have shown an earnest desire to properly perform their share of the work.

Acknowledgment is hereby made of the generous support and kindly encouragement of the Board of Governors, the efficient service and splendid cooperation of the Medical Staff, the Superintendent, the Nursing Department and Heads of Special Departments, all of whom have contributed in full measure to the satisfactory and successful results obtained by the various departments of the Hospital during the year.

The teaching, out-patient department, ante-partum and post-partum clinics, laboratory, social service, special clinics, namely: babies', luetic, cardiac, and sterility, have conducted their work as in previous years, with excellent results.

The X-ray department has been much more satisfactory than heretofore, under the able guidance of Drs. Harry Miles Imboden and Jerry S. Bell. Requests for X-ray pictures are attended to promptly.

The anesthesia department guided by Dr. James T. Gwathmey is more active. Each month Dr. Gwathmey now instructs the Junior House Staff how properly to give gas and oxygen to

women in labor. In this way the pain incident to child-birth will be alleviated still further, when the gas and oxygen is administered in addition to the routine rectal ether analgesia, which was originated at the Lying-In Hospital and has been practiced so successfully here for the past eight years.

The premature ward in which we place all babies under 4½ pounds, is an outstanding feature of the Hospital, and this year has taken care of more premature babies, with better results than heretofore. Of 84 premature babies, who lived longer than 24 hours, only 7 died, the remaining 77 having been discharged well.

The credit for these splendid results is not so much due to the scientific conduct of the ward as to the careful selection by the Directress of Nurses of a capable and permanent nurse in charge, and such pupil assistants who show special aptitude for and interest in this type of work.

Regarding the educational work, some idea can be obtained by a study of the table below:

The year 1930 will go down in history as perhaps the most difficult year of the present economic cycle. No hospital could fail to be affected in some way or other by the experience of the year. The forces that were operating are reflected in the number of patients admitted, both in the wards and private pavilion. In spite of the fact that the number of births conducted by the Hospital has slightly diminished, the Hospital, as in previous years, cared for more than 11 percent of the entire number of confinements in the Borough of Manhattan.

Report of Nurses' Training School

In 1930, 188 nurses were admitted for obstetrical training; 58 of these were graduate nurses, and 130 were pupils from affiliating hospitals. The number of pupil nurses was slightly less than previous years, and the number of graduate nurses increased. Two of the graduate nurses resigned before the termination of the course, but all the undergraduate students completed their service.

In addition to the student body, 83 special nurses were called to care for patients in the following services: babies in the isolation ward, or those who were very sick, needed the care of 14 nurses for 89 days; very ill mothers required the services of 44 nurses for 132 days; varied conditions, such as relief for change days, relief for ill members of the supervising staff, and the care of an intern who was operated on, required the services of 25 nurses for 58 days,—a total of 279 days service from this group.

Two general duty nurses have been added to the regular staff.

The staff of supervising nurses is composed of 17 graduate nurses who have given their cooperation and interest most consistently. Miss Clara M. Konrad, who held the position of instructor for the past four years, resigned to take charge of the new Maternity Department of the Jersey City Hospital. Miss Ethel M. Sweeney, a graduate of the Philadelphia General Hospital, has succeeded Miss Konrad.

The Ashland State Hospital, Ashland, Pennsylvania, withdrew its affiliation at the request of the Pennsylvania State Board of Nurse Examiners to send their students to the Philadelphia Lying-In Hospital. No other affiliations were discontinued. Applications for further obstetrical training are being received in large numbers from graduate nurses, and it is interesting to note that a number of student nurses still in training are asking for additional service in obstetrics immediately after their graduation. This is no doubt due to a campaign of publicity being made by groups of persons interested in nurses' training who have emphasized the importance of good obstetrical care and more thorough preparation of nurses for giving it.

The Out-Patient Department continues to be of great interest to the students, and a valuable part of their training. The work in that department with which 166 student nurses assisted was as follows:

146 normal labors in homes
39 abnormal labors in homes
240 ante-partum visits in homes
2,441 post-partum visits in homes

156 students spent one-half day each in the field observing Maternity Center methods, and graduate students particularly interested in this work were given the opportunity of attending some of the mothers' classes given at the Center.

Through the generosity of a friend, we have continued to add valuable books to our nurses' reference and fiction libraries.

The Medical Staff of the Hospital has contributed a great deal toward our nursing and teaching programmes by its helpful suggestions in the solution of our problems, and in the generous amount of time and thought they have given to the lectures and their supervision of the health of the student body.

Statistics

During the year ending December 31st, 1930, the Society admitted to the two branches of its service 5,330 cases, and the members of its medical staff officiated at 4,599 births. According to the returns from the City Health Department, there were 39,231 births in the Borough of Manhattan, of which 36,216 were reported by physicians and 2,915 by midwives and others. Thus, the Society cared for over 11 per cent of the total number of confinements in the Borough and more than 12 per cent of those attended by physicians. The total number of applications for treatment was 5,441. In the out-patient department, there were 1,254 applicants, 1,096 of whom received treatment either as general cases or confinements, which latter numbered 983. The number of applicants for hospital care during the year was 4,187, though, owing to the fact that many patients who had applied prior to January 1st, 1930 were admitted after that date, 4,261 were treated, 3,571 of these being confinement cases. Its own ambulance service brought to the Hospital 48 cases. Detailed figures showing the Hospital's work during the year will be found in the following pages.

Of the 4,218 patients concerning whom information was obtainable, 4,170 lived in front and 48 resided in rear tenements. 77 patients resided in basements, 391 on stoop floors, 777 on first floors, 898 on second floors, 806 on third floors, 537 on fourth floors and 666 on fifth floors and 66 not noted.

Charter of the Society of the Lying-in Hospital of the City of New York

An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, passed March 1, 1799, chapter xxiii. Laws of 1799.

WHEREAS, THOMAS PEARSALL, JOHN CHRISTOPHER KUNZE, ROBERT LENOX, CORNELIUS RAY, ARCHIBALD GRACIE, JOHN STARK ROBERTSON, HENRY REMSEN, WILLIAM HOUSTOUN, ANDREW HAMERSLY, JOHN CHARLTON, DAVID M. CLARKSON, WILLIAM JAUNCEY, J. C. VANDEN HEUVEL and others, influenced by principles of benevolence and charity, associated as an institution, under the style of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York, for the useful purpose of establishing an asylum for the reception of women in a state of pregnancy who are unable to procure the necessary medical assistance and nursing during the period of their confinement in child-bed, by their petition presented to the Legislature, have prayed to be incorporated, the better to enable them to carry into effect the salutary object of their institution; therefore

Be it enacted by the People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly. That all such persons as now are, or hereafter shall be members of the said institution, shall be and hereby are ordained, constituted and declared, forever a body corporate and politic, in fact and in name, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York" and by that name they and their successors shall and may have continual succession, and shall be persons in law, capable of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, defending and being defended, in all courts and places whatsoever, in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, matters and causes whatsoever; and that they and their successors may have a common seal, and may change and alter the same at their pleasure; and also that they and their successors, by the name of "The Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," shall be in law capable of purchasing, receiving, holding and conveying any estate, real or personal, for the use of the said corporation. *Provided* that the lands, tenements and hereditaments which it shall be lawful for said corporation to hold shall be only such as shall be requisite for the purpose of erecting a public building and such houses or other buildings as may be suitable and necessary to the nature of the said institution, or such as

shall have been *bona fide* mortgaged to it by way of security, or conveyed to it in satisfaction of debts previously contracted in the course of its business, or purchased at sales, on judgment which shall have been obtained for such debts; and with regard to all such lands, tenements and hereditaments so to be held by the said corporation as aforesaid, except such as may be for its immediate accommodation as aforesaid, or such as it may hold by way of mortgage, and whereof the actual possession shall be and remain in the mortgagors, their heirs or assigns, the said corporation shall be bound to sell and dispose of the same respectively within five years after it shall acquire the same, and shall not be capable of holding the same after the expiration of the said five years.

And be it further enacted. That all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same shall be deemed and taken for members of this corporation, and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot, by and from the said subscribers; that the following persons (that is to say) Thomas Pearsall, John Christopher Kunze, Robert Lenox, Cornelius Ray, Archibald Gracie, John Stark Robertson, Henry Remsen, William Houstoun, Andrew Hamersly, John Charlton, David M. Clarkson, William Jauncey, J. C. Vanden Heuvel, shall be the present governors of the said corporation, and shall continue in office until the second Wednesday in April, in the year one thousand and eight hundred, when a new election shall be made at the hour and place, to be appointed by the said governors; that the election for governors after the year one thousand and eight hundred, shall be held annually on the second Wednesday of April, at such place and hour as the majority of the governors for the time being shall appoint, of which election, public notice shall be given by the said governors for the space of one week, in two of the daily newspapers, printed in the said City. That if any vacancy shall happen among the said governors (so elected) by death, resignation or removal, such vacancy shall be filled by a special election for the purpose, to be held in the same manner as the annual elections are made and at such time and place as shall be provided for by the by-laws of the said corporation, and in case it should happen that an election of governors should not be held on any day when pursuant to this act it ought to have been made, the corporation shall not for that cause be deemed to be dissolved; but it shall and may be lawful, on any other day, to hold an election of governors in such manner as the by-laws of the said corporation shall prescribe.

And be it further enacted. That the governors shall not take or receive any compensation for their services; and for the time being shall have power, to make and prescribe such by-laws, rules and regulations, as to them shall appear needful and proper touching the management and disposition of the stock, property, estates and effects, of the said corpora-

tion, and touching the duties and conduct of the officers of the said corporation, and touching all other matters as appertain to the business, ends and purposes, for which the said corporation is by this act instituted; and shall also have power to appoint an apothecary, house pupils, matron, stewards, nurses and servants, for carrying on the business of the said institution.

Provided, that for the appropriation or disposal of any of the capital stock, a number not less than seven shall constitute a quorum, of which number the president, or in his absence, the vice-president of the board, to be appointed in virtue of this act, shall be one, provided also, that such by-laws, rules and regulations shall not be repugnant to the constitution and laws of the United States, or of this State.

And be it further enacted. That the governors, at their first meeting, and also at the first meeting in every year next after the said annual election on the second Wednesday in April, shall elect by ballot, from their number a president, vice-president, a treasurer and a secretary, and that the officers thus elected, shall immediately enter upon their respective offices and hold the same until the next election of governors, and it shall be the duty of the president or vice-president to preside at all meetings of the governors.

And be it further enacted. That the governors shall propose at one meeting and elect by ballot at the next a number of physicians, not exceeding four to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution, and that the said physicians remain in office until the next election for governors, after which time they are to be annually elected.

And be it further enacted. That this act shall be and hereby is declared to be a public act, and shall be construed in all courts and places benignly and favorable for every beneficial purpose herein intended.

Chapter 468, Laws of 1897.

An ACT to amend chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine entitled "An ACT to incorporate the Society of the Lying-In Hospital of the City of New York," relative to subscriptions, the election of subscribers as members, and the elections of physicians and surgeons.

Became a law May 17, 1897, with the approval of the Governor; passed three-fifths being present.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly do enact as follows:

SEC. 1. Section two of chapter twenty-three of the laws of seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 2. And be it further enacted, that all persons who now are members of the said institution, or shall at any time hereafter subscribe to the same, shall be deemed and taken as members of this corporation provided such subscription is received by the society, and such subscribers are elected members of the said society by the board of governors thereof, in such manner as shall be provided by the by-laws of the said society; and that the property and concerns of the said corporation shall be managed and conducted by thirteen governors, to be chosen by ballot by a majority of the governors from the said subscribers.

SEC. 2. Section five of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 5. And be it further enacted, that the governors of the said society, or a majority of them, shall immediately after the annual meeting of the society in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the said hospital, and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefit of this institution; and in case of a vacancy or vacancies, to elect other physicians or surgeons in their places.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

BY-LAWS
of the
Society of the Lying-in Hospital
of the City of New York

CHAPTER I.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS

1. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Governors on the first Tuesday of April in each year for the purpose of choosing by ballot by a majority vote of the existing Governors, from the members of the Society, thirteen Governors who shall manage and conduct the property and concerns of said corporation for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected, the hour and place for the holding of such meeting shall be fixed by the Board from time to time.

2. A vacancy among the Governors may be filled at any Stated Meeting of the Board by a majority vote of quorum of the Board.

3. A person subscribing to the funds of the Society a sum not less than five dollars, provided his subscription is accepted by the Board, upon being duly nominated and elected by the Governors, may become a member of the Society.

A person subscribing at one time to the funds of the Society the sum of five thousand dollars shall become a Patron of the Society, and any person so subscribing the sum of five hundred dollars shall become a Benefactor of the Society.

4. No person shall be eligible for the office of Governor unless he shall have so subscribed to the funds of the Society at least three months previous to an election.

CHAPTER II.

1. If any Governor shall be absent from three successive stated meetings of the Board, or from three successive stated meetings of any committee of which he shall be a member, his place as Governor may be vacated.

CHAPTER III.

MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS

1. The Board of Governors shall hold stated meetings on the first Tuesday of each month. The hour and place of meeting shall be from time to time appointed by the Board.

2. Special Meetings may be called by the President, or in his absence by the Vice-President, or on a written requisition of two Governors.

3. A number of not less than five shall be a quorum for the transaction of ordinary business; but for the appropriation or disposal of any of the property or money of the Society, except for the payment of necessary expenses, a number of not less than seven shall be necessary to constitute a quorum, of which number the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall be one.

4. At the stated meeting in April of each year, the Board shall elect from its number, by ballot, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and shall appoint the following standing committees, namely

1. A Finance Committee, to consist of three Governors.

2. An Executive Committee, to consist of five Governors.

3. A Committee on Nominations, to consist of three Governors, to whom shall be referred the names of all candidates who may be proposed for election to the office of Governor, and of all nominations for vacancies occurring in any of the other offices of the Society, whenever they may occur.

4. A Law Committee, to consist of three Governors.

5. The following shall be the order of business at the meetings of the Board.

1. Reading of the Minutes of last meeting.

2. Reading of the Minutes of Standing Committees.

3. Reports of officers of the Board.

4. Reports of Standing or Special Committees.

5. Unfinished business.

6. Miscellaneous business.

CHAPTER IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. The President, or Vice-President, together with the Secretary, may, on authority of the Board, upon the payment of the principal

and interest of any Bond and Mortgage held by the Society, execute a certificate of satisfaction thereof, or an assignment of the same without recourse.

2. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds of the Society which shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors, and he is authorized to receive the interest or dividends on all securities and to give receipt therefor. In case of his absence or disability, the President or Vice-President is authorized to receive such interest or dividends.

3. The Treasurer shall keep books of account, and at each stated meeting shall make a report of the several sums by him received and expended.

4. The Secretary shall have the custody of the records and papers of the Society, other than the securities and medical records; he shall keep fair and accurate minutes of the proceedings of the Board, and notify the Governors of the meetings. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal of the Society.

CHAPTER V.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. The Finance Committee shall have power, from time to time, to direct the purchase, sale or exchange of investments of the Society and may authorize the Treasurer to execute and deliver in the name and under the seal of the Society all necessary papers in connection therewith, and no change shall be made in any investments without the authority of said committee. They shall as often as once in six months examine the Treasurer's accounts or cause the same to be examined.

2. The Finance Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER VI.

CUSTODY OF SECURITIES

1. All securities shall be deposited with such Bankers, Bank or Trust Company as may be designated by the Board of Governors. Securities so deposited to be withdrawn only upon the written order of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital when signed and countersigned by any two of the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary or Treasurer, or upon the signature of any one of the above officers, when countersigned by any other Governor of the Society.

CHAPTER VII.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

1. The Executive Committee shall have the supervision of all buildings and improvements belonging to the corporation, and shall hold stated meetings at least once in each month and as often as the exigencies of business may require.

2. They shall audit the bills on receiving them from the Superintendent, and make a draft on the Treasurer for the amount of the same. At their succeeding meeting they are to examine all such bills to see that they are duly receipted. They shall notify the Superintendent each month of the total amount of money which may be expected for all running expenses during the following month.

3. They shall keep a book of minutes, and enter therein such business as may come before them, which book must be laid before the Governors at every monthly meeting.

4. The Committee may direct the expenditure of money or clothes for the relief of patients who from extreme poverty or circumstances of peculiar distress, may need such aid.

5. Whenever they think it necessary that a special meeting of the Governors should be called they shall apply for that purpose to the President, or in his absence, to the Vice-President. In the absence or inability of both to act, such meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

6. The Executive Committee shall have and exercise such other powers as may from time to time be conferred upon them by the Board of Governors.

CHAPTER VIII.

1. The Board of Governors, or a majority of them, shall, immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Board in each year, elect by ballot such and so many physicians and surgeons as they shall judge necessary to attend the Hospital and to render all necessary medical aid to the persons admitted to the benefits of the Institution, and to conduct the educational and medical work of the Hospital. In case of a vacancy or vacancies, the Board of Governors, or a majority of them shall elect other physicians or surgeons to fill the same.

2. No surgeon, officer, nurse or servant of this Institution shall accept any gift or bequest from or on behalf of any patient in the Wards or Out-Patient Department.

CHAPTER IX.

1. Persons may contribute toward the endowment of beds in the Society's Hospital by the payment of a sum not less than \$7,500, the annual income from which will be applied to the cost of maintaining a free bed in one of the wards so far as such income will suffice to pay such cost. Persons making such payments shall have such rights in respect to naming patients to the Society for treatment as the Governors shall from time to time prescribe.

CHAPTER X.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

1. Any alteration or amendment of these by-laws must be proposed in writing at a stated meeting of the Governors, but cannot be acted upon until a subsequent stated meeting; when the same may be adopted provided a majority of the Governors shall approve thereof.

2. These by-laws shall take effect immediately, and all other by-laws of the Society are repealed.

REPORT OF IN-PATIENTS' COMMITTEE

(Committee 1)

November 17th, 1929—November 15th, 1930

We have briefly summarized the work of this committee for the past year. There were 820 cases under our care: Of these 107 were unmarried; 126 deserted or separated; 585 married; 2 widows.

Convalescent care was given to 110 patients; 121 children were placed temporarily; 60 women placed in homes after their discharge from hospital.

Every effort is made to help the unmarried mother, often bringing her into contact with an organization that will continue to give advice and help over an indefinite period of time.

Families are referred to various organizations where they are helped to maintain a satisfactory standard of living. Assistance is given to all patients, who apply, providing the case proves deserving.

Case No. 1. B. S., 103 Willett St., New York City.

Family of four children and new-born baby, the eldest a girl about 12 years of age. When patient was five months pregnant her husband left her taking with him two boys. Up to time of delivery the mother did housework by the day in order to support herself and two children. Home consisted of two rooms which were in a terrible condition. Patient was very cooperative and appreciated everything done for her. Cleaner gave services until patient was able to be about. Refused aid from Charitable Organization. Family of three children and new-born baby living in three fairly well kept rooms. Father is serving two years in prison for forgery. Mother and children are cared for by the A. I. C. P.; housekeeper is also furnished by the Society. Nursing care given.

Case No. 3. C. S., 328 West 40 St., New York City.

Family of five children. Patient was referred to Lying-In Hospital by the C. O. S. Husband is serving a jail sentence for non-support. Mother helped to support children by occasionally working on furs at home. Rooms were poorly kept. C. O. S. helped with rent and gave home supplies at various times and will continue with some assistance. Nursing care given.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

(Committee 4)

This Committee raises as much money as possible towards the maintenance of the Babies' Class by soliciting contributions of two dollars each from children, mostly under the age of ten years. The members of the Board of Managers of the Ladies' Auxiliary are responsible for getting these contributions. The balance on hand November 1, 1929 was \$393.64, and we received during the year ending October 31, 1930 \$681.00.

The funds of the Ways and Means Committee are kept in a special bank account out of which money is paid into the account of the Ladies' Auxiliary from time to time. On December 5, 1929 the sum of \$300.00 was thus transferred to the Ladies' Auxiliary, leaving a balance on October 31, 1930 of \$774.64.

REPORT OF THE BABIES' CLASS FROM DECEMBER 1, 1929 TO NOVEMBER 30, 1930

During the last year the Babies' Class has continued its customary work with the babies born in the service of the Hospital. We have often felt that many of our patients who would have gone to the office of a private physician in more prosperous times, came to us in order to save expense. These mothers have appreciated our help greatly and have been most intelligent in carrying out the advice given to them by the doctors and nurses. Some of the mothers frankly say that they receive more help from us, who make a specialty of treating babies, than they do when forced to go to a general practitioner whose fee they can at times afford.

In some cases the fathers have brought us their babies, as the mothers are employed in earning the little the family lives on. Women can often find work in cleaning or doing other domestic work, when the man of the family has lost his position, sometimes through no fault of his own. It is surprising to see how well some of the fathers handle the babies and how faithfully they try to carry out the advice given to them.

Our volunteers not only greatly help us at the Class sessions but also are very kind in aiding the families who are in the greatest need. This is especially true during the Holidays. For some years past a friend has sent us a check at Christmas time and at the beginning of the summer months, stipulating that this shall be used directly for the babies. We have usually bought warm underwear for the babies who would otherwise be scantily clad during the winter months, and in summer we have used this money to send babies on short day trips where they could be refreshed by cool sea breezes for a little while at least. Many of the mothers are so situated that they cannot leave home for a longer stay in the country or at the seashore even if no expense is connected with this vacation. If the baby is breast fed of course it cannot leave the mother, hence the little day outings are all the change of air they have, and are very beneficial.

At every Class session inoculations of toxin antitoxin for the prevention of diphtheria have been given to all babies of suitable ages, and 188 babies were protected from smallpox by vaccination.

General Alpine Sun Lamp treatments have been given by our volunteer technician, while treatment for special cases requiring closer application of the rays, has been given by one of our staff doctors in charge of this work; 1,400 treatments were given during the seven months when this kind of aid is advisable. In warm weather we discontinue the Sun Lamp work, out of door sun baths being advised then.

It is interesting to note that many mothers come to the Hospital for confinement even if they must travel a long distance. Among the follow-up cards sent down from the wards when the babies were discharged from the Hospital, 350 cases lived on Long Island and 425 in Brooklyn. It is not possible for our busy nurses to personally call on these mothers, but some of them return to the Babies' Class voluntarily. Many of them are very loyal to the Hospital although they cannot return to the Class as frequently as those living nearby; they often say "My baby was born in the Lying-In Hospital and I want him to be under its care as long as possible."

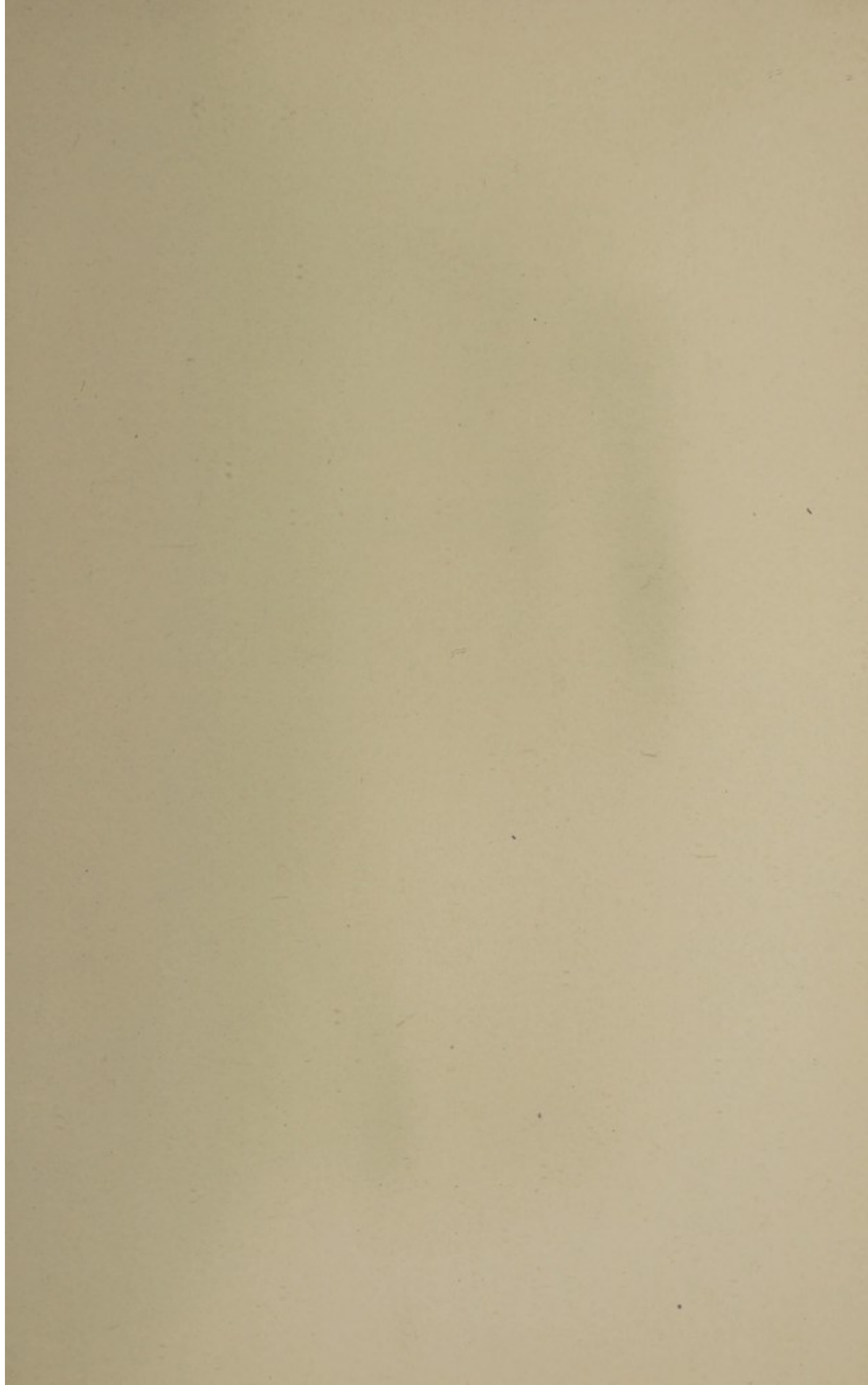

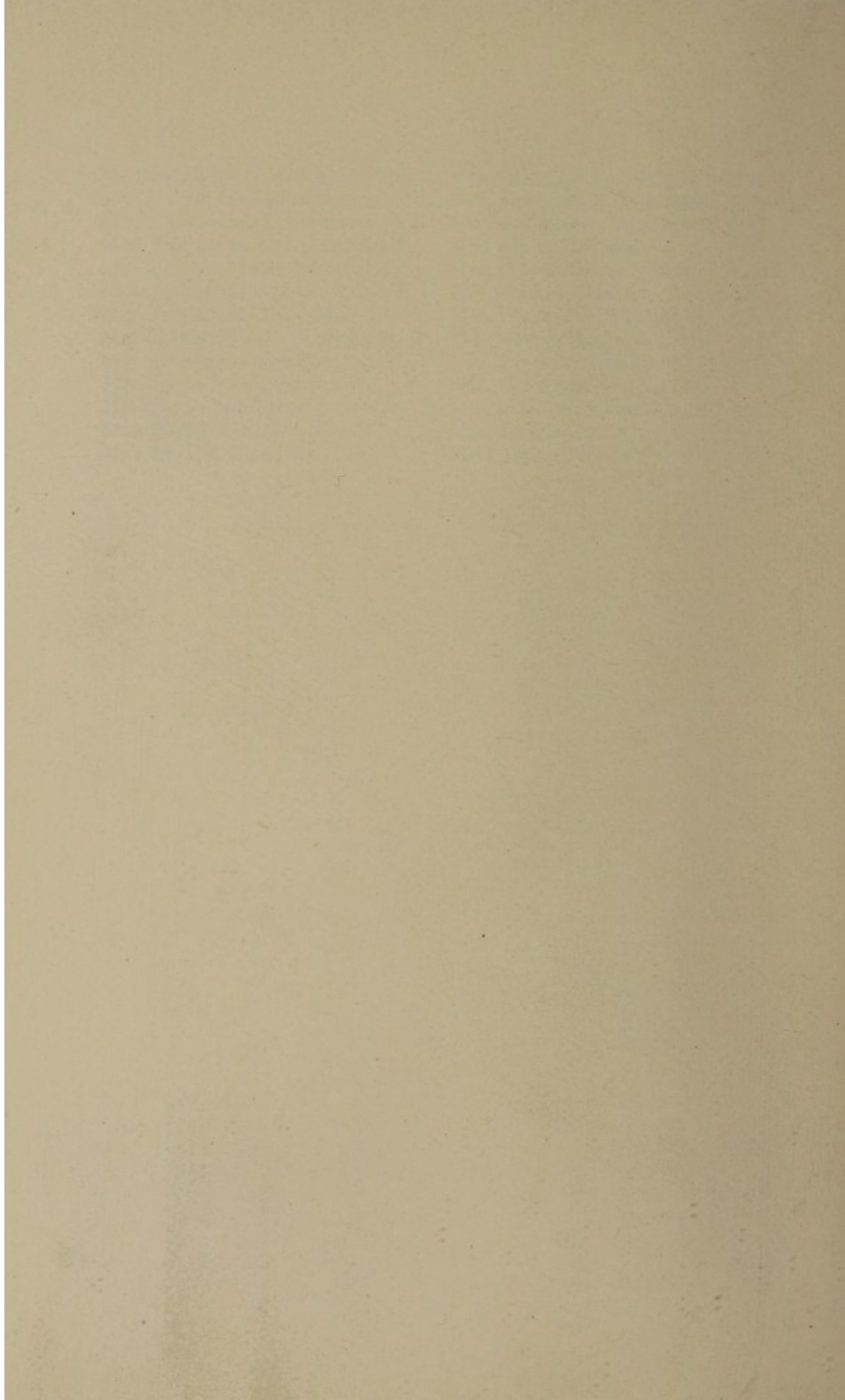

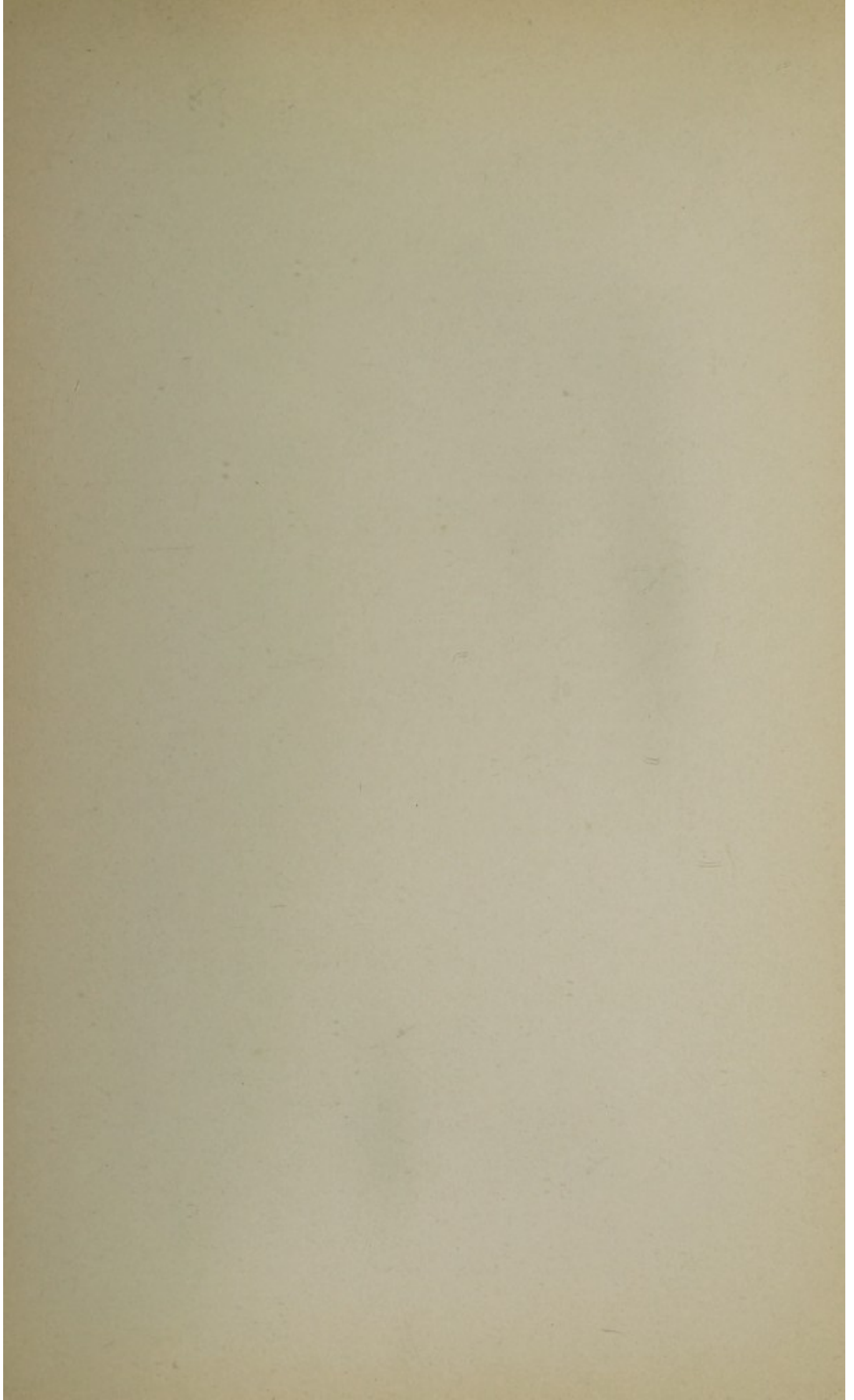

FORM OF BEQUEST

I give and bequeath to the SOCIETY OF THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, incorporated by the Legislature of the State of New York in the year 1799, the sum ofDollars, to be applied to the use and benefit of the said Society under the direction of the Governors thereof.
