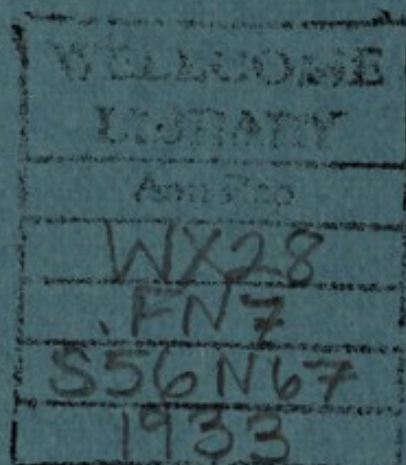

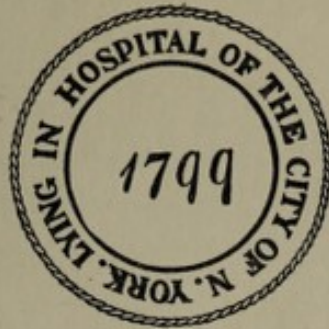


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THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL, 70th STREET AND EAST RIVER

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS
OF
THE SOCIETY OF THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL
1933

The Board of Governors of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital submits herewith its report for the 135th fiscal year of the Society ending December 31, 1933.

Through the energy and ability of the resident and non-resident staff of the Hospital the first full calendar year in its present location has been one of unusual success.

The expected reduction in the charitable work following the moving from 17th Street and Second Avenue to the new Hospital at 70th Street and Exterior Street did not take place. The beds have been filled continuously practically to capacity.

The arrangement for the care of the babies of the Lying-In Hospital by the Department of Pediatrics of the New York Hospital, occupying the connecting building built with the funds of the Manhattan Maternity and Dispensary, has been highly successful through the devotion of Dr. Oscar M. Schloss, the Chief Pediatrician, and his capable staff.

The death rate of mothers and infants has been low.

The Ladies Auxiliary has ably carried on its duties

throughout the year and has been a potent feature in bringing about the excellent relationship between the patients and the staff of the Hospital with the result that the success of the Hospital has been greater than could have been foreseen.

The social relationship of the patients to the Hospital is an important factor both in the welfare of the patients and the conduct of the Hospital. This duty falls on the members of the Ladies Auxiliary and their assistants and to them particular credit is gladly given.

So well was the new building planned that no substantial changes in its arrangement have been necessary.

It is a privilege to convey to the Staff, both professional and administrative, the appreciation of the Board of Governors of The Society of the Lying-In Hospital and of the Board of Governors of The Society of the New York Hospital for the splendid work done and the fine spirit of cooperation displayed.

Medical Report

I have the honor to present the report of the Society of the Lying-In Hospital for the year 1933.

In the report for the previous year I expressed the hope that our results would, in a measure, justify the efforts and interest of the Board of Governors of the Hospital. I feel that the figures, as detailed in the statistical report, represent a partial realization of this expectation.

During the year 1933 we treated a total of 4,387 obstetrical patients on our indoor and home delivery services, and 626 gynecological patients, a grand total of 5,013 patients discharged for the year. Our pavilion hospital beds have been occupied to the extent of 89.7 per cent of full capacity and the private beds 71 per cent, resulting in a total bed occupancy for the Lying-In Hospital of 86.84 per cent capacity, a figure which cannot be increased and still remain consistent with adequate obstetrical care.

The number of hospital deliveries was 2,620 and that of home deliveries 1,095, a total of 3,715 confinements resulting in 3,752 babies. The uncorrected total maternal mortality, including abortions and ectopic gestations was 7 deaths in 4,387 obstetrical discharges, or 1.59 per 1,000 patients. This mortality rate, when expressed in the customary manner in terms of live births, is 1.9 maternal deaths per 1,000 live births, as compared with 3.3 per thousand for the year 1932. The maternal death rate for Greater New York City for 1932 was 5.98 per 1,000 live births, according to the Report of the Committee on Public Health Relations of the New York Academy of Medicine.

Our gross infantile mortality, for indoor and outdoor delivery service, including all babies over 1,500 grams in weight, as well as neonatal deaths during the first two weeks following birth, was 3.86 per cent for the year 1933.

In the gynecological service there were 6 deaths in 626 patients, a gross uncorrected mortality of 0.958 per cent.

The credit for these results belongs not only to the medical staff but in a very large measure to our nursing and anaesthesia departments. Our nurses have given unusually good nursing care to the hospital and outdoor patients. In the outdoor delivery services, Berwind and Lying-In, I am deeply indebted to the Henry Street Settlement and the Maternity Center Association for the valuable nursing rendered to our patients by these two organizations. Miss Marguerite A. Wales, General Director of Nursing Service of the Henry Street Settlement, and Miss Hazel Corbin, General Director of Maternity Center Association, have cooperated with our medical staff to the fullest, with the result that the patients have received excellent nursing care and attention in their homes, not only at the time of confinement, but also during the antenatal and postpartum periods. I further wish to express my appreciation of the consistently good work rendered by Miss Mary C. Skelley, Superintendent of the Berwind Free Maternity Clinic, and her assistants. It is through the generosity of the late Mr. John E. Berwind, and the constant interest and help of his widow, Mrs. John E. Berwind, that we are able to carry on the magnificent work of the Berwind Free Maternity Clinic at 125 East 103rd Street.

The admitting officers of this hospital have been most co-operative and efficient in their duties, which at times are most difficult.

The Department of Nutrition of this hospital, under the direction of Miss S. Margaret Gillam, has served us most faithfully and satisfactorily not only in the matter of meals for patients, but also in solving our many dietary problems.

To Dr. O. M. Schloss, Pediatrician-in-Chief to the New York Hospital, and to his staff we are indebted for the excellent medical care given our babies. We feel that the cooperative arrangement between the department of Pediatrics and the Lying-In Hospital has worked very successfully with regard to both patient and doctor. We hope to continue this arrangement.

We are also indebted to Dr. Eugene DuBois, Physician-in-Chief to the New York Hospital, and his staff for their cooperation and assistance in the treatment of our patients suffering from cardiac and pulmonary complications. The other departments of the

New York Hospital have given us excellent cooperation. Dr. Bernard Samuels, in charge of Ophthalmology in this hospital, has been most conscientious and helpful in his weekly rounds.

All members of our Attending staff have participated in the teaching activities of the Lying-In Hospital, which are greatly diversified. The teaching schedule comprises the regular courses in Obstetrics and Gynecology to the Third and Fourth Year Medical Students, as well as to the under-graduate and graduate nurses. In addition, during the summer months a one-month course is offered to 32 medical students from other universities, and a one, two, or three-month service in Obstetrics and Gynecology is offered to post graduates in medicine from other hospitals. This latter group does actual hospital work and attends teaching rounds and conferences. The weekly Monday afternoon staff conferences are open to any physician who is interested in hearing frank discussion of gynecological and obstetrical problems. This applies equally well to our bi-monthly Journal Club meetings, at which time all current literature is presented and discussed. In addition to the above, we are now offering a one-month post-graduate course to physicians seriously interested in obstetrics and gynecology.

The work of the Lying-In Hospital would be incomplete and would leave much to be desired, were it not for the intelligent assistance and inspiration from the Ladies' Auxiliary Board. In the following pages are the reports from the Secretary of this body and from the Head Social Worker which show to what extent our results depend on the efforts of the Ladies Board. These ladies have helped us not only in providing for an excellent Social Service Department and for volunteer assistants throughout the Clinic, but have made it possible for us to procure radium for the treatment of cancer and other conditions, as well as build up a departmental library. The members of their Executive Committee, as well as the other members of their Board, have at all times been willing to discuss and help in the solution of many of our problems. We owe a deep debt of gratitude to the Ladies' Auxiliary Board of the Lying-In Hospital.

Finally, I wish to express my appreciation of the unstinted and wholehearted support given us by the Executive Committee

of the Board of the Lying-In Hospital, as well as by the Board of Governors of the New York Hospital. I am expressing the sentiment of the whole staff, medical, nursing and administration, by stating that there is an unanimous feeling of indebtedness to the Board of Governors for their interest and assistance in the many phases of the work of the Lying-In Hospital.,

Report of Nursing Activities

I herewith submit the annual report of the Nursing Service of the Lying-In Hospital for the year nineteen hundred and thirty-three.

The work of the nursing service has proceeded according to the plan as outlined last year with the direction and assistance of the clinical staff. Modifications of this plan have been necessary because of the general economic situation which has produced problems of an unusual type, affecting the service, the staff, and the school. The routines and techniques of patient care have been thoroughly studied and reviewed in consultation with the clinicians in order to meet the required changes adequately. Every effort has been made to maintain our standard of good nursing care.

The educational program has followed along the lines developed last year. Nineteen hundred and thirty-three has been a year of testing and revising the course of study in order to arrive at those methods which will most adequately meet the needs of the students. Lectures, clinics, and ward teaching have been more closely integrated, and more closely correlated with the actual service to patients. Our hope that the head nurses and the assistant head nurses might be able to participate in the teaching program has been realized in a very satisfactory way and each has taken a definite part in the instruction of students on her floor.

During the past year we have had twenty-five New York Hospital students and eighty-eight affiliating students: sixteen from the Bloomingdale Hospital School of Nursing, White Plains, New York; forty from the Lenox Hill Hospital School of Nursing, New York City; ten from the Moses Taylor Hospital School of Nursing, Scranton, Pennsylvania; nine from the D. Ogden Mills Hospital School of Nursing, Trudeau, New York; seven from the Saint Vincent's Hospital School of Nursing, New York City; twelve from Saint Mary's Hospital School of

Nursing, New York City. There were forty-six graduate students representing thirty-nine schools in the following countries and states:

During the year the Saint Vincent's Hospital, New York City, organized an Obstetrical Department in which their students will receive obstetrical training in the future. The School of Nursing of the Saint Mary's Hospital for Children, New York City withdrew their affiliation; however, through the unfortunate necessity of having to close their school, their students have been admitted to the New York Hospital School of Nursing and will have their obstetrical course with us in due time.

The time lost on account of illness among our staff and students has been unusually large, amounting to over seven hundred days of nursing. Every effort is being made to ascertain the causes of illness, and by early recognition and treatment it is hoped that this amount may be reduced during the coming year.

This report would be incomplete if mention were not made of the Christmas festivities of the Obstetrical Department. Through the generosity of Mr. Edward W. Sheldon, President of the Board of Governors of the Hospital, it was possible to give a useful present to every pavilion mother and child. Material was bought and through the efforts of the staff of the Lying-In Hospital and their friends, each baby was provided with a blanket. This one feature added greatly to the pleasure of patients who had to be away from home at this time.

The department has had the pleasure of entertaining many professional visitors from foreign countries and from many

different states. These contacts have been valuable and the points brought out by their study of our organization and methods have been of benefit to us in working out our own problems.

Several of the members of the nursing staff are taking special courses within or outside of the hospital. Eighteen have matriculated at one or another of the colleges located in the city. Two have worked toward the completion of their high school courses. It is the policy of the department to encourage self-development and to assist the nurses in taking special courses in which they are interested. Many have attended the lectures, clinics, and conferences held for the students in the department.

The interest and cooperation of the Director of the Lying-In Hospital and the Medical Staff have been very helpful throughout the year. Their assistance in meeting the problems of the nursing service and their generous participation in the educational program have been of great value to us. Acknowledgment of appreciation is due to the members of the other departments of the hospital who have cooperated with us in many ways.

Our great concern for the coming year is to maintain through difficult times our ideals and standards of care to patients, service to doctors, and education of student nurses.

REPORT OF THE LADIES' AUXILIARY TO THE SOCIETY OF THE LYING-IN HOSPITAL

November 1, 1932—October 31, 1933

This report covers the work of the Ladies' Auxiliary for the first year in the new building. As the requirements were considerably different from those in the old building, we were forced to reorganize our entire department and to work out the details to meet our new needs.

When we moved into the new building Miss Riley and Miss Tynes were engaged as assistants to the social worker who had started work with us a few months previously. In April Miss Riley was appointed director of the department to succeed Miss Upham, who resigned, and another social worker was added. The success of the work of the department is due to Miss Riley, who has directed the gynecological clinic, and to Miss Tynes, whose province was the obstetrical clinics. They have also carried on the social service work in the pavilions and have, in spite of many problems and ever increasing responsibilities, adapted themselves splendidly to the new work. Miss Riley's report, which is also printed in this year book, covers in detail the work of the whole department.

Our Treasurer's report shows disbursements for the year of \$8,291.50 and a balance on October 31, 1933 of \$484.04.

The Ladies' Auxiliary has two committees, the House Committee and the Volunteer Workers' Committee. The House Committee undertakes to provide layettes and to collect books for the New York Hospital Library. In January the Library Committee of the New York Hospital extended its services to our pavilions. Gifts of layettes, blankets, diapers and caps were received from the following: American Red Cross, Junior Emergency Relief, Junior League, Ladies' Sewing Class of Cedarhurst, L. I., Mrs. George Nichols, Mrs. E. Farrar Bateson, Miss O'Connell, Nursing Staff and the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Lying-In Hospital. The United Hospital Fund gave us twelve

blankets as a prize for the hospital having had the largest number of babies born in any hospital in New York City during the year.

To Mrs. Allan Locke, Chairman of the Volunteer Workers' Committee, is due the organization and continued service of that Committee. Mrs. Locke secured volunteers from the Junior League, the American Women's Association, Association of Volunteer Workers, and the Scudder School. These volunteers take charge of the following work in the clinics: Directing patients to the correct clinic and helping them at the information desk; doing a great deal of the clerical work of the clinics and naming babies. As the City of New York requires a birth certificate immediately after birth bearing the name of the child, one volunteer has been assigned the duty of assisting parents in the selection of a name. During the year a volunteer student has also followed up the sick babies.

Mrs. Locke represented this Board at the meetings of the Welfare Council, Medical Social Service Section, and was made a member of the Executive Committee. The reports brought back from those meetings have been helpful in planning our work.

Owing to intended absence from the country for the rest of the year, Mrs. Paul Pennoyer resigned as President of the Ladies' Auxiliary in January and Mrs. Robert A. Lovett was elected to succeed her. When Mrs. Lovett subsequently left the country for a prolonged stay, Mrs. James J. Higginson was elected President pro tem.

Dr. Stander requested the assistance of the Board in two important departures in the Hospital: The founding of the Maternal Welfare Clinic and the acquiring of radium for use in the Hospital. The Ladies' Auxiliary gave \$250, half of the cost of the founding of the Maternal Welfare Clinic and guaranteed \$600 for the renting for one year of the amount of radium necessary.

MORBIDITY (FULL TERM AND PREMATURE DELIVERIES):

By "Puerperal Infection" is meant a rise in temperature to 100.4° F. (38°C.) occurring once during each of two twenty-four hour periods following delivery or remaining elevated longer than 24 hours, excluding the first 24 hours after delivery, unless the rise in temperature is definitely proven to be due to other causes, such as mastitis, pyelitis, or intercurrent infection. Morbidity includes all cases of Puerperal Infection and all those febrile from other causes. A temperature elevated to 100.4°F. (38°C.) once, or of only 24 hours duration is a One Day Fever, and not included in the morbidity figure. The temperatures are taken on the Indoor service as follows: 6-10 A.M., 2-6-10 P.M., unless otherwise ordered. The temperature on the Outdoor services are taken by the visiting nurse once a day at the time of her routine visit, unless otherwise ordered.

HISTORY No. 28082—Acute cardiac failure

The patient was an unregistered white primipara, aged 28, about five months pregnant, admitted in extreme cardiac failure, pulse 120, respirations 60 per minute, temperature 35.8°C., blood pressure 70/50. Past history entirely negative. Present illness began two months ago when patient noticed dyspnea on exertion, followed later by dry cough. Five days before admission thought she had a cold and was treated by a doctor for cardiac decompensation. Patient did not follow advice and would not go to bed. In spite of all treatment, patient grew steadily worse and died two and one-half hours after admission.

Diagnosis: Acute cardiac failure, rheumatic heart disease. No autopsy.

HISTORY No. 40757—Pyelitis and Cardiac Insufficiency

Patient, age 25, para 0-0-0-0, L.M.P. March 23, 1933, was admitted with severe chills and fever. She had had a pain in her back for six weeks and frequency of urination, with occasional chills and fever. Impression was pregnancy of 6 months' duration complicated by acute pyelonephritis, right, and acute anemia. She improved somewhat under treatment. A blood chemistry on the following day showed N.P.N. 70.6 mgm., uric acid 7, CO₂ 39.5. Blood pressure rose from 115/75 on admission to 175/100. Intravenous glucose 25% was given. Patient grew steadily worse, became drowsy, dyspnoic, had numerous rales in chest, coughed a blood stained sputum. Patient died undelivered the third day after admission.

Diagnosis: Acute pulmonary edema with cardiac insufficiency. No autopsy.

HISTORY No. 19987—Anesthetic death

Patient, age 30, para 1, white, was admitted not in labor. About 8 hours later labor began suddenly and the membranes ruptured. Dilatation occurred rapidly and in 25 minutes the head was on the perineum. Ether anesthesia was used while the patient was transferred to the delivery room and then was replaced by nitrous oxide and oxygen. Patient vomited a thick brownish material containing particles of food. Anesthesia was discontinued at once but the patient ceased to breathe and could not be resuscitated. In the meantime, the child was delivered by low forceps, and was in good condition.

Diagnosis: Asphyxia due to aspiration of vomitus.

HISTORY No. 33484—Acute yellow atrophy

Patient was a registered 24 year-old white para 1-0-1-1, Wassermann negative, complained of nausea, vomiting and epigastric pain four days before admission to hospital. Had a full term spontaneous delivery; anesthesia, nitrous oxide and ether; duration of labor, 12 hours; infant weighed 2,810 grams. Pelvis—generally contracted typical. The day after delivery an icteric tinge of the skin and sclera was noted. The next day the patient seemed exceedingly drowsy, jaundice more marked. Blood chemistry showed N.P.N. 60.3 mgm. and uric acid—6. She was given 1,000 cc. of 25% glucose. The second day after delivery patient became semi-comatose, temperature rose to 37.6°C., pulse 140 per minute, vomited coffee ground material. Condition grew worse and patient died that night.

Autopsy: Central fatty degeneration of liver with beginning periportal regeneration and fibrosis.

HISTORY No. 16897—Puerperal infection

Patient, age 25, white, para 1, was admitted from Berwind Clinic on the fifth day post-partum. Delivered by version and extraction of a stillborn infant, weighing 3,000 grams, following an episiotomy. Patient followed closely in home, temperature rose to 104°F., pulse 140, she complained of pain in left side, abdomen was distended and there was generalized tenderness. On admission to Hospital, patient was extremely ill, blood cultures showed hemolytic streptococci. Patient grew steadily worse and died day following admission.

Diagnosis: Septicemia with generalized peritonitis.

HISTORY No. 21410—Lobar pneumonia

Patient, age 43, para 4, gravida 9, was admitted three days post-partum from Berwind Clinic because of pneumonia. Had a spontaneous delivery at home, infant was born before doctor was called. When first seen, patient was coughing and expectorating blood-stained sputum. On admission to Hospital, sputum showed pneumococcus, Type II, and blood culture showed 200 colonies per cc. of type II pneumococcus. Patient grew steadily worse and died on the sixth day postpartum.

Diagnosis: Lobar pneumonia, pneumococcus, Type II.

BERWIND HISTORY No. 33411—Post Partum Hemorrhage—Internal

Patient was 42 years old, para 6. Went into labor spontaneously. After labor of 10 hours the cervix was fully dilated with the presenting part above the spines. When patient was seen a sterile vaginal examination was done and a compound presentation made out. Under anesthesia the head recessed into the uterus and the foot which was also presenting descended into the vagina. Breech extraction was done without difficulty. Fetal heart lost just before the anesthesia was given. Following delivery there was no bleeding and placenta was expressed without difficulty. Patient was coming out of ether anesthesia when she went into shock and in spite of all efforts patient died 25 minutes after delivery. Baby weighed 4,000 grams, stillbirth, intra-uterine asphyxia.

No autopsy.

INFANTILE MORTALITY

Total infantile mortality includes all full term and premature infants, deadborn, stillborn or dying within 14 days following birth on the Lying-In Hospital Indoor and Outdoor Obstetrical Service and Berwind Outdoor Obstetrical Service. Abortions are all infants born weighing less than 1,500 grams, or less than 35cm. in length. Abortions are not included in the Total Infantile Mortality.

1. History No. 10959—Krukenberg tumor metastatic in the endometrium and in the uterine cervix.

Patient is a 48 year old nullipara who had been followed in the Gastro-Intestinal Clinic for one year because of epigastric pain and flatulence. Diagnosis was gall bladder disease with duodenal adhesions. On admission to this Clinic patient was bleeding profusely per vagina. Diagnosis on examination was pelvic malignancy or metastatic from a gastrointestinal malignancy. Diagnostic biopsy and curettage were done. Pathological report—Krukenberg tumor. On third day post-operative the chest was tapped and 40 cc. of pleural fluid obtained. Later a paracentesis yielded 3 ounces of fluid. Patient was cyanotic and dyspneic. Condition grew worse and patient died on the fourth post-operative day, six days after admission. No autopsy.

2. History No. 33067—Metastatic sarcoma

Registered white unmarried woman, age 62, menopause at age of 56. For past 4 years had asthma, otherwise general health was good. In March 1927 had deep x-ray therapy for two months for an abdominal mass (large fibroid). Six months ago noticed enlargement of abdomen. On admission patient was dyspneic, pulse 120 per minute, weak. On examination there was some fluid in left chest, and an abdominal mass extending above umbilicus on right side of the abdomen. Eight days after admission a posterior colpotomy was done, fluid containing fragments of tissue drained out. Pathology report was metastatic sarcoma. Given deep X-ray treatment. Patient's course was downward and death occurred on the 16th day after admission from acute respiratory failure.

Autopsy diagnosis: 1. Leiomyosarcoma of uterus with implantation throughout peritoneal cavity. 2. Myoma of uterus. 3. Multiple adhesions of peritoneal cavity.

3. History No. 39264—Pulmonary embolism

Patient is a 46 year old unmarried white woman whose complaint was menorrhagia for the past 5 years, and tightness and stiffness around the waist line. Examination showed the uterus enlarged, nodular, and softened. Diagnosis of myoma uteri was made. Two days after admission a dilatation and curettage and subtotal hysteromyomectomy were performed under gas, oxygen and ether anesthesia. For the first 5 post-operative days patient's temperature was around 38°C. Patient had distention and complained of headache. On the 7th day the temperature was normal. That evening patient was heard to groan but complained of no pain. In 15 minutes patient was cyanotic, became unconscious, and died without responding to any medication administered.

Autopsy diagnosis: Pulmonary embolism—right.

4. History No. 38855—Pelvic abscess and generalized peritonitis

Patient, age 26, white, para 1-0-0-1, Wassermann unknown, was first admitted to the Medical Service complaining of weakness and nervous-

ness. Because of a vaginal discharge a Gynecological consultation was obtained. Impression was hypertrophic cervicitis and a cauterization and dilatation and curettage were performed. Normal premenstrual endometrium was the pathological diagnosis. Post-operative course normal. Discharged on 10th post-operative day. Thirteen days later she was readmitted because of pain in the lower abdomen with profuse bloody discharge. Diagnosis following pelvic examination was Pelvic Inflammatory Disease bilateral with extensive Pelvic Cellulitis. Patient did not respond to treatment and her condition gradually grew worse and she died of generalized peritonitis on the eighth day after admission. No autopsy.

5. History No. 46968—Carcinoma of ovary with metastases

Patient, 66 years of age, admitted because of dyspnea of one month's duration and swelling of abdomen. For the past six weeks she had had intermittent vaginal bleeding. Menopause 15 years ago. Paracentesis done and 5,210 cc. of fluid obtained; contained cells of papillary adenocarcinoma of ovaries. Had one X-ray treatment. Another paracentesis was done, and 3,400 cc. of fluid obtained. Patient's condition grew steadily worse and she died 12 days after admission.

Autopsy diagnosis: 1. Cystic carcinoma of ovaries. 2. Invasion of great omentum. 3. Peritoneal implantation. 4. Emboli of tumor tissue in right ventricle of heart. 5. Thrombosis of pulmonary arteries. 6. Infarct of right lung.

6. History No. 43293—Pelvic peritonitis

Patient, age 49, single, was admitted as an emergency, because of profuse vaginal bleeding. Diagnosis of myoma uteri and secondary anemia was made. Cervical pack inserted following day and transfusion given. Following day pack was removed and another transfusion given. Hemoglobin 50%. Patient improved daily. On the 21st day after admission she developed thrombophlebitis. Forty-four days after admission a panhysterectomy and left salpingo-oophorectomy were performed. There was profuse hemorrhage. Hemoglobin was 65%, and a transfusion was given during the operation. Pathological diagnosis was cervical myoma with hyaline degeneration. On the 3rd post-operative day, patient became lethargic. N.P.N. was 39 mgm./100 cc. blood. Another transfusion was given. On the 7th day, the N.P.N. was 46.1 mgm. On the 11th day the wound broke down to the peritoneum. On the 18th day the patient bled 100 cc. per vaginum. Another transfusion was given on the 20th day. On the 21st post-operative day patient became much worse, there was a profuse flow of blood from the vagina, and patient died without responding to medication.

Autopsy diagnosis: 1. Open wound of recent abdominal operation. 2. Hydroureter (slight bilateral). 3. Division of right ureter. 4. Pelvic peritonitis. 5. Erosion of small branch of right internal iliac artery with hemorrhage into pelvic cavity.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

In considering the report of the Social Service Department in the past year, we feel that the results of our work are revealed in the fact that we have become definitely a part of the entire mechanism of the clinic. We are not struggling along with work that has no definite plan in the entire care of the patient but are meeting a need of the woman who registers at the Lying-In Hospital.

We found that for the year ending September 1, 1933, the prenatal clinic had registered 3,457 patients. Of this number, 2,002 were delivered and transferred to post partum clinic. For the year, we lost, through failure to respond to follow-up, only 36 of the ante partum cases registered in the clinic, about 1% of the entire group.

In the post partum clinic, of the 2,179 patients registered for post partum care, 1,920 returned to clinic. This is an 88% return of the total number of patients registered. Of the 12% that never returned to post partum clinic, only 4.5% can be classified as having failed to respond to follow-up. The others have moved, are under the care of a private doctor, or are still being followed in clinic. These figures are very encouraging to us because during the year we worked rather blindly, hoping that we would achieve a satisfactory result.

The gynecology clinics and pavilion have been covered by the Social Service Department in their entirety. All gynecological admissions to the hospital are interviewed by a social worker, who, in this interview, attempts to assist the patient with her plans for admission. By doing this, we have felt that a better understanding of the hospital by the patient could result from social casework treatment. Clinic follow-up has been done by the social worker with the Assistant Resident Physician in charge of the gynecology clinic. Special emphasis has been laid on the following of those patients who are referred for admission and those who are returning to the clinic as post operative cases. The problem of follow-up in gynecology is quite different from that in obstetrics. By careful following and with further assistance, we hope to assist in the extension of the gynecological service.

We have maintained an average caseload in our social cases, and feel that with the changes that have occurred during the past year, and considering the size of our staff, we have maintained an even balance in the treatment of our patients, and nothing urgent has been neglected. Our contacts with patients have been many. We have found that contacting of all new patients has been of great value to us in the follow-up of prenatal and post-natal cases. We hope that we have achieved with our patients, who have been through the clinic in the past year, our share in their education.

In an analysis of our casework, we found that unemployment, inadequate income, illegitimacy, interpretation of the medical problem, child placement and marital difficulties were the social problems which we met most frequently. In handling our casework problems, 45% were carried on in cooperation with other agencies.

We wish to thank the members of the Ladies' Auxiliary Board for their constant interest and support. We are also indebted to others who have contributed magazines for patients on the pavilions and in the clinic, and to those who have kept us well supplied with layettes. The demands on us are many, and we appreciate very much the generosity of those who are interested in the Social Service Department.

Our work has been made possible only because of the cooperation of all the other Departments of the Lying-In Hospital, and we hope that our results for the next year will again be commensurate with the interest of the Members of the Ladies' Auxiliary Board.

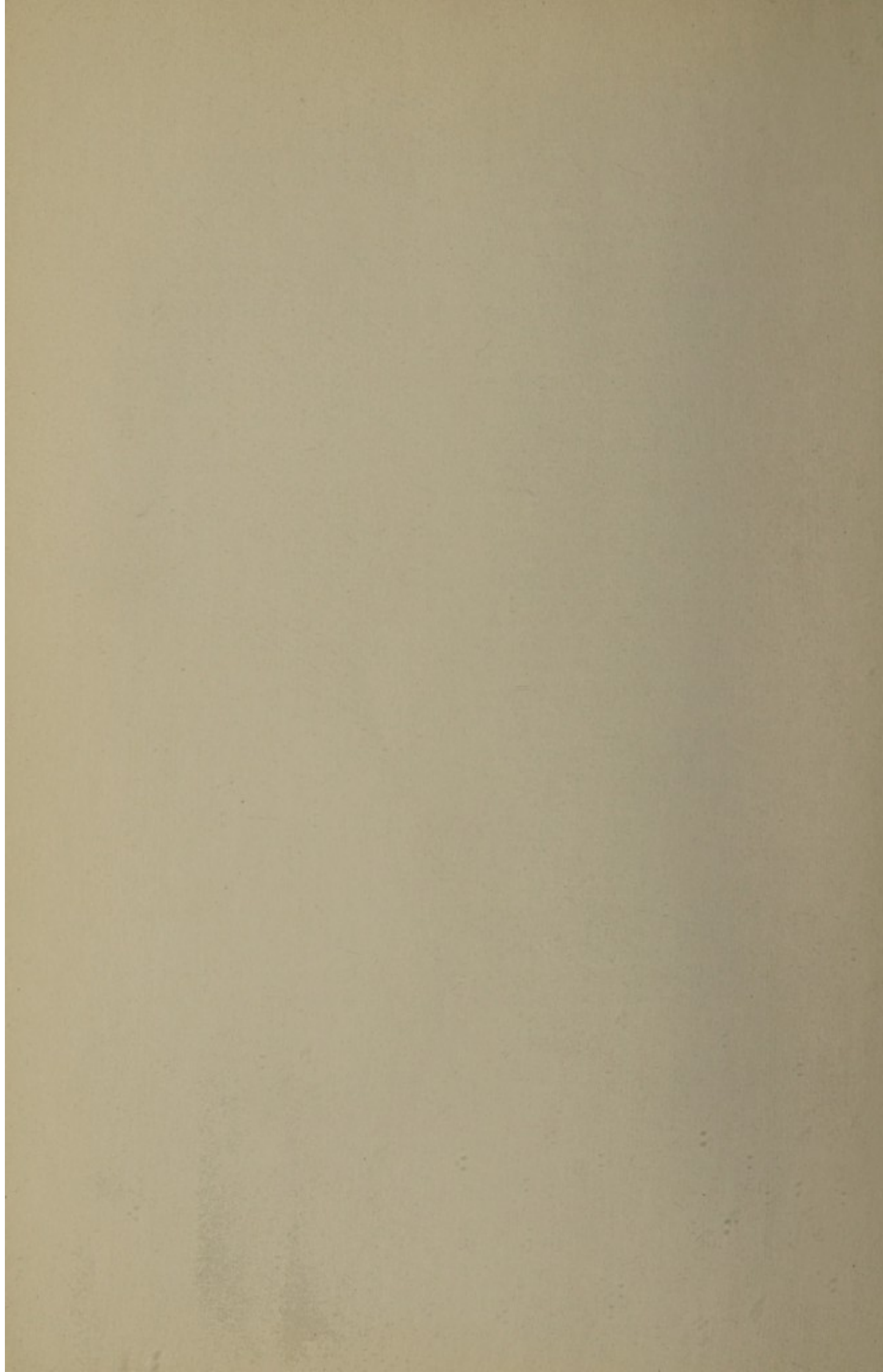

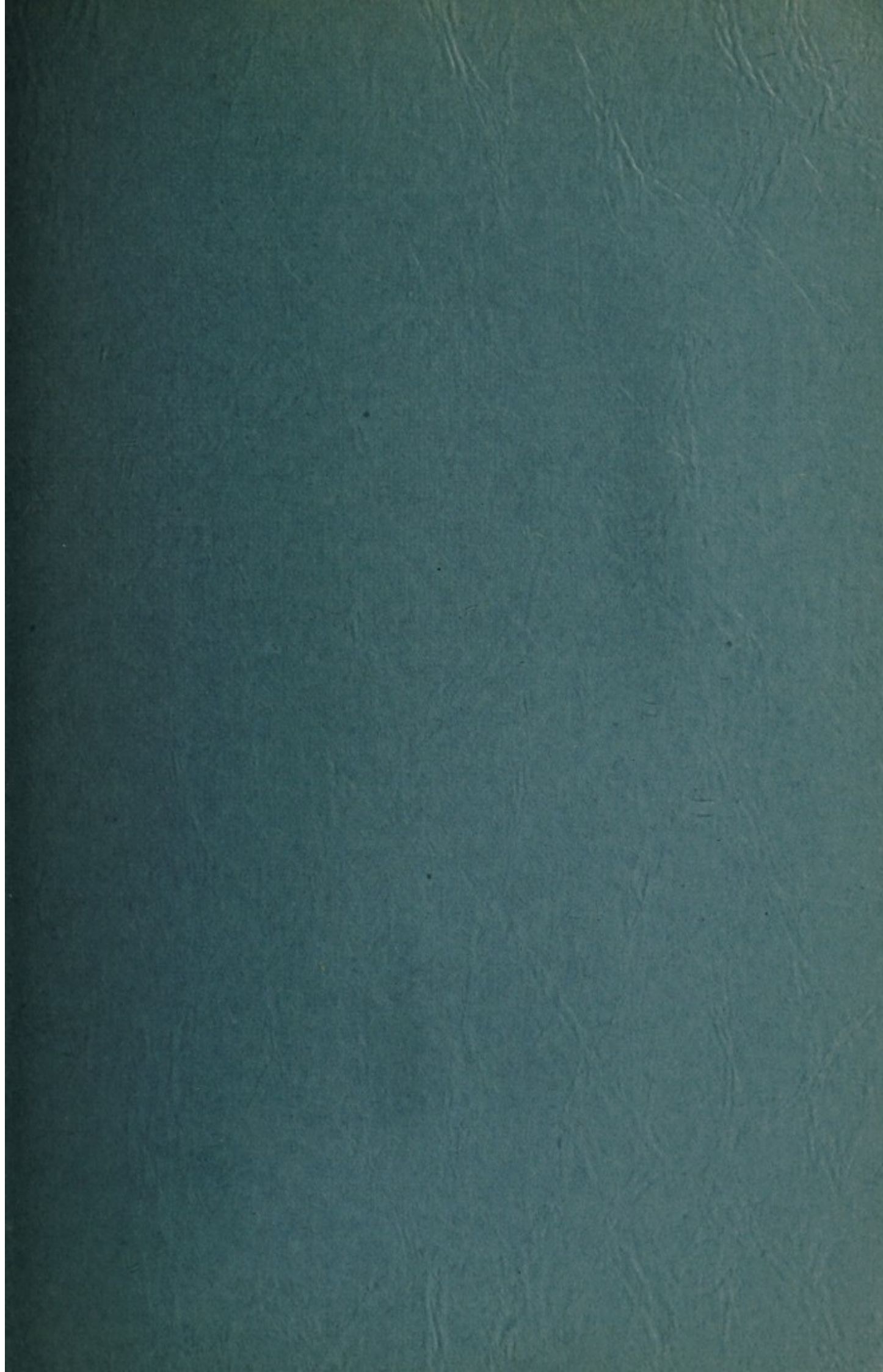
