## ANNUAL REPORT, 1939.

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**T**HE Board of Management have the honour to submit to the Governors and Subscribers their report for the year 1939, together with the accounts audited by Messrs. Price, Waterhouse & Co.

War conditions have rendered it necessary to reduce the Annual Report to almost skeleton form but the Board feel sure that the Governors and Subscribers, whilst realising the necessity for this drastic curtailment, will also fully appreciate the fact that the work of the Hospital has been, and will be, actively and energetically carried on.

St. Mary's has taken a leading part among the great London Hospitals in maintaining to the fullest extent possible in the present exceptional circumstances an uninterrupted service for the care of the civilian sick in need of hospital treatment. The Out-Patient Department has remained constantly open and no urgent case in need of institutional treatment has been refused admission. In addition, such of the Hospital's accommodation and facilities as were deemed necessary by the Government were placed at their disposal for the treatment of casualties which would inevitably arise in the event of any extensive air raid on London.

From time to time, since September 1st, and so far as official authority would permit, additional beds have been opened so that at present 352 beds are available in the Hospital; 192 for civilian sick and 160 reserved for possible air raid casualties. A part of the Lindo Wing has also been reopened and there are now some 25 rooms available for patients of moderate means, who may be admitted for treatment under the care of a member of the Medical Staff.

This policy of affording the widest possible facilities for the treatment of the civilian sick has been adopted by the Board of Management in the confident and earnest hope that all those friends who have so generously helped in the past will continue to lend their aid so that St. Mary's may maintain without interruption and without serious modification the beneficent work for the sick and suffering which has been carried on within its walls for nearly 100 years.

### HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN.

The Board of Management desire humbly to express their deep gratitude to Her Majesty The Queen, as President of the Hospital, for her benevolent and generous interest in the work of the Hospital throughout the year. It is a special pleasure to recall that St. Mary's was the first Hospital to be visited by Her Majesty in connection with the provision of accommodation for air raid casualties. Her Majesty spent some two hours inspecting the emergency medical arrangements and had for each patient in the various wards a kindly and encouraging word. Her Majesty's visit and message of appreciation will ever remain an inspiration to those working in the Hospital as a mark of exceptional efficiency.

The Board of Management have the honour to submit to the Governors and subscribers their report for the year 1939, together with the accounts audited by Messrs. Price, Waterhouse & Co.

War conditions have rendered it necessary to return the Annual Report to almost double its former length. It is felt that the Governors and Subscribers, while realising the necessity for this lengthening, will be fully appreciative of the fact that the work of the Hospital has been, and will be, actively and energetically carried on.

St. Mary's has taken a leading part among the great London Hospitals in maintaining to the fullest extent possible in the present exceptional circumstances an uninterrupted service for the care of the civilian sick in need of hospital treatment. The Day Patient Department has remained constantly open and an urgent case of need of treatment and attention has been received at all times. In addition, such of the Hospital's out-patient and facilities as were deemed necessary by the Government were placed at their disposal for the treatment of cases which might well inevitably arise in the event of any emergency or need in London.

From time to time since September 1st, and so far as local authority would permit, additional beds have been opened so that at present 252 beds are available in the Hospital for civilian sick and 160 reserved for possible military use. A part of the Upper Wing has also been reserved and there are now some 125 rooms available for military use. In addition, the Hospital has been placed at the disposal of a number of the Medical Staff.

This policy of affording the widest possible facilities for the treatment of the civilian sick has been adopted by the Board of Management in the confident and earnest hope that all those friends who have so generously helped in the past will continue to lend their aid so that St. Mary's may maintain without interruption and without serious modification the beneficent work for the sick and suffering which has been carried on within its walls for nearly 100 years.

The plan drawn up by the Ministry of Health for dealing with air raid casualties provided that London and the surrounding areas should be divided into ten Sectors—the apex of each Sector being one of the great Teaching Hospitals, which was also to serve as the main Casualty Clearing Station for the particular Sector. Casualties after receiving emergency treatment were to be evacuated as soon as possible to outlying Institutions which, in some cases, had to be adapted specially for the purpose.

A Group Officer was appointed in charge of each Sector, assisted by a Sector Matron, a Lay Sector Officer and representatives of the Municipal Hospitals. In St. Mary's Sector, the Group Officer was Sir Charles Wilson; the Sector Matron, Miss M. B. Salton; and the Lay Sector Officer, the House Governor.

The scheme involved considerable modification in the working organisation of the Hospital. The operating suite, consisting of two theatres, situated on the top floor of the Hospital, was closed and a large ward on the ground floor was converted into a temporary operating suite with six tables. Special arrangements were made for the reception and registration of stretcher cases and a First Aid Post was established in the Medical School Garage by the Paddington Borough Council for the treatment of walking wounded.

On September 1st, the order was received to clear the Hospital. The great majority of patients were evacuated to their homes or to outlying hospitals. Only some 30 patients, who were too ill to be moved, remained. In addition, various members of the Honorary Medical Staff and a proportion of the Nursing Staff and Medical Students proceeded to their allotted institutions in the Sector. No hitch occurred in connection with the evacuation, which reflected great credit on the admirable arrangements made for transport both for patients and staff by the London Transport Board.

The bed complement of the Hospital, as laid down by the Ministry of Health, was reduced from 480 to 305, *i.e.*, 200 beds for air raid casualties and 105 for civilian sick.

Mr. A. E. Porritt, F.R.C.S., has been the Officer-in-Charge of the emergency medical arrangements of the Hospital, and the Board of Management would like to take this opportunity to record their real appreciation of the excellent work which Mr. Porritt has done in that capacity. The efficient manner in which he has carried out his duties

...brought by thought and carefully through a very difficult period, and all associated with the play's and deeply grateful to him for his work in this connection.

Happily to date there has been no war, but the Board feel confident that, and when the war does come, St. Mary's will be quite ready to meet the emergency which will of necessity arise.

### FINANCE

The audited accounts for the year show:

The deficit is smaller than that of one year ago, but, compared with the deficit of £2,540 in 1937 and £4,700 in 1938, gives rise to a financial picture of great anxiety for at least the next year, the provision on the General Maintenance Fund amounted to well over £70,000.

The year has not been a happy one for the hospital in all respects, it has suffered from a serious shortage of staff, and the Board are deeply grateful to the staff who by their devotion and hard work have maintained a high standard of service. The contents of this report presents a detailed acknowledgment of these gifts, but the Board feel sure that in all circumstances all will understand how much their help has been appreciated and how sincere is the Board's hope that in spite of the difficult conditions prevailing this help will, as far as possible, be continued.

A Group Officer was appointed in charge of each sector, assisted by a Sector Matron, a Lay Sector Officer, and representatives of the Municipal Hospitals. In St. Mary's Sector, the Group Officer was Sir Charles Wilson, the Sector Matron, Miss M. H. Nelson, and the Lay Sector Officer, the House Governor.

In addition, a number of the Hospital Medical Staff and a proportion of the Nursing Staff and Medical Students remained behind in a diminished number of beds. On this occasion the Hospital was cleared in a very short time and the patients were transferred to their homes or to temporary hospitals. The deficit is somewhat less than was at one time anticipated but, combined with the deficit of £2,746 in 1937 and £4,763 in 1938, gives rise to a financial position of great anxiety, for at times during the current year the overdraft on the General Maintenance Fund amounted to well over £70,000.

The war has entailed such dislocation that no useful comparison can be made as regards expenditure with the preceding year. The Board of Management are deeply grateful to all those friends who, by their generous assistance, have maintained to a great extent the income of the Hospital. The curtailment of this report prevents any detailed acknowledgment of these gifts, but the Board feel sure that, in the circumstances, all will understand how much their help has been appreciated and how sincere is the Board's hope that in spite of the difficult conditions prevailing this help will, as far as possible, be continued.



No support is more valuable at this time than that given by annual subscriptions which supplies an assured income so essential to the steady and planned development of the Hospital. ### **NURSING STAFF.**

The Board of Management record with the deepest regret the death of Miss M. B. Salton, who died in Hospital on Christmas Day after a long and serious illness most bravely and patiently borne. Miss Salton was appointed Matron in 1933. She rendered devoted service to the Hospital and belonged to that small and select body of women who have made the Nursing Profession in this country the pride and admiration of the world.

An invitation to fill the vacancy caused by Miss Salton's lamented death was extended to Miss M. G. Milne, the Matron of the General Infirmary, at Leeds. Miss Milne was formerly Matron of St. Mary's from 1928 to 1933, and the Board are glad to know that she has consented to return to her old Hospital to assist at this time of exceptional difficulty with her great ability and experience.

On the outbreak of war, a considerable proportion of the Nursing Staff was transferred to an institution in the outlying district which had been prepared as a Base Hospital for the Sector under the emergency medical arrangements; the remainder of the Staff stayed at St. Mary's, whilst the Preliminary Training School was transferred to Joyce Grove, Nettlebed. The dispersal of the Nursing Staff caused certain difficulties in training, but care had been taken to reduce these difficulties to a minimum. There has been a considerable increase in the number of applicants for training and the facilities afforded by the use of Joyce Grove has enabled this increased demand to be met.

The depleted numbers of Nurses at the Hospital have been filled by members of the Civil Nursing Reserve, whilst St. Mary's has taken an important part in the training of V.A.D.'s, of whom no less than 80 have received the institutional part of their training at the Hospital during the current year.

Adair Lodge, Aldeburgh, which, under the terms of the Will of the late Mr. F. C. Lindo, was endowed and bequeathed to the Hospital as a Convalescent Home for the use of the Nursing Staff, has proved an invaluable asset. Many Sisters and Nurses have greatly benefited and thoroughly enjoyed the excellent facilities which Adair Lodge, with its beautiful gardens and delightful surroundings, afford to those in need of convalescence and rest.

The tennis court, which was laid early in the year on a site in the neighbourhood of the Hospital for the use of the Nursing Staff, has been much used and greatly appreciated.

Thanks are due to Mrs. Ernest Ward for the garments which she so kindly sent for the children in Hospital.



## FIFTH ARMY MEMORIAL FUND.

The war has unfortunately interrupted the Appeal which was actively being made on behalf of the Memorial to the Fifth Army to be established at St. Mary's Hospital. It was confidently hoped that the total this year would be raised to £10,000; actually the Fund now stands at £9,252, and for this result the Hospital is deeply indebted to General Sir Hubert Gough for all the time and trouble he has so generously given in connection with the Appeal.

Work was commenced in the new Entrance to the Hospital in Norfolk Place, which was to form the main outward Memorial, for the chief object of the Fund was to endow two wards in the Hospital which would be available in time of necessity for all ranks who served in the Fifth Army and their dependents in need of hospital treatment.

It was not thought desirable to proceed with the completion of the new Entrance until after the war, although the major part of the work has been already completed, but a beautiful stone tablet has been placed in position in the Main Hall of the Hospital bearing the following inscription:—

To the glorious memory of the Fifth Army under the command of General Sir Hubert Gough. Formed in 1916, constantly undertaking arduous tasks, it finally bore the brunt of the German offensive in March, 1918. Fighting against overwhelming odds this gallant Army perished, but the heroic resistance of all ranks stemmed the torrent and saved their country.

### JOYCE GROVE, NETTLEBED.

Through the great generosity of members of the family of the late Mrs. Robert Fleming, Joyce Grove, Nettlebed,

was placed at the disposal of the Hospital immediately on the outbreak of war. This beautiful house is to be used eventually as a Convalescent Home for patients, but since September has proved of inestimable value as a Preliminary Training School for the Nursing Staff. It was doubtful in September whether the Preliminary Training School would be able to continue, but all doubts on this matter were set at rest by the generous offer of Joyce Grove, which has enabled the recruitment and training of the Nursing Staff to proceed on normal lines.

Joyce Grove has been shared for this purpose with Westminster Hospital. The arrangement with Westminster Hospital will terminate early in the New Year and it is hoped that, whilst our own Training School will remain at Joyce Grove, facilities will also become available for some patients of the Hospital to have the benefit of this delightful house and surrounding country during their period of convalescence.

Since the war began, the First Floor of the Inoculation Department has been used for the purposes of blood transfusion. Many thousands of prospective blood donors have been enrolled and tested, and preparations have been made to collect large quantities of blood in case of need.

Certain of the scientific and technical staff have assumed emergency duties in connection with the war, but, although some research work has had to be postponed, sufficient staff has remained to maintain the essential routine duties of the Department, namely :—

1. The performance of the bacteriological investigations for the Hospital.
2. The teaching of bacteriology.
3. The preparation of vaccines on a large scale for the prevention and treatment of bacterial disease.

The completion of the equipment of the Third and Fourth Floors of the Department has proved of great assistance in the present emergency. The Virus Department has been actively engaged in the preparation of a virus vaccine against influenza. Bearing in mind the deadly epidemic of 1918, any procedure which will afford protection against the disease will be deeply appreciated.

All the vaccines now made in the Department are filled in the safest manner possible in containers for distribution to members of the medical profession throughout the world. This activity in war-time assumes an even greater importance than ever in view of the necessity for the prevention of bacterial diseases such as enteric fever, tetanus, whooping cough, diphtheria and influenza.

Sir Almroth Wright and the other workers in the Inoculation Department have continued their research work, more especially with regard to the mechanism by which the body resists infection and the method by which vaccines and serums can be used in combination with the new chemicals, sulphanilamide and M. & B. 693, to cure a number of acute and previously fatal bacterial infections.

A welcome is extended to Sir Andrew Duncan, G.B.E., who has kindly consented to become a member of the Governing Committee of the Inoculation Department.

## THE MEYERSTEIN DENTAL RESEARCH LABORATORY.

Investigations have been made into the reactions of bone to septic infection, and work has continued on a classification of the innocent neoplasms of bone and of the odontological tissues. It is the earnest hope of the Board that Dr. Fish's research work may proceed unimpeded by the war and by financial reverses.

## ALMONER'S DEPARTMENT.

The resignation, owing to ill-health, of Miss M. H. Williams, the Senior Almoner, was accepted with regret. Miss D. M. Manchée, whose work in the Special Clinic has been of outstanding excellence, has been appointed to succeed Miss Williams.

The normal working of the Department has continued in spite of the many difficulties and the inevitable imposition of emergency duties. Arrangements for convalescence and the supply of surgical appliances have been made and an endless variety of help and encouragement has been afforded to patients in need of assistance.

The Department, aided by volunteers from the Electrical and Massage Departments, undertook the staffing of the Reception Ward, set up in Allcroft Ward, in connection with the Emergency Medical arrangements. The ward was manned day and night until the close of the year, when conditions permitted a return to the normal methods of admission, although the Staff of the Department still remain in residence in readiness for the reception and registration of casualties in the event of an air raid.

War conditions have created many new social problems arising from the separation of families. Special arrangements have had to be made for a number of elderly patients who could, in normal times, have been nursed at home.

Since the outbreak of hostilities and the transfer of the Casualty Department to the Out-Patient Hall, it has been possible for the Almoner to see all the casualty patients instead of only those referred by the Medical Staff. The Casualty Department is essentially the centre of the destitute, and many who come for medical treatment are equally in urgent need of friendly advice and help with clothes, fares, homes and employment.

In August, the necessity of the above plan as part of the general emergency scheme. This involved making alternative plans for a great number of expectant mothers who had booked for admission many months ahead. Fortunately, it has been found possible to accept part of the necessary accommodation in the Hospital for the admission of such cases whose conditions do not permit of their evacuation to outlying institutions.

One of the plans for the coming year is the extension of work amongst patients suffering from cancer. In many cases a timely visit does a great deal which can easily be done by being called to the patient's side, for example, the best of an ailment, or help with that, or later on the provision of institutional treatment.

In the Special Clinic, our conditions have served to increase the difficulties in "following up" one of the main functions of the Almoner in this Department. Every effort has been made to ensure facilities for the continued treatment of expectant mothers and children and extensive to patients and relatives in the hospital in order to carry out the necessary follow-up work and to provide throughout the year continuous treatment.

As from the New Year, a reorganization of the Almoner's Department has taken place with a view to the abolition of the artificial barrier which has often existed in the past between the Patients and the Patients. Arrangements have now been made which provide patients of each Physician and Surgeon to be seen by the same Almoner whether these patients are in attendance in the General Department, the various "follow-up" Clinics or in the wards. This will allow of greater continuity of work and permit of adequate time for having discussions with patients on their own particular difficulties.

The year must serve as a challenge to the Almoner's Department for increased efficiency and economic work.

The Department, aided by volunteers from the Electrical and Massage Departments, undertook the staffing of the Reception Ward set up in Allcroft Ward, in connection with the Emergency Medical arrangements. The ward was manned day and night until the close of the year, when conditions permitted a return to the normal method of admission, although the Staff of the Department will remain in residence in readiness for the reception and registration of casualties in the event of an air raid.

In September, the maternity wards were closed as part of the general emergency scheme. This involved making alternative plans for a great number of expectant mothers who had booked for admission many months ahead. Fortunately, it has been found possible to reopen part of the maternity accommodation in the Hospital for the admission of such cases whose conditions do not permit of their evacuation to outlying institutions.

One of the plans for the coming year is the extension of work amongst patients suffering from cancer. In many cases, a friendly visit discloses a need which can easily be met, bringing relief to the sufferer such as, for example, the loan of an air-cushion, or help with diet, or fares or the provision of institutional treatment.

In the Special Clinic, war conditions have served to increase the difficulties in "following-up," one of the main functions of the Almoner in this Department. Every effort has been made to ensure facilities for the continued treatment of expectant mothers and children often evacuated to isolated areas. In spite of additional obstacles, the record of work done and assistance provided throughout the year continues unabated.

As from the New Year, a reorganisation of the Almoner's Department has taken place with a view to the abolition of the artificial barrier which has often existed in the past between Out-Patients and In-Patients. Arrangements have now been made which permits patients of each Physician and Surgeon to be seen by the same Almoner whether these patients are in attendance in the Out-Patient Department, the various "Follow-up" Clinics or in the wards. This will allow of greater continuity of work and permit of adequate time for having discussions with patients on their own particular difficulties.

The war must serve as a challenge to the Almoner's Department, for increased economic and domestic stress

must be met with constructive and prompt social help. It is in this spirit that the Almoner's Department, encouraged by the ready assistance so freely given by all sections of the Hospital, hope to meet the increased demands which must inevitably arise for its services from the present upheaval in the social conditions of the country.

### **LADIES' ASSOCIATION.**

The Ladies' Association has continued its splendid and invaluable work. This has consisted not only of generous gifts both in money and kind but also of the help afforded to every event organised in aid of the Hospital and the increasing number of friends who have become interested in the work of the Hospital through the activities of the Association.

A number of events were organised in the early part of the year, including Pound Day and a Children's Party at Fulham Palace. Work Parties have been held and, in addition, a large number of Surgical Dressings have been made for use in the Hospital.

In spite of the difficulties of the international situation, every endeavour has been made to maintain the activities of the Association and the interest of its members in the work of the Hospital.

The death of Mrs. Maynard Smith, who rendered such valuable service to the Association as Honorary Work Secretary for so many years, is recorded with deep regret.

Miss Lithiby, M.B.E., found it necessary, in view of her increasing responsibilities on National Service, to resign from the office of Honorary Treasurer, and Mrs. Morris has been appointed her successor.

The Executive Committee very earnestly appeal to all ladies interested in the Hospital to support them in their

work by joining the Ladies' Association. Mrs. Graham H. Bantick, Honorary Secretary, Wood Lodge, Studley Wood, Herts, will gladly give full particulars of the Ladies' Association.

### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

The Chaplain's work consists of arranging and conducting services in the Chapel and in the wards and of personal ministrations to the patients. The visiting of the patients is a daily task, and this important task has been faithfully discharged. Often, too, the Chaplain has an opportunity of speaking to friends of patients in times of anxiety and sorrow.

Services in the Chapel are held on Sundays and on certain days of the week. These services are much appreciated by the patients and staff of the Hospital. Every facility is, of course, given to clergy of all denominations to visit their own people.

### VEGETABLE COLLECTION.

Attention is again directed to the scheme which has been in existence for a number of years for the voluntary supply of vegetables for the Hospital, organised by Mr. William Wynn. Enthusiastic support has been given by branches of the Women's Institutes throughout the country, and subscribers, who have local influence with these Institutes, are asked to be so good as to send the name of their Branch Secretary to Mr. William Wynn.

In addition, it is hoped that all war-time allotment holders who may, at any time, have a surplus of vegetables will be so kind as to remember the Hospital and its pressing needs.



## ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Applicants are treated as In-Patients or Out-Patients at the discretion of the Medical and Surgical Staff, and as the accommodation available in the Wards may permit.

*Accidents* and other cases deemed urgent by the Medical Officers are (so far as space permits) admitted without Letters at all times.

Holders of Letters seeking admission as In-Patients must present their Letters at the Hospital at 1 o'clock (Sundays excepted).

Much inconvenience having occurred in consequence of the arrival of Patients from a distance, without notice, it is requested that in the case of Patients coming from places so remote as to preclude easy and cheap communication with the Hospital, notice be given to the Secretary three days before the Patient intends to apply for admission, enclosing a Medical Certificate stating as fully as possible the nature of the case.
