ANNUAL REPORT, 1940.

THE Board of Management have the honour to submit to the Governors and Subscribers their report for the year 1940, together with the accounts audited by Messrs. Price, Waterhouse & Co.

The Report is drastically curtailed ; but the work of the Hospital has been actively carried on throughout the year.

Since the 1st January, 1940, 352 beds, *i.e.*, the maximum number officially authorised by the Ministry of Health, have been available in the Hospital ; 192 beds for civilian sick and 160 beds for air-raid casualties. The Lindo Wing was also partially re-opened on the 1st January, and at the moment some 34 rooms are available for private patients, who may be admitted for treatment under the care of a member of the Medical Staff. The Out-Patient and Casualty Departments have continued to work normally.

The Board have felt that it was the duty of the Hospital to afford the widest possible facilities for the treatment of the civilian sick, and hope that all those friends who have supported the Hospital so generously in the past will continue to do so in order that the work for the sick and suffering, which St. Mary's has carried on within its walls for practically a century, should not be interrupted.

The war has brought many changes in the Staff of the Hospital, and in September, Lt.-Col. W. Parkes, D.S.O., M.C., House Governor of the Hospital, rejoined His Majesty's Forces. The Board feel sure that all connected with St. Mary's will wish good fortune and a safe return to Colonel

Parker, and to all those members of the Medical, Nursing and Administrative Staffs who are now on active service.

In the meantime, those who have remained at their various posts in the Hospital have played their parts worthily, and the loyalty and determination evidenced on all sides have enabled the work of the Hospital to continue during this very difficult period.

HER MAJESTY THE QUEEN

The Board of Management desire fittingly to express their deep sympathy with Her Majesty The Queen, as President of the Hospital, in the ordeal through which the Royal Family are passing, together with so many of their subjects, during the intense bombardment of London. Their Majesties' magnificent courage in sharing the common danger is an inspiring example to all.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL ARRANGEMENTS.

The Emergency Medical Arrangements which came into force in September, 1939, have continued throughout 1940. Here again there have been some changes in personnel. Mr. A. E. Forth, F.R.C.S., who had been Medical Officer-in-Charge since the outbreak of hostilities, left to join His Majesty's Forces in March. He was succeeded by Dr. Thomas Hunt, who, after a brief term of office, also joined up. Mr. Donald MacLeod, M.S., F.R.C.S., was then appointed and is still Medical Officer-in-Charge. The Board wish to record their deep appreciation of the excellent work which he and all the members of the Emergency Medical Staff at St. Mary's have done and are still doing.

During the recent bombardment of London, St. Mary's has had to deal with many casualties as the result of air raids in the vicinity of the Hospital, and has also provided

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refuge for patients from other Hospitals which have suffered damage. Mention should be made of the valuable services rendered by Miss Manchée, the Senior Almoner of the Hospital, and her Staff, who have undertaken the registration and welfare work in connection with the casualty services. The Emergency arrangements have now been well tested, and the Board feel confident that there is no emergency which may arise in the future that will not be dealt with efficiently by all concerned.

FIRE-FIGHTING AND STRETCHER-BEARING SERVICES.

The Fire-fighters and Stretcher-bearers, recruited from the Medical School Students and organised by Dr. A. C. Frazer, have done valiant service, and the grateful thanks of everyone at St. Mary's are due to them for the efficient manner in which they have carried out their duties, often under unpleasant conditions.

FINANCE.

Owing to war conditions no useful comparison can be made with the previous year.

The Board greatly appreciate the generous way in which all those friends of St. Mary's have continued to support the work of the Hospital by maintaining their subscriptions and donations. When better times come, the Board will resume the practice of printing the lists of Subscribers, Donors, gifts in kind and the subsidiary reports. Their gratitude for benefits received and services rendered is none the less sincere because of omission now.

The Combined Hospitals Flag Days were held on the 7th May and the 8th October, as a result of which the Hospital benefited to the extent of £1,102. It is interesting to note that this is an increase of £140 on the amount collected in 1939.

It was hoped that the Matinee might be held in October as usual at the Metropolitan Theatre of Varieties, and Her Royal Highness Princess Arthur of Connaught had most graciously promised to be present. Unfortunately when the bombing began, the arrangements had to be abandoned. The Board much appreciate the generosity of those patrons who allowed the money they had sent for tickets to be retained as a donation towards the Hospital Funds.

Attention is drawn to the arrangement whereby, without any extra expense to themselves, annual subscribers may, with income tax at 8s. 6d. in the £, increase by almost half the amount of their subscription to the Hospital by completing the Form of Agreement to contribute for seven years or during life, whichever is the shorter period. Full particulars of this Form of Agreement will be gladly supplied upon application to the Secretary.

The Board wish to record with gratitude the useful gifts of clothing, dressings, &c., which have been received from the American Red Cross Society and the South Africa Voluntary Service.

BRITISH WAR RELIEF SOCIETY.

Grateful mention must be made of the help given to the London Hospitals by the generosity of the American public. An American relief organisation—the British War Relief Society, Inc., of New York City—has made a grant to the British Hospitals Association War Emergency Committee for distribution amongst Hospitals in this country. The Lay Sector Officer has received a portion of this grant, which has enabled St. Mary's Hospital to assist necessitous air-raid patients.

NURSING STAFF.

Applications for training at St. Mary's Hospital have been received in numbers which allow satisfactory selection. There is no doubt that the call to those interested in the Nursing Services has made a very general appeal. Every effort has been made to maintain a high standard of training for staff, at the home hospital, St. Mary's, or if transferred temporarily for duty throughout the Sector. Praise is due to all who have dealt so ably with changed conditions, and assisted those about them to adapt themselves to the new surroundings.

Great pressure has been placed upon members of staff and it is to the satisfaction of those in charge to be able to report that in every instance, especially under the heavy bombing during the later months of the year, the staff were ready to meet the emergency, and by their coolness and quiet attention to the duty to hand, exerted a marked influence upon the patients in their care.

The Sports and Social section has, of necessity, seen less activity on account of emergency conditions, but every effort has been made to impress the importance of maintaining these activities.

JOYCE GROVE, NETTLEBED.

The adaptation of Joyce Grove, Nettlebed, as a Convalescent Home has been postponed until after the war. The Preliminary Training School for Nurses still continues there under ideal conditions, and these facilities are also being shared with the Westminster Hospital.

Accommodation has also been provided at Joyce Grove for a section of the Accounts Office since October, when it was thought desirable that the essential records of the Hospital should be moved to a place of greater safety. This arrangement is proving satisfactory and much of the routine work is being done there.

ADAIR LODGE, ALDEBURGH.

Owing to occupation by the Military Authorities, Adair Lodge, which was given and endowed by the late Mr. F. C. Lindo for use as a Convalescent Home for the Nursing Staff, had to be evacuated in July. The Board regret that the Nursing Staff have thus, for the time being, been deprived of the benefits which this delightful house provided for them.

MEDICAL SCHOOL.

The entry of full-course students for the Academic Year 1939-40 was 73 ; the increased number having been accepted as a provision against loss by calling-up for Military Service.

The number of full-course students attending during the same Academic Year was 426, while 53 others attended for short courses.

In the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge and London, 17 students obtained First Degrees, and one obtained a Higher Degree. During the year, 68 students obtained First Diplomas and 6 obtained Higher Diplomas.

In spite of the many difficulties caused by the evacuation of patients and the division of clinical instruction among the Sector Hospitals, the number of First Qualifications rose to 85 during 1939-40, as compared with an average of 60.3 for the three previous Academic Years.

The Second and Third Year students, evacuated to Manchester in October, 1939, returned to St. Mary's in January, 1940, and have continued there.

The First Year students also returned for the Summer Session, but were again evacuated to Berkhamsted in the Autumn.

Instruction given by members of the Medical Staff to Clinical Students in the Sector Hospitals has been continued throughout the year.

The Athletic Clubs have been active, and the ground at Teddington has been in regular use, but the usual Inter-Hospital Cup Competitions have not been held.

INOCULATION DEPARTMENT.

Apart from a short period when the Out-patient Department was closed at the outbreak of war, the treatment of patients has continued. In spite of air raids and evacuation, there were over 13,000 out-patient attendances during 1940.

The Committee of the Inoculation Department has granted to the Emergency Medical Service, without recompense, the use of the greater part of the first floor of the building for purposes of blood transfusion. Many thousands of prospective blood donors have been enrolled and tested, and preparations have been made to collect large quantities of blood in case of need.

Many of the scientific and technical staff have assumed emergency duties in connection with the war, but, although some research work has had to be postponed, sufficient staff has remained to maintain the essential routine duties of the Department, namely:—

1. The performance of the bacteriological investigations for the Hospital.
2. The teaching of bacteriology.
3. The preparation of vaccines on a large scale for the prevention and treatment of bacterial disease.

These vaccines are used by practitioners throughout the world and by the fighting forces.

All the vaccines now made in the Department are filled in the safest manner possible in ampoules for distribution to members of the medical profession throughout the world. This activity in war-time assumes an even greater importance than ever in view of the necessity for the prevention of bacterial diseases such as enteric fever, tetanus, whooping cough, diphtheria and influenza.

The completion of the equipment of the third and fourth floors of the Department has proved of great assistance to the present staff. The Virus Department has been actively engaged in the preparation of a virus vaccine against influenza. Bearing in mind the deadly epidemic of 1918, any procedure which will afford protection against the disease will be deeply appreciated.

Dr Alexander Wright and the other workers in the Inoculation Department have continued their research work, more especially with regard to the substances by which the body resists infection and the method by which vaccines and sera can be used in conjunction with the new chemicals which have been introduced to cure a number of acute and previously fatal bacterial infections.

In spite of the many difficulties caused by the evacuation of patients and the division of clinical instruction among the Sector Hospitals, the number of First Classifications was 105 during 1939-40, as compared with an average of 80.5 for the three previous Academic Years.

Owing to the withdrawal of the grant by the Medical Research Council, and the impossibility of arranging any other grant at this time, it has been found necessary temporarily to close the Meyerstein Dental Research Laboratory. Much important research work has been carried out by Dr. Fish in the Laboratory, and the Board hope that financial assistance will be forthcoming in order that the Laboratory may be re-opened in the near future.

In July, Dr. G. W. B. James rejoined His Majesty's Forces and Mr. Douglas MacLeod was appointed to fill the vacancy thus caused in the Medical Members of the Board of Management.

Mr. Guy Herbert, C.B.E., was re-appointed Chairman of the Board, and General Sir Herbert Lough, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., Deputy-Chairman.

At the first meeting of the House and Finance Committee after the Annual Meeting, Mr. R. M. Greenwood, C.B.E., was re-appointed Chairman of the Committee.

The Board of Management have suffered great loss in the death of Mr. Stuart Sankey, K.B.E., C.V.O., and Mr. F. R. Williams Wynn, C.B. Colonel Sir Stuart Sankey had been a member of the Board for 13 years and was responsible for the very generous interest which the City of London branch of the British Red Cross Society took in the work of this Hospital. Mr. F. R. Williams Wynn, whose family have always been associated with St. Mary's, had been a member of the Board for over ten years and will be remembered in connection with the Vegetable Collection Fund organised by him. From what the Hospital derived such great benefit.

The resignation of Mr. Gilbert Jarvis from the Board of Management was received with regret.

At the first meeting of the House and Finance Committee after the Annual Election, Mr. R. M. Greenwood, C.B.E., was re-appointed Chairman of the Committee.

The Board of Management have suffered great loss in the deaths of Colonel Sir Stuart Sankey, K.B.E., C.V.O., and Mr. F. R. Williams Wynn, C.B. Colonel Sir Stuart Sankey had been a member of the Board for 13 years and was responsible for the very generous interest which the City of London branch of the British Red Cross Society took in the work of this Hospital. Mr. F. R. Williams Wynn, whose family have always been associated with St. Mary's, had been a member of the Board for over ten years and will be remembered in connection with the Vegetable Collection Fund organised by him, from which the Hospital derived such great benefit.

The resignation of Mr. Gibson Jarvie from the Board of Management was received with regret.

CHANGES IN MEDICAL STAFF.

The Board of Management record with regret the resignation of Mr. Herbert Smale from the office of Dental Surgeon, to which office he was appointed in 1928. His loss will be greatly felt. In appreciation of the devoted services he has rendered both to the Hospital and the Medical School, Mr. Smale has been appointed to the office of Consulting Dental Surgeon.

Dr. E. Wilfred Fish succeeds Mr. Herbert Smale as Dental Surgeon.

Congratulations are extended to Dr. Rohan Williams on his election as a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians.

ALMONER'S DEPARTMENT.

It is only logical that war conditions should intensify the demands on those whose task is Social Service. The record of the past year shows, however, a great increase in normal work in addition to many new undertakings and fresh duties.

When Miss Shiell left us in May to take up her appointment at the West Suffolk General Hospital, Miss Drummond was promoted to Senior Assistant. A Casualty Almoner was also appointed, thus meeting a long-felt need.

Of new undertakings, one of the most valuable is the following up of cancer patients, over 400 of whom have been visited and helped in a variety of ways. In this connection, grateful thanks are due to Miss Allen, who gives much time and interest to these visits.

War has brought the problem of the Refugee. In addition to German Jews are Austrians, Czechs, Poles, French, Dutch and Belgians, the British War Refugees and

Case from Canada. Apart from the language difficulty is the provision of treatment, diet and accommodation and the in-pile of treatment of certain cases.

No small part of the work has been among members and babies referred from tube stations and shelters and the evacuation of both old and young has been one of the main objects.

The demands of war have never been less for the civilian population and more patients have to be transferred to a Base Hospital and it has been found so that although there are at any given time long queues in the wards there before the war the work has never been more varied. It is this more than ever that has been the work and labor in those wards where the Medical Staff have to keep in touch.

With much to be done and the need for the Medical Assistance Committee, the Government has provided for the Department from the Government Fund and the War Office and small Sanctions Fund and in addition the War Office and the Medical Staff have to keep in touch.

In connection with its far-reaching records, our grateful thanks are due to Miss Tainton of the British Red Cross Society, who, in spite of onerous duties, gives so generously of her time in helping this side of the work.

The Department has been in residence since outbreak of war for the reception and registration of casualties, and the commencement of the bombing in September marked the beginning of yet another phase of duty. Casualties have been identified and relatives traced ; claims for compensation lodged and help given extending over a wide range, including those rendered homeless and relatives of those killed.

No small part of the work has been among mothers and babies referred from tube stations and shelters, and indeed evacuation of both old and young has been one of the main objects.

The demands of war leave fewer beds for the civilian population and many patients have to be transferred to a Base Hospital after only a short stay, so that although there are at any given time fewer patients in the wards than before the war, the turn-over is more rapid. It is thus more than ever necessary to watch and follow up those with whom the Medical Staff wish to keep in touch.

Much work has been made possible by the Dresden Assistance Committee, whose generosity is valued ; by grants from the Convalescent Fund and by use of the Almoner's small Samaritan Fund, one of whose chief supporters is Mrs. Paterson.

The year's statistics reveal the true progress in the work accomplished, for general assistance has been more than trebled; the number of home visits doubled; as also treatment arranged through other hospitals.

In the year 1884 Mr. George Sturge, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, executed a Deed of Trust conveying to St. Mary's Hospital £926 *Great Eastern Railway 5 per Cent. Preference Stock, representing one thousand pounds (£1,000), under the following conditions:—

“ In giving the sum of £1,000 for a Samaritan Fund for the above Hospital, Mr. Sturge gives it on the conditions that this Fund shall be kept entirely separate from the General Funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to, or applied for, such In-Patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment, clothing, or change of air.”

“ Mr. Sturge hopes that this Fund may be made known and that others may be induced to subscribe to it.”

confer upon the said Hospital the sum of five hundred
pounds (£500) to be paid to the said Hospital
and the same to be used for the purpose of the
General Fund of the Hospital, and that the same shall
be paid by instalments of £100 per annum for a
period of five years, the first instalment to be paid
on the 1st day of January 1835, and the balance
of the said sum of five hundred pounds to be paid
by instalments of £100 per annum on the 1st day
of January in each of the four following years.

And I do hereby declare that this fund shall be
used for the purpose of the General Fund of the
said Hospital and the same may be subject to
the same regulations as the other funds of the
said Hospital.

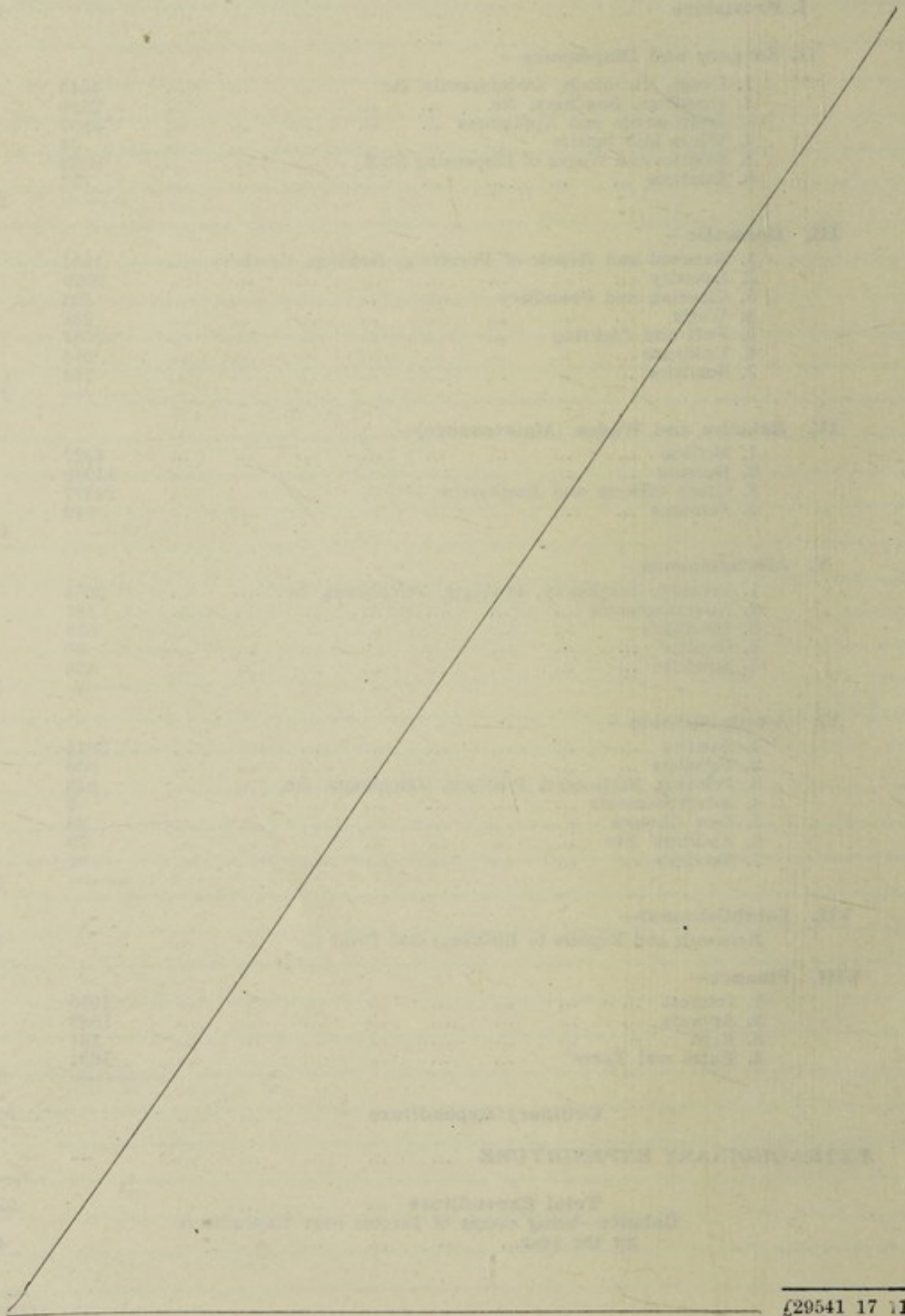

GOVERNMENT AND MANAGEMENT.

The mode of government is by a Board of Management, meeting Monthly, and by Standing Committees appointed by the Board of Management.

During the year the Trustees of the Hospital Convalescent Home, Parkwood, Swanley, Kent, have placed 13 beds at the disposal of the Hospital. The Trustees of the Dresden Fund, as a result, have been enabled to send 48 patients to this Home for a period of 19 days or more, and the Trustees gladly take this opportunity to record their grateful thanks to the authorities of the Hospital Convalescent Home for the great benefit which the use of these 13 beds has enabled the Trustees to confer on so many patients of the Hospital.

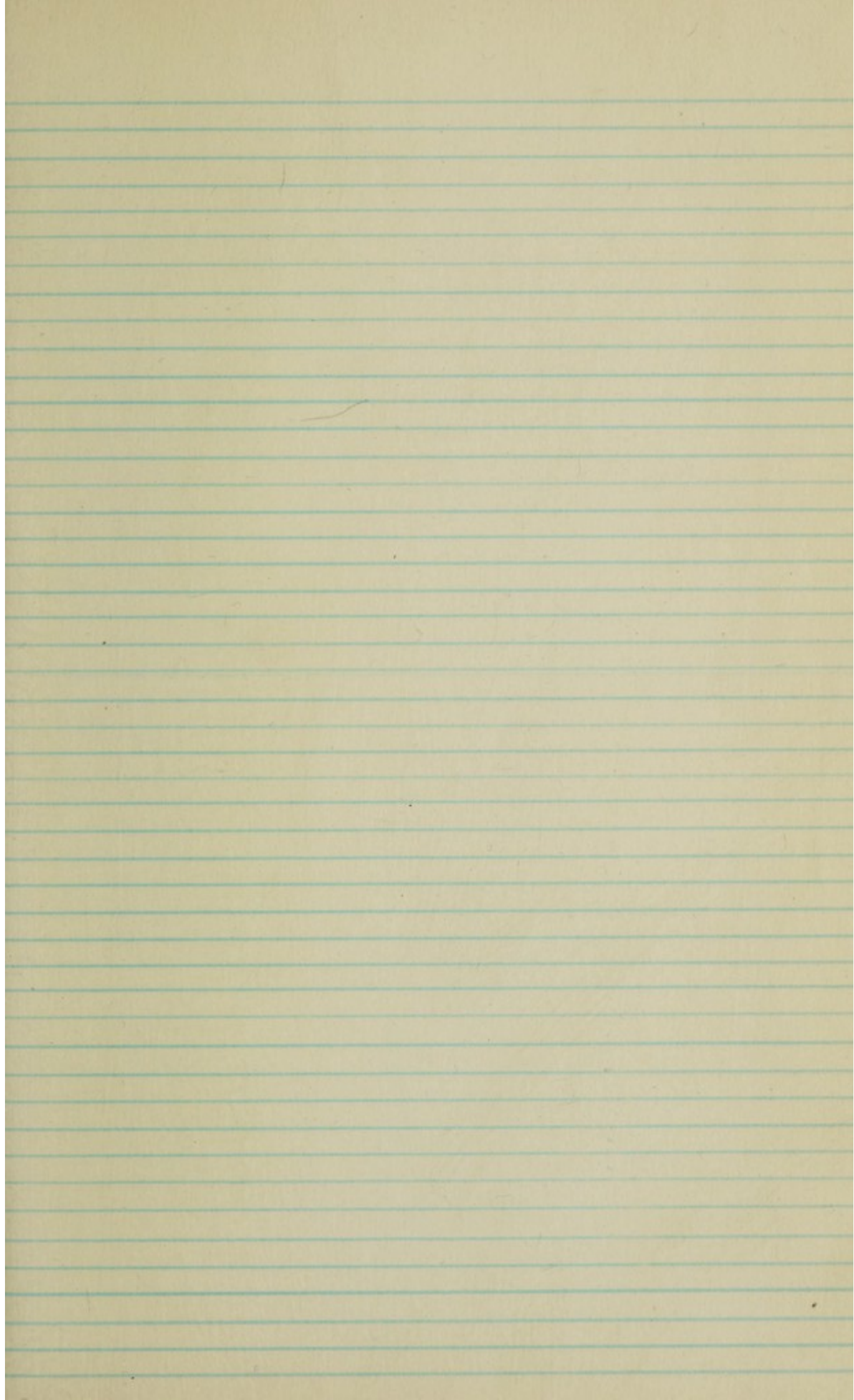

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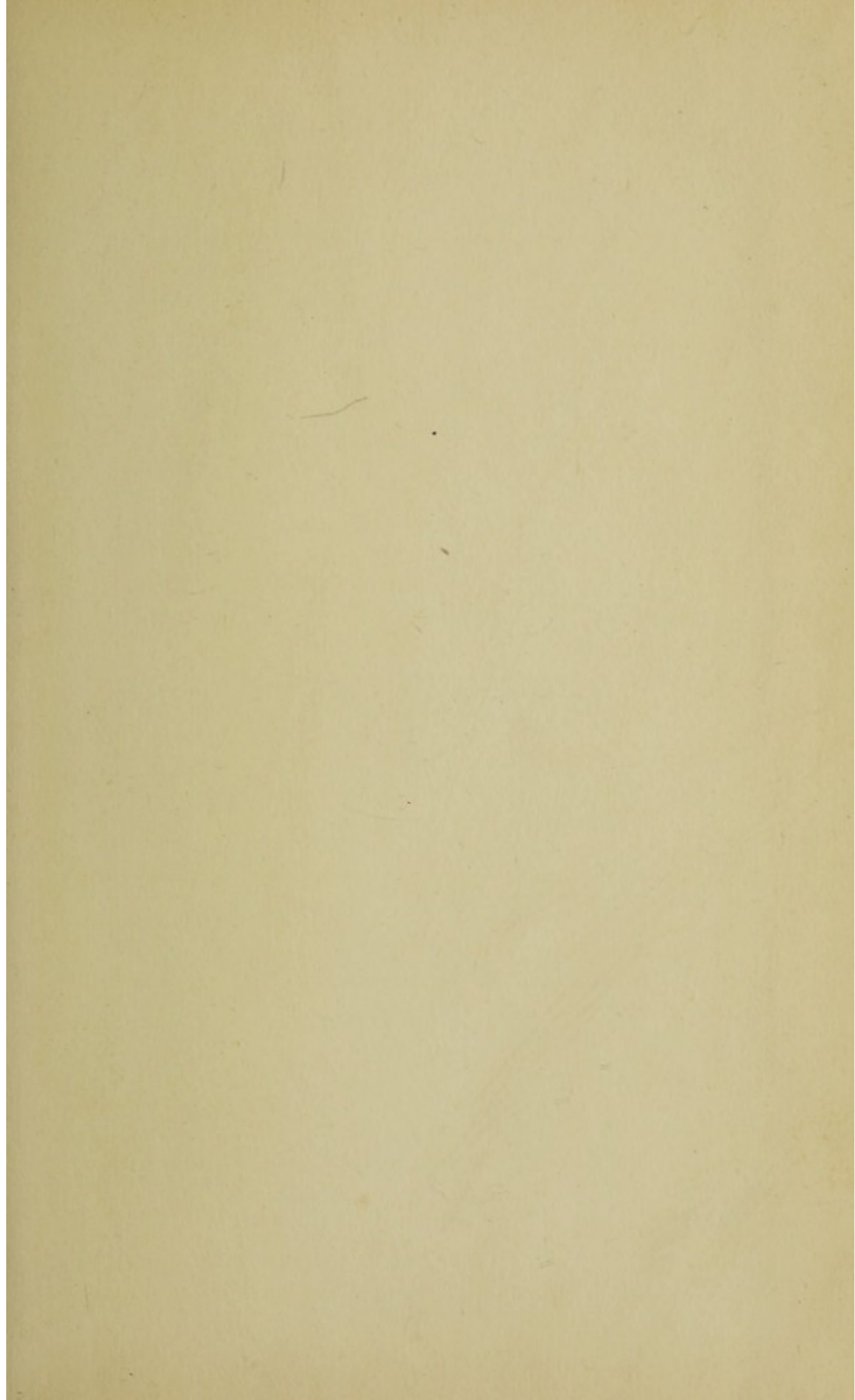
