



REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE.

In presenting the report for 1946 and reviewing the developments that have taken place in the year it is inevitable that regret must be felt that we are coming to the end of our service as the Management Committee of the Cottage Hospital. Last year when I wrote the National Health Bill was before Parliament ; now it is an Act : last year we surmised about the future. now we know something of the changes that are to be made, as well as the date when we and all other hospitals will be taken over. That date is now fixed for July 5th, 1948. Already the Regional Hospital Boards have been formed and there can be little criticism of there character as so many recognised authorities on hospital management have agreed to serve. Though the old Voluntary Hospital system comes to an end it is only fair to say that the new State Hospitals will be under the supervision of persons well qualified to see to the needs of the areas they administer. Many years must elapse before adequate hospital accommodation can be provided and in the interim the hospitals already in existence must be used with a co-ordination of their work and a unified administration. Though no scheme has yet been announced it is very likely that the various hospitals in the Furness District will have some form of local management, and we can only hope that those who have served the Ulverston and District Cottage Hospital may have part in its management in the future. Sorry as we are to see the end of a system that has worked well we are not blind to the advantages of a National Service, which, if it can but retain something of the humane and intimate personal touch of the Voluntary Hospital may be a great advance in the fight against disease and ill health. It will be free from the greatest problem of the Voluntary Hospital-lack of funds, but all will depend on the spirit in which its work is conceived.

Our project to make Wellwood, Bardsea, into a Maternity Home was rejected by the Minister of Health. He felt the cost was not justified and with the present shortage of building material and labour he could not agree, even to a modified plan. Some provision is being made by the Lancashire County Council at Oubas House, but the problem will remain acute and the district will still be inadequately served. We regret a project we entered with such hope has not matured.

Our work has been well maintained during the year and the results are as gratifying as ever. The new Matron, Miss Baillie, entered our service on May 13th, 1946, and has won for herself a high place in the regard of patients and staff. We again express our thanks to the Honorary Medical Staff, who have served us so faithfully and well, and to the visiting Specialists whose attendances have been of the highest value, and to the Nursing and Domestic Staff for their efficient and patient work. On July 31st, 1947, Dr. E. J. Boyd retires after being on the staff since he first came to Ulverston in 1919. He will be missed by many in Ulverston and District to whom he has been doctor and friend : nowhere will he be more missed than at the Cottage Hospital where his gifts as surgeon have meant so much to hundreds. We wish him and Mrs. Boyd a long and happy retirement. We assure him of our regret and tender our thanks for his long service, and for his help and sound advice to us as a Committee. It is impossible to particularise here all who have contributed to our funds during the year. Amonst the larger amounts received is £250 from Messrs. Vickers-Armstrongs Ltd; Miss Holmes £100; Mr. J. P Jackson from Hound Trails £146-14-2; League of Mercy £100; Old Scholars' Dramatic Society £36; Evening School Choral Class £25; Swarthmoor Hound Trails £26-6-0; Dale Street Girls School £22-8-6; Ulverston Grammar School £24; Outsiders Dramatic Society £29-4-6; We are most grateful to those who gave or directed these substantial amounts to the Cottage Hospital. The benefit of covenanted subscriptions is to be seen from the list later in the book. Had there not been a change in the administration we should have found this a useful means of increasing our income. The Contributory Scheme remains a very useful part of our income. We thank employers for their help as also the many collectors whose interest and help is appreciated.

The U.H.S.P. after a long and highly successful life has ceased to beyet another casualty amongst charitable institutions. Its final gift to the hospital was £536-6-7 and in addition their invested funds of £300 are being transferred to us. It is a great pity that something that contributed so much to the pleasure of the public as well as raising over £23,000 for the Cottage Hospital should cease to be. In pre-war days the Parade was an attraction that brought thousands to Ulverston. It was always an outstanding event, and the devotion of many gave its various features a precision and beauty we shall miss. Perhaps in future years it may be revived to serve some other good cause. We thank Mr. Clarke for his direction and his helpers for their support in recent years, knowing what effort was needed to maintain their contribution to hospital funds. Mr. Clarke especially has our gratitude for all he has done for the hospital.

As the National Health Bill is not coming into operation until July 5th, 1948, we must ask all who make payment through their wages or to the various collectors, to maintain their weekly payments until that date, if they wish to be covered against hospital liabilities. We would point out the large amount we have paid to other hospitals on their behalf. For the modest 3d, they have the service of any convenient hospital in England.

The Committee again express their thanks to the Honorary Auditors, Messrs R. F. Miller & Co., the Honorary Solicitor Mr. Frank Jackson and the Honorary Architect, Mr. Whitfield. The Linen League has again made substantial contributions and has the satisfaction not only of relieving the Management Committee of considerable expense, but of contributing to the comfort of the patients. The Linen League, too, has no future, but its past record is one to be proud of. It deserves and gets our sincere thanks.

The Annual Meeting will be held in the Council Chamber, Queen Street on Monday, 8th September, at 8 p.m. All subscribers and friends are cordially invited to be present.

Of these, it is interesting to note that no less than 480 were operative cases, and 114 cases of accident or extreme urgency. There were 5 cases remaining in Hospital on the 31st December, 1946. The Gross Expenditure for the year was £9348 10s. 3d. The average cost per Patient per week was £7 11s. 11¹/₂d.

Report of Surgical Staff.

There were 812 cases treated during the year, 480 of which were operative cases 218 being of a major character. The number of deaths was 15, giving a mortality of 1.85 as compared with 22 deaths in 1944, when the mortality was 3.03. Of the 15 deaths 6 occurred within 24 hours of admission. There were 136 maternity cases, of these 7 were operative and 10 emergency. Also 3122 out-patient attendances, of which 339 were minor operations.

The surgical Staff desires to place on record its appreciation of the very excellent work accomplished by the Matron and Nursing Staff.

The Secretary will be grateful for copies of Old Annual Reports of the Hospital issued 1874, 1876—1910, 1912, 1916.


