Subscriptions.

 $\mathbf{T}_{\mathrm{Medical}}^{\mathrm{HE}}$ admission of patients must depend on the sanction of the Medical Officers and the House Committee, and is subject to the accommodation of the Hospital. Infectious and incurable cases are not admitted.

Private patients admitted by special arrangements.

Application for the admission of patients not resident in Ilfracombe must be accompanied by a Medical Certificate of the case.

The Ex-Service Men having given to the Hospital £134 in War Loan, are entitled to benefit equivalent to the Interest of this sum.

A bed endowed by the late James Staples, Esq., is free to inhabitants of Combe Martin, under the usual rules of the Hospital.

By Clause 3 of the Charity Commissioners' Order, every donor of £21 and upwards at one time to the Funds of the Hospital shall be a Life Governor of the Hospital.

Form of Bequest.

I give to the Tyrrell Cottage Hospital, Ilfracombe, for the General Purposes of that Institution the sum of pounds free of duty, and the receipt of the Treasurer of the Hospital shall be a sufficient discharge for the same.

Annual Report.

Presented at the Annual General Meeting held on the 26th February, 1942.

THE General Committee have pleasure in presenting their twelfth Annual Report (for 1941) and the 71st in the history of the Hospital. The year has proved remarkable in many respects, all previous records of patients treated having been broken. On many occasions the Hospital was used to capacity.

Too much praise cannot be given to the Matron and her Nursing and Domestic Staffs for their devoted services and the manner in which they have coped with emergencies. Praise, on no stinted measure, is also due to members of the British Red Cross Detachment (D.64), under the leadership of their devoted Commandant, Miss Dean, and who throughout the year have given unstinted daily practical assistance, thus enabling the regular Nursing Staff to meet the situation.

The comparative Table of Statistics in this report illustrates the increases in treatment given over 1940, viz.: In-patients 661, with an aggregate number of days spent in Hospital of 7,554; Accidents treated 415; Surgical Operations 538; New Outpatients 1,430; Out-patients' attendances 8,408; X-Ray examinations 715. The average cost per in-patient per day works out as in 1940, at 8/10. These increases are, in the main, due to the presence of " strangers in our midst," but services to the local inhabitants have also been fully maintained.

Naturally, the ordinary Income and Expenditure figures reflect these increased services. On the Income Account (excluding the legacy of £468 7s. (shown in 1940) it will be seen that there is an increased income of no less than £1,238/17/6. Naturally, too (excluding the items totalling £453 under item VI. shown), Ordinary Expenditure shows an increase of £988/0/2 over 1940, reflecting the all-round rise in prices of commodities and conditions generally. The net result is a balance of Ordinary Income over Ordinary Expenditure of £91 4s., with £300 carried to Deposit Account.

Your Committee, with these figures before them, believe it may be claimed that under prevailing conditions the Hospital has been economically run. It will also be appreciated that individual items of expenditure are not, in all cases, this year comparative. The Extraordinary Account reveals that all expenditure on the third section of the Building Scheme has now been met, also A.R.P. requirements. Grants towards the latter were made by the Government Department concerned. The Income shows one Legacy of £25 received from Mr. C. Shapland, a valued friend of the Hospital for many years ; a grant from a performance by the Central Clearing House of £8/18/11; also £30 from the Berrynarbor Amateur Dramatic Society, which sum has been invested in 3% Defence Bonds : £25 14s., subscribed by scholars of all schools in Ilfracombe and district; and an Extension Appeal of £32/11/11, details of which will be found in a Summary in this Report. The net result being a credit balance of £396/17/2.

Other Summaries reveal continued generous Subscriptions and Donations, Church Collections from all denominations, and funds raised by entertainments, etc.. and gifts in kind; also, this year, a new source of income, viz., National Savings Certificates and 3% Defence Bonds. To all who have so helped, most grateful thanks are recorded.

The following tried friends continue to help in their respective spheres, viz.: Mrs. du Santoy Newby (Alexandra Rose Day); Miss Elms (Collections by Exhibition of Model); Misses Scanes (Mending and repairing linen); Mrs. Hollingshead (Linen Guild) Mr. Eric Hutchings (Hospital Saturday Fund); Misses Powell (Preparation of Dressings); Mr. H. L. Michelmore, of Exeter (Devon Queen Victoria & King Edward Memorial Funds); The Exeter & Western Counties Hospital Aid Society (generous donation of £125); Miss Lancaster, of Woolacombe (entertainments). Regretfully, other names have to be omitted on account of space.

It will be seen that the Hospital benefited greatly, indirectly, as the result of "Warship Week," due to the sympathetic consideration by the Committee of that effort, under the chairmanship of Mr. F. G. Reed, and Mr. W. J. Ellis and Mrs. Robins, joint Secretaries.

A red-letter day in the Hospital's history took place in November, when a Bed was named by the Colonel of an Army Unit commemorating the subscriptions to the Hospital from Entertainments Section of that unit. The substantial financial assistance given (additional to financial help given in 1940) is gratefully recorded and appears in the Summaries referred to. The Colonel and members of the unit were afterwards shown over the Hospital, and expressed pleasure at the Hospital amenities.

The Committee regretfully record the passing during the year of the Rev. Reginald Churchill and Mr. C. J. Copner, who both gave many years of devoted service on the Committee of the Hospital.

Thanks are recorded to Mr. E. J. Morris for again voluntarily auditing the accounts. Extracts from letters of grateful patients will be read with interest; many of the items recorded as donations are their gifts.

In conclusion, the Committee earnestly appeal for continued contributions and increased financial support, realizing that much of the support given during 1941 cannot be recurring. The necessity, therefore, to husband available resources, first for the maintenance of a competent and adequate Nursing Staff in view of the future calls on the Hospital services that may be expected under conditions prevailing, and also having regard to post-war conditions, when leeway will have to be made up in maintenance of buildings and equipment, the need of a reserve is therefore apparent. They believe this appeal will not fall on deaf ears.

GIFTS IN KIND.

Whilst it is not possible for us to give a detailed list of the donors of General Equipment, Vegetables, Fruit and Flowers, Books, Magazines, Toys, Comforts, etc., we wish to assure all who have in this way contributed that such help is most warmly appreciated.
