



# Twenty-Sixth Annual Report

#### of the

# Committee of Management.

A satisfactory report can be submitted of the past year's work, no serious emergency having arisen in the area served, and the more settled industrial conditions leading to a substantial improvement in the Hospital funds.

The number of patients treated during the year was less than in 1926, being 122 as against 159, a return to the level that obtained several years ago. The reduction of "patients' days" was not quite proportionate, the number being 2403 in comparison with 2559. The number of operations (major and minor) remained constant, and several splendid cures and recoveries were effected, reflecting great credit upon the skill and care of the Medical Officers and Nursing Staff. As the customary statistical and comparative statements are included in the published Report further detailed reference here is unnecessary.

The revenue of the Hospital has recovered in a very pleasing manner from the previous year's low level, which of course was due entirely to trade dislocation. This upset has reacted upon subscriptions to some extent, during last year, but Workmen's Contributions have been restored to a normal level, and it is noteworthy to record that £578-12-6 has been received from this source. Patients' payments show an increase of £37-19-6 at £59-8-6 and Entertainments have produced just slightly less at £50-17-8. The continued and increasing interest shown in the Hospital by the promoters of entertainments and organizers of the Football competitions, and in

many other ways is fully appreciated by the Committee. Particularly is this the case with regard to the Ladies who so willingly and successfully undertake the House to House Collection, which added last year £125-11-9 to the Hospital income. The revenue altogether has surpassed the £1,000 level, which is necessary to maintain the Hospital under modern circumstances.

Special expenditure was incurred in several departments in 1926, particularly in furnishing, so that in comparison it has been possible to work at a reduced cost during the past year.

Outlay upon provisions shows only a slight variation, and the average cost per day was in fact somewhat increased at 21.7d. as against 21.2d. The total average cost per day works out at 92.9d. whereas last year it was 98.5d. Apart from the fixture of a modern Kitchen Range in place of the old one that had served from the building of the Hospital, and the painting of the womens' Ward and the Staff Dining Room, no special expenditure was incurred. The total cost of maintenance amounted to £930-6-9 thus admitting of a balance of £85-18-8 being carried to Legacy and Suspense Account. It has to be borne in mind, however, that £425-0-8 was taken from that fund in the previous year.

During the year a Legacy of £1000 was received under the Will of the late Mrs Sarah Wood for the endowment of a bed to be designated "The Robert and Sarah Ismay Wood Bed." This sum has been invested through the Charity Commissioners in the purchase of £1409-4-6 India 3½ per cent Stock.

At the last Annual Meeting Mr Frederick Kelly resigned office as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, and Mr Faulder G. Gaskarth was appointed to succeed him. Mr Kelly who had fostered the interests of the Hospital from its inception with signal ability and devotion was tendered a vote of thanks for his services and asked to accept the office of Vice-President as a token of appreciation, and consented.

The present Matron, Miss Campbell, only entered upon her duties at the end of the year. Complete satisfaction has been uniformly expressed by patients with the care and attention shown by Doctors and Nurses and grateful thanks are also tendered to them by the Committee.

#### RULES AND REGULATIONS.

- The government and control of the Hospital and Staff shall be vested in a Committee constituted as hereinafter provided, called the Committee of Management.
- 2 The expenses of the Hospital shall be defrayed by interest on invested funds, donations, subscriptions, and by such payments by the patients as may be determined from time to time.
- 3 An Annual General Meeting of subscribers shall be held in the month of February, at such time and place as may be fixed by the Committee of Management, and 14 days before the meeting, notice thereof shall be given by advertisement in a local newspaper circulating in the County of Cumberland.
- 4 The following shall be entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting, namely:
  - a Donors of £10 and upwards.
  - b Annual subscribers whose subscriptions for the past year have been paid.
  - c The persons forwarding any annual Church, or other collection, or such person as may be named as representative in the letter covering such contributions.
  - d The representative of any group of employees making a regular levy or contribution in aid of the maintenance fund.
- 5 At the Annual General Meeting a report shall be presented by the Committee together with statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the past year; and the Officers and the Committee of Management and a Ladies' Visiting Committee, and also an Auditor shall be appointed for the ensuing year.
  - 6 The Committee of Management shall be constituted as follows :
    - a A President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and a Secretary, and ten other persons to be elected at the Annual General Meeting.
    - b The Medical practitioners within the Petty Sessional Division of Maryport.
    - c One person to be elected by each group of employees numbering at least fifty, regularly contributing to the funds of the Hospital.
- 7 The Committee of Management shall meet quarterly for the transaction of business. Other Meetings shall be convened by the Secretary when so directed by the Executive Committee or when deemed necessary by the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretary, or any two of them. Five members shall be a quorum.
- 8 The Annual General Meeting shall appoint a Committee of twelve ladies to act as visitors.
- 9 The Committee of Management shall at the first meeting after its constitution elect an Executive Committee to meet monthly or when necessary. The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretary, and seven other members of the Committee of Management; three to be a quorum.

- tions for admission of patients, pass bills for payment, and transact ordinary business and also all other business which may be delegated to such Committee by the Committee of Management.
- The Committee of Management shall appoint or dismiss the Matron, and fix the remuneration for her services. The Executive Committee shall have power to appoint, dismiss, and fix the remuneration of all other paid servants of the Hospital.
- applicant for admission to the Hospital must obtain a letter of recommendation from a subscriber to the funds and must also submit therewith a certificate from the applicant's medical attendant. The decision of the Executive Committee on any application shall be final.
- Donors of £10 or upwards to the funds, and Annual Subscribers of £1 is. shall each be supplied annually with one form of recommendation for admission of patients. Annual subscribers of £3 3s. shall each be supplied with two such forms, and one additional form shall be supplied for every two guineas subscribed beyond £3 3s.

This rule shall apply to the representative of each group of employees and also to the person forwarding any annual collection taken in aid of the funds.

In the event of the whole of the beds not being in use at the time, subscribers may, at the discretion of the Executive Committee be allowed to recommend the admission of additional patients.

- 14 The Executive Committee may in its discretion admit patients other than those recommended in accordance with the preceding Rule.
- 15 Patients may be admitted any day on presentation of the recommendation of a subscriber, and the necessary certificate of the Medical Attendant.
- 16 Patients shall have the utmost religious liberty, and may be visited by any minister of religion when the patient so desires, subject, however, as to hours and conditions to any Bye-laws in force with relation to visitors.
- 17 Every requisite (except personal clothing) including medicine will be provided in the Hospital. Patients may not receive any food or drink from any other source. Any patient entering a public house while an inmate of the Hospital shall be subject to instant dismissal.
- 18 Except in cases of urgency, every patient admitted shall be provided with decent clothing, and proper change of linen.
- 19 All cases in the Hospital shall be reported at the monthly meeting of the Executive Committee. Patients shall be discharged on the expiration of one month after admission, unless the Medical Attendant shall certify that there is a probability of cure or considerable relief.

No patient shall remain in the Hospital for more than two calendar months without the special leave of the Executive Committee.

20 A patient who is not a subscriber to the funds of the Hospital, or who is not the wife or the child of a subscriber, will be required to make a contribution to the funds in accordance with his or her means, the amount in each case to be fixed by the Executive Committee.

Workmen or their families who contribute through their works or

sick clubs shall be treated as subscribers.

- 21 Applicants in receipt of or entitled to parochial relief shall be admitted on payment by the Guardians.
  - 22 Patients shall be attended by their own Medical Attendants.

The Medical Practitioners in Maryport will take duty for one week each in turn as Casualty Medical Officer for the Hospital for cases of emergency.

- 23 No person suffering from Mania, Epilepsy, or any incurable or infectious or contagious disease, shall be admitted to the Hospital.
- 24 The Committee of Management shall have power to make such Bye-laws for the Management of the Hospital as may be deemed requisite.
- 25 A book shall be kept at the Hospital open at all times to the inspection and use of subscribers, patients, and visitors, in which complaints may be entered. The book shall be submitted to the Executive Committe at each meeting, and the Committee shall cause enquiry to be made as to each complaint noted therein.
- 26 The Annual Report and Statement of Accounts shall be printed and a copy be furnished to each Subscriber after the Annual General Meeting.
- 27 In the event of any vacancy in the Committee, or among the Officers of the Hospital, arising from death, resignation, or otherwise, the Committee of Management shall be empowered to fill up such vacancy and the person so appointed shall hold office until the next Annual General Meeting.
- 28 The Committee of Management may give directions for the investment of any of the funds not needful for the immediate maintenance of the Hospital.
- 29 All questions submitted to the Annual General Meeting, or to a meeting of any Committee, shall be decided by a show of hands, or otherwise as directed by the meeting, and the Chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote.
- 30 The foregoing rules may be altered, rescinded, or added to at any General Meeting, provided that notice of the proposed alteration or addition shall have been given in writing to the Secretary not less than one week prior to such meeting.

Workmen who are regular contributors through the works and also members of their families are admitted without further payment. Individual workmen can have similar privileges on payment in advance of 5s per annum.

Paying patients are charged at the rate of 6s per day if living within the hospital area, or 9s per day if living outside the area. For children under 12 years, one-half the above rates are charged.

It is necessary to obtain an admission form for each patient. Workmen contributing at Works can secure a form on application where employed. Paying patients must obtain the necessary form from the Honorary Secretary.
