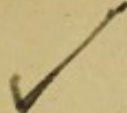

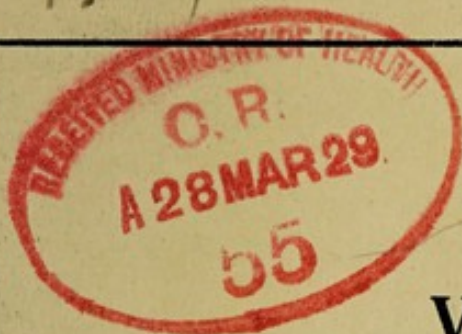

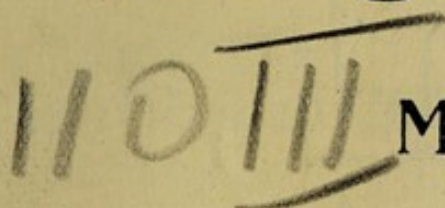

Twenty-Seventh Annual Report

of the

Committee of Management.

As shown in the summary of cases given later in this Report, the number of patients admitted to Hospital during the past year was 115, including patients temporarily discharged and re-admitted. Five patients were under indoor treatment at the beginning of 1928, and there were four in Hospital at the end of the year. The average length of stay per patient was 24 days and the total number of 'patients' days' was 2,800, the average daily occupation of beds being 7.65 per day. Additionally there has always been a fair amount of treatment of out-patients and a record kept during the months October to December showed that 152 attendances were made by out-patients at the Hospital for dressings and massage. One birth took place in Hospital during the year, and two deaths occurred. In the summary the item "number of operations" has been altered to read "number of patients operated upon" as in some cases more than one operation has to be performed upon the same patient. During the year an arrangement was made with the Workington Infirmary whereby patients of the working class can obtain the benefit of X Ray examination at a reasonable cost to be borne by this Hospital, and the favour extended by our neighbours should prove of considerable value. For some years an annual subscription has been paid to the Silloth

Convalescent Home and advantage was taken of the privilege thus obtained to send a working class patient there during convalescence.

The general income of the Hospital has been greater than in 1927, the receipts passed to Maintenance Account being £1047 14 4 as against £1016 5 5. Only under one heading has there been an outstanding decrease, but that, regrettably, from the vital source of Workmens' Contributions, only £461 6 3 having been received herefrom in the past year, in comparison with £578 12 6 in 1927. The closing of the Risehow Colliery has been and will be seriously felt, as during the past five years a total sum of £886 6 1 has been received from the workmen employed there. In the past year Workmens' Contributions from all Colliery workers were reduced from £508 9 7 to £394 9 6, and anxiety is caused by the distressed condition of this staple industry.

The grant by the Maryport Operatic Society of £108 4 6, being 25 per cent of the gross takings from the 1928 production "The Waltz Dream" came very opportunely and has been the means of maintaining the revenue of the year. Altogether the public interest and support has been very gratifying, the "House to House Collection" producing as good results as in previous years notwithstanding untoward circumstances.

During the year a Legacy of £100 was received under the will of the late Mr. Wilfred Irwin to be applied to the general upkeep of the Hospital. The Flimby Girls' Friendly Society (St. Nicholas Branch) very kindly presented a Cot, a gift that is much appreciated.

The expenditure of the past year has been greatly above normal level as it was felt that the time had come for necessary alterations to be made to admit of better bedroom accommodation for both nursing and domestic staffs, and that accomplished, to overhaul and renovate the fabric and paintwork of the Hospital. The total cost of the improvements thus effected was £345 9 10, a special outlay that has restored the Hospital to good condition.

The general cost of working has been somewhat higher, outlay upon provisions being 23.5d. per patient per day as against 21.7d. but the total average cost is slightly lower at 90.25d. per day as compared with 92.9d.

The income from Investments and Legacy for the year passed to Legacy and Suspense Account was £273 10 5 and from this Account at the end of the year £351 4 3 has had to be transferred to the Maintenance Account, leaving a balance in hand of £519 10 5. The Invested Funds of the Hospital remain unchanged.

The gratitude of the Committee is hereby expressed to the Medical Officers, the Matron, the Nursing and Domestic Staffs and to all who have so liberally given of their time, services, and substance for the good of the Hospital.

NOTANDA.

The business of the Hospital is conducted by a Committee of Management, constituted as follows:—The President, Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, the Honorary Secretary, ten persons elected by the Annual Meeting, the Medical Practitioners, and one person elected by each group of 50 or more employees who regularly contribute to the funds.

The following are entitled to attend the Annual Meeting, viz:—Donors of £10 and upwards, annual subscribers for the preceding year, the persons forwarding any church collection or proceeds of an entertainment, the representative of any group of employees making a regular levy on behalf of the funds.

Annual subscribers of £1 is. are supplied with a form of recommendation for the admission of patients and one additional form for each two guineas beyond the first guinea.

Workmen who are regular contributors through the works and also members of their families are admitted without further payment. Individual workmen can have similar privileges on payment in advance of 5/- per annum.

Paying patients are charged at the rate of 6/- per day if living within the hospital area, or 9/- per day if living outside the area. For children under 12 years, one-half the above rates are charged.

It is necessary to obtain an admission form for each patient. Workmen contributing at Works can secure same on application where employed. Paying patients must obtain the necessary Form from the Honorary Secretary.
