






NURSES' HOME - MAIN BUILDING - THOMPSON PATHOLOGICAL BUILDING





In Memoriam

MARGARET OLIVIA SAGE

Died November 4, 1918

On the fourth day of November, 1918, Margaret Olivia Sage, Honorary Vice-President of this Hospital, passed to her rest. Her connection with the Woman's Hospital dates from 1870, when her name first appears in the list of Supervisors. She served in this capacity until 1886, when she became a member of the Board of Governors, was elected in 1888 Chairman of the Assistant Board and passed thereafter to the office of Second Vice-President and later to that of Honorary Vice-President, which she held at the time of her death.

This record, covering a period of forty-eight years, goes far to show the active interest she ever manifested in the work and welfare of the Hospital, an interest which never flagged while she lived, although in later years she was unable to give personal and active attendance. With what lavish generosity she finally remembered us is known of all men.


This Board gratefully acknowledges its deep indebtedness to Mrs. Sage for her many benefits, and desires to give full expression thereto upon its minutes, but feels that such action would be inadequate if it did not pay tribute to the woman as well as to the benefactress.


The fundamental trait of Mrs. Sage's character was benevolence in the highest sense of the word, benevolence founded upon her deep and abiding Christian faith. The mistress of a colossal fortune, she expended, so to speak, nothing in the gratification of her personal desires, her one idea and recompense was in its employment in ways productive of the greatest good to mankind, in the diffusion of knowledge, the advancement of education and the relief of suffering.

By no means given to blind indiscriminate charity, she shows in the final list of her beneficiaries with what excellent judgment she selected the best channels for the distribution of her wealth and how wisely she assigned to each an appropriate share. How keen was the pleasure she derived from the knowledge that practical results waited upon her generosity, appears from her own words in a little address she made in this Hospital, epitomizing what its work had already accomplished, "A new light has shone forth in the eyes of thousands of women and thousands of homes have been gladdened with the joy of restoration to health and happiness."

Her ear was ever open to appeals for aid and never, if the object was found deserving, was that aid refused. Such was her life that her name became a synonym for help to the needy and assistance to every worthy charity.

To her associates on this Board she endeared herself by her unfailing courtesy and kindly sympathy and her memory will be cherished by them in common with all who knew her as a precious possession.





THATCHER M. ADAMS

Died May 10, 1919

Thatcher M. Adams was elected a Governor of the Woman's Hospital during the year 1910 and in that capacity continued until his demise. As a member of the various Committees and particularly as Chairman of its Law Committee, the Hospital received the benefit of the active attention and advisory counsel which Mr. Adams was so conspicuously qualified to give. He always took a keen and devoted interest in any subject pertaining to the welfare of the Hospital.

The members of this Board desire to extend deepest sympathy to Mr. Adams' family, and to record appreciation of him as a cordial friend, counsellor and associate.

In Memoriam

THOMAS ADDIS EMMET, M. D.

Attending Surgeon, 1862-1900

Died March 1st, 1919

The Board of Governors of the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York have learned with deep regret of the death of Doctor Thomas Addis Emmet.

The history of the Woman's Hospital is intimately associated with the life and labors of Doctor Emmet and the Governing Board desires to place on record their full recognition of his sterling integrity and of his monumental work during the first half century of the Hospital's existence.

His high sense of integrity, together with his unremitting labors as a surgeon and as a teacher, carried the name of the Woman's Hospital to the entire surgical world.

Doctor Emmet's connection with the Hospital commenced one year after the opening of its doors and continued for forty-four years. During this long period of activity he gave to the Hospital the full and undivided strength of his mind and skill, and has left for all time an indelible imprint of his teaching and of his earnestness of purpose. The foundation of the present Hospital cannot be stronger than the principles which Doctor Emmet has taught and the superstructure, with all its utility and elegance, must always remain a memorial to his life-work and teaching.

As a Surgeon, as the Teacher, as the Medical Author, as the Litterateur, and as the Friend, we honor his memory, and record in the archives of the Hospital this recognition of his life's labors.

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THE SIXTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

OF THE

WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

The Board of Governors of the Woman's Hospital presents the following report for the year ending September 30, 1919.

It is a great satisfaction to be able to report that the revised and more centralized organization of the Surgical Staff introduced into the Hospital a little over a year ago by the Chief Surgeon, Dr. George Gray Ward, Jr., to whose report attention is especially called, is proving a success. Under this System the procedure in the care of patients has been simplified and standardized, and the responsibility centralized as much as possible, resulting in greater efficiency. The Follow-Up System has been rendered more efficient. It is now possible to keep in touch with a greater number of patients after they have returned to their respective homes, to continue to give them surgical advice when needed, and thus to assure them as far as possible favorable results of their surgical treatment in the Hospital.

Dr. E. L'H. McGinnis, who as Electro-Therapeutist served the Hospital faithfully for thirty-three years, and whose connection with the Hospital began as early as 1884, when he was appointed to the House Staff, has resigned. The Board of Governors wish to record here their appreciation of Dr. McGinnis' long and faithful services and of his unwavering loyalty to the interests of the Hospital.

A Special Clinic of Gastro-Enterology has been added to the Electro-Therapeutical Department and has been placed in charge of Dr. Dudley Roberts.

The statement immediately following page 34, of the report of the Superintendent, shows the comparative statistics of patients treated during the years ending Sept. 30, 1919 and 1918. From this statement it will be noted that 3,102 women and 887 babies were cared for in the wards and private rooms of the Hospital, an average of 146 women and 35 babies, or a total average of 181 patients per day. 787, or about $35\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the patients cared for in the Hospital wards were unable to pay for treatment and were therefore treated free. In the Obstetrical Department there were 876 births, an increase of 63 over the previous year.

A considerable increase will be noticed on the statement in the average cost per patient per day, due to the increased costs of material and supplies, and to numerous increases in rates of pay of employees which it was necessary to grant during the year in order to meet the higher costs of living. The somewhat more thorough and elaborate treatment of patients, due to improved methods during the past few years, is also partly responsible for increased costs of Hospital care.

In the Out-Patient Department it will be noted that during the

year ending Sept. 30, 1919, 7,915 patients made 16,997 visits, an average of 55 visits per day.

In the Hospital and Out-Patient Department 11,904 patients, or an average of 236 patients per day were treated.

The report of the Social Service Department plainly shows that this department is fast becoming an important and efficient part of the Hospital's work. It has proved of particular value in connection with the Follow-Up supervision of patients who have been cared for in the Hospital, and also in connection with the Pre-Natal care of women.

During the past year the difficulties incurred in obtaining supplies, engaging employees and having necessary repairs made to buildings and machinery have been much greater than under normal conditions, but the Hospital has, nevertheless, been able to render its full service for the benefit of the public.

Your particular attention is called to the Treasurer's report. Page 21, of this report, shows a concise statement of what caused the large deficit of \$131,790.50 for the year. While current expenses increased about \$87,000, or 26% over the previous year, the earnings at the Hospital from patients increased only about \$41,000, or 17%. The Treasurer's report emphasizes the need of larger endowment funds and of generous donations from the friends of the Hospital who are interested in having its work performed in a proper and efficient manner.

It is impossible to express adequately the appreciation of the Board for the many kindnesses received by the Hospital from Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson. So quietly does Mrs. Thompson bestow her kindnesses that few besides the Board of Governors realize how much the Hospital owes to her generosity. The Board is sincere in its gratitude.

During the year the Hospital has lost by death two of its Governors, Mrs. Russell Sage and Thatcher M. Adams. Mrs. Sage was elected to the Assistant Board in 1870 and to the Board of Governors in 1886. In 1903 she resigned from the Board, but her interest in the Hospital and in the work for which the Hospital stands caused her in 1915 again to accept an election to the Board and to include the Hospital among the many charities named as beneficiaries under her will.

Mr. Adams was elected to the Board of Governors in 1910. During the ensuing years he was a regular attendant at the meetings of the Board and of the Executive Committee. He performed conscientiously his duties as Trustee and acted with marked ability as Chairman of the Committee on Law.

By the deaths of these two Governors the Hospital has lost two friends whose places it will be difficult to fill.

The Board of Governors desires to acknowledge its appreciation of the faithful and efficient service rendered by the members of the Surgical and Executive Departments during the trying year just closed.

Patients' Relief Fund. This Fund is used to meet the cost of supplies or relief furnished to needy patients.

H. Smith Periodical Fund. This Fund is used to provide periodicals for the wards of the Hospital.

Cheer Fund. This fund is used to provide cheer for patients, staff, nurses and employees.





REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit my report for the year ending September 30th, 1919.

We started this fiscal year handicapped by a great shortage of the various people necessary for the proper administration of an active hospital. Our forces were much depleted by the resignation of many of our Supervisors and others who left for foreign service, or war work in this country. Several nurses remained in the hospital from a strong sense of duty rather than desire. It was a serious time and additional cause for anxiety was the influenza epidemic which crept into our midst and incapacitated many, especially the nurses.

The problem of labor, bad then, is much worse at the present time, and male help is easier to find than female, but costly and generally inefficient. In all departments of the hospital substantial additions to salaries and wages had to be considered and, when deemed advisable, granted. These advances have been made with alarming frequency, and, with the costliness of properly maintaining the hospital and doing the best possible for the patients, have made a serious deficit for the year.

The laundry has been overworked, the machinery was not always well handled by the inferior labor we were obliged to employ, and a great deal of repairing and replacing of worn out parts had to be done. The growth of the hospital has placed a great strain on this department. A new small Troy washer was installed, which has been satisfactory but inadequate to meet our needs.

To keep the entire hospital in good repair has been difficult. In this we have had very generous help from Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, who, at her own expense, had one entire building repaired and painted and two clinic floors of seven large rooms and several ante-rooms taken up and replaced with "terrazza." Extensive necessarily but quite expensive changes in new equipment were made on the first floor of the clinic.

The renovation of the nurses' home during the summer was costly and new rugs and rocking chairs were purchased to make it more comfortable. All the steam pipes in the rooms of this home were covered with asbestos.

A model utensil room has been fitted up with all necessary sterilizing equipment and we hope to fit up the others in the same way.

Bookcases were built on the seventh floor of the main building to accommodate the overflow of histories from the record room.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The result of the surgical work of the hospital has been highly commendable. The most significant feature of the Social Service Department has been the establishing of the pre-natal work. Its educational influence in the community is far-reaching, and its assistance to the administration of the hospital is of great value.

Through the generosity of Mrs. Cecila Taussig we were able to establish the nucleus of a fund for an endowed room for sick nurses of the Woman's Hospital. We are all grateful to Mrs. Taussig for her generous contribution of \$5,000 and we hope the coming year will see additional contributions or the total amount of the necessary \$25,000 subscribed.


Materials have been costly, but much help has been derived from the Hospital Bureau of Standards and Supplies, which has proved most advantageous.







REPORT OF THE CHIEF SURGEON OF THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present the Annual Report of the Surgical Department of the Hospital, as follows: During the past year the work of reorganization of the Surgical Department has been continued and substantial progress has been made on the lines indicated in my Report of last year. Gratifying results are already manifest as shown by the Follow-Up System and the smooth running of the service.

The importance of this work is emphasized by the position given to the subject of Hospital Standardization at the recent meeting in New York of the American College of Surgeons, when an entire day was devoted to its consideration, and the Woman's Hospital was one of four selected from the United States and Canada as a conspicuous example to demonstrate what it has already accomplished in this direction.

The Minimum Standard for Hospital efficiency as required by the American College of Surgeons has been complied with in all respects, and the Woman's Hospital is on the approved list.

During the year our efforts have been directed towards insuring the more thorough pre-operative study of our patients and definite requirements to accomplish this have been instituted.

STAFF CONFERENCES.

The weekly Staff Conferences, where a careful study of our end results is made, have proved most valuable and instructive, and it has been encouraging to note the increasing number of the Medical profession who avail themselves of the opportunity to be present. The average attendance of the Staff and visitors is 27.

During the last six months period the data taken from the clinical records of the Gynecological Department and brought before the Staff for review, as disclosed in the monthly follow-up analysis which we require of each Attending Surgeon, showed that the percentages in our operative cases were as follows: Successful, 801-3%; partially successful, 16%, and failures, 32-3%. In a period of nine months, in 1,388 operations in both clean and pus cases, we obtained $951/_{2}\%$ of primary union in the healing of wounds. The mortality for all cases was 1.9%.

I think I may say that it is the unanimous opinion of the Staff that these Conferences are of inestimable value and profit to all concerned and there can be no question but that they have produced **a** marked effect in improving the pre and post-operative study of our patients with the consequent benefit to them. No man on the Staff

can afford to have careless work shown up in the strong light of the publicity and criticism of such conferences, and no man can object to a system which applies with equal force to every operator in the Hospital. The interest shown in the meetings by the Staff is very great.

TEACHING.

The teaching of the undergraduate students of the Cornell University Medical College has been continued in all the departments of the Hospital throughout the college year and has proved so valuable that the Faculty have increased the allotted time devoted to this subject in the curriculum.

SURGICAL REPORT.

During the year the Annual Surgical Report, which is composed of the scientific contributions of the Staff, made from studies in the service of the Hospital, has been published and copies sent to all the leading medical libraries and colleges and to those interested in Gynecology and Obstetrics. This Report contains twenty monographs contributed by the Staff, and three theses by students of the Senior Class of Cornell Medical College as part of their work at the Hospital.

LIBRARY.

The Surgical Library, which has been comfortably furnished and equipped through the kindness of the Ladies of the Board of Governors, has proved a valuable and an essential aid in the scientific studies of the Staff and the students.

RADIUM.

The Hospital is to be congratulated in having acquired some 230 milligrams of Radium. Since the Radium was received in February, 1919, it has been employed in 106 cases. It has been in constantly increasing use in the treatment of inoperable cases of cancer, prolonging life and giving months of relief from suffering. Many patients have been cured by the use of the Radium who otherwise would have had to submit to serious mutilating operations.

The Reports of the several Departments for the year ending September 30, 1919, show the work done by the Hospital as follows:

GYNECOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

There were admitted during the year 1,987 patients. There were 1,795 patients operated upon with a mortality of 2%.

OBSTETRICAL DEPARTMENT

There were 865 confinements and 876 babies born with a mortality for the mothers of .9 per cent, and for the babies (living and stillbirths) of 5.5 per cent.

The total number of women and babies cared for in both Gynecological and Obstetrical Departments during the year was 3,989. This was only 33 patients less than last year, although the epidemic of Influenza made it necessary to curtail the admissions for a considerable period of time.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.

The total number of patients treated in the Gynecological, Obstetrical, Urological and Electro-Therapeutic Clinics was 7,915, making 16,997 visits.

PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

Through the generosity of Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson the Lecture Room and Pathological Museum has been entirely rearranged and repainted and a new lighting system has been installed, which has greatly facilitated the work of the Staff Conferences and the teaching. It is now possible to exhibit properly the many valuable specimens in the Museum. During the year interesting lectures and demonstrations on the marvelous properties of Radium have been given to us by Dr. Robert Abbe, of our Consulting Staff, and Dr. Charles H. Viol, Physicist to the Radium Chemical Co., of Pittsburgh.

The teaching activities of the Pathological Department have been greatly increased. A course of lectures on Gynecological Pathology with microscopical demonstrations is given to the House Staff and is repeated every six months, so that every House Officer will have the opportunity to attend. The Cornell students also receive instruction in the laboratory throughout the year.

ELECTRO-THERAPEUTIC DEPARTMENT.

The work of this Department, which under the reorganization consists of the Clinics of Urology, Gastro-Enterology and Radio-therapy, has been satisfactorily carried on in spite of the alterations which have been in progress. The establishment of these Clinics has necessitated the installation of a complete new X-Ray equipment and Fluoroscopic apparatus. This has required extensive changes and rearrangement of the rooms on the first floor of the Thompson Pavilion which are devoted to this purpose, and the work has been done most satisfactorily. A full time technician is now employed in this Department.

UROLOGICAL CLINIC.

This Clinic, in charge of Dr. Bugbee, has been most successful and has a continued increase of new patients.

GASTRO-ENTEROLOGICAL CLINIC.

-

A new Clinic of Gastro-Enterology has been established under the charge of Dr. Dudley Roberts for the study and diagnosis of Gastro-Enterological conditions, which are so frequently associated with Gynecological diseases. We are thus enabled to make more thorough and complete diagnoses.

RADIO-THERAPY CLINIC.

Plans are in hand for the establishment of a Clinic of Radio-therapy for the treatment of certain Gynecological conditions with the X-Ray, and it is expected that it will be in operation within a short time.

DEPARTMENT OF RECORDS.

Under the direction of Dr. Byron H. Goff many improvements have been made or are in progress in the development of a more perfect system of recording the valuable clinical records of the Hospital. Suitable storage room, which was needed for the rapidly increasing Hospital Records, has been provided on the top floor.

The work of the Follow-Up System has been most satisfactory and the monthly analyses of results reported by the Staff at the Staff Conferences prove the very great value of this system and there is a continued increase in the percentage of responses. Uniform rules for the revisits and the duration of time that the patients remain under observation have been established.

NURSING DEPARTMENT.

This Department, which suffered greatly owing to war conditions, has begun to recover under its present efficient management. Plans are in hand for placing the School on a more modern basis and for a revision of the course of training. A full time Instructress has been secured to insure more thorough teaching.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT.

The work of the Social Service Department has been efficient and most satisfactory. This Department is an invaluable adjunct to the work of the Follow-Up System, as without its aid it would not be possible to have the high percentage of returns which we now have.

CHANGES IN THE SURGICAL STAFF.

The following changes in the Surgical Staff have taken place during the year:

Dr. E. L'H. McGinnis has resigned as Electro-Therapeutist.

Dr. E. B. Armstrong has resigned as Junior Attending Surgeon.

Dr. H. M. Cox has resigned as Assistant Electro-Therapeutist.

Dr. J. C. Fisk, Dr. Abel Holcomb, Dr. Harry S. Marcley, Dr. G. Wayne Brehm, and Dr. Chester Stone, Cystoscopic Clinic, have resigned as Assistants in the Out-Patient Department.

Drs. Edward W. Pinkham, Attending Surgeon, and Edward C. Lyon, Jr., Junior Obstetrician, and Frederick M. Law, Roentgenographer, who had been granted leave of absence while on active military service, have returned to their duties in the Hospital.

The following new appointments have been made:

Special Consultants: Dr. E. L'H. McGinnis, Electro-Therapeutics and Dr. Cornelius G. Coakley, Otology and Laryngology.

Gastro-Enterologist: Dr. Dudley Roberts.

Junior Attending Surgeon: Dr. E. A. Bullard.

Supervisor of the Out-Patient Department: Dr. Reginald M. Rawls.

Assistants in the Out-Patient Department: Dr. John J. Kenney, Dr. Harold M. Herring, Dr. Charles W. Phillips, Dr. Hadley T. Cannon, Dr. G. Wayne Brehm, and Dr. George F. Hoch.

Drs. Ewart, Chase and Cox, who had resigned to accept commissions in the Army, were reappointed to their former positions in the Out-Patient Department.

HOUSE STAFF.

We have been fortunate in attracting candidates of unusual merit for the positions on the House Staff during the year, and it has been a gratifying and unique experience to have them as a body make request for extra work and instruction in the Out-Patient Department and the Special Departments in order that they may more thoroughly fit themselves as Specialists in this line of work.

The following changes have occurred on the House Staff:

Resident Gynecologist: Dr. George Deylen, October 1, 1918, to February 1, 1919; Dr. Stanley Freeman, February 1, 1919, to July 1, 1919; Dr. Douglas Cruikshank, July 1, 1919, to October 1, 1919.

Resident Obstetrician: Dr. James A. Levins, July 13, 1918, to July 11, 1919; Dr. James Mossman, July 26, 1919, to date.

A diploma was awarded Dr. Stanley Freeman as Resident Gynecologist.

Diplomas have also been awarded, upon the satisfactory completion of service as internes, to Drs. Patrick M. Howard, Robert C. Schleussner, Alma Pennington and Alvord R. Sanderson.

NEEDS OF THE SURGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The recent meeting of the Clinical Congress of the American College of Surgeons, which was held in New York during the week of October 20th, demonstrated most foreibly our great need for adequate accommodations in our clinical amphitheatre. Throughout the week there were held daily morning and afternoon operative clinics for the benefit of the visiting surgeons who came from all parts of the country, and to our great regret we were able to accommodate but a small proportion of those who were interested in the work the Hospital is doing. Only a small number of these were able to properly observe the operations owing to our poor seating arrangements. At present the visitors must pass through the main floor of the operating room in order to reach their seats and it has been necessary to place screens in order to protect the tables and their contents from the danger of contamination and consequent sepsis. This is a temporary measure and is not satisfactory.

It is entirely feasible to remodel the amphitheatre without great difficulty, so that its present disadvantages can be overcome. The cost of the reconstruction has been estimated at about seven or eight thousand dollars. Here is a splendid opportunity for some one to greatly increase our facilities for more perfect work.

The Medical Artist, whose services have been available for a few hours at irregular intervals, has added materially to our scientific productions, but the large number of rare specimens and pathological conditions of great scientific value, which are constantly passing under our observation at the operating table, are now lost to science owing to our inability to have them sketched at the time. This would necessitate the services of at least a part time artist, and would greatly enhance the value of the scientific work of the Hospital. We hope that it may soon be possible for us to have such facilities.

So much yet remains to be done in our plans for reorganization that I feel that we have only scratched the surface of our opportunities. Many problems need attention in the immediate future. As I recently stated in an address before the American College of Surgeons, one of our greatest needs is properly qualified young men who desire to specialize in Gynecology. The opportunity for those seeking to enter this field is unusual at this time. At the Woman's Hospital the path leading to a position on the Attending Staff is well blazed for the serious-minded and capable man and the entrance door is situated in the Out-Patient Department and is wide open.

The reorganization and constructive work that we have been endeavoring to put in force has been no light task and it would not have been possible to accomplish what we have if it were not for the hearty support of the Board of Governors and the co-operation of the Surgical Staff and the Executive Department. To them my sincere thanks are due for their aid and I am encouraged to hope for greater improvement in the future.

I submit herewith the detailed Statistical Reports of the Gynecological, Obstetrical and Pathological Departments and of the Follow-Up System of the Hospital.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF SURGEON

REPORT OF THE FOLLOW-UP WORK FOR THE YEAR

ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1919

During the year an attempt has been made to "follow up" 1,661 patients who have been discharged from the Hospital.


Of the 1,661 patients enrolled in the Follow-Up System 1,077 (65%) have responded to all of our requests for return visits; 440 (26%) have responded in a partially satisfactory way; 144 (9%) have refused to return for examination. There have been made 3,288 visits by the patients to the Follow-Up Clinics.


A perusal of the Follow-Up findings recorded throughout the year upon the "End Result" Card of each patient under observation reveals the fact that much data is gradually accumulating which will be extremely valuable in the study of end results and in the treatment of patients in the future.

With the exception of the months of July, August and September, a monthly report has been made at the Staff Conferences by each Attending Surgeon upon the patients seen by him during the month. A classification of the clinical results has been made in each report.

In connection with the Follow-Up, the Social Service Department has done most valuable work. A visit to each ward patient before discharge has become routine. Ten hundred and thirty-three (1,033) visits have been made at the homes of patients in behalf of the Follow-Up. Special attention is called to the small per cent of cases in which a complete refusal to return for examinations has been made.

The figures show an improvement in several ways over the preceding report and justify the changes made in March, 1917, in the method of conducting the Follow-Up System.

REPORT OF THE POST GRADUATE TRAINING SCHOOL OF THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL

The School was more seriously affected during the first half of the current year than at any time during the war and reconstruction period. In June there were only 26 student nurses on duty. The additional nursing care of the patients was provided by graduate nurses. Since June, however, there has been a steady increase in the number of student nurses with a corresponding reduction in the number of graduate nurses doing general floor duty. There have been no nurses' aides on duty since March.

It was decided in July to include two shorter courses in the curriculum and we have since then been receiving nurses for three months practical courses in Gynecological Nursing with Sterilizing Room and Operating Room Technique, and in Obstetrical Nursing with Delivery Room Technique. The School Diploma is not awarded to nurses completing these shorter courses, but a certificate is to be given. These special courses are of value and could be made very attractive, as many nurses require either of these branches of nursing but do not need or desire the full six months course.

There have been a number of changes in the Executive Department of the School during the year.

Mrs. Pearl Sutton resigned as Directress of Nurses in 1918.

Miss Blanche M. Thayer, Directress of Nurses from October, 1918, resigned on February 23, and was succeeded by Miss Mabel Wilson on March 24th. In the interim Miss Mary Forbes, Assistant Directress of Nurses, assumed the duties of Acting Directress. Miss Wilson resigned on June 6th and was succeeded by the present Directress, who had entered upon the duties of Instructor of Nurses on June 1st.

The generosity of Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson has made it possible to have a Resident Instructor for the School, and the class work, as well as the lectures given by Members of the Attending Staff, is of great interest and value to the nurses.

REPORT OF THE TRAINING SCHOOL

Each nurse was given a day's outing this summer, as in the past, through the Good Cheer Fund and the kindness of Miss Ellen King. This day of recreation, either on the River or at one of the Beaches, was thoroughly appreciated.

The overseas services of two members of the Alumni of the Woman's Hospital Post-Graduate Training School for Nurses were recognized in a most gratifying manner. Miss Martha B. Townsend, whose service overseas was made possible through the generosity of a member of the Assistant Board, and who was on duty both in England and France, has been decorated by the Prince of Wales. Miss Perry Handley, who has been overseas since 1914 and is now with the Red Cross in Poland, has been decorated by the French Government.

Every effort is being made to make the School progressive, and this opportunity is taken to thank the Board of Governors, the Chairman and Members of the Nursing Committee and Members of the Hospital Staff for their valuable co-operation and assistance.

The following schedule of lectures and demonstrations has been given at intervals of six months so that each nurse has been able to attend the full course regardless of the time at which she entered.





REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT FOR YEAR ENDING SEPT. 30, 1919

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

With the closing of the tenth year of the Social Service Department, although considerably handicapped by several unavoidable changes in the staff personnel, much progress can be noted.

PRE-NATAL CLINIC.

The most notable accomplishment of the year was the reorganization of the Maternity Clinic. In February Miss Kaufman was appointed to take charge of the pre-natal work. Since that time a total of five hundred and forty-three patients have been cared for. Every patient is required to return once every two weeks (or oftener if the doctor thinks best) for observation. A clinic card is given to each patient, on the reverse side of which are printed certain instructions regarding the care of herself during the pre-natal period.

Through the kind generosity of one of our members of the Social Service Committee, we were enabled to secure a pre-natal exhibit which has been of wonderful value. The exhibit is in panel form and is very practical. It emphasizes the necessity for skillful medical advice and oversight, warns against worry and overwork, and very simply and clearly presents the necessity for proper food, air, exercise, bathing and sleep.

A home visit is made to every patient immediately after her admission to the clinic and as often afterwards as is deemed necessary. The doctor's instructions given in the clinic are carefully indorsed. The simple laws of health and hygiene are taught, not only to the patient, but to the whole family. The social conditions that surround our patients are closely observed, to see wherein they are a predisposing factor in disease. Through instruction to the family and the co-operation of other agencies, it is the aim of the department to leave each home cleaner and better, and each family better prepared to keep well than when we entered. We see in this service the greatest opportunity to prevent disease.

A generous amount of home visiting is done after the patient is discharged from the hospital until her return for the final post partum examination.

Having no baby clinic, we are therefore forced to refer the babies at once, upon discharge from the hospital, to the various infant welfare agencies for constant supervision. We are indeed grateful to these agencies for their cordial co-operation.

The young, unmarried mothers are still as great a problem as ever. To give them the care and long continued supervision which they need requires more than our department can well do. If we are to look for their future safety, the present need is both moral and physical and best left in the hands of those dealing constantly with such problems.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

FOLLOW-UP SURGICAL CLINICS.

There has been no change in the routine of the work in the Follow-Up Surgical Clinic with the exception of some alteration made in the data of the follow-up card given to the patients upon discharge. Referring patients to other clinics, *i. e.*, Orthopedic, Dental, etc., is a feature of the work done in the Follow-Up Clinic.

All patients admitted to the wards (if they have not been seen previously in the clinic) are visited as soon as possible after admission and any problem presenting itself is taken up, thereby establishing a friendly footing with the patients before the question of followup presents itself.

SURGICAL APPLIANCES.

Every patient referred by the doctor for surgical appliances, whether in the clinic or wards, is immediately given attention and the appliance secured, the patient usually paying the cost on the installment plan. We expect to add soon an additional worker to the staff to take charge of the Gynecological Clinic. At present this work is referred to the Social Service Office, but it has grown so much during the year that it is impossible with the present force to give as much time to it as it should have.

CHRISTMAS WORK.

The chief event of Christmas time was the distribution of food and clothing, including toys, games and candy, to the neediest families. The cost, \$170.02, was defrayed by an appropriation from the Cheer Fund.

We take this opportunity of expressing our grateful appreciation to the members of our Social Service Committee and other interested friends for their gifts of clothing, food, toys, etc., for the use of families under the care of the Social Service Department.

Too much cannot be said about the ready response we have received from the various co-operative agencies.

Concluding, we wish to express our gratitude for the cordial cooperative interest extended to us from all the departments of the hospital.

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ACT OF INCORPORATION

SEC. 1. Peter Cooper, Benjamin F. Butler, George F. Trimble, Robert B. Minturn, and their associates, as hereinafter provided for, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a hospital in the City of New York for the treatment of the diseases peculiar to women, and for the maintenance of a Lying-in Hospital, which shall be known and designated as the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York.

The following section is part of the Amending Act of April 18, 1888, prior to which date there was a Board of Governors and a Board of Supervisors.

SEC. 2. The property and concerns of said corporation shall be managed by a Board of Governors which shall consist of all the members of the present Board of Governors and so many of the present Board of Supervisors as will with the present female members of the Board of Governors make thirteen female members. No male Governor other than those who now hold office shall be elected, until the number of male Governors shall be reduced to less than fourteen. From that time the number of Governors shall be twenty-seven, of which fourteen shall be male and thirteen female. The members of the Board of Supervisors to be added to the present members of the Board of Governors, so as to make the number thirteen, shall be nominated to the Board of Governors by the members of the present Board of Supervisors. The said corporation may hold any lands or property which shall be conveyed to it, and may let, lease, mortgage, or sell the same for the purposes in the said Act provided.

SEC. 3. Benjamin F. Butler, George F. Trimble, Theodore Sedgwick, Robert B. Minturn, E. D. Morgan, William F. Mott, Joseph B. Collins, A. R. Wetmore, Alexander E. Hosack, Thomas B. Stillman, Benjamin R. Winthrop, Stewart Brown, William Birdsall, Peter Cooper, E. C. Benedict, H. J. Raymond, J. D. Wolfe, R. L. Kennedy, John Jacob Astor, H. M. Schieffelin, Mark Spencer, George W. Bradford, John W. Francis, Cyrus Curtiss, Joseph Samson and John C. Green shall constitute the Board of Governors.

SEC. 4. The Governor of the State, the Mayor of the City of New York, the President of the State Medical Society, the President of the New York Academy of Medicine, and the Presidents of the following Medical Colleges viz., the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the City of New York, the Medical Department of the University of New York, the New York Medical College, the Department of the University of Buffalo—shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be honorary members of the Board of Governors. Notice of Meetings of the Board of Governors shall not be required to be given to them, and they shall not be entitled to vote.

SEC. 5. The Governors shall be divided into three classes as nearly as may be. Each class shall hold office for three years.

SEC. 6. The Board of Governors shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in said Board; to enact By-Laws; to organize a Medical Board for said Hospital; and to appoint all other assistants, agents, and servants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of said corporation.

SEC. 7. Not less than eleven Governors shall constitute a quorum for the purposes of electing officers, making By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

SEC. 8. All the Professors and matriculated students of any regular medical college in the State, and all other members of the medical profession, and students of medicine, may be admitted to the privilege of visiting said Hospital, under such equal regulations as may be prescribed by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 9. No person holding an appointment under the Board of Governors (unless it be honorary) shall be a member of that body. But the members of the Medical Board shall have the privilege of attending the meetings of the Board and of taking part in the debates.

SEC. 10. There may be an Assistant Board, composed of twenty-five ladies, to be appointed from time to time by the Board of Governors in accordance with its By-Laws, to whom shall be assigned such duties as shall be provided by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 11. At any time thereafter, when the State shall contribute a sum equal to that invested in the lands, buildings, and property of said Corporation, then there shall thereafter, and as long as the said Corporation shall exist, be reserved in said Hospital a certain number of beds, not less than one for each County in the State, for the use of poor patients, resident out of the City of New York, to be selected as the Legislature may hereafter designate; and said patients shall receive the medical attendance and care of the officers of said Hospital, and be boarded therein free of expense, until, in pursuance of the rules and regulations thereof, they are discharged.

SEC. 12. The Act passed on the first of March, seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Lying-in Hospital of the City of New York," is hereby so far amended as to enable the Trustees of the said Corporation to appropriate its funds to the use and purpose of the Corporation hereby created.

SEC. 13. This Corporation shall possess the general powers and be subject to the general restrictions and liabilities in the Third Title of the Eighteenth Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

SEC. 14. This Act shall take effect immediately.

BY-LAWS

of the

BOARD OF GOVERNORS

of the

WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

REVISED FEBRUARY, 1920

ARTICLE I.-STATED MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. Stated monthly meetings of the Governors shall be held on the third Monday of January, February, March, April, May, October, November and December. All meetings shall be held at such time and place, in the City of New York, as the Board shall from time to time order or direct. SEC. 2. If any member of the Board of Governors shall be absent from six

SEC. 2. If any member of the Board of Governors shall be absent from six consecutive stated meetings, such absence, unexcused, shall, *ipso facto*, be deemed a resignation of membership.

ARTICLE II.-ORDER OF BUSINESS AT STATED MEETINGS.

SEC. 1. The following shall be the order of business at the stated meetings of the Board;

Reading of the minutes.

Report of the Treasurer.

Reports and communications from the Chief Surgeon.

Reports of Standing Committees.

Reports of Special Committees.

Miscellaneous business, including unfinished business.

Filling vacancies in the Board and in other offices.

Nominations to office.

SEC. 2. All resolutions shall be submitted in writing by the mover.

ARTICLE III.-SPECIAL MEETINGS.

The President or any two members of the Board, may call a special meeting of the Governors, by not less than one day's notice, given by the President, the Secretary or the members calling such meeting.

ARTICLE IV .- ELECTION OF GOVERNORS.

At their stated monthly meeting, in March in each year, the Board of Governors shall elect, by ballot, the members who are to serve in the class whose terms of service will expire on the second Wednesday of April next after such election. In case of a failure to hold such election at the time above specified, the election may take place at any stated or special meeting thereafter.

ARTICLE V.-ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

SEC. 1. At their stated monthly meeting in April in each year, the Board of Governors shall elect, by ballot, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall all hold office for the term of one year next after their election, and until their respective successors shall be elected and accept office.

SEC. 2. In case the board shall fail to elect any officer on the day above specified, the election may take place at any stated or special meeting thereafter. SEC. 3. The Board may at any time elect one or more honorary Vice-Presidents.

ARTIVLE VI.-PRESIDING OFFICERS.

The President, and in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings of the Governors. In the absence of the President and Vice-President, the Governors present shall appoint one of their own number to preside.

ARTICLE VII.-THE TREASURER.

SEC. 1. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all bonds, stocks, deeds and other papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, and of all moneys received for or belonging thereto, and shall open an account in the name of the corporation with such banks and trust companies in the City of New York, as may be approved by the Board, and shall deposit all moneys therein immediately upon receiving them. He shall present each month to the Governors a report of the accounts of the Hospital for the preceding month and shortly after the close of each fiscal year shall present a similar report for such year.

SEC. 2. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show properly the receipts, expenditures and financial condition of the hospital, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Governors.

SEC. 3. He shall present each month to the Assistant Board a report of the current receipts and expenses of the Hospital for the preceding month.

SEC. 4. He shall pay moneys by authority of the Board of Governors or of the Executive Committee and is authorized to buy and sell securities and other property with the approval of a majority of the Finance Committee and not otherwise.

SEC. 5. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal, to be used only under the authority of the Board, or of the Executive Committee, except on satisfaction pieces of mortgages, upon which the Treasurer is authorized to affix the seal when any such satisfaction piece has been duly signed by the President.

SEC. 6. All Bonds, stocks and other invested securities and evidences of debts shall be kept, as the Board may direct, either in the vault of a Safe Deposit Company, to be taken in the name of the Hospital, or with a duly incorporated Trust Company, located in the City of New York, upon a receipt from such Trust Company, holding itself responsible for the safe keeping of such securities. In either case access to said securities shall be had only by the Treasurer, when accompanied by a member of the Finance Committee, or in the absence of the Treasurer by any two members of the Finance Committee. A record of each visit shall be kept in a book provided for that purpose, stating over the signature of the visitors all withdrawals or changes made in said securities, and when no changes are made the object of the visit.

ARTICLE VIII.-THE SECRETARY.

SEC. 1. The Secretary shall give notice of and attend all meetings of the Governors, take minutes of the proceedings, thereat, and transcribe them in a book provided for that purpose and attest the same.

SEC. 2. He shall give immediately notice of their elections or appointments to all Governors, officers and members of committees, and to the Surgical Staff. He shall prepare the Annual Report of the Governors and attend to its publication.

ARTICLE IX .- STANDING COMMITTEES.

SEC. 1. There shall be the following Standing Committees of the Board: Executive Committee.

Committee on Finance.

on Law. 11

on Nominations.

- 46 on Supplies. 44
 - on care of Buildings and on Repairs.

on Nurses.

Inspecting Committee.

Auditing Committee. SEC. 2. The President annually, at the stated May meeting, unless it be ordered otherwise by the Board, shall appoint all the Committees.

ARTICLE X.-EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

SEC. 1. This Committee shall consist of nine Governors, including ex-officio, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Chairman of the Committee on Supplies, Chairman of the Committees on Nurses and Secretary of the Assistant Board.

Three shall constitute a quorum.

It shall have general charge over the Hospital during the time intervening between the regular Meetings of the Board of Governors.

It shall keep records of all its Meetings and shall submit them for con-firmation to the Board of Governors at its next regular meeting.

SEC. 2. Its Meetings shall be held at least once a month at such time as may be provided by its rules.

SEC. 3. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary and shall draw drafts in favor of the Superintendent upon the Treasurer therefor. Such drafts, except for the monthly pay roll and supplies, shall not exceed \$500 without authority of the Board of Governors and must be signed by two members of the Executive Committee and when received by the Treasurer will authorize him to remit to the Superintendent the amount called for thereon.

SEC. 4. The following shall be the order of business at regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Reading the minutes.

Reading the minutes of the Assistant Board.

Reading the minutes of the Surgical Board and communications from the Chief Surgeon.

Report of the Superintendent.

Report of the Committee on Nurses.

Miscellaneous business.

ARTICLE XI.-COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

This committee shall consist of five Governors including the President and Treasurer *ex officio*. Its duties shall be to advise with and assist the Treasurer, and to control all investments.

ARTICLE XII .- COMMITTEE ON LAW.

This Committee shall consist of three Governors, and the President ex officio. It shall advise the Board as to any legal question submitted to it. It shall have charge of the prosecution and defence of all suits to which the Hospital may be a party.

ARTICLE XIII.-COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS.

This Committee shall consist of five Governors, including the President and Secretary *ex officio*. All nominations to fill vacancies in the Board of Governors shall be referred to it, and at the next regular meeting of the Governors it shall report such name or names as it may deem best for election.

ARTICLE XIV .- COMMITTEE ON SUPPLIES.

This Committee shall consist of five Members who shall have the direction and supervision of the purchase of all articles and stores for the Hospital.

ARTICLE XV .-- COMMITTEE ON CARE OF BUILDINGS AND ON REPAIRS.

This Committee shall consist of two Members and the President *ex officio*. It shall have oversight and care of the buildings, and have charge of all repairs.

ARTICLE XVI.-COMMITTEE ON NURSES.

This Committee shall consist of five Governors and the President and Chief Surgeon ex officio. The latter shall have no vote.

It shall have general supervision over the Nurses and their work.

Three shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XVII.-AUDITING COMMITTEE.

This Committee shall consist of two Members, who, shortly after the close of each fiscal year, shall examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants and shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

ARTICLE XVIII.-INSPECTING COMMITTEE.

SEC. 1. This Committee shall consist of two Governors for each month, but no two Governors shall serve for two successive months. It shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.

SEC. 2. It shall enter its report and suggestions in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its next regular meeting.

ARTICLE XIX .- Assistant BOARD.

SEC. 1. The Domestic affairs and concerns of the Hospital shall be managed by the Assistant Board, appointed in accordance with the Charter, and composed of twenty-five Ladies. It shall have general supervision over the domestic management of the Hospital, subject to the approval of the Board of Governors.

SEC. 2. It shall nominate to the Board of Governors members to fill vacancies among its number, shall enact By-Laws for its own government, shall elect annually a Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer and shall appoint its Committees, which Committees shall report to the Assistant Board. It shall fix from time to time the number of members of which each Committee shall consist.

SEC. 3. It may report to the Board of Governors at their Regular Monthly Meeting any matters upon which it may desire to inform the Board, or upon which action may be desired.

ARTICLE XX .- EXECUTIVE STAFF.

The Board of Governors shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital and also a Directress of Nurses, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board or of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XXI.-CONSULTING STAFF.

SEC, 1. There shall be four or more Consulting Surgeons and Consulting Physicians. They may be consulted on any important case by any member of the Attending Staff.

SEC. 2. Consultants shall have the privilege of sending patients to the private and semi-private rooms of the Hospital when available, and shall have the assistance of members of the House Staff.

ARTICLE XXII.-SURGICAL BOARD.

SEC. 1. The Surgical Board shall consist of the Chief Surgeon, who shall be President of the Board, the Attending Surgeons and the Head of the Pathological Department.

SEC. 2. The Surgical Board shall have general supervision under the direction of the Chief Surgeon of all matters pertaining to the Surgical, Medical, and Laboratory work of the Hospital and of the Out-Patient Department. It shall recommend subject to the approval of or at the request of the Chief Surgeon and subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, rules for the internal management of the Hospital so far as the Surgical, Medical, Pathological and all Laboratory Staffs are concerned, provided the rules shall not conflict with the rules and regulations established by the Board of Governors. SEC. 3. Should a member of the Hospital Staff be insubordinate or other-

SEC. 3. Should a member of the Hospital Staff be insubordinate or otherwise behave in any way prejudicial to the best interests of the Hospital or welfare of the patients, the Chief Surgeon or any Attending Surgeon may suspend such member and shall report the fact of and the reason for such suspension to the Chief Surgeon and to the Executive Committee and shall notify the Superintendent.

ARTICLE XXIII.-CHIEF SURGEON.

SEC. 1. There shall be a Chief Surgeon in charge of the surgical work of the Hospital who shall be appointed by the Board of Governors and as such Chief Surgeon, he shall be the chief head of the Gynecological, the Obstetrical, the Pathological, the Electro-Therapeutical and the Out-Patient Departments of the Hospital, and subject to the Board of Governors and the Executive Committee, he shall have full charge and management of the Surgical Staff, of the surgical work of the Hospital and of the above Departments, including the assignment of patients.

SEC. 2. He shall have the control of the clinical material of all the Departments and may select from this material whatever may be necessary for his own use in the Hospital, and subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, he may make use of the clinical material of the Hospital for teaching purposes.

SEC. 3. In case of expected absence, the Chief Surgeon shall have power to appoint as Acting Chief Surgeon, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, one of the Attending Surgeons, who shall assume during his absence all the powers of the Chief Surgeon.

ARTICLE XXIV.-ATTENDING STAFF.

SEC. 1. The Attending Staff shall consist of

The Chief Surgeon,

Not less than three nor more than ten Attending Surgeons of which the Obstetric Surgeon shall be one,

Not less than three nor more than ten Junior Attending Surgeons of which the Junior Obstetric Surgeon shall be one.

Not less than three nor more than ten Adjunct Assistant Surgeons.

SEC. 2. Adjunct Assistant Surgeons shall attend as Chiefs of Clinic in the Out-Patient Department on such days as may be designated by the Chief Surgeon.

SEC. 3. The members of the Attending Staff shall at all times throw their entire influence in favor of the Hospital, and shall have no connections with other Hospitals which require divided loyalty.

SEC. 4. Members of the Attending Staff and of the Departments referred to in Article XXVI shall be nominated by the Chief Surgeon and appointed by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 5. There shall be an age limit of sixty-three years for members of the Attending Staff.

ARTICLE XXV .- LEAVES OF ABSENCE OR VACATIONS.

In case a leave of absence from regular service or a vacation is desired by any member of the Attending Staff or of the House Staff, or by the Head or Assistant Head of any Department referred to in Article XXVI a request for such leave must be made in advance, (preferably at least a week in advance) upon a form provided for that purpose. Each request, if granted, shall bear the approval of the Chief Surgeon and of a member of the Executive Committee, and should a substitute be necessary, the name of a substitute qualified to act and who has signified his willingness to act for the absentee during his leave of absence. Each request if granted, should bear also a statement signed by the Superintendent that the Superintendent's office has been duly notified in writing of the proposed leave of absence.

ARTICLE XXVI.-DEPARTMENTS.

SEC. 1. There shall be

A Gynecological Department,

An Obstetrical Department.

A Pathological Department,

An Electro-Therapeutical Department, which shall consist of the Special Clinics of Gastro-Enterology, Urology, and Radio-Therapy.

An Out-Patient Department.

SEC. 2. Each of these Departments shall have a Head, who shall be subject to the Chief Surgeon. If, however, the Chief Surgeon shall act as Head of any of the Departments, no other Head of that Department need be appointed.

SEC. 3. All employees in all Surgical Departments shall be subject to the discipline of the Hospital.

ARTICLE XXVII.-REGISTER AND REQUISITIONS.

SEC. 1. Members of the Attending Staff and Heads and Assistant Heads of Departments referred to in Article XXVI on arrival at or departure from the Hospital shall note the hour of their arrival and departure in a record kept for that purpose.

SEC. 2. Whenever, in the opinion of a member or members of the Surgical Board, any instrument, apparatus, medical work, or other article shall be thought necessary for use in the Hospital, the name of the article required, and the name of the surgeon or surgeons making the requisition, shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose in the Superintendent's office, and no outlay for the purposes above named shall be made until the requisition shall be approved by the Chief Surgeon and shall be authorized by a member of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XXVIII.-COURTESY STAFF.

Invitations shall be extended each year by the Executive Committee or by the Board of Governors upon recommendation by the Chief Surgeon to not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty Surgeons skilled in Gynecology or Obstetrics, who shall have the privilege of sending patients requiring treatment for diseases peculiar to women or obstetrical cases, to the private rooms of the Hospital, and of treating and operating upon the patients sent by them, subject to such conditions as the Board of Governors may, from time to time, determine.

ARTICLE XXIX.-APPOINTMENTS.

Members of the Attending Staff, Heads of Departments referred to in Article XXVI, Members of the Consulting Staff and of the Courtesy Staff, shall be appointed annually in the month of April, and shall hold office, subject to the pleasure of the Board of Governors.

ARTICLE XXX.-ENDOWED BEDS.

SEC. 1. The Board of Governors may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the Hospital, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment and discharge of patients as are now or shall be hereafter prescribed by said Board.

SEC. 2. Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

SEC. 3. A gift of \$7,500 shall entitle the donor and the donor's successors, if either of them is, or is acting for, a corporation or association, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the hospital.

SEC. 4. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle an individual donor and his or her successor, if acting only as an individual and not for a corporation or association, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the hospital.

SEC. 5. A gift of \$3,000 shall entitle the donor, if an individual and not acting for a corporation or association, during life, and if a corporation or association, during 15 years, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the hospital.

SEC. 6. A gift of \$300 shall entitle the donor, for a period of one year, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the hospital free of charge.

SEC. 7. Any person, corporation or association being the donor of a \$5,000 or \$3,000 endowed bed may increase his or their donation to \$7,500, in which case he or they shall thenceforth become entitled to the privilege that attaches to an original donation of that amount.

SEC. 8. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.

SEC. 9. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the Partly Endowed Bed Fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

SEC. 10. The Board of Governors shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

SEC. 11. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Governors may prescribe and when extending over a period of more than one year, shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall affix the seal of the Corporation.

SEC. 12. If a donor of an endowed bed desires to appoint a successor to nominate patients to occupy such bed, the donor must so state in writing by will or otherwise.

ARTICLE XXXI.-AMENDMENTS.

No alteration or amendment of these By-Laws shall be made unless notice shall be given at a previous regular meeting of the Board of Governors. A copy of any proposed alteration or amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the meeting at which action thereon may be taken.
