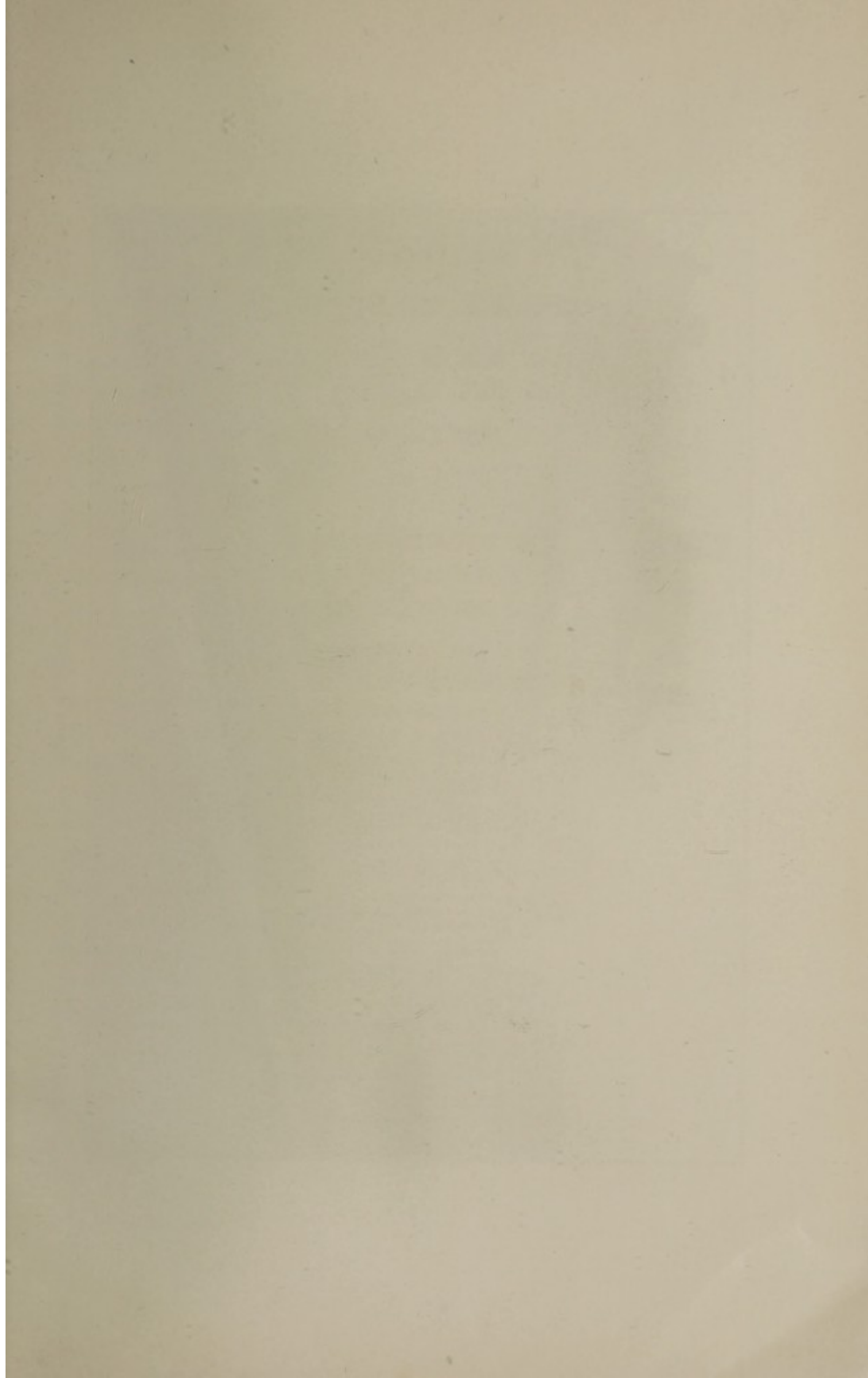

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## THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

Founded in 1855 through the efforts of J. Marion Sims, M. D.; incorporated in 1857.

The Woman's Hospital has the distinction of being the first institution in the world established by Women "for the treatment of diseases peculiar to women and for the maintenance of a Lying-In Hospital."

Its first site was at Madison Avenue and 29th Street, where a building was rented, equipped for forty patients and opened on May 4, 1855.

Twelve years later a building to accommodate seventy-five patients and the necessary staff of officers and nurses was built on land granted by the City, bounded by Park and Lexington Avenues and 49th and 50th Streets, and was opened for patients on October 12, 1867. A second building similar to the first was added in 1877 providing increased accommodations for patients and improved facilities for surgical work and investigation.

On the Lexington Avenue site the work of the hospital was continued for thirty-five years. In 1902 the property was sold and the hospital closed temporarily during the erection of its new building on Cathedral Heights.

The present hospital building was completed and opened for patients on December 5, 1906.

The Nurses' Home, built largely through the generosity of the late Mrs. Morris K. Jesup on land given by the late Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, was completed in December, 1914.

The Thompson Building, built and equipped by the late Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, was officially opened on December 9, 1915. This building provided the hospital with extensive pathological laboratories, ten additional private rooms, two additional operating rooms and accommodations for the Out-Patient and the X-Ray Departments.

The Out-Patient Building and an extension to the X-Ray Department were completed and opened for patients on March 13, 1929.

## THE EIGHTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

The Board of Governors of the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York presents the following reports from the several departments of the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1937.

The Board calls attention to the following facts:

During the year 2,925 ward patients were given a total of 44,504 days treatments of which 30,263 days treatments or 68% were free. The receipts from the ward patients amounted to \$90,109.82 while the care of these patients cost the Hospital \$277,468.83.

In the Out-Patient Department 10,768 patients made a total of 42,080 visits in the Clinics. The cost of maintaining this service amounted to \$42,924.83 while the fees collected from patients able to pay amounted to \$21,287.50.

In the Social Service Department 4,201 cases were cared for, including the prenatal care of 983 prospective mothers; 2,276 visits were made to the homes of patients, including 1,533 visits for the Surgical and Obstetrical Follow-Ups, and the care of 32 convalescent patients was arranged for with the various Convalescent Homes.

The net cost of the charitable activities of the Hospital for the year amounted to \$208,996.34.

The total current receipts from earnings, donations and income from investments amounted to \$472,066.79, and the total current expenses to \$527,370.10, leaving an excess of current expenses over current revenue of \$55,303.31.

Comparative statistics for the year 1937 and 1936 will be found in the Report of the Treasurer on page 18.

*Larger General Endowment.*

*Funds for Scientific Research.*

*Endowment of \$10,000 for the Surgical Library and Record Room.*

*Funds for Emergency Treatments for Needy Cases.*

It is with deep sorrow that announcement is made of the death on July 2nd, of Mrs. Thomas Fortune Ryan and of the death on December 25th of Mrs. William V. S. Thorne, members of the Board of Governors of the Hospital.



Mrs. Ryan served on the Assistant Board for twenty-eight years and on the Board of Governors for twenty-five years. Of late, owing to ill health, Mrs. Ryan was unable to take an active part in the Hospital's management, but her interest in the Hospital's welfare never flagged.

Mrs. Thorne was an active member of the Assistant Board for twenty-three years and of the Board of Governors for seventeen years. She served on the Committee on Supplies, on the Committee on Nurses and on the Inspecting Committee. Her advice was constantly asked, willingly given and always of great value. Her death is deeply mourned by her many friends in the Hospital.

The Governors acknowledge with gratitude the many donations the Hospital has received during the past year, both those made directly and those made to the Hospital by the many contributors to the United Hospital Fund. The Governors also wish to record their appreciation of the faithful and efficient services rendered by the Surgical, Executive and Nursing Departments.

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present herewith the Report of the Superintendent for the year 1937.

The activities of the Hospital increased considerably during the year. Service was rendered to a total of 16,088 individuals; 5,320 in-patients were given a total of 74,207 days care in the wards, semi-private and private services and 10,768 out-patients made a total of 42,080 visits to the Out-Patient Department. Births totaled 1,516 which included 6 pairs of twins.

The Social Service Department cared for 4,201 cases and made a grand total of 37,723 ward, clinic, office and home visits.

A comparison of the services rendered by the Hospital during the year 1937 with that of the preceding year shows an increase of 1,826 in the number of individuals cared for, an increase of 2,600 days care in the private and semi-private services; an increase of 2,021 days care in the ward services, an increase of 100 in births and an increase of 4,997 visits to the Out-Patient Department.

The Report of the Treasurer shows an increase of \$25,881.87 in Hospital Earnings, an increase of \$1,555.56 in donations from individuals, a decrease of \$7,907.52 from the United Hospital Fund and a decrease of \$886.78 in income from Investments, with a total net increase in Current Revenue of \$17,509.98 as compared with the year 1936.

Current Expenses have increased to the amount of \$29,977.12 over the previous year; the principal increases being in the following:

The great increase in the first item is due chiefly to additions to the Nursing Staff necessitated by the greater number of patients cared for, and the allowance of one day off duty per week instead of two half days as heretofore, also to the great shortage of general duty nurses experienced during the greater part of the year which necessitated the employment of many more non-resident nurses.

The increase in Cost of Provisions is due in the main to an increase of 29 per cent in the average number of patients and personnel; the per capita cost of provisions having increased only 2% over the previous year despite an average increase in food prices of approximately 6%.

Total Current Revenue for the year amounted to \$472,066.79 and Total Current Expenses to \$527,370.10 with a resultant excess of Current Expenses over Current Revenue of \$55,303.31. Capital and other extraordinary expenses have brought our total deficit for the year to \$72,892.73.

The total excess of Current Expenses over Current Revenue from all sources since the year 1929 has now reached a total of \$254,743.91. It is very evident that without greater support the Hospital cannot much longer continue its charitable activities at their present extent; the cost of which is so far in excess of the income available and which necessitates a steady encroachment upon its unrestricted reserve funds.

During the year the Hospital continued to admit and care for indigent city cases. Two hundred and eighty public charges were cared for at a cost to the Hospital of \$23,399.09. The payment made by the City of New York for the care of these cases amounted to only \$6,873.10.

More detailed information regarding costs and the work accomplished may be found in the Board of Governors' Report, in the departmental reports and on the statistical pages immediately preceding this report.

The growth of the Associated Hospital Service or "three cents a day plan" for hospital care is shown by the fact that we cared for 347 subscribers during the year as compared with 119 in 1936.

In July the Hospital was inspected by a representative of the American Medical Association and on his very commendatory report, the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals continued its approval.

In September an inspection was made by a representative of the American College of Surgeons and commendation was extended for the comprehensive analysis made of the work done in the institution and for the manifest interest in the quality of the medical records.

Among the principal improvements made during the year may be mentioned the following:

### New Equipment:

- An Electrocardiograph.
- A Stereoscope for X-ray Pelvimetry.
- A Delincope for the Staff Conferences.

### Replacements:

- A Viewing Box for X-ray Films.
- A large Autoclave for Dressing, Main Sterilizing Room.
- A Double Water Still for Pathological Laboratory.
- An adjustable Operating Light Fixture for Thomas Operating Room.
- Large Utensil Sterilizer for Operating Room.
- A new Metabolism Apparatus.
- The Replacement of individual Aspirating Pumps with a Central Electric Suction Pump piped to each Operating and Delivery Room has been a great improvement.

The Assistant Board has made possible the refurnishing and redeco-rating of our reception rooms and many private and nurses' rooms by appropriations granted from their Special Fund. A complete list of these appropriations may be found on page 27.

Our Maintenance Staff has been kept busy throughout the year on routine painting and repairs throughout the buildings and every effort has been made to keep plant and equipment in good operating condition.

In May the Superintendent and his Assistant attended the Annual Conference in New York City of the Hospital Association of New York State and in September the Superintendent attended the Annual Conference in Atlantic City of the American Hospital Association. The Assistant Superintendent and Record Librarian attended the Annual Conference in Chicago of the American College of Surgeons in October. Attendance at these meetings has, as usual, proved well worth the time and expense involved.

We are indebted to our President, Mr. Winthrop, for his efforts in obtaining a number of portraits of former members of the Board of Governors which he has had suitably framed and hung in the Board Room.

The Babies' Alumni added 516 new members and collected \$2,111.50 in dues. The Alumni contributed \$1,879.00 from its funds towards the cost of the free care given to indigent mothers and their babies during the year.

The Patients' Library is used considerably by our patients who call for books and puzzles. Donations would be greatly appreciated as books must be replaced from time to time.

Valuable assistance in the economical purchasing of equipment and supplies has been rendered by the Hospital Bureau of Standards and Supplies.

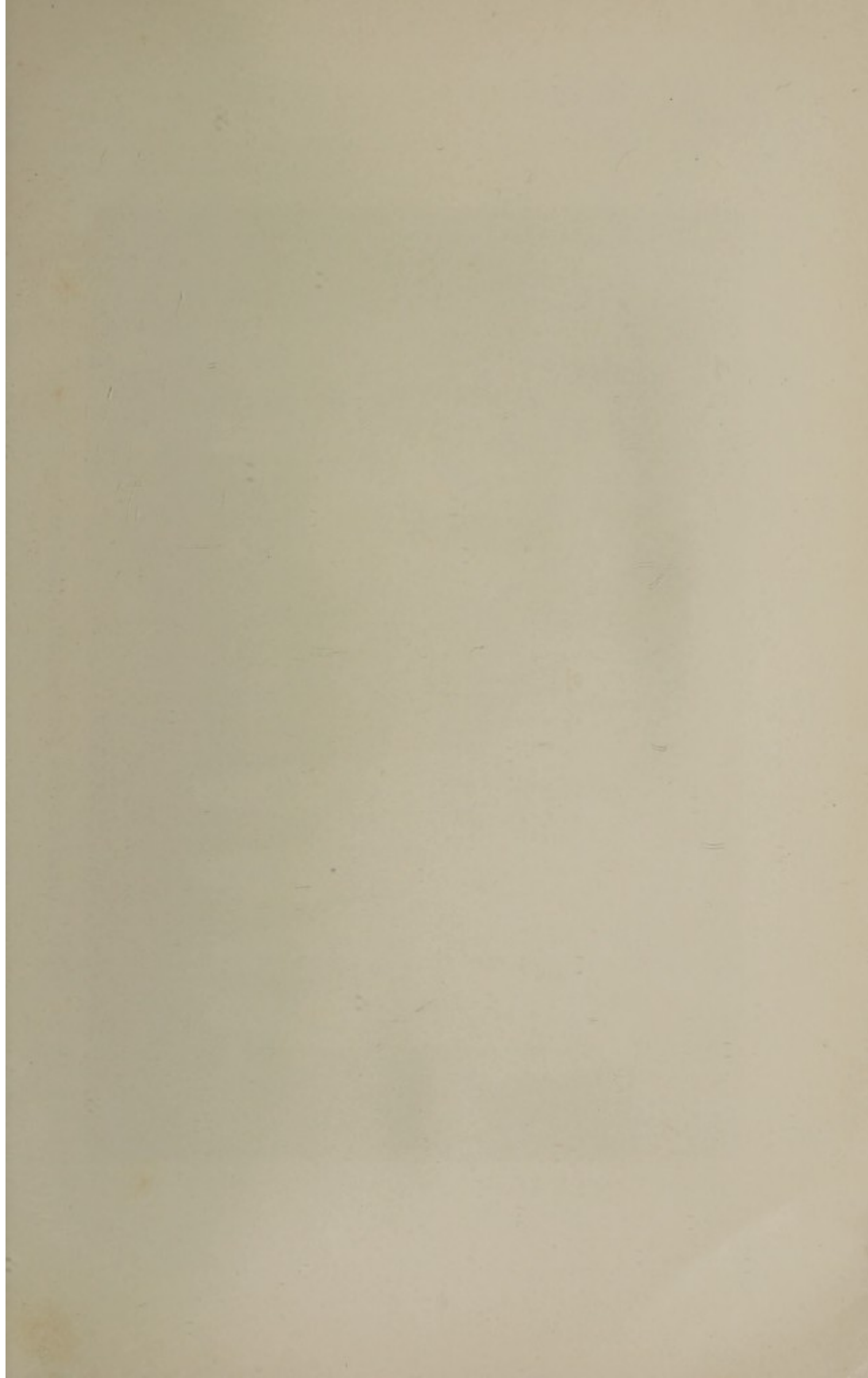

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present the Annual Report of the Surgical Department of the Woman's Hospital as follows:

During the year the Surgical Staff has carried on the work of the Surgical Department with efficiency, and has maintained the high standards we have established for the care of our patients.

While no changes have occurred in the Surgical Staff, we regret to have to record the illness of our Pathologist, Dr. Grete Stohr, which necessitated granting her a leave of absence for a year. Dr. Motyloff, the Associate Pathologist, has taken charge of the Laboratory during Dr. Stohr's absence, and a temporary assistant pathologist has been employed.

Following the reorganization and extension of our Obstetrical Department, the Antepartum Clinics, held twice a week, became so congested that it was deemed advisable to add a third clinic. This new arrangement was instituted in July and greatly expedited the care of these patients.

On April 13th, on the occasion of a joint meeting of the Philadelphia, Boston and Washington Obstetric Societies with the New York Obstetrical Society, the Hospital gave a series of operative clinics and demonstrations in which all the departments participated, and a luncheon was served to our guests.

On April 27th and 28th we were honored by a request visit of the Clinical and Surgical Association of Massachusetts, a society composed of men engaged in surgical practice in various parts of that state. There were twenty-one visitors and we arranged a program of operations and demonstrations which occupied the two days. On the evening of April 29th the Society had a dinner at the Commodore Hotel to which they invited the Surgical Staff of the Hospital, and at which the Chief Surgeon gave an address on "The Origin of Modern Gynecology" which included the work of Marion Sims and the founding of the Woman's Hospital.

We were honored on September 6th by a visit from Dr. Daniel Dougal, Professor of Gynecology and Obstetrics at the University of Manchester, England. Dr. Aldridge arranged a special clinic and demonstrations for him.

The outstanding event of the year has been the affiliation between Columbia University and the hospital whereby our residents now have the opportunity to qualify for the advanced degree of Doctor of Medical Science. Provision has also been made for courses in post-graduate instruction in radio-therapy which the facilities of our Cancer Clinic and newly equipped X-ray Department provide. To carry out the required teaching, Columbia University has appointed on their faculty, Dr. Ward as Professor of Clinical Obstetrics and Gynecology and Drs. Aldridge and Hurd as Assistant Professors of Clinical Obstetrics and Gynecology.

### STAFF CONFERENCES

The weekly Staff Conferences have been held as usual from October first to June first. During the summer months the casualty and follow-up reports are filed each week in the Chief Surgeon's office. Stenographic records of these Conferences have been bound, and are on file, since 1918. The average attendance was 39, and there were 204 visitors during the year.

The follow-up reports given at the Conferences, show the following percentages of end-results in the gynecological patients during the year:

Unfinished.....	2.67%

There were 5,060 patients under the care of the Attending Staff during the year, and the mortality for all cases, gynecological and obstetrical, including babies, was 1.34%. Of the total patients cared for 2,805 were ward cases and the mortality was 1.46%.

### TEACHING

Our Resident Staff have been given systematic instruction throughout the year, by members of the Attending Staff, in the form of lectures and demonstrations. Courses in Pathology and practical instruction in Urology, at fixed periods, have been given each week in addition to the routine work in the wards, operating rooms and clinics.

Three of our residents have applied for registration at Columbia University for the Advanced Medical Science Degree. Their service and instruction in the Hospital under our supervision, is an integral part of their qualifications for this degree.

A number of postgraduate students have registered at Columbia for the Radio-therapy Course which we are to give in the spring of 1938.

Again this year the American Medical Association has included the Woman's Hospital among its approved hospitals for the teaching of residents in Obstetrics and Gynecology, and following their inspection of the Hospital, they have given us an excellent report.

Many visitors from this country and abroad have attended the operative clinics and the Cancer Clinic, and the weekly Staff Conference.

### SURGICAL LIBRARY

The books in the Surgical Library have been rearranged by Dr. Davies, and fifteen new books have been added. Fifty-four journals have been bound into nine volumes and the subscriptions to eight medical journals have been renewed. The Library is in constant use by the Attending

and Resident Staffs, and its facilities are of great value and are much appreciated.

### RADIUM

During the year we have treated 42 new cases of cancer with radium and x-ray, and 70 cases of non-malignant diseases. Our total cases treated since 1919, when we obtained the radium, are 3,537. We are handicapped by not having a sufficient amount of radium to insure prompt treatment to all our patients. We have 280 milligrams and need at least another 100 milligrams in order that there may be no serious delay in treating patients with malignant disease.

At the June meeting of the American Medical Association, we gave our sixth statistical report of our results in the treatment of cancer in our Clinic, covering a period of eighteen years. During this period we have cared for more than 900 cases of cancer of the female genitalia, and our five year survival rate is comparable with the leading cancer clinics of the world, being nearly 30% for cancer of the uterus. In the patients coming *early* for treatment, we have saved over 56%.

### RESEARCH AND NEW ACTIVITIES

Plans have been made and authorization has been given for the provision of a new wing for semi-private obstetric patients, which will add twelve more available beds, and on account of this increase in the obstetrical service, the appointment of an obstetric intern will be made to assist the Resident Staff in their duties.

A new basal metabolism apparatus has been provided.

A Caldwell-Malloy x-ray pelvimetry apparatus for the study of pelvic abnormalities in our obstetric patients, has been authorized.

An electrocardiogram instrument has been provided.

Authorization for the installation of a new 200 kilovolt high-voltage x-ray apparatus of the latest model has been granted, and will be installed for the treatment of our cancer cases.

New examining tables have been provided for the treatment rooms.

The report of the several departments for the year ending December 31, 1937, shows the work of the Hospital as follows:

### GYNECOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

There were 1,851 gynecological patients discharged during 1937 with a mortality rate of 1.84%. Of this number 1,054 were ward patients and the mortality rate of this group was 2.56%. There were 1,627 gynecological operations performed during the year, and of this number 919 were operations upon ward patients.

### OBSTETRICAL DEPARTMENT

There were 1,710 obstetrical patients discharged in 1937 and the mortality rate was 0.12%. Of these patients 942 were in the ward, and we are happy to report that of this number, there were no deaths. The maternal mortality rate for 1937 per 1,000 live births was 1.3%. The mortality for mothers in viable cases per 100 cases discharged was 0.13% for all cases, and 0.00% for ward cases.

There were 1,499 viable live births in 1937 with a mortality for the babies of 2.13%. Eight hundred and nine ward births are included in the total, with a mortality rate of 1.73%.

### OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT

There were 10,768 individuals who received treatment in this Department during the year and the total number of visits was 42,080. This

is an increase of 1,497 individuals and of 4,997 visits over the preceding year.

### PATHOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT

The regular work of the Laboratory has been carried on efficiently by the Associate Pathologist, Dr. Motyloff, and the staff of technicians, during the absence of Dr. Stohr on sick leave. A temporary assistant has been procured. The number of clinical pathological examinations made during the year were 37,968, a marked increase over 1936. Thirteen adult, 22 stillborn and 26 neonatal autopsies were conducted.

Practical instruction in diagnosis, in both gross and microscopic pathology, was given the Resident Staff by Dr. Motyloff three mornings each week throughout the year. The Pathologists also gave demonstrations at each weekly Staff Conference.

### PEDIATRIC DEPARTMENT

Our Pediatricians have direct supervision of the care of our babies in the ward nurseries, and they follow these infants in the Pediatric Clinic after they have been discharged from the Hospital. Seven hundred and forty-four new infants were cared for in this Clinic and 1,199 total visits were made during the year.

### SPECIAL CLINICS DEPARTMENT

The special clinics function as a valuable diagnostic and therapeutic aid to the gynecological and obstetrical services: Their work is as follows:

#### UROLOGICAL CLINIC

Each week three urological clinics are held under the direction of our Urologist and his Assistants. Two hundred and eight new patients were seen during the year and 1,769 total visits were made to this Clinic.

Our residents receive instruction in Urology from the Assistant Urologists, Dr. Hoch and Dr. Murphy, at each of the three weekly sessions of this Clinic.

#### GASTROENTEROLOGICAL CLINIC

Two sessions of this Clinic are held weekly under the direction of our Gastroenterologist. During the year 79 new patients were seen and 530 visits were made by all patients. Ward cases with gastroenterological complications are seen in consultation by the Gastroenterologist.

#### X-RAY DIAGNOSIS AND RADIOTHERAPY CLINIC

The total number of patients seen in this Clinic during the year numbered 1,131 of which 113 came for roentgen therapy and 1,018 for roentgen

diagnosis. One thousand three hundred and twenty-eight treatments were given, 1,169 being high-voltage treatments and 159 medium and superficial. Fifty-six cases of malignant disease were also treated.

We are pleased to announce that authorization has been given for the installation of a complete high-voltage x-ray apparatus of the latest model to replace our present machine, for the treatment of our cancer patients.

### ORTHOPEDIC CLINIC

Sixty-eight referred cases were seen in this clinic and a total of 500 visits were made throughout the year. The services of two masseuses are always available for patients requiring such treatment.

### ENDOCRINE CLINIC

Endocrine therapy continues to play an important part in the treatment of certain of our gynecological cases. The Clinic had 83 new patients during the year and a total of 1,139 visits by all patients. We are grateful to G. W. Carnrick Company for their contribution of hormone products which have been used in this work for those patients who for financial reasons, would otherwise not receive the benefits of this therapy.

### RECORD DEPARTMENT

This very important department has maintained its reputation for the high standard of efficiency of our case histories and cancer records. During the year 44,777 charts and abstracts were consulted for data and research studies by the Staff. All the case histories for the year have been approved, indexed and filed. Merwin-Davis, our statisticians, have audited our results, and submitted a report of the mortality and morbidity statistics of the Hospital and the individual members of the Staff, as they have done for the past twelve years. Miss Vredenburg, our Record Librarian, presented a paper on "Building for a Better Understanding of Clinical Charting, Economy and Nomenclature" before the National Organization of Record Librarians at Chicago in October.

### ANESTHESIA DEPARTMENT

During the year 3,231 anesthetics in both obstetrics and gynecology were administered by nurse and visiting anesthetists, under the direction of our Anesthetist.

### NURSING DEPARTMENT

Through the continued cooperation of the Directress of Nurses and her Staff, our patients have been well cared for. In accordance with the Postgraduate Course curriculum, thirty-five lectures were given by members of the Surgical Staff to the postgraduate student nurses.

### SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

The good work of this Department and the assistance given by the Director and her Assistants, have been of great benefit to both our patients

and the members of the Surgical Staff. By their untiring efforts we have been able to maintain our excellent record of attendance in the gynecological, obstetrical and cancer follow-up clinics.

### CHANGES IN THE SURGICAL STAFF

### NEEDS OF THE SURGICAL DEPARTMENT

In order that our patients shall receive the best care, it is imperative that we must constantly improve our equipment and facilities to conform to the most modern standards. We hope that in the near future a generous endowment will permit of an entire new plant.

A larger supply of radium element is one of our most urgent needs in order to avoid delay, and to make more effective the treatment of our malignant cases. Three thousand dollars would enable us to procure an additional 100 milligrams.

The Guggenheim Transfusion Fund now amounts to \$2,020.45. Blood transfusions are more frequently needed in a gynecologic and obstetric service than in any other branch of medicine. Many patients must be transfused before we can safely operate upon them or deliver them, and the emergency cases of hemorrhage must have immediate transfusion. Each transfusion costs about \$50.00 unless a suitable relative or friend is available. We earnestly request donations to this fund as patients who are unable to pay must suffer unless the necessary money is provided for a donor.

The J. Marion Sims Research Fund now amounts to \$2,483.64.

The J. Riddle Goffe Research Fund amount to \$5,680.33 and the Book Fund, which Dr. Goffe also established, is now \$5,227.72. The medical journals to which the hospital subscribes, are paid for out of this fund.

The Maud Aguilar Leland Fund for blood transfusions, or for scientific research, now amounts to \$2,694.47.

Closed cabinets are needed in the Pathological Museum to protect our valuable pathological specimens.

A constant temperature water bath is needed in the Pathological Laboratory for simultaneous serological work.

An additional stand light is needed in the Operating Room, and a new type of table pad for the fifth operating table. Four have already been supplied.

An upright Bucky-diaphragm is needed in the X-ray Department.

There is a need for more beds to accommodate semi-private gynecological patients on the second floor. The rapid increase in the demand for this type of accommodation has been brought about through the service offered by the Associated Hospital Plan.

I again call attention to the desirability of giving permanent recognition to the Attending Surgeons who since the foundation of the Hospital in 1855, have by their valuable research and contributions to the Science of Gynecology, and faithful service, given the Hospital its great reputation. As is customary in many hospitals both here and abroad, the names and dates of service of these men should be placed on a suitable tablet where it may be seen by all, and would thus serve as an inspiration to their successors.

Twenty years ago I was commissioned by your Board to take charge of the Surgical work of the Hospital with the mandate to reorganize and standardize our procedures in order to conform to the recent requirements of the American College of Surgeons for the improvement of hospitals throughout the country. During these years, we have steadily progressed in developing an efficiency of which we are justly proud, and we have the satisfaction of knowing that the Woman's Hospital has achieved an enviable reputation throughout the profession and stands today, in a pre-eminent position among the efficient, well-conducted hospitals of the country as a conspicuous example of what a gynecological-obstetrical clinic should be.

There has been an expansion of the work in all the departments: Special Clinics have been instituted to permit of a more thorough diagnosis and study of the patients and the laboratory staff has been enlarged and better facilities provided to take care of the greatly increased work and studies made in this important department. Six volumes of scientific contributions to the Gynecologic and Obstetric Literature made by the Staff, have been published through the generosity of your Board, and additional material for more volumes is available for publication when funds can be provided. The Obstetrical Department has been increased and developed to a high state of efficiency. Women physicians have been admitted to the Resident and Attending Staffs and the Special Departments. A new and model building has been erected and equipped for the Out-Patient Department. The Record Department has been reorganized with an increased personnel and an entire, modern case history system has been installed. A yearly surgical audit of the work of the Hospital

and the Staff has been made by professional statisticians for the past twelve years. Beautiful quarters for the Record Department and Surgical Library have been provided through the generosity of your President. The Resident Staff has been enlarged and the term of service and special training increased to two years. These developments could not have been accomplished without the cooperative aid and hard work of the members of the Surgical Staff who have given freely of their time and efforts, under my direction, and for whose help I am deeply grateful.

Perhaps the greatest satisfaction in looking back over these twenty years, is the fact that there has been developed a group of young men who are thoroughly competent in both training and skill to carry on the work of the Hospital in a manner that will maintain its traditions and prestige and add to its future fame. Also that many well-trained young men have gone out from the Woman's Hospital to disseminate its methods and to raise the standard of practice throughout the country.

On behalf of the Surgical Staff I offer our thanks to the Board of Governors for their generous response to our many needs, and to the Superintendent and the Executive Staff and the Nursing Department for their cooperation and help.

To the Consulting, Attending and Junior Staffs my sincere thanks are due for their willing and efficient response to every call.

I especially wish to express my personal appreciation and grateful thanks for the hearty support and encouragement I have received from Mr. Winthrop and your Board throughout these twenty years as Chief Surgeon without which the high reputation that the Hospital has throughout the world, could not have been attained.

I submit herewith the report of the Follow-Up System of the Hospital for the year.

## REPORT OF THE FOLLOW-UP JANUARY 1, 1937 TO JANUARY 1, 1938

### GYNECOLOGY

During this period 1,885 patients have been under observation in the Follow-Up Clinics. Of this number 84.08% have responded satisfactorily to all requests for visits to the clinics; 10.88% responded in a partially satisfactory manner, while 5.05% failed to return for follow-up examination. The total number of visits made by patients to the Follow-Up Clinics during this period was 3,698.

An analysis of the follow-up figures show that 82.21% of the cases have been classed as successes; 5.21% as partial successes; 1.52% as failures; 8.39% as undetermined cases which will require further observation before a definite classification can be made, and 2.67% as unfinished. There were permanently discharged and classified as satisfactory 537 cases; permanently discharged and classified as partially satisfactory 19 cases; permanently discharged and classified as failure 1 case.

In behalf of the Gynecological follow-up, the Social service Department has made 702 visits to the homes of delinquent patients in an effort to induce them to return to the Hospital for examination, and in addition the Department wrote 446 letters to patients.

### OBSTETRICS

All obstetrical patients cared for in the ward service, return for a follow-up examination after delivery and as often after that as is necessary. If still further treatment is required these patients are then referred to the Gynecological Clinics. During the year 908 ward patients were observed in the Obstetrical Follow-up Clinic and these patients made 1,197 visits. Of the 908 patients observed, 726 were discharged and classified as follows:

Satisfactory.....	463—63.77%
Unsatisfactory.....	71— 9.78%
Unchanged.....	192—26.45%

There were 126 delinquents, nearly all of whom made one or more visits to the Follow-Up Clinic, but failed to report until discharged.

In behalf of the Obstetrical follow-up, the Social Service Department made 538 visits to the homes of the delinquent patients to induce them to return for examination, and in addition they wrote 297 letters to patients.

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT:

Sir:

As Personnel Physician, I have the pleasure to submit the Annual Report for the year 1937.

During this past year 1,865 visits or treatments were made. Four hundred and thirty-five cases reported because of illness or injuries received while on duty in the Hospital. One hundred and thirty-four complete physical examinations were done on the new employees of all the Hospital departments and the student nurses admitted to the Post-Graduate School. The Wasserman blood test was performed on all those involved in the handling of food. Only those who were safely healthy were allowed to work.

In general the health of the Hospital personnel has been satisfactory. There has been a definite decrease in the number of hospital bed days compared with those of last year, also the number of patients admitted has somewhat decreased. The number of injuries remained about the same. Practically all of them were minor in character, and, if suitable, were reported to the State Insurance Commission. Twenty-four operations were performed. Four were major and twenty were minor.

As in previous years, the greatest number of individuals reported ill suffered from an infection of the upper respiratory system. An effort was made to immediately isolate such a patient from any susceptible room companion or friend at the dinner table. Generally a single room in the Nurses' Home could be found in which to place her. Occasionally, admission of the patient to the surgical private floor was necessary. A small infirmary for the nurses would be more ideal and medically safer. The effort on the part of the Department Supervisors in urging the personnel to report promptly any suspicious symptoms of an ailment is undoubtedly an important reason why there was no serious spread of an infection or an epidemic in the Hospital.

I must take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation of the excellent cooperation from the various departments of the Hospital with which I come in contact. Naturally, most of my work is concerned with the Nursing Office, where cooperation is both constructive and pleasant.

Students admitted this past year have come from twenty-two States and Canada.

Many of our postgraduates have again been recommended for positions, in addition to those taking the courses at the request of their own school directors, to return for positions.

Our Monthly Reports show a total of 853 days illness with salary and 611 days with no salary. Total number of days' illness during the year was 1,464, which averages 4 per day. The total number of days' illness shows an increase over 1936 of 309 days.

We would like, again, to stress the need of a two or three bed room, where nurses may be isolated from their roommates when developing colds.

### STAFF NURSES

The difficulty of securing the necessary number of staff nurses for vacation relief was almost tragic; however, after sending out a great many letters to registries all over the United States and Canada, we did secure the required number before the summer was over. The number of staff nurses needed for vacations was between thirty and thirty-five, and next year will number around forty.

### STAFF EDUCATION

The nurses have continued their interest in the staff education program which included reports of trips, case reports and discussion of nursing topics and legislation.

The number of nurses taking outside classes and courses remains about the same.

### SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Thanks to the Assistant Board, the teas held during the winter again gave us a very pleasant afternoon once a month.

Among the concerts, musicales and broadcast tickets received was Mrs. Carnegie's box for the Peoples' Chorus, which our nurses look forward to each year and greatly appreciate; another was a box at Carnegie Hall for four concerts given by the National Orchestral Association, through the courtesy of Mr. Robinson; others were from Mr. George Engles of N. B. C. Artists' Service. These concerts were well attended and thoroughly enjoyed.

### CONVENTIONS

The Biennial Convention of the National League of Nursing Education, held in Boston, May, 1937, was attended by Miss Ella M. Rafuse, our Educational Director, and myself. Getting together and hearing of programs conducted by other schools is always a stimulus and very valuable, as we return with some new ideas and material which we can use. The Biennial Convention of the American Nurses Association next year will be held in Kansas City, the week of April 25th, and if at all possible, some of us would like to attend; this being the most important meeting of the year.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation and thanks for the understanding cooperation given the Nursing Department by the Board of Governors, Assistant Board, Committee on Nurses, the Superintendent and the Chief Surgeon and Staff.

Dr. Dudleigh C. Stone has ably cared for the health of the nurses and has been most cooperative.

I wish to express my personal thanks to the entire nursing staff for their continued loyalty and support.

TO THE DIRECTRESS OF NURSES:

Madam:

The report of the department for this year covers only the time from the middle of April through December, the period of my tenure.

The last two weeks in April were taken up with completing the program as previously planned and in making up such records as Miss Cowan was not able to complete before she left for the students who finished May first.

With the coming of the May class, a slight change of policy was inaugurated. Considering the graduate students as mature women, capable of directing their own activities to a large extent, they were given more freedom to demonstrate that ability and helped in every way possible to do independent thinking and to develop initiative under careful guidance.

Outlines were introduced which covered the essential knowledge to be acquired and which indicated the possibility of reference reading according to the inclination of the individual student who was informed that she was responsible for the knowledge available from both these sources.

This made less compulsion to rehearse detail which was probably known to graduate students in the class periods and left more time for discussion of practical problems encountered in the care of patients; more opportunity to report and discuss unusual conditions; more freedom to analyze and synthesize information gained from reading done in connection with theory presented or questions raised in discussion.

Formal study periods were abolished and students were encouraged to read what they liked and when they liked, provided it was relevant material and provided written excerpts were presented for inspection each week as note-books came in for checking. If a student seemed to be lagging behind, a talk with her usually revealed the difficulty as well as gave an opportunity to discover her problems and to help her solve them by her own efforts. There have been no compulsory evening classes except lectures by the Attending Staff.

The result has been most gratifying. All students have done better than average work and some have shown remarkable interest and ability. Classes have become more and more a cooperative venture and fewer and fewer formal lectures have been given. The questions asked and the willingness to spend unlimited time and effort in hunting out information for themselves are most encouraging since these things show a developing capacity for independent study later when they are no longer under guidance.

Recreation has also been informal. There was one formal party at Christmas which the students organized and directed themselves. Interesting events have been posted and information as to tickets available has been given. These have resulted in many small groups enjoying worthwhile things and the society of one another. Concerts and broadcasts have been very popular.

All students have been sent in small groups, accompanied by a super-

visor, to the Lobenstine Clinic of Midwifery and arrangements have been made at different times for various small groups to go to places of interest which they have discovered for themselves or of which they have been told. A surprising number of these excursions have been requested.

Every effort has been made to get a closer tie-up with the ward services and all other departments of the hospital. Staff men and residents have given freely of their time for lectures and in advice as to problems encountered. Supervisors have never been too busy to talk over difficulties and some have come to feel free to make suggestions and to come to the class room with their problems. I should like to say here that there has always been the most wholehearted cooperation and support in all new plans and projects. Mrs. Combs and Miss Ryan in particular have given unfailing cooperation and understanding which have made the inevitable difficulties of adjustment to a new regime so much easier than they could otherwise have been.

Three changes have been made in the teaching program:

1. Ward service and class room work have been correlated so that students having classes in Obstetrics work on the Obstetrical Division and Gynecology and Operating Room students have their classes in surgery while on those services.
2. The course in Ward Management (which should really be called Unit Administration) has been lengthened to 15 hours.
3. A course in Elementary Principles of Teaching (15 hours) has been added as a second elective for the eight months' students.

So far, all students (except one) have elected to take both Ward Management and Principles of Teaching courses even though doing so involved an extra evening class at times for which they had to give the time.

Before she left, Miss Cowan recommended that a scholarship be offered to Miss Ruth Connor. This was done and she accepted it and enrolled as a student in the Department of Nursing Education at Teacher's College. At the same time, Miss Connor has acted as a part-time assistant instructor in the class room. It did not seem advisable to offer scholarships to students in the May or September classes although there were students in both groups who were eligible on the basis of class room standing and some who could have qualified in every way. But to accept a scholarship meant to stay on for six months at least and all the eligible students had already accepted positions which precluded this. We shall undoubtedly use the scholarships later as more students decide to stay on with us.

We have made a little progress this year but there is still much to be done. Every day some new situation arises which shows opportunity or need to better the service that the Educational Department may give both to the students and to the hospital in general. May the next year show much greater advance!

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I hereby submit the following report of the Social Service Department for the year ending December 31, 1937:

This year the Social Service Department has found it very difficult, in the majority of the cases interviewed, to interpret to the patients who are asking assistance of the hospital the extent of its ability to furnish aid. It is apparent to the worker who is in daily contact with patients needing help that in most cases a decidedly lowered morale is evident. The fact that they are receiving emergency home relief seems to them to be an "open sesame" through which they may demand anything they wish and receive it. About forty per cent of the female members of our contacted families are having a difficult undertaking in getting the male members to realize that a great conscious effort must be made before self-reliance and dependability can be regained. Certainly this relief situation is slowly undermining the morale of all who are accepting it. We have had many more patients this year requesting statements certifying that they are unable to work due to physical incapacity, when in the opinions of the doctors these claims were merely pretexts. However, in cases of emergent need where immediate assistance is required, milk and food are supplied from the Social Service fund, which is supplemented by an anonymous annual donation of one thousand dollars.

Five years ago the procedure of interviewing all patients referred into the wards from the clinic was instituted by the Social Service Department. This method has been successful, not only in the mutual interpretation of the hospital and the patient, but in engendering a more friendly and cooperative spirit on all sides.

During the past year there were 1,198 visits made to the Monday morning baby clinics by babies born in this hospital. The mothers showed keen interest in the advice given by our excellent pediatrician and his assistants.

The prenatal lectures given by the Social Service Department have continued to prove their worth in health education, judging from the results. The Director of Social Service talks to our prospective mothers on diet, exercise, elimination, and the proper outfitting of babies (the latter lecture being given in conjunction with the nurse in charge of the ward nursery). When visiting the homes of these patients, the obstetrical worker emphasizes and further instructs them along these lines.

The surgical follow-up worker continues to have marked success in her returns on follow-up visits. Her efforts in the cancer work are undiminished and have brought excellent results.

During the past year we have continued our contact with the post-graduate student nurses of the hospital. The Social Service Director gives an hour's talk on the principles of social service and the practical case work arising on the wards. The students have their field work with the surgical and obstetrical workers. During their out-patient clinic

training, they are instructed in the methods used in the services rendered by the Social Service Department for the out-patients.

We have had hearty cooperation in the adjustment of our problems from the many organizations in the city, and we are greatly appreciative of the assistance given by these agencies.

### FRESH AIR WORK

The Herald Tribune Fresh Air Fund has again demonstrated its excellent cooperation and assistance by not only taking care of an entire family at one time in order to relieve a sick mother's anxiety, but also supplying clothing to these children. This of course was in addition to the regular quota of children sent by them for extensive vacations. The assistance which Life Fresh Air Camps have given to two boys and a girl from one of our large families has certainly produced a result beyond expectation. We offer our sincere thanks to both these organizations for their continued generosity and cooperation.

### CHRISTMAS ACTIVITIES

The success of our Christmas party could not be doubted, judging from the expressions of all those who witnessed the performance of magical feats and the Punch and Judy show which started the festivities. This was followed by the arrival of Santa Claus, ably impersonated by one of our surgeons, who distributed well-filled stockings containing food, clothing, toys and shoes to the 121 children and 45 adults who were present. Christmas carols were then sung by the choristers of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, under the direction of Mr. Norman Coke-Jephcott.

### PERSONNEL

At the present time our department consists of three salaried full-time workers, a secretary and one salaried substitute.

The Director supervises the handling of all problem cases, in addition to her executive duties, and gives the prenatal lectures.

The Surgical Follow-Up Worker instructs every post-operative case regarding clinic attendance, brings back delinquent patients to the follow-up clinics, and superintends the cancer work.

The Prenatal-Postnatal Worker has charge of every prospective mother from the time of her admission to the prenatal clinic until her discharge from the postnatal clinic.

The Secretary keeps the records of all social service cases, and attends to the clerical duties of the office.

The Substitute Worker relieves during the summer months, being required to do the work of those on vacation.

## ACT OF INCORPORATION

SEC. 1. Peter Cooper, Benjamin F. Butler, George F. Trimble, Robert B. Minturn and their associates, as hereinafter provided for, shall constitute a body corporate, with power to establish, maintain, and conduct a hospital in the City of New York for the treatment of the diseases peculiar to women, and for the maintenance of a Lying-in Hospital, which shall be known and designated as the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York.

*The following section is part of the Amending Act of April 18, 1888, prior to which date there was a Board of Governors and a Board of Supervisors.*

SEC. 2. The property and concerns of said corporation shall be managed by a Board of Governors which shall consist of all the members of the present Board of Governors and so many of the present Board of Supervisors as will with the present female members of the Board of Governors make thirteen female members. No male Governor other than those who now hold office shall be elected, until the number of male Governors shall be reduced to less than fourteen. From that time the number of Governors shall be twenty-seven, of which fourteen shall be male and thirteen female. The members of the Board of Supervisors to be added to the present members of the Board of Governors, so as to make the number thirteen, shall be nominated to the Board of Governors by the members of the present Board of Supervisors. The said corporation may hold any lands or property which shall be conveyed to it, and may let, lease, mortgage, or sell the same for the purposes in the said Act provided.

SEC. 3. Benjamin F. Butler, George F. Trimble, Theodore Sedgwick, Robert B. Minturn, E. D. Morgan, William F. Mott, Joseph B. Collins, A. R. Wetmore, Alexander E. Hosack, Thomas B. Stillman, Benjamin R. Winthrop, Stewart Brown, William Birdsall, Peter Cooper, E. C. Benedict, H. J. Raymond, J. D. Wolfe, R. L. Kennedy, John Jacob Astor, H. M. Schieffelin, Mark Spencer, George W. Bradford, John W. Francis, Cyrus Curtiss, Joseph Samson and John C. Green shall constitute the Board of Governors.

SEC. 4. The Governor of the State, the Mayor of the City of New York, the President of the State Medical Society, the President of the New York Academy of Medicine, and the presidents of the following Medical Colleges—viz., the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the City of New York, the Medical Department of the University of New York, the New York Medical College, the Medical Department of the University of Buffalo—shall, by virtue of their respective offices, be honorary members of the Board of Governors. Notice of meetings of the Board of Governors shall not be required to be given to them, and they shall not be entitled to vote.

SEC. 5. The Governors shall be divided into three classes as nearly as may be. Each class shall hold office for three years.



## ACT OF INCORPORATION

SEC. 6. The Board of Governors shall have power to fill all vacancies that may occur in said Board; to enact By-Laws; to organize a Medical Board for said Hospital; and to appoint all other assistants, agents, and servants as may be proper to carry out the purposes of said corporation.

SEC. 7. Not less than eleven Governors shall constitute a quorum for the purposes of electing officers, making By-Laws, or for holding any special meeting; but for all other purposes, and at stated meetings, seven shall be a quorum.

SEC. 8. All the Professors and matriculated students of any regular medical college in the State, and all other members of the medical profession, and students of medicine may be admitted to the privilege of visiting said Hospital, under such equal regulations as may be prescribed by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 9. No person holding an appointment under the Board of Governors (unless it be honorary) shall be a member of that body. But the members of the Medical Board shall have the privilege of attending the meetings of the Board and of taking part in the debates.

SEC. 10. There may be an Assistant Board, composed of twenty-five ladies, to be appointed from time to time by the Board of Governors in accordance with its By-Laws, to whom shall be assigned such duties as shall be provided by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 11. At any time thereafter, when the State shall contribute a sum equal to that invested in the lands, buildings, and property of said Corporation, then there shall thereafter, and as long as the said Corporation shall exist, be reserved in said Hospital a certain number of beds, not less than one for each County in the State, for the use of poor patients, resident out of the City of New York, to be selected as the Legislature may hereafter designate; and said patients shall receive the medical attendance and care of the officers of said Hospital, and be boarded therein free of expense, until, in pursuance of the rules and regulations thereof, they are discharged.

SEC. 12. The Act passed on the first of March, seventeen hundred and ninety-nine, entitled "An Act to Incorporate the Lying-in Hospital of the City of New York," is hereby so far amended as to enable the Trustees of the said Corporation to appropriate its funds to the use and purposes of the Corporation hereby created.

SEC. 13. This Corporation shall possess the general powers and be subject to the general restrictions and liabilities in the Third Title of the Eighteenth Chapter of Part First of the Revised Statutes.

SEC. 14. This Act shall take effect immediately.



# BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL

## IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

Revised April, 1936

### ARTICLE I.—STATED MEETINGS

SEC. 1. Stated monthly meetings of the Governors shall be held on the third Monday of January, February, March, April, May, October, November and December. All meetings shall be held at such time and place, in the City of New York, as the Board shall from time to time order or direct.

SEC. 2. If any member of the Board of Governors shall be absent from six consecutive stated meetings, such absence, unexcused, shall, *ipso facto*, be deemed a resignation of membership.

### ARTICLE II.—ORDER OF BUSINESS AT STATED MEETINGS

SEC. 1. The following shall be the order of business at the stated meetings of the Board:

Reading the minutes.  
Report of the Treasurer.  
Reports and communications from the Chief Surgeon.  
Reports of Standing Committees.  
Reports of Special Committees.  
Miscellaneous business, including unfinished business.  
Filling vacancies in the Board and in other offices.  
Nominations to office.

SEC. 2. All resolutions shall be submitted in writing by the mover.

### ARTICLE III.—SPECIAL MEETINGS

The President or any two members of the Board, may call a special meeting of the Governors, by not less than one day's notice, given by the President, the Secretary or the members calling such meeting.

### ARTICLE IV.—ELECTION OF GOVERNORS

At their stated monthly meeting, in March in each year, the Board of Governors shall elect, by ballot, the members who are to serve in the class whose term of service will expire on the third Monday of April next after such election. In case of a failure to hold such election at the time above specified, the election may take place at any stated or special meeting thereafter.

### ARTICLE V.—ELECTION OF OFFICERS

SEC. 1. At their stated monthly meeting in April in each year, the Board of Governors shall elect, by ballot, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, who shall all hold office for the term of one year next after their election, and until their respective successors shall be elected and accept office.

SEC. 2. In case the Board shall fail to elect any officer on the day above specified the election may take place at any stated or special meeting thereafter.

SEC. 3. The Board may at any time elect one or more honorary Vice-Presidents.



## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE VI.—PRESIDING OFFICERS

The President, and in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings of the Governors. In the absence of the President and Vice-President, the Governors present shall appoint one of their own number to preside.

### ARTICLE VII.—THE TREASURER

SEC. 1. The Treasurer shall have the custody of all bonds, stocks, deeds and other papers and documents relating to the property of the Corporation, and of all moneys received for or belonging thereto, and shall open an account in the name of the corporation with such banks and trust companies in the City of New York, as may be approved by the Board and shall deposit all moneys therein immediately upon receiving them. He shall present each month to the Governors a report of the accounts of the Hospital for the preceding month and shortly after the close of each fiscal year shall present a similar report for such year.

SEC. 2. He shall cause to be kept such accounts as may be necessary to show properly the receipts, expenditures and financial condition of the Hospital, or as may be required by the Finance Committee. These accounts shall be open at all suitable times to the inspection of the Governors.

SEC. 3. He shall present each month to the Assistant Board a report of the current receipts and expenses of the Hospital for the preceding month.

SEC. 4. He shall pay moneys by authority of the Board of Governors or of the Executive Committee and is authorized to buy and sell securities and other property with the approval of a majority of the Finance Committee and not otherwise.

SEC. 5. He shall have the custody of the corporate seal, to be used only under the authority of the Board, or of the Executive Committee, except on satisfaction pieces of mortgages, upon which the Treasurer is authorized to affix the seal when any such satisfaction piece has been duly signed by the President.

SEC. 6. All bonds, stocks and other invested securities and evidences of debts shall be kept, as the Board may direct, either in the vault of a Safe Deposit Company, to be taken in the name of the Hospital, or with the duly incorporated Trust Company, located in the City of New York, upon a receipt from such Trust Company, holding itself responsible for the safe keeping of such securities. In either case access to said securities shall be had only by the Treasurer, when accompanied by a member of the Finance Committee, or in the absence of the Treasurer by any two members of the Finance Committee. A record of each visit shall be kept in a book provided for that purpose, stating over the signature of the visitors all withdrawals or changes made in said securities, and when no changes are made the object of the visit.

### ARTICLE VIII.—THE SECRETARY

SEC. 1. The Secretary shall give notice of and attend all meetings of the Governors, take minutes of the proceedings thereat, and transcribe them in a book provided for that purpose, and attest the same.

SEC. 2. He shall give immediately notice of their elections or appointments to all Governors, officers and members of committees and to the Surgical Staff. He shall prepare the Annual Report of the Governors and attend to its publication.

### ARTICLE IX.—STANDING COMMITTEES

SEC. 1. There shall be the following Standing Committees of the Board:

Executive Committee.  
Committee on Finance.  
" on Law.

Committee on Nominations.  
" on Supplies.  
" on care of Buildings and on Repairs.  
" on Nurses.  
Inspecting Committee.  
Auditing Committee.  
Committee on Social Service.

SEC. 2. The President annually, at the stated May meeting, unless it be ordered otherwise by the Board, shall appoint all the Committees.

### ARTICLE X.—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SEC. 1. This Committee shall consist of nine Governors, including *ex officio*, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Chairman of the Committee on Supplies, Chairman of the Committee on Nurses and Secretary of the Assistant Board.

Three shall constitute a quorum.

It shall have the general charge over the Hospital during the time intervening between the regular Meetings of the Board of Governors.

It shall keep records of all its Meetings and shall submit them for confirmation to the Board of Governors at its next regular meeting.

SEC. 2. Its Meetings shall be held at least once a month at such time as may be provided by its rules.

SEC. 3. It shall audit and examine the accounts of the Superintendent and authorize such repairs and disbursements as may from time to time be necessary and shall draw drafts in favor of the Superintendent upon the Treasurer therefor. Such drafts, except for the monthly pay roll and supplies, shall not exceed \$500 without authority of the Board of Governors and must be signed by two members of the Executive Committee and when received by the Treasurer will authorize him to remit to the Superintendent the amount called for thereon.

SEC. 4. The following shall be the order of business at regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Reading the minutes.  
Reading the minutes of the Assistant Board.  
Reading the minutes of the Surgical Board and communications from the Chief Surgeon.  
Report of the Superintendent.  
Report of the Committee on Nurses.  
Miscellaneous business.

### ARTICLE XI.—COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

This Committee shall consist of five Governors including the President and Treasurer *ex officio*. Its duties shall be to advise with and assist the Treasurer, and to control all investments.

### ARTICLE XII.—COMMITTEE ON LAW

This Committee shall consist of three Governors, and the President *ex officio*. It shall advise the Board as to any legal question submitted to it. It shall have charge of the prosecution and defence of all suits to which the Hospital may be a party.

### ARTICLE XIII.—COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS

This Committee shall consist of five Governors, including the President and Secretary *ex officio*. All nominations to fill vacancies in the Board of Governors shall be referred to it, and at the next regular meeting of the governors it shall report such name or names as it may deem best for election.



## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE XIV.—COMMITTEE ON SUPPLIES

This Committee shall consist of five members who shall have the direction and supervision of the purchase of all articles and stores for the Hospital.

### ARTICLE XV.—COMMITTEE ON CARE OF BUILDING AND ON REPAIRS

This Committee shall consist of two members and the President *ex officio*. It shall have oversight and care of the buildings, and have charge of all repairs.

### ARTICLE XVI.—COMMITTEE ON NURSES

This Committee shall consist of five Governors and the President and Chief Surgeon *ex officio*. The latter shall have no vote.  
It shall have general supervision over the Nurses and their work.  
Three shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE XVII.—AUDITING COMMITTEE

This Committee shall consist of two members, who, shortly after the close of each fiscal year, shall examine and check the bonds, stocks, mortgages or other securities or evidences of value owned by the Hospital and shall also have the accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent for the last fiscal year examined and checked by certified public accountants; and shall thereafter report to the Board the result of such accounting with its recommendations.

### ARTICLE XVIII.—INSPECTING COMMITTEE

SEC. 1. This Committee shall consist of two Governors for each month, but no two Governors shall serve for two successive months. It shall inspect all the Hospital buildings, visit the wards, service rooms, and laboratories and shall examine as to the cleanliness and order of all parts of the Hospital and grounds.

SEC. 2. It shall enter its report and suggestions in a book, which book shall be laid before the Executive Committee at its next regular meeting.

### ARTICLE XIX.—COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL SERVICE

This Committee shall consist of five Governors and the President and Chief Surgeon, *ex officio*. The latter shall have no vote. It shall have general supervision over the Social Service Department. Three shall constitute a quorum.

### ARTICLE XX.—ASSISTANT BOARD

SEC. 1. The Domestic affairs and concerns of the Hospital shall be managed by the Assistant Board, appointed in accordance with the Charter, and composed of twenty-five Ladies. It shall have general supervision over the domestic management of the Hospital, subject to the approval of the Board of Governors.

SEC. 2. It shall nominate to the Board of Governors members to fill vacancies among its number, shall enact By-Laws for its own government, shall elect annually a Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer and shall appoint its Committees, which Committees shall report to the Assistant Board. It shall fix from time to time the number of members of which each Committee shall consist.

SEC. 3. It may report to the Board of Governors at their Regular Monthly Meeting any matters upon which it may desire to inform the Board, or upon which action may be desired.



## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE XXI.—EXECUTIVE STAFF

The Board of Governors shall appoint a Superintendent and such Assistants as the Board may deem necessary for the service of the Hospital and also a Directress of Nurses, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the Board or of the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE XXII.—CONSULTING STAFF

SEC. 1. There shall be four or more Consulting Surgeons and Consulting Physicians. They may be consulted on any important case by any member of the Attending Staff.

SEC. 2. Consultants shall have the privilege of sending patients to the private and semi-private rooms of the Hospital when available, and shall have the assistance of members of the House Staff.

### ARTICLE XXIII.—SURGICAL BOARD

SEC. 1. The Surgical Board shall consist of the Chief Surgeon, who shall be President of the Board, the Attending Surgeons and the Head of the Pathological Department.

SEC. 2. The Surgical Board shall have general supervision under the direction of the Chief Surgeon of all matters pertaining to the Surgical, Medical and Laboratory work of the Hospital and of the Out-Patient Department. It shall recommend subject to the approval of or at the request of the Chief Surgeon and subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, rules for the internal management of the Hospital so far as the Surgical, Medical, Pathological and all Laboratory Staffs are concerned, provided the rules shall not conflict with the rules and regulations established by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 3. Should a member of the Hospital Staff be insubordinate or otherwise behave in any way prejudicial to the best interests of the Hospital or welfare of the patients, the Chief Surgeon or any Attending Surgeon may suspend such member and shall report the fact of and the reason for such suspension to the Chief Surgeon and to the Executive Committee and shall notify the Superintendent.

### ARTICLE XXIV.—CHIEF SURGEON

SEC. 1. There shall be a Chief Surgeon in charge of the surgical work of the Hospital who shall be appointed by the Board of Governors and as such Chief Surgeon he shall be the chief head of the Gynecological, the Obstetrical, the Pathological, the Special Clinics Department and the Out-Patient Departments of the Hospital, and subject to the Board of Governors and the Executive Committee he shall have full charge and management of the Surgical Staff, of the surgical work of the Hospital and of the above Departments, including the assignment of patients.

SEC. 2. He shall have the control of the clinical material of all the Departments and may select from this material whatever may be necessary for his own use in the Hospital, and subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, he may make use of the clinical material of the Hospital for teaching purposes.

SEC. 3. The Board of Governors may appoint an Assistant Chief Surgeon who shall perform such services as the Chief Surgeon shall require and in the absence of the Chief Surgeon shall assume, during his absence, all the powers and duties of the Chief Surgeon.

SEC. 4. In case of expected absence, if no Assistant Chief Surgeon has been appointed, the Chief Surgeon shall have power to appoint as Acting Chief Surgeon, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, one of the Attending Surgeons, who shall assume during his absence all the powers of the Chief Surgeon.



## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE XXV.—ATTENDING STAFF

SEC. 1. The Attending Staff shall consist of

The Chief Surgeon.

The Assistant Chief Surgeon, if any.

Not less than three nor more than ten Attending Surgeons of which the Obstetric Surgeon shall be one.

Not less than three nor more than ten Junior Attending Surgeons of which the Junior Obstetric Surgeon shall be one,

Not less than three nor more than ten Adjunct Assistant Surgeons.

SEC. 2. Adjunct Assistant Surgeons shall attend as Chiefs of Clinic in the Out-Patient Department on such days as may be designated by the Chief Surgeon.

SEC. 3. The members of the Attending Staff shall at all times throw their entire influence in favor of the Hospital, and shall have no connections with other Hospitals which require divided loyalty.

SEC. 4. Members of the Attending Staff and of the Departments referred to in Article XXVII shall be nominated by the Chief Surgeon and appointed by the Board of Governors.

SEC. 5. There shall be an age limit of sixty-three years for members of the Attending Staff. This age limit shall not apply to the office of Chief Surgeon.

### ARTICLE XXVI.—LEAVES OF ABSENCE OR VACATIONS

In case a leave of absence from regular service or a vacation is desired by any member of the Attending Staff or of the House Staff, or by the Head or Assistant Head of any Department referred to in Article XXVII a request for such leave must be made in advance (preferably at least a week in advance) upon a form provided for that purpose. Each request, if granted, shall bear the approval of the Chief Surgeon and of a member of the Executive Committee, and should a substitute be necessary, the name of a substitute, qualified to act and who has signified his willingness to act for the absentee during his leave of absence. Each request, if granted, should bear also a statement signed by the Superintendent that the Superintendent's office has been duly notified in writing of the proposed leave of absence.

### ARTICLE XXVII.—DEPARTMENTS

SEC. 1. There shall be

A Gynecological Department.

An Obstetrical Department.

A Pathological Department.

A Special Clinics Department, which shall consist of the Special Clinics of Urology, Gastro-Entrology, Radio-therapy and Orthopedics.

An Out-Patient Department.

SEC. 2. Each of these Departments shall have a Head, who shall be subject to the Chief Surgeon. If, however, the Chief Surgeon shall act as Head of any of the Departments, no other Head of that Department need be appointed.

SEC. 3. All employees in all Surgical Departments shall be subject to the discipline of the Hospital.

### ARTICLE XXVIII.—REGISTER AND REQUISITIONS

SEC. 1. Members of the Attending Staff and Heads and Assistant Heads of Departments referred to in Article XXVII on arrival at or departure from the Hospital shall note the hour of their arrival and departure in a record kept for that purpose.



## BY-LAWS

SEC. 2. Whenever, in the opinion of a member or members of the Surgical Board, any instrument, apparatus, medical work, or other article shall be thought necessary for use in the Hospital, the name of the article required, and the name of the surgeon or surgeons making the requisition, shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose in the Superintendent's office, and no outlay for the purposes above named shall be made until the requisition shall be approved by the Chief Surgeon and shall be authorized by a member of the Executive Committee.

### ARTICLE XXIX.—COURTESY STAFF

Invitations shall be extended each year by the Executive Committee or by the Board of Governors upon recommendation by the Chief Surgeon to not more than fifty Surgeons skilled in Gynecology or Obstetrics, who shall have the privilege of sending patients requiring treatment for diseases peculiar to women or obstetrical cases, to the private rooms of the Hospital, and of treating and operating upon the patients sent by them, subject to such conditions as the Board of Governors may, from time to time, determine.

### ARTICLE XXX.—APPOINTMENTS

Members of the Attending Staff, Members of Departments referred to in Article XXVII, Members of the Consulting Staff and of the Courtesy Staff, shall be appointed annually in the month of April, and shall hold office, subject to the pleasure of the Board of Governors.

### ARTICLE XXXI.—Endowed Beds

SEC. 1. The Board of Governors may fix amounts which when paid shall entitle the donor to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the Hospital, subject, however, to such rules and regulations for the admission, treatment and discharge of patients as are now or shall be hereafter prescribed by said Board.

SEC. 2. Where such nomination is accorded during life, or in perpetuity, the amount paid therefor shall be kept invested in income-producing securities until the privilege may lapse by the death of the donor or otherwise.

SEC. 3. A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle the donor and the donor's successors if either of them is or is acting for, a corporation or association, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the Hospital for a period not to exceed ninety days of occupancy in any one year.

SEC. 4. A gift of \$10,000 shall entitle an individual donor and his or her successor, if acting only as an individual and not for a corporation or association, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the Hospital.

SEC. 5. A gift of \$5,000 shall entitle an individual donor and his or her successor, if acting only as an individual and not for a corporation or association, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy free of charge one bed in the common wards of the Hospital for a period not to exceed ninety days of occupancy in any one year.

SEC. 6. A gift of \$300 shall entitle the donor, for a period of one year, to nominate from time to time a patient to use and occupy one bed in the common wards of the Hospital free of charge for a total of sixty days.

SEC. 7. All endowed bed privileges are subject to the Rules and Regulations governing the admission, treatment and discharge of patients.



## BY-LAWS

SEC. 8. Contributions to the endowment fund of free beds, as above provided for, may be made by instalments, when the donor shall, in writing, so notify the Treasurer at the time of each payment. So long as the instalments so paid in shall not equal the sums required under the preceding sections, the amount received shall constitute a portion of the Partly Endowed Bed Fund, the income of which shall be used for the payment of the current expenses of the hospital, and no privileges shall accrue to the donor.

SEC. 9. The Board of Governors shall have power in their discretion to make, under special and exceptional circumstances, such other arrangements (temporary or permanent) as to endowed beds as they may deem best calculated to promote the objects for which the Hospital was established and is now being maintained.

SEC. 10. Certificates of the right to nominate patients to use and occupy beds free of charge shall be issued in such form as the Board of Governors may prescribe and when extending over a period of more than one year, shall be signed by the President or Vice-President and Treasurer, who shall affix the seal of the Corporation.

SEC. 11. If a donor of an endowed bed desires to appoint a successor to nominate patients to occupy such bed, the donor must so state in writing by will or otherwise, and notice of such change shall be given the Hospital within three months.

## ARTICLE XXXII.—AMENDMENTS

No alteration or amendment of these By-Laws shall be made unless notice shall be given at a previous regular meeting of the Board of Governors. A copy of any proposed alteration or amendment shall be mailed to each member of the Board at least three days prior to the meeting at which action thereon may be taken.
