THE WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

Founded in 1855 through the efforts of J. Marion Sims, M.D.; incorporated in 1857.

The Woman's Hospital has the distinction of being the first institution in the world established by Women "for the treatment of diseases peculiar to women and for the maintenance of a Lying-In Hospital."

Its first site was at Madison Avenue and 29th Street, where a building was rented, equipped for forty patients and opened on May 4, 1855.

Twelve years later a building to accommodate seventy-five patients and the necessary staff of officers and nurses was built on land granted by the City, bounded by Park and Lexington Avenues and 49th and 50th Streets, and was opened for patients on October 12, 1867. A second building similar to the first was added in 1877 providing increased accommodations for patients and improved facilities for surgical work and investigation.

On the Lexington Avenue site the work of the hospital was continued for thirty-five years. In 1902 the property was sold and the hospital closed temporarily during the erection of its new building on Cathedral Heights.

The present hospital building was completed and opened for patients on December 5, 1906.

The Nurses' Home, built largely through the generosity of the late Mrs. Morris K. Jesup on land given by the late Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, was completed in December, 1914.

The Thompson Building, built and equipped by the late Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, was officially opened on December 9, 1915. This building provided the hospital with extensive pathological laboratories, ten additional private rooms, two additional operating rooms and accommodations for the Out-Patient and the X-Ray Departments.

The Out-Patient Building and an extension to the X-Ray Department were completed and opened for patients on March 13, 1929.

**EIGHTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
WOMAN'S HOSPITAL IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK**

The Board of Governors of the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York presents the following reports from the several departments of the Hospital for the year ending December 31, 1944.

During the year 2,838 ward patients received a total of 35,070 days care in the hospital. The cost of this service amounted to \$279,760.25 while we received from these patients able to contribute towards the cost of their care a total of \$122,318.49; therefore 56% of the ward service was free.

In the Out-Patient Department 6,926 patients made a total of 30,216 visits to the Clinics. The cost of maintaining this service amounted to \$64,056.80 while the fees collected from patients able to pay totaled \$21,444.64.

In the Social Service Department 1,889 cases were cared for and 270 referred to outside social agencies.

The NET COST of the charitable activities of the Hospital for the year amounted to \$199,953.92.

Total current receipts from all sources amounted to \$661,725.54 and total current expenses to \$685,646.90 with an excess of current expenses over current revenue of \$23,921.39 for the year.

The principal needs of the Hospital are:

Larger General Endowment

Funds for Scientific Research

Endowment of \$10,000 for the Surgical Library and Record Room

Funds for Emergency Treatments for Needy Cases

Looking toward the future and for its protection, the Hospital has purchased from the National Academy of Design a plot of land facing on Amsterdam Avenue at 109th Street and Cathedral Parkway, which adjoins its property, and it is hoped that it will be able to raise sufficient funds to build on the property a pavilion for private and semi-private patients, as the present facilities are inadequate for the expanding needs.

ACCOUNTANTS' CERTIFICATE

We have examined the Balance Sheet of Woman's Hospital in the State of New York as at December 31, 1944 and the related Statement of Income and Expenses for the year ended on that date. In connection therewith, we reviewed the accounting procedures of the Hospital and examined accounting records and other evidence in support of the financial statements. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances except as herein indicated, and included all procedures we considered necessary, which procedures were applied by tests to the extent we deemed appropriate in view of the system of internal control.

The segregation of investments shown in the Balance Sheet, as between, respectively, unrestricted funds and restricted funds, is in accordance with a segregation made by the Board of Governors of the Hospital.

We did not review the provisions of legacies or the observance of such provisions.

We did not confirm unpaid principal or interest by direct communication with mortgagors.

In accordance with the established practice of the Hospital, the accounts do not reflect amounts of inventories of materials and supplies and of accrued interest receivable at the beginning and end of the year; nor do they reflect any provision for depreciation of Hospital properties and equipment or of real properties held as investments.

In our opinion, subject to the preceding paragraphs, the accompanying Balance Sheet and related Statement of Income and Expenses with the footnotes appearing thereon, fairly present the financial position of the Hospital as at December 31, 1944 and the results of operations for the year ended on that date, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and practices, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present herewith the Report of the Superintendent for the year 1944.

The work of the past year shows an increase over 1943 in the number of In-Patients and Out-Patients cared for, but a decrease in Patient Days Care.

In addition, 5 of the Personnel received 92 days care.

Births totaled 2,187, a decrease of 25 from last year, and included 20 pairs of twins.

The Out-Patient Department admitted 6,936 patients who made a total of 30,216 visits, an increase of 1,374 visits over 1943.

The Report of the Treasurer shows an increase in Earnings of \$41,937.04, an increase in Donations of \$4,317.17, a decrease in Income from Investments of \$2,604.80 with a net increase in Current Revenue of \$37,731.44 and an increase in Current Expenses of \$42,836.61 as compared with the previous year.

Current Revenue for 1944 totaled \$661,725.54 and Current Expenses totaled \$685,646.93 with a resultant excess of Current Expenses over Current Revenue of \$23,921.39.

The Babies' Alumni added 743 new members and contributed \$3,485.37 towards the cost of caring for ward mothers and babies.

In May, the Blood and Plasma Bank was put into operation and has rendered invaluable service.

Other improvements made during the year included additional lavatory facilities for Patients and Visitors on the 2nd floor.

Installation of Fluorescent Operating Room Lights.

A new Cauterodyne for Operating Room.

An additional Davidson Incubator for premature infants.

Ventilation of space used when admitting ward visitors.

Replacement of Water Storage Tank on Nurses' Home Room.

The Assistant Board provided from their Special Fund for the re-furnishing and redecorating of the Nurses' Reception Room.

The usual repairs and renovations were made to keep the plant and buildings in good operating condition.

We continue to be greatly indebted to Mrs. Taft and her Aides for the time and effort, a total of 2,063 hours, given to the Hospital Library. During the year 12,573 books and magazines, an increase of 738 over 1943, were loaned to patients and personnel.

Our thanks are due to the Red Cross and other Volunteer Aides, under the direction of Mrs. Robert G. Page, who have continued to render services without which we would have been obliged to considerably curtail our activities. A total of 33,142 hours service was given during the year, an increase of 4,764 over the previous year.

In May, the Superintendent and Record Librarian attended the annual meetings of the Hospital Association of New York State and the Association of Medical Record Librarians in Buffalo, and in June the Pharmacist attended the meeting of the New York State Pharmaceutical Association in Syracuse.

Continued shortages of supplies and personnel have made operation of the Hospital increasingly difficult and I wish to express my appreciation of the faithful and efficient services rendered during the year by my Assistants, Department Heads and Personnel. Our new Director of Nursing, Miss Witham, particularly deserves commendation for the quiet and efficient manner in which she has taken hold and carried on the work of her department in spite of many handicaps.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF SURGEON

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor of presenting the Annual Report of the Surgical Department for the year 1944.

During the past year, there have been 1,975 admissions to the ward and private gynecologic services. Two thousand and seventy patients were operated upon.

On our obstetric service, 2,206 ward and private patients were delivered.

One hundred and forty-seven patients were treated with radium, bringing the total number of patients treated since radium was made available in 1919, to 4,585.

Six thousand, nine hundred and thirty-six patients made 30,216 visits to our Out-Patient Department for examinations and treatments.

In our Pathological Department, 45,029 clinical and surgical pathological examinations were made.

Of the patients referred to our Roentgenologic Department, 1,016 were for diagnosis and 166 were for treatment. In the department, 3,478 diagnostic and therapeutic procedures were carried out.

The Staff of our Anesthesia Department administered 4,028 anesthetics to our gynecologic and obstetric patients.

Through the personnel in charge of our Special Clinics, many Out-Patient Department and ward patients have had the benefit of expert advice as to diagnosis and treatment. Work in the Special Clinics may be summarized as follows:

Our Pediatric Staff has supervised the care and feeding of all newborn infants and has conducted our Pediatric Follow-up Clinics. During the past year, it was decided to limit the work in our Pediatric Follow-up Clinics to the care of babies who had unusual feeding problems or physical conditions requiring continued observation. Obstetric patients who have normal infants have been encouraged to take advantage of help provided by the Department of Health Baby Clinics. During the year 346 babies were brought back for 440 visits to the Pediatric Follow-up Clinics.

Miss Bernadette Hanna, Director of the Record Department, deserves great credit for her efforts to be certain that the completion and filing of our hospital records are kept up to date. Work in this department has been seriously handicapped by numerous changes in personnel. End

results of treatments of all patients have been audited by Merwin-Davis.

Four Follow-up Clinics are conducted every week. Members of the Attending and Resident Staffs in charge of patients who are treated, operated upon or delivered in the hospital wards, attend these clinics to check upon the results of their work.

During 1944, 1,853 patients made 3,774 visits to our Gynecologic Follow-up Clinics and 746 patients who had been delivered made 1,122 visits to our Obstetric Follow-up Clinics.

On July 24, 1944, Miss Edna Witham assumed her duties as Director of Nurses to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Grace Haycock. During the year it has been necessary to meet many problems arising from the shortage of nurses. Through the continued efforts of a much reduced nursing staff and a faithful group of volunteer aids, essential nursing care for our patients has been provided.

Results of the work in the various hospital departments are reviewed at Staff Conferences which are held twice per month.

In accordance with regulations of the Procurement and Assignment Service, the number of residents has been limited to eight instead of the previous eleven. However, we have been fortunate in maintaining a competent Resident Staff in spite of the shortage of candidates for such positions.

REPORT OF THE NURSING DEPARTMENT

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I hereby submit the following report of the Nursing Department for the year ending December 31, 1944:

Generally speaking, the nursing situation was not improved over last year. Marked shortages and constant turnovers in the general duty group continued to undermine standards and morale and to render even day to day planning precarious. Paramount among the reasons for the shortage was the drain on the nursing services of all hospitals to meet the needs of the armed forces. Lack of stabilization on the part of the staff found its answer in the sky-rocketing of the cost of living and demands for increased salary. In order to compensate for lack of domestic help at home to care for children or to be with husbands, specified days off duty were requested, usually weekends, as well as choice hours of the day for duty. In addition, those nurses who had husbands in service coming home unexpectedly on furlough left for long periods of time without notice. Private duty nursing eased somewhat the load of staff nursing by 4731 (12 hr.) nursing days and 2247 (8 hr.) nursing days.

According to a directive of the Procurement and Assignment Service of the War Manpower Commission last April 4, 1944, the minimum number of nurses per 100 patients per day in a hospital without a school of nursing should be 21.9 and the maximum 36.5. As of December 29, 1944, a typical day, our payroll showed 54 general duty nurses. Of these, only 36 were on the basis of 6 full 8 hour days per week; the rest were part time, anywhere from 4-7 hours daily. Of the 54 general duty nurses supposedly available for nursing care, 6 were ill, 2 were on vacation, 3 were on leaves of absence and 6 on days off leaving 37 actually on duty. On that day, the patient census was 189. According to the P. & A. figures we would need, in order to reach the maximum ratio allowed, 68.99 nurses instead of 37, while as for our comparison with the minimum ratio, which would not be commensurate to any degree with a quality type of nursing, we should have had 41.39 nurses. However, the supervisory positions with the exception of one, and all the Head Nurse positions remained filled which helped considerably. Major changes in nursing personnel were the resignations of Miss Grace E. Haycock, Director of Nursing for the past few years and those of Miss Virginia McKenna, a Head Nurse on "L" for about the same length of time and Miss Jean Ellis, Head Nurse in the Operating Room.

While some of this record may seem to be rather disquieting, we have been unusually fortunate in having our staff augmented by capable auxiliary workers both voluntary and paid. Patients, on being interviewed, usually expressed satisfaction and appreciation with care received and frequently had the highest praise, in addition, for this type

of worker. We are deeply grateful to the Red Cross and other volunteer workers without whose unfailing assistance we would not have been able to manage. More than ever before we have had to look for help to the semi-professional nursing groups such as the practical nurses and the baby nurses, not to mention the non-professionals such as the nurses' aides all of which required greater discrimination in assignment of duties and many extra hours of supervision. For example one of our needs was met when the sanction of the Surgical Board was obtained for practical nurses to administer certain medications under supervision of a registered professional nurse. Another was that registered professional nurses are in certain instances authorized to take the blood pressure of patients. In order to distinguish between all the various groups of nurses, the registered professional nurses wear an R.N. emblem on the left sleeve of the uniform.

During the period of most concentrated appeal for nurses for military duty, the War Manpower classifications of all registered nurses in the hospitals were changed to 4A, or essential at their posts for the duration of the war. There were, however, 58 resignations during the year and only 49 new appointees, and of the 49 appointees, 12 were part time.

At a period of acute shortage of suture nurses, Miss Jean Hall, one of the Assistant Directors of Nursing, volunteered to be assigned to the operating room. She remained there two months, October and November, during which the Director of Nursing took over Miss Hall's teaching duties with the pupil practical nurse program. This program, by the way, will be expanded next year to include not only more pupils from the Ballard School of the Y. W. C. A. but also a new affiliation with the Hospital for Joint Diseases. A re-inspection by a representative of the State Education Department is contemplated in early 1945.

A contract with St. Luke's Hospital has been drawn up stating the terms and conditions of the dietitian affiliation with Woman's Hospital. No form of written agreement as to the plan for clinical and theoretical teaching previously existed.

It is hoped that at the termination of all hostilities and with the resumption of more normal living, the post graduate courses for registered professional nurses may be reinstated. Another attempt will be made to establish an affiliating course in obstetrics for undergraduate or pupil nurses, pending approval of the State Education Department.

While the Post Graduate School is closed, some of the most commonly used books have been removed from the classroom and are in a more accessible book case in the office of the Director of Nursing. Members of the nursing staff are privileged to sign for and borrow them as needed.

A complete reorganization of the files of the nursing department was begun, the object being, economy of space and greater accessibility of records, etc. The new secretary-registrar, Mrs. Marie Carney, greatly assisted in this work and in general lightened the burden of the Nursing Office Staff.

Major changes in policies of the department were (1) the re-establishment of Supervisors' and Head Nurses' meetings (weekly). A member of the group was appointed each month to the duties of secretary to keep the minutes. (2) Monthly reports from each ward or floor were instituted soon thereafter in which the Head Nurse commented upon the general ward conditions for the month as well as any major changes in equipment, treatment or problems which arose. (3) Vacations for all employees in their second year were planned for the warm months of the year. Many new employees whose employment record reached the one year mark found their first vacations due them at the newly established vacation period. Two reasons are given for this change: (a) over the past few years it was found that employees whose vacations were always due them in the winter months frequently found reason to absent themselves for various lengths of time during the summer months as well. (b) Planning relief for vacations will be facilitated by enabling us to make reciprocal arrangements with nurses considerably in advance.

The Nursing Department wishes to express its wholehearted appreciation to the Board of Governors, the Assistant Board and the Committee on Nursing for the interest and suggestions offered from time to time.

To Mrs. Walbridge S. Taft, the Chairman of the Committee on Nursing, go my deepest personal thanks for her unfailing encouragement and support at all times.

It gives me great pleasure to acknowledge the splendid coöperation and inspiration received from both the Chief Surgeon and the Superintendent of the Hospital and his Assistant.

Finally, I wish to take this opportunity to express my profound gratitude to all the nurses who remained loyal and stuck to their posts.

REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor of submitting the annual report of the Social Service Department for 1944.

This year has brought further staff changes to our department, including that of Directorship following the resignation of Mrs. Mildred Maxwell, August 1, 1944. The Department lost a very fine Director and Medical Social Worker when Mrs. Maxwell left and we can only hope that the high standards she so ably set are being maintained.

While the severe economic burden has lifted for many of our patients, emotional burdens have increased with the progression of the war. Separation from loved ones makes illness a harder hurdle and worry has its direct effect on recovery. Some of our patients have faced the final separation this year that "killed in action" denotes and others the news of "missing." We attempted to help these patients by giving them individual sympathetic understanding which in some instances is all that we can offer but in other instances there are plans to be made, children to be placed, convalescent care to be arranged and other problems where we can definitely help.

With the large amount of publicity given the psycho-neurotic veterans and the removal of stigma that comes with better understanding, people are becoming much more cognizant of this type of illness. We feel this in the increased number of patients who came to us seeking referral to mental hygiene clinics. As some of these clinics are booked up for as much as seven or eight weeks ahead, we attempted to help our patients over the difficult waiting period by seeing them regularly.

Our number of unmarried mothers continues to increase and in addition to working with agencies that are directly caring for some of these patients, we have joined with other hospital social workers in furthering attention on a new problem facing this group of patients, namely, the so-called "bootleg adoptions." This traffic in babies carried on by individuals for profit involves a mother at a moment of stress from which point there is no turning back. We are doing all we can to protect our patients from "signing over" their unborn babies before they have reached a clear decision and are referring them to authorized agencies established for these purposes.

This year, our Hospital was represented on a committee composed of other hospital social workers, meeting under the auspices of the United Hospital Fund to carry out a request from our city colleges. These colleges require volunteer experience in a Social Service Department for students majoring in sociology and planning to enter graduate schools of social work. It was planned to centralize the project so that the experience could be uniform and within the limitations of young volunteers. We were able to give a student from Hunter College this experience.

May we take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation to the superintendent for the kind consideration he has always given us and to Mrs. Davis and the members of the Social Service Committee for their helpful advice and generous moral support.
