





## WOMAN'S HOSPITAL AND THE COMMUNITY

The photographs on the preceding pages illustrate progress and change, and reflect the ever-advancing trends in the practice of medicine. Woman's Hospital in the State of New York has served its community in the specialties of obstetrics and gynecology during the past ninety-four years. The Surgical Staff has maintained a position of world leadership in these specialties, and has carried out the hopes and dreams of Dr. J. Marion Sims, the founder of the Hospital.

The Woman's Hospital was opened in a small building at Madison Avenue and 29th Street in 1855. Twelve years later, in 1867, a large hospital, which set the standard for hospitals of its day, was opened on a block of land at Park and Lexington Avenues between 49th and 50th Streets, the present site of the Waldorf Astoria Hotel. The present Hospital, which was opened in 1906, reflected the best architectural thinking of the early twentieth century, and when it was opened it was hailed as a remarkable achievement in hospital construction.

The present Hospital building has now served the community for forty-four years. Land adjoining the Hospital to the west, bordering on Amsterdam Avenue, has been acquired for the erection of an addition. Before proceeding with this, however, it seemed wise to renovate the present building and accordingly the Board of Governors authorized the expenditure of \$400,000 for this purpose. This money is being raised through contributions by friends, former patients, and everyone interested in perpetuating the unusual and wonderful service that has been rendered to the women of New York City by this Hospital. A summary of the work accomplished during 1949 is contained in the director's report.

The year 1949 has been one of real progress at the Hospital.

The Board inaugurated in 1948 a three-year plan to bring the physical plant of the Hospital entirely up to date. We believe that the work done during 1948 and 1949 places our Hospital in first class condition for the basic care of the patient. Our program for 1950 will add to the comfort of our patients and to the attractiveness of the Hospital for all who come to it.

The greatest expense in 1950 will be the modernization of our heating system and the completion of our plumbing and wiring renewals and improvements.

New equipment is needed continually to accord with the latest surgical practice. Such equipment has been purchased, and will be purchased in the future whenever required.

It is vitally important that this great teaching Hospital, where such fine care is given to our patients, should always have the best kind of facilities to make this work most effective.

The cost of this essential program is great, and the Board believes the full cost should be amortized over a reasonable period, so that our endowment may not be depleted.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

We earnestly ask our many friends to contribute to the extent of their ability, both for the maintenance and improvement of the Hospital during 1950.

During this period of reconstruction, our nursing care of the patients has not only been maintained, but also improved.

Our Surgical Staff, under the able leadership of Dr. Aldridge, has kept our Hospital an outstanding institute, both for the care of the patient, and as a teaching Hospital.

Under Dr. Klicka as Director, the Hospital has functioned very efficiently and many improvements have been made in every department of the Hospital.

A constant scrutiny by the Board of reports on all sums spent in carrying on the work of the Hospital has meant that, with the complete support of Dr. Klicka, many economies have resulted while better service has been given to our patients.

Our thanks go to everyone employed at the Hospital who has shown unfailing interest and devotion to the Hospital.

Our able and interested Assistant Board has accomplished a vast amount towards improving the interior of the Hospital by redecorating many rooms. The delightfully decorated Nurses' Reception Room is an important example. Their Library Committee has brought reading matter and comfort to thousands of our patients. The recently formed Volunteer Committee will, we are sure, bring many new recruits to the ranks of our present Volunteers who have given many hours of essential service to our patients, for which we are very grateful.

During the year 4,870 books and magazines have been given out and 3,684 persons served. Respectfully submitted,







Our Hospital has a country-wide reputation for the fine care given to our patients, and as a teaching center for young surgeons.



## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The program of modernization of the Hospital that was planned and started during the last half of 1948 developed into full scale operation

during 1949.

The first major accomplishment for the year was the modernization of the two passenger elevators and the dumbwaiters. New cabs and door fronts were installed in the passenger elevators, and the mechanical elements were completely renovated. Their smooth performance and excellent appearance are greatly appreciated by all. The dumbwaiters servicing the pantries were rewired, new doors and electrical controls were installed and all mechanical aspects modernized.

Another major accomplishment was the complete renovation of the floor pantries. These were equipped with stainless steel steam tables, try racks and automatic dish washing machines. As a result, their efficiency of operation was much improved and their appearance enhanced.

The utility rooms on the private surgical floor (L) were renovated and all equipment was renewed. Wall space was better utilized by installing long stainless steel work tables with built-in sinks. New bedpan flushers which include steam jets for sterilization permitted the removal of the old bedpan sterilizers. The space previously occupied by these sterilizers was used for new cabinets which combined a warming area for blankets in the upper portion and a warm storage area for bedpans below. By rearranging the floor plan of the utility rooms it was possible to provide a toilet in each with a door leading into the corridor.

Considerable progress has been made in the two major renovation programs, that of renewing the old plumbing and the complete rewiring of the main building. In conjunction with the electrical work a new Consolidated Edison alternating current 3-phase, 60 cycle, 4 wire 120/208 volt service including service switch, metering equipment and main feeders between service switch and main distribution panel was installed. In addition a new alternating current main distribution panel and associated equipment was completed. The major portion of the hospital is now converted to alternating current and the total conversion can be expected early in the Spring of 1950.

Following the disastrous hospital fire in Illinois in the Spring of 1949, hospitals throughout the country were carefully inspected by the fire departments in their respective locales. The inspection of the Woman's Hospital revealed the need of many improvements to provide greater safeguards for our patients. Most of the violations pertained to the absence of sprinkler heads in the storerooms and laundry. Immediately on the receipt of these violations steps were taken to have them remedied and by the end of the year we were ready for our re-inspection, all rec-

ommendations having been complied with.

A new 6-roll ironer complete with canopy and exhaust fan and duct was purchased and installed in the laundry. This unit replaced a badly worn inefficient ironer that was approximately 40 years old. The locker room space used by the female laundry employees was replanned.

The operating suite was improved by the installation of explosion proof outlets in each operating room. The viewing balcony in the Sims operating room was raised approximately 40 inches and its appearance improved by installing a new stainless steel facing. The entire suite was painted.

By moving the nurses aides' lockers from Semi-private C to the 7th floor it was possible to relocate the patients' examining room in this area. New equipment was also installed. The room previously used as the examining room was converted into a visitors' room and appro-

priately furnished.

In December the nurses' reception room was completely redecorated. This was made possible by a gift of \$5,000.00 from Mrs. Roswell Miller in memory of her mother, Mrs. Andrew Carnegie, who had been an active member of the Assistant Board for many years. A committee of the Assistant Board selected a decorator and worked with him in this very successful and satisfying project. The nurses are very appreciative of their new room and find it a very pleasant and relaxing adjunct to their home.

A new patients' visitors' waiting room was set up on Semi-Private C, and new furnishings were placed in the waiting room of Semi-Private H.

New electric light fixtures were installed in the stairwells leading from the main to the sixth floor and both stairwells were completely repainted.

Electrically refrigerated drinking fountains were installed in the operating suite, O.P.D., main hospital corridor, and on all patient floors.

These have been well received by all.

During the Fall the exterior surfaces of the hospital and the nurses' home were washed. The effect has been dramatic as the hidden beauty of the building was revealed beneath the dirt that had accumulated over the years. The new appearance of the hospital has been favorably commented upon by patients, doctors, employees, and neighbors. In effect, it has given a "lift" to all.

After washing the hospital it was found that many areas of the stone work required repointing and consequently this was done on the entire northern exposure where as expected it was most necessary. It is planned to complete the necessary pointing on the southern exposure

during the Spring of 1950.

During the Spring of the year the building of the National Academy of Design was demolished inasmuch as it constituted a marked fire hazard, leaving the wall along 109th Street and a 50-foot portion on Amsterdam Avenue as a fence. The remaining portion of this property had been enclosed by a wooden fence for many years, and this was replaced with an anchor fence. An all season tennis court was laid in the northwest corner of the lot and was protected by lining the anchor fence with cedar paling. The tennis court has been gratefully appreciated by the resident and nursing staff for whose use it is reserved.

During the year the business office procedures were modernized. The accounting system was reorganized along the lines recommended by the American Hospital Association and the United Hospital Fund. New

monthly financial statements which included a more comprehensive picture of operations were prepared for the Board of Governors. A new National Cash Register accounting machine was purchased. It was first used to prepare the payroll and subsequently for all accounts payable. During 1950 it will be applied to inventory control. Methods of handling accounts receivable were improved with resulting better follow-up in delinquent accounts. As a result the loss from bad debts has been minimized. This has been aided to some extent by the services of a new employee in the O.P.D. whose primary responsibility is that of properly rating surgical patients referred to the wards for treatment. A new National Cash Register which accumulates statistics and prepares receipts was installed in the O.P.D. for better control of the cash receipts in that department.

I wish to express my appreciation for the faithful and efficient services rendered during the year by my assistants, department heads, and personnel; and finally, I welcome the opportunity to acknowledge the generous assistance and wholehearted support which I have received from

the Board of Governors and Surgical Staff.



The reduction in patient days in the face of a slight increase in admissions is due to the increasing acceptance of early ambulation of patients. TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor of presenting the Annual Report of the Surgical Department for 1949.

During the year there were 2,851 admissions to our ward and private gynecological service. On the obstetrical service, 2,763 ward and private patients were delivered. Two thousand, nine hundred and fifty-one patients were operated upon.

One hundred and forty-one patients were treated with radium since radium was made available in 1919, bringing the total number of patients treated to 5,282.

Seven thousand, seven hundred and forty-eight patients made 37,307 visits to our Out-Patient Department for examinations and treatments.

Of the patients referred to our X-ray Department, 1,513 were for diagnosis and 150 for treatment. In the department, 4,052 diagnostic and therapeutic procedures were carried out.

The staff of our Anaesthesia Department administered 5,318 anaesthetics to our obstetrical and gynecological patients.

In our hospital laboratory 60,079 examinations of clinical and surgical specimens were made.

Through the personnel in charge of our Special Clinics, many Out-Patient Department and ward patients have had the benefit of expert advice as to diagnosis and treatment. Work in the Special Clinics may be summarized as follows:

Three hundred and three babies were brought back for 395 visits to our Pediatric Follow-up Clinics. Admissions to this clinic are limited to our newborn babies who have unusual feeding problems or physical conditions which require continued observation. As in the past, all obstetric patients who have had normal infants are encouraged to take advantage of pediatric advice provided by the Department of Health Baby Clinics.

In order to promote satisfactory routines in our newborn infant nurseries, an official courtesy list of pediatricians was established during the past year. Courtesy privileges were extended to sixty-two qualified pediatricians.

On October 1, 1949, the period of training for the members of our regular resident staff was increased to thirty-six months. This includes six months of training in gynecological and obstetrical pathology. The pediatric residents provided through an affiliation with St. Luke's Hospital have given valuable assistance in the care and feeding of our newborn infants. During the past year, the following appointments in Pediatrics were made:

Dr. Herbert V. von Gal from January 1, 1949 to May 1, 1949.

Dr. Frank M. Ripberger from May 1, 1949 to November 1, 1949.

Dr. Ronald Maclean from November 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.

Results of work in the various hospital departments were reviewed at Staff Conferences which were held twice per month.

Four Follow-up Clinics are conducted every week. Members of the Attending and Resident Staffs in charge of patients who are treated, operated upon or delivered in the hospital wards, attend these clinics to check on the results of their work. During 1949, 1,218 patients made 4,138 visits to the Gynecologic Follow-up Clinics and of the patients who had been delivered 1,253 made 1,700 visits to our Obstetric Follow-up Clinics.

During the past year, 38,000 charts and abstracts were filed by our Record Department. This included filing of clinical records for new patients treated during the year and charts and abstracts consulted for research and scientific work.

Clinics to demonstrate our methods for treatment of various gynecological and obstetrical conditions were held for a joint meeting of the Boston, Philadelphia and New York Obstetrical Societies on April 12th, and for the Twenty-second Graduate Fortnight of the New York Academy of Medicine on October 21st. We were gratified by the unusually large attendance at both of these meetings and the interest shown in the programs which were presented.

During the year, our Surgical Staff conducted examinations in obstetrics and gynecology on two occasions for candidates attempting to qualify with the National Board of Medical Examiners for licenses to practice medicine.

Upon satisfactory completion of their services, the following members of the Resident Staff were granted diplomas:



## REPORT OF THE NURSING DEPARTMENT

TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present herewith the report of the Nursing Department for the year ending December 31, 1949:

The general nursing situation was definitely better in 1949 than in any previous year for some time. Fluctuating shortages appeared from time to time on all shifts but were more sustained during the 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight period. In spite of this, it can be said that nursing care was accomplished more comfortably, with more attention to detail, and with a more serene effect on patients. To use one factor as an illustration, the time consuming but all important procedure of evening care, in addition to afternoon care, was re-established for all patients.

The nurse turnover was still high, as represented by 104 appointees and 87 resignations, of which in each group some were part-time. A 5-day week has been planned for 1950, which is hoped to create a stabilizing effect. A comparison with last year of our present proportion of professional and non-professional people employed in the Nursing Department reveals the following:

It will be noticed, upon comparison, that the percentage of professional workers increased in 1949. This was due to the fact that we were able to fill more of our professional worker vacancies. These vacancies in 1948 were in many instances temporarily filled with nurses' aides or practical nurses who do not come under the professional status, but who were available when registered nurses were not.

Two new key positions were created: An Assistant Head Nurse (Miss Henrietta Van Vorst) on Private A to assist with administrative supervision on the east wing, and a Clinical Instructor (Miss Anne Falkenstein) to take over the teaching program in the Nursing Department. The necessity for the appointment of someone to set up and outline a modern orientation and teaching program for graduate nurses

and others had long been felt. With the opening of an ambitious program in the Personnel Health Service it was apparent that the teaching program of the pupil practical nurses would have to be carried by someone else than the Assistant in the Nursing Office whose responsibility it was to carry the Health Service. The Clinical Instructor was assigned the following duties: orientation of all new registered nurses and licensed practical nurses; teaching, supervision, and guidance of the pupil practical nurse affiliating program in obstetrics; teaching periodically, of groups of women to prepare them for nurses' aid duties; supervision and revision in techniques. Two rooms were equipped and set aside in the Nurses' Home as classroom and demonstration rooms. It was also planned that the clinical instructor be responsible for the staff education program, but before much work could be done, the pupil practical nurse affiliation was terminated on November 27, 1949, under amicable circumstances, and the immediate need for a clinical instructor was over. The position was temporarily discontinued. Two other general staff nurse positions were created, one each for 4:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight, and 12:00 midnight to 8 a.m., as floaters for emergency nursing care.

A great deal of new equipment and furnishings throughout the Hospital made an immeasurable amount of difference to the comfort, convenience, and efficiency of the nurses and other workers. Reference here is made to the increased linen supply, the new lighting system, the change over from D.C. to A.C. resulting in more fans being made available where needed, the new Venetian blinds in the nursery, the new dish washing machines, and other kitchen equipment, the new desks and chairs, the beautician service, the new filing equipment in the clinic, the new elevators, and many other changes too numerable to mention. The most spectacular change of all was the beautiful newly renovated reception room, done in memory of Mrs. Andrew Carnegie, formerly a member of the Assistant Board. Mrs. George W. Crawford, Chairman of the project to do over the room, deserves a great vote of thanks from the nurses for her interest and efforts in securing such magnificent results.

Changes in techniques and procedures continued. Among the changes were the termination of the use of Cresol, in favor of Zephiran, and the general use of bland soap instead of green soap. New sterilizers and bedpan flushers contributed to some changes in terminal disinfection of certain types of equipment.

On January 9, 1949, the following salary changes took place:

An additional increment of \$5.00 was allowed to all general duty nurses on all shifts who had been here 18 months or longer. This included the nurses in the operating room and the delivery room.

An additional increment of \$5.00 was allowed to all nursery nurses and practical nurses on all shifts who had been here for 12 months or longer. Laundering of uniforms was made free.

Nurses' aides were all raised to \$130 plus uniforms and laundering of uniforms.

Increments based on merit were allowed up to \$140.

Pantry maids were all raised to \$120 plus uniforms and laundering of uniforms.

Ward helpers were all raised to \$125 plus uniforms and laundering of uniforms.

Increments based on merit were allowed up to \$135.

On May 15, 1949, room rents for supervisors were reduced from \$45 per month to \$40.

In closing, I wish to extend the thanks of the nursing staff to the Assistant Board whose parties and teas we have enjoyed so much. The guidance of the Nursing Committee has been most helpful in time of need. My deep appreciation to Mrs. Walbridge S. Taft for her wise counsel and support. To Dr. Klicka, I wish to convey my respect and appreciation of his able direction. I am grateful to Dr. Aldridge for the continued support he has shown the nursing staff. And, to the nursing staff, my fellow-workers, my pleasure and appreciation in their loyalty and cooperation.

During the year, the Social Service offices have been repainted. This is a great improvement and the rooms have been made additionally cheerful and attractive by new curtains and the hanging of suitable pictures.

Note 1. The assets of hospital properties and equipment represents the value of an appraisal by the Equitable Appraisal Company as at May 23, 1925, plus additions from that date to December 31, 1942, at cost. Additions subsequent to the latter date, down to December 31, 1948, have been charged to expense, as have been certain additions of equipment during the year 1949. Within the year 1949, the hospital adopted a program of rehabilitation and modernization of the hospital's buildings, building appurtenances and certain major departmental equipment, to cost \$400,000.00. During the year 1949 there was expended on this project the sum of \$206,314.67. Because these expenditures are so extraordinary in amount, in the interest of presenting statements of operations in a manner that would more accurately reflect the operations of each year, the procedure has been adopted of charging to expense the expenditures under this program at the rate of \$40,000.00 per annum. Accordingly, said amount has been charged to expense in the year 1949, and the balance of \$166,314.67 of such expenditures in the year 1949 is carried forward on the Balance Sheet as deferred expenses, to be written off in subsequent years.
