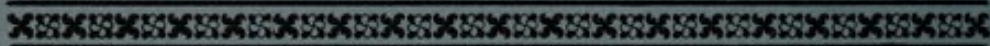

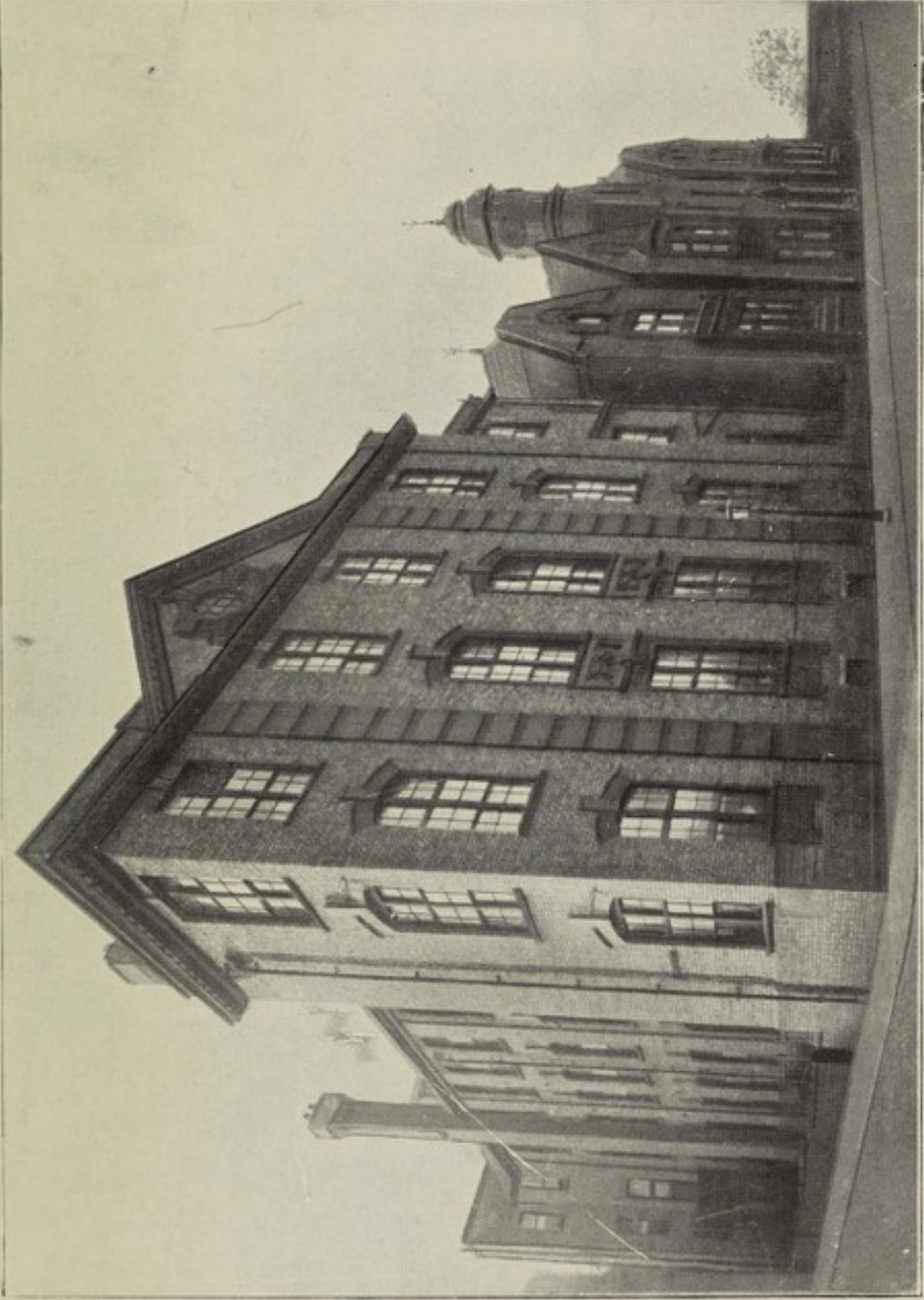

THE INSTITUTION is established for the relief of the Sick Poor of the Town and Neighbourhood of Warrington, and persons sustaining accidents.

Poor people attacked by any sudden indisposition will be immediately relieved without a recommendation ; but they must procure one by the next day to entitle them to continue as patients.

It is earnestly requested that personal inquiry be made into the cases of the patients recommended, and to insert the name of the street where they reside.

Life Governors who wish to have blank printed recommendation forms may be supplied by sending for them to the Infirmary.

Donors of not less than Twenty-five Guineas, and an Executor or Nominee of any person bequeathing One Hundred Pounds, become Life Governors.

The Dispensary

The Dispensary will be opened every day (Sundays excepted) at Nine o'clock in the Morning for dressing wounds ; and at Three in the Afternoon, when those who require a repetition of Medicines must apply.

Medical Attendance for general business will be given every day (Sundays excepted) at times arranged by the Board, and on Sunday in case of emergency.

Patients are required to deposit such sum with the Dispenser which will cover the cost of the bottles, &c., supplied, the same to be given back when the bottles, &c., are returned.

REPORT

OF THE

WARRINGTON INFIRMARY and DISPENSARY

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DECEMBER, 1941

The Board of Management submit their Report for the year 1941.

FINANCE.

The finances of the Institution have maintained the level set up in the previous year and again the income exceeds the expenditure, this year by £1,218 15s., which thus reduces the bank overdraft on the General Fund to £2,912 15s. 1d.

The expenditure, which is constantly increasing owing to the greater commitments of the medical services, has exceeded the previous year's amount by £6,047 14s. 2d. In considering this increase it must be taken into account the fact that more beds have been added to the bed complement of the Institution by bringing into use the Annexe at Daresbury Hall.

The Ministry of Health make certain grants for beds which are allocated for the use of military and civilian casualties.

Whilst the income provided is sufficient to meet the immediate needs of the Institution, it must be noted that part of this Income, which comes from the Ministry of Health, will cease after the War.

At the same time it must be pointed out that the demands on the Institution have increased so enormously that the accommodation for both in and out patients is now totally inadequate, with the result that the Staff is working under great difficulties, and efficient running and oversight is difficult to maintain.

Temporary arrangements have been made with the local authorities to assist in meeting these pressing needs but as soon as it is practicable, a careful survey must be made to ascertain by what means additional accommodation can be provided.

This hospital has required more bed accommodation for many years and for the size of the area served there should be at least 250 beds instead of 117 as at present, with more adequate accommodation for out patients.

This is a problem which requires serious consideration, especially in view of the proposed Nuffield Regionalisation Scheme which is in process of consideration all over the country. It is probable that after the War there may be many changes in the hospital system of the country and it is essential that this hospital should be in a position to meet the demands of any system, from whatever source it may come.

TRUSTEES.

Lieut.-Colonel Thomas Ridgway, Mr. Cyril F. Hill and Mr. John Inglis were appointed additional Trustees by the Governors at their last Annual Meeting.

WORK OF THE INSTITUTION

The work of treating the sick and suffering has continued steadily throughout the year and all departments have been kept extremely busy. Luckily, the hospital has not been called upon to deal with air-raid casualties like other nearby cities, but the state of emergency exists. There are, however, other demands made on the service which it is felt is performing a very useful and necessary part in the war effort of the country.

Comparison of the work done will be found on another page.

DARESBUY HALL

This Annexe Hospital was opened for patients on the 15th March and up to now has proved a valuable adjunct to the parent hospital. It has been the means of relieving the bed accommodation at this hospital and from all accounts, the patients have improved by their stay in this delightful place and also by the change of surroundings.

The Board are indebted to Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Hill for the very great interest they take in the running of this hospital.

THELWALL GRANGE CONVALESCENT HOME.

The alterations, &c., required in turning this house into a hospital have taken longer than was at first thought. Limitation of supplies, lack of labour, &c., has been the cause of the delay, but it must be remembered that the war demands must be first met before places such as this one can get the necessary supplies. It is, however, certain that the Convalescent Home will be opened in the near future as at the time of writing this report, the alterations and decorating are coming to a finish and the furnishing has now commenced.

The increased expenditure is partly accounted for by the additional staff necessitated by the increased bed accommodation which was provided at Daresbury Hall, by the increased cost of foodstuffs and supplies, and the higher salaries of the Nursing Staff, as approved by the Ministry of Health.

NEW LAUNDRY

The Board are in a position to state that the New Laundry will be in working order in the very near future. New Machinery, &c., has been obtained after a great delay owing to prevailing conditions.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Mr. J. R. Burgess, a member of the Board and House Committee for many years, died during the year and his loss is deeply regretted.

Councillor R. Ryder has been appointed to a seat on the Board.

MEDICAL STAFF.

The Board report with regret the death of Dr. H. Langdale, who was for many years associated with this hospital. Both as a House Resident and Honorary Physician, he gave splendid services to the patients who were sent to him for advice and treatment.

There were no changes on the active panel of doctors during the year, and the Board's thanks are once again tendered to them for the services which they have rendered to the patients.

NURSING HOME

The Home has now completed a full year's working since the alterations were made, and the use made of it is fairly satisfactory.

It is hoped that a comprehensive scheme in connection with the Nuffield Trust Fund will be started soon so that persons who are above the hospital scale, yet not able to pay full Nursing Home charges, will be able to take advantage of the Nursing Home by regular contributions payable either quarterly or half yearly in advance.

NURSING STAFF

During the year 10 Probationer Nurses have passed the State Final Examination and 11 Probationer Nurses have passed the State Preliminary Examination. Nine nurses have passed the Hospital Final Examination, and have received the Silver Badge of this Training School.

There is now in being a Nurses' Council which meets the Management side once a month to discuss items for the better working and comfort of the Nursing Personnel.

HOSPITAL SUNDAY FUND.

£496 4s. 4d. has been received from this source, an increase of £174.

A Service in the Parish Church was held on Hospital Sunday as a form of thanksgiving. The Right Rev. Bishop of Liverpool (Dr. David) preached the sermon and there was a large representative gathering at the Church. It is hoped that this service will become an annual event.

The Board thank Mr. J. L. Collin for his services during the year.

WORKPEOPLE'S INFIRMARY COMMITTEE

The net amount received from the above Committee was £18,395 10s. 5d., an increase of £2,102 2s. 11d. over the previous year. This is mainly due to the increased rate of the Contributory Scheme.

Owing to the large number of persons working in this area who are residents of other towns, a considerable sum of money is paid to other hospitals for the treatment of these members and their dependants.

The Board are thankful to the Workpeople's Committee for the great interest they take in the welfare of this hospital, also to the representatives who sit on the Board for their advice and assistance.

LADIES' LINEN GUILD

The grant for 1941 was £400, an increase of £150 over the previous year. Lady Rylands held a "Bring and Buy" Sale which was very successful and helped this fund considerably. The Board are grateful to the Officers, Collectors and Subscribers for their continued financial assistance.

LEAGUE OF HELP

The grant received was £150, the same as last year. The Board thank the members for their efforts, which must have taken a great deal of their spare time.

THANKS

The sincere thanks of the Board are tendered to the Ladies' Committee and all kind friends for their services and financial assistance to the Institution during the past year.

The Board pay a special tribute to the various staffs for the work which they have done during the past year, often under great difficulties owing to the lack of assistance.

The Christmas Festivities for the patients and staff whilst being greatly modified owing to war conditions were enjoyed and carried out at no expense to the General Fund.

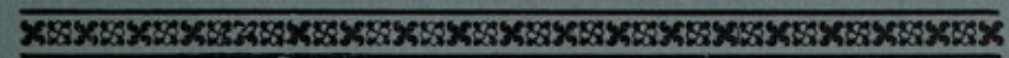
