#### OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

#### TO THE

#### Subscribers of West Cornwall Hospital, At the One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Annual Meeting, March 7th, 1934.

#### In Patients.

The sequence of records made year by year in the number of patients treated was broken last year —the second time only in the course of 11 years. There were 807 inpatients, and this is the next to the highest in the long history of the Hospital, the greatest number being 842 in the previous year, 1932. But the average stay was longer by just over a day, and the total number of days spent in Hospital was greater by 89.

The accommodation provides officially 50 beds. Last year the average number of beds occupied daily was 52.4. So that there still seems to be no limit to the demands which are being made upon the resources of hospitals. There was a period of welcome respite, during April and May, when for the first time the full accommodation was not occupied by six beds.

But this state of affairs did not last long. On November 10th, the peak was reached by 67 patients being in Hospital, which meant 17 over the ordinary accommodation, and a severe strain upon the Matron and her staff. For the month of November the average was 61.53. The overcrowding has been accentuated in the Men's Ward, where for months it has persistently obtained, and with a long waiting list reported. It caused the Committee to refer the question to their Building Committee, but their deliberations were overshadowed by the outlay that would be involved, and further consideration was deferred to the end of the financial year.

This overcrowding in the Men's Ward is partly due to road accidents, and those engaged in the adminstration of hospitals are very concerned that legislation does not enable institutions to be fully reimbursed in these cases.

It is more satisfactory, however, that the maximum payable under the Road Traffic Act by insurance companies has been increased from  $\pounds_{25}$  to  $\pounds_{50}$ , and that insurance companies will no longer be able to plead that a so-called "ex-gratia" payment to a patient does not render them liable to make a payment to the Hospital.

#### Surgical.

The surgical side of the work of the Hospital gives a record which has been unequalled. No fewer than 1,195 operations were performed—on in-patients, 532; and on outpatients, 663. The new theatre unit has been of much service. Gas and oxygen anæsthetic apparatus, and inhaling apparatus, were obtained through the generosity of MR. and MRS. SYDNEY BAZELEY, to whom the Committee are grateful for the gift of  $f_{100}$  for this most useful equipment and other special apparatus. A complete sterilising outfit has been installed and paid for—an important factor in the work of the Hospital which has been quite modernised.

#### Out-Patients.

Again record has to be made that the number of outpatients passing through the out-patient department has reached its lowest level. Last year the number was 194. As stated in previous reports, the decline here has been steady for a number of years, and comparatively recently the Committee discussed its questioned usefulness and its continuance on economic grounds. The Committee decided that no action should be taken for the present.

#### Opthalmic Department.

The Hospital has now a recognised opthalmic department, and DR. H. B. OWEN, D.S.O., who is an opthalmic surgeon of the institution, is conducting an outpatient opthalmic session every Monday morning. For this department, the Committee acknowledge with thanks the gift of apparatus by MR. DAVIS KEELER.

#### X-Ray.

Last year saw the completion of the programme of extensions and alterations which had been embarked upon, and which has been the means of meeting the more modern requirements, and the demands made upon the Hospital. With justifiable pride the Committee report that they have been able to pay for the cost of this scheme, which has provided West Cornwall with a most commodious X-Ray unit, and the finest equipment procurable. The only financial disability of the scheme is the  $\pounds 880$  adverse balance on the X-Ray apparatus fund.

The formal opening took place on June 13th. MR. R. A. COURTNEY, whose gift of  $\pounds$  5,000 made the extension possible, opened the main door of the X-Ray room with a commemoration key with which he was presented, and our President (MRS. W. E. T. BOLITHO) declared the new apparatus ready for use. The complete installation of a shock proof unit, with motor driven table; mobile equipment for radiography in the wards; a diathermy unit; and accessories for the developing room, cost  $\pounds$  2,075.

Although there was an available fund for this purpose of only f,1,000 at the time, the Committee, realising the urgency, felt that it was imperative to make this expenditure in order to obtain the finest equipment possible. This was entrusted to the Victor X-Ray Corporation, whom the Committee desire to congratulate upon their installation. No fewer than 702 patients have been dealt with in the course of the year, and 879 radiographs taken. It is impossible to compute in money the value of the new installation to the community which the Hospital serves, and the Committee are encouraged in the fact that the large expenditure has been justified, despite that there is still an adverse balance of £8 o on the X-Ray fund. With gratitude they beg to acknowledge gifts to this fund of a further  $f_{100}$ by Mr. R. A. COURTNEY,  $f_{21}$  by Mrs. SHIMMIN,  $f_{50}$  by Dr. and Mrs. Leslie,  $f_{5}$  by Mr. W. Craze (St. Ives),  $f_{5}$  by MRS. M. DUNN, £14 2S. 6d. by PENZANCE ROTARY CLUB, and f 2 2s. od. by the late ALD. RD. HALL.

The mobile X-Ray set, which was an innovation, has been a valuable adjunct to a most useful and efficient department. The Committee desire to especially acknowledge the urost valuable services which the Matron continues to render in this very important branch of the work of the institution. MISS RALPH has been responsible for the management and working of the new equipment, and with a great degree of technical efficiency. The last and recent report of the experts of the firm who installed it, stated that the apparatus was in excellent condition and working order.

#### Financial Administration.

In the previous annual report, mention was made of the reorganisation which was being undertaken of the whole financial administration of the Hospital. Mr. G. O. REDFEARN, F.C.A., (of MESSRS. WHITAKER & REDFEARN) undertook this task, with the result that the Committee are now able to place before the subscribers and public an account of income and expenditure based on the revised uniform system of hospital accounts laid down by King Edward's Hospital Fund for London (instead of a statement of receipts and payments as hitherto.) These will enable a closer examination of the financial position to be made, and accurate comparisions of analytical costs with similar institutions. To MR REDFEARN, the Committee desire to tender grateful thanks for the interest he has taken in the financial side of the work of the Hospital, and for the time and thought given to the introduction of the new system. As concerning the financial administration, the Committee report with pleasure of the election as honorary treasurer since the last annual meeting, of MR. R. W. SMITH, the District Manager for Cornwall of Barclays Bank, whose knowledge and ready assistance have been of inestimable value to their Finance Committee, and for the great benefit of the Hospital.

The statement of income and expenditure shows that the ordinary income totalled £6,924 5s. 1d. and the ordinary expenditure £6,835 14s. 2d., showing a credit on the year's working of £88 10s. 11d., and leaving the Hospital with a deficit of £158 0s. 5d. The extraordinary income was £831 14s. 3d., and the extraordinary expenditure £3,037 17s. 1d., an excess of extraordinary expenditure over extraordinary income of £2,206 2s. 10d.

#### The Passing of Friends.

The Committee regret the passing of MR. J. H. TONKING, who for many years had been a member of the Committee of Management; of subscribers in the persons of MRS. J. B. HADDON, COL. E. D. CAIRD, ALD. RD. HALL, MRS. FRANK HARVEY (Hayle), MISS JARVIS, and MR. N. T. WIALIAMS (St. Just); and also the death of MRS. PAYNTER, of Boskenna, a friend to the Hospital, and who initiated the X-Ray Fund.

#### Gifts.

During the year legacies received and acknowledged with gratitude were  $\pounds_{500}$ , Mrs. LAURA BEATRICE BRANWELL;  $\pounds_{100}$ , MISS MARIA BOLITHO BORLASE;  $\pounds_{30}$ , MISS ELIZABETH PENTREATH; and  $\pounds_{9-14}$ s. 9d. (balance of bequest), MISS G. B. WELLDON.

For a gift of land at Carbis Bay, in the sale of which the Hospital benefited by a third share, £52 75. 4d., the Committee are much indebted to MR. F. G. LING, of Carbis Bay.

#### Patients.

Of the  $f_{4,143}$  9s. 10d. received from all patient sources £1,729 6s. od. was contributed by the Hospital Saving Association for its members, or  $f_{312}$  gs. od. more than in 1932, and the largest amount received. For this 199 were in-patients, III out-patients, and 74 had X-Ray. This revenue was particularly valuable and materially assisted to lessen to £188 17s. 9d. the decreased receipts from patients compared with the previous year, due to fewer patients, but particularly to financial stringency. Many persons have been unable to satisfy a desire to make some payment to the Hospital for the benefit received, because of penury, and have accordingly had free treatment and been most grateful. But there still remain those who expect most things without any sacrifice on their part, and those who mislead by a voluntary offer of some small payment, and forget it all as they pass out of the portals of the place where they have had much benefit, and, in many instances, a renewed life.

But the Committee are encouraged by the knowledge of the great service the Hospital is giving to the community, and of the many letters of appreciation from paitents who reveal a deep sense of gratitude for what has been done for them.

#### Reduced H.S.A. Payments.

The Committee regret that the H.S.A. has notified them that as from January 1st last, there is to be a reduction of 1/- per day in the interim payment to the Hospital for services rendered to members. This is in consequence of the large amounts paid out in benefits by Groups in this area. With a re-organisasion in administration, in which the Hospital will have representation, it is hoped that the loss to the institution will not be eventually so serious as the

#### The Buildings.

Much thought has been given to the relaying of the main corridor floor, which is in such a bad state of repair that a new one will have to be provided. The rubber covering of the main stairway and landing of the first floor has been an acceptable improvement, and the installation of house telephones a boon. The interior decoration of the Nurses' Hostel has been carried out, as well as the painting of the Hospital externally. In connection with the maintenance of the buildings, the Committee acknowledge with thanks the excellent services MR. G. S. CURNOW has rendered as their Clerk of Works.

#### For Others.

The Committee are mindful of the many friends the Hospital claims. That no fewer than 194 persons, and 43 religious, social and educational bodies, made gifts in 1933, is an indication of a generous thought for others. To all these practical sympathisers many thanks.

The Hospital has no greater friend than its own President, who is constantly concerned with its being, and whose work through the Linen League alone affords a fine example of service for others. To the Mayor and Mayoress of Penzance (ALD. and MRS. J. W. MEEK), the Committee are sincerely indebted for their active personal interest-in visiting the sick and for other acts of kindness, and for the substantial contribution to the income of the Hospital by being instrumental in raising over £ 200. Mr. FRED WARD, of St. Mary's, Isles of Scilly, remains a constant friend. He made himself responsible for again a collection at the islands, and gave collections on the s.s. Scillonian. MR. MARTIN COCK, of St. Ives, did another invaluable service for the Hospital in organising a "Chain of pennies" at St. Ives and Carbis Bay. To them the Committee are most grataful, as well as to MRS. ALFRED BECKERLEG (Newlyn), and MRS. FRED LADNER (Mousehole), for flag day and pound day collections at Newlyn, Mousehole. and Paul; and to MISS D. STONE, of St. Buryan, who continues with the St. Buryan Operatic Society to render the Hospital a considerable service. The co-operation and helpfulness of the clergy and ministers are much appreciated.

The Committee, Matron and Staff, are under a debt of gratitude to members of the Penzance Division of the St. John Ambulance, who have most readily given assistance in the transfer of patients inside the Hospital at all times of the day and night.

Finally it is desired to place on record the great services rendered by the Medical Staff, and of the selflessness and devotion to the work of the Hospital of the Matron, and of the zeal of her staff. Theirs is a splendid achievement of which all may be proud.
