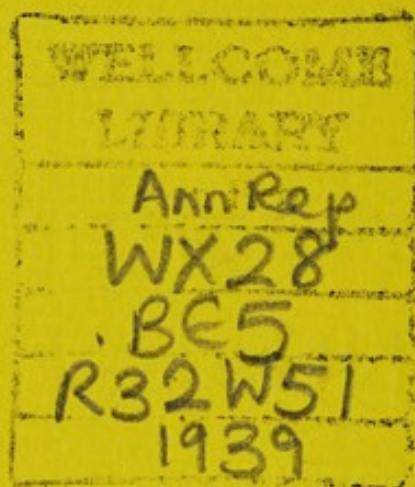

**MINUTES of the Thirty-ninth Annual General Meeting of the
Subscribers to the West Cornwall Miners' & Women's Hospital,
held at the Hospital at 3.15 p.m., on Tuesday, 28th May, 1940.**

PRESENT. The Rt. Hon. The Viscount Clifden, M.V.O. (in the chair); Mesdames Arthur, Sara, G. M. Tyack, A. D. Owen, E. The President said that since their last meeting the Hospital had lost through death Mr. A. Pearse Jenkin, for many years associated with the management of the Hospital and a Trustee, and that notice had been received of the death of Mrs. Edward Tounson of Bath, whose funeral was taking place that afternoon. Mrs. Tounson had been an old friend of the Hospital and he felt sure those present would wish their sympathy conveyed to the family. Those present stood in silence.

APOLOGIES. Apologies were received from Sir Hugh Molesworth St. Aubyn, Mrs. Treve Holman, Mrs. Pendarves, Mr. Pengilly, Mrs. C. E. Tyack, Rev. H. A. Benaton, Mr. & Mrs. E. Tounson, Mr. G. P. Paige, Mrs. Ladd Canney, Rev. A. T. Udy, Miss L. James, Mr. D. W. Thomas.

1. **MINUTES.** On the motion of Mrs. Maclaren, seconded by Mr. Batty, the Minutes of the Meeting held on 15th May, 1939, were confirmed.
2. **ANNUAL REPORT.** The President moved the adoption of the Annual Report of the Committee as read by the Honorary Secretary, with the addition of the Medical Staff list. He said that the Report could not be compared with former years, but from the point of view of a normal year, the outstanding event certainly was the opening of the Hospital and the munificent gift by Mr. Thomas to the funds. There were few causes in Cornwall which have not benefitted by Mr. Thomas's unfailing generosity. He hoped the construction of a Nurses' Hostel would not be long delayed. He congratulated the Matron on the splendid start she had made for funds for the Hostel, and expressed high appreciation of the work done by the Hospital Women's Guild. They were extremely grateful to them for all they were doing. He endorsed the thanks expressed in the Report to the Group Secretaries of the Hospital Contributory Association for the work they had done. The results achieved by the Committee for the securing of further financial support for the Hospital, and especially the results of Mr. White's efforts, showed what could be done in the district. The Rev. Canon Ladd Canney seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

3. On the motion of Mr. Penberthy, seconded by Mr. W. J. Opie, the accounts as circulated, were adopted.
4. On the motion of Mr. Peters, seconded by Major Ford, Viscount Clifden was re-elected President. His Lordship thanked the meeting.
5. On the motion of Rev. Canon Ladd Canney, seconded by Mr. W. H. Griffin, it was resolved—

“That all appointments made to-day to the position of Vice-President or member of the Management Committee shall cease on the coming into force of new rules affecting the constitution of the Hospital, should such be passed at a special meeting of subscribers during the coming twelve months.”

6. On the motion of Mr. Griffin, seconded by Miss Grylls, it was resolved that the following be re-elected Vice-Presidents of the Hospital—

Mrs. W. C. Pendarves, Mrs. Powys Rogers, Mrs. R. A. Thomas, Mrs. C. E. Tyack, Dr. C. Rivers, Mr. C. V. Thomas, Mrs. J. M. Opie, and the Chairman and Vice-Chairman for the time being of the Camborne-Redruth Urban District Council. Also that Sir Hugh Molesworth St. Aubyn be elected a Vice-President.

7. On the motion of Major Ford, seconded by Mr. Rich, Mr. W. H. Griffin was re-elected Honorary Treasurer. Mr. Griffin thanked the meeting.
8. On the motion of Mr. White, seconded by Mrs. Berriman, Mr. Pope was re-elected Honorary Secretary. Mr. Pope thanked the meeting.
9. On the motion of Mrs. Hayman, seconded by Mrs. Opie, the following were re-elected members of the Management Committee—

10. On the motion of Mr. Pope, seconded by Mrs. Thomas, Messrs. Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., were elected Auditors for the ensuing year.

11. Mr. W. J. T. Peters presented the Report of the Building Committee showing that little work had been done during the year partly owing to the incidence of war. He said that a sum of £25,225 had been spent up-to-date and estimated that a further sum of between £6,000 and £7,000 was still to be paid. He moved the adoption of the Report which was seconded by Mrs. Veale and carried.
12. On the motion of Rev. Canon Ladd Canney, seconded by Mr. Penberthy, it was unanimously resolved—

“That this meeting approves the action of the Management Committee requesting the Trustees to allow the use of invested funds sufficient to meet the cost of modernising certain radiological plant, the sum to be not less than £1,300 or more than £1,500.”
13. On the motion of Major Ford, seconded by Rev. Canon Ladd Canney, Mr. Stanley Wickett was appointed a Trustee *vice* Sir Hugh Molesworth St. Aubyn, resigning.
14. On the motion of Mr. H. H. Berriman, Viscount Clifden was thanked for presiding.

Report of the Committee

of the West Cornwall Miners' & Women's Hospital for the year ended 31st December, 1939, presented at the Thirty-ninth Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers on the 28th day of May, 1940.

IN the year under review the life of this Hospital has been crowded with incident, and although the statistics presented with this Report are given in a comparative form as usual, little importance can be attached to any comparisons.

The outstanding event of the year was the formal opening of the extensions, to which reference is made later in the Report. The interference with Hospital work over a fairly protracted period due to the joining up of new and old buildings, and the occurrence of epidemics, have had their effect on the totals of admissions and the number of patient days spent in Hospital. Although up to the month of July the old complement of 57 beds was nominally available, the actual number which could be used was at times much less. For some considerable time the Maternity wards were closed. Another factor greatly affecting the work of the Hospital was the outbreak of hostilities which involved the evacuation of nearly all the patients in Hospital at the time.

EXTENSIONS. These were opened on July 26th in the presence of a large gathering, by Alderman C. V. Thomas, one of our Vice-Presidents. Our President, the Viscount Clifden, took the Chair, and the Rev. Canon Ladd Canney and the Rev. Colin Sheffield conducted a short dedication service. A tablet commemorating the munificent gift of the late Sir Edward Nicholl to the Extension Fund was unveiled by the Lord Lieutenant.

Other new tablets commemorate Mr. Thomas's gift of radium, the services of Dr. Rivers to radio-therapy, and the Angwin legacy which, in accordance with family wishes, was utilised for furnishing the new wards. Tablets already in existence recording former gifts have been restored, and we have endeavoured to place these in suitable positions.

Mr. C. V. Thomas gave an encouraging address, in the course of which he announced his intention of contributing a further £3,000 to the Extension Fund. He was also good enough to covenant his subscription, thereby adding largely to the final amount which the Hospital will receive on this account. We know that Mr. Thomas's generous gift was largely prompted by a desire to set an example, and we record our sincere acknowledgement, both of his generosity and of the thought which accompanied it.

The normal Hospital accommodation, capable of considerable extension, now consists of the following beds:—

Male—12 Surgical, 6 Medical; total 18.

Female—15 Surgical, 12 Medical; total 27.

Children—total 8.

Observation Ward—1.

Private Wards—total 10.

Maternity—12 General, 4 others; total 16.

Total—80 beds.

This has perforce been changed considerably, owing to war conditions. The larger space allotted to and normally required for women, has had to be temporarily reserved for men, as the Hospital is now scheduled to receive possible casualties caused by the war. In addition, most of the 43 beds provided by the authorities for this emergency have been placed in that part of the Hospital, so that the normal bed complement is greatly exceeded at the present time.

HOSTEL. The provision of a Hostel for the Nurses is one of many needs which we fear will have to await provision until more normal times, and the cost of which would appear to be beyond the immediate prospect of raising. The Matron and her staff have made a good effort towards starting a fund for the Hostel and have succeeded in raising £72. Thanks to the Matron's initiative, Her Majesty Queen Mary was graciously pleased to send gifts for disposal, and gifts were also received from Mrs. Neville Chamberlain and Miss Gracie Fields.

The very urgent need for a Hostel will be kept in mind and we still hope that at a not distant date it will materialise.

A.R.P. The war necessitated steps being taken to protect the Hospital buildings and to black-out windows. For the former purpose, 33,000 sand-bags were provided and placed in position, and we have to thank those voluntary helpers who gave such willing service in a matter which would otherwise have proved a heavy expense to the Hospital.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEMES. Once again the Hospital Contributory Association shows an increase both in the number of contributors and in the amount made available. The Cornish Scheme is well established. To the Organising Committee and the Honorary Group Secretaries whose names appear at the end of this Report, we tender our hearty appreciation of the solid work which has been accomplished during the year. Both the Hospital and the contributory members owe these officers a great debt of gratitude.

SUBSCRIBERS. This year's accounts include for the last time the subscription of an old and generous friend of this Hospital who contributed £115 per annum under a Deed of Covenant which increased the sum to about £150. Its cessation through the death of the subscriber has obviously been a serious matter. The Management Committee gave special consideration to the question of subscriptions and a Committee was appointed to devise some scheme to get into touch with potential subscribers. This Committee, under the Chairmanship of Mr. H. Rich, has published an Appeal which has been distributed without cost to the Hospital through the kindness of the Urban Council, who allowed copies to be posted with the rate demands. It is early yet to comment on results but we feel that special mention should be made now of the successful efforts made by one member of the Executive Committee, Mr. W. E. White, whose unaided personal effort has succeeded in obtaining 102 new subscribers of the amount of £66:18:6 and 13 new donations amounting to £7:16:6. This result was obtained in one section only of the Hospital area, and demonstrates that if our other friends will similarly interest themselves in the matter, a great deal more financial support can be obtained for the Hospital.

HOSPITAL WOMEN'S GUILD. Once again we have to report substantial help received from this organisation. The Women's Guild has during the year spent £152 on linen for the Hospital and also organised a Pound Day which resulted in gifts to the value of £22:12:0 being handed to the Matron for use in the Hospital. In addition, Camborne Hospital Week, organised by the Camborne Hospital Women's Guild, resulted in £222:16:11 being forwarded to the Treasurer for the credit of the Appeal Fund.

We have to record that during the year Dr. Riddell has left the district and his place as Honorary Surgeon has been taken by Dr. Louis.

PERSONAL. Death has removed from us many friends prominent among whom was Mr. A. Pearse Jenkin, J.P. He was a very real friend of the Hospital to the affairs of which he devoted a great deal of his time. After serving on the Management and Executive Committees for a number of years, he was elected Chairman of the Executive Committee on 14th May, 1934, and held this office until declining health compelled him to relinquish it. He was a Trustee of the Hospital from 1917 until his death.

FINANCE. We very much regret having to show such a considerable deficit on the year's working. In some measure this was to be expected, as not only have our facilities been greatly enlarged but the war conditions of the last four months of the year under review have affected costs. The actual cost per patient week amounts to 73/6 as compared with 56/8 for 1938, a serious but unavoidable increase. We hope that this deficit will not be repeated in the coming year though we can scarcely hope for a reduction in prices; and as a matter of fact there are indications that revenue is coming in somewhat better. But we fear that the only substantial increase in revenue must come from payments for maintenance.

In this connection we would like to emphasise that although this Hospital has been scheduled by the Ministry of Health for the treatment of war-time casualties, this does not mean that the maintenance of the Hospital has been taken over by that authority. We are still a voluntary Hospital and the Ministry of Health will merely reimburse to the Hospital such costs as are incurred in treating such patients. We stress this fact because it is important that there should be no doubt in people's minds that the Hospital more than ever needs their whole-hearted, generous support.

THANKS. We wish to record our gratitude to the Medical Staff for the work done by them during the year. We are particularly desirous of mentioning their hearty co-operation with the Committee in dealing with a variety of important matters which have been considered during the year.

We offer our thanks to the Matron and her Staff for services often rendered under great difficulties.

To Messrs. Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Co., we tender our thanks for their services in the audit of the accounts. It has been done this year without charge, and they have undertaken to carry out future audits on a basis of actual cost without profit, for which kind offer we are additionally grateful. A motion for their re-election will be put before the meeting.

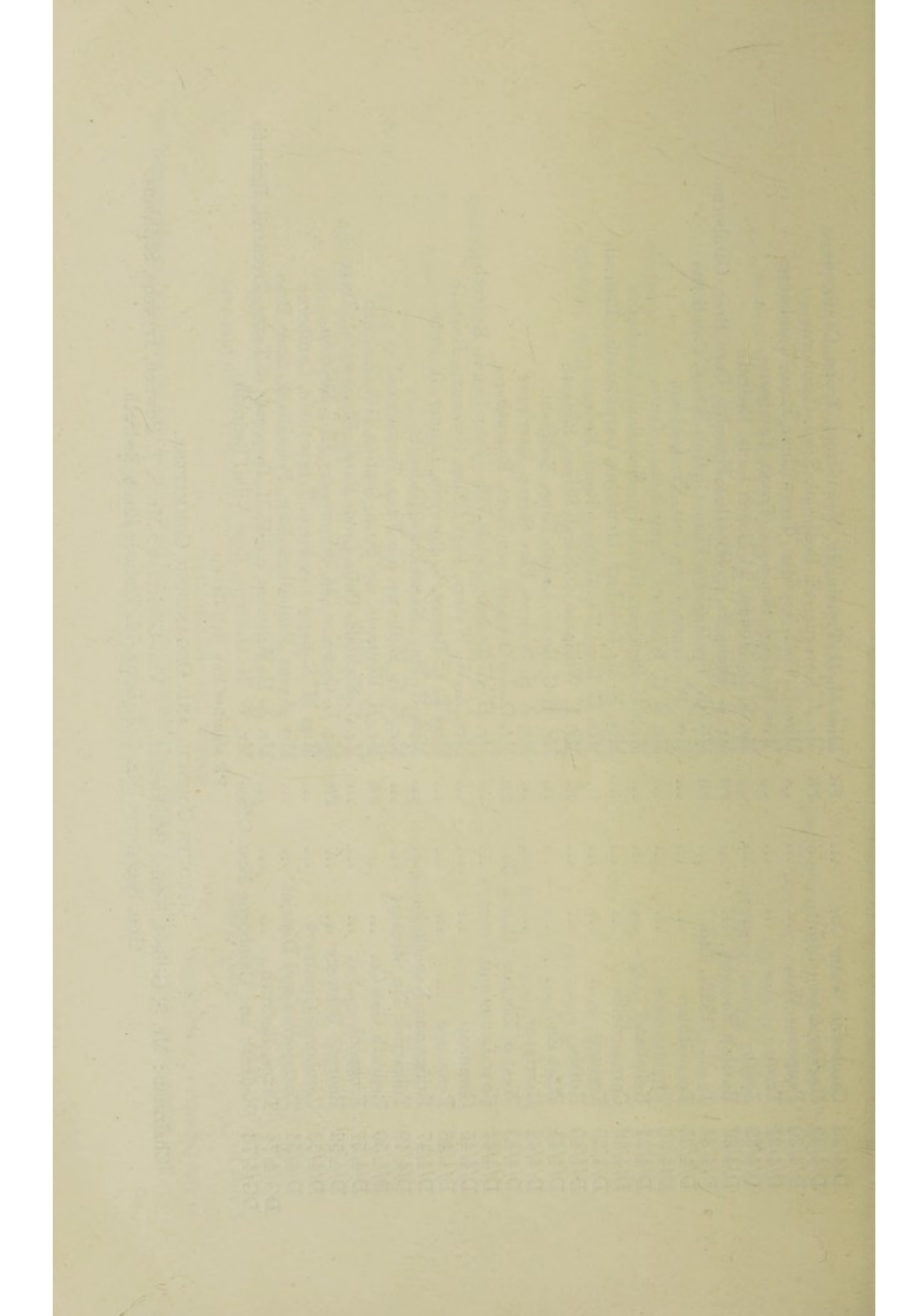
