

INFORMATION FOR SUBSCRIBERS.

The Hospital was opened on April 4th, 1740, for the relief of the diseased poor in the County of York, and rebuilt in 1851.

Donors of £21 and upwards are Life Governors.

A collector, or principal organizer of a collection of thirty guineas or more in any one year, may be made by the Committee a Governor for life, and the same privilege may be extended to the principal organizer of any entertainment resulting in the sum of thirty guineas or more being handed over to the Treasurer in one sum.

All Legacies and Donations given expressly for the purpose of being invested are to be permanently invested accordingly.

Annual Subscriptions are due on the 1st January in each year.

No Governor, whose Annual Subscription is unpaid Three Months after notice of its being in arrear has been given to him by the Secretary, can exercise any privilege as a Governor.

The House Committee is elected at the Annual Court in March.

Six Gentlemen and six Ladies (being Subscribers) are appointed to visit and inspect the Hospital during each Quarter, and to report their observations to the Committee.

In-patients are admitted any week-day. They must attend not later than Twelve o'clock Noon, and must come provided with a Change of Linen, Soap, Flannel, and Towels, and a Pair of Slippers or Light Shoes, and must arrange for their personal linen to be properly washed.

Accidents and cases of great urgency are treated and, if necessary, admitted at all times. Before patients are sent from a distance for admission, it should first be ascertained from the General Superintendent that accommodation is available in the Hospital. Particulars of the nature of the patient's case should also be given.

No person able to pay for medical attendance can be treated as an In or Out-patient.

Patients suffering from Consumption (except in its earliest stages) or from any infectious or contagious disorder, or any disease deemed incurable, or who might more suitably be treated at the City Infirmary, are not considered proper persons for admission.

Persons in receipt of parochial relief, soldiers or members of soldiers' families, cannot be admitted except by special arrangement between the Public Assistance Committee or the Military Authorities, and the House Committee.

**VISITING RULES FOR THE CLERGY AND MINISTERS
OF ALL DENOMINATIONS.**

Clergymen and Ministers may visit members of their congregations who may be patients in the Hospital, subject to such regulations as the House Committee may from time to time put into force.

Patients desiring the services of their own Clergyman or Minister must make definite application to that effect to the Matron, House Physician or House Surgeon, stating the name of the person whose visits they desire. Such Clergyman or Minister will be allowed to attend the Patient any afternoon between the hours of 2 and 4 o'clock, or in the morning if desired to do so, special request being made to that effect to the Matron, House Physician or House Surgeon; but no Clergyman or Minister can be allowed in the Wards between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2 p.m., except in urgent cases, for which special arrangements will be made.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-FOURTH

ANNUAL REPORT

The House Committee have the pleasure to submit to the Governors and Subscribers their Report and Audited Accounts for the year 1934.

OPENING OF THE NEW OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT AND NEW WOMEN'S SURGICAL WARD BY H.R.H. THE PRINCESS ROYAL.

Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal visited the Hospital on Monday, 8th October, to open the new Out-patient Department and new Women's Surgical Ward.

Her Royal Highness was received at the Entrance by Lord Deramore (Senior Trustee) and the Chairman.

The Treasurer, Mr. W. Louis Lawton, O.B.E., made a statement on the financial position of the Building Fund, and expressed his gratitude to the citizens of York and District for their generous support.

After the Buildings had been dedicated by His Grace the Archbishop of York, Her Royal Highness unveiled a commemoration plaque in the waiting hall of the Out-patient Department.

A tour of inspection of the new Buildings was then made, and the Children's Ward was also visited.

Her Royal Highness left the Hospital amidst scenes of great enthusiasm.

THE BUILDING FUND.

The Bazaar in aid of the Building Fund, organized by the Lady Mayoress of York (Mrs. H. E. Harrowell), proved an unqualified success.

The total proceeds of the Bazaar (including a sum of £505 raised by the London & North Eastern Railway Exhibition in aid of the Lady Mayoress' Fund) exceeded £7,000, a record for the City.

At the Mansion House, on Monday, the 19th November, the Lady Mayoress handed to the Treasurer, Mr. W. Louis Lawton, a cheque for £6,655 16s. 3d.

As a mark of their appreciation of the success of the Lady Mayoress in raising this large sum the House Committee are erecting a suitably inscribed tablet in the Main Waiting Hall of the new Out-patients' Department. The Committee would also place on record their deep sense of gratitude to all those who by giving their services and making gifts and purchases helped to make the Bazaar such an outstanding success.

The total amount raised on behalf of the Building Fund to date is £27,000. It is anticipated that the cost of the recent extensions and the additional accommodation for Nurses now being built over the Watt Wing will amount to £31,000.

PRESS PUBLICITY.

Throughout the course of the Appeal for the Building Fund and in connection with the Bazaar the Hospital has been splendidly supported by the Press.

The publicity given has been of the greatest assistance, and the House Committee convey their grateful thanks to the Press for their valuable help.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

The death of Dr. W. A. Evelyn is recorded with the deepest regret.

As Honorary Physician for over 30 years, his devotion to the Hospital was an inspiration to all.

By his death the Hospital loses a great friend who will not be forgotten in the years to come.

During the year the Hospital has suffered the loss, through retirement, of two senior members of the Honorary Medical Staff—Dr. G. W. Micklethwait and Mr. Noel Hood.

Dr. Micklethwait, the Senior Physician, has been a member of the Honorary Staff for 22 years, and Mr. Hood had served as Honorary Surgeon for 33 years.

The House Committee desire to record their high appreciation of the long and valuable services they have rendered to the Hospital.

Dr. Micklethwait has been elected to the post of Honorary Consulting Physician, and Mr. Hood to that of Honorary Consulting Surgeon.

Dr. David Laing has been appointed Honorary Assistant Physician to the Hospital.

Dr. Laing is already a member of the Honorary Medical Staff, and for five years has been Medical Officer in charge of the Actinotherapy Department.

OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

SPECIAL CLINICS.

After the 1st January, 1935, the following special Clinics will be available in the new Out-patient Department:—

On Thursday afternoons at 3 o'clock Dr. Hewitt will hold a special Clinic for Children, while Dr. Cameron will hold a special Clinic for investigation into Heart cases, including Electro-cardiographic and Radiological examinations.

The latter Department will be available only for patients on the In and Out-patient Registers.

On Wednesday mornings, at 11 a.m., Dr. Mackenzie will hold a Clinic for patients suffering from Skin complaints.

NEW MASSAGE AND ELECTRICAL AND SUNLIGHT DEPARTMENTS.

The work of the Out-patient Department was transferred to the New Buildings on the 9th October, and the work of transforming the old Out-patient Department into the new quarters of the Massage and Electrical and Sunlight Departments is progressing satisfactorily. On its completion the remainder of the Wooden Hut will be removed.

The transfer of the Massage and Electrical and Sunlight Departments to the old Out-patients' Department has involved a 'change over' from direct to alternating current, affecting practically the whole of the Electrical apparatus and equipment of both Departments. In several cases the Committee decided to instal new alternating current apparatus rather than purchase costly converters for use in conjunction with the old direct current apparatus, which had already given many years of useful service.

The House Committee would acknowledge the assistance they have received from the York Corporation in overcoming the difficulties arising out of the 'change over.'

THE CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Scheme has, since its inception in January, 1932, contributed the following amounts to the Hospital funds:—

1932	£7,900
1933	£12,000
1934	£15,000

There is little doubt that without the steadily increasing income from the Contributory Scheme the recent extensions could not have been carried out. For some years before the Contributory Scheme was launched, the expenditure of the Hospital was in excess of its income, and the increasing overdraft at the bank was causing the gravest anxiety to the House Committee.

Once again the Committee extend their most grateful thanks to the members of the many District Committees and their Collectors whose work is so largely responsible for the success of the Scheme.

Special mention should be made of the splendid services of Mr. C. B. Parkin, whose untiring work as Chairman of the Management Committee of the Scheme is beyond all praise.

RENEWAL OF HEATING AND HOT WATER SERVICES.

During the year the heating and hot water systems supplying the Watt Wing, which were upwards of thirty years old, were found to be in urgent need of renewal, and the work was therefore put in hand immediately. The cost will be £433 10s. Od.

The renewal of the heating and hot water systems for Victoria Ward was undertaken at the same time, and will cost £260.

POST MORTEM ROOM AND MORTUARY.

The Post Mortem and Mortuary arrangements are no longer adequate to meet the needs of the Hospital, and, unfortunately, the present buildings cannot be made suitable by alteration or extension.

The provision of an entirely new Mortuary and Post Mortem room is, therefore, an urgent necessity.

The approximate cost is £1,400, and perhaps some kind friend of the Hospital may be disposed to give this amount as a memorial to the dead.

PATIENTS' LIBRARY.

Throughout the year the patients have enjoyed a regular supply of books of all kinds.

To Mrs. Stobart, the organizer of the Library, and to those who have so kindly assisted her throughout the year the Committee are most grateful.

The supply of up-to-date literature now available for the patients is very highly appreciated.

ETHEL CROMBIE LINEN GUILD.

The 11th Annual Meeting of the Ethel Crombie Linen Guild was held in the John Petty Chapel, Monkgate, on Thursday, the 22nd November.

The Chairman, Lady Thomson, presided, and an excellent address was given by Miss Nicholls, Head Mistress of Mill Mount School. Over 600 members visited the show of work, and afterwards took tea in the Hospital.

The high quality, the number of articles, and the large attendance at the meeting show the great interest taken in the Linen Guild, and the Committee would once again thank Lady Thomson, Mrs. H. A. Watson, Miss Rose, and all the Officers and Members of the Guild for carrying on their work with such marked success.

The Annual Report of the Linen Guild will be found on page 109.

YORK COUNTY HOSPITAL SUPPORTERS' CLUB.

During the year the Supporters' Club were responsible for handing over a donation of £250 to the General Fund, and £250 to the Building Fund, also a sum of £119 to the Bazaar. The proceeds of the Match organized by the York Rugby League Football Club, for the Hospital Cup (York v. Bramley), amounted to £176 0s. 9d.

The Club also made valuable gifts of furniture for the Nurses' Dining Room and the Bedrooms in the Nurses' Home, and, in addition, maintained the Hospital Wireless installation throughout the year.

For their continued good work the House Committee are most grateful.

ROAD ACCIDENT CASES.

Mr. Hore-Belisha, the Minister of Transport, has slightly improved the financial position of Hospitals by his amendment to the original Road Traffic Act.

There is now a payment of 12s. 6d. per case paid either to the Doctor or Hospital (not to both) giving Emergency treatment. Further, the limit per In-patient has been increased from £25 to £50, and there is now a payment of up to £5 for Out-patients, but in order to obtain payment for either In or Out-patients negligence must be proved against the motorist.

In 1934, 151 cases were treated at a total cost of £1,115. Of this sum we have recovered £76 from patients, £126 from Insurance Companies for 24 cases, and £8 from other sources, producing a total of £210. Negotiations with Insurance Companies are still pending in 49 cases.

We would still urge the Minister of Transport to recognise that the Government must be responsible for the payment of cases for whom payment is not received from any other source. It is for the Government to decide from what source these funds shall be found.

Hospitals cannot go on footing the bill for these road cases.

A DESCRIPTION OF THE NEW OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT AND WOMEN'S SURGICAL WARD.

The recent additions to the Hospital have been made to replace two old wooden huts which were survivals of the war. One contained a Women's Surgical Ward and the other a large and well-equipped Massage and Electrical Department. In 1929 the House Committee decided to obtain a complete scheme of extension likely to meet the requirements of the next 50 years, and plans and a model were prepared by Messrs. Stanley Hall & Easton and Robertson. The present additions are part of this scheme. The new Out-patient Block frees the old Out-patient Department for housing the Massage and Electrical Department; and, by adding an upper floor over the Children's Ward, the Hospital have all their patients properly housed in permanent buildings.

Illustration No. 1 shows the entrance to the new Out-patient Department. Internally, the waiting space is divided into two, with a large, top-lighted Dispensary between. The larger Hall (illustration No. 2) has 140 seats, and serves the Medical, Orthopaedic, and Surgical Consulting Rooms: the smaller Hall seats 84 patients, and serves the Dispensary and Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Department.

In the Surgical Department is a large Dressings Room with a full battery of sterilizers, and a Theatre for Minor Operations. The Orthopaedic Consulting Room has a Plaster Room attached; and there is a small Pantry from which light refreshments can be served to waiting patients. There is also a V.D. Department with separate entrances for men and women.

The Women's Ward (illustration No. 3) necessarily conforms to the dimensions of the Children's Ward below. It contains 18 beds, and each bed has a fitted bedside table, with lockers for shoes and dressing gown, wireless headphones and personal papers. At the South-East end are two glass enclosed sun rooms, whose windows fold back on three sides (illustration No. 4); and there is an open balcony between them. At the North-West end of the ward, two beds are curtained off to give privacy in cases of extreme illness. The floors are of teak and the walls and ceilings are painted a very pale lemon yellow. The curtains and bed coverlets are fawn and jade. Curtains are unusual in wards, but are greatly appreciated in sunny weather, where patients lie facing windows: at night time also they help greatly to take away the bareness of black voids. They are, of course, of washable material.

In addition to the large ward is a 2-bed ward, and a fully equipped Gynaecological Theatre (illustration No. 5). This room was originally designed for a Treatment Room only, so that when it was made into a Theatre it was necessary to compress much into a small space. The sterilizers are shown on the right of the picture : built in flush with the Theatre wall is a polished black Bakelite panel, concealing a cupboard containing Hot and Cold Water sterilizers and a Bowls sterilizer. The cupboard has large access doors in the Ward Kitchen adjoining, from which all steam pipes can be examined. An X-Ray Viewing Box is built into the wall on the right of the window. The Theatre is steam-heated, with radiators under the stainless steel window sill. Steel doors enclose the radiators both inside and out, the outer doors being padded with cork. The slots on the inner doors have cheese-cloth in removable frames for easy renewal of the cloth. All the doors open for cleaning. The floors and walls are of pale jade green terrazzo.

The Ward Unit has a fully equipped Ward Kitchen, a Sisters' Room, and a sanitary annexe at the North end of the Main Ward containing Patients' W.C. and Bath Room, Sink Room with built-in bed pan sink, sterilizing sink and wash-up sink, and Nurses' W.C.

RECOVERY BY THE HOSPITAL OF INCOME TAX ON ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS.

Subscribers to a Hospital who give a written agreement that they will pay their subscriptions for a period of seven years or during their lifetime, whichever shall be shorter, will enable that Hospital to recover the Income Tax paid by the subscriber; and, further, the subscriber, if a surtax payer, may deduct the gross amount of his annual subscription from the amount of income which he returns as assessable for surtax.

With income tax at 4s. 6d. in the £1 the following example is given in respect of an annual subscription of £1 (the figures applicable to bigger subscriptions are in proportion):—

a. INCOME TAX.

For every £1 of annual subscriptions the Hospital will recover 5s. 10d. and the subscriber who now gives £1 annually will have the satisfaction of knowing that this £1 is worth £1 5s. 10d. to the Hospital, without any additional expense to the subscriber and without any trouble, as the Hospital will recover the amount from the income tax authorities.

b. SURTAX.

In making his surtax return the subscriber of £1 can deduct £1 5s. 10d. (larger amounts in proportion) from the income which he returns for surtax purposes.

It is hoped that the surtax payer will give the Hospital the saving which he will thus make on his payment for surtax, as the Hospital cannot reclaim it in the same way as income tax.

In view of the large additional income which may accrue to the Hospital in this way without any trouble or expense to present subscribers, it is hoped that all subscribers will sign the agreement, which will be supplied by the General Superintendent of the Hospital on application.

Compared with the advantage to the Hospital the disadvantage to subscribers is almost negligible; there are probably very few who do not intend to continue their subscriptions for the next seven years, if they live so long, and the agreement imposes no obligations on their executors.

It will not be necessary for subscribers who have given a bankers' order to alter that order in any way.

LIST OF ANNUAL SUBSCRIBERS.

Subscribers marked thus * have signed an agreement to pay their subscriptions for seven years or their lifetime, whichever is the shorter. This will enable the Hospital to recover the Income Tax paid by subscribers on the amount of their subscriptions. With Income Tax at 4/6 in the £ a subscription of £1 becomes worth £1 5s. 10d. It is hoped that all subscribers will sign this agreement, copies of which can be obtained from the General Superintendent.

Those marked † are also Life Governors.

All Annual Subscriptions shall be paid annually in advance, and shall be considered due from the first day of January preceding the date of Subscription.

The General Superintendent will be much obliged if his attention is drawn to any inaccuracies or omissions that may appear in this List.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

The X-Ray Department comprises a large airy room with waiting room, developing room, and office adjoining it. The office is provided with proper means of examining films, viewing desks, stereoscope, etc., and complete card index records of all examinations and treatments are kept there.

The risk of fire from storage of inflammable X-Ray films has been met by the provision of two small isolated rooms for the purpose. Films are kept in steel filing cabinets.

A large number of examinations has been made in the wards by means of a portable X-Ray apparatus. This is especially useful in cases of fracture of the thigh, spine, etc., as it avoids any necessity for moving the patient.

The total number of examinations made during the year was 4,194, compared with 3,536 in the previous year.

The work of this department again shows a large increase, and is now 93% above what was done before the premises were opened.

Further dressing-room accommodation and rooms for treatment are urgently required.

MATRON'S REPORT.

1934 has been a year of many happenings to the Hospital.

Dr. Micklethwait left York in the summer and is greatly missed by everyone. He was not only the Nurses' doctor, but for many years gave a course of Medical lectures greatly appreciated by them.

Sister Arlidge, who had been on the Staff as Night Sister and Assistant Matron since 1920, decided to give up hospital work, and is living at Bingley. She was always an excellent Sister and much beloved by everyone.

We wish her all happiness.

Her place is filled by Sister Brander who is well known to everyone here as Sister, Ward 7.

Sister commenced training in 1918 and has been here ever since.

Sister Walker has returned as Night Sister—Sister Cowan Bell being appointed Sister in charge of the pay block at the Ipswich Hospital. She holds the C.M.B. certificate, and has had a very varied experience since completing her training here.

Sister Crow has also returned as Sister, Ward 7.

Sister Soderqvist was granted special leave to take her C.M.B., and Sister Hoggard to obtain her Radiographer's Certificate at the Manchester Royal Infirmary.

The opening of the new Out-patient Department and Ward 4 has necessitated the increase of both Nursing and Domestic Staff. The record of the work done in both since October, 1934, shows how badly these departments were needed.

The Children returned to Victoria at the same time—the Ward having been painted throughout and heated by a new process.

The Ward used temporarily by the Children has 5 beds for Women, another room next door has been made ready for the emergency cases which come so often during the night and disturb the Wards so greatly. The Chapel is now on the next floor, and has been re-decorated—new rugs and dossal supplied.

This means that Sister Tutor has lost her Lecture Room temporarily.

The whole of the Hospital worked well for the Appeal and Bazaar.

The old and present Nurses raised £320 for the former, and all the different staffs £500 for the Bazaar.

Monkgate House is again the temporary home for Nurses.

Miss Taylor, who followed Miss Fowler in the Linen Room, sleeps there and is in charge at night.

The Committee granted Miss Fowler a pension when she left us.

The roof is off the Watt Wing preparing for the new Nurses' bedrooms, and 12 maids are now sleeping in the garden huts.

Her Royal Highness Princess Royal sent a beautiful photograph of herself for the New Ward, and also gave the Nurses three pictures for the sitting-room, all greatly prized.

The Old Night Home has been heated by a member of the House Committee at his own expense.

The Supporters' Club has given divan beds for all the Sisters, a carving table and dining-table for the Nurses' dining-room, and help for my Christmas Appeal.

A patient in Ward 3 has given a Leather Armchair, Mrs. Arthur Watson a Chesterfield, and Messrs. Grainger a Clock for the new sitting-room, and Mrs. Drew, through the Women's Institute, Poppleton, a Linen Wagon for Ward 4.

The old Lift car, which is made of oak, has been turned into a shelter for the Children in the garden.

A snack meal consisting of various kinds of sandwiches is now supplied to the Wards each evening with their last meal, and is both an appetizing and popular addition.

Miss Lees has, unfortunately, been in the sick room most of December and is now away on leave. We hope she will return well and fit again in February.

101 candidates have applied for training during the last year.

22 entered for training.

13 had previous training in smaller hospitals.

9 had no previous training.

10 passed the Final State Examination. 1 failed.

11 sat and passed the Hospital Final.

16 passed the Junior State Examination. 2 failed.

2 Senior Nurses have joined the staff.

5 left.

The Gold Medal was won by Nurse Theaker. Nurse Bonar and Nurse Thompson were equal for the Cookery Examination.

Lectures have again been given by the Hon. Staff, the Pathologist, the Dispenser, and the Cook (50), and revision and tutorial lectures by Tutor Sister.

We are very grateful for this practical help.

May I also thank all who have helped with the Christmas Appeal, the Nurses' Dance given by Mr. Hughes, the Linen Guild, and the gifts of game for the Nurses, sweets for the children, concert and theatre tickets, daily papers and magazines all so greatly enjoyed and appreciated.

THE HOSPITAL EGG COLLECTION.

Mrs. Hugh Stobart again undertook the organization of the egg collection last year. The total number of eggs collected was 53,879.

Each Deanery has a representative, who, in turn, appoints collectors and helpers.

The collection of so great a number of eggs has entailed much hard work, and the Committee wish to offer their warmest thanks to all concerned.

The names of those who have helped to make this Scheme so successful, together with the number of eggs collected, are given below.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

(FOR THE YEAR ENDING NOVEMBER, 1934).

The committee of the "Ethel Crombie" Linen Guild have pleasure in presenting their Eleventh Annual Report.

They deeply regret to record the death during the year of Mrs. Duncombe. She was one of the District Secretaries from the re-organisation of the Guild, and took at all times the greatest interest in its work for the York County Hospital. She is greatly missed. It is hoped to arrange for the work begun by her to be carried on in the coming year—as the Guild has many friends in Helmsley and the surrounding villages.

The collection in the City of York has been undertaken by Mrs. Craig, and we welcome her as District Secretary. She now has 29 collectors, who are collecting in all parts of the City.

The following changes have taken place on the Committee during the year:—Mrs. Goodman Platts and Miss Rotherham retired by rotation, and their places were filled by Mrs. B. Fairfax and Mrs. Craig.

This year has been an eventful one for the York County Hospital. It has seen the completion of the new Women's Ward and new Out-Patient Building. The Linen Guild has taken a splendid part in their equipment. It has been able to give to the Matron everything she needed, and in addition to mattresses, pillows, and all soft goods, gave 20 new bed tables of the latest pattern for the women patients in the new ward.

The Lady Mayoress' Bazaar for the Building Fund took place at the end of October, and members of the Linen Guild Committee, in conjunction with Mrs. Bate and members of the Minster Congregation, had a "Towel Stall" for all five days, which realised the sum of £289. We should like to gratefully acknowledge the gifts in kind sent to the stall from many villages surrounding.

The Catholic Women's League (York District) has contributed for the first time this year, and has a representative on our Executive Committee.

The village of Sheriff Hutton has contributed for the first time.

The Countess of Chesterfield kindly allowed her gardens to be open to the public one Sunday in August in aid of Guild Funds.

Mention should also be made of two special efforts in Tadcaster. The Council School Teachers, in addition to their regular subscriptions, organised a Jumble Sale, and realised the large sum of £18 6s. 3d. The members of the Wesleyan Chapel congregation arranged a Concert and made £7. They hope to make this Concert an annual event.

The Children's Working Party at Allerthorpe continues to do excellent work, and they have increased their contribution this year.

After the meeting the work was on view in the School-room, and members visited the new Out-Patient Building and had tea at the Hospital.

The Committee beg to thank the "John Petty" Trustees for the use of the Chapel, also all who contributed to the tea, and to all the members of the Hospital staff who help so splendidly each year with the arrangements at the Hospital, and to Messrs. James Bowman, who carted goods free of charge.

4. The articles must be made from patterns which will be supplied by Miss Steele at the Hospital.
5. Finished articles and subscriptions must be sent to the District Secretaries by the end of the first week in November of each year.

recently carried out a series of tests on gas and other cookers. Their Report established the following facts:
