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# President's Report

THE Brigham Hospital was endowed by Peter Bent Brigham, under his will, with large pieces of real estate, besides other property. In these days of depression, income from real estate has been more reduced than income from other kinds of property. Our income has come largely from real estate and has been so much reduced that the hospital has not been able to pay its current expenses with its income, notwithstanding the fact that a large sum (\$75,520.15) has been received from the Emergency Campaign of 1933. The hospital has, therefore, been obliged to pay during this year \$86,329.27 of its current expenses from its capital. This hospital is, compared with many hospitals, a new institution, and we do not receive unrestricted bequests which can be used for current expenses. It is obvious that our current expenses must be reduced, if these conditions continue; this will become one of the problems confronting the Trustees and Staff.

Dr. Harvey Cushing, our Surgeon-in-Chief Emeritus, has been appointed Sterling Professor of Neurology at Yale University.

It is with just pride that the Hospital calls attention to the following men who have received a part of their education and experience in surgery, medicine, and pathology in this Hospital and who have been called to positions of importance in other hospitals and medical schools of this country.

# Report of the Superintendent

THIS is the twentieth annual report of the Superintendent, covering the year 1933. Although economists tell us that financial conditions have improved since the middle of the year, our experience, which I believe is common to other similar hospitals, does not show this improvement. Fortunately again this year, there have been no serious epidemics, although there is evidence that under-nutrition in children is already beginning to show its effect in increased morbidity. As we take no children under twelve years of age, either in the wards or out-door department, except emergencies, we are not in a position to have noticed the effects of malnutrition to the extent that it has been seen in children's clinics.

In general, bed occupancy of hospitals throughout the United States has been lower than in the previous year, which was abnormally low.

There were admitted to the wards during the year 4,272 patients, as compared with 4,220 the previous year, although the patients days treatment was slightly less, 64,642 days as compared with 68,301 days in 1932. The average bed occupancy was 72-%. It was 75.7%last year. The percentage of free patients was the same as the previous year, although, as a matter of fact, a very large number of patients were received at nominal rates so that the actual amount of free work was greatly increased over the previous year. The average stay of patients was 15+ days, as compared with 16+ days the previous year. The per capita cost, based on the total expenditures in all departments of the hospital (except the amount paid graduate nurses employed at the expense of the patient for special duty) was \$7.60-

as compared with \$7.49+ in 1932. Deducting the cost of operating the private ward and Out-Door Department the per capita cost was \$6.49+. It was \$6.25 last year. The daily per capita cost of provisions for all persons fed was \$.32+ as compared with \$.36+ in 1932.

In the Out-Door Department, 7,976 new patients were seen. In 1932, this figure was 8,173. The total number of visits to the Department was 80,272 as compared with 78,786 the previous year. The cost per visit was \$.57—, \$.04 less than last year.

The reduction in salaries and wages which began in February, 1932, has continued, and this saving of about \$30,000 a year has been the principal economy which we have been able to effect. It has been found difficult to make any other considerable savings without lowering the standard of medical care.

This hospital with one hundred and nine other charities, has participated in a Community Chest from which we received \$75,520.15. Notwithstanding this, our operating deficit for the year was \$86,329.27. We are very grateful to the public for its generous participation in the drive, without which many of the voluntary charities would have had to seriously curtail their work or even close their doors.

In the Dietary Department, Miss Maude Lacey, who had been with us as an assistant dietitian for  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years, resigned to accept a position as Dietitian of the Lawrence General Hospital. Miss Ann Schultz, a Simmons College graduate, succeeded Miss Lacey. Seven student dietitians have completed the eight months course during the past year. In accordance with the request of the American Dietitic Association, we are cutting down our yearly quota of students because of

the over-supply of graduate dietitians. The total number of special diets for the year was 12,697, as compared with 13,980 last year. The outstanding diets and numbers were: Diabetic, 2,539; High Vitamin, 2,949; High Caloric, 1,284; Standard Nephritic, 1,049; Low Residue, 814; Colon, 609.

The Patients' Library circulated 5,737 books during the year. Sixty-two books were presented to the Library, 16 from Mr. Charles P. Curtis; 18 from Miss Eleanor Chase; complete sets of L'Illustration magazine from Mr. L. H. H. Johnson. We take this opportunity to thank all who have remembered us in supplying books and magazines. Nothing gives more pleasure to convalescent patients than suitable light reading. Most of our library books are old and we have no funds for their replacement. A small fund, the interest of which could be used only for this purpose, is highly desirable.

Mr. William Amory, a member of the Corporation, very generously gave us two Scialytic operating room lights for Operating Rooms 1 and 3.

On February 1, 1933, Mr. William R. Trask, long a member of the Corporation, died. Mr. Trask maintained an unfailing interest in the work of the Hospital, and, although he was in poor health for a number of years before his death, he came to the meetings of the Corporation whenever possible and always contributed with sound advice.

We regret to record also the death of Miss Bernice Young, a student in the School of Nursing, on December 19, 1933, from agranulocytic angina and bronchopneumonia.

Miss Elizabeth M. Packard, who had been with us as Housekeeper since November 1, 1912, resigned on

September 1, 1933. Miss Packard's health had been poor for some time. We wish to record our appreciation of her long and faithful service. Mrs. Ann M. Lewis was appointed Housekeeper on September 15, 1933.

This year, we held our third Reunion to celebrate our twentieth anniversary. It would seem as if the custom was established of holding a Reunion every five years. The Corporation very generously invited all alumni to return for a three day celebration. Nearly all stayed to luncheon each day, and some to dinner. The brunt of the work of preparing these extra meals fell on the Dietary Department. They did their work well and deserve the highest praise. The menus were attractive and the serving of so many was made possible by the establishment of a temporary cafeteria. This, our twentieth anniversary celebration, was held on May 4, 5, and 6. The total registration was 428; 113 doctors and 195 nurses came from various distant parts of the country. They voted it a great success. It was gratifying to hear the comments which indicated a very strong spirit of loyalty and interest in their hospital. In addition to the usual features of the Reunion, on Friday evening, May 5, a special dinner was held in Vanderbilt Hall for the presentation of portraits of Drs. Cushing and Christian. Dr. Cushing's portrait was presented to the members of the Corporation of the Brigham Hospital and has been hung in the main waiting room of the Administration Building. Dr. Christian's portrait was presented to the University. Members of the Faculty of the Medical School and of the Governing Boards of Harvard University and Peter Bent Brigham Hospital were present, as were many alumni.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

The depression has continued so long that we have almost ceased to think of expenditures other than the actual necessities for operating the hospital. Our needs are many, but of these, probably the most outstanding is that of a new entrance to our Out-Door Department connected directly with Huntington Avenue. The plans for this have already been made and provide waiting space, admitting room, filing space for patients' records, offices for the Social Service Department, for an out-patient surgeon and the assistant superintendent responsible for out-patient supervision. The expense to accomplish these much needed changes and additions would not be large. Re-arrangement of the surgical building is highly desirable. It is to be hoped that when such is possible, ample provision will be made for the preparation of dressings and the sterilization of all supplies needed throughout the hospital in a suite of rooms centrally located, easily accessible from all parts of the hospital without going to the main operating floor. Large sterilizers will be required which can be used not only for dressings but for clothing and mattresses.

Many of our other needs have been mentioned in previous reports, including more suitable quarters for X-ray department and photography, for our record librarians and for medical records, a patients' library, also additional laboratory space, including a new autopsy suite.

The hearty co-operation of the staff and employees of the hospital, which I have repeatedly mentioned, has continued. In closing, I wish to thank members of the Corporation for their support throughout the year.

## Report of the Roentgenologist

Now that the depression is said to be over, we can look back and survey its effects. Lessons may be learned from its causes and results, and even hints as to future development may be discovered. Whatever the cause may be, the result was a decided curtailment of our work. This was apparently due to two factors, first, an executive order which prohibited unnecessary X-rays, promulgated to cut down expenses, and second the inability of the average paying patient to afford X-ray examination, even if the attending physician desired it. The peak of our work by volume came in 1931, when nearly 12,000 examinations were made. This fell to 9,650 in 1933, a decrease of nearly 20%. In the same period we cut the expenses of the X-ray Department from \$45,000 to \$34,500, a decrease of 23%. The income dropped even more, so that in spite of economies there was a deficit of a little over \$2,000 for 1933. It must be emphasized, however, that no patient unable to pay for X-ray examination was refused if it was requested by one of our physicians. The percentage of free patients has risen considerably in the past three years, and it is going to be difficult to get the department back upon a paying basis for that reason. Our charges are minimal for dispensary cases, most of them below the cost of the examination, but it is normal psychology for a person who gets something for nothing to expect and even to try to continue to get it free even when he may be able to pay for it. The privilege of free treatment has undoubtedly been abused in all of the large hospitals and the same problem is common to all departments. On the other hand it seems un-

ethical for one department to be exploited and urged to produce revenue for the general purposes of the hospital. In an institution such as ours with a moderate number of private patients, the X-ray department should be able to pay for itself and take care of depreciation and replacements. If there is any considerable excess of income over and above these requirements it is probable that either the fees charged are too high, or that the staff of the department is being exploited. The relations between Hospitals and Roentgenologists is a question which has been causing considerable discussion in our national societies and in our journals. Many codes of ethics have been suggested and uncounted resolutions have been passed, all with little effect, as the situation varies with each individual hospital, each with its own particular problems, and its own varying percentage of free and paying patients.

No single system or code can be used for all situations or for individuals of different abilities, but general principles can be stated and should be respected by both parties. These are being considered by our national societies as a part of the economic readjustment of medicine to the changing times and a response to the demand for less expensive but equally efficient or improved diagnosis and treatment. A major step in the direction of controlled specialization was in the formation of a National Qualifying Board for Radiology this year. This board is to function as similar boards in other specialties have done, and is to furnish a list of competent Roentgenologists to the profession, to the medical schools, to the hospitals and eventually to the public. It is in no way a licensing board, but purely an examining board to pass upon the qualifications of voluntary applicants. This board has already been

formed, the permanent organization has been effected and the first examination will be held during the American Medical Association meeting in 1934. The board will work in cooperation with but not subject to the Council on Medical Education and Hospitals of the American Medical Association. It is hoped that this will eventually raise the standards of our specialty in many ways and encourage the better students to enter Roentgenology as a life work. It is constantly becoming a broader specialty, covering more and more territory, until now there are specialists within the specialty -some men devoting all of their time to therapy, for example, others, especially in the larger clinics, devoting all or nearly all of their time to a major branch of diagnostic roentgenology, such as gastro-intestinal diagnosis, or neurological diagnosis. On the other hand various specialties are taking their section of our work unto themselves and making it a part of their routine. The dentists now do most of their own X-rays and many are more proficient at diagnosis than the general roentgenologist. Likewise the urologist, the orthopedist, the gastro-enterologist, the cardiologist have on occasions and in various clinics taken over their own X-ray work. This has many good features but also many drawbacks, particularly the latter when the individual is forced out of his own field by some unexpected finding, or worse still when he fails to recognize something out of his own specialty which the general roentgenologist would quickly identify. On the whole the tendency is both centrifugal and centripetal, and there is every reason to believe that the specialty will continue as an entity, but perhaps only in hospitals, clinics or groups where there is the opportunity not only to work but also to learn and to experiment.

For the fifth year in succession we have analyzed a part of our work, this year the diagnostic work done in cooperation with the Genito-Urinary Service under Dr. Quinby. The cystoscope and the X-ray are the two most important diagnostic tools of that service and the cystoscopic-radiographic rooms are an integral part of the X-ray Department since the rebuilding several years ago-both unhappily too far from the operating suite and pathological laboratories, but making the best of the unhappy arrangement. The only new development in this work worthy of note is the intravenous urography which has now been in use for several years. It has its place in selected cases, but is decidedly inferior to retrograde pyelography in routine work. On the whole it has been a disappointment. The best diagnostic results are obtained when there is an obstruction in the urinary tract, in some cases where retrograde pyelography is not feasible.

During the year 1933 there were 749 X-ray examinations made of the urinary tracts of 461 patients, including 253 pyelograms. The most frequent finding was urinary calculus, of which 95 cases were identified, eleven of them with bilateral calculi. There were no cases of hyperparathyroidism discovered in this group. Sixty-one of the 95 patients had not noticed or reported any hematuria. Thirty-four patients with hematuria, on the other hand, had entirely negative X-ray findings. There were 7 cases of renal tumor demonstrated by X-ray and 5 cases of renal tuberculosis. Nine cases with congenital anomalies were found, the most frequent being double ureters, present in six of them.

This is a relatively small number of cases and forms only 8% of our total work, but is time-consuming and

more expensive than gastro-intestinal or pulmonary examinations, as more films are used per patient, and as the care of the accessory instruments has devolved upon our department, in return for its accessibility to the department.

The personnel of the X-ray Department has undergone a few changes as usual. Dr. Joseph H. Marks completed his year as Assistant Resident and accepted a position with the Truesdale Clinic in Fall River, Mass. as Roentgenologist. Dr. C. Carter Hamilton was promoted to fill Dr. Marks' place. The position of House officer was awarded to Dr. William W. Bryan, a graduate of Emory Medical School, who had served one year in the Jackson Memorial Hospital, Miami, Florida. We regret to record the resignation of Eleanor Hennessy our cheerful and efficient filing clerk who has been with us for six years. Her place has been filled by Dorothy Brogan. The staff otherwise remains intact. There have been no important additions to machinery or equipment, except the routine replacements. The lack of funds has held back the logical development and accessions which we hope will be overcome next year.

Fifty-nine students entered. Thirty have been graduated. Twenty-three have withdrawn. One has died.

Twenty students from the Children's Hospital continue to come for the six-month period for instruction and experience in the care of adults.

The nineteenth annual graduation exercises were held November 23 in the Assembly Hall at Simmons College. Mr. Curtis, President of the Corporation, presided, announced the graduates and presented the medal and scholarship. The Dr. John P. Reynolds gold medal for general efficiency during the three-year course was awarded to Elna Evelyn Jolikko of Rockport, Massachusetts. The John P. Reynolds scholarship for highest rank at the end of the second year was awarded to Elizabeth Kerr, Fisherville, Massachusetts, a student in the five-year course, with a grade of 95.5%.

The enrollment of the School presents more girls having had college preparatory work in secondary schools, and either full-time or part-time college preparation, than ever before. Because of this, the students are better prepared and many are a little older than usual, and should show somewhat more of maturity and judgment, and a capacity for more rapid development.

During the year, a student council has been created, solely through the efforts of the student group, with the idea of fostering good school spirit, and providing for some recreational and extra curricular activities. Perhaps this effort is due to the presence of more college girls in the School with previous experience with student organization. Rules for the conduct of the School continue to be formulated by the faculty. Mass meetings with the Principal have been held about once in six weeks, in which important events have been reviewed and the reasons for certain actions explained.

For many years it has been felt that there should be courses offered in the five-year program with Simmons College other than solely through the course in public health nursing, and the four-months affiliated undergraduate field work in public health nursing. These are excellent and have proved of much value to nurses who have elected public health nursing. But there has been a demand for courses in preparation for head nursing, and ward teaching and supervision. It is, therefore, a happy event of the year that these have been put into effect. The inclusion of these courses gives the fiveyear students a choice of subjects and experiences in the fifth year. Simmons College has added to its faculty a nurse of wide experience in hospital and nursing work, and one who is fully qualified to teach these subjects on a collegiate level.

The College is also offering a one-year program in head nursing to graduate nurses. Those candidates must have had six months experience in general nursing practice, and their records show a standing above average, and potential ability for teaching and executive work. This School and hospital are participating in this by helping to provide field work for the course. Each department of the hospital has been helpful and co-operative in receiving the one student who has been assigned, and in giving her instruction and information, particularly showing her those things which make for the smooth-running of an institution through interdepartmental relations. The nursing staff has found a certain stimulation in the presence in the wards and offices of a student of an interested and inquiring turn of mind.

There seems to have been an urge this year on the part of many of the graduate staff of this School for more education. Three took summer courses in July and August at Teachers College, Columbia University, New York City. Four head nurses registered for the new course in ward administration at Simmons College in the spring term, and will take the course in ward teaching the coming spring term, and one is carrying the fall term course in ward administration.

The following incidents seem significant:

In a period of a little more than a year, two checks of \$100 each were received from graduates of the School. The first came a little over a year ago from a nurse who has been graduated ten years. She is holding a position

# as Superintendent of a hospital in New York State. The following quotation is from her letter:

"In appreciation of the scholarships given, I believe, by the Board of Managers during my training and in realization of the hardships brought on many students by the present financial conditions, I enclose you check for one hundred dollars, to be given at your discretion in two installments to a student whom you deem worthy. With it to her, whoever she may be, go my best wishes that she may find in nursing the joy and happiness that has come to me."

The second came in November from a nurse who was graduated in 1924. She is, at present, Assistant Superintendent of Nurses in a School of Nursing in New Jersey. Her letter in part is as follows:

"Exactly ten years ago this month at graduation, it was my great privilege to receive at the hands of Mr. Curtis, the first John P. Reynolds scholarship ever awarded. During the years since my own graduation, I have had opportunity to use that scholarship for further study in nursing education which, I feel, is the purpose of making such an award. The years have also served to deepen my appreciation that I am a graduate of a School of Nursing such as ours founded on sound principles and steadily developing an ever-increasing fineness of tradition.

"As a tangible means of expressing this appreciation and in memory of my mother, I wish to return to my School in 1933, a sum equal to that which I received in 1923. The disposition of this sum I wish to leave to you, Miss Hall, and to anyone whom you may appoint."

She also made mention of the possibility of using this sum as the nucleus for an endowment fund for the School of Nursing.

These two unsolicited gifts seem to me to be extremely significant. They come from nurses who have

been successful in the nursing field. They show a fine appreciation of the benefits received from this School, a great loyalty to it, a desire to perpetuate the work and to be helpful to those who follow. They are, also, proof of the wisdom of the donor in providing for the John P. Reynolds annual award, and of the Corporation in granting certain sums annually.

It is well known that many of our great universities have received large endowments from the alumni. It is unlikely that a nursing school as small as this could ever hope to create a large endowment through its alumnae. But funds are needed for nursing education, which the hospital cannot supply.

It would seem as if these two alumna have set an example which might be followed by other successful nurses. Or classes 10 years out of the School might like to form the custom of coming back for re-unions on their anniversary, and make at those times a group contribution for nursing education.

There is, also, some need for a loan fund among the graduates for purposes of further study. At all events, the voluntary contributions on the part of these two alumnae are distinctly cheering, and careful thought must be given to the terms of acceptance of the latter.

Perhaps the most important development has been the creation by the Trustees of a Committee which is advisory to the School of Nursing. This Committee is composed of nine members; made up of two trustees, two members of the staff, two women interested in education, a graduate of the School of Nursing, the Superintendent of the Hospital, and the Principal of the School of Nursing. It is expected that this Committee will be a valuable adjunct to the School of Nursing; that it will be an aid in stabilizing nursing educa-

tion and in continuity of nursing service; that it will be a factor in interpreting the problems of the School to the Board of Trustees; and a factor in interpreting nursing as a profession to the public. Already it has been helpful in securing some new teaching equipment for the classrooms.

It is a pleasure to acknowledge the fine understanding and support of the Superintendent of the Hospital in the problems of nursing service and nursing education, and also to record appreciation of the splendid co-operation of the medical and surgical residents in the care of the nurses in illness and in health.

## In Memoriam

## BERNICE MARGARET YOUNG

#### DIED DECEMBER 19, 1933

BERNICE MARGARET YOUNG, daughter of J. C. Young of West Roxbury, Massachusetts, a student in this School of Nursing, died of agranulocytic angina after an illness of ten days, at the age of 24 years, 7 months, 8 days.

## SURGICAL FOLLOW-UP CLINIC

This clinic was started at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in October, 1932, and has been held one afternoon weekly since then. Its purpose is to follow up every patient who has been on the surgical wards. The patient is asked to come to the clinic for a check-up on his operation or condition every six months or year, until such time as the doctors think his condition has improved sufficiently to discharge him from further care. The patients do not receive treatment in the Follow-Up Clinic but just a check-up. If treatment is found necessary, however, the patient is referred to some other clinic.

Three or four doctors attend the clinic. Besides a stenographer, there are a social worker and a volunteer. The volunteer is the clinic secretary and the social worker makes the appointments, thus having an excellent opportunity to talk with each patient and to assist him with any social or economic difficulty which may be troubling him at home or in any way interfering with his physical recovery.

The follow-up work for this clinic is, as the name implies, quite extensive. Cards are sent to every patient a week before he is due to return to the clinic. If the patient fails to come to the clinic at his appointed time, he is sent a second card and if this brings no result a letter is sent. If there is no response to these three inquiries, the case is considered closed unless the doctor thinks it wise to follow the case even further. If so, a home visit is made to ascertain why the patient has not kept his appointment and to urge him to come to the clinic the following week. A second volunteer makes most of these calls.

## NEUROLOGICAL-TUMOR CLINIC

There has been a Neurological Clinic at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital for some time but in November, 1933, it was reorganized. It has now become the Neurological-Tumor Clinic, malignant tumors only, and has become a follow-up clinic as well as a diagnostic one. It now has a stenographer, a social worker and a volunteer clinic secretary. The clinic still seems comparatively small, there having been only six clinic meetings to date with an average attendance of thirteen.

A system of follow-up similar to that in the Surgical Follow-Up Clinic is used in this clinic, two cards and

## SURGICAL SERVICE

The majority of the cases referred to the Surgical Worker during the year 1933, were for convalescent care or nursing home care, there being 79 such cases in all. The next in order were 37 for District Nursing care and 26 who needed financial help in purchasing some form of surgical apparatus such as braces, orthopedic shoes or special abdominal supports. Other cases were referred for financial aid, institutional care, placement of children, special diets, vacations and transportation to and from the clinics.

## MEDICAL SERVICE

The Social Worker on the Medical Service has most frequently been asked to make plans for institutional or sanatorium care for patients, the latter mainly for patients found to have tuberculosis of whom there has been a great number. The majority of the cases of tuberculosis have been of the pulmonary type, found most frequently in young people—six young men and women in their twenties, several between the ages of thirty and forty-five. There were also a few older peo-

ple with new or recurrent infections. Arrangements for sanatorium care and help in family readjustments were made for all these. In addition to the cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, three patients were referred for sanatorium care because of intestinal or spinal tuberculosis.

Nursing and convalescent home problems were also many. In several instances where the family of the patient were unable to meet the problem because of lack of finances, money was raised by the Social Service Department to make the plan possible.

It has been necessary to secure additional aid for diets in cases of malnutrition, anemia or pregnancy, for patients whose families were dependent on the City Welfare. The Family Welfare Society has supplemented the City aid in many of these cases, thus making it possible for the patient to carry out doctors' recommendations, through the interpretation of the patients' needs by the Social Worker.

## LUETIC CLINIC

In the Luetic Clinic during the past year, the effort to gather material for a study of contacts has been continued. Some idea of the numbers contacted so far can be given. About fifty blood tests on husbands, wives and children of the original patient have been done; several of these have had complete physical examinations, several others have had lumbar punctures on the wards, subsequent to the report of the blood test.

## CARDIAC CLINIC

In looking back over the past year the months seem to have been occupied in attempting to tide over

presenting difficulties rather than opening new avenues of constructive activities. Many plans for just "carrying on" were of necessity made and for these there was lessened facility for obtaining money for making them effective. Consequently in many instances only the most urgent needs of the patients could be successfully met. The types of problems presented were, as always, numerous and varied.

Convalescent and vacation care have been outstanding needs for some of the ambulatory cardiacs in the worrisome days of the past year.

In several instances young women cardiacs have been the partial or sole support of their families. To raise money for a needed change of environment for these courageous girls has been an important activity of the social worker. A break in cardiac strength might easily have occurred without the provision of a real vacation with its complete let down from work and responsibility.

An occasional vacation for an unemployed man has proved desirable both from the family's point of view as well as his own. Living under the sorry and adverse days of recent years has had its baneful effect on the disposition of many a former wage-earner. Two weeks vacation in the company of others has sometimes been the means of a fresh stimulus and new paths of thought for his former stale outlook on life.

Occasionally young married cardiac women facing pregnancy for the first time were in need of expert hospital care beyond the financial means of their "out of work" husbands. Through co-operation between the cardiac social worker and the social workers in the maternity hospitals plans for pre-natal and confinement

care were arranged and in addition layettes were provided for the babies.

The Children's Mission, Children's Friend Society, New England Home for Little Wanderers, the Catholic Charitable Bureau and the various Jewish Welfare Centers have all given help in family foster homes.

It has been gratifying in the Cardiac Clinic to note the increase in weight and the general physical improvement following these placements.

For several of the children who were unable to leave their own homes, Country Week provided boat rides and car tickets to the beaches. This was a welcome change from hot tenements and dusty streets.

In reviewing the statistics of the Cardiac Clinic for the past year, it is shown that the total membership is increased by eighty-four over that of the previous year, and the total number of visits to Clinic by 132. Present attendance January 1, 1934, being 452.

The report of the work of the Cardiac Clinic would be incomplete without mentioning the generous Volunteer Service of Miss Katharine A. Homans who for twenty years has faithfully given assistance in the Cardiac Clinic. Her contribution of unselfish devotion has been valued by doctors, social workers and patients alike, by whom she is greatly missed. In the past year, Miss Homans' volunteer service for the Family Welfare Society has taken so large a part of her time and strength that it seemed unwise for her to attempt anything more at this time.

## ARTHRITIC CLINIC

During the year 1933 there were thirty-six arthritic clinic days on which a total of 463 visits were made by patients. Eighty-four cases were carried over from the previous year and fifty-five new patients were seen, thus making a total of 139 active Clinic patients at the close of the year.

The Social Worker in this Clinic has a two-fold function to perform. She not only assists in the management of the Clinic but also does actual casework in which it is her responsibility to see that the doctor's recommen-\* Thirty-nine are reporting yearly at the clinic but are counted as closed cases to correspond with American Heart Association. dations are not only understood, but that they are carried out by the patients.

Among Dr. Hall's and Dr. Monroe's recommendations for the treatment of Arthritic patients are a highvitamin, low carbohydrate diet and frequent rest. Such a diet is expensive so supplementary financial aid from outside agencies is necessary for the many patients who themselves cannot afford the prescribed green vegetables, fruits and milk recommended.

The rest which is recommended does not often necessitate arranging for convalescent care. More often it means talking over with the patient her daily routine and after visiting her in her home planning with her a living readjustment by which she can get the necessary rest.

The Red Cross Motor Corps has continued to be of great service in providing for transportation of patients to and from the Clinic.

During the year 1933, 676 visits were made by patients to the Gastro-Intestinal Clinic. The average attendance per clinic day was fourteen patients.

The chief problem which the social worker meets in this clinic is that of supplying financial means by which a patient can get the expensive Sippy diet prescribed.

On several occasions the Department of Public Welfare has been asked and actually has increased a patient's weekly allowance so that he might follow the doctor's recommendations. In several instances a private agency such as the Family Welfare Society or the Boston Provident Society have been asked to supplement City aid or to provide money for an important item in the diet such as milk.

Patients have also been referred to the social worker for aid in securing teeth, free X-rays, medicine, help in securing employment and clinic supervision.

## DIABETIC CLINIC

There were 1,051 visits made by patients to the Diabetic Clinic during the past year. The outstanding problem in this clinic, as ever, is that of providing insulin for patients who have inadequate incomes.

Although the hospital provides a large amount of insulin for these patients, Social Service has tried to provide insulin for patients through money raised from private agencies and from money given by the Unemployment Emergency Campaign Committee. This amount is given in another column.

There has been a volunteer clinic secretary each clinic day during the year and a social worker has supervised the work in the clinic.

A dietitian has called at the homes of patients who did not seem to understand their diet or whose condition was unsatisfactory.

Miss Margery L. Crothers was granted a year's leave of absence for further study in the Simmons College School of Social Work.

Mrs. Esther Rosenow resigned the first part of the year to accept a full paying position with the Cambridge Family Welfare Society.

The Red Cross Motor Corps gave much valuable assistance to patients unable to travel by street car. One hundred blankets were given by the Red Cross and were greatly appreciated by our patients.

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Gifts of clothing were also given by the Red Cross, the amount and types of which were limited and the supply was not equal to the demand.

The Waldorf Company, Inc., made a notable contribution this year through the gift of free tickets for Christmas dinners. This Department distributed fiftyseven of these to patients who apparently enjoyed their dinners and reported a good time.

A gift of seventy dollars (\$70.00) was given by the Trustees of the Lotta Crabtree Estate from the Mary Crabtree Fund, as in the past few years, for Christmas baskets.

At present there is no occupational therapist. Miss Grace Cummings volunteered her services during the first six months but did not feel able to continue longer. We are very grateful to her for the time she has given and we hope that in the near future she may be able to resume her work here.

Students from the Simmons College School of Social Work have been given supervised field work here the past year as formerly.

We take this opportunity to gratefully acknowledge the help and assistance given us by the Ladies Committee and also wish to express our appreciation for the financial aid which the Permanent Charity Fund, Inc., has given.

A group of six Wellesley College girls have acted as volunteers in the various clinics since October, 1933. They have each given an afternoon a week. There have been also four volunteers from the Junior League who have given half a day a week.

Two thousand four hundred thirty-three dollars and fifty-five cents (\$2,433.55) was given to the Social Service Department during the year: Eight hundred fifty dollars (\$850.00) from the Emergency Relief Campaign and one thousand five hundred eighty-three dollars and fifty-five cents (\$1,583.55) from other agencies and friends. There was a balance from last year of two hundred nine dollars and forty-two cents (\$209.42) in Special Gift Fund and one hundred thirtyfive dollars and forty-four cents (\$135.44) Unemployment Fund making total amount for year \$2,778.41. 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The number of demands upon the Department of Pathology for assistance in preparation of publications by members of the clinical departments increases each year. This is as it should be and reflects favorably upon the competency of the pathological staff. Our services would be increased and the productivity of the pathological staff increased if an additional house officer could be accommodated. The demand for training in pathology has become greater year by year and the creation of another interneship would in itself be of service in meeting a demand now almost universal in men seeking high standards of preparation for medicine and surgery.

Changes in the staff in the last year were as follows:

- Dr. Robert E. Gross, having completed services in Pathology and in Surgery at the Children's Hospital, Boston, succeeded Dr. Horsfall in May, 1933, who after a research period in Bacteriology, assumed his duties as Resident in Medicine at the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal.

# Report of the Surgeon-in-Chief

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THE opportunity to write my second Brigham Hospital annual report finds us completing the period of adjustment after my long stay in the middle west. I have found adjustment here, in spite of our returning to an environment with which we had long been familiar, more difficult than we had anticipated. Time flies and the changes in an eight-year period are extensive. Readjustment has entailed the establishment of happy relations not only with a large faculty, but also with the great group of professional colleagues in our district. It has necessitated the building up of a new group of patients that will be both available and valuable for teaching purposes, and finally the labor of starting investigations in laboratories which have had to be somewhat altered for our purposes.

Now that we have more fully shaken ourselves in the environment, it may be hoped that the surgical service will be able to report greater progress in the ensuing The Hospital service must always come first vears. and to that matter we have largely devoted our chief energies. The organization within the surgical staff has undergone no important change and there have been no personnel shifts of significance, but the inevitable attempts to adjust the service so that the interne's time is properly balanced in his various stages of work has necessitated minor changes. Our increasing desire to improve the Surgical O. D. D. has necessitated a greater amount of time from both the senior and junior staffs in that part of our hospital organization. In addition to the establishment of a general Follow-Up Clinic which checks the results of all our work as separate

from the ordinary surgical O. D. D. examinations, we have instigated several special clinics; *viz.*, a *Gynecol*ogical Clinic, an Orthopedic Clinic, a Vascular Clinic, and a Tumor Clinic. We have further extended the close affiliation with the medical service by the attendance of Dr. Cheever at the Gastroenterologic Clinic, run so well for many years by the medical service.

The addition of these special clinics has led, as would be expected, to an increase in the O. D. D. attendance. More particularly we have greatly increased our gynecological attendance, which is desirable in that this form of work constitutes one of the safest and therefore one of the most satisfactory branches of surgical work in an institution devoting itself in part to the training of young surgeons. The addition of the Tumor Clinic, which meets once a week in special rooms and which is attended by Dr. Sosman representing roentgenology, either Dr. Wolbach or Dr. Hass representing pathology, and by myself representing surgery, has brought us an increasing number of patients as well as assured us of the better care of patients afflicted with malignant disease. The establishment of this special clinic has also made it possible for us to obtain radon from the supply at the Palmer Memorial Hospital, thus adding to our ability to fight cancer with all modern technical means. Patients with malignant disease picked up in any O. D. D. clinic, either medical or surgical, go to this Tumor Clinic for reference and recommendation before admission to the Hospital; and all tumor cases on discharge from our wards are referred back to this clinic for further care and disposition. Patients with malignant disease will never be discharged from the rolls of this clinic, so that we shall eventually have a valuable follow-up on this type of

disease. It is true that all of these special clinics need amplification and it is our ambition to devote considerable energy to their improvement. It is indeed easy to visualize now that this will eventually necessitate a great increase in the space devoted to this form of work and will also eventually mean that the O. D. D. will become one of the chief sources for the education of our students. Here will be the focal point where the study of most cases can be carried on until the diagnosis is made. Thus the Hospital beds may be chiefly devoted to care subsequent to therapy or reserved for special and intensive study of fields for therapy and investigation.

These special clinics are in addition to Dr. Quinby's long-standing *Genito-urinary Clinic*, but this clinic too has shown increased attendance, possibly through the fact that we have had the expert services of Dr. Eckels in addition to the resident staff as of past years. The *Orthopedic Clinic*, originally begun to give our thirdyear students better teaching in this specialty and having its original conception in the mind of our colleague, Dr. Robert Osgood, has shown extraordinary development and has resulted in our feeling it wise to add an active orthopedic staff to the Hospital rolls since cases studied in this clinic are now admitted to the surgical service for operative care. Thus, both Dr. Brewster and Dr. Green, former internes of this institution, are now members of our senior staff.

Another phase of adjustment to this community is seen in our attempt to establish cordial relations with our surrounding professional colleagues. We have made it a routine that not only shall a doctor referring a patient be asked to the operation, but in each instance a summary of the case is sent to him at the time of the

patient's discharge. A card index of all cases referred by outside physicians is carefully maintained, and those physicians who send a considerable number of patients to the surgical service are put on the surgical staff mailing list for reprints as well as sent special invitations to our general hospital activities. This seems to have a kindly effect and an increasing number of local physicians are seen in our operating rooms and at our staff exercises. We feel that the presence of these physicians in the Hospital is of benefit to both parties. We benefit not only from being able to acquire additional evidence, but from our house staff widening their experience with their professional colleagues; and we hope these neighbor-colleagues benefit from a closer contact with hospital work in general as well as by cementing their relations with their patients through this demonstration of interest.

Some minor changes in the organization of the service may have been partly effected by our desire to increase the usefulness of the Hospital for our students. It is always difficult to estimate just how far one should go in devoting time to students, but it would be unfortunate should the students of the Harvard Medical School fail to have a warm feeling for the services available to them in our Hospital. My ambitions in this may seem too vigorous for a staff as small as ours. though we all can agree that we would like to have the Brigham Hospital remain a popular selection among our medical students. The second-year surgical curriculum has been considerably altered, so that the students now attend a good many exercises, in the spring of their second year, in section work on our wards. I have personally shouldered the responsibility for this particular teaching, feeling that the most important matter

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in the education of the young doctor is the primary concepts he achieves when he first enters into his clinical work. Thus the matters of the care of sepsis and trauma and the principles of surgical technique which are covered in the second year have been taught largely by myself on our wards. The third-year teaching in the O. D. D. has remained under the care of Dr. H. F. Newton and Dr. W. V. Cox, who have varied the teaching both by sending the group for one morning a week to our Orthopedic Clinic and further by a number of simple operating-room exercises which I have attempted to give. The fourth-year clinical clerk service has remained unaltered in that we have continued to give to the students the closest association with our work and our patients in order to develop in them a deep sense of responsibility toward their hospital activities.

It must appear that the load carried by the senior staff has been increased both as regards teaching and attendance in the O. D. D. I should like here to acknowledge to our surgical staff my deep sense of gratitude for their unstinting devotion to everything which would seem to enlarge and extend the activities of this Hospital. No hospital could have a staff more completely devoted to its welfare.

Some of the special meetings held in the Hospital deserve space in the report of this year for they are of interest to our own graduates as well as being representative of how a hospital can be of educational value in a broader sense than is always visualized.

The Twentienth Reunion held here in May of 1933 was a great fillip to those of us who had recently returned to the Hospital, and the evidences of devotion to this Hospital given at that time only increase our wish

to carry on our surgical traditions in the manner desired by former members of the surgical service. The dinner in Vanderbilt Hall during the Reunion festivities, at which the portraits of Dr. Cushing and Dr. Christian were presented, the former to the Brigham authorities and the latter to the University authorities, will always be one of the high points in the history of the Brigham Hospital. And the papers presented at the scientific meetings of the Reunion are the best evidence of the type of individual who has had a part of his training within the walls of this Hospital.

During the year the usual meetings of the Harvard Medical Society continued, ably directed by Dr. Homans, and the almost complete filling of our amphitheater and sometimes the overfilling of it at these meetings evidences another phase of our influence. The fact that this meeting is not a purely hospital function to which the name "Brigham Hospital" is attached has on occasion given rise to adverse comment. It appears to us that perhaps our influence is wider and the students even more likely to attend if we retain the original name of the "Harvard Medical Society," even if the other hospitals do now run somewhat similar meetings.

A particularly interesting occasion deserving record here was the celebration in connection with the 150th Anniversary of the opening of the Harvard Medical School. On October 6, 1933, there were scientific exercises in the Medical School and in the various hospitals for the alumni, and on October 7, 1933, was held a most stimulating and colorful occasion in Saunders Theater, Cambridge, at which our present Hersey Professors, Dr. Christian for the Professorship of the Theory and Practice of Physic and Dr. Bremer for the Professorship of Anatomy (originally the Professorship

of Anatomy and Surgery held by the first Warren) spoke in terms reminiscent of the occasion when the Harvard Medical School was established.

CHANGES IN PERSONNEL. Senior Staff. There have been no changes of moment in the attending staff of the Hospital, either as to the division of work or the individuals. We have, however, attempted to continue our policy of strengthening the consulting staff and as of November, 1933, added Dr. A. H. Brewster as a Junior Associate in Orthopedic Surgery, and in February, 1934, Drs. J. H. Waite and Trygve Gundersen as Consulting Ophthalmologist and Associate Ophthalmologist respectively. There can be no doubt but that the addition of consultants has led to a greater variety in the material admitted to the Hospital as well as affording us the stimulus and advantages which expert advice always brings to the staff of a hospital as well as to the patients.

Resident Surgeon. We have been fortunate in having Dr. Robert Zollinger continue for a second year in this most important position. He has shown great energy and ability in the direction of the house staff, has assisted greatly in our teaching load, and has been an admirable stimulus in every way. Meanwhile his technical abilities have led him to the performance of major surgical procedures with exceptional finesse. It is our pleasure to be able to record here that he will stay on for another year at least in a more senior position on our staff, taking over next July from Dr. H. F. Newton the onerous and important task of supervising both the care of patients and the teaching in the O. D. D.

Assistant Resident Surgeons. During 1933 three of our Assistant Resident Surgeons have left the service.

Dr. Kenneth Wade Thompson, who had been here successively as interne, special worker in the Laboratory of Surgical Research, and Assistant Resident Surgeon, finished his tour of duty in March, 1933. At that time he was appointed Harvey Cushing Fellow. This Fellowship, when the funds supporting it were donated to the Hospital by Dr. Cushing, was known as the Surgeon-in-Chief Fund and was later named in Dr. Cushing's honor by the Trustees. The Fellowship may be utilized either for a Traveling Fellow or for a special worker in the Hospital. It seemed to us that a Fellow working both in the Hospital and in the Laboratory, perhaps on problems originating in the clinic, might best exemplify that form of investigative work to which Dr. Cushing so ardently and with such distinction devoted himself. Dr. Thompson held this post from March until September, during which period he continued his work on problems, which he had already started in the Laboratory of Surgical Research with Dr. Cushing, relating to the experimental production of basophilism, as well as assisting us in the Hospital laboratory and upon the wards in studies concerning intrapleural pressures. During this period he also completed an excellent article on spinal anesthesia which has since been published, as has some of his experimental work on basophilism, the latter in conjunction with Dr. Cushing. In September, 1933, Dr. Thompson left as George Gorbam Peters Traveling Fellow to work in Germany.

Dr. Richard U. Light, who had been carried over from Dr. Cushing's service, finished his tour of duty in July, 1933, and went to New Haven where he has devoted his time largely to experimental neurological investigations. A recent note in the March 30, 1934,

issue of *Science* describing a new apparatus for continued stimulation of the central nervous system is a splendid evidence of his considerable ability and continued progress.

Dr. Ernest F. Bright, originally a graduate of the Harvard Medical School, who had been with us in Cleveland as interne and Laboratory Fellow and who came here in September of 1932, completed his service in November, 1933. Following this he spent an extra month completing some laboratory work and writings and then returned to Cleveland to succeed to the post of Resident Surgeon at the Lakeside Hospital. It was a particular satisfaction to me that one of our men should return to the hospital where so much of our energies had been expended in the last eight years.

As these men have gone off duty, new incumbents have been attached to the service. In March, 1933, Dr. Charles D. Branch, who came from the University of Michigan to serve as one of our surgical internes at the Lakeside Hospital, Cleveland, began his tour of duty here; and on July 1 Dr. Cornelius B. Wood, who had held the post of Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow for the preceding year, commenced his service. In November, 1933, Dr. Harold F. Robertson, who had been a special surgical fellow working in the Laboratory of Surgical Research for the preceding year, commenced his service. With Dr. Robertson a graduate of the University of Toronto, Dr. Wood a graduate of Michigan and Dr. Branch another graduate of the Michigan school, we seem perhaps to have emphasized the advantages of mixing into our staff men educated away from this particular environment. It, however, may be added that in the period of adjustment and because of hold-

overs from another regime, such diversification was inevitable.

House Officers. The usual changes have occurred in our interne service. In February, 1933, Dr. Jean DuMortier and Dr. David W. Gaiser left the service, both going to New Haven, the former as Assistant Resident Surgeon in the New Haven Hospital and Dr. Gaiser to the Department of Pathology, Yale Medical School. It is with deep regret that we record here the sudden death at New Haven of Dr. DuMortier on January 19, 1934, from a gas bacillus septicemia, the portal of entry of which is unknown. He had recently married Miss Marguerite Robb, a graduate of our own School of Nursing, in whose great loss all members of the Brigham family share.

In May, 1933, Dr. Frederick H. Shillito left us to fill a post at the Presbyterian Hospital, New York, and Dr. Darwin E. Bennett went to the Boston Lying-in Hospital for a short service to enlarge his general training.

In August, 1933, Dr. Edward M. Drissen left us to assume the post of Assistant Resident Surgeon in Louisville, Kentucky, where Dr. Clarence E. Bird, a former Resident Surgeon of this Hospital, is now the Professor of Surgery. At the same time, Dr. Philip Shambaugh completed his interneship and became Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow in charge of the Laboratory of Surgical Research. In November, 1933, Dr. Peter A. H. Midelfart left us to fill a post in pathology under Dr. Opie at the Cornell University Medical College, and Dr. Robert L. Patterson left at the same time to take up his service of two years as orthopedic fellow at both the Children's Hospital and the Massachusetts General Hospital.

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The new incumbents of the surgical house officerships as usual came on in pairs. In March, 1933, Dr. Storer P. Humphreys, a graduate of the Yale Medical School, and Dr. Carl W. Walter, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School, began their duties. They were followed in July by Dr. Robert R. Bates, a graduate of Northwestern University School of Medicine, and Dr. Walter A. Reiling, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School. Unfortunately, Dr. Bates after two months' service showed signs of loss of weight and easy fatigability, and X-ray studies as well as the physical examination gave evidence of the incipient signs of pulmonary tuberculosis. After careful studies here and rest he was transferred to the Trudeau Sanatorium at Saranac where he has made splendid progress, and he is to report back to the Hospital for duty in another six months. The post vacated by Dr. Bates has been filled by Dr. John E. Dunphy, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School, who had done well at the time of the interne examinations, was much liked by other members of the house staff, and who fortunately for us had been putting in his time studying pathology with Dr. Wolbach. In November of 1933, Dr. Hall Seely, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School, and Dr. J. Hartwell Harrison began their services. Dr. Harrison graduated from the University of Virginia and had already completed a service in medicine under Dr. Wearn at the Lakeside Hospital, Cleveland, Ohio.

During the last year and a half we have had frequent talks with Dr. William E. Ladd, Chief of the general Surgical Service at the Children's Hospital, with the hope that eventually an arrangement may be made between the Brigham Hospital and the Children's Hospital surgical services so that a common interneship can

be set up. This would permit our internes the great advantage of some training in this most important branch of surgery and would assure to those men who desire a service in children's surgery something broader than that special form of surgery alone. After all, children's surgery is a specialty and men desirous of entering this field should have a broad general training either before or at the same time this special training is going on. Moreover, the special training in children's surgery alone is hardly adequate for those desirous of entering practice without a further hospital service. It would appear that such a joint service would be highly beneficial to both the Brigham Hospital and Children's Hospital and should give us a particularly satisfactory surgical interneship. Possibly our present period of sixteen months will have to be extended to cover such an arrangement, but the difficulty should not be insurmountable since the goal appears so much worthwhile.

Fellows. Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow. In the report of last year it was mentioned that Dr. Cornelius B. Wood held this post from September of 1932 to July of 1933. During this period of time he busied himself with several problems, chiefly the working out of a satisfactory method for causing bronchial stenosis via the oral route. Working with many caustic substances he eventually found that by the application of a 25% aqueous acriflavine solution to the bronchial mucosa through a bronchoscope a chronic injury occurred which resulted in the gradual formation of scar tissue sufficient to cause complete occlusion from a single application. This method, which holds out the ability for selected pulmonary collapse, offers a wide

field for clinical application if it can be made safe and sure, and it has already received application in this Hospital in a case of pulmonary tuberculosis with a broncho-cutaneous fistula. Dr. Wood has further elaborated his problem by producing pulmonary tuberculosis in dogs and then studying the effect of establishing a bronchial occlusion by his method as a way of causing atelectasis of the affected lobe for therapeutic reasons.

In September, 1933, Dr. Wood was succeeded by Dr. Philip Shambaugh as Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow. Dr. Shambaugh, though commencing with a problem also involving thoracic disorders, a favorite field of ours for investigation, was soon switched over into experimental work in conjunction with our clinical studies upon the effect of total thyroidectomy in angina pectoris. By most ingenious methods he has shown that the addition of small doses of adrenalin to an animal whose coronary artery is partly blocked may bring about a severe attack of angina. Elevation of the pulse rate, achieved under the same conditions by the utilization of atropine, has been shown to be a less important factor. Dr. Shambaugh has evinced, at the same time, considerable ability in running the Laboratory smoothly. This experience in the administration of the Laboratory I have always looked upon as one of the most important advantages to the man assuming this position.

Fellow in Urology. As was mentioned in last year's report, Dr. Quinby is served by a Fellow in Urology, who devotes his full time to this matter, as well as an Assistant Resident Surgeon during his second fourmonth period in our present assistant resident system. Dr. Lawrence L. Howard, who came here in September,

1932, left us in July, 1933, to go to Atlanta, Georgia. His association there in these years of depression was not entirely satisfactory and now he has moved to Great Falls, Montana, where he seems to be happily situated. He was succeeded by Dr. Richard E. Alt, who had completed his surgical interneship at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

George Gorbam Peters Traveling Fellow. This post is filled by Dr. Kenneth Wade Thompson, who has spent most of his time in Freiburg, Germany, under Professor Sigurd Janssen, following up the lead he obtained here in trying to extract from the anterior pituitary lobe a thyroid-depressing substance. Dr. Thompson is now about to return home and letters from him inform us that his work has been satisfactory and that the goal he desired has been achieved. Dr. Thompson went to work with Professor Janssen because of the latter's important investigations in the field of modern hormonology and in particular the hormones relating to the pituitary and the thyroid.

Dr. Thompson has also corresponded with Mr. George Gorham Peters, the donor of this Fund, and has increased the latter's personal interest in the matter of his Traveling Fellowship. It is proper to state here that Mr. Peters has been greatly pleased with the activities of the men who have held this Fellowship and has a sincere belief that sending young doctors to Europe not only brings back to this country knowledge of great advantage, but also tends to bring about a feeling of good will between the nations.

The Harvey Cushing Fellowship was filled from March to September by Dr. Thompson before he left for Europe. It was then filled by Dr. Max T. Schnitker,

a graduate of the University of Michigan Medical School, whose twin brother has been a happy member of our medical staff for the last year and a half. During his incumbency of this post Dr. Schnitker has evidenced an industry and capacity which has added greatly to our ability to prosecute serious investigations. He has been responsible for setting up our room for the determination of skin temperatures and with Dr. Carl W. Walter has set into action the Hospital Surgical Laboratory where experimental blood-chemistry determinations are now carried out.

INVESTIGATION. Under this head there must be at least two captions: (1) The activities in the Laboratory of Surgical Research, and (2) those activities more properly confined to the Hospital itself. Within the Hospital the usual clinical studies have been going on, as can be seen by a study of the publications. The activity and stimulation of Dr. Zollinger has meant that more of our younger men have begun their literary pursuits. In the publications will be seen a paper written by one of our clinical clerks, and a considerable number of case reports and statistical studies completed by the house staff are now in press though they do not appear in the publications for this year.

Investigations involving the Laboratory have been conducted by our staff in several quarters. Dr. Homans, working with Dr. Cecil K. Drinker in the Laboratory of the School of Public Health, continued his studies on the production of edema in the extremities. In the Laboratory of Surgical Research the work by Dr. Wood on endobronchial stenosis has already been mentioned. At the same time, in this Laboratory Dr. Robertson and Dr. Cox completed their experiments on the action of

denervated hearts with and without nerve anastomoses, and Dr. G. Kenneth Coonse, a member of the Department of Orthopedic Surgery, has continued his investigations of the last two years concerning the rôle of intrapleural pressure in relation to respiration and the major circulation. The paper published by Dr. Coonse and his co-workers is listed here rather than with our Brigham list of publications, since he is not properly a member of our staff but merely working in the Laboratory of Surgical Research as a matter of courtesy.

COONSE, G. KENNETH and AUFRANC, OTTO ELMO: The Relation of the Intrapleural Pressure to the Mechanics of the Circulation. Am. Heart J., 9, 347-362, Feb., 1934.

Dr. Shambaugh's major studies concerning the production of angina pectoris by experimental methods are evidence of the Laboratory activity this winter. At the same time, Dr. Jacob Fine of the surgical staff of the Beth Israel Hospital has carried on investigation concerning pulmonary atelectasis. Work such as that prosecuted by Drs. Fine and Coonse, who are not members of the Peter Bent Brigham surgical group, are financed separately.

In the Hospital Laboratory, previously occupied by Dr. Cushing's very productive neurological group of workers, there has been a considerable change. Dr. Eisenhardt and Miss Thing have been moved into the smaller laboratory and there they have set up a *brain tumor registry*. It was one of Dr. Cushing's particular desires that the great group of nervous-system tumors collected by him should be continued as an active educational unit. For this purpose the University has made a certain financial grant and it is the eventual intention to transfer this collection of neurological tumors, with

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a staff to look after them, to the Warren Museum. It is Dr. Cushing's hope that rare and unusual tumors can be sent to this central registry from any part of the country and there studied in relation to other similar tumors in the collection. The Harvey Cushing Society of Neurological Surgeons have been interested in this matter and have made a gift toward its maintenance. Until quarters can be established for this registry in the Warren Museum, we have been most happy to have the registry continue in our Surgical Laboratory.

The major Surgical Laboratory, beneath the operating room, has been made over largely into a biochemical unit, though part of it has been set aside for skin temperature determinations. This change was due to our interest in studying completely people who have been submitted to total thyroidectomy for intractable heart disease. This work began in the Brigham Hospital under the stimulation of Dr. Samuel A. Levine, and was already in existence in active form before I had returned to Boston. The clinical observations of Dr. Levine, coupled with the important studies of Dr. Herrman Blumgart of the Beth Israel Hospital into the mechanism controlling the rate of blood flow, led first to subtotal and then to total thyroidectomy in various forms of decompensated heart disease. The reasons for this have been fully published long before this, but it may be said that Dr. Blumgart showed that the rate of blood flow was largely controlled by the metabolic demands. This led to the assumption that lowering the metabolic demands, i.e., the creation of artificial myxedema by surgery, might, in people whose cardiac mechanism was unable to maintain a normal rate of flow. give rise to a situation where the crippled heart could supply a circulation adequate for the lowered demand

and thus bring about compensation. The fact that this is true seems now definitely established. Once the crippled heart was treated by this method it was only natural that people suffering from angina pectoris should also be submitted to the same treatment. In this condition a greater measure of relief resulted than had occurred following other surgical methods. Moreover, the promptness of the relief was spectacular and justifies serious investigation. By this time some fortyfive patients have been submitted to total thyroidectomy in the Brigham Hospital, the greater majority for angina pectoris. It was essential, for a full appreciation of what changes this radical operation might give rise to, that the patient should be critically studied from every point of view before and after the surgical operation. This meant (1) the setting up of a satisfactory room for the study of skin temperatures since both the circulation and the sympathetic nervous system can be somewhat appraised by this method, and (2) also the establishment of an experimental laboratory for carrying out the large amount of blood chemical analyses essential to the proper appreciation of these patients. This is merely an example of how the surgeon may at any time, through necessity and interest in his work. have to turn to unusual tools for the elucidation of his problem.

This Laboratory has been put under the charge of the Harvey Cushing Fellow. We have been most fortunate in having as an assistant to the Fellow for this last six months Dr. Leslie H. Van Raalte, a graduate of the Harvard Medical School in 1932, who had already had a short interneship at the New London Hospital. In addition to assisting in the chemical analyses in the Laboratory and in the accurate studies on the skin tem-

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peratures, he has conducted occasional statistical and pathological studies concerning diabetes, myxedema, and the various cardiac disorders. His addition to our Laboratory staff has been one of great value and personal satisfaction to us.

PUBLICATIONS FOR 1933. The appended list of publications needs some explanation, for it contains certain papers not in conformity with previous lists. For example, two papers by Dr. Frank Glenn which did not turn up in time for the 1932 Report are listed this year. The same may be said for one of the articles by Dr. Leroy M. S. Miner, and this brings up the fact that consultants on our staff chiefly attached to the surgical service, as Dr. Frank R. Ober, Dr. A. H. Brewster, and Dr. Miner, have allowed us to give notice of their publications in our list. I have already made mention that there is a publication listed here which was written when its author, Dr. A. F. Jonas, Jr., was a clinical clerk serving at this Hospital. Since much of his stimulation came from our staff it seemed proper to include his publication in our list.

I have never known quite what to do with publications appearing during a man's tour of duty on our staff, the work for which was largely done elsewhere, and also papers written by men while on our staff but not appearing until perhaps a year later when the authors have left the service. Such papers are represented on this year's list by the work of Dr. Ernest F. Bright and Dr. Robert L. Patterson, and that of Dr. Boris M. Fried, Dr. Carl F. List, Dr. William Mahoney, Dr. Richard Meagher, Dr. Eric Oldberg, and Dr. Benno Schlesinger. It seems to be the custom in most places

for such work to be listed and I know the junior members of the staff may find satisfaction in such listing.

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STATISTICAL. The study of statistics is never a very pleasant matter and to surgeons who happen to be of artistic dispositions it is apt to be quickly set aside. At the same time, operative mortality, the diversification of the material on a service, dispensary attendance, which is the largest feeder to the Hospital, the percentage of autopsies and similar matters may give to those directing any hospital service vitally important data. For the reason that certain of such data appears valuable to us, we continue to publish it, knowing that they will interest at least a large fragment of our graduates.

Table A represents the general Hospital surgical statistics. In spite of a year of depression, or perhaps indeed because of it, though such matters depend more upon the activity of the Resident Surgeon than anything else, the total discharges are somewhat increased. There was a slight drop in the general mortality and a large increase in the diagnoses. This latter matter is explained because with the advent of the new system

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of recording diagnoses we have chosen to include on our front sheet not only the principal disease from which the patient suffers but any other attending disorder of real magnitude. Thus a patient who has cholelithiasis, but also diabetes mellitus, should, it appears to us, have both diagnoses recorded in order that the student of the future may have access to a large amount of material through the cards of the Record Room, rather than having to pore over individual records.

A slight decrease in the number of operations recorded is due to the fact that perhaps we have been a little more strict in what we have called a dressing. since this list does not include cystoscopies, dressings, pyelograms and the application of simple casts. The number of post-operative deaths is high and the percentage considerably increased. The operative mortality percentage has directed us to a case study of this matter and the higher mortality figures in various fields are found in the fields of gastric and duodenal surgery, thyroid surgery, and neurological surgery. And it is of interest that over 30% of the fatalities occurred in people who were the seat of malignant disease. It may be that this year we were presented with an unusual number of serious risk people as, for example, in the field of peptic ulcer, where two patients over seventy years of age, long the seat of severe repeated hemorrhage, are to be found. With hindsight we may judge such patients should not have been accepted for surgery. There are also two cases of unusual internal strangulated hernias, raising our mortality in the hernia group to 4.1%, a field where the mortality is usually low. Again, in the thyroid group we have been tackling the worst possible forms of risk with our attempts

to treat cardiac failure with total thyroidectomy. Many of these patients have been in bed for months, have been incapacitated for years, and a number of them have had previous attacks of coronary closure. Although there have been only three deaths in the group of forty-five people submitted to total thyroidectomy, this, of course, adds to our mortality. Fortunately the mortality is largely in the hands of the senior members, which is as it should be. I always have a great horror of the house staff assuming mortalities, largely because it may make them think that deaths are to be expected in surgery, whereas they should acquire the instinctive feeling that every surgical death is a catastrophe. Only by such a point of view can the young surgeon be properly educated to his high responsibilities.

Table B. This table represents to me the most interesting phase of our statistical studies, since it allows us to compare from year to year the tendency of our work to enlarge or decrease in the various special fields in which the staff may be interested.

The major discrepancy this year is, of course, the falling off in surgery of the central nervous system, though from our point of view enough of this work still comes to the Hospital to satisfy our teaching obligations. The figures under the thyroid division are increased due to the fact that almost one-half of the thyroidectomy cases listed have been total thyroidectomies performed by us in our study of the effect of this procedure in patients with cardiac decompensation or angina pectoris. Surgery of the breast has been listed separately this year since it forms a special division of which we would like to keep a tally. Surgery within the abdomen has changed but little and the chief change upward is found in the realm of gynecology. This per-

haps represents a greatly increased activity in our O. D. D. where a special Gynecological Clinic has resulted in a greatly increased attendance in this field of work.

I still wish to keep nose, ear and throat operations and dental operations listed separately in order that we may see how these specialties are developing and whether, particularly in relation to nose, ear and throat, the time is not soon approaching when a special division may be necessary in the Hospital to handle this interesting specialty.

The total list for 1933 shows a considerable dropping off against the previous year, perhaps partly due to a stricter listing of minor operations as such. It is a necessary concomitant to a shift in direction, for we all keep score cards differently and until several years have gone by comparisons with preceding years are not of striking value.

Table C represents a general fall in the percentage of autopsies secured. For this we are deeply regretful and can only make further attempts to improve this.

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Table D. The O. D. D. statistics are of importance to us since this is the chief feeder to our surgical wards. That there is a continued growth here is satisfactory, though one cannot rely too much on these figures since the financial conditions in our country have driven people to hospital dispensaries and away from the ex-

pense of utilizing their personal private physicians. Our figures show a steady increase in the new cases attending the O. D. D. for general surgery and also the highest figure in ten years in the Genito-urinary O. D. D. Perhaps our attempt to make favorable contacts with the physicians surrounding us has played a rôle in this increase. I should feel happier if I could prove this, since I think it is highly important that the Hospital maintain a happy relationship with their surrounding professional colleagues. As a part of this contact we have made particular efforts to return to the private practitioners, referring cases to the Hospital, all such cases rather than carry them in our own O. D. D. Dr. Howland has been kind enough to check upon the result of our efforts along this line and has

told me that in some months practically every patient referred by a private physician has found his way back to the physician rather than being caught in the routine discharge of returning to our O. D. D.

As the depression begins to leave us, and any Farmer's Almanack is as good for this as Washington news, we must begin again to visualize the growth of the Hospital-not necessarily growth in size, but rather continued vigor and progress. From what we have this vear written about the O. D. D. it must be apparent that some physical change there is soon necessary. The O. D. D. needs an opening directly to Huntington Avenue, a larger Record Room, and more space for the Social Service Department, offices for representatives of the medical and surgical services, a better physiotherapy department, better equipment for the special clinics, and more space in general, particularly for teaching of patient-classes, as well as for students. All this has long been visualized and to such changes we will devote our energies.

In the Department of Surgery a reconstruction of the operation rooms will soon be essential. Some way must be found for getting visiting doctors into the stands without their going through the operating rooms; the sterilizing equipment for instruments should be next to the operating rooms, doing away with the serious danger now existing which necessitates the carrying of instruments when sterilized across the busy operating room corridor which is utilized for all purposes; and, finally, the general sterilizing activities for the Hospital should be removed from the operating room proper. Such changes are only in line with greater protection to our patients and need little argument to justify their accomplishment.

The cheerfulness and devotion to their duties which has seemed to imbue all workers in the Hospital, in spite of hardships due in part to the financial depression, is the best evidence of the high regard in which all of us must hold our administration. In spite of serious financial curtailments all essential functions of the Hospital have gone on unaltered and although belts may have been tightened in scientific as well as more practical ways, no visitor would ever have noticed it. Our warmest thanks, therefore, go to all who have served this Hospital during the trying period of the last three years.

# Report of the Physician-in-Chief

THE Annual Report for 1932 ended with a note of pessimism. The year had been one of depression. During 1933 this pessimism of the Annual Report of 1932 has been fully justified. Economic conditions have grown worse. More and more of our patients have been unable to pay hospital charges. Income from our invested funds has greatly decreased. Governmental efforts toward regaining prosperity during the year have made no demonstrable improvement; in fact, so far, conditions have been made worse rather than better, for the hospital has had to meet increased cost of supplies out of decreased income. Great economies have been made in operating costs, but it has been impossible to prevent a large deficit. Work has gone on and good work has been done, but many needed repairs, reconstructions and improvements of necessity have been impossible. Again a deficit in income has been made up by drawing on our capital; this has been necessary, but obviously the result is a lessened income for all future years, since a hospital makes no profit by which previous deficits thus met may be repaid to endowment. The 1933 deficit happily has been lessened by funds derived from the Boston Emergency Drive.

These economic conditions present a great problem for all types of private philanthropic institutions. How are they to be met? Must there be a reorganization of all private charities? These are serious problems confronting us. We can only prepare, as far as is possible, to carry on under changed conditions, if such develop, and this seems likely. As one is able to judge of present governmental policies, wealth is to be distributed and

great fortunes discouraged, if not prevented. Yet endowed hospitals could never have been developed but for the gifts of the wealthy. If no such gifts can be expected in the future, new methods of financing hospitals such as the Peter Bent Brigham must be found. Various plans have been discussed; none so far seem very feasible. Is it a probability that endowed hospitals will become governmentally maintained and controlled or will they be discontinued? We can only hope that neither eventuality will develop, and that gradually economic conditions will make possible a continued existence for the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital as in the past and with the carrying out of plans of development formulated prior to the beginning of the period of depression.

The reduction in salaries and wages made in 1932 by vote of the corporation has been continued in force during 1933 and in this way a sum totalling approximately \$30,000.00 was saved the institution during the current year. This should be recognized as the contribution of the personnel of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital to help the needs of the community and might well be credited by the Boston Emergency Drive to these people in addition to such other contributions as they made directly in 1933. At some future date when, and if, economic conditions improve, steps should be taken to restore, as far as possible, these necessitous contributions dating through the period of the reduction in salaries and wages, particularly, as in many instances, these reductions were from salaries which the corporation by vote had obligated themselves to pay during the continuance of satisfactory service without any proviso for reduction. The cheerfulness with which these reductions in wages and salaries were accepted is

all the more reason for such an attitude. The increase that is taking place in cost of living will add to the burden brought about by reduction in wages and salaries, and if it continues, will demand an early return to the level of wages and salaries existing prior to the reduction in 1932 referred to above; this will be only justice to the hospital personnel.

'REUNION. To turn our thoughts into more pleasant channels, memories of the reunion of 1933 well will serve. Past and present nurses, house officers, residents and assistant residents, member of the medical, surgical, pathological and administrative staffs for three days, May 4, 5 and 6, gathered in surprisingly large numbers from near and far; hard times were forgotten; all enjoved themselves as a large family returned to the old homestead. Each morning until 11 o'clock the routine work of the Hospital was open for inspection and former Brighamites could contrast this day with their own, critically or uncritically, as the case might be. From 11 to 1 and from 2:30 to 4:30 each day a splendid scientific program (for this see another page in this volume) was carried out with precision; this consisted of excellent presentations of work done by those who had left the Brigham fold and by home talent. Each day all had luncheon in the hospital dining room as guests of our trustees; to Miss McDonald, our dietitian, every one gave enthusiastic praise for the delicious food and its efficient service. Tea on the lawn by the Nurses Alumnae Association filled the afternoons. One evening after dinner at the Hospital all were entertained by a lantern slide exhibit of early photographs arranged by the nurses and by a delightful musical comedy prepared and rendered by the Resident Staff. In the lat-

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ter the foibles of the older staff were portrayed in a way to bring pleasure to all, including those whose idiosyncrasies were portrayed. Even that imaginary fly which for so long has been tickling the Physician-in-Chief's head appeared in corporeal form; this is but an index of the perfection of "the play". On another evening the gymnasium at Vanderbilt Hall was filled for dinner followed by presentations to the Brigham Hospital of the portrait of Dr. Cushing, former Surgeonin-Chief, and to Harvard University of a portrait of the present Physician-in-Chief on the occasion of his completion of twenty-five years service as Hersey Professor of the Theory and Practice of Physic in the Medical School. After this there was a dance at Longwood Towers. At the end of the last afternoon's program Miss Hall, Superintendent of Nurses, was presented with an old Sheffield plate teapot as a token of the esteem for her felt by all of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital family.

These reunions, of which this is the third, mean much to the Hospital. That so many returned, often from great distances, to token their continued interest in and affection for their hospital is a wonderful stimulus to those of the present staff. Those that have worked with us in their earlier days form now a large group scattered widely who are doing splendid work in their various fields of endeavor; in them we take very great pride. These reunions are to be repeated at five-year intervals; the next will be in 1938.

INVESTIGATION. As has often been emphasized in different annual reports investigation is important to the best functioning of the Hospital in the care of patients; it is the vivifying influence that prevents
stagnation and decrease in efficiency for the staff; investigation in a hospital calls for the most careful observation of patients, and patients profit thereby. To the lay mind investigation frequently suggests the idea that patients are being experimented on and not infrequently are harmed; nothing could be further from the truth; investigation demands the keenest, most critical sort of study of patients, and to be successful, if for no other reason, it is essential that patients are in no wise harmed; since the opening of the Hospital it has been the rule that patients must understand and be entirely willing to cooperate in whatever is done, and nothing is ever done which is believed likely to injure the patient in any way. The willing cooperation of patients is an evidence of their confidence in the staff; it has always been given freely.

During 1933 there has been carried on a considerable amount of investigation, as will be seen from the list of 1933 publications appearing on a subsequent page of this report and in the list to appear next year, for often work done in one year does not appear in print until the next year. In this year there has been very much interest at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in total thyroidectomy as a means of therapy in cardiac disease, the work stimulated and carried on by Dr. Levine, who with his associates in cooperation with Dr. Cutler and his assistants of the surgical service has made important observations at the Brigham, while Dr. Blumgart, earlier a house officer with us, has been conducting studies of the same type at the Beth Israel Hospital.

Myxedema long has been recognized as a condition in which the body is largely in a vegetative phase with lowered metabolism and decreased physical activity and in which symptoms of cardiac failure and particularly

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anginal symptoms may follow too vigorous treatment with thyroid extract. Treatment of cardiac disease always has had as a very important factor the insistence on rest. Complete removal of the thyroid gland will result in myxedema, *i.e.*, a vegetative phase of human activity, in which there would be a maximum of rest. The application of such an induced maximal rest to cardiac patients, failing to respond satisfactorily to other forms of therapy, is what has been carried out by total thyroidectomy.

It is too early to attempt as yet any full evaluation of this method of treatment, but certain opinions are justified. First, it has become evident that the removal of all thyroid tissue from patients with severe cardiac disease surgically is possible without any more risk than is incident to most procedures of major surgery; second, it has been found that immediately after complete removal of the thyroid, as a rule, anginal pain, previously present, does not recur; third, maximal rest, as had been anticipated from our knowledge of myxedema, results from thyroid ablation and decreases signs of congestive heart failure where these have been present. In total thyroidectomy operations in some patients the parathyroids are removed or injured with resultant tetany; this disturbance has not been difficult to control. Myxedema, though producing a vegetative phase of body mechanism, is not a desirable condition, for it is accompanied by unpleasant symptoms and disturbing results, and so we regard it as a disease requiring treatment, which treatment must be maintained through life. Treatment by feeding thyroid gland substance to restore the deficient thyroid principles is only fairly satisfactory; it is rare to see complete restoration to normal in the naturally myxedematous patient from

such therapy; in some patients results of thyroid dosage definitely are unsatisfactory; whether artificially produced myxedema will resemble natural myxedema in these respects will not be known until more time has elapsed.

In artificially induced myxedema treatment will be limited to that basal metabolic level consistent with the limitations imposed by the existent cardiac deficiency. Consequently results from the treatment of congestive cardiac failure and angina by thyroid ablation will depend upon the feasible balance of two evils in type opposed to each other. This puts a limit on the results from the point of view of comfort and body efficiency; complete myxedema and cardiac dysfunction are both evils; too much of either is intolerable; an optimum admixture is to be sought; if attainable, the patient is improved, not rendered normal, but only so long as a naturally progressing heart lesion remains within certain limits. Results so far offer no evidence that thyroid ablation influences the underlying organic cardiac lesion, and it is obvious that the period of relief from symptoms of congestive failure is going to be but a limited one, the length depending on the stage of congestive failure at which the patient should be advised to undergo the major surgical operation of total thyroidectomy.

Natural myxedema develops slowly as a result of progressing atrophy of the thyroid and symptoms appear gradually; it may be that acute myxedema from total thyroidectomy will gradually, as time goes on, develop more and more of the discomforts of naturally developing myxedema which are not present shortly after thyroid ablation. The patient may be no better off eventually with the discomforts of uncontrollable

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myxedema than he was with uncontrollable congestive heart failure and he may end up having both disabilities, but he will have a period of greatly increased comfort. These patients, as we have seen already, have a very narrow zone between the thyroid dosage that is improving their myxedema condition and the thyroid dosage that will precipitate acute congestive heart failure. All of these factors make it probable that total thyroidectomy will have only a limited field in treating congestive heart failure and that the period of improved condition for most patients will be in terms of months, and those not many.

With regard to anginal pain the outlook seems better. There is suggestive evidence that the effect on anginal pain may be other than the effect of decreased metabolic activity; if so, the favorable influence may be expected to persist longer than the effect on congestive heart failure. However, total thyroidectomy does not stop anginal pain in every patient, and probably does not decrease the probability of coronary occlusion. The satisfactory treatment of naturally acquired myxedema often is limited by the anginal attacks produced by thyroid gland dosage. This may turn out to be the case, too, with artificially induced myxedema in some patients as time elapses, with the result that operation has caused a myxedema in many ways intolerable, which can not be much relieved, because, when adequate thyroid dosage is reached, the patient has, as a result, the severe attacks of angina pectoris for which he was primarily treated by thyroid removal. Just how these factors will work out in various patients will determine the worthwhileness of total thyroidectomy in the treatment of angina pectoris. Present experience lacks the necessary time element to justify as yet a definite opin-

ion on the real value of this new therapeutic procedure in angina pectoris. It would seem that here too the field of applicability will not be a wide one.

The study of these patients following total thyroidectomy has opened up many problems for investigation and already has resulted in important new knowledge. In this sense the procedure has been worthwhile. Also patients thus treated have been symptomatically much better even though for a limited time; they have expressed great enthusiasm for the results; this, too, is very worthwhile.

Vigorous but retiringly modest, a delightful personality at close range, both resident and visiting staff greatly enjoyed his sojourn among us and profited from the wisdom in medicine which emanated from him as he walked our wards and lived our life at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

# REPORT OF THE PHYSICIAN-IN-CHIEF

CHANGES IN PERSONNEL. Near the end of 1932 Dr. William T. Salter was appointed Junior Associate in Medicine, an appointment through my oversight not noted in the 1932 report. We are glad to have him on the staff. In 1933 Dr. Harry H. Blotner was promoted to the position of Associate in Medicine in recognition of his faithful and efficient service dating from 1925 when he came as Assistant Resident Physician.

During the year Dr. Richard G. Hahn ended his very effective service as Resident Physician to become Fellow in Pathology at the Cornell University Medical College. Quietly things ran under him; with good judgement he handled the many problems that we put on the Resident Physician for solution; his clinical work was well done. He has been succeeded by Dr. Eugene C. Eppinger, a graduate of Williams College, a Harvard M.D. and a former house officer and Assistant Resident Physician at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

In 1933 Paul H. Wosika and Edward A. Bartram resigned as Assistant Resident Physicians, the former to continue with us to study treatment of peptic ulcer on a fellowship granted by the Upjohn Company, the latter to enter practice at London, Ontario, Canada. The new Assistant Residents are Dr. Maurice A. Schnitker, M.D. of the University of Michigan, formerly Medical House Officer at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Dr. Edward A. Cannady, M.D. of Washington University, who comes to us from Barnes Hospital, St. Louis and Dr. P. H. Drewry, Jr., M.D. of Johns Hopkins University, who comes to us from Baltimore City Hospital.

As Medical House Officers the following men completed their service and began on other work as follows:

Dr. Roberto F. Escamilla to become Assistant Resident Physician at the University of California Hospital, San Francisco, Dr. Milton H. Clifford to become Assistant Resident Physician at the Massachusetts General Hospital, Dr. Robert E. Glendy to become first Assistant Physician at the Middlesex County Sanatorium and later Assistant Resident Physician at the Massachusetts General Hospital, Dr. Maurice A. Schnitker to become Assistant Resident Physician at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Dr. Charles F. Walcott to continue medical study at the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Dr. Christian F. Midelfart to become House Officer at the New York Lying-In Hospital, Dr. William R. Hallaran to become Assistant Resident in Medicine at the Lakeside Hospital, Cleveland and Drs. Eugene A. Stead, Jr. and John G. Gibson to become Research Fellows at Harvard to carry on experimental studies in the Laboratory of the Department of Medicine.

REPORT OF DR. FITZ ON THE OUT-DOOR DEPART-MENT. I know of nothing very startling to report regarding the activities of the Medical Out-Door Department during the past year. The appointment system continues to function well and has abundantly demonstrated its usefulness. The so-called Teaching Clinic has also established its value. It has been interesting to watch the development of the third and fourth year medical students who have been assigned work there. Such students have quarters admirably equipped for the office practice of medicine and they soon acquire considerable aptitude in the recognition of disease and in the art of managing people. Certainly the teaching facilities of the Out-Door Department are much appreciated, well utilized and help the Hospital's work.

# REPORT OF THE PHYSICIAN-IN-CHIEF

The various special clinics where patients are treated in groups have continued to function satisfactorily. Dr. F. W. Marlow, Jr., Associate in Medicine, has assumed responsibility for directing the Luetic Clinic. I am confident that this important clinic will acquire great momentum under his guidance. Dr. Levine from the Cardiac Clinic states that our heart patients have suffered a loss in the resignation of Miss Katherine Homans. As he says, we all owe her a great debt of gratitude for the untiring and unselfish assistance which she has rendered in the Social Service work of the Hospital. She is one of the earliest volunteer Social Service workers to be attached to a cardiac clinic in this country, and for many years brought a most intelligent and wholesome spirit to her patients.

The physicians in charge of the other therapeutic clinics report no striking news or changes. Each clinic has had a busy year, has done efficient and helpful work for our patients and has expanded almost to the limit of its capacity.

I often wish that I were gifted with greater powers of foresight. There are many problems to be solved in the near future. One of the most important is a determination of policy regarding the manner in which the course of the Hospital is to be guided most wisely.

Twenty-one years ago I began to work in the Out-Door Department. The Clinic was small then and our quarters seemed large enough. Now we are vastly overcrowded. One sub-department is continually in the way of another. On the average two hundred patients are seen each day and about twenty-five new ones are examined in the general medical and surgical divisions. New special clinics tend to sprout up and there is always demand for more. Dr. Wilhelm has assem-

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bled some very impressive figures which illustrate the common causes for which patients are turned away. According to these figures there is a definite demand from patients that we establish in the Hospital eye, skin and ear clinics in addition to what we already have. And no doubt were such special clinics established, demands for new efforts would soon arise.

The present Out-Door Department building has nearly reached the saturation point of its accommodative powers. We soon must have a new building or a reform in the manner in which we use the present one. Boston already has enough large out-patient departments for a city of its size. Ours should remain small, intimate and individual; I favor curtailment of effort rather than expansion.

In closing these remarks I must again thank certain standbys for their cooperation in making the Out-Patient Department run so smoothly; Miss Alice Cheney and her well-organized Social Service Department; Miss Rachel Adams who has proved a most efficient administrator; Miss Frances McGuire who works in the laboratory and in addition, with unfailing cheerfulness, drills platoon after platoon of students in laboratory technique and manners; and finally, nurses, houseofficers, visiting physicians and everyone else who contribute their mite toward making the Hospital's personality so gracious that each year more sick people knock at our doors wishing to be mothered and nursed here.

This is the twentieth Annual Report that I have written as Physician-in-Chief. Over and over again I have ended the report with an expression of great gratitude to the many individuals who have made both possible
