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President's Report

OUR REAL problem is still lack of endowment. Our founder's funds were largely in real estate and unfortunately a large amount was kept in that sort of property and any owner of real estate knows what that means.

The majority of our Trustees have been elected in the last few years and are now a board that any hospital might be proud of, and have done a great deal of work in the last two years. Much of our real estate has been sacrificed at great loss of capital in cases where the taxes were more than the income and our fund is in better shape that it ever was before.

In order to keep running, an unfortunate amount of our capital has been sacrificed in the last ten years, in spite of the large amounts which we have received from the Community Federation. Any one interested in the Hospital and its great assistance to the Harvard Medical School as one of the important teaching centers can be of great help in inducing friends and patients to give donations or leave bequests to this Hospital. Our neighbors, who are doing no better work, benefit annually from such gifts while ours have been conspicuous by their absence owing to our having started life sufficiently endowed.

On January 1, our Superintendent, Dr. Joseph B. Howland, who has for twenty years handled the Hospital most efficiently, retired and I know will be missed by all who know the Hospital. We were fortunate in getting Dr. Norbert A. Wilhelm to take up the difficult work as his successor.

Changes are coming rapidly in our staff and next year we lose our Medical Chief, Dr. Henry A. Christian, who has worked so faithfully for the Hospital for the last

T. Monroe, who will leave us on September 1. On the surgical service, we will lose Dr. David Cheever. Dr. Christian's successor will be Dr. Soma Weiss and we have great hopes that he will continue to improve and modernize our medical efficiency.

We have continued our custom of appointing distinguished doctors as Chiefs of Staff pro tempore for one week. Dr. Emil Goetsch served as our Surgeon-in-Chief pro tempore during the Reunion, and Dr. Francis G. Blake as Physician-in-Chief pro tempore. We have benefitted greatly from this contact with practice in other institutions.

The Ladies' Social Service Committee, the Advisory Committee of the School of Nursing, and the Gray Lady Service of the American Red Cross have continued their good work in assisting us.

Report of the Superintendent

This is the twenty-fifth report of the Superintendent, covering the year 1938.

There were admitted to the wards 4,584 patients, compared with 4,714 last year. The number of days' care was 70,107-408 less than in 1937. The average bed occupancy was 77-%, a fraction of 1% less than last year. The average stay per patient was 15+ days as compared with 15— days in 1937. The percentage of free patients was 46- in 1937, 49- this year. The per capita cost, based on the total expenditures (excepting the Out-Door Department) was \$7.77+ a day as compared with \$7.35 last year. Deducting the cost of operating the private ward and the Out-Door Department, the per capita cost was \$5.95+. It was \$6.77 in 1937. In the Out-Door Department, the number of new patients treated was 6,552. Last year it was 6,582. The total number of visits was 84,365—3,190 more than last year.

The daily per capita cost for provisions for all persons fed averaged \$.41+, a decrease over last year of \$.03—.

The total operating expenses for the year were \$607,794.53, and the receipts from patients \$319,745.06. The difference, \$288,049.47, represents the amount of free service to the indigent sick of Suffolk County, to serve whom the Hospital was founded.

We wish here to record our thanks to all who contributed to the Community Federation, which has become so important—a really vital part in the life of the social agencies of the community. We wish to record again the fact that no patient resident in Suffolk County has ever been refused admission because of inability to pay.

The personnel of the Dietary Department remains unchanged from last year. Six students completed the

ten months' course during the year. This course of training has now been extended to one year in order to give the students more work in private ward service. The total special diet days for the year 1938 were 12,251, as compared with 14,150 last year. The outstanding diets were: Diabetic, 2,814; High Caloric-High Vitamin, 3,664; High Carbohydrate-Low Fat, 1,355; Low Residue, 1,118. 2,062 special extra diets were served.

The Gray Lady Service of the American Red Cross has continued to be very helpful in taking charge of the Patients' Library and in furnishing us helpers in the Orthopedic, Otolaryngological, Arthritic, and Gastro-Intestinal Clinics, also in making supplies. This service, through twenty-two individuals, gave a total of 3,467 hours of service to the Hospital. There were distributed from the Patients' Library during the year 7,901 books and magazines. During the year, 419 books were contributed by various individuals of which 235 were donated by Miss Mary Clapp, 36 by Miss Eleanor Chase, 31 by Miss Louise Fitz, 18 by Miss Caulfield, 15 by Dr. O'Hare, and the others from many different individuals. In addition to the library and clinic service, the Red Cross made up 96,190 surgical dressings.

It has been customary to have a reunion of the alumni of the Hospital every five years. This year marked the twenty-fifth anniversary of the opening of the Hospital, and the Trustees made it a notable occasion. A buffet luncheon was served on the Hospital grounds following the public exercises. Nearly 1,000 people were present at the luncheon. In addition, the Trustees gave a dinner on Friday evening, May 6, to the alumni at Vanderbilt Hall, followed by a ball at Longwood Towers.

A play, "Growing Pains," was presented on Thursday evening, May 5, in the Hospital amphitheater, under the direction of Drs. Gibson, Dunphy, Quigley, and Durant, with music by Dr. Wilkins, and was an unusual success. This play was so popular that it was given three times and still there were some unable to obtain admission.

With the exception of the events which have taken place at each reunion, the expenses of all the rest were contributed personally by the trustees of the Hospital. Six hundred and five alumni registered, of whom 352 were nurses, 243 were doctors, 9 were dietitians, and 1 a former housekeeper.

Thanks are particularly due to the Community Federation, which loaned us Mr. Nelson C. Metcalf of its Publicity Department. Mr. Metcalf stayed at the Hospital during the several days' exercises, and kept in constant touch with the press, furnishing them with photographs and articles of interest concerning the program. A handsome booklet, "The Heart of a Great Medical Centre," was published. The composition of the book was very largely due to Mr. Allyn B. Mc-Intire and was enthusiastically received. Five thousand copies were printed and 3,500 distributed to friends of the Hospital throughout the country.

We wish to acknowledge our thanks to the Godfrey M. Hyams Trust for their generous contribution of \$2,690.00 for X-ray apparatus.

Mr. William Amory gave a special fund of \$15,000.00 to be spent over a period of three years in increasing the size of the faculty of the School of Nursing, and to make it possible to improve the curriculum of the School to the end that it more nearly equal those of the better schools with which we are in competition for the more desirable students. During the year, a personnel director, an assistant science instructor, and a full-time secretary have been added to the nursing staff. The fund also permitted small increases in salary to other members of the nursing faculty. On June 2, 1938, a new group was added to our nursing force-ward helpers. They have proved successful in saving much time of our student and graduate nurses in performing routine duties, thus giving the student and graduate nurses more time for important nursing duties.

On September 21, the hurricane occurred. While there was considerable damage to the property in that 43 trees were blown down, together with the flag-pole, some trees striking buildings with more or less damage

to them, there was no damage to the lighting as the wires are all underground coming from the power plant at Harvard. The total damage amounted to about \$3,600.00, of which, fortunately, \$2,450.00 was recovered by insurance.

Tables II, III, and IV following this report give a more detailed account of the Hospital finances and statistics for comparison with other years. In closing, I wish to express here my thanks to the Trustees for their support, and to all members of the staff and employees for their loyalty and cooperation in helping to carry the Hospital through another difficult year of the depression.

Report of the Roentgenologist

It is more difficult than usual to write an annual report this year for two reasons. One is that there are so many changes taking place, and in prospect, that it is hard to evaluate what is going on so soon after it happens. The other reason is that one's friends insist on discussing either (a) the prospects of socialized medicine or (b) the hazardous situation in Europe, to the detriment of one's peace of mind and with loss of valuable time. But both are pertinent to this report and if I can stay out of the arguments long enough it will be brought out how and where they affect us.

Most of our friends realize, I am sure, how the financial situation of the Hospital has changed since the advent of the First Depression, and how much we are indebted to the Community Fund for their help in carrying on the work of the Hospital. Without the considerable help from the Fund, we would be seriously handicapped indeed. That is one of the greatest changes that has occurred recently, and it is hard to tell how that situation may further change. If the financial support of the Hospital should become entirely inadequate, one can only speculate as to other possible wings to shelter us as an institution—university, city, federal who knows? On the other hand, as we grow older we gain support from a wider circle of friends, both from a larger number of satisfied patients, and particularly from the ever-increasing circle of active professional graduates, especially those in practice in and around Boston. It takes several generations of both patients and graduates to establish such an institution as ours on a permanent family basis, particularly in the rocky soil of

New England, where twenty-five years of growth are considered merely an adolescent period. Our first generation of physicians, infused with the spirit of Councilman, Cushing, Christian and Wolbach, is coming of age indeed, as seen at the Twenty-fifth Reunion, and the second generation now starting under Cutler, Weiss, and future leaders and teachers will be as notable, I am sure, when the Fiftieth Reunion rolls around.

The successive changes in interest and in emphasis are reflected in our department. We miss the stimulating challenge of those daily problems in neurological diagnosis which we enjoyed when Dr. Cushing was here, but other problems take their place, no less interesting, and requiring the same careful study on our part to afford the maximum assistance in diagnosis. Dr. Burwell's interest in the dynamics of the circulation, Dr. Levine's interest in the exact anatomical, pathological and etiological diagnoses in diseased hearts, Dr. Cutler's interest in teaching, Dr. Christian's healthy skepticism, have all caused reflex changes in the spinal cord and sympathetic system of the Hospital-yes, I mean our department. The extra work and varied problems of orthopedic clinics, nose and throat clinic, and dental clinic have all been welcomed as offering variety as well as broadening the training of the house officer and assistant residents. The tumor follow-up clinic has been the weekly responsibility of the senior assistant resident, offering an excellent opportunity for the mutual benefit of the patient as well as the surgeon, radiologist, and pathologist, who profit by studying the end results of their treatment or prognosis.

The outstanding event of the year was undoubtedly the twenty-fifth anniversary celebration, most painstakingly arranged and most efficiently managed by Dr. Christian, who was at the same time the *cause célèbre*

and the hero of the annual play—a production never to be forgotten by those who were fortunate enough to witness one of its three presentations. Hundreds of alumni from all over the country and friends from near and far joined to celebrate the occasion. The formal program of papers was enriched by contributions from several former members of our department. The professional program alone was worth any amount of time and trouble to return, being of a higher calibre and more sustained interest than any the national medical societies could produce.

The second item of importance in this report is to record the most welcome addition of a fluoroscopic tilttable with a spot-film device to aid us particularly in our studies of the gastro-intestinal tract and the spinal canal. The equipment was given to us by the Trustees of the Hyams Trust who so generously helped us with a new therapy machine two years ago. The new apparatus has been of considerable value and help and is, of course, in daily use not only for the gastro-intestinal work but also in the fluoroscopic reduction of fractures and in the surgical nailing of fractured hips. The use of the fluoroscope in the reduction of fractures has grown so much that plans are on foot to equip a separate room for fracture work, where the equipment will be available and ready at all times instead of at odd and inconvenient times as at present.

Referring to the records, we note that patient number 100,000 was duly recorded on our books, as prophesied in last year's report. This number was reached on February 18, 1938, and was assigned to a resident of Suffolk County who was X-rayed for gall stones. He was later admitted to the Hospital with jaundice and after two weeks in the medical ward was discharged with a diagnosis of catarrhal jaundice, cause unknown. Like

so many other X-ray examinations, this one was of no positive help or value except that it ruled out the 20% of "positive" or opaque gall stones. Cholecystograms after the jaundice had cleared showed no gall bladder shadow suggesting a non-functioning gall bladder. The patient felt well, was again working regularly and decided to get along without further help from the Hospital or from the magic number of X-ray No. 100,000. The last new patient on December 31, 1938, received number 104,009, making a total of 4,675 new patients this year. There was an even larger number of old patients re-examined or treated during the year, with a total of 13,750 patient-visits for the year, an average of well over a thousand a month-more than the optimum for our present equipment and personnel. Other figures as to the work of the department will be found at the end of the report.

Financially the department has suffered from the Second Depression with a marked fall in revenue and a slight increase in cost so that our record as a self-supporting and revenue-producing department has been broken. For the first time in twenty years, the department was in the red for the year, but fortunately for only a small amount, roughly \$500.00—which was the cost of a new therapy tube and new oil for its insulation. Efforts are being made to cut the expenses still more and we hope to be out of the red again next year especially if the general financial situation improves.

Speaking of equipment, our department survived the hurricane of September 21 with no damage and with only a few hours' shut-down due to the loss of power. In fact the Hospital and grounds fared well except for the loss of awnings and the loss of many of the old poplars along the street and between the wards—trees I never liked anyway. The X-ray department really did

suffer, however, when a torrential downpour on the night of August 17 overwhelmed the storm sewers of the whole neighborhood, resulting in a flood of dirty water all through the department. All of the machines were put out of commission, several of them requiring replacement of parts, adding considerably to the year's expenses. Of greater importance but of incalculable value was the loss of thousands of films stored in the basement and ruined by the water, leaving quite a gap in our records. We hope the catastrophe will not be repeated but we are unable to prevent its recurrence so long as we remain in our present location, as the water backed up through the storm sewers inside the Hospital yard. This is the second flood which we have suffered and the only way I can see to prevent it will be to move the department to a higher level. It is not true that the hurricane was caused by the symposium which Dr. Levine and I put on at Atlantic City that same afternoon although we did talk intermittently for four hours and the high winds did come from that direction.

One of the most important changes in prospect is the installation of a new Physician-in-Chief next year and we are looking forward to welcoming Dr. Soma Weiss to membership in our official family. No one can take The Professor's place, but the work and the traditions and the high ideals which he has initiated can still be carried on. No more stimulating person than Dr. Weiss could be found, I am sure, and we hope that he will be as happy to come as we are to have him with us. Even harder jobs await Dr. Wilhelm, who will succeed Dr. Howland on January 1, and Miss Beal who took up Miss Hall's burdens last year, as their administrative duties in both cases are handicapped by financial stringency. Necessity, however, is still the mother of invention, and to be too rich is a temptation to be idle. We can all

keep busy, and will have to keep busy while hoping for more comfort if not luxury ahead. But while the watchword is economy, it is never at the expense of service to our patients, but rather inconvenience to ourselves and our co-workers.

There are many items of personal interest in and from the department this year, and from its alumni both professional and technical. We regret to note that the first roentgenologist of this Hospital, Dr. Alfred Luger, died in Vienna, Austria, on July 10, 1938. Dr. Cushing has placed in the Hospital library a bound volume of his reprints and other mementoes as a monument to his service with us. Miss Hilda M. Riley, known to several successive groups of house officers and nurses as one of our best-liked and most charming nurses, died on July 26, 1938, of cardiac decompensation. We miss her cheery presence and her never-failing good humor very much indeed. Two of our former house officers have had personal acquaintance with serious illnesses this year. one of them with pulmonary tuberculosis which has laid him up for a year, and the other with undulant fever which lasted for months. Both, fortunately, are well enough to resume their work again at present and both have acquired a new viewpoint and a new appreciation of health which the rest of us take for granted.

The usual succession of residents resulted in the "graduation" of Dr. David A. Sampson in June of 1938 to an important position with Dr. G. E. Pfahler in Philadelphia. Dr. John Larkin was promoted to his position, and Dr. Wallace Miller began his term as junior assistant resident on July 1. The position of house officer in the department was awarded to Dr. Robert E. Crowder, a graduate of Northwestern Medical School, after his interneship at Passavant Memorial Hospital. Several volunteer graduate assistants have served in the

department during the year, Dr. Laxman Athle, from Bombay, India; Dr. Johnston, from Gorham, New Hampshire; Dr. Morey, from Ada, Oklahoma; and Dr. Simpson, from Hyannis, Massachusetts. The last three of these were sponsored in whole or in part by the Commonwealth Fund in their laudable work of supplying trained specialists for community hospitals in the smaller centers. We feel that this is a very worthwhile contribution both by the Commonwealth Fund and by the Trustees of the Hospital in an attempt to elevate the standards of medical practice throughout the country. This method of short-term intensive teaching for carefully selected men will go a long way toward meeting the demand for trained radiologists as noted in last year's report—a demand which still far exceeds the supply. It is particularly worthy of note that foundations such as the Commonwealth Fund consider the radiologist and pathologist as the most important nucleus of the staff of the community hospitals which they encourage. Res ibsa loquitur.

Upon recommendation of the Committee for Displaced Foreign Physicians, we have accepted as voluntary graduate assistant Dr. H. Peter Mueller, from Königsburg, East Prussia, for a period of one year from July 1, 1938. Dr. Mueller has already earned his place in our department by his careful work and by his linguistic ability.

The technical staff has also undergone one change, as Mrs. McLean (formerly Louise Taylor) resigned in April. Miss Helen Sargent of the class of 1928 has been put in charge of the rapidly increasing work in the cystoscopic rooms. Many applications for training in radiographic technic have been received, but it is our custom to accept only those whom we wish to employ in the department. It might be feasible and advantageous

to accept one or two students a year and thus have replacements more readily available in case of illness or resignations.

Of academic as well as professional interest is the fact that twelve papers were read by the Roentgenologist before different societies during the year, of which only three were published—an example of literary restraint combined with laziness. The usual amount of thirdand fourth-year teaching has been carried on in addition to the increased routine work, averaging about two hours a day through the school year for the students' and house officers' instruction. The fourth-year elective course in Roentgenology at our Hospital is said to be the most popular of the electives, possibly because we vary rarely flunk anyone and practically never give an "A." The X-ray conferences have been held weekly throughout the school year, with a continuation of the never-ending and ever-increasing feud between the departments of pathology and roentgenology, only occasionally submerged by a joint attack upon medical or surgical or orthopedic fallacies. Suggestions are being considered to change the time of the clinic to an afternoon hour so that outside physicians and house officers from neighboring hospitals might more readily attend.

In summarizing the year, we might say that it has been one of progress, of more and better roentgenotherapeutic endeavors, of increased efficiency in diagnosis with our new apparatus, of wider usefulness in teaching, and of continued friendly collaboration and support (with occasional helpful criticism) from our sister departments, the administration, and the Trustees.

Report of the School of Nursing

THE YEAR 1938 marks the beginning of a second quarter of a century for the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. On May 5, 6, and 7, the Hospital, in recognition of this anniversary, invited all of its Alumnæ and Alumni to return to celebrate this occasion. As a result, 352 graduates of this School of Nursing returned and participated in a professional program, contributing papers and taking part in demonstrations. They observed changes in their School, reviewed old friendships and enjoyed the hospitality extended by the members of the Corporation and the Hospital staff.

It seems fitting at this time in the history of the School to consider briefly the fields in which these graduates are engaged, to determine, if possible, whether or not the School is preparing them to meet the demands of the community for their services. It is not enough that a School of Nursing prepare young women for such a vocation without thought of the need for their services and the probability of their employment. We have graduated 811 nurses. Of this number about 50% of them are actively engaged in nursing, the other 50% have married or, for one reason or another, are inactive. Of the number of nurses actively engaged in nursing, 22% are in private nursing, 21% in public health nursing, 50% in institutional nursing, and 7% in various fields, as office nursing, the foreign field, laboratory work, organization work, social service, teaching in college, or have forsaken nursing for business. In the country at large, graduate nurses are distributed as follows: 55% are in private nursing, 9% are in public health, and 36% are in institutional nursing.

For a good many years, the number and distribution of nurses in the country, as a whole, has been of great concern to both the nursing profession and to the public, the consumer of nursing service. In 1934, when the final report of the Grading Committee appeared, it was obvious that under the existing apprenticeship system in hospital schools of nursing, such as we are conducting, that nurses were being graduated more rapidly than they could be absorbed in the community; that the distribution of available nursing service was poor, and that the economics of nursing was unsatisfactory to both the nurse and the employer of nurses. At the same time a high percentage of the people in our country were in dire need of nursing service. It was also shown that of the 294,189 graduate nurses in the country, the majority were not sufficiently well prepared to meet the needs in such fields as public health, psychiatric nursing, tuberculosis nursing, pediatrics or obstetrics, and that the numbers needed in teaching and supervision in schools of nursing, and in the specialties was entirely inadequate. Hospital and public health agencies could place only a small percentage of graduates, leaving by far the largest group of nurses dependent on the unstable and seasonal work in private nursing for their livelihood.

Sufficient attention was brought to this situation so that since 1934 many schools, such as this, reduced the number of students which they admitted, and many others believing that they did not provide a sufficiently rich field for teaching nursing gave up their schools. This has opened new opportunities for a large number of nurses as general staff nurses in hospitals; some stimulation has been given to the extension of the services of nurses in the public health field from both private and public agencies; the program in many schools of nursing has been enriched to better qualify nurses to meet the

needs; and from the demands of nurses themselves postgraduate courses have developed in colleges and universities to provide a better qualified group in teaching and supervision. Pursuant to these trends, prospective applicants in nursing are giving more careful scrutiny to nursing as a future vocation. Under the advice of guidance counsellors who are themselves becoming better informed on the types of preparation offered in schools of nursing, applicants are selecting their schools more carefully.

It is interesting to note that those schools which have followed these trends and have made changes in their curricula, in keeping with them, have had no dearth of applicants. Nursing offers today a wider range of interests for young women interested in a service career than ever before. Changes in science, in medical practice and in social conditions make new demands upon nurses which they must be prepared to meet. Therefore, the school which offers a preparation which will equip its graduates to meet these needs will obviously attract the most desirable applicants. Diminishing opportunities for selection and a constantly decreasing enrollment in a school such as this, which has always held a high place among schools of the country and which has much to offer, should challenge our consideration.

We have, in the past, produced many good nurses, nurses who have found their place in the profession, and from their distribution appear to be meeting the needs more adequately than the rank and file of nurses. The question confronting this school appears to be whether we are going to remain among the schools holding first rank and continue to produce nurses well qualified to serve in the community, or are we going to follow this general laissez-faire pattern of schools which continue to swell the ranks without thought of the need in the

community. There are just as many fine young women interested in nursing as ever before. There is even a greater need for well-prepared nurses. Intelligent applicants are seeking the best course they can find to prepare themselves.

I have purposely cited these facts relative to nursing in the country as a whole, and to our specific situation, because our whole philosophy of nursing education and the responsibility which we assume by conducting a school, to provide the number and type of nurses that are needed, is involved. The belief that the Brigham Hospital offers a rich field for the teaching of medical and surgical nursing is well founded. However, this is not a sufficiently varied field to provide a well-rounded program in nursing. It is true that we have always supplemented these services by affiliation in obstetrics and pediatrics. We have not met our obligations in the fields of psychiatry or public health. It is generally believed by leaders in nursing, because of the experience of nurses who have had the fundamental preparation in the care of the mentally ill, that a basic experience in this clinical field, with emphasis on the preventive aspect, mental hygiene, is an essential part of the equipment of every nurse. Only six of our students receive this introductory experience each year. They invariably state it to be one of their most valuable experiences in their preparation for generalized nursing, and since the demand for nurses in this field far exceeds the supply, it gives them a basic foundation on which to build in the future. There is no question but that the affiliation in public health nursing has served to interest a larger percentage of our graduates in this field. It is to be regretted that more of the public health point of view is not taught within our own walls. Had we a public health nurse on our staff, whose duty it was to teach nursing from the community health point of view, far better use could be made of the students' experience, both in the out-patient department and on our wards. Too much emphasis is placed on teaching the care of the patient in the hospital, and too little on the care of a patient as an individual, a member of a family, or social group.

That 50% of our graduates who are practicing are engaged in institutional nursing can be accounted for partly by the increased number of graduates being employed by hospitals for bedside care, and speaks well for the large number who from their personal qualifications and by advanced study have prepared themselves for positions in supervision, teaching or administration. It would seem that with the increasing demands for nurses in the specialities, in public health, and in institutional nursing, and with the constant advances in medical science, that the course in the school of nursing should develop to meet these needs. It is essential that all instruction and practice be centered around good patient care, and that the graduate from a school of nursing such as this, should have that fundamental knowledge essential in all good nursing. Providing as we do, a rich clinical field for the teaching of medical and surgical nursing, our problem is to make better use of the facilities available and enrich experience by extending student practice in such services as psychiatry, and public health, to a larger number of students than receive it at present.

This year, because of the decreased number of students, it has been necessary to increase the number of graduate staff nurses. To further supplement the work of nurses, 17 ward helpers were introduced into our wards in June to carry those routine non-nursing duties formerly carried by students, and allow more time for patient care. No adjustment that has been made this year has perhaps lessened the tensions under which our

nurses constantly work to so great an extent as the introduction of these workers. Unless ward helpers were assigned to night duty, we have reached our saturation point for this type of service, though additional nurses are very much needed in order to provide sufficient hours of nursing. For more than a year, records of the number of nursing hours available per patient daily, have shown that though meeting the minimum need we fall short of meeting what is accepted as adequate. It has been a matter of much concern, and one which should have the serious consideration of those who establish policies for the Hospital. It is greatly to the credit of head nurses and supervisors who carry the onus of such weaknesses that their morale is not broken. Not only should they be given an adequate number of workers to care for patients, but serious consideration should be given to shortening the hours for both graduate nurses and students. Not only would the morale of the group improve, but it would undoubtedly be reflected in the illness record. At the present time graduate nurses work from 49 to 54 hours per week, while students in the School, after the first six months, work a 51-hour week on the wards, exclusive of classes and study, in the daytime, and 56 hours a week at night, exclusive of classes and study. Add to this four to five hours of class with a similar amount of time for study, and it presents a schedule far too strenuous for a 19- to 20-year-old girl. One free day in seven, if not one and a half days in seven, appears only reasonable as a working week, as well as from a health point of view. Serious consideration should be given to this question, for both students and graduates.

Last year attention was called to the constantly diminishing enrollment in the School of Nursing. This year the School is smaller by eight students. Too much emphasis cannot be given to the fact that intelligent young women cannot be expected to enter a field in which they are so obviously exploited. And only in so far as the course can be built up to attract the type of young women whom we would like in nursing, with conditions of work which are suitable, can we expect to make progress.

This year a very generous gift from Mr. Amory, President of the Board, made possible three new appointments, which have been greatly appreciated. One was the appointment of a second science instructor, Miss Gladys Ekman, a graduate of Newton Hospital, another, Miss Grace McPhail, P. B. B. H. 1926, as supervisor of student health and of personnel. The appointment of a full-time secretary to the School of Nursing has relieved supervisors of much office routine and allowed more time for supervision. Other staff changes include the temporary appointment of Mrs. Gertrude Maurer, of the Newton Hospital, for follow-up in the Luetic Clinic under the auspices of the State Department of Health, to fill the vacancy created by Miss Marion Hampton's resignation in November. To fill head nurse vacancies Miss Jeanne Gervais, P. B. B. H. 1925, Miss Lucy Deggs, P. B. B. H. 1937, and Miss Jane Hunt, P. B. B. H. 1937, have been appointed. In September, Miss Esther Kinney, P. B. B. H. 1929, was appointed Supervisor of the Operating Room, and Miss Bridget Egan, P. B. B. H. 1935, was promoted to Instructor in Operating Room Technique, and Miss Helen Marsden, P. B. B. H. 1937, appointed as third assistant in the operating room. Miss Bernice Sinclair was released during the summer to teach the freshman students in the Simmons College School of Nursing their introductory course in nursing in this Hospital, thus continuing the ties with the College.

That an increasing number of graduates have sought to improve their preparation by taking advanced courses is encouraging. In the summer Miss Kinney and Miss Campbell were released to attend Boston University Summer School, and this winter seventeen graduates are taking one course at either Simmons College or Boston University.

Forty-seven students have entered; 43 have been graduated; 11 have withdrawn. Thirty-two students from the Children's Hospital School of Nursing have been accepted for six months' experience in adult nursing during the year, and 4 students accepted on January 29, 1938, from the Simmons College School of Nursing for one year's experience in adult nursing. The last group of students in the five-year combined program with Simmons College completed the work at the College in June, 1938, and were awarded the diploma of

this School of Nursing and a Bachelor of Science degree from Simmons College. During the year four graduate nurses from Simmons College were given their field work in the Hospital; three in head nursing ond one in teaching.

The twenty-fourth annual graduation exercises were held in the Assembly Hall at Simmons College on November 18, 1938. Mr. Amory, President of the Corporation, presided. Forty-three nurses were presented for diplomas. The Dr. John P. Reynolds gold medal for general efficiency was awarded to Mary Madelyn Herd. The John P. Reynolds scholarship for highest rank at the end of the second year was awarded to Agatha Kittrick. Jesse B. Davis, A.M., Litt.D., Dean of the School of Education at Boston University, gave the address.

In the retirement of Dr. Howland at the end of this year, after nearly twenty years as Superintendent of the Hospital, the School loses a staunch supporter and friend. We have been fortunate in having had his understanding support and counsel. His knowledge of sound principles of nursing education has given this School a stability and his ideals and standards have been a source of encouragement to those given the responsibility to maintain them. In the conduct of this School, his advice has frequently been sought, his counsel generously given, and his opinion always fair. For those innate qualities of the true gentleman and those outstanding abilities of an able administrator, we honor and respect him, and extend our most sincere good wishes for his coming years of retirement.

Report of the Social Service Department

DURING THE past year there were 1,421 new patients referred to the Social Service Department, 693 reinstated, 56 brought forward from previous year, making a total of 2,170 patients active in the department.

The many cases referred may be divided into several large groups according to the reason for referral, as follows: Convalescent, nursing, institutional, and terminal care; orthopedic appliances, housekeepers, transportation, interpretation to agencies, and miscellaneous requests.

Following operations, convalescent or even nursing care is often necessary because of the patient's physical condition and the home situation. This type of care was arranged for many patients, some of whom were able to pay their own expenses, and others for whom money was raised from special funds.

Institutional care for treatment of tuberculosis and cancer has been secured for patients needing it. Terminal care was also arranged for cancer patients either in an institution, private nursing home, or their own home. Most patients prefer to remain at home if possible. In this instance daily nursing care was provided by the cooperation of the visiting nurses. Community health nurses have also been sent to visit patients discharged home following operation, and others being followed in the Out-Door Department.

With the Orthopedic Clinic meeting twice weekly there have been many requests for orthopedic appliances. These have been provided for those patients unable to pay either by social service funds, or in the case of an expensive brace, by raising the money.

A great need has been met by the cooperation of the WPA Housekeeping Project in providing housekeepers for our patients. We have put in many requests for this service for various reasons; to enable a housewife to enter the hospital, to give help in the heavier housework during the period of convalescence, and for many patients who are unable to perform their household duties.

A thirty-two-year-old mother of five children, who had been in poor health for several years, was advised to have a repair operation. She came to social service asking help in arranging for the care of her children so that she could enter the hospital. The children were between the ages of three and eight so could not be left alone. Her husband was employed on the WPA three days a week but could look after the children on the days he was not working. Arrangements were made for a WPA housekeeper to go in while husband was at work and the patient entered the hospital. She had a very extensive operation and on discharge from the ward the doctor advised against any heavy work or lifting for at least six weeks. As she was a very energetic, conscientious, mother it was not felt wise for her to return home immediately from the hospital. She was sent to a convalescent home for two weeks. Transportation to clinic for check-up was arranged through the Red Cross Motor Corps. When she returned home the housekeeper was continued so that patient could be relieved of the heavy work.

The provision of transportation is an important part of the work done by the social worker. There are many patients who must report frequently to the Orthopedic Clinic, Fracture or Surgical Clinics, or to the Physiotherapy Department. These patients are incapacitated in some way and unable to travel by street car. Still others must report daily over a period of several weeks

for X-ray treatment. Generally their condition is such that travel by street car is impossible and transportation is arranged for them through the Red Cross Motor Corps. The help of the Motor Corps has been invaluable during the past year.

Interpretation to community agencies takes a good deal of time but is very worth while. In this way the interested agency is given an understanding of the patient's medical problem and is then able to cooperate with the Hospital in working to help him to return to health and independence. For example, an agency by helping provide a special diet, giving temporary relief, or finding suitable work has given many a patient the chance he needs but would be unable to make for himself.

Besides these main large groups of problems the social worker has received many varied requests. A woman who was partially incapacitated following an operation for a brain tumor needed a wheelchair; a child was unable to keep up with her regular class in school and needed some arrangement made for special work which she was capable of doing; a woman needed help in finding out how to go about securing return payments of a sum of money she had loaned to a friend. Any day may bring a totally new request for which the worker tries to provide.

In addition to the regular case work a follow-up study of the patients in the Tumor and Neuro Clinics has been started. The purpose is to check up on all those patients with a diagnosis of cancer who have not reported as advised for periodic examination or treatment. First their house and Out-Door Department records have been seen to find out whether patients had returned to other clinics, or had been reported as dead. Then home visits were made in an attempt to locate the patients and persuade them to return to the clinic. This study was started in October and at the end of December 55 patients had been visited.

Of the 55 patients 16 had died, 7 were unable to locate, 4 treating elsewhere, 2 confined to chronic hospitals, 2 confined to home, 1 working hours conflicted. Of the remaining 18, 14 patients have returned to the Tumor Clinic, 6 of these are to continue reporting for check-up, 4 advised treatment, and 3 discharged.

The social worker in the Arthritic Clinic has been successful in getting convalescent care for many of the patients even when this involved raising money to pay for this care.

The more important problem of getting work for patients handicapped with arthritis has not been met to any extent. The handicapped project of the WPA which for the last few years has taken some of our patients, has not been able to take new applications. We have been able to increase the family income for a few cases by getting work for other members of the family.

The problem of financing medicines used primarily to build up the patient's resistance, such as various vitamin preparations, Haliver Oil, etc., is difficult for most of our patients are unable to pay for them as they are very expensive and the Hospital has not felt able to provide them.

The Red Cross Motor Service has been most generous in bringing patients in both to the Clinic and Physiotherapy Department. The relief agencies have shown a sympathetic understanding of the needs of the patients that they have known.

The morale of the patients has been very good. They have felt that they benefited by returning to the Clinic and very little follow-up has been necessary.

On the Medical Service 21 patients were sent directly from the wards to convalescent homes, 18 patients to nursing homes, 13 patients were sent to hospitals for chronic diseases, and 11 patients discharged to sanatoria for tuberculosis. The Community Health Association was asked to supervise 23 patients in their own homes, and the WPA housekeepers were requested for 8 families. The most difficult cases to plan for satisfactorily are those needing chronic hospital care as there are such inadequate facilities to meet the great need.

During its second year the Psychiatric Service has continued to hold two clinics a week, one for adults and one for adolescents. The adolescent group is a small but important one. Maladjustments discovered early in life and dealt with promptly present a more hopeful prognosis than those which, originating in youth, have gone untreated for years.

During this second year the social worker has continued to take a detailed psychiatric social history from each patient referred to the clinic. This has proved useful not only to the psychiatrist but to the social worker herself when cases have been referred to her for help, and has saved time and facilitated prompt action in time of emergency with individual patients.

One of the patients in this clinic was a girl of fifteen, one of three children and the only girl. She and her older brother were constantly at odds. She was very fond of her younger brother but being only seven years old he was too young to be much of a companion. Her

parents were both neurotic and most incompatible. The difficult home situation assumed such an overwhelming importance in this girl's life that she attempted suicide last spring as the only solution. Frequent visits to the psychiatrist modified her outlook to a large extent but when summer came it seemed advisable to send her away from home so that she might get a different perspective on the situation. She was accepted by the Y. W. C. A. for their girls' camp. She is an attractive girl, with a pleasant singing voice, clever in theatricals, and fond of athletics. She fitted in well at the camp, took a leading part in camp plays and operettas and had a satisfying vacation. Last fall she entered high school and is enthusiastic about her courses and her teachers. It has been made possible for her to continue her connection with the Y. W. C. A. where she is enjoying several activities this winter. With all these outside interests the home conditions, though little changed, seemed far less intolerable to her.

The worker in the Cardiac Clinic has tasks which are varied and numerous. It is through her that the doctor may obtain any social information which might affect the patient. The worker becomes well acquainted with all patients as each reports at regular intervals over a long period. Through her visits to the home and cooperating with interested agencies, she understands the problem.

The Clinic routine is the responsibility of the social worker. She makes appointments, balances clinic sessions, and follows patients who have lapsed in their treatment. A social history is taken on each new patient at the initial visit to the clinic. At this time the rôle of the social worker, the appointment system, and need of medical care is interpreted to the patient. The nature of the patient's illness, the recommendations of the doctor are also explained. Although there may be no social problem at the moment, the patient is urged to consult

the worker at any future time. During the clinic sessions the majority of old patients are interviewed to keep the worker informed of any new social developments. Those who are unable to pay for medicines, X-rays, special tests, etc., are sent to the worker for the necessary adjustment and arrangement to obtain this free of charge.

This year 165 patients were referred to the social worker by the doctor or came voluntarily for some help. Many of these patients received intensive casework treatment while others desired some small service. Fourteen of these patients were referred for employment adjustment. For the most part the State Department of Rehabilitation, WPA Handicapped Project, the Cooperative Workrooms and the Christopher Shop cooperated with the worker. Through several child-placing agencies it was possible to send twelve children away to camp for the entire summer. The Children's Mission took eight of our young girls to a special cardiac camp for the summer season where a restricted life and close supervision was had under ideal conditions. Seventeen other children were sent to camp for shorter intervals. This group included six mothers, who accompanied their children for a two-week period.

Another task of the social worker is interpreting the patient's physical condition to interested agencies, employers, and schools. The Public Welfare Department sends questionnaires at regular intervals to check on patients' physical condition and work ability.

In many cases the Public Welfare aid was obtained for patients who were without a source of income. Increased aid for diets and better home conditions were requested and obtained. In solving many family difficulties the Family Welfare Society, Catholic Charitable Bureau, and Jewish Welfare Association cooperated.

A good deal of time and effort is expended in trying to teach the younger children in the clinic the value of restricted activity as recommended by the doctor and to acquaint them with some knowledge of their handicap without making them over-solicitous.

The Cardiac Clinic has also cooperated with the Children's Mission in the study they are making of cases of rheumatic heart disease. These cases have been reported to them and a chart is being made showing the incidents of this disease in relationship with poor living conditions.

Of the 107 new cases referred (age division being made at 16 years, inclusive), there were 32 men, 40 women, 21 girls, and 14 boys.

During the year the Luetic Clinic meets three afternoons a week. Two of these sessions are for treatment and the other one for consultation. The purpose of the Consultation Clinic is to diagnose new cases and reexamine those returning for check-up. The social worker is present at the Consultation Clinic and interviews each new patient. She establishes a friendly contact with each new patient and explains her rôle in the Clinic. Although there may be no problems at the mo-

ment, patients are urged to seek social service help if one should arise.

During this past year the social worker has assisted many patients without income in securing welfare aid or obtaining larger allowances for health reasons. She has asked the cooperation of the private family agencies; *i.e.*, The Family Welfare Society, Jewish Family Welfare Society and the Catholic Charitable Bureau in making satisfactory adjustments to the medical problems of many patients.

Because of the necessity of regular treatment over a long period, the social worker is often called on to encourage patients and reinterpret the need of such intensive care. In many cases a great deal of interpretation of the medical aspects of the disease by the doctor and the social worker is needed to convince patients of the value of having a lumbar puncture and malaria therapy. Patients also must be made to realize the importance of having serologies taken on contacts and members of the family in order to protect other individuals in the community.

Although our follow-up system is very successful, there are always some cases that lapse in the necessary treatment. The state epidermologists have done remarkable work in returning these cases to the Clinic. They are also alert to any social problems of which the worker may not be aware. The State Department of Public Health has been responsible for the payment of treatments, special tests, carfares, and hospitalization for those patients who cannot afford it.

With the State Department of Public Health and each clinic combining their efforts to control this disease and educate the general public the results should be gratifying.

There were 1,233 patients' visits to the Diabetic Clinic during the past year. Social Service does not provide insulin now from any of its relief funds. The responsibility of providing insulin has been taken over by the Hospital. Student dietitians have been most helpful in making follow-up calls to instruct patients showing a considerable amount of sugar or those who did not seem to understad the routine instructions given in the clinic. A volunteer clinic secretary has been in attendance during the year.

There were 1,569 patients' visits to the Dental Clinic. A volunteer clinic secretary has also been in attendance throughout the year.

The Red Cross Motor Corps made 2,376 trips to the Hospital bringing patients who were unable to travel on street cars. Great praise is due these drivers who give the use of their cars and so much of their time to this

service. Snow, wind, or rain does not prevent them from carrying on their efficient work. Occasionally other arrangements have to be made for transportation of patients. About \$12.00 a month is used for taxi fares.

Members of the Junior League, Erskine School, and Kathleen Dell Secretarial School have served as volunteer workers, helping in several of the clinics.

The Social Service greatly appreciates the interest and assistance given by the Ladies' Committee who have met at the Hospital once a month except during the summer.

A list of the charitable agencies and private individuals who have contributed to the welfare of our patients with sums of money will be found listed in the first part of the report.

There were 1,252 postcards sent out for the Follow-Up Clinic and Tumor Clinic, and 677 letters.

One thousand nine steering letters were sent out by this department, and 98 miscellaneous letters.

This year a check for \$100.00 was given the department for Christmas baskets from the Mary A. Crabtree Fund.

There were 380 patients given some slight service in the general office not included in the other tables of statistics.

Report on the Social Service Department, 1914-1939

THIS REPORT is submitted to the Trustees for two specific reasons: first, to acquaint them more fully with the work and needs of the Social Service Department; and second, to indicate objectives toward which the Trustees, the Hospital, the Ladies' Committee, and the department itself might hope to work in the future.

EARLY WORK

When Miss Alice Cheney was appointed by the Hospital as its first social service worker in 1914, her duties were manifold, covering problems all over the Hospital. The need for social service work was still to be proved within the Hospital. It was definitely pioneer work in the Peter Bent Brigham.

At that time perhaps one of the greatest services that she rendered the Hospital was in constantly freeing beds of patients with chronic diseases, by arranging for their transfer to convalescent homes. These patients could no longer be helped at the Peter Bent but would have stayed on in the Hospital because they had no place to go.

CLINICAL WORK

Gradually there developed a clearer understanding by the Hospital staff of the value of the service rendered by a social service department, and calls for help from many of the clinics increased. Among the earliest of the clinics to be social-service-minded were the diabetic in 1916, the luetic in 1921, and the cardiac in 1923. Steadily growing to meet these demands, the department has supplied workers to one clinic after another, such as the gastric, the venereal, the arthritic, the tumor, and the dental—the amount of work in each clinic varying according to the demand. In certain clinics, such as the psychiatric, the services of a social worker are essential.

Efficient clerical work is also necessary. At present two stenographers serve six workers, take care of all the correspondence entailed by follow-up work and investigation of the home care of patients, arrange for all transportation of patients, do the filing, and keep the case records.

SPECIAL SERVICES

There are also valuable "special services" rendered by the Social Service Department, such as:

Occupational Therapy. An occupational therapist was in the Department from 1919 to 1930, and did invaluable work.

"Recuperation" Services. Approximately 300 patients with chronic diseases are placed in sanatoria or institutions by Social Service every year. An equal number are sent to convalescent homes to recuperate from operations or short illnesses. In these cases home conditions or the type of the illness preclude the possibility of the patient's going direct to his own home from the Hospital.

Psychiatry. A year ago a trained psychiatric worker was added to the staff. An interesting departure in this field has been a clinic for adolescents on Saturday mornings, where behavior problems are analysed and treated, and defects in home and school are corrected before they leave their permanent mark. Each patient is interviewed by the psychiatric worker before seeing the psychiatrist, and a detailed history is drawn up, thus providing a record of the case should it later be referred to social service.

Research Work. Every efficient social service department, in developing cooperation between medicine and social work, must interest itself also in the field of research. Our Social Service Department has undertaken its share in this field, by

- 1927 A study of the chronic sick, undertaken by the Boston Council.
- 1927 A study of the interrelationship of hospital work and the public health nurse.
- 1927 A study of diabetics, entailing examination of medical records of more than 400 cases for tabulation.
- 1931 A study of possible communicability of acute rheumatic infection.
- 1931 A study of a group of patients in the gastro-intestinal clinic, to determine the influence of emotional and mental upsets and long working hours.

VOLUNTEER SERVICES

The Social Service Department has greatly benefited by volunteer service, which began in 1914 with three ladies who generously gave many valuable hours of their time. This has increased during the years until now the Volunteer Service is an organized group under the direction of Miss Anna Revere. Volunteer aid is received from:

The Junior League, which sends many volunteers, some of whom serve as secretaries in the clinics.

Private Schools, such as the Erskine School and the Kathleen Dell School, whose students are particularly interested in this type of work.

Simmons College, Stoneleigh College, which have sent its students to do field work.

The Women's Motor Detachment of the American Red Cross (since 1917), which has rendered invaluable service by providing transportation of patients to and from the Hospital, making 200 trips the first year and 2,376 trips in 1938.

FUNDS

Financial aid to carry on this all-important work is received from various sources:

The Permanent Charity Fund has contributed from \$2,000 to \$3,500 a year, from 1918 to the present.

The Community Federation has made generous grants since

it was organized in 1933.

Special Appeals. Letters written in "Divers Good Causes" in the Transcript have brought in funds for special cases.

Other Agencies. Particular charitable agencies in Boston have given aid in cases falling within their special spheres of work.

The Ladies' Committee has succeeded in raising from \$3,500 to \$6,550 each year since 1922, through securing the interest of individuals and by giving entertainments, which also bring publicity to the work of the Hospital.

RÉSUMÉ

To give a brief but inclusive summary of the work of the Social Service Department is not an easy task. Beginning with Miss Cheney alone in 1914, it cost that first year only her salary (\$1,200); it served its first year only 365 patients; it was chiefly pioneer work in the Peter Bent Brigham. The years 1928 and 1929 saw the department rise to the peak of its efficiency, since in those years its budget had increased to \$8,816 (not including Miss Cheney's salary), thus making possible a staff of five workers (besides Miss Cheney) and two stenographers. On the staff at that time were such highly trained workers as Miss Andren and Miss Crothers. Inevitably, as financial aid has decreased, we have had to lose the services of people like Miss Andren, and have had to depend on less well-trained workers at much lower salaries (save for one or two exceptions, like Miss Crothers who has stayed on in spite of the difficulties facing the department). Last year, although its budget had shrunk to \$8,010 Social Service served 2,170 patients. It has long passed the pioneer stage in the Peter Bent Brigham; it is an essential part of the Hospital.

Social Service has two important aspects, the humanitarian and the economic. To emphasize the humanitarian side we cannot do better than to quote from Miss Cheney's Twenty-five Year Report: "One of the important duties of the social worker is to restore a feeling of courage in the patients and to reestablish their selfrespect. By friendships with individual patients it becomes possible through them to reach medically other members of their families. To find out why patients do not return for necessary treatment, to educate them to the need of continuing their visits over a sufficiently long period, to become familiar with the social background of each case, to work out with parents better facilities for rest and play for young patients, to help reestablish a proper mental balance (as in the psychiatric cases) all this is now an integral part of hospital work." It is well recognized that social and physical conditions are interdependent and that much of social service is actually preventive medicine. It is at the same time an economic asset to the Hospital itself, since through its workers the Hospital's highly specialized service is not wasted but is made available to those most capable of benefiting from it. From both the humanitarian and the economic standpoint, Social Service becomes Public Service. It ameliorates the menace to the Hospital, the community, and the state, of mental, moral, and physical human wreckage, which otherwise is thrown back on them for care.

Social Service is still further an asset since well-trained and well-paid workers help to raise the standard and the standing of the Hospital, and help to keep up the morale within the Hospital itself. This again keeps alive outside interest and sympathy which otherwise becomes inactive and sluggish, and indirectly affects the financial return to the Hospital.

In conclusion, the Ladies' Committee would like to put on record their very great appreciation of Miss Cheney's work. None of us can fully realize how much of a burden she has carried in the years of depression when the Hospital has been faced with great financial difficulties. In the last nine years since 1929, she has done a remarkable piece of work in reducing the expenses of the department in ways which have least handicapped the work and the morale of the department. She has met the trying and discouraging problem of reduction instead of expansion with unfailing cheerfulness and cooperation.

Report of the Surgeon-in-Chief

INTRODUCTION. With the fragrance and stimulus of our twenty-fifth celebration still with us we wish to remind those alumni who did not attend the ceremonies that a complete transcript of the public ceremonies, May 7, 1938, was published in the New England Journal of Medicine, volume 219, pages 183 to 193, August 11, 1938.* It would appear as if this date were the signal for great changes in our staff, and it is with deep regret that the Hospital accepted the resignation of Dr. Joseph B. Howland, its Superintendent, on December 31, 1938. This loss is to be followed, as we all know, by the resignations of Dr. Henry A. Christian in the fall of 1939 and of Dr. David Cheever in the spring of the same year. These three great characters about whom is built so much of the splendid tradition of the Hospital will all too soon be lost from our active rolls, but we who remain hope that their presence and example will long decorate the "pike" and all parts of the Hospital and that the tradition of the goodness of their work and spirit may descend to many generations of Brigham pupils.

A chief concern to our alumni has been the appointments of Dr. Soma Weiss to succeed Dr. Christian and of Dr. Norbert A. Wilhelm to succeed Dr. Howland.

Dr. Weiss comes to us from the Boston City Hospital where he has been since 1925. After graduation from the Cornell Medical School in 1923, he was brought to Boston by the late Dr. Francis Peabody, and the vigor and brilliance of his abilities have led to rapid advancement both on the Boston City Hospital Staff and on the Faculty of the Harvard Medical School. He has

those qualities which we at the Hospital feel are essential for our Physician-in-Chief. He has proved himself an able clinician and has evinced a dominant interest in clinical medicine. He has shown great abilities as a teacher, and no member of the Faculty of the Harvard Medical School has a more devoted following among the better students in the school. He is a productive scholar and his publications give evidence of the catholicity of his interests in clinical medicine. We welcome him to our family with all the warmth at our command and look forward with great optimism and satisfaction to years of cooperative effort for the good of our Hospital.

Dr. Wilhelm, who succeeds Dr. Howland, is well known to us, for from 1930 to 1937 he acted as Assistant Superintendent at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital and experienced the benefit of Dr. Howland's training. During this period he gave evidence of an unusual openness of mind to the ever-changing administrative problems and in his interim experience as Superintendent of the Butterworth Hospital, Grand Rapids, Michigan, he won the complete support of his professional colleagues as well as his Trustees. We know that cooperation and a desire for progress are supported by great ability in this important field. As has been made clear in previous reports, we are shortly to embark on physical changes in which the training and outlook of our Superintendent will be a dominant factor. We who know Dr. Wilhelm look forward with confidence and satisfaction to the task we must all accomplish as a team.

Notice should be given here of the death of Dr. Emmet Rixford, who was Surgeon-in-Chief pro tempore in 1927, and who died in the Brigham Hospital January 2, 1938; and of the death of our original Roentgenologist, Dr. Alfred Luger, July 10, 1938.

With the advent of new personalities have come certain changes. Dr. Weiss and I have agreed to consolidate our two biochemical laboratories and with a gift from the President of the Board of Trustees and with funds secured by Dr. Weiss for a chemist the major Medical Laboratory is being refitted and equipped and should soon function as as good a clinical biochemical laboratory as exists in New England. At the same time the space for Pathology is to be increased by removing the Patients' Library from the Chapel. This space with other adjustments will provide a satisfactory area for more extensive bacteriological work. As a part of this attempt to provide more space for laboratory and investigative work, the Trustees have been generous in permitting us the use of Ward A-Ground for laboratories and here are or will be set up (1) a laboratory for the special study of peripheral vascular disease, (2) space for the study of high temperature effects, (3) the basal metabolism laboratory, (4) the allergy laboratory, and (5) room for special physiological investigation. All these changes aim at a more complete utilization of our clinical material and represent the traditional Brigham spirit of study and investigation begun by our original chiefs of service. That our Trustees can see the need for these changes and have brought assistance to us, even in our difficult financial situation, gives great satisfaction to the staff and allows us much hope for future progress.

The Surgical Service has seen no major changes. The Resident Service remains the same and since, in these days of specialization, we are almost the only general hospital left with a single service on which appear all types of surgical work, applications for the opportunity to work with us are countless. In most teaching hospitals gynecology, urology, otolaryngology, and neurological

surgery are separate services. This means that if the young surgeon is to receive a general training, he must secure at least an assistant resident's post or its equivalent on several services. Such a rotation is almost impossible and as a result breadth of training, which is the foundation for later education, is sacrificed. The demands of the American Board of Surgery have been a major influence in securing effective training for the young surgeon. It should be a satisfaction to Brigham Alumni that the Surgical Service here, modified since its inception only by the addition to the interne service of the year at the Children's Hospital, is one of the few in which no changes had to be made to fit the complete requirements of the Board before accepting candidates for examination. The routine training of the young surgeon at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital consists of (1) the joint Peter Bent Brigham Hospital-Children's Hospital interneship of twenty-nine months, (2) a year in a laboratory for which we have each year three fellowships: the Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellowship, the Harvey Cushing Fellowship, and the George Gorham Peters Fellowship, (3) the Assistant Residentship of sixteen months, and (4) the Residency.

The supply of clinical material with approximately two thousand operations a year is ample and varied. We should like a little more thoracic work, which can probably be arranged, and I am in hopes that soon the oto-laryngological work will justify the addition of an assistant resident in that field so that the scope of our training may be further broadened. That our service is desirable is represented by the fact that five of our next six internes came from the top of the present graduating class at the Harvard Medical School, these five being members of the Alpha Omega Alpha Society.

Surgeon-in-Chief pro tempore. It is a pleasure to recall the visit of Dr. Emil Goetsch as Surgeon-in-Chief pro tempore, April 18 to 23, 1938. Dr. Goetsch was the first Resident Surgeon of this Hospital. Many of the customs of this important office were set by him in those days. Since I am one of those who owe him a deep debt of gratitude for the calmness, precision, and thoroughness with which he inculcated in the internes of our earliest days good surgical technique, I feel that I perhaps enjoyed this visit and benefited as much from his teaching as any member of our house staff. Dr. Christian and I chose early Residents as our pro tempore visitors this year that we might emphasize more fully the Hospital's traditions for teaching and investigation, and record with pleasure that Dr. Goetsch for the Surgical Department and Dr. Blake for the Medical Department lived up to our highest expectations.

Changes in Staff. Dr. John Dunphy, who had been Resident Surgeon since December 1, 1936, resigned March 1, 1938, to become George Gorham Peters Traveling Fellow and went to Europe for further experience. On his return in October, 1938, he succeeded Dr. John Bell as Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow. Dr. Dunphy was succeeded as Resident Surgeon by Dr. Richard Warren, who had already been Assistant Resident Surgeon and who, although he had never been an interne at the Brigham Hospital, fulfilled the duties of this high post with credit and devotion. Dr. Warren resigned and went to the University of Pennsylvania Hospital, Philadelphia, in September, 1938, where he is putting in a mixed clinical and laboratory year with the group of men led by Drs. Abbot and Miller, who have so greatly contributed to the field of gastroenterology. Dr. Warren was succeeded September 1, 1938, as Resident Surgeon by Dr. Robert Gross. Dr. Gross had been successively Resident Pathologist, Assistant Resident Surgeon, and George Gorham Peters Traveling Fellow and Resident Surgeon at the Children's Hospital, Boston, before taking over this important position.

The succession of Assistant Resident Surgeons has been as follows: In November, 1937, Dr. William S. Mc-Cune came to us from the Massachusetts General Hospital and succeeded Dr. Quigley. In March Dr. James B. Blodgett, who had already been an interne, moved up to succeed Dr. Warren. In June Dr. Paul D. Giddings moved up from interne to succeed Dr. Reiter, and in November Dr. John F. Bell, previously an interne and from October, 1937, to October, 1938, Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow, moved in to succeed Dr. Harrison. Dr. Reiter on leaving us has settled in Bridgeport, Connecticut, and commenced there the practice of surgery, and Dr. Harrison has remained with us as Harvey Cushing Fellow, devoting his time largely to investigative work and teaching.

Dr. George Austen, Jr., succeeded Mr. A. Ruscoe Clarke as *Urological Fellow*, July 1, 1938. Dr. Austen had previously been a surgical interne at St. Luke's Hospital, New York City, and at the Children's Hospital, Boston.

Several men benefited from the generous fellowship established by Dr. Cushing. Dr. Michel Pijoan continued his labor in our biochemical laboratories. Dr. John L. Keeley, who stayed on in our laboratory as Harvey Cushing Fellow following his year as Arthur Tracy Cabot Fellow, left us in August to go to the University of Louisiana Medical School as Instructor in Surgery. Dr. Max T. Schnitker, who had been with us as Assistant Resident Surgeon and Neurosurgical Fellow continued his Cushing Fellowship with studies under Mr. Hugh Cairns at Oxford, England.

Joint Interneship with Children's Hospital Surgical Service. The new joint interneships have proved highly satisfactory to both the men taking them and to us of the staff who have noticed already the greater maturity of opinion and therefore the greater ability of our internes. We were still in 1938 passing through the transitional period. This is evident in the fact that Dr. James W. Hawkins, who came on in February, and Dr. Frederick J. Lesemann, Jr., who came on in June, had not been through the Children's Hospital service. Dr. Hawkins, after graduating from Harvard Medical School in 1934, served his interneship at the Cincinnati General Hospital, while Dr. Lesemann spent the year following his graduation from the Harvard Medical School in 1937 in the Pathological Laboratory of the Boston City Hospital. But Dr. Claire F. Goeringer, who came on in April, Dr. John H. Kennard, in August, Dr. Dean W. Tanner, in October, and Dr. John A. Sandmeyer, in December, each had been a year at the Children's Hospital. All of these men, with the exception of Dr. Goeringer, a graduate of Johns Hopkins Medical School, had been through the Harvard Medical School. These men replaced Drs. Blodgett and Giddings who, as recorded above, moved up to the post of Assistant Resident Surgeon, and Dr. Botsford, who became Resident Surgeon at the Children's Hospital in August, Dr. Tyler, who left to work in pathology at St. Luke's Hospital, New York City, and Dr. Campbell, who transferred back to the Children's Hospital to work in neurosurgery.

The fact that twenty-three of the publications for the year represent efforts of members of the House and Laboratory Staffs is an indication of the continued drive and thirst for investigation which has from our beginning characterized the Brigham Hospital spirit.

REPORT OF THE SURGEON-IN-CHIEF

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Table A, which is presented to picture the diversification of clinical material, shows no very serious shift in the type of surgery performed. Comment might be made on the increased number of cases under diseases of the Circulatory System and the continued drop in thoracic procedures. The increased orthopedic work is

Report of the Physician-in-Chief

THE YEAR 1938 has been an important one in various ways for the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, for its Medical Service and for its Physician-in-Chief as set forth in the following report. The actual routine of ward and out-door department medical services has continued throughout 1938 without any significant changes.*

Changes in Staff. Dr. George P. Denny, former Medical House Officer, 1913-14, after having served as Associate in Medicine for twenty-three years, resigned at the end of the year from the visiting staff in order to devote his time more completely to practice. He gave valued and appreciated service to the Hospital

and his resignation was accepted with regret.

Dr. Maurice A. Schnitker, M.D. University of Michigan, 1931, resigned on November 1, 1938, from the position of Resident Physician, to commence practice in Toledo, Ohio. Medical House Officer, February 15, 1932-July 1, 1933, Assistant Resident, July 1, 1933-August 1, 1936 and Resident Physician, August 1, 1936-November 1, 1938, Dr. Schnitker made a unique record for efficiency in each of these posts. Systematic, dependable, enthusiastic, widely read with a retentive mind and sound clinical judgment, to him increasingly was given responsibility, responsibility always adequately measured up to; in the years to come these qualities, as I learned to know them at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, will, I feel sure, bring to him great success in whatever he undertakes. Dr. Schnitker's position as Resident Physician has been filled by the promotion of Dr. Alfred W. Harris, M.D., Washington University, 1935,

Interne and Resident in Medicine, St. Paul's Hospital, Dallas, Tex., 1935-36, Assistant Resident Physician, January 1, 1937-January 1, 1938, Voluntary Graduate Assistant, January 1-July 1, 1938, Assistant Resident Physician, July 1-November 1, 1938, at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

During 1938 Drs. Edward Massie, Richard H. Lyons, Jesse C. Lockhart, Harald N. Johnson and Roger W. Robinson resigned as Assistant Resident Physicians, Dr. Massie to return to Barnes Hospital, St. Louis, as their Resident Physician, Dr. Lyons to return to Ann Arbor, Mich., as Resident in Medicine at the University of Michigan Hospital, Dr. Lockhart to continue here as Voluntary Graduate Assistant at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital and Research Assistant in Medicine at the Harvard Medical School, now (1939) just appointed to become Resident Physician at the Hospital of the University of California, San Francisco and Dr. Robinson to commence practice at Worcester, Mass. They have been succeeded by Dr. Daniel M. Swan, M.D., University of Rochester, '35, formerly Interne, Rhode Island Hospital; Dr. Draper Warren, M.D., McGill University, '37, formerly Medical Interne, Baltimore City Hospital; Dr. William C. McClure, M.D., University of Oklahoma, '36, formerly Medical House Officer, Peter Bent Brigham Hospital; Dr. Francis F. Rosenbaum, M.D., University of Michigan, '36, formerly Interne and Assistant Resident, University of Michigan Hospital; Dr. Roy L. Swank, M.D., Northwestern University, '34, formerly Medical House Officer, Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, and Dr. Reno R. Porter, M.D., Medical College of Virginia, '35, formerly Assistant Resident in Medicine, Wisconsin General Hospital.

As Medical House Officers the following men completed their service and commenced other work; Dr. Max Kutzer, M.D., Harvard University, '36, to become Assistant Resident Physician at the Hospital of the Good Shepherd, Syracuse, N. McClure, M.D., University of Oklahoma, '36, to become Assistant Resident Physician at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital; Dr. Richard N. Tillman, M.D., Johns Hopkins University, '36, to become Resident in Medicine at the University of Michigan Hospital, Ann Arbor, Mich.; Dr. John B. O'Connor, M.D., Harvard University, '34, to become Assistant Resident Physician at the William Wirt Winchester Hospital, West Haven, Conn.; Dr. Karl Shepard, M.D., Harvard University, '35, to become Interne at Duke Hospital, Durham, N. C., and Dr. Edward J. Welch, M.D., Harvard University, '36, to become Assistant Physician at the Middlesex County Sanatorium, Waltham, Mass.

Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore. In 1938 Dr. Francis G. Blake, Sterling Professor of Medicine at Yale University and Physician-in-Chief, New Haven Hospital, New Haven, Conn., came to serve with us as the twenty-fifth Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore. Medical House Officer, 1913-14, Assistant Resident Physician, 1914-15, Resident Physician, 1915-16, at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, Dr. Blake brought to us those qualities of character and professional training which he had shown in his prior services at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, matured by his subsequent appointments as Moseley

Traveling Fellow of Harvard University, 1916-17, Assistant, Rockefeller Institute Hospital, 1916-17, Assistant Professor of Medicine, University of Minnesota, 1917-19, Associate in Medicine, Rockefeller Institute Hospital, 1919-20, Associate Member in Medicine, Rockefeller Institute, 1920-21, Member Board of Scientific Directors, Rockefeller Institute, 1924-35, Chairman, Division Medical Sciences, National Research Council, 1933-36, since 1927 Sterling Professor of Medicine at Yale. Quiet, incisive, logical as teacher and clinician, highly trained in the technique and lore of medicine, Dr. Blake made an effective leader in our ward visits and other Hospital exercises from whom we learned much. We greatly appreciated his willingness to serve us as Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore.

The custom of having a yearly Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore, was inaugurated in the first year of the Medical Service of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital by the late Dr. William S. Thayer of the Johns Hopkins University and Hospital, a former teacher of the Physician-in-Chief; so it is fitting that the twenty-fifth should be the earliest surviving Resident Physician at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. For 1939 it is planned to invite back those who from the beginning of the custom have come to us in the capacity of Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore, and already many of them have accepted the invitation. Of the twenty-five past Physicians-in-Chief, pro tempore, happily all are alive but Drs. William S. Thaver, A. Walter Hewlett, Frank Billings, H. R. M. Landis, Thomas McCrae, Campbell P. Howard and Alfred Stengel, Physicians-in-Chief, pro tempore, in 1913, 1915, 1916, 1919, 1921, 1931 and 1934, respectively. Hans Christian Jacobaeus, Professor of Medicine of the Caroline Institute and Chief of the Second Medical Clinic of the Seraphimer Hospital at Stockholm, accepted our invitation to serve as Physician-in-Chief, pro tempore, in the year 1938, but alas he died October 29, 1937, of coronary thrombosis, a great loss to medicine, to which he had made many important contributions, notable among which was his development of thorascopy, intrathoracal galvanocautery technique and bronchospirometry.

Retirement of Dr. Howland. The passing years are closing one by one the roll to those who shared in the beginnings and in the earlier years of the development of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. With the end of 1938 came the retirement of Dr. Joseph B. Howland, our second Superintendent. For almost twenty years he worked wisely, intelligently, to maintain the efficiency of the Hospital and to lighten the burden of the work of all on the staff of the Hospital. A skilled hospital administrator, quiet in manner, diplomatic but not lacking in forcefulness, wise in many of the ways of medicine, a gentleman in the best sense of that word, he endeared himself to those who worked with and under him and became their friend and counsellor. We, none more than I, disliked to see him leave, although we realized the inevitableness of his departure.

A New Superintendent. In succession to Dr. Howland as Superintendent we welcome Dr. Norbert A. Wilhelm. From July 20, 1930 to April 1, 1937, Dr. Wilhelm was associated with our administrative staff; then he was superintendent of Butterworth Hospital, Grand Rapids, Mich. Knowing so well the quality of his work, while he was at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, and hearing such fine reports of what he was accomplishing at Grand Rapids, it is no wonder that we wanted him back as Dr. Howland's successor. That he has come is a great satisfaction to all of us.

Publications for 1938. During 1938 certain lines of investigation have been pursued by the members of the staff, as shown by the following list of publications. Some of these represent work actually done in the preceding year, but, according to our custom, are noted in the Annual Report only after their completion and publication, thereby avoiding duplication in being noted once when the work is under way and the second time when completed and published.

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Investigation and Clinical Studies. In the annual report of 1937, after recounting various features of the Medical Service since its inauguration in 1913, it was stated that "in next year's annual report, * * * some space will be devoted to an account of the scientific work of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital medical service since its beginning."

In the period 1913-38 1,029 publications have appeared under the authorship of members of the Medical Staff or their pupils as listed each year in the Annual Report. These cover a wide range of subjects. In large part they are clinical studies but, in addition, comprise laboratory investigations as suggested by, or in correlation with, studies of patients. Of the latter some were carried on in the laboratories of the Peter Bent Brigham

Hospital and others in the laboratory of the Department of Medicine in the adjacent buildings of the Harvard Medical School. Various phases of heart disease and of disease of the kidneys have received major attention. In both, methods of treatment and of diagnosis have been considered most often, as is natural for an institution whose prime interest always has been devoted to the attainment of the best possible care of its patients. The fundamental attitude of the Medical Service toward investigation is discussed in a later part of this Annual Report.

The possession of an electrocardiograph at an early period in its development led to numerous studies based on its use in various disturbances of the mechanism of the heart. Among the arrhythmias that have been discussed during the years 1913-38 are auricular fibrillation, auricular flutter, paroxysmal tachycardia, both auricular and ventricular, auriculo-ventricular and sinoauricular block, changing ventricular complexes, nodal rhythm and the electrocardiographic changes following coronary occlusion, sometimes in relation to frequency, sometimes in relation to treatment and sometimes in relation to recognition by simple, non-electrocardiographic methods. Digitalis therapy has been studied and reported on from numerous angles, the electrocardiographic changes induced by it, its efficiency when heart rhythm was regular, its influence on various of the arrhythmias, its use in certain patients without evidences of cardiac insufficiency and its use in its simplest form, pills of powdered digitalis leaves, a preparation used continuously since the opening of the Hospital. Strophanthin and quinidine, including quinidine deaths, too, have been investigated both in man and in experimental animals. Cardiac infarction has been the subject of numerous studies, some of which have been influential in

increasing the early and more general recognition of this highly important heart disease on the part of practitioners. Chronic myocardial insufficiency in its frequency of occurrence, in its recognition, in its therapeutic management and in its mechanism has been discussed in numerous papers. The calcified type of aortic stenosis with its roentgenological recognition, dynamic and syphilitic aortic insufficiency, angina pectoris, the oculocardiac reflex, the heart changes in myxedema and in hyperthyroidism, coarctation of the aorta and the compression signs of acute pericarditis are the subjects of other papers. With the surgeons the effects on heart function of total thyroid ablation have been explored and measures for the cutting of stenosed valves have been described. These former patients gave, too, an opportunity of studying various effects of thyroid deficiency from their very inception. The changes in blood volume in heart disease and in other diseases as well as the effect on it of therapeutic hyperthermia have been investigated extensively. Venous pressure and the effects of and treatment of constrictive pericarditis have been more recent studies.

A simple method of recording vital capacity in the normal individual in contrast to those with cardiac insufficiency or pulmonary disease was evolved and extensively investigated. Numerous clinical studies of respiration, including the effects of acidosis and CO₂ have been published. The changes in basal metabolism and methods for recording it in heart disease, in thyroid disease, in obesity, etc., have been studied from the early days of the Hospital, some of these being published at a time when little knowledge of the clinical applications of such factors was available.

Coordinate with these interests in the problems of the circulation has been a sustained study of Bright's dis-

ease, with an interest in its etiology, its pathology, its clinical classification, its symptomatology and its therapeutic management, which began with extensive investigations of renal lesions produced experimentally in animals and has been continued as studies both of patients in the wards and out-door clinic and of animals in the laboratory. Numerous of these studies have been closely related to problems of the dynamics of the circulation and changes in the heart since high blood pressure is a significant factor in the progress of renal disturbances as well as causative of eventual cardiac hypertrophy and cardiac decompensation. Various methods of controlling hypertension have been investigated, such as protein or salt reduction in the diet, the effect of liver substance, of mistletoe, of thiocyanate, etc. A large variety of tests or measures of renal function in relation to disease have been studied and compared. Plasmapheresis has been investigated in its relation to uremic conditions. Experimental nephritis, acute and chronic, has been produced and studied from numerous angles. Changes in the eye grounds have been followed closely and correlated with evidences of general vascular and of renal disease. Nitrogen and sulphur metabolism in relation to kidney disease has been studied. Edema produced in animals by repeated bleedings and occurring in man has been investigated both as to mechanism and management. Diuretics of different types have received much study both in animals and in man with a view to a more intelligent utilization of them in our patients with edema of either renal or cardiac origin.

In the Hospital and its laboratories asthma and hay fever has been investigated almost from the opening of the Hospital with resultant extension of knowledge of these diseases and especially of ways of treatment. A large number of papers on the blood, especially the anemias, have been published. Of these the ones of greatest practical importance have been those concerned with liver in the treatment of pernicious anemia; from the Medical Clinic of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital came the earlier papers that demonstrated the great effectiveness of liver substance in the cure of this previously almost universally fatal disease. Syphilis in relation to diagnosis and treatment has been a constant interest with a resultant group of publications on these topics. Gout and diabetes are diseases on which numerous studies have been published. This is true also of peptic ulcer, pneumonia, polycythemia, the erythema group of diseases, meningococcemia, periarteritis nodosa, etc. Examples of rare diseases from time to time have come to our wards, been studied and reported on; to two of these, a form of xanthomatosis and a curious skin condition, relapsing febrile nodular non-suppurative panniculitis, the name of a member of the medical staff has been attached by the general profession. In the preceding paragraphs have been enumerated the topics that since the opening of the Hospital have held chief interest of the medical staff on the investigational side of their activities; the authorship of these publications include all of staff, with but rare exceptions, from youngest to oldest in vears.

The Hospital in the Education of Resident and Non-resident Staff. The previous section points to an important phase of the educational activities and responsibilities of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. Here numerous men in past years have learned by the doing of the value in their professional development of investigative attempts and have come to be more intelligently critical of scientific investigations because they have experienced its difficulties and realized the importance of thoroughness.

In their study and care of patients the Hospital has given them a supervised and inspirational post-graduate instruction. From the making and recording of detailed histories and thorough complete examinations of patients has come to them a very important factor in developing them into exceptionally good practitioners of medicine by showing them the way to build up a valuable clinical experience.

In all of this perhaps no single thing has played a more important rôle than the making and recording of our detailed, typewritten records from which facts so easily can be culled. That they have been dictated is a stimulus to making descriptions more detailed and more complete and hence of greater value for future use. They have been typed means that there has been saved to the patients of the Hospital many hours of intelligent study of the patient without which our patients would have been less well cared for. After all how unintelligent would it have been to use daily hours of the time of highly trained young doctors in the purely routine labor of writing records in long hand?

As I look back on it, I have the impression that the way our clinical hospital records have been fashioned and typed is the greatest single achievement of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, and that they have played the largest part in that training, which has placed so many of our men in subsequent positions of great importance. Here is the only important permanent record of what we have done beyond the published papers and books, which in great part have been based on these records. It would be, in my opinion, a false economy ever to give up having such complete typed records, a backward step that would require years to undo.

Physician-in-Chief-Elect. The outstanding event of 1938 for the Medical Service has been the appointment of Dr. Soma Weiss as Physician-in-Chief-elect of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. Following the precedent set by Dr. Cushing, when his retirement was approaching, I took no part in any way in the selection of the one to be my successor; of course, I was keenly interested, and I may say, concerned, in the decision of the committees of the Harvard Medical School and the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. Carefully, thoroughly, for a long time they studied potential appointees; this I knew. When I learned their choice, my pleasure was great; I was certain that their selection had been wise; knowing the breadth and depth of Dr. Weiss' training, the keenness of his intellect, the charm of his personality, his inspiration to pupils and associates, his broad clinical acumen and his real worth, I felt certain that the future of the medical service of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital was being entrusted to capable hands for that leadership which, his health remaining good, will be long, as certainly it should be, that he may have full time to develop his ideas into an accomplishment of great fruitfulness for the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. To Dr. Weiss goes my benediction. May he find the same happiness in this work, new for him, as I have since my appointment in 1910.

Anniversary Celebration and Fourth Reunion. May 5 to 7, 1938, the Hospital formally celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary by a reunion of members of all branches of the Hospital family and by public exercises, the program of all of which appears elsewhere in this, the Twenty-fifth Annual Report of the Hospital.

On this occasion the public was informed both of what the Hospital had accomplished in the first quarter

century of its life and what were its present needs for funds to pay annual costs, to provide for necessary reconstruction of plant, to replace inroads into capital made during the years of depression and still continuing and to permit of needed continuity of growth and development in the years of the immediate future. Poverty may be a blessing in disguise; no doubt the increasing and great poverty of the past ten years has chastened us; alas, poverty, too long continued, saps the strength and dims the enthusiasm necessary to advance, be it of man or institution; would that generous friends would change the poverty of the present to the abundance of the earlier years of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. The Community Fund of Boston has been our one bulwark against dissolution; to it we of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, one and all, bespeak our everlasting obligation; unfortunately all that it can do is to reduce to relatively small size what otherwise would be a huge annual deficit, steadily reducing our capital funds and making smaller each year our income from endowment. But the Community Fund cannot replace wornout and outmoded buildings nor give funds necessary to a revivifying progress in medical knowledge and the care of patients. For these we must turn to our friends.

The return to the reunion celebration of so many (300 registered) of those that the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital has trained, to reune with us, to tell us of their investigations and their work and to speak kindly appreciative words of the Hospital's share in the medical advances of the past twenty-five years has brought to the Hospital great pleasure and great satisfaction. They and what they have accomplished are sources of great pride to all of those that shared in their training; their visit to us brought us great happiness. Our Trustees by their generosity and by their indefatigable work in

preparation made this celebration both possible and a great success. The Brigham family extends to them their thanks. The program was a great success because all worked so diligently for its success. The dramatic talent of house staff and nurses, under the able direction of Drs. Gibson and Wilkins, gave us the delightful musical comedy (repeated three times to accommodate all who desired to attend) in which the foibles of the visiting staff and Hospital personnel were happily and amusingly set forth. At the end of this gathering all agreed that we Brighamites had had the best possible celebration and reunion.

Presentation of Dr. Christian's Portrait. On October 13, 1938, at an informal gathering my portrait was presented to the Trustees of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, the gift of many who had been or still were members of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital family. May I take this place to say to each of them: "You have made me your debtor. By the presentation of my portrait to the Hospital you have paid me an honor which I cherish as an evidence of your esteem and affection. In the years to come this portrait from the cunning of Mrs. Page's brush will serve to portray the ideal goal of my life, the hospital physician busied daily in the care of patients in contact with students, resident staff, associates and colleagues; this seemed to me the acme of attainment when in the days of my youth I dreamed dreams.

"Here at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital it has been my good fortune to act out my life's dream; nowhere could have a greater opportunity come, and as my days of active service draw to a close, as dramatized by this portrait presentation, I am profoundly grateful to all of you who have done so much to bring to rich fruition this work in which I have been but a figure head."

The Aims and the Spirit of the Medical Service in Its First Quarter Century. On such an occasion as this, my last annual report, it seems appropriate to render some account of one's stewardship and to tell something of the philosophy of living that has actuated one's way of doing things. Each that directs a hospital service for a period of years needs must have a plan, a method, an ideal of perfection; these are determined by the past training and the aptitude of the chief. The way of the service must be conceived so as to represent the highest accomplishment of leadership possible to that leader.

Equally another leader must be entirely free differently to carry out his plan, his method, his ideal. For my successor my hope is that he, too, will have ahead of him many years to perfect his leadership, as I had, and above all, an entire freedom, as has been mine, to follow any plan, any method that to him seems ideal. Most unfortunate would it be for the development of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital for anyone to say we must continue along some path laid out by a past leader. Time and conditions change rapidly; always must there be a willingness to meet changing conditions by changed ways of doing things. Any man chosen as physician-inchief will be a leader safe to follow whatever way he turns; if not worthy of that confidence, he would not have been selected.

On the other hand, it seems to me that a certain spirit, which has developed here at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, is worthy of becoming a tradition to be passed on from generation to generation by succeeding chiefs of service, a spirit that will in no wise determinatively limit any plan or method of the future, but which will,

in a subconscious way, influence them. Such a spirit undoubtedly exists here. Although it is difficult to describe it in words, this spirit of the Hospital becomes manifest in a short time to all who have stayed for work with us, a spirit of friendly helpfulness to all who gather under our roof, pervading both the practical care of patients and the scientific study of medical problems, a spirit that permits to all the maximum of freedom of action tempered by the realization that freedom to one must not trammel the action of others, a spirit of joy in the task, however difficult the task may be, a spirit that has been built up by those who in succeeding years have worked at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

In developing the medical service of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital from the beginning I have had two definite aims, closely correlated the one to the other. One has been to give to our patients the best possible professional care in such a friendly way that each patient should feel that we have been particularly interested in him or her as an individual, and that nothing has been left undone in arriving at a correct diagnosis of the disease of our patient and in alleviating its discomforts. The other has been to lay broad foundations of training on which students and staff might build themselves into the best type of clinicians. As a corollary has been the recognition that members of the staff should be engaged in medical investigation as an integral factor in perfecting these aims, but that investigation should remain in this sense secondary to the chief aims of the service, merely a means to those ends. These aims form the keynote of the medical service and give an understanding of its development since the first patients were admitted in 1913.

Meticulous care in patients' records has been insisted upon. Students and house officers, I know, often have felt that the many details in the histories and physical examinations represent wasted energy. Those of us who have turned back to an early history, when a patient is readmitted, know that much, which at the time might seem irrelevant, has proved of great importance in the subsequent management of the case. Equally, when we come to study groups of records, seeking a better understanding of a given disease entity, do we realize the value of these details at the obtaining of which students and house officers often have rebelled, not always inwardly and silently. Still more important is the value of such thoroughness in the training of our men for their future work. All great clinicians study their patients with the most detailed thoroughness, missing not the smallest departure from normal function, appreciating always what is the normal. No successful investigator can have any other method than infinite thoroughness in his work. Thoroughness in every detail cannot begin too early in one's career.

To be an able clinician one must hold stored in his mind the details of a vast number of patients that he has studied as well as the results of those studies by others that go to make up medical literature. All of this depends upon a trained memory. To train the memory of our students and house officers we have required always that they know the facts about their cases and be able at any time to give them from memory. Besides training memory, this makes for better care of the individual patient. How can one treat patients intelligently, and especially sudden emergencies in them, unless he has in mind all of the patient's history and just what previous physical examination has shown?

To take a detailed history, to make a thorough physical examination, to carry out the various indicated laboratory studies, to write a summary of the findings and

to arrive at a diagnosis is a logical process of deduction, the value of which largely is lost, if all, including the diagnosis, is not stated positively in writing, to be modified or changed as subsequent study or more experienced observation justified. Hence our plan of encouraging all who study a patient to add his findings to the history and express his ideas as to diagnosis and treatment. The senior member of the staff ought to be correct oftener than those of shorter experience, but all learn from their mistakes to improve their clinical ability. None should be afraid to be proved wrong in his opinions and to give credit to his junior, when the junior's expressed opinion is the correct one. Thus clinical training is perfected. He, who never commits his opinions to writing, loses the most important discipline of clinical work and runs a great risk of assuming an omniscience that is fatal to further development as a clinician. Alas, too often cowardice prevents such commitments; extremely rarely, I am glad to say, has this been true of members of the medical staff of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital.

After our wards were receiving their full quota of patients, the size of our resident staff was increased to a size which, so far as I know, equals in the ratio of resident staff to number of beds that of any other general hospital anywhere and exceeds that in the majority. This was done in order that our methods of study of patients might be detailed in their thoroughness, and yet there be time for reading medical literature and carrying on some bit of investigation or the preparation for publication of an interesting case or group of cases. How well or how inadequately this has been done by individual members of the resident staff is recorded in their publications and in their subsequent rating in the medical world. More I believe have been laggards in this aspect of the work than in any other.

There is today an unfortunate tendency to say that the mass of medical literature is so great that none can keep up with it. To my mind this is but an excuse of the lazy. It is surprising how much can be covered in the literature by a few hours' reading each week and by browsing among books and periodicals; no physician, who expects to attain to any importance in the medical world, should be satisfied with less than a daily quota of reading general medical literature; not very much time is required, and this can be done from the earliest days of hospital work throughout life. Perhaps in the beginning this may seem a task, but I assure you that, as the years go by, no pleasure is greater to a trained, keenly interested physician than the hours spent in comparing his ideas and his knowledge with that recorded in medical literature by his colleagues. To one, who desires to outstrip his competitors, there is no surer way than to have a greater store of memories of clinical observation, a greater knowledge of medical literature and greater familiarity with something won by investigation than they have. These only are obtained by hard work. It seems to me that the medical man, who does not find greater pleasure in such acquisitions than in anything else, has unwisely selected his life's work. I must confess a disgust for the medical man, who tells you, how hard he works instead of telling you how much satisfaction and joy he finds in his professional work and study, and for the man, who is not keen to become the responsible head of some medical organization or does not soon seek the independence of private practice.

Our plan of organization at the Brigham, which does not subdivide the service into special subgroups, has been a deliberate and important part of the plan to lay broad foundations for the training of the best type of clinicians. To my mind to study all types of disease is a

necessity for the clinician, who is to take a broad view of any particular subdivision of medicine. It is not the easy way. It is a task calling for less diligence and less intelligence early to devote one's attention to a special phase of medicine and no longer attempt to remain conversant with the broad aspects of disease. I dare say it may be the part of wisdom to recognize one's own limitations, choose, for example, some narrow field of medicine as cardiology, gastro-enterology or metabolic disease, etc., and abandon the attempt to remain a competent general clinician, but this is, it seems to me, the explanation of the obviously narrowed outlook of so many of the men who are regarded as leaders in these respective special fields. At least that has seemed to me to be the situation, and so I have insisted that at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital the medical service remain a general service, and that all have an integral share in its management, while at the same time leaving it possible to carry on studies in any special field that may be selected. That this can be done is witnessed by the recognized standing of a number of the Brigham staff in special fields and by the notable positions now held by men trained at the Brigham, a list in which we take great pride. Would that we could always train men like Jonathan Hutchinson, who was, in the words of Osler, "the only great generalized specialist which the profession has produced."

In the arrangement of the work at the Brigham it has been a constant effort to place such facilities for study and investigation, as we have had, at the service of those men most capable of utilizing them to the best advantage without at the same time forming air-tight compartments into which new ideas of others might not freely penetrate. Petty jealousies, happily, have remained rare. Our workers almost without exception

have felt that they would have complete credit for what they did and could publish freely their results under whatever arrangement of authorship seemed to them desirable. The only limitation ever placed on publication has been to limit the use of the words "from the Medical Service of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital" to those publications approved by the Physician-in-Chief, believing that a chief of service should be responsible for the work emanating from his clinic, both as to its form and its substance. Any work, not so approved, of course, could be published just the same but not as "from the Medical Service of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital". After all it seems to me a clinic should have a responsibility in training its younger members so that they can write clearly and logically, using good English. Such a review of papers, as carried out at the Brigham, gives an opportunity for this. The result has been that these papers have needed very little editorial change when they were submitted to journals for publication.

Also should not a clinic have a responsibility to train its members to present their work at meetings clearly, logically and briefly? Our plan of presenting cases from memory on the wards, especially during staff rounds, and at the evening meetings in the amphitheater, gives just such training. I find that Brighamites with rare exceptions make most excellent presentations at public meetings, which speaks well for their early training.

To encourage investigation has had a place in our scheme of developing members of the service as already indicated. Investigation has a two-fold value. The value of an individual investigation may be great or small, but each adds to the sum total of medical knowledge, and this is valuable. Investigation trains the man

conducting it to become careful, patient, persistent and intelligently critical and so is helpful in whatever work that is undertaken subsequently. Very few indeed are capable of investigation of such importance as to justify its being more than a minor part of his activities; its value is rather what it gives in training than what it adds to medical knowledge. This has been the attitude of our service to investigation; no great investigator so far has appeared; such are not made by any process of development, in my opinion, but so to speak are spontaneous in occurrence; when one appears, every opportunity to work out his ideas should be placed at his disposal.

All of the various methods, some of which I have cited, intended chiefly to train broadly our men, may have seemed to you unimportant. To many of you, I dare say, there has been no thought at all as to why they were in use. However, one of the most delightful experiences of the medical service is to see house officers grow in power and develop in ability as they progress through the various steps of the service to greater and greater responsibility and to continue this development as assistant residents and residents, so that, when they leave us, we feel confident that we are sending out men well prepared to continue in their development and to take a high rank among their future colleagues. When the service was first organized, we instituted the graded progressive steps of the house officers' service culminating in a recognized responsibility first in the care of ward patients and then in the management of ambulatory patients with a superimposed system of assistant residents and residents combining routine clinical responsibility with entire freedom for investigation, a system then unique which in some respects has remained unique. This system appears to have been satisfactory in the development of our men as shown by their subse-

quent careers.

To us it is of little import what line our men have chosen to follow. That Brighamites are doing well so many different things in medicine is evidence of the breadth and soundness of the early training they have gotten here. To have become an eminent professor of medicine means no more than to develop into the honored and beloved physician of a community; both are doing equally important jobs. It is their success in the chosen job that is the credit to their training and the cause of our pride in them.

As I look back through the years of my service at the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital, memory recalls many pleasant incidents and delightful associations both with younger assistants and older associates. Working with you men, who constitute the medical staff, past and present, has ever been to me a stimulation to greater

effort and a reward for hours spent in the work.

Farewell. And now I end this my last Annual Report. On September 1 next, I retire under the rule of the Trustees adopted in the beginning of the Hospital on the recommendation of Dr. Cushing and myself, a wise rule, which in my opinion should never be violated. I will ever look back on my period as Physician-in-Chief of the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital as a happy episode in life. In closing this report I say to all of you, past and present, who have worked under my direction, that you are, and always will be, to me a source of the greatest pride and satisfaction; the association with you has been one of the greatest joys of my life. From my colleagues of the staff ever has come helpful cooperation to lighten the load of the work. The chiefs of services, past and present, with whom I have worked, have adorned their

posts. With Howard, Councilman, Cushing, Miss Hall and Miss McCullough as department heads I began; with Howland, Luger and Reynolds I carried on; with Cutler, Wolbach, Wilhelm, Sosman, Miss McDonald and Miss Beal I approach my retirement from active service; those names, their capabilities, their accomplishments speak for themselves; their affection and their cooperation have meant more to me than I have words to tell. Of my present colleagues and assistants on the medical staff with Levine, O'Hare and Walker longest in service and of Frothingham and Peabody, who helped to inaugurate the medical service, what more can I say than that they were ever kindly critics, ready to help; able, dependable, honest and lovable; no chief, I feel sure, could have possessed a finer group of colleagues, associates and assistants. The work of 1938, as in past years, has been facilitated by the willing cooperation of all the many people needed to make the wheels of a hospital go round. And so, "farewell."
