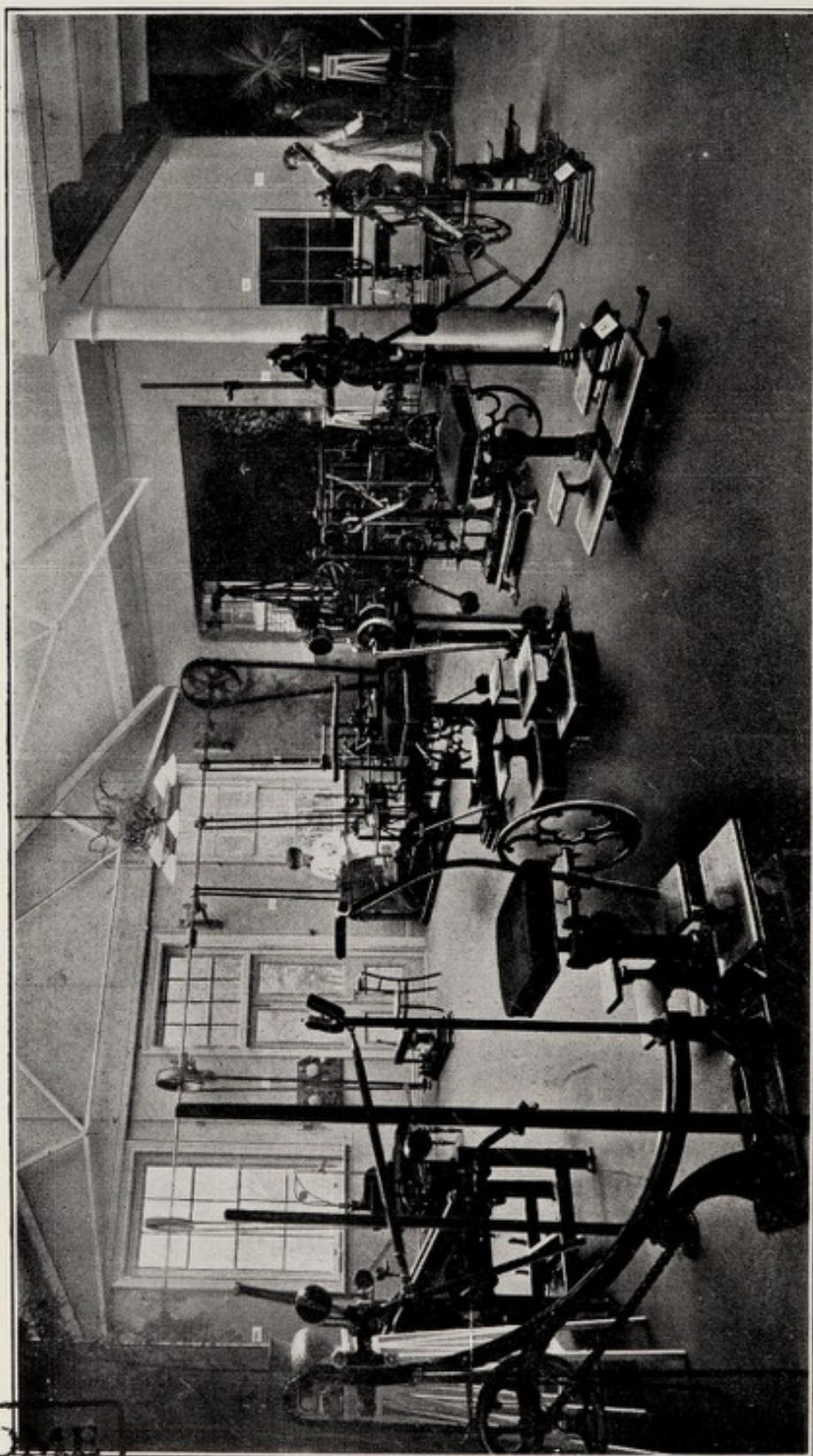

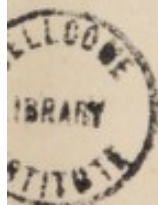

REPORT

of the Council of Management for
the Year ended 31st December, 1942.

THE Council of Management has pleasure in presenting its Thirty-second Report for the year ended December 31st, 1942.

The year under review represented for the Institute a period of great activity; the number of patients treated was the highest on record in the history of the Institute. The number of patients treated was 4,495, the average daily attendance being 524; and the number of attendances during the year reached the total of 145,700. It will be readily understood that the large and increasing number of patients presenting themselves for treatment taxed the resources of the Institute to the utmost.

Despite every endeavour to carry on the work as economically as possible, consistent with efficiency, the Council again has to report an excess of expenditure over income of £1,315 17s. 8d. At the same time the Council expresses satisfaction in that the receipts from Private Patients and the donations and subscriptions from Firms, Employees, etc., shows an increase for the period under review.

The Council of Management regrets to report the loss it has sustained in the death of Miss A. M. Hall and Sir William E. Hart, O.B.E.,

Miss Hall was one of the original Members of the Council of Management and Executive Committee, and up to the time of her retirement in 1939, took a very active interest in all that appertained to the welfare of the Institute.

Sir William E. Hart became a Member of the General Committee of the Edgar Allen Institute Special War Effort in 1917, a Member of the Council of Management and Executive Committee in 1919, and President of the Council of Management in 1927. The keen interest which Sir William E. Hart took in the work of the Institute was much appreciated; the advice and help given by him being of great value to the Council.

A legacy of £2 10s. 0d. was received from the Executors of the late Mr. Edward Wilson, for which the Council expresses its thanks.

The Agreement with the Sheffield Hospitals Council for the treatment of "1d. in the £" Contributors and their dependents has been renewed for 1943. During the past year 3,403 Contributory patients have availed themselves of the facilities extended to them under the Agreement.

Once again the Council of Management wishes to place on record its appreciation of the manner in which all members of the Staff have contributed towards the efficient working of the Institute.

In conclusion, the Council of Management thanks all who have so generously supported the Institute in the past, and trusts that the advancement of the work may be still furthered by continued and increased support.

Report of the Medical Director.

FROM the figures that have been presented to you, it will be realized that the task laid upon the Institute during 1942 was not an easy one.

An average number of no less than 524 patients attended daily for treatment throughout the year under review. This figure indicates that upon busy days some 600 patients received treatment. These numbers are greater than those of any previous period in the history of the Institute, and indeed are only to be compared with those of the period immediately following the last Great War, when the Institute was called upon to treat large numbers of wounded soldiers. It is of interest to note that in 1919 the great bulk of our work was military in character, whereas to-day it is essentially civilian. The large numbers of our civilian patients to-day is an indication of the stress and strain to which the population is exposed; it is the result of hard work undertaken by those not previously inured to toil, and by those no longer young, and by women; and to this must be added the injuries inseparable from high-g geared industry. It is the function of the Institute to alleviate the results of this stress and strain, and to bring about the restoration and rehabilitation of those affected.

Our thoughts have been by no means restricted to our daily tasks, for it has also been necessary for us to consider the future; indeed, it may be said that at the Institute we have had our full share of planning, in view of the widespread interest now taken

in physiotherapy and rehabilitation. Much thought and discussion has been directed during the year to our relationships with the other Medical Institutions of the City, and to the provisions of the Beveridge Report and to the Nuffield Hospital Survey. Great changes are imminent in the hospital system of the country, and it is my hope that the part played by the Institute in these changes will be a useful and a worthy one.

In conclusion, I express my thanks to the Assistant Medical Director, Dr. Tilsley, and to my other medical colleagues for their excellent work during a difficult time, and to the Matron and the rest of the staff for their unfailing attention to their duties.

NOTE ON TREATMENT.

THE Institute is equipped for the carrying out of the various methods of physical treatment. It possesses a set of the Zander apparatus, part of which is power-driven for the performance of passive manipulations, and part of which is designed for active exercises.

The Institute also possesses a complete electrical installation for treatment by means of galvanism, faradism, high frequency, diathermy, short-wave therapy and ionization. It is provided with a set of whirlpool baths, and apparatus for treatment by means of radiant heat, and it is equipped for treatment by means of the Ultra-Violet Rays. Treatment by means of Therapeutic Mud Baths is also provided.

Massage, remedial exercises and re-education are carried out by a trained massage staff in specially-equipped gymnasia.

When necessary, manipulations under anæsthesia are performed.

Attention is paid to the provision and fitting of orthopædic and surgical appliances. Certain types of splints are made at the Institute.

The following may be mentioned as types of the morbid conditions treated :—

- (1) The results of injuries to bones, joints and muscles; the results of nerve lesions.
- (2) Arthritic conditions, as rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis and allied diseases; general rheumatic conditions, including myalgia and fibrositis.
- (3) Neuritis; sciatica; certain general nervous diseases, especially those requiring re-education; functional nervous diseases.
- (4) Orthopædic cases, including scoliosis, the results of infantile paralysis and rickets, and congenital malformations.

No patients are accepted for treatment without the sanction of their usual medical attendant.

ADMITTANCE OF PATIENTS TO TREATMENT.

THE Institute is a charitable Institution chiefly supported by voluntary contributions. Subscribers receive a "Recommend" for each guinea subscribed. For one month's treatment two "Recommends" are required.

Patients who are requiring but are unable to obtain "Recommends" should apply to the General Secretary for the names of Subscribers to whom application may be made.

Private Patients: The fees for private patients are 8/- an attendance or alternatively £7 for a course of 20 treatments, the course to be completed within two consecutive months. These charges cover all services with the exception of X-ray, surgical appliances or manipulative treatment under anæsthesia. There is a separate Block for Private Patients. The entrance to this is 50 yards lower down Gell Street from the main entrance.

The Institute is now recognized by the Ministry of Health as an Additional Benefit (No. 16) for the treatment of rheumatism. Any patient desiring to receive treatment under this Additional Benefit should make application to his or her Approved Society.

Patients contributing to the Sheffield "1d. in the £" Scheme, and their dependents, may receive treatment on production of a "1d. in the £" Scheme Letter of Introduction.

All patients coming for treatment should be provided with the approval of their usual medical attendant.

ONLY OUT-patients are treated as the Institution does not provide in-patient accommodation.
