

North Cambridgeshire Hospital.

THE HOSPITAL was built and liberally endowed by the late MISS M. E. TRAFFORD SOUTHWELL, who laid the Memorial Stone on the 16th of October, 1872, and formally opened and presented the Hospital to the Town on the 2nd of October, 1873. The First Patient was admitted on the 22nd November, 1873.

With the sanction and approval of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales the Hospital is now a "Training School for Nurses," in affiliation with Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge.

The Hospital possesses excellent General and Private Wards, Children's Ward, Open-Air Balconies, up-to-date Operating Theatre, Anæsthetising Room, Electric Lift for the Patients, also special Electrical Apparatus and Appliances, including X-Rays and Ultra Violet Rays, Massage, &c.

An Orthopædic Clinic is held under the personal supervision and management of Dr. Roderick, the Honorary Orthopædic Surgeon of Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge.

There are 50 Beds.

SIXTIETH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL COMMITTEE.

1873 1933.

This Report marks the end of the 60th year of the Hospital's work. A splendid record of continued progress and efficiency in the treatment and cure of suffering humanity in our midst. Wisbech and its locality should be—and doubtless is—proud of the North Cambridgeshire Hospital, and thousands have had cause for gratitude for its work of healing.

It is gratifying to the Committee to be able to record that the past year has been one of undiminished usefulness and effort, combined with extended efficiency, and with evident increasing appreciation on the part of the public.

STATISTICAL.

The number of In-Patients increased from 571 last year to 624—the average daily number of In-Patients rose to 35'5. Unfortunately the accommodation at the Hospital has lately been severely taxed, and for several weeks there has been a "waiting list," which the Committee is most anxious to avoid.

The number of ordinary Out-Patients went down from 301 to 228, but the number of X-Ray Patients increased from 109 to 336, and Electrical Massage and Sunlight Violet-Ray Patients numbered 121.

The total number of Patients treated was no less than 1309, which is a record.

The "accident" cases numbered 96. Emergencies 154. Dental Patients 17. Private Patients 57.

The number of X-Rays taken was 498. Number of Massage and Sunlight treatments 2,939.

The cost per head per week of In-Patients was £2/10/6.

During the year Mrs. Newling, of Beaupre Hall, most kindly presented to the Hospital the sum of £1000 to endow a bed in the Male Ward in memory of her late Husband,

Mr. Edward Fordham Newling. The Committee is greatly indebted to Mrs. Newling for her generous and most welcome gift.

Special Donations and Gifts amounted to £259/15/4. A complete list of these is printed in the Annual Report and the generous donors are asked to accept this expression of appreciation and sincere thanks for their most welcome financial help. This source of income is an invaluable aid to the Committee in carrying on the work of the Institution.

FINANCIAL.

The total income credited to the General Maintenance Fund amounted to £4,804/8/5. General Subscriptions were £239/11/6 against £274/14/1 in the previous year. Church and Chapel Collections shewed a slight increase of £3'2/11, but the total amount was only £75/1/11, which seems lamentably small, and the attention of the Clergy and Ministers is repectfully called to this small item. The total sum received from Patients was £773/12/1, of which Private and Paying Patients' fees amounted to £635/13/1 and payments by Ordinary Patients £62/19/0.

On the expenditure side salaries and wages amounted to £1,535/19/0 against £1,411/10/5 last year (The bulk of this increase is connected with the X-Ray and Massage and Sunlight Department). Provisions cost £983/19/9, a saving of £73 on the figures of the previous year owing to reduction in cost of various items of food. Furnishing and supplies went up from £222 to £299, and Medicines, Bandages and Dressings cost £402/12/5. There was a considerable increase in the cost of Surgical Instruments and Appliances, chiefly occasioned by the necessity for purchasing a new Operating Table for the Theatre.

An Audited copy of the Abstract of Accounts is printed herewith.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

A welcome addition of £134/4/0 brought the total income from this scheme during the past year up to £1,258/15/3. To the local committees and their collectors, the committee cannot too strongly express gratitude and high appreciation. This source of income is absolutely essential to the Hospital. The increase above reported is very gratifying, but it is sincerely hoped that a much further extension of membership may arise. The enormous advantages offered for a Penny per week, in addition to the opportunity it gives of doing something for the Hospital, should induce thousands more to become members. During the past year quite a

large number of Patients have expressed regret that they had not joined the scheme, and it is again pointed out that free treatment at the Hospital is now given only to Members of the Contributory Scheme.

368 Members of the scheme were admitted as In-Patients during the past year. They cost the Hospital no less than £2,757. How important it is that the maintenance of the Contributions from the Hospital Sunday Collections, and from the various events kindly arranged throughout the district for the benefit of the Hospital should in no case be allowed to diminish!

The reciprocal arrangments made with Addenbrooke's Hospital at Cambridge, and the King's Lynn Hospital, have proved to be very popular and of great advantage to many Members of the scheme, but it must be distinctly understood that before a member is sent either to Cambridge or King's Lynn a form of certificate (which can be obtained from the secretary of the local branch to which the Member belongs) must be signed by the Patient's own Doctor and sent to the secretary of the North Cambs. Hospital at Wisbech. In no other case is the North Cambs. Hospital liable for the cost of treatment at Cambridge or King's Lynn.

PORTABLE X-RAY APPARATUS.

The Committee recently issued an appeal for donations to pay the cost of a portable X-Ray apparatus which was felt to be necessary to enable X-Rays to be taken at the bedside of Patients who through accident or other cause could not be removed from their beds to the X-Ray department. Through the kindness of friends and particularly through the generosity of a Lady (who wishes to remain anonymous), and Mr. Arthur Image, the fund was speedily provided, and the new apparatus will add greatly to the efficiency of the Hospital, and be of enormous benefit to suffering Patients.

ADMINISTRATION.

The Committee records with much regret the decease of Mr. H. C. Elgood and Mr. J. H. Dennis who had rendered invaluable services to the Hospital as members of the Committee. The vacancies caused by their decease will be filled by the subscribers at the Annual Meeting.

During the past year, owing to the resignation of the late Vicar of Wisbech (Canon Crookham) the Hospital was deprived of its Chairman who had held office for 29 years. Opportunity has already been taken of recording the indebtedness of the Hospital to Canon Crookham for his splendid services and help, in recognition of which he was

elected an Honorary Life Governor of the Hospital. As is well known the new Vicar of Wisbech—The Rev. H. K. Stallard, M.A.—has succeeded to the Chairmanship. The new Chairman has taken up the duties with such energy, enthusiasm and efficiency, that the splendid record of the past continues undiminished, and the members of the Committee are grateful for their new Chairman's most valuable help and leadership.

A change in the office of Matron has occurred through the resignation of the late Matron (Miss Folliott), after 8 year's efficient service. The Committee is pleased to record that in the person of the new Matron (Miss Hopkins)—who held splendid credentials, and was selected from a very large number of applicants—the Hospital has a most capable and excellent Matron, who is not only thoroughly efficient and experienced, but has already earned the appreciation and confidence of the Committee and Staff, and also of the Patients and the public.

PERSONAL SERVICE.

The personal services rendered is so many ways in aid of the Hospital must be acknowledged with expressions of much gratitude. In all parts of the District are many enthusiastic and willing hands ever ready voluntarily to help in the good cause. Special mention must be made of the members of the local Contributory Scheme Committees and the Hospital Sunday Committees, their Honorary Secretaries, Collectors and helpers in many ways, not forgetting those who also arrange Whist Drives, Dances, Concerts and other Social events in aid of the funds of the Hospital. To one and all grateful thanks are due and are most cheerfully accorded.

THE STAFF.

The Committee has again the privilege and pleasure of recording highest appreciation of the most able and willing services rendered to the Institution by the members of the Hon. Medical and Dental Staff, and of expressing entire satisfaction with the efficient way in which the whole of the Hospital Staff have fulfilled their onerous and important duties.

APPEAL.

The Hospital greatly needs more Annual Subscribers, the subscription list being again sadly depleted through the decease of generous friends. It is difficult, especially in these depressed times, to fill their places, but the help of all those who can afford to do so is cordially solicited.

EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES, &c.

(1). INPATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

The Hospital Committee consists of the Trustees, fourteen Members annually elected by the subscribers, and two Representatives of the Hon. Medical Staff.

The Committee meets at the Hospital every Tuesday, and on such other days as may be found necessary, for the General Management of the Hospital.

Subscriptions become due on the Thirty-first day of March, and are considered Annual, until notice in writing to discontinue be given to the Secretary. (Subscribers are entitled to one Letter of Recommendation for each 10/6 subscribed).

Private patients are admitted to the Private Wards of the Hospital on the application of the Medical Practitioner in charge of the case, and on payment of the charges fixed by the Committee. Candidates for admission as ordinaay patients must present a letter of Recommendation from a Subscriber countersigned by a registered Medical Practitioner. (After receiving treatment six weeks, a new Letter must be procured). Contributory scheme members must present a letter of recommendation signed by the Hon. Secretary of their local branch and countersigned by the patients own doctor.

Immediate admission is given in cases of accident or emergency.

No child under four years of age (except in extraordinary cases), no person in an advanced stage of consumption, disordered in senses, subject to epileptic fits, suspected to have the small pox, venereal disease, or any infectious or contagious distemper, no woman advanced in pregnancy (except cases requiring surgical treatment) and no person apprehended to be dying or incurable, shall be admitted, or if inadvertently admitted, shall be suffered to remain longer than is avoidable.

All patients shall bring with them clean clothing and a proper change of linen.

Patients are not allowed to receive food or drink from any other source than the Hospital, and are not permitted to receive *Opium* or any other *Narcotic* without the sanction of the Hon. Medical Officer in charge of the case.

Any patient may, upon his or her request to the Matron, at convenient hours, be visited by the Clergyman of the parish from which the patient comes, or by the Minister of the religious denomination to which such patient belongs.

Patients may be visited by their friends between 2-30 and 4 p.m. on Sundays, and between 2 and 3-30 p.m. on Thursdays and Saturdays, and in cases of dangerous illness at such other times as the Medical Officer or Matron shall appoint.

Two friends only will be allowed to visit a patient at one time, but four friends may visit a patient in one day.

No patient may leave the Hospital without permission from the Medical Officer under whose care he or she may be placed.

Patients who offend against any of the Rules, or behave themselves irregularly or indecently, may be expelled; and no patient, after such expulsion, shall be again admitted without a special order from the Committee.

(2) OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

Persons applying for treatment as Out-patients must present a Letter of Recommendation signed by a Subscriber, and countersigned by a Registered Medical Practitioner.

No person (other than a member of the Contributory Scheme) may be admitted as an Out-patient who is considered by the Committee able to pay for Medical attendance, or who is receiving parochial relief.

After receiving treatment under one Letter of Nomination for a period of six weeks, a new Letter must be procured.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

Under this scheme all Contributors of ONE PENNY per week (which covers the wife, and children under 16, of the Contributor) are eligible for free treatment in the Hospital (including X-Rays, Ultra Violet Rays, Electrical Treatment, Massage, &c.) when required. INSURED PERSONS. EXTRACT FROM REGULATIONS.

Insured Persons being entitled under the National Insurance Act to the services of a Doctor for the treatment of ailments, illnesses and accidents which can be treated by a General Medical Practitioner of ordinary competence in the Patient's own home, or at the Doctor's Surgery, are not entitled to such treatment at the Hospital, provided always that exceptional cases shall be left to the discretion of the Committee. Cases of accidents and minor casualties, if brought to the Hospital, will receive "First Aid," and the Patient will then be referred to his own Doctor under the Act.

All cases not provided for under the Act (as specified above) are eligible for treatment as In-Patients or Out-Patients in accordance with the General Rules of the Hospital.

N.B.—Gifts of Fruit, Vegetables, Books, Papers, Old Linen, &c., as well as discarded Male and Female Apparel of all kinds, are gratefully received at the Hospital.
