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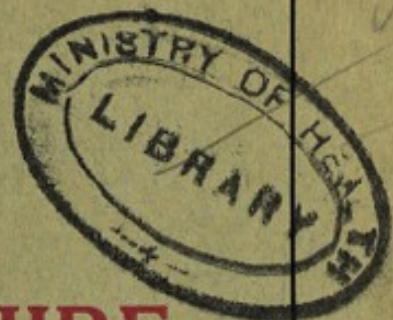

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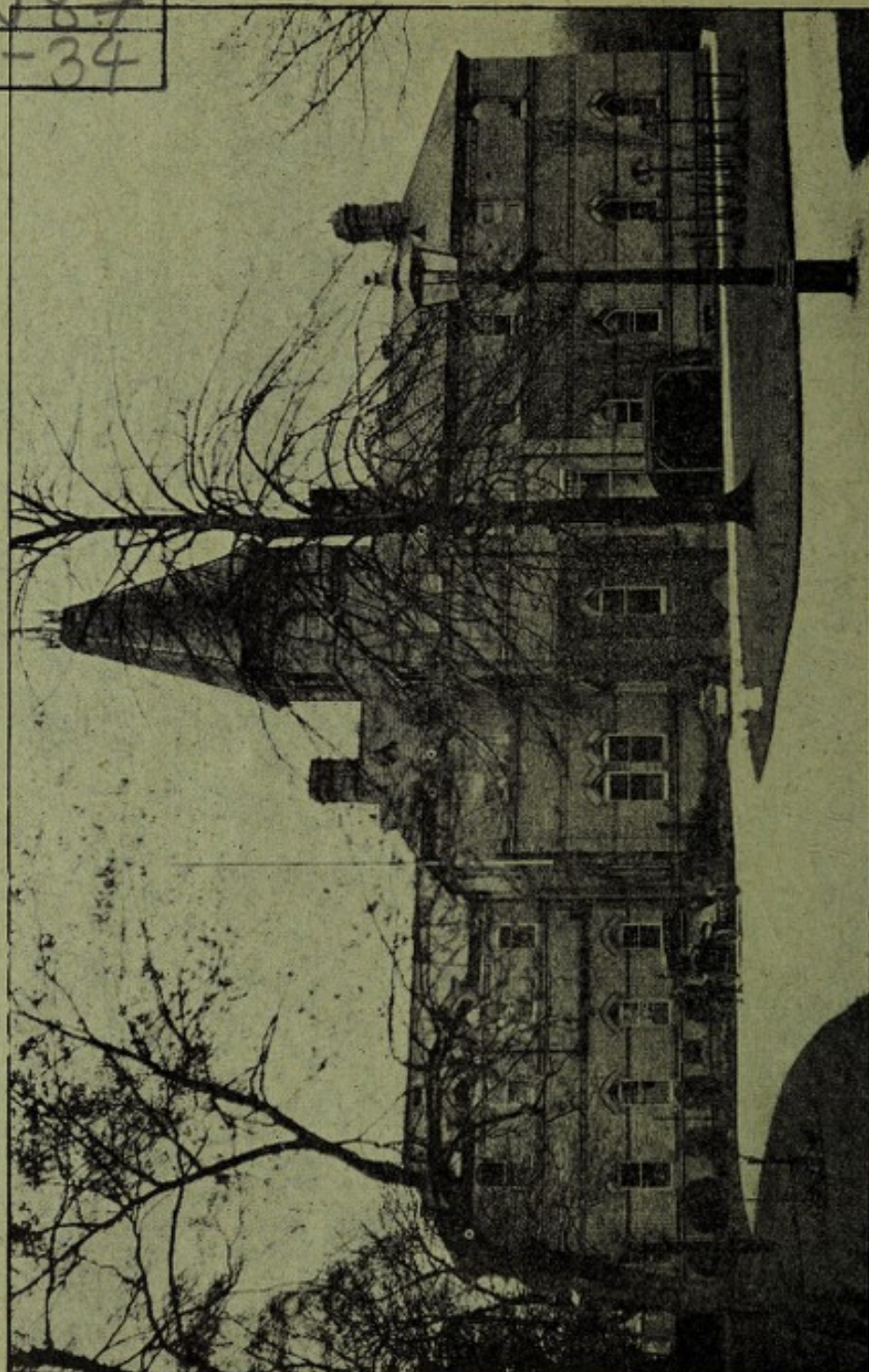

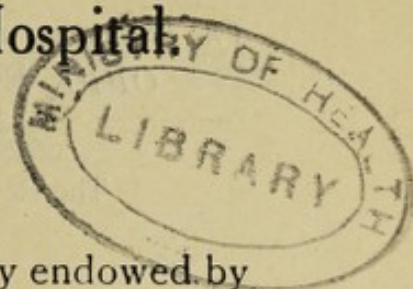
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North Cambridgeshire Hospital.



THE HOSPITAL was built and liberally endowed by the late MISS M. E. TRAFFORD SOUTHWELL, who laid the Memorial Stone on the 16th of October, 1872, and formally opened and presented the Hospital to the Town on the 2nd of October, 1873. The First Patient was admitted on the 22nd November, 1873.

With the sanction and approval of the General Nursing Council for England and Wales the Hospital is now a "*Training School for Nurses*," in affiliation with Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge.

The Hospital possesses excellent General and Private Wards, Children's Ward, Open-Air Balconies, up-to-date Operating Theatre, Anæsthetising Room, Electric Lift for the Patients, also special Electrical Apparatus and Appliances, including X-Rays and Ultra Violet Rays, Massage, &c.

An Orthopædic Clinic is held under the personal supervision and management of Dr. Roderick, the Honorary Orthopædic Surgeon of Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge.

There are 50 Beds.

SIXTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL COMMITTEE.

1933—1934.

The past year's work has thoroughly maintained the efficiency and usefulness of the Hospital in carrying on its beneficent work, and the public appreciation of the Institution is manifested by the still increasing demands upon its resources. To meet that demand, the necessity of making provision for more beds for Patients, providing increased accommodation for the Nursing and Household Staff, and for bringing up-to-date other matters of internal arrangements to enable the work to be more effectually and efficiently carried on, are matters which have to be faced, and are now receiving the most careful consideration of the Committee.

STATISTICAL.

The number of In-Patients rose from 624 in the previous year to 691; there was an increase of 74 in the number of Out-Patients; an increase of 144 (being no less than 44 per cent.) in X-Ray Patients; and the number of Electrical Massage and "Sunlight" Ultra-Violet Ray Patients rose from 121 to 233. These figures strikingly illustrate the growth of the demands upon the Institution. The daily average number of In-Patients was 37.84. There was a welcome reduction in the number of accident cases admitted during the past year, when the number was 80, against 96 in the year before. The Committee is gratified in being able to record that the cost per head per week (In-Patients) fell from £2/10/6 in the previous year to £2/5/7.

Special Donations and Gifts amounted to £275/4/9. A complete list of these will be found in the printed Report and the generous donors are asked to accept this expression

of the Committee's grateful thanks. This source of income provides a most welcome and valuable addition to the funds of the Hospital.

FINANCIAL.

Annual Subscriptions amounted to £286/11/8, which is a slight increase on the previous year, but the Committee earnestly appeals for an increase in the number of annual subscribers. The sum received from this source gets seriously diminished owing to deaths and removals of subscribers from the district, and the members of the Committee feel that a list of considerably less than 200 annual subscribers is not a credit to the large area on which the Hospital confers such enormous benefits. Church and Chapel Collections are another source of income which has seriously diminished in late years, and the total sum received last year was only £72/19/9. Patients fees raised a total of £747/10/3, of which £677/7/3 came from Private or Paying Patients, ordinary Patients fees amounted only to £55/7/6.

On the expenditure side of the accounts salaries and wages cost £1,533/11/11 against £1,535/19/0 in the previous year. Provisions cost £881/5/11; Furnishing and Supplies £251/15/0 against £299/11/2 last year; Instruments and Medical Stores, X-Ray, &c., cost £225/13/3, which was £100 less than in 1932—1933 when a new Operating Table was provided, and the item Medicines, Dressings, &c., cost £447/15/0, an increase of £45. The new item "Medical Staff Fund," £125/6/6, represents the percentage paid to the Medical Staff in respect of their treatment of "Contributory Scheme" Patients and School cases, since October last.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

There was a welcome increase of nearly £100 in the Contributions of Members, the total being £1,352/7/1. To the Local Committees and their Collectors, the Members of the Hospital Committee cannot too strongly express their grateful thanks, but it is felt that in consideration of the enormous advantages offered for a penny per week, there are still thousands more persons living in the District who ought to become members.

381 Members of the Scheme became In-Patients during the past year, and as the cost per head per week of In-Patients was £2/5/7, these cost the Hospital no less than £2,481.

In view of the above figures it is earnestly hoped that the local Hospital Sunday Committees will not diminish their efforts in aid of the Hospital Funds, and that the organizers of Concerts, Dances and Whist Drives, &c., will continue their kind efforts to assist the Institution with generous donations.

ADMINISTRATION.

The Committee records with profound regret the sad and sudden decease of the late Mr. Charles Clayton Brakes who, as a Trustee and a Member of the Committee, rendered splendid service to the Hospital. The removal from Wisbech of the Rev. Robert Smith also deprived the Hospital of the services of one who gave valuable assistance in the management, and the loss of those two gentlemen is keenly felt by their colleagues.

It is with much pleasure that the Committee is able to record that Dr. H. B. Roderick, O.B.E., M.A., M.D., M.Chir. (Cantab.), F.R.C.S., has accepted the position of Honorary Surgeon in charge of the Orthopædic Department at this Hospital. Dr. Roderick is also the Honorary Surgeon in charge of the Orthopædic Department at Addenbrooke's Hospital, Cambridge, and in accepting the invitation of the Committee wrote as follows:—"I accept the position with the greatest pleasure and satisfaction, and look forward, I hope, to many years of happy association with your Institution."

The Committee has elected Mr. Graham S. Gardiner as a Trustee of the Hospital in the place of Mr. Brakes. There are thus two vacancies on the Committee to be filled by the Subscribers at this Meeting.

Owing to his removal from Wisbech, Dr. A. E. P. Parker resigned his position as a member of the Medical Staff. He had rendered valuable services to the Hospital for many years and the Committee much regretted his resignation. Dr. W. H. Carlisle has been appointed to the Staff in Dr. Parker's place.

A change in the office of Matron has taken place during the past year owing to the resignation of Miss Hopkins, who left to take up a more remunerative appointment in London, which had been offered to her. Miss Hopkins was an excellent Matron whose services were highly appreciated by the Committee, the Patients and the public. The Committee

had much pleasure in offering the post of Matron to Miss Elsie Voisin, who had been Assistant Matron and Theatre Sister during Miss Hopkins' Matronship, and the Members of the Committee are pleased to record that Miss Voisin is a most capable and efficient Matron and that her services are highly appreciated by them, and by the Medical Staff, and the Patients.

Another change has occurred through the resignation of the Secretary, Mr. W. F. Bray, whose connection with the Hospital covered a period of no less than 50 years. The Members of the Committee have expressed, and recorded on their Minutes, their sincere appreciation of Mr. Bray's lengthy services, and in special recognition of such services have unanimously elected him an Honorary Life Governor of the Hospital.

The Committee has appointed Mr. John N. A. Briscoe as Secretary and Accountant in the place of Mr. Bray. Mr. Briscoe has had much valuable Hospital experience as a member of the Secretarial Staff of the Manchester Royal Infirmary, and has already entered upon his duties at this Hospital.

PERSONAL SERVICE.

The personal services rendered in many ways in aid of the Hospital are again acknowledged with expressions of much gratitude. In all parts of the District are many enthusiastic and willing hands who voluntarily render invaluable help in the good cause. Special mention must be made of the members of the local Contributory Scheme Committees and the Hospital Sunday Committees, their Honorary Secretaries, Collectors and helpers in many ways, also the organizers of Whist Drives, Dances, Concerts and other Social events in aid of the funds of the Hospital. To one and all grateful thanks are due and are most cheerfully accorded.

THE STAFF.

The Committee has again the pleasure of recording high appreciation of the able and willing services rendered to the Institution by the members of the Medical and Dental Staff, and of expressing entire satisfaction with the efficient way in which the whole of the Hospital Staff have fulfilled their important duties.

EXTRACTS FROM THE RULES, &c.

(1). INPATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

The Hospital Committee consists of the Trustees, fourteen Members annually elected by the subscribers, and two Representatives of the Medical Staff.

The Committee meets at the Hospital every Tuesday, and on such other days as may be found necessary, for the General Management of the Hospital.

Subscriptions become due on the Thirty-first day of March, and are considered Annual, until notice in writing to discontinue be given to the Secretary. (Subscribers are entitled to one Letter of Recommendation for each 10/6 subscribed).

Private patients are admitted to the Private Wards of the Hospital on the application of the Medical Practitioner in charge of the case, and on payment of the charges fixed by the Committee.

Candidates for admission as ordinary patients must present a letter of Recommendation from a Subscriber countersigned by a registered Medical Practitioner. (After receiving treatment six weeks, a new Letter must be procured). Contributory scheme members must present a letter of recommendation signed by the Hon. Secretary of their local branch and countersigned by the patients own doctor.

Immediate admission is given in cases of accident or emergency.

No child under four years of age (except in extraordinary cases), no person in an advanced stage of consumption, disordered in senses, subject to epileptic fits, suspected to have the small pox, venereal disease, or any infectious or contagious distemper, no woman advanced in pregnancy (except cases requiring surgical treatment) and no person apprehended to be dying or incurable, shall be admitted, or if inadvertently admitted, shall be suffered to remain longer than is avoidable.

All patients shall bring with them clean clothing and a proper change of linen.

Patients are not allowed to receive food or drink from any other source than the Hospital, and are not permitted to receive *Opium* or any other *Narcotic* without the sanction of the Medical Officer in charge of the case.

Any patient may, upon his or her request to the Matron, at convenient hours, be visited by the Clergyman of the parish from which the patient comes, or by the Minister of the religious denomination to which such patient belongs.

Patients may be visited by their friends between 2-30 and 4 p.m. on Sundays, and between 2 and 3-30 p.m. on Thursdays and Saturdays, and in cases of dangerous illness at such other times as the Medical Officer or Matron shall appoint.

Two friends only will be allowed to visit a patient at one time, but four friends may visit a patient in one day.

No patient may leave the Hospital without permission from the Medical Officer under whose care he or she may be placed.

Patients who offend against any of the Rules, or behave themselves irregularly or indecently, may be expelled; and no patient, after such expulsion, shall be again admitted without a special order from the Committee.

(2) OUT-PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

Persons applying for treatment as Out-patients must present a Letter of Recommendation signed by a Subscriber, and countersigned by a Registered Medical Practitioner.

No person (other than a member of the Contributory Scheme) may be admitted as an Out-patient who is considered by the Committee able to pay for Medical attendance, or who is receiving parochial relief.

After receiving treatment under one Letter of Nomination for a period of six weeks, a new Letter must be procured.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

Under this scheme all Contributors of ONE PENNY per week (which covers the wife, and children under 16, of the Contributor) are eligible for free treatment in the Hospital (including X-Rays, Ultra Violet Rays, Electrical Treatment, Massage, &c.) when required. INSURED PERSONS.

EXTRACT FROM REGULATIONS.

Insured Persons being entitled under the National Insurance Act to the services of a Doctor for the treatment of ailments, illnesses and accidents which can be treated by a General Medical Practitioner of ordinary competence in the Patient's own home, or at the Doctor's Surgery, are not entitled to such treatment at the Hospital, provided always that exceptional cases shall be left to the discretion of the Committee. Cases of accidents and minor casualties, if brought to the Hospital, will receive "First Aid," and the Patient will then be referred to his own Doctor under the Act.

All cases not provided for under the Act (as specified above) are eligible for treatment as In-Patients or Out-Patients in accordance with the General Rules of the Hospital.

N.B.—Gifts of Fruit, Vegetables, Books, Papers, Old Linen, &c., as well as discarded Male and Female Apparel of all kinds, are gratefully received at the Hospital.
