The text gives a copious description of each Island in relation to its Discovery and the Inhabitants, which has a special value in its proximity to the event. The N. W. of Canada is called *Terra Incognita*; coming east is *Avacal, La Nova Franza, Canada, Larcadia*, and south, *Apaichen, Norumberga, La Florida*. In what is now the United States and Mexico many towns are named, and of one Mexican town, *Temistitan*, there is a separate view; this was published owing to its resemblance to Venice, where it will be noticed the book was printed.

Not staying at this even, he has actually in some instances gone the length of being facetious in the surroundings, and in one case (p. 260) on the body itself.

This beautiful volume is a most desirable memorial of the precious original, and is bound in olive morocco by ROGER PAYNE in his very best manner. On the reverse of the title is the usual address of the Printer, followed by the several Tables and Prefatory pieces as found in the Lyons editions. A full-page woodcut of the CRUCIFIXION is prefixed to the Prologue of S. Jerome. [This copy has a full-page cut of a scholar seated amongst Divines, within a border formed by the Portraits of Scriptural characters.] Summaries are at the heads of the Chapters, and the Concordances are in the margins. The Apocalypse is followed by a long Epilogue, and the volume concludes with Interpretations of Hebrew names.

According to Dr. Cowel, the editor of these *Constitutions* was a Cardinal Deacon of St. Nicholas and Legate of the Pope here in England in the 22nd year of Henry III., 1238. Platina in his Lives of the Popes endorses this statement in his account of Adrian V., who was previously called Othobon, and adds that he was sent into England with plenary power to compose the differences between the King and his Barons. It was no doubt as a direct result of this visit that the important document here printed was first compiled; but even quite apart from this importance, and only reckoned as a mere example of early Parisian typography, it has no inconsiderable value, owing to its beautiful 'build' and arrangement, and the presence of the woodcuts and woodcut initials. The engraving on the first title is in places touched with red exactly corresponding with that in the British Museum copy.

Capgrave's Lives of the English Saints is one of our very earliest works on the subject, and the successor of Caxton evidently recognised it as a production of importance, by the singularly elegant press work expended upon its production. Amongst bibliographers the fact is a generally accepted one, that if it is not the most meritorious of Wynkyn de Worde's productions from a typographical point of view, it certainly is, when coupled with the importance of the text. Francis Lambert was a monk of Avignon who became a follower of Luther in 1522, and was married in 1524. In his dedication of this work to Philip of Hesse he mentions PATRICK HAMILTON, the first Scottish Reformer, who the year previous (1527) was burnt at the stake as a heretic opposite San Salvador's College. No work has so far superseded Old and New London, and as a popular History of the World's Metropolis, it is always likely to hold its present important place. Many of the engravings reproduced in the original editions are inserted, the great majority are new to the work. The earlier engraved Views and Portraits take the foremost place as regards both interest and intrinsic value; but so far as the work itself is concerned, the numerous autograph letters received from various sources in reference to certain particulars of antiquarian interest, and the additions in MS. by the author, are certainly more important. Some of the letters, however, are present only as autographs of persons mentioned in this book, as for instance the friendly letter from Dickens to Stanfield of 2 pp., 8vo, in reference to some affair at the Royal Academy. A note by Daniel O'Connell, a letter of Sharon Turner's, and a note from Stothard (the artist) are here from the same cause. Amongst the portraits is a very fine **drawing in water-colours** of Bentham, the philosopher.

One great advantage of the compilation is its being present in entirety as left by the author.

One cannot but admire the painstaking care and well directed energy expended upon the formation of this philological and anthropological Gallery. Yet so far from their enjoyment being confined to students, they are, by their endless variety and peculiar interest, equally or perhaps even better adapted to interest the outside collector. This is entirely true of the pictorial portion, which divides the honours very evenly as regards numbers with those devoted to Calligraphy. No costume is omitted, and the artist is as true in his details upon the gorgeous ornamental dress of a Persian lady as he is upon the more scanty and less decorative of that worn by certain of her sisters of the Hottentot and other savage tribes. Then there are the Ceremonies and Festivals, China and Japan matters especially having many of their tracings executed IN COLOURS. America holds an important place in the Savage Dances, and the Costumes worn by the early Planters in Virginia and elsewhere. Taken as a whole the compiler has been eminently successful in presenting most graphically—if by a method rather uncommon—the mediums by which the History of Man has been handed down to us; and the confirmation of their truths he aids by his delineations of their later Manners and Customs, thus combining the two factors of the utmost importance in the study of Peoples. *There is still space for further additions in every department.*

A very interesting choir manual, not only on account of the surpassingly beautiful execution of the gothic characters, but also on account of the remarks written on the fly-leaves by successive friars using the book. There are pages so aptly grouped and so tastefully adorned, that it were easy to wax enthusiastic in their contemplation. From the illuminator's point of view we may safely say (as do the writers of notices on novels) "there is not a dull page in the book," although it can boast nothing in the way of pictorial illumination, owing its entire merit to the excellence of textual execution. The music is written with admirable distinctness throughout, and includes the special music used by the Franciscan order on its Founder's day. A really charming volume.

A book upon which an enormous amount of labour has been expended to comprise within limits little larger than those of a printed volume the whole of the priests' daily office for the year. The psalter, hymns, collects and versicles are grouped under separate headings, a method which though entailing constant thumbing has not resulted in any appreciable soiling of the pages. The penmanship throughout is of a well sustained regularity, a perfect monument of patient work and successful arrangement, the initials in particular being singularly bold and strong in design, and displaying at times considerable originality. So complete a compendium of the devotional year is not often to be met with in manuscript.

The Bishop is called to account for great partiality and misrepresentation. The evidence is gone into pretty minutely, and discussed at considerable length. The details are not always pleasant reading. The manner of Lord Essex's death seems never to have been precisely determined.

The book thus embodies a practical history of mediæval calligraphy.

This book has many claims of distinction, chief among them being perhaps the extreme beauty and exact form of the characters employed. Their full dignity is apparent in the latter and less used portion of the volume. The strength, especially of the initials is very remarkable. They rely for effect less upon ornament than upon the firmness and the admirable portions observed in their outlines, their decoration being of the simplest description. Curious interpolations will be found in parts of the ordinary of the Mass—in some of the settings of the *Kyrie eleison* for instance and in the version of the *gloria in excelsis* for use on days sacred to the Blessed Virgin. The vellum varies greatly in colour, from pale cream to deepest yellow. Rubrication is plentiful throughout.

The gorgeously painted initial is a rare artistic gem, the upper portion representing, against a background of burnished gold, Herod issuing his commands, while the lower part is devoted to a graphic portrayal of their execution. The outer limits of this grand letter are quartered crimson and blue. The pages which follow it are full of interesting matter.

The pages are plentifully studded with capitals of varied design.

Judging from its small size and the absence of musical notation from the Prefaces, etc., this Missal was doubtless intended for portable use. There is, however, an insertion of certain antiphons with music immediately after the Mass for Candlemas-day, which deserves attention as a specimen of the neatest possible penmanship; indeed it may be said that the book partly owes its historical value to the successive additions thus made to it, although of course the earlier text has a paramount claim. The single illustration, at the Canon of the Mass, is of great beauty, tender and devotional, and possessing the true archaic flavour usually found in work of the period. Such of the initials, also, as were completed by the original artist may rank with the very best of their kind. Lesser capitals standing well beyond the text, add greatly to the effect of fields of superb black lettering broken by brief rubrics and titles in vermilion, and adequately framed by wide and mellow margins. Such picturesque planning of the pages affords inexhaustible pleasure; though no two are alike, each has its peculiar beauty. The Missal bears traces of practical use and of the wear and tear incidental to the peregrinations for which it was intended, but this does not altogether detract from its value. Rather, from certain points of view, is its interest thereby enhanced.

## Excessively Curious Manuscript.

Curious and most entertaining is the very original and humorous style of the author who tells us how he was called away to fight Tyrone in the woods of Glencoe, passed subsequently through Newry and crossing to the island of Magnes. The writer becomes especially gleeful as he recounts his festive reception at the house of Sir Richard Morrison. His views on the question of drunkenness are set forth with much jocularly: "Et ego pro mea parte semper putavi abstemios istos conscios esse sibi magni alicujus criminis, qd ebrios se prodituros verebantur. Est enim vinum ebrietatis Pater, ebrietas vero mater veritatis....."

An excellent example of early French decorative instinct. The adornments are indeed profuse, rough here and there, perhaps, but strikingly effective. The miniature which serves as a sort of frontispiece to the work represents the accouchement of the Virgin, and is exceedingly curious. The historiated initials are exceedingly strong, retaining their original freshness of colour to a remarkable degree. Ornamental interest, well sustained throughout the volume, reaches a climax in the columned pages devoted to the Litany.

This excerpt from a 15th Century Antiphonarium includes choral portions of the divine office for Candlemas Day. The splendid illuminated initial (A), 4 in. by 3½ in., which opens the first responsory, represents the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. It is in its original state—untouched, and has five figures, SS. Mary and Joseph, the infant Jesus, Simeon, and an Angel. On the twelfth page is another historiated initial, with a figure of Simeon, while on all the others occur many of varied importance, beautifully scrolled and models of their kind.

An exceedingly interesting booklet, containing, for all its small compass, a great store of information as to the customs followed by the inmates of the celebrated Abbey of Fontevault, in the church of which Henry II. was buried. The rules of the nuns are given first, those for the brethren of the order holding the second place, as the establishment was ruled by an abess. Regulations are set down as to prayer, meals, manner of sleeping, penalties for faults, the administration of the discipline, &c. This last mentioned penance the nuns received at the hands of the superior and the monks from the confessor of the monastery on stated occasions. In the margins room is found for many scripture references, and the book finishes with the signature of the scribe, "F. Jacobus," who executed the work "in ædibus Paruissi," December, 1550.

An elaborately designed dragon frames the picture. The second initial illustrates Christ's welcome of a saint into Heaven, with the words "Euge serve bone," &c., and the third depicts the apparition of the Angel to Joseph. All three are gorgeous adjuncts to the mellow page.

*Selections from all branches of Mr. Morris's designs are reproduced, which have been chosen to give representative specimens of every branch of the artist's work—from the most ornate to the most simple, including, by permission, fourteen titles, borders, and other ornaments drawn for the Kelmscott Press, and forty-two full-page plates of reproductions from various designs carried out at the works he has established. To those unacquainted with the history of printing music with type, an example like this is an astounding revelation; the wonderful regularity with which the notes are placed upon the lines, and the beautiful effect this produces, combined with their varied shapes, belong to the very earliest productions in this manner and a hundred years after its first introduction, such beauties would be sought for in vain, the art having been entirely lost. The initial letters are of an order quite peculiar to themselves, and the woodcut of a variety of fruits on the title is worthy the best work done by Bewick, if not superior to it. Motets about this date are of very great rarity; even the British Museum has hardly any complete, and no portion at all of this printed at Ferrara.

By a happy combination of the old-time spirit with the new, our artist has managed to present us with a series of sporting subjects—characteristically English—that covers the whole ground from Archery to Golf and from Coaching to Boating; this same combination is also apparent in his treatment of each individual subject, and aided by his skilful execution and a somewhat extraordinary use of colour the effect produced is one of striking originality. The touch of the artist's hand in colouring adds greatly to their value, and for all practical purposes they are quite equal to original drawings. For the first time we are here presented with a complete and adequate translation of the famous Rubaiyat in the English language.
