This second version of the Bible in English, by its literary and typographical importance, will always retain the place it has taken as one of the most necessary foundations to an English library. It is known to have been printed abroad by Grafton and Whitechurch; though the town has not been ascertained, the majority of bibliographers favour Paris as the most likely. John Rogers, the first martyr in Queen Mary's reign, was responsible for the variations and emendations to Tyndale's and Coverdale's first English version, and he superintended the whole publication under the assumed name of Mathew. To find a perfect copy is a matter almost impossible except for the few in our great Public Libraries. Even such collections as those formed by the Duke of Sussex and Earl Spencer had to be content with copies failing many leaves, and the Fletcher copy, also imperfect and with some leaves mended, realized no less a sum than £105, whilst Gardner's (presumably perfect) sold for £150. The above copy is from the Johnson Library, and has the binder's account inserted for the cleaning and binding, for which alone the owner paid £14.

I have ordered a Sun dial for the top of it, and it will be a very good object indeed. Best love to dear Lottie and Mrs. White. The same to Mr. White and Clara. We are always talking about you all.

Thomas" (Sergeant-at-Law.) H. G. Bohns (an old schoolfellow of Thomas) was its next possessor, after which it came into Mr. Wright's Collection; he showed it at the Victoria Era Exhibition at Earl's Court, 1897. All this and further information is printed or written on the back of the picture. Altogether whether to an admirer of Dickens, or as an example of Frith's work, it is an item of the greatest interest.

Berthelette was one of Caxton's workmen, and the first who obtained the patent and title of King's Printer. Willett's sold for £315, Roxburghe £336, White Knight's, imperfect, £205. Gower was one of our earliest poets, and his 'Confession of a Lover' is no unpleasant miscellany of the shorter tales which delighted the reader of the middle ages. Warton says if Chaucer had not existed, the composition of Gower, the next poem in succession, would alone have been sufficient to rescue the reigns of Ed. III. and Rich. II. from the imputation of barbarism.

Nearly the whole of the title is occupied by the beautiful device of Godard, followed on the reverse by '*Almanach pour XI. ans*' (1517-27); the next page bears the curious cut representative of the lunar influences upon man, surrounded by descriptive text, and on reverse of the same leaf the Calendar commences, each month preceded by a cut illustrative of some feast, occupation, or amusement; it ends on ro. of 8th leaf, and a cut of St. John in the cauldron of oil takes up the reverse of the same. Christ betrayed by Judas, The Annunciation, The Crucifixion, Descent of the Holy Ghost, The Nativity, The Angel's message to the Shepherds, Adoration of the Magi, Prophecy of Zacharias, Flight into Egypt, Death of the Virgin, and Resurrection of Lazarus are the Gospel subjects of the full-page cuts, whilst there are also a few from the Lives of the Saints. The earlier borders are principally floral, arabesque, and ribbon, with figures frequently introduced. Some person of excessive modesty has emphasised their objection to the nudity of certain of these figures by partially effacing them with ink. The Dance of Death series extends about 17 pages towards the end. Initials throughout are filled in by hand in red and blue.
