

(2) Second issue, exactly the same setting except the last cipher of the date, where a "3" is substituted for the "2." Of the second issue there are two varieties (a) with a headline, De epistola, on \* 2 b (b) without it.

This copy is taller than that in the British Museum, measuring in height 185 mm—the B.M. copy measures 174 mm. James Mabbe (1572-1642?) Spanish scholar, born in Surrey, matriculated at Magdalen College, Oxford: adopted the pseudonym of "Don Diego Puede-Ser" (James May-be), translated Celestina and the Exemplary novels of Cervantes.





Ambroise Paré (1509-1590), born at Laval (Mayenne), "the father of French Surgery." He reformed the treatment of gunshot wounds and the method of stopping bleeding in surgical operations, in which cautery had previously been used. Pare substituted in the one case soothing unguents and in the other ligatures. Brantome says that the king sent for Paré who was a protestant, on the eve of the Saint Bartholomew massacre, and kept him in his own room for safety.

The book consists of four essays, the first and second attack the superstition as to the medicinal virtues of mummy and "unicorn's horn," the third deals with poisons and the impossibility of a universal antidote, and the fourth treats of the

The Seigneur des Ursains, to whom this volume is dedicated, after an illness in which Paré had attended him, had enquired why the latter had administered neither mummy or "unicorn's horn." Pare wrote these two essays as an answer. He poured scorn on the notion that any healing virtue could reside in either. "The ancients." he said, "were indeed anxious to embalm the bodies of their dead, but not that they should serve as food and drink for the living as is now done. For they never thought of anything so foolish and abominable." As for the unicorn, Paré points out that the creature is given a different description and character in every traveller's tale. In the introduction he says he had discussed with Chape-

lain, the recently deceased physician to the king the possibility of abrogating the absurd custom of putting the powdered "horn of the unicorn" in the king's cup as an antidote against poison, but Chapelain replied that the popular fallacy wass too ingrained for correction. (D. W. Singer: Ambroise Paré).
Sir Thomas Browne, in his Pseudodoxia Epidemica, book 3, ch. 23, writes at

length on the unicorn's horn. He believes in the existence of such an animal, butt says that the medicament sold as unicorn's horn is a fraud, and ascribes the credit of exposing it to Thomas Bartholin and Olaus Wormius. However, he is not con-

vinced that this preparation may not have some sort of antidotal property.

The Encyclopaedia Britannica, 12th edition, art. "unicorn," states that the earliest description of the animal is given by Ctesias, who also mentions the antidotal properties of the horn. The belief lingered on in England until the reign off Charles II, when it was finally disposed of by the Royal Society.

A reduced facsimile of the woodcut of the "Camphur" (a supposed species off

unicorn) on f 20 b, is to be found in Mr. Francis R. Packard: Life and times of Ambroise Paré, p. 117.

In the treatise on poisons, which is really a continuation of the theme of the previous essay, he refutes the notion of universal antidotes. The treatise on the plague was written with special reference to the outbreak in Paris of 1564, which all! but annihilated the population. As Paré had worked in the city during the whole period Catherine de' Medici invited him to record the fruit of his experience. The result was the present tract which appeared in separate form in 1568 and 1580. His claim to the book has been disputed. This is, perhaps, the most important part of the present volume as it contains the first known reference to the discovery at autopsy of metastatic abscesses of the internal organs following wounds.

This book, in common with most others printed in this peculiar type, we designd to teach children to read and write. 
