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

All the prices are amusing, of course, but we notice in particular that the first folio of Beaumont and Fletcher is priced at 6/- and the second at 15/-. The first lot in the catalogue is Caxton's Game and Play of Chesse (1474), lacking the title. Unfortunately this is not priced but the cataloguer who rarely gives more than two or three lines of description to each book, observes that "This Book is allowed by all the Typographical Antiquaries to have been the first Specimen of the Art among us."



The facilities afforded to Dr. Biagi in gathering this material were so unusual that no similar collection ever has been or ever again can be brought together. The permission granted by the Italian Government stipulates that under no circumstances may this edition be reprinted or any other edition published. In this volume are represented 132 of the 199 pages which form the magnificent album now on exhibition at the Laurentian Library, which has been a constant source of inspiration to visitors to Florence who have been fortunate enough to have the opportunity of studying it.

This unusually intimate approach has resulted in a book which will be a fascinating companion for all booklovers as well as of incalculable value to bibliographers.

Except for two sheets of no artistic merit the 1693 specimen of the types presented by Dr. John Fell to Oxford University is the earliest issued in any part of the English speaking world. The types and ornaments have been extensively used by the Daniel Press at Oxford, and the Ashendene Press has made use of the matrices.
