ARMLETS.

- 81 Three, hammered and rivetted, various designs
- 82 Two—one has a figure in *copper*, super-imposed and rivetted on to the brass
- 83 Two, ivory, apparently of great age, carved with Portuguese on foot and on horseback
- 84 Two, ivory, very fine—one carved with rows of a crustacean, the other carved with Portuguese on foot and on horseback
- 85 Two, cast bronze or brass. Vide Plate I. Heavy open trellis work, 5½ inches high
- 86 Two, cast bronze or brass, very fine. Vide Plate I. The one is solid, embossed with vertical rows of heads of crocodiles alternating with cat-fishes, 5¼ inches high. The other is of openwork, with figures of Portuguese carrying manillos, swords and fetish birds, 5¾ inches high
- 87 Two, cast bronze or brass. The one is solid, ornamented with rosettes and heads of Portuguese. The other is of openwork (vide Plate I.) with five transverse bands, two of which are of trellis work

99 Glove box shape, length 23 inches, endless-chain pattern on 2 sides; on lid, 4 birds and leaf scroll

BRACELETS.

- 100 Four, various patterns, square, circular, halfmoon
- 101 Two, set with red so-called "Benin coral"
- 102 Three, iron ring joining 4 bronze or brass figures, the first has 4 crocodile heads, the second 3 Portuguese heads, the third 4 heads of natives
- 103 Three, with leopard heads, cat-fishes, and rosettes, diameter of largest 34 inches
- 104 Four open-work, heads of natives, diameter of largest 4½ inches
- 105 Four, with symbolic designs of snakes, cat-fishes, heads, etc.
- 106 Three, very fine, with super-imposed mystic symbols, chameleons, masks, canoes, snakes, flasks, etc., diameter of largest 4 inches

BOWL.

107 Unique specimen. Circular, melon shape, height $3\frac{3}{4}$ inches

CASKET.

108 Solid, weight 6 lbs. 10 oz., $6\frac{5}{8}$ inches long by $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches broad, and $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches high

CEREMONIAL SWORD.

109 Fish-slice pattern, in splendid state of preservation, length 40½ inches

CEREMONIAL WANDS.

110 Length 32½ inches, solid handle, with 2 figures, one representing a chief holding a sword, the other a king with ceremonial sword of fish-slice pattern

- 111 Length 32½ inches, solid handle with 2 figures, one representing a crocodile's head, the other a chief with a sword
- 112 Very fine, length 35½ inches, handle with 3 loops, and at each end a double figure, back to back, of native kings holding fetish birds and ceremonial swords

EXECUTION SWORD.

113 Measures 363 inches along outer curve of the iron blade, the bronze or brass hilt measures 7 inches

FIGURES.

- 114 Two, one spheroidal of paper-weight shape with embossed trefoil, the other a Janus-head of Portuguese
- 115 Very fine. Circular lid, with raised figures of lizards, snakes and chiefs
- 116 Rare and unique specimen. Solid, representing skull of a sacrificed goat, trussed and preserved as a fetish

VERY FINE AND RARE HEAD.

117 (Vide Plate II.). The whole is covered with a smooth green patina and has the appearance of considerable age. Four vertical and parallel raised cicatrices above each eye; also two vertical and parallel cicatrices inlaid with iron down the forehead to root of nose. Behind but above each ear are 3 ornamental lumps inlaid with iron. The pupils of the eyes are inlaid with iron. Standing on a flat surface, the front is 7½ inches high, the back 7 inches high, the neck of the figure rests on a circular base 5½ inches in diameter with raised external rim projecting ½-inch outwardly from the neck. A splendid specimen of ancient Benin art

IVORY.

118 Seven very fine ivory figures, mounted together artistically on a white shield (vide Plate III.). The middle figure represents a chief on horse-back; it served as a door peg to fasten the door, and was probably in use before the introduction of keys. The lowest figure represents a leopard; above it are 2 human masks, apparently of great age. Above one mask is a musical instrument embossed with a crocodile, above the other mask is a thick carved bracelet and the figure of a native king

KEYS.

- 119 Two, lengths 5 inches and $5\frac{3}{8}$ inches
- 120 Two, with embossed handles, lengths $4\frac{3}{4}$ inches and $4\frac{7}{8}$ inches
- 121 Two, the one is $4\frac{7}{8}$ inches long, the other is a latch-lifter and measures $14\frac{7}{8}$ inches from tip to tip

KNIVES.

- 122 Two, sword-shape, iron blades, brass bandles
- 123 Two, one with curved iron blade and brass grip, the other of dagger shape and all brass
- 124 Two, sacrificial, iron stem with half-moon cutting edge, the bronze or brass handles represent the head of a king and a closed human hand

MASKS.

125 Two, $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Three raised vertical cicatrices above each eye, and a broad grooved vertical cicatrix from forehead to tip of nose. The collar ruff of one is ornamented with 11 bells, and of the other with 11 cat-fishes

- Necklet consisting of 20 bronze triangular pendants. It is said that only Pages in attendance on the King of Benin were allowed to wear such a pendant, and then only on certain special occasions in the year
- 136 Pendant, representing a leopard face, length 5½ inches

PADLOCK.

Rare and unique specimen. Its convex outer surface is embossed with a double row of figures, each row representing a native King supported by two chiefs. The back is flat and engraved with geometrical and flowery patterns. The side with the key-hole has in relief two men with pistols, the other side represents two men with guns. The handle is rectangular in shape, and embossed with two leopards on the side supports attacking a crocodile on the central support

POWDER FLASK.

138 Solid, height 83 inches; two loops on each side for suspension

PLAQUES.

Handsomely mounted on dark oak shields for wall decoration.

- 139 Snake holding a fish in its mouth. Size of plaque 15¹⁵/₁₆ inches by 6¹/₄ inches
- Native king with a ceremonial sword of the fishslice pattern in his right hand. Size of plaque 17½ inches by 7 inches
- 141 Two Portuguese travellers, father and son, very fine and unique,—vide Plate IV. The father carries a long staff in his right hand, and with his left hand he grasps the right hand of his boy. The boy holds a water flask or gourd in his left hand. Above the boy is a fish. Size of plaque 16½ inches by 14 inches



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
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
