

Finance and General Purposes Committee.

Duties:

- The Finance and General Purposes Committee shall, in accordance with the Rules of Order, and with the approval of the Board:
 - (a) supervise all the fiscal concerns of the Board and report periodically as to the state of the several funds of the Board;
 - (b) prepare and submit to the Board in the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated capital income and expenditure and of the recurrent income and expenditure of the Board in respect of that year;
 - (c) prepare and submit to the Board during the month of December in each year a statement of the estimated recurrent income and expenditure of the Board's Institutions in respect of that year, which shall be framed after consultation with the other Standing Committees concerned;
 - (d) receive at each monthly meeting a statement of the payments effected by the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board during the preceding calendar month, and thereafter report to the Board the total amount of the expenditure in question;
 - (e) arrange all investments of moneys held by or funds entrusted to the Board;
 - (f) report to the Board at the request of any of the other Standing Committees as to the provision of funds for any object connected with the administration of the Board or any of its Institutions;
 - (g) supervise the collection of all revenue due to the Board and its Institutions;
 - (h) be responsible for the control of the Head Office of the Board, and deal with all matters appertaining to the appointment, emoluments, resignation or leave of the Secretary and Treasurer and other officers employed therein;
 - (i) invite and deal with all tenders received for annual supplies and services required by the Board;

- (j) arrange all insurance policies, whether in respect of fire, fidelity guarantee, workmen's compensation, or any other risk;
- (k) arrange, co-ordinate and supervise the training of nurses;
- (l) deal with all other matters which do not fall within the jurisdiction of any of the other Standing Committees;
- (m) consider and report upon or conclude, as may be directed, such matters as are specifically referred to it.

The control and administration of the several Institutions of the Board, are allocated to Standing Committees as follows:—(1) Somerset Hospital and the Cape Town Free Dispensary to the Somerset Hospital Committee; (2) Rondebosch and Mowbray Hospital and Woodstock Hospital to the Rondebosch and Woodstock Hospitals Committee; (3) Victoria Hospital, Wynberg, and False Bay Hospital to the Wynberg and Simon's Town Hospitals Committee; (4) Eaton Convalescent Home, McGregor Convalescent Home, Princess Alice Home of Recovery for Children and Lady Michaelis Orthopædic Home to the Convalescent Homes Committee; and (5) Peninsula Maternity Hospital and the C.H.B. District Nursing Organisation to the Combined Institutions Committee.

Duties of these Committees are as follows: -

- (a) Exercise a general supervision of such Institution or Institutions, including the fabric and grounds thereof;
- (b) Carry out such regulations as may be framed by the Board in respect of such Institution or Institutions;

(c) Subject to the approval of the Board, make all professional and other appointments in connection with such Institution or Institutions;

(d) Deal with the representations of patients in and members of the Staff of such Institution or Institutions;

(e) Advise the Board in all matters affecting such Institu-

tion or Institutions;

(f) In December of each year, in consultation with the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board, frame Estimates of the recurrent income and expenditure of such Institution, or Institutions in respect of that year and submit the same without delay to the Finance and General Purposes Committee;

(g) Generally administer such Institution or Institutions, provided, however, that no expenditure shall be incurred unless prior provision has been made therefor in the approved Estimates of the Board for the current year or by special resolution of the Board.

MINUTE

of the Chairman of the Board for the Year 1935-1936.

on Maintenance Account for the calendar year 1935 was £147,779; this was £21 less than the Estimates as finally approved. The total of the Estimates as originally submitted was £150,761; but this was reduced by the Provincial Administration to £147,500, which was subsequently increased by £300 on account of certain special requirements at the Peninsula Maternity Hospital. Fortunately for the Board the amount required for interest and redemption charges on loans relating to the Groote Schuur Hospital (an item which cannot be estimated with accuracy) was £1,780 less than anticipated, this reduction eased the position considerably.

But notwithstanding this, it proved to be extremely difficult to keep the expenditure within the limit imposed by the Estimates. No margin had been allowed for in the Estimates as originally submitted; and one result of the reduction thereof was to make it impossible to maintain the standard set in previous years in regard to repairs and renovations to buildings and equipment. It was not until within a few weeks of the end of the year that the Board felt justified in carrying out much needed exterior painting and decoration work at some of the institutions, which had had to be postponed owing to the uncertainty of the financial position.

I feel that, in view of these figures, I must once more draw attention to the very meagre proportion which the sum received

from the charitable public towards the cost of maintaining the hospitals bears to that cost. £4,562 is a trifle more than 3 per cent. of the total expenditure of £147,779; it represents less than 3d. per in-patient per day, whereas the average daily cost per inpatient (after allowing for various adjustments, including deductions on account of the cost of treating out-patients) was about 8s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. On the other hand, the contribution from rates and taxes amounted to nearly 83 per cent. of the total.

In spite of the enormous growth in the work of the hospitals, the contributions from the public are falling off. In the previous year (1934) the total was £5,397 (the maintenance expenditure for that year was £142,780). Some action must be taken to bring the public to a realisation of the position, if the danger of the loss of the voluntary system of hospitals, with all that it implies, is to be averted.

There has, I am glad to say, been a marked improvement in the position as regards patients' fees. The amount collected under this head—£18,644—is a record for this Board, and represents an increase of £1,346, or nearly 8 per cent., over the corresponding figure for the previous year (£17,298). This may be ascribed to the fact that the Board now employ two full-time officers for the purpose of assessing the charges at the several institutions and collecting outstanding accounts; and, as a proof of the thoroughness with which their work is performed, may be cited the fact that the volume of accounts which have to be written off as irrecoverable is considerably less than formerly.

Many people prefer to earmark their donations to the hospitals for special purposes. The money received in this way is credited to special Funds Accounts, and is expended only in accordance with the wishes of the donors. Such special donations totalled £6,824 in 1935, and in addition the Funds Accounts benefitted from bequests to the extent of £8,320. The sum of £7,386 was expended from Funds Accounts during 1935.

The capital expenditure in connection with the Groote Schuur Hospital in 1935 amounted to £141,257. The total sum spent on the erection of the hospital to the end of that year was £370,764.

PATIENTS.—There was a further increase in the numbers of hospital in-patients and convalescents treated during last year, while out-patient attendances were fewer than in 1934. The figures were as follows:—

It will be seen that more than a thousand additional in-patients were treated; and it is noteworthy that this extra work was carried out without any increase in the staffs of the institutions. It is impracticable to consider the question of providing additional accommodation until the Groote Schuur Hospital is completed; pending the relief which will thus be afforded little or nothing can be done, and I am continually astonished by the manner in which the ever-increasing demand upon the resources of the existing hospitals is met. A very undesirable feature of the situation is the chronic condition of overcrowding to which I have referred on several previous occasions. This must necessarily militate very considerably against the welfare of the patients, and naturally imposes a severe strain upon the nurses.

The present shortage of hospital beds in this area is aggravated by the fact that a considerable proportion of our patients come from outside the Cape Hospital Board District. To my mind it is altogether wrong that we should be called upon to remedy the deficiencies of other parts of the country in the matter of hospital accommodation, particularly in view of the large contribution which is made by the Local Authorities in this area to the maintenance of our hospitals and the fact that similar bodies in other areas from which patients are sent to our hospitals pay nothing whatever towards the cost of their treatment; and averse though the Board are from excluding any patients, they have no option but to give

preference to cases from within their own area.

These figures are arrived at by deducting from the expenditure at those institutions dealing with out-patients, the estimated cost of their out-patient work. For this purpose the expenditure at the Cape Town Free Dispensary (the work of which, of course, is confined to out-patients) is used as a basis; this worked out at 1s. 9·17d. per attendance in 1935, and 1s. 7·58d. per attendance in 1934.

In the case of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital a different method of calculation, which was described in my previous minute, was adopted.

IMPROVEMENTS TO INSTITUTIONS.—Notwithstanding that the energies of the Board in the matter of development are in the main concentrated upon the Groote Schuur Hospital, which it is expected will be opened in the course of next year, it was possible to inaugurate a number of improvements to the existing institutions during the year. Chief among these is the new operating theatre block at Wynberg Hospital, the erection of which is now proceeding and is expected to be completed in the near future. The need for this has been apparent for several years, and became acute when the hospital was enlarged by the erection of the non-European block now known as the Dr. Currie Memorial Wards. The cost of the new theatre, with the necessary sterilising and anaesthetising rooms, sluice rooms, etc., will be approximately £6,500, and is being met by a bequest of nearly £3,400 from the estate of the late Mrs. F. Sparling, and donations of £1,000 from Mr. M. Mauerberger, £500 from Dr. and Mrs. M. L. Ashton, £500 from the University students (part of the proceeds of the 1935 Hospital "Rag") and £1,150 from the Victoria Hospital Association. It will be seen, therefore, that the whole of the cost of the work is being defrayed from voluntary sources.

The cost of equipping the new block, which is expected to be between £600 and £700, is being met by means of donations of £100 from the Mayoress (Mrs. Gradner)—part of the proceeds of the 1935 Hospital Ball, and £72 from the staff of Messrs. Stewart, Neave & Sons, Ltd. (part of the proceeds of dancés), supplemented by bequests of £135 by the late John Watt, and £200 (part) by the late Mrs. Helen Dalgleish. The balance needed will be provided from Maintenance Account, £150 having been voted for the purpose.

Among other notable improvements recently carried out was the complete reorganisation of the kitchen, scullery, etc., at the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home, and the installation of two Aga cookers in place of an old coal-burning range. The cost of this was largely met by means of a donation of £300 from the Lady Michaelis Home Aid Committee (now disbanded), this sum being approximately half of the funds in their possession.

During the past few years the Board have completely reorganised (and in some cases rebuilt) the kitchens at all of the institutions under their control, and that at the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home is the last to be so treated. The advantage of possessing modern well-equipped kitchens is apparent to everyone who has any experience of the practical work of hospitals.

In spite of all that has been done in recent years, there is still scope for improvements in various directions, and, given the necessary funds, these will be effected. Among these are the following, some of which have already been put in hand:—

A sitting-room for the Sisters, and casualty and denta

rooms at the Rondebosch Hospital.

A mortuary chapel at the False Bay Hospital.

The extension of accommodation for non-European children at the Eaton Convalescent Home.

The provision of additional accommodation and of a small

laundry at the Princess Alice Home.

The reorganisation and enlargement of the accommodation at the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home.

Board could not, without outside assistance, undertake the work of raising funds for the equipment of the Groote Schuur Hospital, an influential Committee has been formed, under the chairmanship of the Mayor (Councillor J. D. Low), with Mr. A. N. Foot as Vice-Chairman and Mr. E. R. Syfret as Honorary Treasurer. A large body of voluntary workers has been enrolled, and a great deal of preparatory work has been accomplished. It is expected that a public appeal for contributions will be launched in the course of a few weeks.

The cost of equipping the new hospital is estimated to be in the neighbourhood of £150,000; and the Administrator has agreed that, in the event of half of this amount being contributed voluntarily, he will authorise the Board to raise a local loan for the balance, the interest and redemption charges on which will figure in the ordinary maintenance costs of the hospital.

LAUNDRY.—It has been decided to abandon the CENTRAL proposal to erect a laundry at the Groote Schuur Hospital, and to explore the possibility of building and equipping a central laundry at the Somerset Hospital, which will be capable of dealing with the washing of all of the Board's institutions. The capital cost involved in the project is estimated at £25,000, and, subject to the approval of the Provincial Administration, it is proposed to utilise, either outright or, preferably, in the form of a loan, special funds belonging to the Somerset Hospital, legal opinion having been obtained to the effect that, provided the Somerset Hospital continues to be used for hospital purposes (which is intended in connection with the scheme for training non-European nurses) this proposal is quite feasible. In any event, the money so utilised would in the course of years be reimbursed on an interest cum redemption basis. proposed laundry would be self-supporting, and would be conducted

as an ordinary business proposition under competent management and supervision. Apart from the interest on and redemption of the capital sum, provision would be made for the depreciation of buildings and plant; and the whole of the working costs would be taken into account in calculating the cost to be allocated to the several institutions.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.—I am glad to say that the high reputation for efficiency which the Board's ambulance service

has earned was well maintained during the past year.

It will be necessary entirely to reorganise this service when the work of Somerset Hospital is transferred to Groote Schuur. At the present time the regular ambulance staff is small, the services of the hospital attendants being called upon when it is necessary to increase the number of drivers and ambulance attendants. But this arrangement, which is in the nature of an expedient, is open to grave objection, and it will not be possible to continue it when the new hospital is opened. In any case, there is no provision for the establishment of an ambulance station at Groote Schuur.

The Board own a piece of ground at the rear of Woodstock Hospital; and owing to its situation it is considered that this would be a suitable site for a central ambulance station. A single station would meet the Board's requirements, but there is some doubt as to whether it would satisfy the needs of the City Council, who are interested in the matter in connection with the removal of street accident cases, in respect of which they pay a special annual subsidy to the Board. From the Board's point of view it would not be practicable for them to operate more than one station; and if the Council should consider this to be insufficient for their purposes, the arrangement under which street accident cases are cared for by the Board's ambulances will have to be terminated. Negotiations are proceeding with the Council in this connection.

The proposed ambulance station would be conducted as a separate undertaking; that is to say, it would not be associated with any

particular institution.

SOMERSET HOSPITAL.

Resignation of Matron.—Miss F. A. Goodacre, who had been Matron of the Somerset Hospital since 7th Feb., 1922, resigned on 31st March, 1935, on account of marriage. The Board had looked forward to having the benefit of Miss Goodacre's assistance in connection with the equipment and establishment of the Groote Schuur Hospital, and on this account her resignation was received with regret, although, of course, the Board wish her every happiness in her new sphere.

The Board were fortunate in being able to secure the services of Miss E. M. Pike, formerly Matron of the Provincial Hospital, Port Elizabeth, who assumed duty as Matron of the Somerset Hospital on 1st January, 1936.

I should like to take this opportunity of expressing the Board's grateful thanks to Miss H. Wilken, Assistant Matron at Somerset Hospital, who acted as Matron during the interval between Miss Goodacre's resignation and the appointment of Miss Pike. Miss Wilken's selfless devotion to duty is well known to all who have come in contact with her; and the manner in which she filled the position referred to at a very difficult time was beyond all praise.

Resignation of Radiologist.—Dr. J. van Roojen, who had occupied the position of full-time Radiologist at Somerset Hospital since 1st April, 1930, resigned that appointment on 31st August, 1935, on his appointment as Professor of Radiology at the University of Cape Town. I desire to acknowledge very sincerely the valuable services rendered to the hospital by Dr. van Roojen; happily the relinquishment by him of the post referred to does not connote the severance of his relations with the hospital, as he will continue to be associated with it in an honorary capacity. In this connection I feel impelled to pay a tribute to the generosity of Sir J. B. Robinson, whose gift of £9,000 to the University has enabled the Chair of Radiology to which Dr. van Roojen has been appointed to be established.

The resignation of Dr. van Roojen has necessitated a complete revision of the Board's Radiological services; this matter is now receiving careful attention.

WOODSTOCK HOSPITAL.—Resignation of Honorary Visiting Officer.—Dr. H. W. Stephens, who was a member of the honorary visiting staff of Woodstock Hospital for twenty years, resigned therefrom in February of this year. He has been appointed an Honorary Consultant in recognition of his long and faithful service to the hospital.

Trust Fund.—The warm personal interest which Lady Michaelis continues to take in the Home which bears her name has been evinced by her action in establishing a Trust Fund of £15,000, the interest on which is to be paid over to the Board and to be utilised for the benefit of the Home during such time as it continues to function (under the Board's control) as an institution for the treatment of orthopaedic cases. The gratitude of the Board and of the public generally is due to Lady Michaelis for this benevolent action. It is the Board's intention, if possible, to utilise the income

from the Trust Fund in the direction of improving and increasing the accommodation at the Home.

PENINSULA MATERNITY HOSPITAL. Expansion of Work. The demands upon the services of the Peninsula Maternity Hospital continue to grow very rapidly, particularly in the direction of district work. The position in this regard has been rendered more acute by the closing down of the Jane Waterston Memorial Maternity School; the work formerly carried out by this organisation, which consisted entirely of district work, has naturally had to be taken over by the Peninsula Maternity Hospital. An attempt has been made to meet the position by increasing the bed-roll at the hospital from 32 to 40; but this enlargement (which has involved an increase in the nursing staff) does not go very far towards alleviating the position, and I am of the opinion that the Board should seriously consider the possibility of utilising part of the accommodation at the Somerset Hospital (when that institution is re-opened as a training school for non-European nurses) for the training of non-European midwives also, and the nursing of non-European maternity cases.

that, having regard to the demands upon their resources in other directions, no further expansion of their District Nursing service which would involve additional expenditure can be contemplated at the present time. It is satisfactory, however, to note that a means has been found whereby the work done by the District Nurses can be extended without additional cost. This consists in reducing the personnel and utilising the saving thus effected in the payment of motor-car allowances. By reducing the staff by one individual, the Board are able to pay motor-car allowances to three others; and it is safe to say that a nurse's effective value is practically doubled through the saving of time she is able to accomplish with the aid of a car.

RETIRING GRATUITIES TO AGED EMPLOYEES.—One of the many difficulties with which the Board have been faced is that of making some financial provision for retiring employees who are not eligible for membership of a pension fund. As matters stand at present, it is not competent for the Board to pay retiring gratuities to these people, and one outcome of this is the tendency to retain them on the pay-roll long after they have ceased to be thoroughly efficient. The question of establishing a scheme (on a contributory basis) under which employees belonging to this class would receive a gratuity upon retirement is receiving the Board's attention.

TRAINING OF NURSES.

Medical and Surgical Nurses.—At the final examination for nurses held by the S.A. Medical Council in April, 1935, candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 14; Woodstock Hospital, 5; Rondebosch Hospital, 2; Wynberg Hospital, 2; these candidates were all successful, and Miss D. F. M. McKay (Somerset Hospital) was placed in the Honours Division and awarded the Board's prize of £4 4s.

At the October examination candidates entered as follows: Somerset Hospital, 17; Woodstock Hospital, 2; Rondebosch Hospital, 1; Wynberg Hospital, 4. All these candidates were successful, Miss A. Williams (Somerset Hospital) and Miss A. Malan (Woodstock Hospital) having been placed in the Honours Division and awarded the Board's prize.

The arrangements in regard to the training of nurses in the Afrikaans medium, to which I referred in my previous minutes, were inaugurated on 1st August last by the assumption of duty of Miss C. M. Loopuyt in the capacity of Sister-Tutor at Somerset Hospital. Miss Loopuyt had succeeded in obtaining the Sister-Tutor's Diploma at King's College of Household and Social Science, London, the necessary facilities to enable her to take the course there having been provided by the Board.

Midwives.—At the April examination for midwives, ten candidates from the Peninsula Maternity Hospital entered and all passed; Miss L. C. F. Earp was placed in the Honours Division and awarded the Board's prize of £2 2s.

At the October examination, fourteen condidates entered and all passed, Miss E. Whitfield having been placed in the Honours Division and awarded the Board's prize.

EXEMPTION FROM SECTION 54 OF ORDINANCE No. 5 OF 1912.—At the request of the Board the Administrator, with the advice of the Executive Committee, approved of the exemption during the calendar year, 1935, of all the institutions under the control of the Board from the provisions of sub-section (a) of section 54, and of Somerset Hospital, the Peninsula Maternity Hospital, and the Lady Michaelis Orthopaedic Home and the Princess Alice Home from the provisions of sub-section (b) of the same section. Similar exemption has been sought for the year 1936, provided that in the case of Somerset Hospital the exemption from section (b) is to be qualified to the extent of excluding from such exemption Workmen's Compensation cases, subject to the proviso that they shall not be entitled to select their own medical attendants.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD.—As required by law, the following elective members of the Board retired in October, 1935, and were re-elected:—

- Rev. A. P. Bender (representing the Contributors to Somerset Hospital).
- Mrs. H. C. Horwood (representing the Contributors to Woodstock Hospital).
- Mr. W. D. Hare (representing the Contributors to Rondebosch Hospital).
- Dr. W. Robertson (representing the Contributors to Wynberg Hospital).
- Mrs. A. van der Horst (representing the Contributors to False Bay Hospital).
- Mrs. G. Lightfoot (representing the Contributors to the other institutions of the Board).

The term of office of Mr. M. C. Vos, one of the Administrator's representatives, expired last year and he was re-appointed until the end of February, 1936.

In terms of Ordinance No. 10 of 1935 (which came into operation on 20th Sept., 1935) the membership of the Board was increased from 18 to 21 members, two to be appointed by the Administrator and one by the Municipality of Cape Town. Mr. A. Friedlander and Rev. Dr. A. J. van der Merwe were appointed by the Administrator to hold office until the end of February, 1937, and February, 1938, respectively, and Mr. F. Morrell was appointed by the Cape Town Council to hold office until February, 1938.

Mr. L. W. G. Lesar resigned his appointment as one of the Administrator's representatives, and was appointed by the Administrator as a member of the Board (in terms of section 4 (1) of Ordinance No. 10 of 1935) to represent, during the Administrator's pleasure, the S.A.R. & H. Sick Fund; Mrs. F. X. Roome was appointed to fill the vacancy thus caused and will hold office until the expiration (in October, 1936) of Mr. Lesar's period of appointment as a representative of the Administrator.

The Divisional Council of the Cape appointed Dr. C. F. Juritz, Mr. S. M. Loubser and Mr. E. R. Ford.

- Dr. P. T. Cairns was reappointed as the representative of the Municipalities of Simon's Town and Durbanville.
- Dr. H. C. Baker, Dr. Z. J. de Beer and Dr. J. S. du Toit were appointed by the Honorary Visiting Officers.
- Dr. L. P. Bosman was appointed as a representative of the City Council, vice Mr. L. Gradner.

CHAIRMANSHIP AND VICE-CHAIRMANSHIP OF THE BOARD.

—At a special meeting of the Board held on 28th October, 1935, I was honoured by being re-appointed Chairman of the Board, and Mr. M. C. Vos was re-appointed Vice-Chairman.

OBITUARY.—It is with deep regret that I record the following deaths, which occurred during the year under review:—

An expression of the Board's sympathy at the untimely death of Lord Hyde, eldest son of the Governor-General, which occurred on 27th April, 1935, was recorded, and a message of condolence was sent to Their Excellencies.

Sister A. Luscombe died on 24th January, 1936. Sister Luscombe retired on pension in December, 1931, after having been in the Board's service since 1917.

Dr. P. A. Creux died on 3rd February, 1936. Dr. Creux at the time of his death was a member of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Woodstock Hospital, and for nearly fifteen years he had rendered very valuable service to the Hospital in such capacity.

Mr. F. B. Barling, who represented the Divisional Council of the Cape on the Board from July, 1933, to October, 1934, died on 25th February, 1936. Mr. Barling was a member of the Rondebosch and Woodstock Hospitals Committee during his term of office on the Board, and took a very keen interest in these institutions and hospital affairs generally.

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EAR, NOSE AND THROAT REPORT, 1935.

1. Cases admitted for the removal of Tonsils and Adenoids.

These constitute a total of 527 cases plus 2 cases in which

adenoids only were removed.

Of these the tonsils were removed by the Guillotine method in 123 cases. In the remaining 404 they were enucleated by the method of Dissection.

The Guillotine cases were mostly under 10 years of age. Of those removed by dissection 196 were under the age of 15 years

and 178 were 15 years old and over.

The anaesthetic employed in 497 cases was a mixture of Aether and Chloroform or Ethyl Chloride in children, but 30 cases were done under local anaesthetic. There were no deaths.

The number of cases of Adenoids are classified according to the age and with regard to the amount of this tissue found at

operation. The following table illustrates this:-

Diseases of Mouth and Pharynx.

Three cases of Retropharyngeal abscess were admitted. Two were 1 year old and the other 15/12 years. Suffering from dyspnoea These abscesses were incised and all the cases did well.

There was one adult male aged 48 years with an oval swelling on the posterior and lateral wall of the Pharynx. The apex of the abscess pointed behind the middle of the Epiglottis. This disappeared after incision.

One case had a fungating growth involving the middle third of the mandible. There was consolidation of the lungs and

dyspnoea. This patient died.

One case of Carcinoma of the Tongue. Aged 48 years. One case of Carcinoma of the Tonsil. Age 64 years.

Both these cases were treated by Radium. Their condition at present is unknown.

Diseases of the Larynx.

Eight cases suffering from malignant disease of the Larynx were admitted. Six of these cases required Tracheotomy. Three are known to have died. The fate of the others is unknown. They were admitted for treatment by Radium.

One case had chronic Laryngitis following infection from very septic teeth, and 1 case had oedema of the arytenoids following

an injury.

Diseases of and Foreign Bodies in the Oesophagus.

. Two cases of carcinoma of the oesophagus were diagnosed by oesophagoscopy. One was 9 inches and the other 10 inches from the incisor teeth.

A third case was examined and although some obstruction was met with 30 cms. down no ulcer was detected and the mucous

membrane was histologically normal.

Six cases were admitted for dilatation of strictures following the ingestion of caustic soda. In one case a preliminary gastrostomy was performed. Some months later the oesophagus was dilated up to No. 20 Boujie.

One case was admitted complaining of obstruction during swallow-

ing. X-ray examination revealed a normal oesophagus.

The oesophagoscope was passed in 13 cases for the removal of foreign bodies from the oesophagus.

In 6 cases meat bones of various sizes and shapes were removed. In 5 cases said to have swallowed meat bones, no foreign body

was found and the patient was well after oesophagoscopy.

The oesophagoscope was also passed for one case which had swallowed a pin and another a fish bone, but neither of these foreign bodies were seen. The patients recovered. Five further cases were admitted for observation only. Three of these were said to have swallowed fish bones and two mutton

bones. These all recovered and were discharged.

In one case the patient swallowed a pin which stuck in the Pharynx. A probang was passed. The patient was sent to hospital. X-ray examination revealed the pin lying obliquely in the neck at about the level of the 5th cervical vertebra. The right vocal cord was fixed, but no pin could be seen by direct or indirect examination. The pin was subsequently removed from the tissues of the neck external to the oesophagus.

Nasal Diseases.

Fourteen cases with deflected septum had submucous resection performed.

Three cases with severe epistaxis were admitted for plugging of

the nose.

Three cases had *Turbinectomy* done. All the above cases were operated on under local anaesthetic.

One case was admitted for removal of nasal Polypi. All other cases of nasal polypi were done in the Out-Patient Department.

Twenty-five cases were admitted suffering from Maxillary Sinusitis. In 24 of these the antrum was drained into the nose. In one case the Caldwell-Tuc operation was performed.

There were 6 cases of Frontal Sinusitis.

The first was a boy of 16 years with swelling of the forehead, a temperature of 102°, pulse 96. The cerebro-spinal fluid contained 41 cells per cubic millimetre. The modified Killian operation was performed. This patient died of meningitis.

The second case was an adult male of 32 years of age. The frontal region was injured in a motor accident. Howarth operation was performed. Right cerebral abscess was found. The patient

vomited, developed rigors and died.

The third case had pain over right cheek, below the orbit and in the region of the floor of the frontal sinus. The right antrum was drained and contained pus. The patient developed cellulitis of the face. The frontal sinus was explored but no pus was found in the frontal sinus or ethmoids. After treatment with fomentations the patient recovered.

The remaining 3 cases recovered after treatment by drainage of maxillary antrum on the affected side, inhalations and nasal

douching.

Ear Diseases.

Four cases were admitted with swelling over the mastoid temporal, simulating mastoid disease. The condition was due to suppurating glands, which were incised and treated by fomentations. There were 2 cases suffering from eczema of the ears.

Sixteen cases were admitted suffering from acute otitis media, in which mastoid operation was not performed. In 8 of these a paracentesis was necessary, one case had meningitis on admission. and died The remainder all recovered after conservative treatment.

Thirty-six operations were performed for acute mastoiditis. Of these 31 cases did well. In one case healing was very slow. Four cases died. Of the cases that died one had lateral sinus thrombosis, localised extradural suppuration, acute pleurisy and at post mortem pyaemic abscesses in the lungs were also revealed.

The other three cases had neck rigidity and a positive Kernig's

sign on admission. Operation was of no avail.

In the cases which recovered the lateral sinus was exposed in 5 cases and the dura above the tegmen in 4. In one case a Bezold abscess was present.

In the operations performed 6 cases were 2 years and under 2

years of age.

Of the cases of chronic ear discharge 4 cases were treated by conservative means.

Sixteen mastoid operations were performed on 14 patients (2 cases were bilateral). In 10 cases the Radical operation was performed and in 6 the work was limited to the Schwartze operation.

Two of these cases died, one from meningitis and the other from

ulcerative endocarditis.

In one case in which the operation was performed on both sides the patient was discharged before the wounds were healed, and transferred to the Tuberculosis Clinic; X-ray examinations have

proved tuberculosis disease of the lung.

In once case in which dizziness was a marked symptom there was foul pus in the antrum, cholesteatomatous material and the lateral sinus found to be covered by unhealthy granulations. The Dura of the Tegmen was not exposed. Nine days later this patient developed diplopia. Lumber puncture gave cerebro-spinal fluid under increased pressure but otherwise normal. A month later the patient appeared well, but still had diplopia.

In another case with very dense mastoid bone in which the patient had two definite rigors, the lateral sinus was retracted for about \(\frac{1}{4}\) inch from the bone and covered by a slough and foul liquid serous pus. The Dura over the Tegmen was exposed and an extra-dural abscess found. The jugular vein was not ligatured.

This patient completely recovered.

Miscellaneous.

The following cases were also admitted:-

Two cases of alveolar abscesses and one inflammation and swelling of the cheek due to septic teeth.

One case of Dacrocystitis.

Two cases of Quinsy and 6 cases of Tonsillitis.

One case of suppurating Submaxillary Lymph Glands.

One case of frontal headache—no ear, nasal or throat disease.

One case of osteitis of frontal bone following injury without infection of frontal sinus.

One case of inflammatory swelling over the frontal and lacrimal region with strabismus which subsided after treatment by conservative means.

One case of abscess of frontal bone which was incised and slowly healed.

One case earache and joint pains—no ear disease. Dental in origin.

One case of painful gland over mastoid due to congenital syphilis and infection.

One case of septic infection of nose.

One case of meningitis, ear discharge, neck rigidity, positive Kernig sign, squint in which symptoms disappeared after two days.

One case of tuberculous meningitis which died.

The report does not include the patients examined and treated in the out-patient department.

GYNAECOLOGICAL REPORT, 1935.

During the year 1935 370 patients were admitted to the Gynaecological Department; 189 were European and 181 coloured. Operations were performed on 251 patients, 54 received conservative treatment, 28 radium, 3 X-ray, 4 Electric Cautery, 5 Tubal Insufflation. Five patients refused treatment and were discharged. Details will be found in the appended tables. It is hoped that the method of tabulating operations, which differs from that of last year, will enable the reader to assimilate the information more readily.

I. Infections.

There were no deaths, the treatment of choice is conservative and all the patients were discharged restored to health. Pelvic infection is a painful and disabling condition, but the majority of patients can be cured given sufficient rest in bed, combined with energetic treatment. Owing to a lack of beds, a large number of patients suffering from some form or other of inflammation cannot be admitted. A portable Diathermy apparatus in the ward would appreciably shorten the time required for cure.

II. Neoplasms.

Benign.—The majority of patients admitted under this heading were suffering from fibroids. The operation of choice for fibroids appears to be supravaginal hysterectomy. There were 2 deaths (vide Fatal Cases). Next in number are ovarian cysts, also with 2 deaths (vide Fatal Cases). The 5th death under this heading was admitted for papilloma of the vulva (vide Fatal Cases).

There was one case of endometrioma. A second case, showing bluish nodules on the cervix and vagina, was considered a possible endomatrioma. This was not confirmed by the pathological report.

Malignant.—33 cases were admitted, 27 for cervix, 3 for corpus, 2 for vulval and 3 for vaginal carcinoma.

Four cases were admitted for recurrence of carcinoma, one of which died. Two had metatastes in the lungs. Details are given under Fatal Cases and Special Cases.

The situation with regard to carcinoma is unsatisfactory. It is impossible to report on the results of treatment or the progress of the patients as a careful scrutiny of the records reveals that only in very few cases is mention made of the condition of the patient on discharge. It is possible that some patients have attended as outpatients to report, but this would be entered on the outpatient record and tracing them would entail a great deal of work.

As early diagnosis and treatment offers the greatest hope of cure, it is of the utmost importance that cases admitted for conditions other than carcinoma, and found to have malignant disease, or cases allowed to leave without treatment because radium is not immediately available, should be followed up energetically. Patients, especially coloured patients, often do not understand the importance of reporting themselves regularly for examination. This situation might be improved if one of the staff were made responsible for following up, inspecting and recording all cases of malignant disease. The work would be facilitated by printed slips sent out regularly to patients in order to induce them to attend at a given time set apart every month.

Some confusion has arisen owing to some cases being treated by the Radiologist and some being inspected by him subsequently. The question arises whether the welfare of the patients would be best served by:

- A. Making the Radiologist solely responsible for all cases of carcinoma, in which case they would pass out of the Gynae-cological to the Radiological department. The disadvantages of this course are, sharing the house-surgeon, reducing the already meagre supply of beds, the question of treatment of purely gynaecological complications and the treatment of choice for certain forms of carcinoma such as corpus carcinoma, etc.
- B. Keeping the patients in the Gynaecological Department and treating them in close collaboration with the Radiologist, as to dosage and method.

III. Displace ments.

The results of operation were good, there were no deaths. In one case it was considered better to do a diagnostic curettage first. The pathological report was "suspicious," so hysterectomy was performed. The report on the specimen did not confirm malignancy.

In another case repair of a very bad rectal tear resulted in a small recto-vaginal fistula. Two cases of interest are reported under Special Cases.

IV. Traumatic States.

There were only 2 cases of vesico-vaginal fistula. One was referred to the urologist and the other operated on successfully. Three cases of laceration were small children who had been criminally assaulted. One patient with laceration, who had had only deformed children was sterilized by occluding the tubes.

VII. Twelve cases of ruptured tubal pregnancy were admitted, some almost moribund. All were operated on and recovered. One case admitted as an ectopic proved to be pneumonia.

XII. Pregnancy and Complications.

Anterior hysterotomy was performed on one patient with mitral stenosis. In one case the patient was admitted for fibroid, but laparotomy revealed pregnancy and the abdomen was closed. The patient did not abort. There were two deaths (vide Fatal Cases).

Seven cases were transferred to the City Hospital, 5 for sepsis (4 puerperal sepsis, 1 septic retained placenta) and 2 for syphilis. Three cases were transferred to the Peninsula Maternity Hospital.

SPECIAL CASES.

Case I.—This patient had been treated privately with X-Rays for Carcinoma of the cervix. She subsequently had radium treatment in Johannesburg. When admitted, the condition was so advanced that only palliative treatment could be attempted. The cervix was ulcerated, the vagina infiltrated and a mass was protuding into the rectum. The cervix was cleaned up with the electric cautery and the patient discharged. Age 55. E.

Case II.—Admitted for carcinoma of the cervix. The iliac glands were involved and the condition too far advanced for treatment. Age 44. C.

Case III.—Admitted for carcinoma of the cervix. Laparotomy was performed, and as the bladder was found to be involved, the abdomen was closed again and the patient subsequently discharged. Age 32. C.

Case IV.—This case had been admitted previously for vaginal haemorrhage. She had worn a pessary and there was a vaginal lesion. The radiologist was asked to see the case and diagnosed epithelioma of the vagina. Curettage was performed and the scrapings sent for examination. The pathological report stated that the endometrium was sufficiently atypical to make one suspicious. No radium was available, so the patient was discharged. She attended the Out-patient Department two weeks later and "was told to have radium." Six months later she was re-admitted with a fungating mass in the vagina and a hard indurated cervix, treated with radium and discharged Age 63. E.

Case V.—This patient was a young coloured girl, aged 23. She had a large mass like a bunch of grapes filling the vagina, which was treated with radium and completely disappeared. Considering the age of the patient and the appearance of the tumor, it was thought to be Sarcoma Botryoides, but the pathological report on a snip removed from the tumor stated that the tumor was very cellular with numerous mitoses, an apparently malignant undifferentiated type, modified by infection and necrosis. On histological ground the pathologist was inclined to doubt whether the tumor was primarily

uterine.

Case VI.—Admitted in 1933 for carcinoma of the cervix and treated with radium. She was re-admitted in 1934 with recurrence, given a second

treatment with radium and discharged.

Case VII.—This patient had been admitted in March, 1934 for carcinoma of the cervix with fibroid. The vaginal walls and the parametrium were involved. She was given radium treatment and discharged feeling fit and with no evidence left of cervical growth. In April, 1935, she was admitted complaining of pain in the chest and dyspnoea. Her chest was tapped and 2 pints 15 ozs. of blood-stained fluid withdrawn. In May she was readmitted to have her chest tapped again; 1½ pints was withdrawn and patient discharged. She was admitted in June under Dr. Marais and died of metastses on the lung.

Case VIII.—Radium treatment had been given to this patient at this hospital in 1932. She was admitted in March, 1935 complaining of pain in both iliac fossae and vomiting. On examination the cervix appeared normal, but there was a mass the size of a cocoanut fixed to the pelvic wall. She was seen by the surgeon, who did not think there were grounds for surgical

interference. Patient was discharged.

Case IX.—European patient, aged 44, was admitted complaining of a swelling in the lower abdomen for one year and menorrhagia for six months. A large tumor with bosses on it was palpable per abdomen. On opening the abdomen a mass of small fibroids antero-laterally to the right and a very large fibroid extending to the left lateral pelvic wall were found. Tube and ovary were flattened out over the large tumor, and both tubes were widely separated There was severe varicosity of the broad from the round ligaments. ligaments and some free fluid in the abdominal cavity. Complete hysterectomy with removal of the left tube and ovary. The left ureter was thin and flabby and stretched out over the upper portion of the large tumor. It was not recognised as such until it was cut in separating out the tumor, about 4½ inches from the bladder. An end to end amastomosis was easily possible. This was covered with peritoneum and a drainage tube with a wick was inserted passing out through the vagina. The patient stood the operation, which was performed on June 10th, very well. There was some leakage of urine through the drain. Cystoscopy on the 16th: Bladder normal in appearance. Both ureteric orifices normal in size, shape and function, good peristalsis in both. Definite efflux from left. Catheter passed on left meets obstruction 10 cm. from orifice. The patient was discharged on 6th July, 1935. The pathological report was disturbing. Multiple fibroids, the large one showing areas of necrosis. Multiple small

fibroids, specially the submucous ones, showing areas of necrosis. The tumors are actively growing and showing numerous mitoses, such as would justify a diagnosis of myosarcoma. Nine months later this patient was admitted to Bickersteth ward with secondary growths in the brain, no mention

of any urinary leakage. Exitus lethalis.

Case X.—This patient was admitted for prolapse and incontinence. Fothergill's operation was performed. The pathological report on the cervix stated:— Marked chronic inflammatory reaction in the tissues with catarrhal changes. In addition, and apparently secondarily, there is very prominent hyperplasia of the squamous epithelium with evidence of active growth. Inclined to look on this as an early carcinoma. On making enquiries I find that this patient has not returned to hospital.

FATAL CASES.

Case I .- A.P., aged 39. This patient had been treated with radium earlier in the year for carcinoma of the cervix. She was discharged but continued to have a bloodstained discharge and pain. When seen in Out Patients she was found to have a recurrence; was again admitted and treated with radium, which was removed when she developed physical signs in the lungs. Five days later she had a severe vaginal haemorrhage, which recurred the following day. The vagina was plugged for both haemorrhages. The patient died on the following day.

Case II .- A.P.J. de K. Patient, aged 24, was admitted complaining of pain in the left iliac fossae for three years. There was a smooth and welldefined mass in the pelvis extending for 2 inches above the symphysis; it was not tender. The uterus was felt separate from the mass. On opening the abdomen, an ovarian tumor was found, adherent to omentum, bowel and bladder. The tumor could not be separated from the gut. On attempting to shell it out of its peritoneal covering it burst, and clear fluid escaped. Inside the cyst was a solid mass containing pus and in communication with the caecum. This mass was removed and the hole in the caecum closed. The appendix was full of pus and was removed. Part of the ovarian capsule was stitched together and whole covered with omentum. The wound was drained. Next day the patient complained of general abdominal pain; there was some rigidity. The patient rapidly became worse and died. After death, faeculent material discharged from the drainage tube.

Case III.—A.M., aged 42. This patient died half an hour after admission. Symptoms were those of a strangulation without obstruction but with

increase in the size of a pre-existent tumor.

Case IV.—G.D., aged 42. This patient was admitted with a history of menorrhagia for three years. There was a large abdominal tumor extending almost to the umbilicus. On opening the abdomen multiple fibroid uterus was found with many adhesions. A pocket of pus was opened. On separating the adhesions the gut was torn. It was stitched securely, subtotal hysterectomy and removal of right tube and ovary was performed. The

patient was badly shocked and died the next day.

Case V.—R.C., aged 41. The patient was admitted complaining of an abdominal tumor and menorrhagia for a year. On opening the abdomen a large, soft fibroid uterus was found. Subtotal hysterectomy was performed. On the following day the patient was very collapsed with subnormal temperature and a rapid pulse. A small incision in the Pouch of Douglas was made and dark blood escaped. It was decided to re-open the abdomen and look for bleeding points, but on opening the abdomen there was no free blood present, and no bleeding point was found. The patient was plugged and the end of the plug passed through the incision in Douglas' Pouch. The patient's condition was bad; a blood transfusion was given, but she steadily became worse and died on the following day.

Case VI.—C.J.B., aged 34. The patient was admitted with a history of vaginal haemorrhage. She was very exsanguinated. Very foul-smelling septic remains of gestation were removed from the uterus. Blood transfusion was decided on, and as there was some delay in getting a donor, intravenous saline was administered in the meantime. When the blood was obtained, part of it clotted. On attempting to give the remaining blood the vein was found thrombosed in two places and the patient died before the transfusion was made. This was a case of criminal abortion which had been procured by a person unknown.

Case VII.—M.C., aged 28. Patient had been delivered of a child at 4 a.m. She was admitted at 10.45 a.m. pale, pulseless and restless. She was given morphia, and died at 11.35 a.m. before any other treatment could be given.

morphia, and died at 11.35 a.m. before any other treatment could be given. Case VIII.—S.A., aged 26. The patient was admitted on 5th February complaining of a growth on the vulva. She was $4\frac{1}{2}$ months pregnant. Temperature 100. There was a foul-smelling papillomatous growth the size of a grape fruit. Patient had been sent from the City Hospital with the report that this condition was non-gonorrhoeal. On the 11th an attempt was made to remove the growth with the diathermy cautery, but this proved impossible, so it was cut off and the bleeding points secured. The site of origin was from the edge of the introitus almost to the anus. On the 19th the patient started having rigors; temperature $103 \cdot 6$. She ran a swinging temperature and aborted on the 22nd. She died two days later. P.M. report: Pyaemia.

DEPARTMENT OF DERMATOLOGY, 1935.

The work of this Department is still confined to the Out Patients'

Clinic, held once weekly.

During the year ending 1935 the total attendance was 1,702, of which 551 were new cases. As one would expect in an Out Patients' Clinic of this sort the commonest skin diseases such as Eczema (including Dermatitis), Scabies, Impetigo, Ringworm, Urticaria, Psoriasis accounted for 75 per cent. of all new cases seen.

There were only thirteen cases of Eczematoid Ringworm seen this year. Certainly a great improvement on last year's figures and hopeful in that one can infer that this disease is not quite as

prevalent in the Cape as formerly.

One rather interesting case of leprosy was seen. A coloured male aged 47 was sent to the Skin Department with a small nodule the size of a pea on the upper right eyelid. There was absence of hair on the outer thirds of both eyebrows and a thickened nerve down the right side of the neck.

Nasal scraping done at the Government Laboratory confirmed

clinical findings.

SOMERSET HOSPITAL.

PEDIATRIC REPORT, 1935,

This report does not include any children seen in the Out-Patient Department.

The total number of cases treated was 255, which were divided as follows:—

During the year 34 cases of Gastro-Enteritis were admitted; most of the cases were coloured infants under 2 years of age.

There were 11 deaths.

Broncho-Pneumonia was not quite so prevalent as last year, but the cases were of a more severe type, there being 8 deaths, of which 7 were Coloured and 1 was European. With the exception of 4 cases all were children of 2 years and under. There were, however, 19 cases of *Lobar Pneumonia*, a big increase on the number admitted during the previous year. Only 1 case was under the age of 3 years, and there were 2 deaths.

Twenty-one cases of *Tuberculosis* in various forms were admitted. Of these there were 16 cases of *Tuberculosis* of the Lungs, with 6 deaths; 4 cases of *Tubercular Meningitis* with 2 deaths (the other 2 were transferred to the City Hospital) and 1 case of *Tubercular Peritonitis*. Of the total 8 deaths from Tuberculosis infection 7 were Coloured children.

A large number of Accidental Poisoning Cases were admitted during the year—17 in all, with 3 deaths. Various poisons had been taken, chief among which was Arsenic, others being Caustic Soda, Paraffin, Benzene and Jeyes' Fluid.

There were 7 cases of *Rheumatic Arthritis* treated. All of these showed some cardiac involvement and most of them had a history of throat trouble previously or at time of admission. An interesting factor was that all the cases treated were Europeans. On the other hand out of 8 cases of *Chorea* admitted only 3 were Europeans.

Fewer cases of *Nutritional Oedema* were admitted than during the previous year—a total of 6 cases being treated and all Coloured children.

Several of the cases of Pneumonia, Gastro-Enteritis, Bronchitis and Empyaema admitted were the result of Whooping Cough complications. Whooping Cough was very prevalent in Cape Town during the Spring and Summer and was of a severe type. Of the Pneumonia cases treated 3 were post Whooping Cough:

of the Gastro-Enteritis cases 4 were post Whooping Cough; of the Empyaema cases 2 were post Whooping Cough; and of the Bronchitis cases 4 were post Whooping Cough.

Eight cases of Acute Nephritis were treated during the year with 1 death and 1 case of Pyelitis which died soon after admission.

Among other cases admitted were: Osteo-myelitis, 1 case; Marasmus, 8 cases; Hodgkin's Disease, 1 case; Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis, 3 cases; Encephalitis, 2 cases; Acute Otitis Media, 6 cases; Purulent Meningitis, 1 case; Pellagra, 1 case; Epilepsy, 1 case; Haemophilia, 1 case; Gaucher's Disease, 1 case; Congenital Malformations, 6 cases; Bronchiectasis, 3 cases; Glandular Fever, 1 case; Chronic Nephritis, 2 cases; Erysipelas, 1 case; Enuresis, 3 cases; Scarlet Fever, 3 cases; Paralytic Ileus, 1 case; Cerebellar Tumour, 1 case; Little's Disease, 1 case; Infective Arthritis, 1 case; Avitaminosis, 1 case; Tapeworm, 2 cases; Cretinism, 1 case; Mongolism, 1 case.

Ten cases were transferred to the City Hospital: 3 Scarlet Fever, 1 Nasal Diphtheria, 3 Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis, 2 Tubercular Meningitis, 1 Pulmonary Tuberculosis.

Others were transferred to Convalescent Homes after discharge from the Wards.

The total number of deaths for the year was 51, which were classified as follows:

SOMERSET HOSPITAL.

DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGICAL MEDICINE, 1935.

This department continues to function solely as an Out-Patient Clinic.

During the year 164 new cases were seen—102 Europeans (62%) and 62 Non-Europeans (38%). The distribution as to sex being 92 males (56%) and 72 females (44%).

Neurological conditions accounted for 72 of these cases (44%), which includes 28 cases of Epilepsy without Psychosis. There were 27 cases (16%) of Mental Deficiency and Behaviour Disorder; 33 cases (20%) of Psychoneuroses and 32 cases (20%) of Psychoses.

The usual practice of Clinical Demonstrations to students was continued and as these demonstrations provide the only opportunity the student has of seeing minor mental disorders and psychoses in their earliest stages they serve a useful purpose.

The department has to acknowledge with grateful thanks the valuable help given by the Secretary of the Cape Province Society for Mental Hygiene who is a trained Psychiatric Social Investigator and who has voluntarily undertaken the environmental investigation of many complicated cases on our behalf.

DEPARTMENT OF UROLOGY, 1935.

The number of admissions for the year was 150. These will be dealt with under their respective headings.

Prostatic Disease:

There were 43 admissions. Of these 29 were senile enlarged prostates, most of them adenomata but a few of doubtful malignancy. Seven cases of carcinoma were admitted. One case, No. 1093, had had a prostatectomy six years ago. Four cases of median bar obstruction. and 3 other cases.

There were 12 deaths, as follows:-

No. 105. A case of enlarged adenomatous prostate, aged 75. Two stage prostatectomy performed. He died about 24 hours after the second stage operation, probably due to collapse following spinal anaesthetic.

No. 2878. A case of enlarged adenomatous prostate, aged 52. treated by suprapubic cystotomy followed by a punch operation. He developed a secondary hemorrhage. He died from hypertensive cardiac failure.

No. 3701. A case of enlarged prostate, aged 72. Admitted with overflow incontinence and a blood urea of 416 mgms %. In spite of a suprapubic cystotomy patient gradually sank into uraemic coma and died.

No. 1058. A case of enlarged prostate with vesical calculus, aged 49. Patient died some days after the stone had been removed

by suprapubic cystotomy. ? Cause of death.

No. 5435. This patient, aged 56, was readmitted with a suprapubic cystotomy performed some months before for an enlarged prostate. He had failed to improve since the operation and had steadily gone down hill lately. *Post mortem* revealed bilateral suppurative pyelonephritis and a large right sided perinephric abscess.

No. 3669. Patient aged 55, admitted in uraemic condition with carcinoma of prostate and incontinence. He died in uraemia.

No. 2297. Patient aged 47, admitted with urinary retention due to an extensive carcinoma of his prostate and a blood urea of 350 mgms.%. Suprapubic cystotomy performed. Patient developed anuria and died in uraemia.

No. 2428. Patient aged 68, admitted in an uraemic condition with retention of urine due to carcinoma of prostate. Catheter

drainage carried out but patient died.

No. 3704. Patient aged 43, admitted with overflow incontinence, the cause of which was never satisfactorily determined. He had a strongly positive W.R., also a median prostate bar which was punched. Post mortem showed bilateral suppurative pyelonephritis and fatty degeneration of the heart.



No. 1873. Patient aged 72, admitted with retention due to prostatitis. Suprapubic cystotomy performed. Patient died. Post mortem showed prostatic and periprostatic abscess. Suppura-

tive nephritis and confluent broncho-pneumonia.

No. 3993. The patient aged 60, was admitted in an emaciated condition with melancholia and acute retention due to an enlarged adenomatous prostate. One stage prostatectomy performed. Patient developed a parotitis which had to be incised. He failed to react, developed bedsores and died from cachexia and septic absorption.

No. 1827. Patient aged 66, admitted as an emergency with prostatic obstruction and died shortly after admission. Post mortem showed prostatic enlargement, bilateral infected hydronephrosis, hypertrophy of the heart and confluent broncho-

pneumonia.

Kidney and Ureter :-

There were 30 admissions. There were 7 cases of renal calculi. In one of these the other kidney had already been removed and the remaining one was badly infected with multiple calculi. She improved considerably after the operation. Another case had an infected hydronephrosis and multiple calculi; a nephrectomy was performed, the other kidney being healthy. There were 6 cases of ureteric calculi, one complicated by renal calculi. There were 4 ureteral strictures, one of these probably due to Bilharzia. There was one case of renal haematuria—localised as coming from the upper pelvis of a double kidney. A heminephrectomy was performed. Microscopic examination showed some interstitial nephritis as the only cause of the haemorrhage.

There were two deaths:

No. 3213. Patient admitted as a case of acute bilateral pyelitis of pregnancy—6 months. She aborted and improved temporarily, but went downhill again and died. Post mortem revealed acute

nephritis.

No. 5432. Patient was a male aged 16, admitted in a condition of extreme cachexia and anaemia with a large mass in his side and pyuria, probably due to pyonephrosis and perinephric abscess. Blood transfusion given and mass incised with free discharge of pus. Patient went downhill and died.

Bladder :-

There were 30 admissions. There was one case of recto-vesical fistula in a young male due to a fall on a spike. He healed com-

pletely by means of an indwelling urethral catheter.

One case of ectopia vesicae was treated by transplantation of his ureters, one at a time. He did very well and had good control of his urine. There were two vesico-vaginal fistulae following child birth. One was treated successfully by a plastic intravesical operation. The other case died, see below.

There were 2 deaths:

No. 1943. This patient, a male aged 46, was treated by open diathermy for an extensive papilloma of his bladder. He ran an irregular fever during his convalescence, but this subsided and he was up and about when he developed a sudden severe attack of dyspnoea and died within 10 minutes. Probably a case of pulmonary embolism.

No. 4096. This patient, a female aged 25, was admitted with vesico-vaginal fistula following a difficult labour. A plastic operation failed. Transplantation of one ureter was done. She developed severe rigors probably due to the lighting up of an old pyelitis. This went on to septicaemia. The patient became worse and more cachectic. A pelvic abscess was drained. She died.

Testis and Epididymis:-

Two cases were admitted and one died.

No. 979. The patient, aged 70, was operated on for bilateral hydrocele. He went into uraemia and died. Post mortem revealed an enlarged prostate with trabeculation of the bladder and bilateral pyonephrosis.

One other case was admitted for testicular abscess, which was

incised. Patient discharged.

Penis and Urethra:

Twenty-nine cases were admitted; 15 of the cases were strictures, most of them complicated by fistulae and various degrees of infection. One incomplete urethral rupture recovered with a tied in catheter. There were 3 cases of spreading infection of the perineum—so called extravasation infection cases. They all had urethral strictures and periurethral abscesses on which was superimposed a severe spreading infection taking the anatomical course of an ordinary extravasation with marked swelling and going on to gangrene. They were treated by multiple incisions and either an indwelling catheter or a suprapubic cystotomy. All did well. There were no deaths in this series.

Sixteen cases were admitted for investigation of their renal tract, without any definite lesion being found.






