TAKE UP LIFE MEMBERSHIP NOW.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE AND NATIONAL INSURANCE.

The Committee of Management of the Society unanimously passed the following resolution at its Meeting at Leeds on 30th/31st May, 1946. "That—

- 1. The Society welcomes the National Health Service and National Insurance scheme as a great advance towards the social betterment of the people.
- 2. It holds the view that the Society will be maintained and that it can continue its work.
- 3. The National Health Service will not be able to provide more than is already provided by the authorities in respect of treatment for tuberculosis for some years to come.
- 4. Benenden Sanatorium is held to be privately owned by the National Association, and reserved for Civil Servants. The Act allows for private patient treatment. The Society will do all it can to provide treatment on the same basis as heretofore.
- 5. There is an equally important economic side to sickness, especially tuberculosis with its long duration. The Society finds in almost every case that pay is reduced either to half rate, to pension rate, or is ceased altogether. Many patients are retired from the Civil Service. The effect on a tubercular subject is tragic. The battle of life then begins. The Society through its Necessitous Cases Fund has done untold good in alleviating the distress caused, and more can be done. Apart from other help to meet requirements for dental and ophthalmic treatment, and clothing, etc., generous financial grants over long periods have brought unparalleled relief to stricken members, as proved by the thanks received. Upward adjustment of these grants to give more in addition to any state money benefit can readily be made.
- 6. For reasons of rendering financial help in all cases of need in addition to treatment benefits, members are urged to maintain their Society at the highest pitch so that these objects can be pursued to the utmost."

MEMBERSHIP.

This year of peace gave an added stimulus to recruitment to the Society. Intensive efforts were made in all Departments. Personal contact became a predominant feature; Heads of Departments, Establishment Officers, Welfare Officers and other officials together with the Staff Sides of Whitley Councils played an outstanding part in putting the aims and objects of the Society before staffs. The gratitude of the Committee of Management is extended to all concerned; to the various organisations which lent support and to Local Secretaries and Committees who continue to work for the Society with great zeal.

Special approach was made to the Treasury for assistance in post-war recruitment. Departments were circularised and as a result, responded generously with facilities for recruitment.

Life membership for T.B. benefit was made a special feature, and the response was gratifying.

Wider publicity was embarked upon involving distribution to Branches of considerable literature. Periodical circularisation of brochures prepared by the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was agreed upon. Aid for research wherever possible, probably by rendering financial help, was visualised.

It is pleasing to note that the waiting period for entry into sanatoria was reduced by the Society in respect of its cases to the barest minimum. The Chief Medical Officer of the Post Office expressed considerable appreciation of this promptitude which is of inestimable value at the present time. Treatment was again required by many non-members, but reluctantly applications could not be entertained by the Society.

A number of members received payment in respect of domiciliary treatment, pending their entry into sanatoria.

Mass radiography was again in operation, and Civil Servants were circularised with a view to examination or re-examination.

The cost of treatment in the year was £22,403 13s.

The charges in sanatoria and other establishments were considerably increased, on an average by about one-third.

The Society continued to meet certain expenses in connection with incidental treatment required by members with T.B. for dental and ophthalmic services, also for clothing where necessary, for funerals, for patients' travel, and for relatives' travel in cases of stress.

Of importance also was the fact that Dr. Bernard Myers, C.M.G., M.D., F.R.C.P., would be established in the Registered Office for his specialist consultant services.

SANATORIA AND SIMILAR ESTABLISHMENTS.

National Sanatorium Association.

Following the Conference, the Officers and Council of the Association became composed entirely of representatives of the Society. The Society became the governing body of the Association and of Benenden Sanatorium.

Benenden Sanatorium.

The Sanatorium was fully restored from bomb damage by April of the year.

The Sanatorium suffered as did all other hospitals and sanatoria from shortage of nursing and domestic staff, and during the year the Cadogan Pavilion was closed. The wages and conditions of the staff were brought up to the highest levels.

A full time Secretary was appointed to undertake the duties of the Hon. Secretaries and the Steward. A T.T. herd was in the process of being got together.

The visits of the thoracic surgeon became a regular feature.

A Ministry of Health dietitian made a complete examination of the feeding arrangements and the food, and rendered a good report.

Under the guidance of the Ministry of Agriculture experts, the farming was intensified.

The Society had complete priority of beds at Benenden, hence the elimination of lengthy waiting periods for Society members. The reservation of 50 beds was maintained.

The Council informed the Ministry of Health that Benenden is a private sanatorium.

St. Barnabas Home, Torquay.

An agreement was reached to reserve eight beds.

Winsley Sanatorium, Bath.

This Sanatorium suffered severely from shortage of staff, closing 50 beds out of 135. The Society maintained its reservation of 5 beds.

Firs Home, Bournemouth.

This Home reopened its closed beds and recommenced taking Society patients.

Convalescent Homes.

Upon the reopening of towns on the South coast, a useful survey was made of convalescent homes for the use of Society patients. The York Lodge Private Convalescent Home, Seaford, expressed willingness to take Society patients again.

NECESSITOUS CASES FUND.

The Conference agreed to the maximum grant being increased from £78 to £104 per annum, and it is significant that during the year £9,889 14s. 3d. was given in financial aid, representing about half the amount spent on treatment. Total granted from the inception is £43,253 4s. 10d.

APPRECIATION.

The impressive work of the Society can be reflected in no better way than in the letters of appreciation and gratitude received from members of the Society unfortunate enough to require treatment.

A message of goodwill on their deliverance from the trials of occupation was sent to the Postmasters of Jersey and Guernsey. Immediate replies of appreciation and gratitude were received.

NEW SCHEMES.

The schemes for cancer benefit for husband and wife, and T.B. benefit for members' children between the ages of 3 and 16 were launched before the end of the year, subscriptions to commence from 1st January, 1946, with a view to benefit commencing 1st January, 1947.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE AND NATIONAL INSURANCE SCHEME.

The Society and the National Sanatorium Association met on 22nd November, 1945, following an approach to the Minister of National Insurance to discuss their position in relation to the above schemes. It was decided to seek a deputation to the Parliamentary Secretary of the Ministry of Health on the basis that the Society supported these schemes, but that the Society's benefits must be bettered before being affected by the schemes, and that any individual was free to provide additionally for himself or herself if desired. The reply asked the Society and Association to await and examine the terms of the proposed legislation. It was not anticipated that the scheme would be in operation until 1948. The Committee of Management and the Council had the position constantly under consideration.

REGISTERED OFFICE.

The Registered Office returned to London from Grove House, Headcorn, Kent, to 63, Catherine Place, London, S.W.1. on 6th June, 1945. The office was fully occupied in September following completion of repairs to war damage.

Steps were taken to extend the use of office machinery, and to modernise the system relating to membership records and to benefit cases.

STAFF.

On returning to London it became necessary to consider the staffing position in view of the expansion of the Society and its work. A sub-committee examined the duties, and the need for additional staff was agreed upon.

At a period of stress certain voluntary assistance was given, and the thanks of the Society are recorded.

A new superannuation scheme for the staff on Civil Service lines was being examined.

ACTUARIAL VALUATION.

As expressed at Conference, the Actuary was consulted, and it was decided to get ready for a valuation covering the last ten years, which would probably take place in 1946.

The Government Actuary's Department received information which had been requested of interest regarding the Society.

CONFERENCE, 1945.

The new rules as completely revised at Conference were approved by the Registrar of Friendly Societies on 27th July, 1945, and were also adopted in Scotland and Northern Ireland. The new rules were circulated to members of delegations at Conference and to members of Branch Committees on request.

The Report of Conference was circulated to all Branches.

The rules were made operative and action was taken on all items of business at Conference where this was necessary.

CONFERENCE, 1947.

Preliminary enquiries were made with the Southport authorities, and notice of the intention to hold the Conference there in 1947 was given.

I have pleasure in submitting to you the Balance Sheet and Statement of Accounts for 1945. Subscriptions to the Society have increased by £5,880 10s, 8d, in comparison with the year 1944, but on the expenditure side an increase of £2,061 13s. 3d, is shown in charges for Maintenance of Patients at Sanatoria, etc. The total cost for treatment of members wives, covering Maintenance at Sanatoria, Travelling and Specialists Consultation expenses, amounts to £718 10s. 6d. The cost in 1944 was £73 15s. 1d. The Society's Credit Balance now exceeds £100,000.
