THE AIMS AND OBJECTS OF THE EUGENICS SOCIETY.

Eugenics aims at improving the inborn
qualities of future generations.

Ethical and Scientific Bases.

The *ethical* basis of eugenics consists in duties not only to our neighbours but also to posterity. These duties include the provision, not only of the best possible environmental conditions, but also the best physical and mental endowment.

The *scientific* basis of eugenics must be one of sound biological knowledge. Racial changes have hitherto occurred without conscious human direction. Eugenics seeks to find the means by which the blind forces of Nature may be controlled by a consciously directed policy based on scientific study of transmissible biological factors.

Among animals and primitive peoples, racial changes occur through natural selection, i.e., by unrestricted reproduction of all types, causing a struggle for existence in which the less capable are eliminated by early death. Modern civilised man revolts against submission to this crude process and usually resorts to the restriction of families. This may involve the preservation and increase of weak types—a racial deterioration which improvements in the environment alone are powerless to check. Rational eugenic selection aims at diminishing the fertility of all persons below the average in valuable heritable qualities and at maintaining a sufficient reproduction of those above the average to ensure that their contribution to the next generation should become progressively larger.

Eugenics: A Study and a Practice.

The term "Eugenics" implies both a scientific study and a social practice. By further study, an attempt should be made to give precision to our knowledge of the part played by heredity in regard to physical and mental superiority, to human defects and diseases and to human inefficiency in any form of society. In particular an attempt should be made to elucidate the respective influences of heredity and environment upon the human type, and to define more clearly such terms as good and bad stock, and superior, average and inferior endowment.

But as well as being a study, eugenics is a social practice. In practice it seeks to realise the aims of (A) *positive* and (B) *negative eugenics* respectively by:

- (A) Promoting the fertility of superior, healthy and useful stocks; and
by
- (B) Restricting through voluntary measures the multiplication of those
who suffer from hereditary infirmities.

An indispensable preliminary to the application of either of these principles is to create throughout the community a "eugenic conscience." This is to be attained not only by the education of the young in the principles of biology, but also by spreading among all an appreciation of the effects of their actions upon future generations. Except in regard to the segregation of lunatics, mental defectives and certain criminals, the Society does not

advocate the compulsory application of the principles of negative eugenics. It seeks to awaken a eugenic or racial conscience which will influence :

- (1) The individual in the choice of a mate and in the decisions as to parenthood, and
- (2) The Community so as to bring to bear on issues of eugenic importance the forces of scientifically informed public opinion.

THE STUDY OF EUGENICS.

The Society encourages the study of all aspects of human heredity and differential fertility. It considers that the following subjects are specially in need of further investigation :

Population Problems.

Further knowledge is needed (*a*) concerning the relative rates of multiplication of the different sections of the population, (*b*) as to whether a definite relation exists between the inherited qualities of different sections of the community and their social and economic status, and (*c*) as to the eugenic or dysgenic tendencies of different types of social structure.

Human Abilities and Disabilities.

The Society favours the study of the inheritance of good health and physique and of special abilities and aptitudes of social value to the community. It is also anxious to promote the organised study of hereditary deficiencies, diseases and defects, with a view of ascertaining their prevalence and distribution and of rendering more accurate our forecasts of their incidence in affected families. The co-operation of the medical profession in this task is essential.

The "Social Problem Group."

This term was employed by the Mental Deficiency (Wood) Committee, 1930, to denote a group of people who are asserted to exhibit "social problem" characteristics such as insanity, mental defect, epilepsy, occupational instability, recidivism, inebriety and social dependency. The Society seeks to determine if such a group can be distinguished and defined, and if any of its characteristics are of a hereditary nature.

Human Evaluation and Registration.

The Society desires to see changes made in the methods of keeping the relevant statistical records so that data may be available for eugenic study. This principle should apply to the registration of births and marriages and to records of medical inspection of school children so as to make possible the detection of changes in the physical condition of the population.

Family Records.

Galton stated that every intelligent person should study his family pedigree. The Society has prepared a schedule to facilitate such study and looks forward to the establishment of facilities for the preservation and study of pedigrees.

Research Into Contraceptive Methods.

The Society favours the promotion of clinical, statistical and laboratory research with a view to ascertaining the reliability, the practicability and the effects on health (both of parents and children) of existing contraceptive

methods; it also encourages research with a view to the discovery of methods sound in these respects.

Family Allowances.

The Society favours the study of the eugenic value or danger of different forms of Family Allowances.

Race Mixture.

In certain circumstances, race mixture is known to be bad. Further knowledge of its biological effects is needed in order to make it possible to frame a practical eugenic policy. Meanwhile, since the process of race mixture cannot be reversed, great caution is advocated.

Immigration.

In view of the possible effects on the national stock of admitting persons of varying quality, the biological aspects of the regulations governing immigration, and the plans for emigration within the Empire should be regarded as a matter of urgent study.

THE PRACTICE OF EUGENICS.

As above stated, this can be divided into negative and positive aspects.

NEGATIVE EUGENICS.

The following measures have, at various times, been suggested as likely to diminish the fertility of sub-average persons: Birth control, sterilization, segregation, legal prohibition of marriage and artificial termination of pregnancy.

Birth Control.

Instruction on methods of birth control, under medical supervision, should be provided by local authorities. Such instruction should stress both its value and danger from a eugenic point of view, and should not be restricted to women suffering from gynaecological illnesses.

Sterilization.

The Society advocates that facilities for voluntary sterilization be provided under appropriate safeguards, for persons suffering from or carrying transmissible defects seriously impairing physical or mental efficiency.

It considers that without introducing compulsion, valuable results can be achieved by awakening throughout the community an enlightened eugenic conscience.

Segregation.

In cases of mental defect and mental disorder, the Society does not regard sterilization as an alternative to segregation but as an accessory or ancillary procedure. The Society concurs with the recommendations of the Wood Committee that facilities should be extended and perfected for segregating and "socialising" mental defectives. Voluntary sterilization would, from the eugenic standpoint, be a necessary adjunct to this policy.

Legal Prohibition of Marriage.

It has been proposed that the marriage of mental defectives should be prohibited by law. So far as this is intended as a eugenic measure it is

ineffective and undesirable, as it does not prevent, and may even incite, propagation by promiscuous unions with their dysgenic possibilities and other evils. Its aims can be realised more effectively and humanely by providing defectives desiring to marry with facilities for obtaining their own sterilization and by encouraging marriage when this safeguard has been adopted.

Termination of Pregnancy.

The Society advocates the provision of legalised facilities for voluntarily terminating pregnancy in cases of persons for whom sterilization is regarded as appropriate, and in cases of incest and rape.

POSITIVE EUGENICS.

The Society holds that married couples of sound stock who deliberately have fewer children than they can adequately bring up, do an injury to the race. It opposes restrictions on marriage which now discriminate against sound stocks.

The following measures are suggested in order to promote the fertility of such people.

Family Allowances.

The Society favours the provision of Family Allowances by the establishment of graded equalisation pools and other systems calculated to have a eugenic effect. It regards as wholly dysgenic the provision of allowances through flat rate payments by the State.

War

The Society considers that modern war is dysgenic—(1) because the persons most likely to be killed in wars are above the physical average; (2) because war and the prospects of war deter from parenthood persons who take into account the well-being of their children.

Taxation.

In order to ease the burden of taxation where the expenses of bringing up children are very heavy in relation to the income, the present system of income tax allowance should be amended, extended and rendered more effective.

Education.

The Society favours for children of superior ability the extensive provision of scholarships sufficient to ease financial burdens, and thereby promote the further reproduction of the parents.

Birth Control.

The Society holds that since the practice of birth control in the last 70 years has acted dysgenically rather than eugenically, birth control should be practised by persons of superior biological endowment only with a view to spacing births.

Health Examinations before Marriage.

The Society favours these, and has prepared a schedule which can be used by medical practitioners.

THE EUGENICS SOCIETY.

The Annual General Meeting was held at the rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, London, W.1, on Tuesday, July 14th, 1936 at 4 p.m.

In the President's absence Mr. B. S. Bramwell occupied the Chair.

MINUTES. The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting, held on Tuesday, May 15th, 1935, and of the Extraordinary General Meetings held on Thursday, March 26th, 1936, and on Wednesday, June 3rd, 1936, being contained in the Annual Report, were taken as read and signed as correct.

ANNUAL REPORT. The Chairman, on behalf of the Council, presented the Annual Report, which was unanimously adopted. The General Secretary replied to certain questions arising from the Report.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS AND BALANCE SHEET. The Hon. Treasurer presented the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ending December 31st, 1935. The statement was unanimously adopted.

ELECTION OF AUDITORS FOR THE YEAR 1936/37. It was proposed by Mr. Bramwell and seconded by Mr. Gun that the auditors of the Society, Messrs. West and Drake be re-elected. This was carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT

In this Report the accounts relate to the period December 31st, 1935, to December 31st, 1936. The rest of the Report covers the period from March 31st, 1936, to March 31st, 1937.

The revised statement of the Society's aims and objects is divided into two main headings: the study of eugenics and the practice of eugenics. In the past year the Society's financial resources and activities have been divided between the two functions of research and propaganda covered by these headings.

RESEARCH.

The following are the main items of research which have been subsidised by the Society:—

Intelligence and Fertility.

The First Darwin Research Studentship (value £250 p.a.) was awarded in 1935 to Dr. R. B. Cattell, M.A. D.Sc., Ph.D., Director of the School Psychological Clinic at Leicester. It was renewed in 1936 for a further year. Dr. Cattell is investigating by tests the intelligence of a typical urban population, and a typical rural population of school children with a view to determining the average size of the family at each level of intelligence. He is also applying intelligence tests to adults and children in the same families with the object of determining the correlation and regression rates existing between the intelligence of the parents and the offspring. Dr. Cattell further hopes to determine the effect of occupation upon effective fertility and to make an analysis of the psychological factors that influence the birth-rate in large and small families. The Studentship was awarded by the Council on the recommendation of the following Committee:—

Race Mixture.

This subject is of biological importance in many parts of the British Empire, and in one European country has become a political issue. The second Darwin Research Studentship of the same value as the first was awarded, on the recommendation of the Executive Committee, to Mr. J. C. Trevor in 1936. The latter is now working in the Galton Laboratory under the direction of Professor Fisher, Professor Ruggles Gates and Dr. Morant, and during the first year will devote himself to preparing an impartial report of the literature on the biological effects of race-crossing.

Annals of Eugenics.

This journal, which is of a technical character, is issued jointly by the Galton Laboratory for National Eugenics and the Eugenics Society. It is

edited by Professor R. A. Fisher, F.R.S., who is assisted by an Editorial Committee consisting of Professor Ruggles Gates, Professor J. B. S. Haldane, Miss Mary N. Karn, Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts and Lord Horder. The subscription price per volume is 50/-. The Society makes a grant of £300 a year to the Annals of Eugenics.

Population Problems.

In the past year an increasing interest has been awakened in the anticipated decline of the population of the United Kingdom. Though attention has been mainly focussed on considerations of quantity, those of quality, which are the concern of the Society, have by no means been ignored.

The Council has taken the initiative in calling together a Population Investigation Committee, of which the Chairman is Professor A. M. Carr-Saunders (a Vice-President of the Society) and the Secretary is Dr. C. P. Blacker. Lord Horder, Mr. Julian Huxley and Mrs. Eva Hubback also serve. The Committee, which consists of eighteen members, has appointed Mr. D. V. Glass as Research Secretary and a statement of its aims and needs entitled "The Future of our Population?" has been written by Dr. Blacker and Mr. Glass. The Committee has made contact with the Registrar-General and will co-operate with his Department in the researches it has planned.

The Population Investigation Committee, though called together by the Society, is not a sub-committee of the Council, nor is it subordinate to the Society. It is an autonomous joint committee. The Council has renewed its grant of £500 to the Population Investigation Committee which hopes soon to be self-supporting.

Population Problems Abroad.

The Positive Eugenics Committee, appointed by the Council in 1934, was asked to draw up a statement of a factual character describing the measures which had been adopted in other countries to promote fertility. The Positive Eugenics Committee was given a grant of £246 by the Council and spent this money in subsidising the enquiries of which an account was embodied by Mr. D. V. Glass in his Book, "The Struggle for Population" (Oxford University Press). This book attracted widespread attention; the chapters describing population changes in Germany and Italy and enumerating the measures taken in those countries to promote fertility were widely commented upon in the Press. The Society offered copies of this book to those members of the Houses of Lords and Commons who cared to apply for them. In response to this offer, applications were received from 44 members of the House of Lords and 73 members of the House of Commons. The first edition is sold out and Mr. Glass has been requested to prepare a longer and more detailed second edition which, among other new items, will deal with Scandinavian countries.

Social Problem Group.

A book edited by the General Secretary entitled "A Social Problem Group?" was published in February, 1937, by the Oxford University Press. The object of the book can be described as follows:—

In 1929, the report of the Mental Deficiency Committee (Wood Committee) was published. The Wood Committee had been asked to submit an estimate of how many mental defectives existed in England and Wales, and to report on how best they could be disposed of. The Committee described, in its report, the finding that a large proportion of primary ailments occurred in the Social Problem Group. The question was thus raised: To what extent would persons with special knowledge of the *other* sub-groups of the Social Problem Group, mentioned by the Wood Committee, be disposed to make a similar generalisation? Do the relatives, for instance, of epileptics, inebriates, prostitutes or recidivists occur more frequently in the Social Problem Group than do the relatives of average persons? To this question

the book seeks to provide an answer; it is arranged as a symposium by authorities with special knowledge of the various sub-groups of the Social Problem Group. The following are the contributors:—

Mr. Caradog Jones has provided a foreword and a valuable postscript; and an introduction has been written by the General Secretary. It is noteworthy that all the writers have difficulty in giving a definite answer to the question put to them, and all stress the need for further research.

Contraceptive Methods.

The aim of negative eugenics is to restrict the fertility of persons of subnormal biological endowment. Such persons often have large and unwanted families because they cannot make effective use of contraceptives at present available. Their fertility might be appreciably reduced if a simple, harmless, reliable and cheap contraceptive method were discovered.

The Council has renewed its grant of £560 to the Birth Control Investigation Committee, now incorporated with the National Birth Control Association. The Investigation Committee, for the last nine years, has promoted researches aiming at the discovery of simpler contraceptive methods. This sum has been used to support two separate investigations.

(a) The first, conducted by Dr. J. R. Baker, M.A., Ph.D., and Dr. H. M. Carleton, M.A., Ph.D. (working respectively in the Departments of Pathology and Physiology, Oxford University), aims at discovering a spermicidal preparation which, it is hoped, may be used in the absence of the occlusive devices, the employment of which present difficulty to stupid and feckless people. Details of the work will be found in five papers by Dr. Baker in the *Journal of Hygiene*¹ and in his book "The Chemical Control of Conception" (Chapman & Hall, 1935). Dr. Carleton has published papers in the *Journal of Obstetrics and Gynaecology*². The work of these two investigators is proceeding actively.

(b) The second enquiry, conducted by Dr. S. Zuckerman, D.Sc., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. (Department of Anatomy, Oxford University), aims at elucidating the factors underlying periodic fertility in Primates. The existence of a so-called "safe period" depends upon this periodic fertility. The utilisation of the "safe period" is the only method of Birth Control permissible to strict Roman Catholics, for whom chemical and mechanical methods of contraception as well as voluntary sterilization are explicitly forbidden. The high fertility of certain Irish-Catholic families is thought by many to constitute a eugenic problem in certain parts of England and Scotland such as the Merseyside and the Clydeside. In collaboration with Dr. A. S. Parkes, F.R.S., Dr. Zuckerman is also engaged in investigating the temporary serological sterilization of Primates by a method which has been found effective in rabbits and goats, namely, their immunisation against the ovary- and testis-stimulating hormones of the pituitary.

PROPAGANDA.

The Society's propaganda is mainly conducted through its own department, of which Miss Pocock, S.R.N., is the Secretary; grants are also made to other organisations whose aims are similar to those of the Society.

Propaganda Department.

The activities of this department are controlled by a Propaganda Committee consisting of: Dr. R. Langdon-Down (Chairman), Mr. B. S. Bramwell, Miss E. Corry, the Hon. Mrs. Grant Duff, and Mrs. E. E. Potton. The department has been responsible for giving lectures and exhibitions and for producing a film and posters. It has also organised the Eugenic Alliance, for which some pamphlets have been written. These items will be dealt with serially.

LECTURES.

One hundred and fourteen lectures were given during the year, with a total attendance of about 5,700 people, making an average of about 50 persons per lecture. The audiences were for the most part drawn from the less educated classes, and they usually showed an intelligent appreciation of the issues involved. Twenty-six lectures on voluntary sterilization were given in co-operation with the Joint Committee on Voluntary Sterilization; six lectures dealt with population problems, and the remainder were on heredity.

These exhibitions varied in usefulness. Taken as a whole they enabled the Society to make valuable contacts with delegates of Local Authorities and Medical Officers of Health. The estimated attendance at all these exhibitions was one hundred thousand. From comments and conversations with persons attending these exhibitions, there would appear to be a widening interest in eugenics and a growing realisation that national health must be based on sound heredity. The pedigree of Sir Victor Horsley was added to the Exhibit, for the preparation of which the Society is indebted to Lady Horsley.

FILM.

A film entitled "Heredity in Man" has been produced by the Society in co-operation with Gaumont-British Instructional Films, Ltd., under the direction of Mr. Julian Huxley. The film is in two parts. The first and longest part illustrates Mendelian principles and mechanisms in animals; the second part deals with heredity in man. It was with the planning of the second part that the Society has been concerned. The arguments contained in both parts of the film had to be presented in a pictorially consecutive manner within the space of fifteen minutes, a task calling for delicate adjustment. It is hoped to show the film at a members' meeting in the autumn. The cost to the Society has been £250.

POSTERS.

Five posters consisting of three pictures and two captions have been prepared for use on Empire Marketing Board Hoardings. These are now controlled by Local Authorities and used for health propaganda.

Through the Central Council for Health Education three hundred sets of posters were issued to Local Authorities and displayed in 1936. A similar number will be issued in 1937.

EUGENIC ALLIANCE.

The Eugenic Alliance has been formed for the benefit of persons who cannot afford a subscription of 10s. 0d. a year. The annual subscription is 2s. 6d., and affiliation is possible for groups, whose Secretaries receive a quarterly news sheet and various pamphlets. The Alliance has now been in existence for fourteen months and the members number one hundred and fourteen. The increase, though slow, is continuous, and it is hoped to develop this branch of the Society's work during 1937.

Voluntary Sterilization.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON VOLUNTARY STERILIZATION.

From the year 1930 the Society has urged that voluntary sterilization be legalised for persons likely to transmit hereditary defects to subsequent generations. The Society's views on how this should be done accorded closely with the recommendations of the Departmental Committee on Sterilization (Brook Committee) published in 1934. From the standpoint of the Society, the chief effect of the Committee's Report was that it persuaded many organisations, which previously had refused to commit themselves, to support the legalising of voluntary sterilization for the persons specified in the Brook Report and subject to the safeguards therein proposed.

In the spring of 1934 was formed the Joint Committee on Voluntary Sterilization. This body consists of representatives of the Central Association for Mental Welfare, the Mental Hospitals' Association, the National Council of Mental Hygiene, the Royal College of Physicians and the Eugenics Society. Lord Horder is President of the Committee, Sir Francis Acland, M.P., is its Vice-Chairman, and Mr. J. V. Quilliam its Secretary. In the last three years an impressive list of supporting resolutions from political, professional and other organisations has been secured.

The Society accommodates the Joint Committee free of charge in its house, and its grants have constituted the chief income of the Joint Committee. For the year 1937 a grant of £500 has been made.

NATIONAL WORKERS' COMMITTEE FOR THE LEGALISING OF VOLUNTARY STERILIZATION.

Hitherto the proposal that voluntary sterilization should be legalised has been regarded with suspicion by the Labour Party, on the grounds that the voluntary principle might prove difficult to safeguard and the measure used against the working classes. This hostile attitude towards sterilization is in marked contrast to the Party's favourable attitude towards birth control. In 1935 the above Committee was formed in order to impress upon the members of the Labour Party the advantages which they might derive from a system of voluntary sterilization, and to secure their support for the recommendations of the Brook Committee. The National Workers' Committee was instrumental in securing, by a large majority, the support of the National Conference of Labour Women, held in Swansea on May 21st, 1936—a resolution of very great significance and importance.

The National Workers' Committee (Honorary Secretary: Dr. Caroline Maule, 18, Saneroff Street, London, S.E.11) is wholly independent of the Joint Committee and of the Eugenics Society, and is entirely composed of members of the Labour Party. The Council of the Eugenics Society has renewed its grant of £50 to the Workers' Committee.

Birth Control.

The Society has voted grants to the National Birth Control Association, the Society for the Provision of Birth Control Clinics, and the Birth Control International Information Centre.

NATIONAL BIRTH CONTROL ASSOCIATION.

The grant of £560 made towards the researches of the Birth Control Investigation Committee (which is incorporated with the National Birth

Control Association) has already been described. In addition to this, the Council has made a further grant of £100 to the General Fund of the National Birth Control Association.

The chief object of this organisation is to induce Local Authorities to take action under Memorandum 153 M.C.W., and Circulars 1,208 and 1,408 M.C.W., of the Ministry of Health; and to provide facilities for giving advice on birth control. In this task the National Birth Control Association has been very successful. The action taken by local authorities varies in different areas and the following is a summary :—

53	Local Authorities	have established clinics where birth control advice is given, usually in connection with maternity and child welfare centres.
25	„ „	have set up gynæcological clinics at which birth control advice is given.
79	„ „	refer cases to voluntary or municipal clinics or private doctors either by paying fees and/or expenses, or by making block grants.
16	„ „	have either lent or hired premises of a maternity or child welfare centre to a local branch of the National Birth Control Association or similar body for use as a voluntary birth control clinic.
36	„ „	have authorised their Medical Officers to give advice, but have organised no special clinics.
11	„ „	have decided to give advice and are either now considering schemes or have not yet taken steps to put the decision into effect.

In the above list the names of certain local authorities are sometimes duplicated. Allowing for this, it can be stated that by March 31st, 1937, 173 local authorities, out of a total of 423, or 40 per cent., have taken some action in this matter; and another 47 are now contemplating doing so. The number is likely to increase.

In addition to its work with Local Authorities, the Association has increased the number of its branches from 29 to 48. These include the clinics previously established by the Society for the Provision of Birth Control Clinics referred to below. Nearly all these branches have organised voluntary clinics, which are not subject to the restriction that advice may be given solely on medical grounds imposed on municipal clinics.

The centres above described clearly provide a rich and unexplored field for eugenic propaganda. The Council is now considering the establishment of closer relations with the National Birth Control Association with a view to making use of the possibilities thus opened. The President of the National Birth Control Association is Lord Horder, and its Secretary is Mrs. M. Pyke, 26, Eccleston Street, London, S.W.1.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROVISION OF BIRTH CONTROL CLINICS.

The object of this Society, which was founded in 1921, is :—

“in the interests of social welfare, and for the relief of poverty, to establish and support clinics in which instruction will be given to men and women in poor circumstances by registered medical practitioners (preferably women) assisted where necessary by qualified nurses.”

The Clinics affiliated to the Society are subject to no restrictions as to the persons to whom advice is given. The Society receives no grant from public sources and depends entirely on subscriptions and donations. It plays an important part in organising the training of medical practitioners and

students in contraceptive technique, a subject sometimes ignored in the curricula of teaching hospitals. Of the courses and lectures organised by the Society for the Provision of Birth Control Clinics, full advantage is taken by the National Birth Control Association, referred to under the previous heading.

Forty-eight clinics affiliated to the Society for the Provision of Birth Control Clinics have been established to date in England, Scotland and Wales. The Chairman of the Society is Lord Gerald Wellesley, and its Secretary is Mrs. Evelyn Fuller, 153a, East Street, Walworth Road, S.E.17. The Eugenics Society has renewed its grant of £50 to the Society for the Provision of Birth Control Clinics. This sum is spent in making a donation of £10 towards the formation of up to five *new* clinics.

BIRTH CONTROL INTERNATIONAL INFORMATION CENTRE.

This organisation has as its objects:—

- (1) To spread the knowledge of birth control to every part of the world;
- (2) To distribute literature and answer any enquiries relating to birth control;
- (3) To assist visitors to Britain to see clinics and to obtain information from the best sources; and
- (4) To acquire and impart the results of the latest research work in the technique of contraception.

The Centre is especially interested in securing the introduction of birth control into the developing Public Health Services of the territories of the British Empire, though it is also in touch with birth control organisations in Europe, the U.S.A., and China. Lord Horder is its President, and its Secretary is Miss Eleanor Hawarden, Parliament Mansions, Orchard Street, S.W.1. The Council has renewed its grant of £50 to the Centre.

Family Allowances.

In October, 1936, the Council decided to postpone for a year consideration of its propaganda on behalf of Family Allowances. This decision was reached after the contents of Mr. Glass's book "The Struggle for Population," above referred to, had been considered. (The book was submitted to the Council by the Positive Eugenics Committee, appointed in 1934, as its Report.) The Council decided to postpone considering the question of Family Allowances in order to allow time to the Population Investigation Committee to collect and present further information. The attitude of the general public towards Family Allowances is likely to become more favourable in the measure that the implications of the present low net reproduction rate for this country are appreciated.

FINANCE.

The Society's finances are in the hands of a Finance Committee consisting of Mr. C. F. Chance, Treasurer of the Society, Chairman; Mr. B. S. Bramwell; Sir Mark Grant-Sturgis and Mr. W. T. J. Gun.

The usual Statement of Income and Expenditure, Balance Sheet and List of Investments, are included at the end of this Report, with the corresponding figures for the previous year.

It will be observed that the excess of expenditure over income has slightly exceeded £2,000.

A further £500 has been received on account of the Twitchen Bequest.

In the course of the year the Society has benefited from two legacies. Dr. H. B. Billups left the Society £100; and Mr. Lee Jackson Jones an annuity of £50, which, after the realisation of his foreign estates, will be replaced by a lump sum of £1,000.

The attention of Members is drawn to an innovation which has been introduced into the Review this year—the Treasurer's Page. In successive numbers it will be here explained that though the Society, by comparison with other voluntary Societies, is rich, the income of which it can dispose is totally inadequate to support the many tasks which lie before it. Their consciences lulled by our reputed wealth, members have allowed our donation list to dwindle to very insignificant proportions. The Treasurer hopes that readers of the Review will not skip his page and that they will respond to his appeal by obtaining for the Society new Fellows and Members, by making donations to the Society, by increasing the amount of their annual subscriptions, and by remembering the Society in their wills.

COUNCIL AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Council was elected, additional members were co-opted, and the Executive Committee was appointed in accordance with the procedure laid down in the new Memorandum and Articles and supplementary regulations approved last year.

The names of members of the Council, Executive Committee and Consultative Council are given on the inside of the first page of the cover and on p. 1. Three meetings of the Council have been held, on July 20th, 1936, November 24th, 1936, and March 23rd, 1937, and there have been six meetings of the Executive Committee.

GALTON DINNER AND LECTURE.

The Galton Dinner took place at the Waldorf Hotel on Tuesday, February 16th, 1937. The Galton Lecture was delivered by Mr. J. Maynard Keynes, his subject being "Some Economic Consequences of a Declining Population." There were present at the dinner 224 persons, which constitutes a record. The chair was taken by the President. A vote of thanks to Mr. Keynes was moved by Sir Walter Layton, and seconded by Mr. H. D. Henderson. The guests of the Society were:—

The Society again thanks Miss E. Corry for her work in connection with the various departments of the Library.

REVIEW.

The Review has again been edited by Dr. Maurice Newfield, under the direction of an Editorial Committee, consisting of Dr. R. Austin-Freeman (Chairman), Mr. B. S. Bramwell, Miss E. Corry, Dr. Kenneth Aikman and the General Secretary. It would be a great help to the Editor if Fellows and Members qualified and willing to review technical works and periodicals, particularly those dealing with genetics, bio-statistics, population, psychology, and sociology, would communicate with him, stating their specialities and also whether they would undertake to review works in foreign languages.
