ELECTION OF AUDITORS FOR THE YEAR 1949-1950

EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

An Extraordinary General Meeting was held at 2.30 p.m. on Tuesday, 21st March, 1950, in the Library at 69, Eccleston Square. There were present ten Fellows. Mr. G. Aird Whyte, Chairman of Council, was in the Chair.

It was reported that this meeting had been called, on the advice of Counsel, to amend the Society's Memorandum of Association in such a way as to show beyond doubt that the Society is established for charitable purposes only and is therefore exempt from payment of income tax. Doubt had arisen as to the position in this repect of organisations such as the Society following the recent Judgment of the Court of Appeal in Oxford Group v. The Inland Revenue Commissioners.

The following Special Resolution was then put to the Meeting from the Chair :-

That the Memorandum of Association of the Society be altered in the manner following, that is to say, that after the words "Conducive to the attainment of the above objects" in sub-clause 13 of Clause 3 thereof the following words shall be inserted:—

"Provided nevertheless that sub-clauses (5) to (13) (inclusive) of this clause shall be deemed to be ancillary only to the principal objects of the Society and that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be deemed to authorise the application of any of the property of the Society otherwise than for charitable objects."

The Chairman proposed and Professor Grundy seconded the adoption of the Resolution. The adoption was carried unanimously.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1949-1950

The Council has suffered a loss in the death of Mrs. Eva Hubback, an active and valued member since 1932. Mrs. Hubback generously left to the Society a legacy of £5.

Consultative Council The following new member was elected: Professor Edward Hindle, F.R.S. Losses have been suffered in the deaths of Sir Laurence Brock, C.B., and Professor J. A. Ryle, M.D., F.R.C.P.

Obituary appreciations appeared in the July, 1949, and April, 1950, issues of the Review.

Galton Lecture The Galton Lecture was delivered on Friday, 17th February, 1950, by Dr. A. S. Parkes, M.A., Ph.D., Sc.D., F.R.S., on the following subject: "The Primrose Path—Some Aspects of the Population Problem." The meeting was held at Manson House, Portland Place, W.1, and was preceded by tea. The chair was taken by the President. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Cecil Binney and carried unanimously. Some 85 people were present.

Members' Meetings The following Meetings, with the exception of that of 25th October, 1949, were held in the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, by kind permission of the President and Council of the Royal Society:—

24th May, 1949. Professor H. J. Fleure on "Some Biological Considerations in Social Evolution." The President was in the Chair.

25th October, 1949. Professor Sir Godfrey Thomson on "Intelligence and Fertility: an Investigation of Scottish Children." (Held at Manson House, Portland Place.) The President was in the Chair.

15th November, 1949. Mr. David Jones on "Family Service Units for Problem Families." Dr. C. P. Blacker was in the Chair.

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6th December, 1949. Dr. L. F. Richardson on "War and Eugenics: 1. Loss of Life caused by Fatal Quarrels; 2. International Marriage as a Pacifying Influence." Mr. G. Aird Whyte was in the Chair.

24th January, 1950. Dr. C. A. B. Smith on "Fitness and Survival." Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts was in the Chair.

21st March, 1950. Mrs. Barbara Bosanquet on "The Quality of the Rural Population." The President was in the Chair.

Eugenics Review A grievous loss has been sustained in the death, on Saturday, 13th August, 1949, of Dr. Maurice Newfield, Editor since 1933. A symposium of appreciations of his services to eugenics and to the Society was published in the October, 1949, issue of the Eugenics Review and has been separately produced. The Council hereby records its deep appreciation of these services. The January and April (1950) issues of the Review have been jointly edited by Miss K, Lane and by Dr. C, P. Blacker.

Royal Commission on Population The Report of above Commission was published on 21st June, 1949. Four articles on the Report appeared in the October, 1949, issue of the Eugenics Review. A general appreciation of the Report was given by Sir Charles Arden-Close; a comparison of the Report of the Royal Commission with that of P.E.P. (Population Policy in Great Britain published in 1948) was made by Mr. Richard Rumbold; and Dr. Blacker wrote two articles describing respectively the bearings of the Report of the Society's aims and the reception of the Report by the Press. The first volume of Papers of the Royal Commission, entitled Family Limitation and its Influence on Human Fertility in the last Fifty Years, written by Dr. E. Lewis-Faning, was published in January, 1950, and will be discussed in the April, 1950, issue of the Eugenics Review.

Problem Families Committee The Committee's aims and activities have been set forth in a memorandum (P.F.C.10) obtainable from the Society's office.

Investigations of problem families in Bristol, Luton, Rotherham and the West Riding have been completed, and that in London (Kensington) will be completed shortly. A full report on the investigation in Bristol has been written by Dr. R. C. Wofinden and will be published as one of the Society's Occasional Papers. It is hoped to produce a report of the five inquiries in the course of the coming year.

Publication of a new edition of Galton's "Hereditary Genius" An agreement has been signed between the Society, Messrs. Watts & Co., and University College, according to which Messrs. Watts & Co. would publish 2,000 copies priced at about 10/6 each. University College waived its right to a royalty and the Society has made a grant of £100 to Messrs. Watts & Co. towards the costs of publication.

Occasional Papers The following has been published in the year under review: --

Population Trends and the World's Biological Resources, by G. C. L. Bertram, M.A., Ph.D.

Representation of the Society on other Organisations. The Council is represented by Dr. C. P. Blacker on the British Committee of the International Union of Family Organisations; by Mr. J. C. Trevor on the Joint Committee for Anthropological Research and Teaching; by Dr. A. S. Parkes on the Biological Council; by Mr. Cyril Bibby on the Annual Conference of Bodies in Association with the Central Council for Health Education; and by Mrs. Grant Duff on the following organisations:—The National Council of Women, the National Association for Maternity and Child Welfare, the British Social Hygiene Council and the National Baby Welfare Council. Dr. C. P. Blacker has continued to be Honorary Secretary of the Population Investigation Committee.

Representation at Conferences Dr. C. P. Blacker represented the Society at a conference convened by the International Union of Family Organisations held from the 19th-24th September, 1949, in Rome, He gave a paper on the Report of the Royal Commission on Population.

Society's Premises The Society continued to make its second floor available, rent-free, to the Family Planning Association until 28th October, 1949, when the Association removed to larger premises in Sloane Street. Of the three rooms thus left vacant, one has been let, rent-free, to the International Committee on Planned Parenthood whose Secretary, Mrs. Houghton, moved in on 1st November, 1949.

Revision of the Society's Regulations (Accompanying the Articles of Association) At its meeting on 6th December, 1949, the Council, availing itself of powers conferred upon it in Articles 33 and 34, unanimously approved certain alterations in the Regulations dated 26th May, 1936. The new version of the Regulations is given at the end of this Report. The changes are designed to ensure that Fellows present at the Annual General Meeting may exercise their full right to vote for or against persons proposed for election to the Council either by the Council as a body or by Fellows acting in a private capacity.

FINANCE Members' Subscriptions and Covenants The appeal to Members of the Society to increase their subscriptions to the new rate of £1 1s. 0d., made by the Treasurer and Secretary in June, 1949, met with a favourable response. Eighty-two Members agreed to pay the higher rate and forty also signed Covenants. The benefit to the Society from Covenants, including that of Fellows, amounted in 1949 to £59 17s. 6d.—and this without any increase in cost to the Covenanters. It is hoped that more Fellows and Members will covenant as time goes on.

Legacies As mentioned elsewhere Mrs. Eva Hubback left the Society a legacy of £5. In addition

our late Chairman, Mr. B. S. Bramwell, whose death was recorded in our last Annual Report, left us a legacy of £100. This latter sum was not received until January, 1950, and consequently does not figure in the present accounts.

Accounts for 1949 A Statement of Income and Expenditure during 1949, together with the Balance Sheet at 31st December, 1949, will be found at the end of this Report; figures for the previous year are shown for comparison. A list of the Society's investments at the same date is set out on page 8.

During 1949 Ordinary Expenditure exceeded Income by $\pounds 23$ 6s, 6d.

In addition the Society paid out £593 18s, 0d, in respect of various grants. After allocating £200 to the Pension Reserve Fund and taking into account realised capital profits of £575, the Balance on the General Fund fell by £242 to £73,148.

The Society is committed to the making of further grants involving about £290. Details of outstanding grants are set out in a Note on the Liabilities side of the Balance Sheet. Grants disbursed during the year are described in the Income and Expenditure Account.

Library During the past year 132 books have been added to the Library by gift or purchase, including

38 books presented by Mr. N. Teulon Porter; 271 books have been borrowed and 26 have been secured for Fellows and Members from the National Central Library.

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THE EUGENICS SOCIETY

26th May, 1936 amended January, 1950

REGULATIONS made by the Council under the Provisions of Articles 33 and 34 of the Society's Articles of Association for (a) the election of the Honorary Officers and (b) as to the procedure to be adopted in connection with the election of the members of the Council and Committees subsequent to this year (1936)

(a) The Election of the Honorary Officers

Under Article 25 the Honorary Officers of the Society (who under Article 26 shall all be appointed by the Council from among the Fellows of the Society) shall consist of the President (who under Article 27 shall retire at the Annual General Meeting in the third year after his appointment or re-appointment and shall be eligible for re-appointment for a further period of three years but shall not hold office for more than six years in succession) and at least one and not more than six Vice-Presidents (one-third of whom shall retire at each Annual General Meeting under Article 28 and shall not be eligible for re-appointment as Vice-Presidents for one year thereafter) a Treasurer, a Librarian (who, under Article 26 retire annually) and such other officers as the Council may from time to time specify.

Such appointments of Honorary Officers shall be made by the Council at their first meeting after 1st March in each year to take effect as from the close of the Annual General Meeting of the Society next following without prejudice to the power of the Council at any time to fill any casual vacancy under Article 40.

(b) As to the procedure to be adopted in connection with the election of the Members of the Council

Under Article 29 the Council shall consist of:—the Honorary Officers for the time being of the Society and of not less than twelve nor more than eighteen other Fellows of the Society elected by show of hands at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in each year (one-third of whom under Article 30 shall retire each year and be ineligible for re-election for twelve months) and under Article 32 of such additional Members of the Council being Fellows of the Society up to but not exceeding 9 persons elected by the Council, who shall retire each year and shall be eligible for re-election.

Nomination

- (1) An announcement shall each year be inserted in the January issue of "The Eugenics Review" that Fellows of the Society desirous of proposing any Fellow as a member of the Council may do so by completing a proposal form to be obtained from the Society's Office which proposal form must be completed and lodged at the Society's Office on or before the 1st March next following.
- (2) A proposal form shall be in the form hereto annexed,
- (3) Each Fellow is entitled each year to propose not more than two Fellows for election to the Council and to second two others, but no Fellow shall be proposed until he has consented to act, if elected.

- (4) Each Candidate for election must be proposed and seconded respectively by a Fellow of the Society and the proposal form must be signed by such proposer and seconder.
- (5) All proposal forms properly completed, signed and lodged as aforesaid will be submitted to the Council at its first meeting after the 1st March following the lodgment of the same as aforesaid and the Council at this meeting shall have power to propose for election to the Council as many further Fellows as it thinks fit.
- (6) If the candidates proposed as aforesaid are less in number than the vacancies to be filled, they shall nevertheless come up for election at the following Annual General Meeting, and if, by reason of the non-election of any such Candidates the number of Fellows elected to the Council shall fall below 12, then the Council shall elect sufficient Fellows under Rule 32 to bring the number up to 12.
- (7) If the candidates proposed by the Fellows and Council as aforesaid are more in number than the vacancies any of the candidates in excess of the number to be elected may withdraw or may be withdrawn by their proposers or seconders with the consent of the Council but if all the candidates in excess of the number to be elected are not so withdrawn an election shall be conducted by voting papers as hereinafter provided.
- (8) Elections by voting papers shall be governed by the following rules:
 - (i) A list of all such Fellows proposed for election with the names of the proposer and seconder shall be circulated by the secretary in the form of a voting paper to all Fellows of the Society on or before the 7th April following the receipt of the proposal forms.
 - (ii) The voting paper shall be in such form as the Council shall direct and shall contain the following particulars:—
 - (a) The names and addresses of the candidates proposed and the names and addresses of their respective proposers and seconders.
 - (b) The number and nature of the vacancy or vacancies to be filled up.
 - (c) The day on or previous to which the voting paper must be returned.
 - (d) A Notice that a cross must be placed in ink against the names of the candidates for whom the member intends to vote and that if the voting paper be returned unsigned or incomplete or after the prescribed date or with more names voted for than there are vacancies to fill up it will be void.
 - (e) The printed name and address of the Secretary for the return of the voting paper.
 - (iii) The voting papers duly sealed or otherwise fastened up in an envelope marked "Election" shall be delivered to the Secretary on or before the 21st April and the Secretary shall place them unopened in a box and so deliver them to the two scrutineers appointed by the Council by whom alone they shall be opened and examined. As soon as the voting papers have been examined and the result of the election ascertained the voting papers shall be closed up under the seals of the scrutineers and shall be retained by them for one month after the election when they shall be destroyed by the scrutineers.
 - (iv) The Report of the scrutineers shall be signed by them and shall contain the following particulars:-
 - (a) The Total number of voting papers received.
 - (b) The number (if any) rejected and the grounds of rejection.
 - (c) The names of those who are duly elected.

- (v) The report shall be read to the Annual General Meeting of the Society by one of the scrutineers and shall be conclusive as to the fact of election notwithstanding any irregularity or informality.
- (9) Additional members of the Council to be appointed by the Council under Article 32 shall be appointed by the Council at the meeting following the annual General Meeting without prejudice to the power of the Council to fill any casual vacancy under the provisions of Article 40.

Meetings of Council

The Council shall meet once a year as soon after 1st March as the Society's Balance Sheet and Accounts are ready for examination and in reasonable time to make the required arrangements for the Annual General Meeting. It shall also meet at such other times as it may deem necessary.

Committees

The Council may appoint from amongst its members such Committees as it considers necessary to administer the Society's affairs under its directions.
