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

### Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting was held at 4.30 p.m. on Wednesday, 24th May, 1961, at the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, Piccadilly, W.1. Chairman: Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts. Fifteen Fellows and three Members were present.

The Chairman presented to the meeting an apology for absence from the President, Sir Julian Huxley, who, being unable to be present at the meeting, had appointed him, Dr. Roberts, to take the Chair in his stead.

### ANNUAL REPORT

The General Secretary presented the Annual Report and briefly outlined its contents. He referred, in particular, to the revised Articles of Association, which would be submitted to an Extraordinary General Meeting later in the day; to the proposed public opinion survey on eugenics; to the Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation Limited and to the first Darwin Lecture in Human Biology which had been held in November 1960.

The adoption of the Report was then proposed by Dr. Kenneth Hutton, seconded by Dr. Cedric Carter and carried unanimously.

### STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS AND BALANCE SHEET

These were presented by the Honorary Treasurer.

After giving a short statement on the Society's financial position, he then proposed the adoption of the Accounts and Balance Sheet which was carried unanimously.

In announcing these appointments the Chairman drew the attention of the meeting to the fact that the changes in appointments and in the names submitted for election were this year more extensive than usual. He explained that this was caused by the revision of the Articles of

Association which, if approved, would limit to nine years consecutive service on the Council in any capacity. In making their appointments and recommendations, therefore, the Council had agreed to observe the spirit of the new Articles.

The Chairman referred then to those members of the Council who, after long and devoted service to the Society, were now retiring. First among these was Dr. C. P. Blacker, to whom the Society was immensely indebted for all his labours over so many years, both during his twenty-one years as General Secretary and then during his term of office as Honorary Secretary. Dr. Blacker had been awarded, in 1957, the Galton medal which was the highest distinction the Society could bestow, in recognition of his services which would be long remembered not only by all who had worked with him but also by the Society as a whole.

The Chairman then expressed the Society's gratitude to Mr. Aird Whyte, who had given years of service both as Chairman of Council and as Honorary Treasurer during which time the Society had greatly benefited from Mr. Whyte's skilful investment and careful handling of of finance in general.

The Chairman also expressed thanks to Professor A. S. Parkes, who was retiring from a Vice-Presidency, and to the retiring Councillors: Sir Charles Darwin, Mr. Cecil Binney, Mr. D. Caradog Jones, Sir Richard Pilkington, Mrs. B. S. Bosanquet, Mr. D. F. Hubback and Dr. M. Hynes, to all of whom the Society owed a debt of gratitude for much helpful service over many years.

He explained that the President, foreseeing that during the coming year he would frequently be unable to attend meetings owing to absence abroad, had asked him, Dr. Roberts, to accept nomination once again so that he might take the chair on such occasions. This request had received the full support of the Council.

### AUDITORS' REMUNERATION

The Chairman reported that Messrs. West & Drake would continue to serve as the Society's Auditors.

"That the Auditors' remuneration for the current year to 31st December, 1961, shall be the sum of eighty guineas with a further charge for additional accountancy as may be agreed between the Auditors and the Treasurer."

The Resolution was proposed by the Chairman, seconded by Dr. C. O. Carter and carried unanimously.

### Extraordinary General Meeting

An Extraordinary General Meeting was held at 5 o'clock on Wednesday, 24th May, 1961, at the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, Piccadilly, W.1. Chairman: Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts, having received from the President, Sir Julian Huxley, instructions so to act in his absence. Sixteen Fellows and three Members were present.

The Chairman having drawn attention to the explanation of the revision of the Articles, which had been previously circulated to the Society's membership, the following SPECIAL RESOLUTION was put to the Meeting from the Chair:

"That the regulations contained in the printed document submitted to the Meeting, and for the purpose of identification signed by Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts, be approved and adopted as the Articles of Association of the Society, in substitution for, and to the exclusion of, all the existing Articles thereof."

The Resolution was seconded by Mr. Aird Whyte and carried unanimously.

### Annual Report: 1961-2

In this report the accounts relate to the period from 1st January, 1961 to 31st December, 1961 inclusive. The rest of the Report covers the period from 1st April, 1961 to 31st March, 1962 inclusive.

### CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL

There have been no changes during the year in the Consultative Council.

### MEETINGS

The Galton Lecture. At the request of the President, Sir Julian Huxley, his Galton Lecture was postponed owing to a temporary indisposition and pressure of other commitments. He will now deliver the Lecture at 5 o'clock on Wednesday, 6th June, 1962, at the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, Piccadilly, W.1.

A notice will appear in next year's Annual Report.

The Darwin Lecture in Human Biology. The second Darwin Lecture in Human Biology, sponsored by the Institute of Biology with the support of the Society, was delivered on Wednesday, 6th December, 1961, by J. M. Tanner, M.D., D.Sc., on "Human Growth in its Comparative and Evolutionary Aspects". The Chair was taken by Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts and about 100 people were present. The Lecture took place in the Lecture Hall, Natural History Museum, Cromwell Road, S.W.7.

Members' Meetings. Two Members' Meetings were held during the year, both at the Rooms of the Royal Society.

At the first, on Wednesday, 24th May, 1961, the lecture was given by Professor C. D. Darlington, M.A., Ph.D., D.Sc., F.R.S., on "Cousin

Marriage". Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts was in the Chair.

At the second, on Wednesday, 22nd November, 1961, Professor Albert Dahlberg, of Chicago, gave a lecture on "Man's Dentition: Past, Present and Future". Dr. J. M. Tanner was in the Chair. Professor Dahlberg was in this country for the annual symposium of the Society of Human Biology to which organisation, it will be remembered, the Council made a three-year grant in 1960 for the expenses of overseas speakers travelling to attend these symposia. Professor Dahlberg was the first of such speakers to be assisted under this grant.

### THE EUGENICS REVIEW

The Eugenics Review has continued to appear quarterly under the Editorship of Mrs. K. Hodson.

The publishers, Pergamon Press Limited, have increased the print number of The Eugenics Review to 2,000 and it is hoped that a wider circulation will be gradually built up.

### LIBRARY

During the past year 47 books have been added to the Library by gift or purchase: 106 books and periodicals have been borrowed, 15 of them by the National Central Library. The Librarian has borrowed one book from the National Central Library for re-loan to Fellows and Members.

The Editorial and Library Committee, which has met four times during the past year, consists of Mr. P. R. Cox (Chairman), The Rev. Dr. D. Sherwin Bailey, Mr. P. Bloomfield, Dr. C. O. Carter, Dr. J. P. M. Tizard and Mr. C. W. Usher.

### DARWIN RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS

On 5th July, 1961, Dr. Rodney Harris was appointed a Darwin Research Fellow. He started work on 1st October, 1961 on a genetical survey in Merseyside of the relationship between ABO blood groups and disease, and is in association with the Department of Medicine in the University of Liverpool. His appointment is for two years.

Dr. D. T. Hughes is now in the second year of his appointment.

Dr. A. W. F. Edwards, having asked permission, resigned his Fellowship as from 1st September, 1961, to take up a post with Professor Cavalli-Sforza in Pavia, in which he will study the structure of human populations.

### GRANTS

During the period under review the Council has made the following new grants:

Professor D. V. Glass A sum of £500 for support of the general work of the Population Investigation Committee. This

sum was to cover the year to the end of the University quinquennium in 1962 and was granted provided that thereafter the item to which this money was applied were financed by

the University of London.

A sum of £750 for one year for population Dr. E. G. Knox studies in Newcastle upon Tyne.

A sum of f, 150 for the support of Dr. Ian Shine, a Dr. A. C. Stevenson medical officer of the Colonial Medical Service in St. Helena, in conducting a genetical investigation of specific traits which appeared to be In addition, the Council has renewed grants made in 1960/61 for a further year as follows:—

The Oliver Bird Trust A sum of £1,000 for the third year's work of a special-problem birth control clinic in Newcastle upon Tyne, under the direction of Dr. Mary Peberdy.

Mr. R. F. J. Withers A sum of £750 for the continuation of his research on the genetics of obesity in Man.

### PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY

In February, 1962, a report on the *Society's* pilot survey of public opinion on eugenics, conducted by Social Surveys (Gallup Poll) Ltd., was completed.

The survey was carried out by the postal method on a sample of 1,000 people whose names were selected at random from Who's Who and to whom were sent a questionnaire prepared by an ad hoc Committee, appointed by the Council, consisting of Professor A. S. Parkes, Dr. J. M. Tanner and the General Secretary.

A total of 406 completed questionnaires was returned representing a response rate of 41 per cent. A further four per cent, who for various reasons did not feel able to complete the questionnaire replied in favourable terms.

A facsimile of the questionnaire was published in the October, 1961 issue of *The Eugenics Review* and a summary of the main findings of the survey will appear in a later issue.

The Council has re-appointed the above-named ad hoc Committee to consider the report and to recommend on the next stage in the survey.

### A.I.D. INVESTIGATION COUNCIL

The following report has been received from Professor A. S. Parkes, Chairman of the A.I.D. Investigation Council:

At the time of preparing evidence, in 1959, for the Departmental Committee on Artificial Insemination, it was noted that almost every witness interviewed by the Council stated emphatically that the difficulties of A.I.D. would be much reduced and the efficiency much increased if some method of preserving human spermatozoa for long periods were available, in other words, if a semen bank could be established.

The only likely method of being able to effect long-term preservation of human spermatozoa is to maintain them at low temperatures, probably of the order of  $-79^{\circ}$  (solid  $CO_2$ ) or  $-190^{\circ}$  (liquid air), but a systematic programme of research needs to be carried out to find the appropriate conditions for thus preserving human semen.

In July, 1961, therefore, the Council decided to initiate such a programme and to allocate for the purpose some of the funds at its disposal. Dr. Agnes Onions, a graduate biologist, has been appointed for one

year to undertake the work on a part-time basis of two days a week; the Council is particularly fortunate in securing her services as she is also employed on the routine testing of spermicidal preparations and consequently has the necessary laboratory facilities at her disposal.

The A.I.D. Investigation Council continues with its original membership as follows: Professor A. S. Parkes (Chairman); Dr. P. M. Bloom and Dr. Margaret Jackson (joint Honorary Secretaries); The Rev. Dr. D. Sherwin Bailey, Mr. C. Binney, Dr. C. P. Blacker, the Rev. Dr. H. L. Philp and Mrs. Mary Stocks.

THE MARIE STOPES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION LIMITED The Balance Sheet and the Revenue Account for the year to 31st December, 1961, of the Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation Limited will be found at the end of this Report.

It will be remembered that, at the time of setting up the Foundation, it was envisaged that in due course a revenue surplus would accumulate which could be applied to the general purposes of The Eugenics Society. In 1961 this expectation was realised and accordingly, with the approval of the Society's Council, the Board has made a grant to the Family Planning Association of £1,000 a year for two years ending 31st March, 1963, for a research project among Problem Families in Southampton.

Under the Foundation's management the memorial clinic at Whitfield Street has had an active year. The official opening ceremony, conducted by Sir Russell (now Lord) Brain, took place on Friday, 12th May, 1961, a most successful occasion which was reported in both the national and local press.

Three training courses for overseas nurses were held during the year and at each the attendance was good, two, in fact, being oversubscribed. It is hoped that in future the training courses will be held every other month.

Additional doctor sessions were started in the summer of 1961 for premarital instruction and advice on marital difficulties and in March, 1962 a lunch-hour doctor session was introduced primarily for the benefit of those employed in the area who might find it difficult to attend at other times.

Since March, 1962 oral contraception has been prescribed for selected patients at the clinic.

### REPRESENTATION AT CONFERENCES

The Second International Conference of Human Genetics was held in Rome from 7th-12th September, 1961. The Society was represented by Mr. P. R. Cox, Dr. A. W. F. Edwards, Dr. H. Lehmann, Dr. E. T. O. Slater, Dr. J. M. Tanner and the General Secretary.

A report on the Conference appeared in the January 1962 issue of The Eugenics Review.

International Union of Family Organisations. A Conference of the Commission on Marriage Guidance of the International Union of Family

Organisations was held in London from 22nd-25th June, 1961 at which Dr. C. P. Blacker and Lady Lewis represented the Society.

### SOCIETY'S PREMISES

During the year under review the *Society* has continued to make all three rooms on its second floor available, rent free, to the International Planned Parenthood Federation.

The Society has continued, also, to make one room on its ground floor available, rent free, to the British Social Biology Council.

We regret to report the death of Dr. T. R. Elliott and Sir John Hobhouse, both Fellows of the Society.

### FINANCE

DONATIONS AND LEGACIES. During the year to 31st December, 1961, the Society has gratefully received the following donations: Mr. C. M. Goethe, £4 16s. 7d. (\$14.00); Mr. G. R. S. Snow, £8 0s. 0d.; and Dr. V. H. Wallace, recently Honorary Secretary of the Eugenics Society of Victoria, Australia, £145 0s. 0d., which sum represents the residual funds of Dr. Wallace's organisation at the time of its winding up early in 1961. Though his donation will for the time being be put to the general purposes of the Society the money is regarded as being available for the Australian Society should it at any time be re-formed.

The Society has also received with gratitude two donations for the support of specific activities: The Hopkins Donations Fund (Dr. Prynce Hopkins of California), £535 3s. 6d. (\$1,500.00) for the Darwin Research Fellowships; and Mr. R. H. Gunn, £100 0s. 0d. for the Public Opinion

Survey.

In August, 1961, the Society received a legacy of £1,000 bequeathed by the late Mr. Richard Rumbold. In a letter to the Secretary, left with his Will, Mr. Rumbold said that he wished the money to be used for "education and propaganda with a view to stimulating people generally to take active steps to avoid children suffering unnecessarily from a bad mental inheritance, and the furtherance of any other measures, such as voluntary sterilization, which in the opinion of the Society, would mitigate this type of suffering". The matter is under consideration by the Council and the legacy is being reserved accordingly.

LEASEHOLD AND FREEHOLD PROPERTY. In June, 1961, Messrs. John D. Wood & Co., Estate Agents, of 23 Berkeley Square, W.1., were appointed

to undertake the management of all the Society's properties.

The maisonette on the third and fourth floors at 69 Eccleston Square, has been let on a seven-year lease from 8th February, 1962, at a rental of £500 per annum, exclusive, for the first five years and thereafter at a yearly rent to be assessed as representing the then market figure.

A purchaser is being sought for the leasehold of 69 Eccleston Square

The freehold of the property at 168 King Street, Hammersmith, has been sold (February 1962) for £7,500.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1961. The Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year to 31st December, 1961, together with a list of the Society's investments will be found at the end of this Report.

For the year under review ordinary working expenses exceeded income by £2,991. In addition, £2,504 Special Grants were paid, which, after adjusting Income Tax for the previous year, produced a deficit of £5,463.

The General Fund, which stood at £86,357 at 31st December, 1960, has been increased by £4,166 in respect of a legacy and profit from sales of investments. After transferring the deficit of £5,463 the balance at 31st December, 1961, was £85,060.




