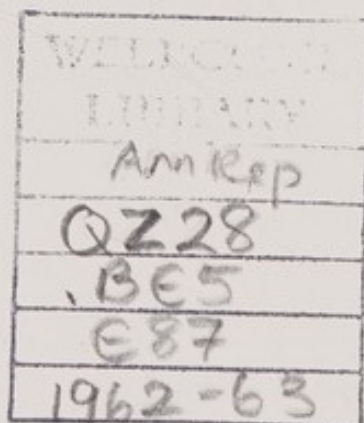

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting was held at 4.30 p.m. on Wednesday, 23rd May, 1962, at the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, Piccadilly, W.1. *Chairman*: Sir Julian Huxley. Fourteen Fellows and two Members were present.

ANNUAL REPORT

The General Secretary presented the Annual Report and briefly outlined its contents. He made particular reference to the *Society's* survey of public opinion on eugenics which had been conducted during the year, and to the progress of The Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation.

The adoption of the Report was then proposed by Sir Charles Darwin, seconded by Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts and carried unanimously.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS AND BALANCE SHEET

These were presented by the General Secretary on behalf of the Honorary Treasurer who was unable to be present.

Annual Report : 1962-3

IN THIS REPORT the accounts relate to the period from 1st January, 1962 to 31st December, 1962, inclusive. The rest of the Report covers the period from 1st April, 1962 to 31st March, 1963 inclusive.

During the year under review the Executive Committee met three times and the Finance Committee twice; in addition, these Committees held one joint meeting.

CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL

The Consultative Council has suffered losses in the death of The Lord Beveridge, Professor Sir Ronald Fisher and Professor R. Ruggles Gates. The two latter were Life Fellows of the Society.

MEETINGS

The Galton Lecture. The Galton Lecture for 1962 which, it will be remembered, was postponed until the Summer, was delivered on Wednesday, 6th June by Sir Julian Huxley, M.A., D.Sc., F.R.S., on "Eugenics in Evolutionary Perspective". The Chair was taken by Professor C. H. Waddington, and about seventy people were present.

The Galton Lecture for 1963 was delivered on Wednesday, 27th February, by Mrs. Margaret Pyke on "Family Planning: an Assessment". The Chair was taken by Professor A. S. Parkes and some 100 people attended.

Both lectures took place at the Rooms of the Royal Society, Burlington House, W.1., and were preceded by tea.

The Darwin Lecture in Human Biology. The third Darwin Lecture in Human Biology, sponsored by the Institute of Biology in association with the Society, was delivered on Wednesday, 12th December, 1962, by Professor A. S. Parkes, C.B.E., M.A., D.Sc., F.R.S., on "Change and Control in Human Populations". The Chair was taken by Mr. H. J. Bunker—a Vice-President of the Institute of Biology—on behalf of Sir Gerard Thornton who was unable to be present, and some 130 people attended. The lecture took place in the Lecture Hall, Natural History Museum, Cromwell Road, S.W.7.

Members' Meeting. A Members' Meeting was held in the Society's library on Thursday, 12th April, 1962, at which the lecture was given by Professor

Lars Beckman, of the Institute for Medical Genetics in the University of Uppsala, on "Assortative Mating in Man". Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts was in the Chair. This meeting was timed to coincide with Professor Beckman's visit to this country for the annual symposium of the Society for the Study of Human Biology; he was the second to be assisted under the Council's grant to this organisation for the travelling expenses of overseas speakers at its symposia.

THE EUGENICS REVIEW

The Eugenics Review has continued to appear quarterly under the Editorship of Mrs. K. Hodson.

LIBRARY

During the past year thirty-eight books have been added to the Library by gift or purchase: eighty books and periodicals have been borrowed, eighteen of them by the National Central Library. The Librarian has borrowed three books from the National Central Library for re-loan to Fellows and Members.

The Council has decided that, in future, students and others who are not members of the *Society* may read in the library if they are introduced by a Fellow or Member or by the librarian of a medical or scientific library.

DARWIN RESEARCH FELLOWSHIPS

On 30th September, 1962, Dr. D. T. Hughes completed the second and final year of his Fellowship and took up an appointment as William Shepherd Research Fellow of the Institute of Cancer Research, London, where he is continuing his studies on the mechanism and range of human variation.

Dr. Rodney Harris, by agreement with the *Society*, resigned his Fellowship from 31st August, 1962, to take up a hospital appointment in Liverpool.

Reports on the work carried out by Dr. Hughes and Dr. Harris during their Fellowships appeared in the January, 1963 issue of *The Eugenics Review*.

The Council has decided in principle that in future it will appoint a Research Fellow in alternate years, it being expected that each will have a two-year tenure; no new appointment, therefore, was made in 1962.

GRANTS

During the period under review the Council has made the following grants:

Professor A. S. Parkes A sum of £500 for the continuation of research on low temperature preservation of human semen. This work was initiated last year (1961/2) by the A.I.D. Investigation Council with some of the funds at its disposal.

International Planned Parenthood Federation:

Headquarters A sum of £800 for the expenses of two U.K. contributors (Professor A. S. Parkes and Professor D. V. Glass) to the Federation's Seventh International Conference on Planned Parenthood, held in Singapore, 10th-16th February, 1963.

Medical Committee A sum of £250 for the support of a foam tablet acceptability trial.

Dr. E. M. Williamson A sum of £500 for one year for training in medical genetics.

Miss V. A. S. Luttrell A sum of £50 for the support of an Oxford genetical and medical expedition to the Aegean.

In addition, the Council has renewed the following two grants, made in 1961 and 1962 respectively:

International Planned Parenthood Federation Region for Europe, near East and Africa: A sum of £250 for a further year in support of administration expenses.

Dr. E. G. Knox A sum of £500 for the completion of his population studies in Newcastle upon Tyne.

The work of the Promising Families Committee having come to an end, the balance of £744 standing to its credit was returned.

At 31st December, 1962, the Grants Fund stood at £1,165 9s. 11d. representing three undrawn balances—A.I.D. Investigation Council (1958), £370 9s. 11d., The Society for the Study of Human Biology (1960), £45 0s. 0d., and Dr. E. M. Williamson (1962), £250 0s. 0d.—and the grant to Professor Parkes (1962), £500 0s. 0d., which was not drawn upon until January, 1963.

PUBLIC OPINION SURVEY

It will be remembered that a report on the *Society's* pilot survey of public opinion on eugenics, conducted by Social Surveys (Gallup Poll) Ltd., was completed in February, 1962 and that a summary of the main findings was later published in the July issue of *The Eugenics Review*.

On the recommendation of its *ad hoc* Committee (Professor A. S. Parkes, Dr. J. M. Tanner and the General Secretary), appointed to consider the

report and to advise on the next stage of the survey, the Council decided to continue by sending the original questionnaire to U.K. members of the Science Masters' and Mistresses', and the Classical Associations. This circulation would reach a group wider than that first approached.

To reduce costs, the questionnaires were sent out from the *Society's* office and alternate names on each Association's list were used, the total membership being too large for practicability. Questionnaires returned completed have been sent to Social Surveys (Gallup Poll) Ltd. for analysis.

VOLUNTARY STERILIZATION

Fellows and Members will have read, in *The Eugenics Review*, the series of articles by Dr. C. P. Blacker on Voluntary Sterilization. These valuable articles (now available bound together) were written at the request of the Council who wished the *Society* to publicise a full review of the present position at home and overseas.

The *Society's* future policy on voluntary sterilization is now under consideration by the Council.

THE MARIE STOPES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION LIMITED

The Balance Sheet and Revenue Account for the year to 31st December, 1962, of The Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation Limited will be found at the end of this Report. These show an excess of income over expenditure for the year amounting to £3,097 which, added to the Revenue Account balance at 31st December, 1961 of £3,059 increased the revenue surplus to £6,156. Of this balance £4,504 was carried forward, the sum of £1,652 having been expended during the year on training, research activities and grants.

The grants included £1,000 made available to the Eugenics Society. By the wish of the *Society's* Council this sum was applied in full to a grant for one year, to be paid quarterly from September, 1962, in support of the special-problem birth control clinic in Newcastle upon Tyne under the direction of Dr. Mary Peberdy. This work had for the previous two years been financed by annual grants from the *Society*. In addition, the Foundation provided £1,000 as promised in 1961 for the continuation of the similar research project being conducted in Southampton under Dr. Dorothy Morgan's direction.

The Board has for some time had in mind the desirability of initiating in London a domiciliary birth control research project with problem families, on the same lines as those conducted by Dr. Peberdy and Dr. Morgan. Accordingly, in January this year, arrangements were completed to start in a small area near the Foundation's clinic in Whitfield Street where the work will be based. Dr. Elizabeth Horder has been appointed as medical officer in charge of the project which will be under the ultimate control of a Steering Committee.

During the past year six training courses were held for overseas nurses and it is hoped in 1963 to arrange the same number but with an extended and more comprehensive syllabus. The Family Planning Association

clinic at Walworth has kindly agreed to set aside one of its sessions each week for additional practical training and Dr. Geraldine Howard has been appointed to assist Dr. Helena Wright with the demonstration lectures.

In October, 1962, a second evening doctor session was started weekly in place of the afternoon session which had been held on alternate Thursdays.

An oral contraceptive is now being prescribed for sixteen women.

SOCIETY'S PREMISES

During the year under review the *Society* has continued to make all three rooms on its second floor available, rent free, to the International Planned Parenthood Federation.

The *Society* has continued, also, to make one room on its ground floor available, rent free, to the British Social Biology Council.

FINANCE

DONATIONS AND LEGACIES. During the year to 31st December, 1962, the *Society* has gratefully received the following *donations*: Mr. C. M. Goethe, £4 15s. 6d. (\$14.00); Mr. G. R. S. Snow, £8 0s. 0d.; Mr. K. M. Howe, £1 1s. 0d.; and Mr. R. M. Mackessack, 10s.

The *Society* has also received with gratitude two donations for the support of specific activities: Mr. R. L. Coutts, £1 0s. 0d. for the Public Opinion Survey; and The Hopkins Donations Fund (Dr. Prynce Hopkins of California), £532 0s. 4d. (\$1,500.00) for the Darwin Research Fellowships. This was the second donation from the Fund for this purpose, the first, for the same amount, having been received in 1961.

In January, 1963, notification was received that the late Sir Charles Darwin had bequeathed to the *Society* a *legacy* of £100 unconditionally.

LEASEHOLD AND FREEHOLD PROPERTY. Messrs. John D. Wood & Co., Estate Agents, of 23 Berkeley Square, W.1., have continued to manage the *Society's* properties.

The sum of approximately £1,000 was spent on repairs and redecoration to the *Society's* house at 69 Eccleston Square during 1962; the work included, in addition to exterior painting, the demolition of certain dis-used outbuildings, and alterations to the plumbing, in the basement area.

The property at 69 Eccleston Square Mews has been underleased to Mr. R. F. Morgan for the remaining years, less 10 days, of the *Society's* term under the Head Lease, i.e. to 15th December, 2050. Mr. Morgan

paid a premium of £6,250 and the Underlease reserves an annual rent of £50 to the *Society*.

The Factory at Redhill, Surrey (Safety Products Limited) is now the only freehold property owned by the *Society*.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1962. The Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year to 31st December, 1962, together with a list of the *Society's* investments will be found at the end of this Report.

For the year under review ordinary working expenses exceeded income by £1,778. In addition, Grants remaining undrawn at 31st December, 1961 (£2,444) and Grants made during 1962 (£2,850) were debited together with the net costs of the Darwin Research Fellowships (£1,570) and the Public Opinion Survey (£463); this produced a deficit of £9,105.

The General Fund which stood at £85,060 at 31st December, 1961, has been increased by £9,826 in respect of profits on the sale of investments and of leasehold and freehold properties. After transferring the deficit of £9,105 the balance at 31st December, 1962, was £85,781.
