CONSULTATIVE COUNCIL

There have been no changes during the year in the Consultative Council.

STATEMENT OF AIMS

A revised statement of the Society's aims and activities has been approved by the Council and copies are available from the Society's office. The previous issue has been withdrawn.

MEETINGS

The Galton Lecture (see *Symposia* below).

The Darwin Lecture in Human Biology. The eighth Darwin Lecture in Human Biology, sponsored by the Institute of Biology in association with the Society, was delivered on Tuesday, 28th May, 1968 by Professor J. S. Weiner on "Human adaptability: its world-wide study within the International Biological Programme". Professor H. Lehmann was in the Chair and over 100 people were present. The Lecture took place in the Lecture Hall of the Natural History Museum.

The ninth Darwin Lecture will be given, also in this Lecture Theatre, at 5.15 p.m. on Tuesday, 6th May, 1969 by Professor Harry Harris, F.R.S. on "The population genetics of enzymes and proteins".

The Caradog Jones Lecture. The second Caradog Jones Lecture will be delivered at 5.00 p.m. on Wednesday, 30th April, 1969 by Mrs. M. E. Bateman on "Improving relations between management and employees". The Lecture, which is arranged in conjunction with the Royal Statistical Society and the Master of Pembroke College, Cambridge, will be held in the Large Lecture Theatre of the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

Mrs. Bateman is deputy head of the industrial relations department of the Confederation of British Industry.

THE EUGENICS REVIEW

Publication of *The Eugenics Review* was discontinued at the end of 1968 after completion of Volume 60. This last volume was devoted to historical matter. The first and second numbers contained respectively a selection of Galton Lectures and of articles reprinted from earlier volumes, and the third a short history of the Society and of the *Review*; reprints were made of these histories and a copy will be sent to all new members on election. The final number comprised a complete index, classified by author and subject, of all sixty volumes.

Arrangements for the distribution of back numbers are being made with Messrs. Oliver & Boyd, Limited.

JOURNAL OF BIOSOCIAL SCIENCE

The official journal of the Society is now the *Journal of Biosocial Science*, published for the Galton Foundation by Blackwell Scientific Publications at £7 per annum. The first number appeared in January 1969 and issues will be quarterly until the flow of material necessitates more frequent publication. The Journal will publish material dealing with social aspects of human biology, including reproduction and its control, gerontology, ecology, genetics and applied psychology; with biological aspects of the social sciences, including sociology, social anthropology, education and criminology; and with biosocial aspects of demography.

Proceedings of the Society's Symposia will in future be published as supplements to the Journal.

Details of the Society's new subscription rates, consequential on the change in publications, will be found in the Finance section below. It should be noted that by payment of the compound subscription members are eligible to receive the Journal and the Symposia Supplements at less than half price; this is a considerable concession.

THE BULLETIN

The first number of the Society's *Bulletin* appeared in March 1969 and this new publication will be issued regularly. Its contents include comment, statistics, memoranda, short book reviews and annotations, and so will incorporate most of the material other than original papers and articles which formerly appeared in *The Eugenics Review*.

The *Bulletin* is intended primarily for members, to whom it is circulated free of charge, but it is hoped that it will also interest non-members, stimulate new membership and, in due course, give a wider coverage of topics. It is edited by the General Secretary in consultation with an advisory group.

HEREDITY CHARTS

The series of six heredity charts for use in schools continues to be published for the Society by Messrs. George Philip (Printers) Limited of 12-14 Long Acre, W.C.2.

In October 1968, chart 2, of which the stock was exhausted, was redrawn and reprinted and the Handbook for Speakers, which accompanies the series and which was also out of print, was reproduced. At the same time, the selling price of each chart was increased from 7s. 6d. to 15s.

It is worthy of note that these charts, which were first published more than thirty years ago, still have a steady sale. In the light of this continuing demand it has been decided that when existing stocks are exhausted the whole set be redesigned and brought up to date.

THE LIBRARY

The Council has decided that the library shall be built up more rapidly and that priority be given to those sections which lack the most up-to-date publications. Accordingly, a committee has been appointed, to advise on acquisitions, consisting of Mr. P. R. Cox (Honorary Librarian), Mr. D. R. Brothwell, Dr. C. O. Carter, Dr. M. J. Cole, Mr. W. M. Keynes, Mr. John Peel and Dr. D. M. Potts. Purchasing has already begun, within a budget of £200 per annum, and, in order to provide much needed space, some books of no historical value have been disposed of.

With the Council's approval an arrangement has been made by which free use of the Society's library facilities is extended to members of the Society for the Study of Human Biology.

The Galton Foundation has agreed to enter into an exchange agreement for the *Journal of Biosocial Science* with a selection of the journals hitherto exchanged for *The Eugenics Review*; the Society's library journals can thus be continued without cost.

THE GALTON FOUNDATION

In August 1968 The Galton Foundation was established as a Charitable Trust "in memory of Sir Francis Galton and in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the biosocial sciences". It is an autonomous body and its Trustees are Mrs. Mary Adams, Mrs. Frances Dennis, Dr. G. Ainsworth Harrison, Professor Sir Alan Parkes and The Lord Platt.

At present the main activity of the Foundation is the production of the *Journal of Biosocial Science* but other activities will follow.

GRANTS

During the year under review the Council has approved the following grants:

The sum of £2,500 over five years to be paid as £500 on 1st January, 1969, towards working expenses, and thence yearly in each year as one-half of the deficit on the Journal for the previous year until the whole sum is expended or five years has elapsed.

*Each of these grants was paid from donations from the Hopkins Fund in 1967 and 1968 (*see Donations below*).

SYMPOSIA

The Society's fifth Symposium, on *Biosocial Aspects of Race*, took place on Thursday and Friday, 26th and 27th September, 1968 in the Meeting Rooms of the Zoological Society of London.

The President opened the Meeting, which as usual comprised four sessions; the first, under the Chairmanship of Lord Platt, was on genetic aspects and the second, for which Professor Amoroso took the Chair, on physiological and psychological aspects. The afternoon ended with extracts from the film "Olympiad festival of the nations, 1936".

On the second day the President was in the Chair for the third session which dealt with demographic aspects and which included the *Galton Lecture*, integrated in the Symposium for the first time. The lecture was delivered by Dr. G. Ainsworth Harrison on "The race concept in human biology" and given a most appreciative reception by the large audience. The President proposed a vote of thanks.

The fourth session, under the Chairmanship of Mr. Philip Mason, covered sociological aspects and ended a very successful Meeting.

As indicated above, the Proceedings will be published as Supplement No. 1 to the *Journal of Biosocial Science*.

During 1968 sales of the first four volumes in the series of the Society's Symposia were as follows: volume one, *Biological Aspects of Social Problems*, 87 copies; volume two, *Genetic and Environmental Factors in Human Ability*, 535; volume three, *Social and Genetic Influences on Life and Death*, 817; and volume four, *Genetic and Environmental Influences on Behaviour*, which was published in November, 1968, 1,164 copies. The figures for volumes three and four include the usual bulk sale of 750 copies to Plenum Press, New York. Volumes one and two are now out of print.

Arrangements are now being made for the sixth Symposium, on *Biosocial Aspects of Sex*, which will again be held in the Meeting Rooms of the Zoological Society on Tuesday and Wednesday, 23rd and 24th September. The four sessions will be on genetic and environmental aspects, sex ratios in different populations, comparative occupational performances and sociological aspects.

A full programme will be obtainable in May from the Society's office.

THE MARIE STOPES MEMORIAL FOUNDATION LIMITED

The Balance Sheet and Revenue Account for the year to 31st December, 1968, of The Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation Limited will be found at the end of this Report.

There was an excess of income over expenditure for the year amounting to £1,649 which, added to the Revenue Account balance at 31st December, 1967 of £6,194 increased the revenue surplus to £7,843. After expenditure during the year of £204 on training and the follow-up survey of the domicillary service, and an allocation of £1,000 to The Eugenics Society, a balance was carried forward of £6,867 which included £228 of the grant made in 1964 to Dr. Faith Spicer but returned by her unused. A further allocation of £700 charged to the Revenue Account was made to The Eugenics Society in respect of administrative and secretarial expenses.

In consideration of the rent now paid to the Society for Constructive Birth Control Limited this Company has made grants, amounting to £3,100, on behalf of the Foundation as follows: to the Birmingham and London Pregnancy Advisory Services, £1,000 each; to Mr. John Peel, in support of a research project on the history of the Family Planning Movement, £750; and to Dr. A. Giles, for post-partum family planning, £350.

Dr. D. M. Potts, who is Medical Secretary of the International Planned Parenthood Federation, has been appointed to membership of the Board whose other members are Dr. G. C. L. Bertram (Chairman), Mrs. H. Brook, Dr. C. O. Carter, Mrs. E. Mitchell, Mr. John Peel and Mr. A. I. Wyborn; Miss Schenk has continued to serve as Secretary. In March 1969, Mrs. Brook retired from the Directorship of the Clinic after nine years in office. The Board is much indebted to her for her work, enthusiasm and encouragement which, particularly in the early days of management, have contributed in no small measure to the present smooth running of the Clinic. No new appointment will be made.

The Foundation's domicillary birth control service was wound up in April 1968 when the Health Department of the London Borough of Camden followed Westminster and took over entire responsibility for all its new families. Before the change-over all those then receiving the service were visited and those who could not be referred to a family planning clinic were advised that in future they would be cared for by a Camden Health Visitor. Four years' pioneering thus came to a successful conclusion, the initiating voluntary project having been taken over by the public authority.

The training programme for overseas personnel has continued. The nurses' courses, of which six were held during the year, have been revised to include more instruction on the pill and IUD routine; in addition, a weekly session has continued for doctors referred by the European Region of the International Planned Parenthood Federation.

In January 1969, Brook Advisory Centres, being now completely launched, was able to move to new and more spacious premises. For over three years the organisation occupied, free of charge, the top floor of No. 106 Whitfield Street and during the period gave birth control advice to 7,000 unmarried young women.

Repairs and improvements to the Whitfield Street premises, agreed in 1967, have been completed during the year.

The number of new patients has continued to increase, 2,745 having attended in 1968 compared with 2,722 in 1967; as additional clinic space is now available following the removal of Brook Advisory Centres the rate of increase is expected to accelerate. The London Borough of Camden has agreed to accept financial responsibility for all Camden residents who receive contraceptive advice at the Clinic.

During the year 767 doctor sessions have been held which have included weekly sessions for marital difficulties and new sessions, started in June, for

pregnancy advice and referral. It is hoped that the records of patients attending the latter sessions will be kept in the same way as those of the Birmingham and London Pregnancy Advisory Services so that eventually a comparative analysis can be made.

The Clinic Report was published in September 1968, and has been widely circulated among social workers and voluntary organisations.

FINANCE

SUBSCRIPTIONS. Recent changes in the privileges of members have necessitated a revision of the annual subscription to the Society. On 1st January, 1969 a two-tier rate came into operation: an ordinary subscription of £2 per annum covering the existing privileges of membership and receipt of the new *Bulletin*, and a compound subscription of £6 per annum for those who wish to receive in addition the *Journal of Biosocial Science* and its supplements containing the Proceedings of the Society's Symposia. Life members are entitled to receive the privileges of compound subscribers on payment of a supplementary annual subscription of £4.

The relevant registration forms are being sent to all members, with personal notification of these changes, shortly before the expiry of their current subscription.

DONATIONS. During the year to 31st December, 1968 the Society has gratefully received the following donations: The Dennis Buxton Trust, £2.2.0; Mr. K. P. Ellis, £30; and Mr. G. R. S. Snow, £8.0.0.

The Society has also received with gratitude a donation, for disbursement in grants, from The Hopkins Donation Fund of \$2,000.00 (£830.16.6.) which, with £244 granted from the Fund's 1967 donation but returned unused, provided a total of £1,074.16.6. for disbursement in 1968. Of this sum, £925 was allocated to three grants as follows: to Dr. E. Sunderland, for an investigation of the physical characteristics of the British Gypsy population, £400; to Mr. R. Chester, for a preliminary study of a divorced population, £350; and to Mr. S. R. Goodman, for a Jamaican community study in Leeds, £175. The balance of £150 was carried forward to 1969.

LEASEHOLD PROPERTY. Messrs. John D. Wood & Co., Estate Agents, of 23 Berkeley Square, W.1, have continued to manage the Society's property at 69 Eccleston Square.

External decorations to the house amounting to £409 have been carried out.

For some years the large room at the rear of the ground floor has been partitioned, but by decision of the Council it was restored during the summer of 1968 to its original state as a single office. At the same time it was redecorated and the lighting modernised. The small annexe has been equipped with a sink

and water heater. Thus, for a cost of £522, the Society has established a self-contained office unit which can be a permanent source of income. The unit has been let, as from 1st October, 1968 to the Galton Foundation at an annual rent of £100 payable quarterly in advance.

INVESTMENT. The Council has decided that when market conditions are favourable the Society's funds shall gradually be transferred from the Charities Official Investment Fund to the Equities Investment Fund for Charities (Charifund). So as to facilitate this intention income shares to the value of £10,000 were withdrawn from the Charities Official Investment Fund at the July, 1968 valuation date and temporarily invested for income in the following Stocks, both of which are readily marketable:

 £5,000 Boots Pure Drug Co. Ltd. 7¾% Unsecured Loan
 Stock 1988-93.

A further £5,000 was withdrawn from the Charities Official Investment Fund during the year for the Society's general purposes, and at 31st December, 1968 the Society's investment in the Fund amounted to 69,751 income shares.

ACCOUNTS FOR 1968. The Balance Sheet and the Income and Expenditure Account for the year to 31st December, 1968 will be found at the end of this report.

For the year under review income exceeded ordinary working expenses by £86. This surplus was increased by an allocation of £1,000 from The Marie Stopes Memorial Foundation Limited and a donation of £831 from The Hopkins Donation Fund; the latter has been transferred to the Specific Purposes Fund on the Balance Sheet. Net expenditure on the publication of *The Eugenics Review* of £1,726 less the net surplus on the Symposia volumes, £750, has been debited together with the cost of the Symposium, £1,375; these, in addition to the grant approved during 1968, £160, produced a net deficit of £1,425.

The General Fund which stood at £94,221 at 31st December, 1967 has been reduced by this deficit of £1,425 leaving a balance at 31st December, 1968 of £92,796.

The Company's Auditors, Messrs. Allfields, are willing to remain in office.

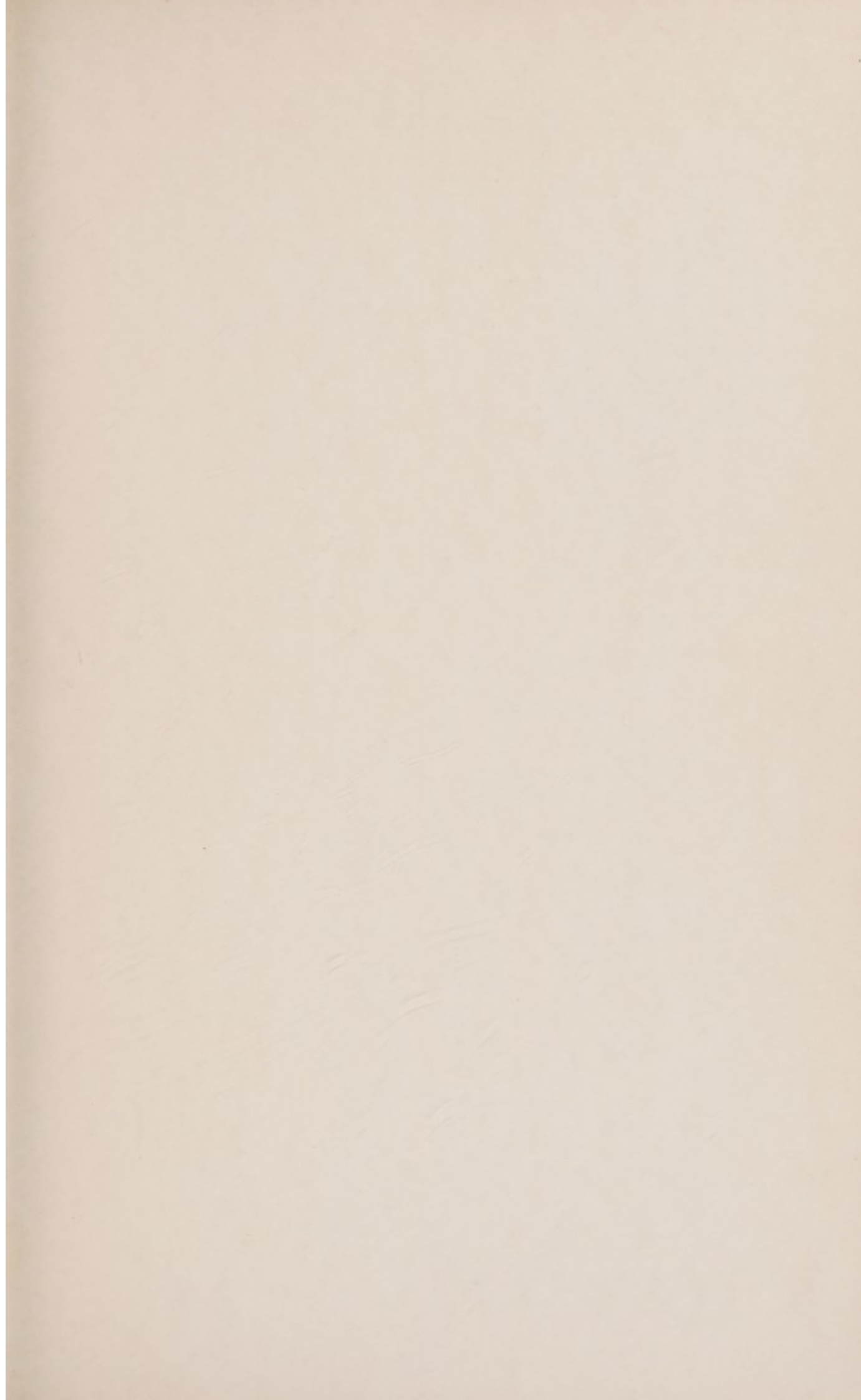
