The Council's Health and Social Service Departments serve a population of almost 200,000, including over 26,000 children and 28,500 old people.

The Directors of these two vital Departments are responsible for a staff of well over 1,000; embracing medical, dental, and nursing professions; public health inspectors; chiropodists, social workers, and residential staff. Together they provide a tremendous range of health and social services costing almost £3 million a year.

This Guide gives details of all these services, together with information about many other public services for which the Borough Council is not responsible. For the particulars about Voluntary Organisations we are particularly appreciative of the great assistance given by the Secretary of the Hammersmith Council of Social Service.

It is our earnest hope that this Guide will help residents of Hammersmith become more aware of the many health and social services open to them through the Council, and of the many statutory or voluntary organisations. The more people know about these services, the more we are able to help!

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THE SYSTEM THAT SERVES HAMMERSMITH

There have been major changes to streamline and to improve the Health and Social Services administered by local authorities. These were recommended by the Seebohm Report to Parliament and were brought into force in April, 1971, through a new Social Services Act.

In Hammersmith, some of these changes were anticipated and put into practice before the Act came into force, especially in the merging of the Health, Welfare and Children's Social Workers into four independent teams working in their own defined areas.

Now, Hammersmith has a Director of Health Services and a Director of Social Services, sharing a secretariat but each having separate responsibilities.

The Director of Health Services continues to be responsible for the Personal Health Services, the School Health (including Dental) Services, and the Environmental Health Services.

The Director of Social Services is responsible for Residential, Day Care and Social Work Services for Children, the Elderly, the Mentally and Physically-Handicapped, and for Homeless Families.

All are administered from the Old Town Hall, Fulham, S.W.6, or 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6. The telephone for *both* addresses is: 385 1212.

Some hospitals in Hammersmith provide accommodation for certain mothers about to be confined. Particulars of admission to these hospitals and to other maternity institutions can be obtained at the ante-natal clinics or at any Child Health Centre.

For dealing with acute obstetric emergencies in the home when the patient cannot be taken to the hospital without undue risk, certain hospitals provide an emergency obstetric service. This includes a number of mobile medical and nursing teams, with special obstetric experience, known as Emergency Obstetric Units.

A doctor in charge of a home confinement—or a midwife if she cannot obtain medical aid and the emergency is grave—may obtain the services of one of these Units by telephoning the London Ambulance Service. The Ambulance Service will immediately send an ambulance to take the appropriate Emergency Obstetric Unit and their equipment from hospital to the patient's address and in the meantime will warn the Unit that the ambulance is on its way.

In addition, there are Premature Baby Units, which are special units operated by certain hospitals to ensure that premature babies (and mothers if necessary) get to hospital quickly. In Hammersmith, the Unit may be obtained by doctors or midwives only on direct application to Hammersmith Hospital.

WELFARE FOODS

Under the Welfare Foods Order, 1971, the provision of cheap welfare milk for expectant mothers and young children has ended, but entitlement to free milk and foods has been extended.

● Families where there are already two children under school age will continue to be entitled to 7 pints of liquid milk or 1 pack of National Dried Milk per week free of charge, for all other children under school-age, and for expectant mothers, regardless of family income.

- In low-income families an expectant mother and all children under school-age will be entitled to 7 pints of liquid milk or 1 pack of National Dried Milk per week free of charge and vitamin A and D tablets.
- In addition, handicapped children aged 5 to 16 who are unable to attend an educational establishment will be entitled to free milk on the same scale.
- Children attending a registered day nursery get $\frac{1}{2}$ pint each day they attend.
- Tokens for free additional supplies of National Dried Milk will be issued, on application, for children up to one year of age in large or needy families.

APPLICATIONS FOR FREE MILK AND FOODS

Applications, on low income grounds, should be made to the local offices of the Department of Health and Social Security. Those in receipt of Supplementary Benefit or Family Income Supplement will automatically qualify for free welfare milk and foods. The local offices are:

HOME NURSING

A home nursing service is provided by the Council from 141 Uxbridge Road, W.12, **Tel. 743 9823**; and 553 Fulham Road, S.W.6, **Tel. 385 8661 and 385 1212, Extension 211.**

General nursing care is given to the sick by the home nurses under instructions of the family doctor, through whom arrangements for their attendance must be made. The calls upon this service sometimes make it difficult to deal with more than urgent cases.

HOME BATHING

A home bathing service for the housebound, not in need of nursing care, is run in conjunction with the home nursing service.

RECUPERATIVE HOLIDAYS

Hammersmith Council provides recuperative holidays for people who are recovering from recent acute physical or mental illnesses but who do not require nursing care. Applications should be made and certified by the patient's doctor on a form obtainable from the Director of Health Services, Old Town Hall, 553 Fulham Road, S.W.6, **Tel. 385 1212.** The charge for the holiday depends on the income of the applicant. Recuperative holidays for children attending schools in the Borough are free of charge, as are recuperative holidays for babies under six months accompanied by their mothers.

MARRIAGE WELFARE CENTRE

Advice on birth control is given by specially-trained women doctors at the North Kensington Marriage Welfare Centre, 12 Telford Road, W.10, **Tel. 969 2532.** A fee is charged according to income. Patients referred on medical grounds by local authorities are advised free of charge. Engaged couples may attend within six weeks of their marriage. Times of sessions are available by telephone. Specialists give advice by appointment on minor gynaecology, infertility and marriage problems. A marriage problems session for men is held by a male doctor.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICE

The Inner London Education Authority is the education authority responsible for the Inner London area, which includes Hammersmith. In addition to primary, secondary, and higher education, it provides nursery schools and special schools for handicapped children. The school health service in the Borough is under the supervision of the Director of Health Services and Principal School Medical Officer at the Old Town Hall, 553/561 Fulham Road, S.W.6. Children undergo periodical medical inspections at school and their parents are advised about any treatment which is required. Facilities for treatment are available at the school treatment centres in the Borough.

CRECHES

CHIROPODY

This service is provided throughout the Borough at nine of the Council's clinics.

The majority of patients treated are restricted to the priority classes—men over 65 years, women over 60 years, the physically-handicapped, and expectant mothers. Patients are seen by appointment, and a small charge made for the service.

Transport is provided for those unable to reach the clinics by public transport, and there is a home* service for the housebound.

For the long-term management of foot disabilities an Appliance Laboratory has recently been established.

DISPOSAL OF THE DEAD

It is the duty of the Borough Council to arrange for the burial or cremation of any person who had died, or has been found dead, in Hammersmith, where it appears that no other suitable arrangements have been or are being made. Applications for assistance under this Section should be made (before approaching the undertaker) to the Health and Social Services, 553 Fulham Road, S.W.6, Tel. 385 1212, Extension 3.

There are special arrangements for the burial of persons of certain religious faiths. In the case of Jewish persons applications may be made to the Federation of Synagogues Burial Society, 64 Leman Street, E.1, Tel. 480 7425. In the case of cremation or burial of Hindus or Muslims, the High Commissioner for India, India House, Aldwych, W.C.2, will give all possible assistance. Tel. 836 8484.

MEDICINAL BATHS

These treatment baths are situated in Scotts Road, Shepherds Bush, W.1, Tel. 743 2438. In addition to treatment for scabies, psoriasis and verminous conditions, elderly and chronic sick people who are feeble and otherwise not able to bathe themselves are given weekly baths.

The medicinal baths are open from 8.00 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on Mondays and Fridays. Persons requiring treatment for scabies must take with them letters from their own doctors.

TODDLERS' TROLLEY TIME (provided by Civic Entertainments)

The activities at Toddlers' Trolley Time include painting, modelling, plasticine and minor games, and are supervised by an experienced play leader.

HEALTH EDUCATION SERVICE

A comprehensive Health Education Service is provided in a self-contained unit at 2-6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, of which the **"DESIGN FOR LIVING"** permanent health education exhibition is a special feature.

The exhibition is open Mondays - Fridays from 10 a.m. - 5 p.m., with provision for group visits. Admission is free (children accompanied). Telling the story of life from pre-birth to the advancing years, "Design For Living" utilises the latest visual aids, models, and animated displays. There is also a Film Theatre. On the ground floor one room is devoted to Borough and National Campaign features. All aspects of Health, Home, and Water Safety are included. Visits by schools, teacher-training colleges, and similar bodies, as well as local organisations are particularly encouraged, and lecture-demonstrations are provided. The exhibition is increasingly used for examinations in connection with the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, and for special projects. Five Programmed Learning Systems have been introduced for individual and group studies. Recent Borough publications include "Social Drinking & You", Community Services for the Incontinent Adult", and "The X in Sex" (V.D.).

The Service initiates a variety of national and local campaigns in the interests of Environmental and Personal Health, Children's, and Social Services, and liaises with both statutory bodies and voluntary organisations. Community aids include information and confidential advice, mobile exhibitions, lecture panels, films, film strips and cassettes, posters, literature, loan and hire of visual aids and, in addition, training, recruitment, and public relations requirements.

Major campaigns include Drug Recognition, Dental Care, Anti-Smoking, Mental Health, Water Safety, Noise Abatement, and Alcoholism. Reminder campaigns feature mass radiography, cytology, venereal disease, foot care, child health, food hygiene, immunisation, care of the elderly, oil heater servicing, fireworks, home safety, safe toys, and Christmas and New Year home safety.

HOME SAFETY

The death and injury toll from accidents in the home is greater than that from road casualties, and a continuous campaign is mounted within the Borough to combat home accidents. A visit to the "Design For Living" Exhibition at 2-6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6 (details above), will provide home safety information covering all age ranges. There is also up-to-date advice on British Standards, as well as of approved electrical, gas, oil heater apparatus and appliances, and non-inflammable clothing. A wide range of free literature is available.

The Borough Home Accident Report Card is also freely available and is of value in assessing local causes, and in prevention. Local technical experts are available to advise on home safety factors, and the Borough is also represented on the Greater London Home Safety Council of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents. At the time this Guide went to Press the Council had approved the setting up of a Home Safety Committee, on which interested organisations in the Borough would be represented.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTION

A team of Public Health Inspectors is employed in the Environmental Health Section.

They are responsible for enforcing statutory provisions relating to environmental health. Inspections are made and enquiries dealt with concerning the following:—

- Atmospheric pollution—Clean Air
- Certificates of Disrepair
- Control of Rodents—Rats and Mice
- Control of Rodents—Other Pests
- Factories Inspection
- Food Inspection and Food Sampling
- Housing—defective conditions, overcrowding, multiple occupation, means of escape in case of fire
- Infectious Diseases—Facilities for Examination of Specimens
- Inspection of Offices and Shops
- International Certificates of Vaccination
- Noise Abatement—Nuisances
- Rent Act, 1968

and many other related subjects.

The Public Health Inspectors attend at the Environmental Health Section between 9 and 10 a.m. and from 4.30 to 5 p.m. and may be contacted at these times from Monday to Friday, or by appointment.

ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION — CLEAN AIR

The Clean Air Act, 1956, empowered local authorities, with the approval of the then Ministry of Housing and Local Government, to designate certain areas within their boundaries Smoke Control Areas.

In 1958 the Council started its phased Smoke Control Programme and, in 1967, was the first London Borough to complete that programme, having made 18 Smoke Control Orders covering 3,988 acres, affecting 72,559 premises.

After a Smoke Control Order has been made, it is an offence for any occupier of a building within a Smoke Control Area to permit the emission of smoke from a chimney in contravention of the Clean Air Act.

It is also an offence for any person to acquire for use in a Smoke Control Area any solid fuel other than an authorised fuel, or to sell by retail any solid fuel other than an authorised fuel for delivery by him or on his behalf, to a building in a Smoke Control Area. A person contravening an Order is liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding £20.

It is possible to prevent emission of smoke in any of the following ways:—

1. **BY BURNING ONLY AUTHORISED SOLID FUELS.** These include low volatile steam coals, Coalite, Phurnacite, Rexco, Sunbrite, Multi-heat, Homefire, Roomheat, Fireglow, Maxiglow and Coziglow. Gas Coke is no longer available owing to the shut-down of gas works producing this fuel. Some smokeless fuels are in short supply but increased production is planned to replace the Gas Coke. All fire grates and stoves at present in use should be suitable for burning these fuels and should, by now, have been adapted or replaced in order to do so with the aid of a Council grant of 7/10ths of the necessary cost. People who take up residence for the first time in a

Smoke Control Area and wish to adapt or convert any grate or stove which is normally used regularly, will not be eligible for a grant.

2. **BY USING FIXED APPROVED GAS, ELECTRIC, OR OIL APPLIANCES.**
3. **BY USING PORTABLE OR ELECTRIC APPLIANCES.**

Grants are not available to instal any of the above alternative appliances to replace fire grates and stoves.

The Public Health Inspector is the officer upon whom most of the work of smoke control falls. Industrial, trade, and residential buildings are all subject to control, and if legal proceedings have to be taken in Court, fines of up to £100 may be imposed for a conviction of industrial or trade premises.

Apparatus for measuring and recording the degree of pollution of the atmosphere has been set up in the Borough, and samples and readings are taken at regular intervals.

CERTIFICATES OF DISREPAIR

The Rent Act, 1968, limits the rent of a controlled dwelling. If the tenant of a controlled dwelling considers that the premises are in disrepair he may serve on the landlord a notice stating that the dwelling, or any part, is in disrepair because of defects specified in the notice; and that those defects ought reasonably to be remedied having due regard to the age, character, and locality of the dwelling.

If after six weeks the defects have not been remedied, or the landlord has not given an undertaking to do the work, the tenant may apply to the Council for a certificate of disrepair. Such application must be accompanied by a statutory fee of 12½p.

If the Council is satisfied that a dwelling, or part, is in disrepair, it will, after three weeks, issue a certificate of disrepair. This follows the service by the Council on the landlord of notice of intention to do so, unless it accepts an undertaking from the landlord in the meantime.

This certificate of disrepair entitles the tenant to pay a reduced rent as provided in the Act until such time as the certificate is cancelled.

Applications for certificates of disrepair must be made to the Environmental Health Services, 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6.

CONTROL OF RODENTS — RATS AND MICE

Five rodent operatives are employed in the Environmental Health Services. They work under the supervision of the Public Health Inspectors, and treat infestations of rats and mice. A charge is made for work carried out in commercial premises, but treatment at private houses is normally free.

It is the duty of the occupier of any premises to notify the local authority of any substantial rat or mice infestation. Enquiries regarding these matters should be addressed to the Environmental Health Services, 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6.

CONTROL OF RODENTS — OTHER PESTS

Enquiries for advice and help regarding the extermination of insect pests may be made to Environmental Health Services, 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6.

FACTORIES INSPECTION

The Public Health Inspectors are responsible for the Council's legal obligations in this sphere. Broadly speaking, their interest is in the health and comfort of the employee in the factory, and in this they co-operate with H.M. Inspector of Factories, appointed by the Secretary of State for Employment, who shares responsibility for the enforcement of the Factories Act. The address of H.M. Inspector of Factories is Charles House, 375 Kensington High Street, W.14, Tel. 603 4595.

Certain industrial diseases (e.g. lead poisoning in persons employed in painting buildings), must be notified to H.M. Inspector of Factories and to the Appointed Factory Doctor for the District.

Appointed Factory Doctors examine, where necessary, people up to the age of 18, and those employed in certain toxic processes. The doctors also investigate certain cases of industrial diseases and cases of injury or death reported to them by H.M. Inspector of Factories.

FOOD INSPECTION AND FOOD SAMPLING

It is the duty of the Council to check the purity and fitness of food and drugs for sale.

Samples of foods and drugs are taken, analysed and action taken over any contraventions.

Regular inspections of milk processing depots, food manufacturing premises, retail food shops, and catering establishments are made to ensure that proper standards of quality and hygiene are maintained.

HOUSING — Defective conditions, overcrowding, multiple occupation, means of escape in case of fire

Hammersmith Council and the Greater London Council have responsibilities to provide housing under the Housing Acts, for those in greatest need. A number of housing schemes have been completed since the war, and further schemes are in progress. About a quarter of the housing in the Borough is municipally owned.

Applications for re-housing should be addressed to the Housing Manager, London Borough of Hammersmith, 233 Hammersmith Road, W.6, Tel. 748 2077.

The local office of the Director of Housing of The Greater London Council is at 259 Harrow Road, W.2, Tel. 289 2221.

The Environmental Health Section is responsible for the administration of those parts of the Housing Acts relating to unfitness and disrepair, overcrowding and multi-occupied houses. The Inspectors also carry out house-to-house surveys in connection with possible General Improvement Areas under the Housing Act, 1969. The Council's objectives in such areas are to encourage the full repair and improvement of the houses, and to make environmental improvements.

The Housing Act, 1969, also enables a landlord, or agent, of a controlled tenancy to apply for a Qualification Certificate where a dwelling has, or will have, all the standard amenities and is in good repair having regard to its age, character and locality. The Qualification Certificate allows a fair rent to be registered by the Rent Officer and the controlled tenancy to be converted to a regulated one. Full details can be obtained from 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, Tel. 385 1212.

The Environmental Health Section is closely involved with the encouragement of applications for Improvement Grants, Standard Grants, and Special Grants (the latter relate to the provision of amenities in houses in multiple occupation). However, the main administration of these grants is carried out by the Home Improvement Officer, at 233 Hammersmith Road, W.6, Tel. 748 2077.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES — FACILITIES FOR EXAMINATION OF SPECIMENS

To assist correct diagnosis, the Council has made arrangements for examination of specimens sent in by doctors in doubtful or suspected cases of diphtheria, typhoid fever, food poisoning and dysentery. Further particulars regarding this service can be obtained from the Environmental Health Services at 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, Tel. 385 1212.

INSPECTION OF OFFICES AND SHOPS

Local authorities have responsibilities under the Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963, relating to the health, safety, and welfare of employees in shops and offices. Occupiers of new offices and shops covered by the Act are reminded of the need to register.

INTERNATIONAL CERTIFICATES OF VACCINATION

A person travelling abroad to certain countries is required to produce a certificate that he has been successfully vaccinated against specified diseases such as small-pox, yellow fever, cholera. Requirements vary according to the particular country and every person intending to travel abroad should, therefore, make certain what is required for his particular journey and ensure that the supporting certificates are correct in all details.

The travel agency, shipping company or airline through which travelling arrangements are being made will usually supply information of what is required, but in cases of doubt it is advisable to apply to the Embassy or Consulate of the particular country concerned. A list of representatives of other countries may be obtained from the Passport Office, Clive House, Petty France, London, S.W.1, Tel. 222 8010.

Apart from any requirement by a particular country, all people going abroad are advised to be vaccinated against typhoid. If they are going to those parts of the Far East where cholera occurs, they should be vaccinated against that disease also. And people going to visit or live in any country outside Europe, other than Canada or the United States of America, are advised to be vaccinated against poliomyelitis.

Vaccination (other than for yellow fever) may be carried out by a person's own doctor. It is available under the National Health Service but the doctor is entitled to charge a fee for some certificates, e.g. an International Certificate.

A yellow fever vaccination must, for international and technical reasons, be done only at a Centre designated by the Government. In London the following centres provide a service **BY APPOINTMENT ONLY**—

* These centres also undertake other vaccinations as well as vaccination against yellow fever.

At the No. 3 Yellow Fever Clinic and West London Designated Vaccinating Centre (above) facilities are provided for people travelling overseas: Immunisation against Smallpox, Typhoid, Cholera; X-rays; Health Certificates. Hours are 9.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays. Moderate fees are charged. Tel. 262 6456.

International Certificates may be prescribed for smallpox, yellow fever and cholera. The certificate for vaccination against yellow fever is issued at the Centre at which the vaccination has been carried out. International Certificates for the other two diseases should be obtained by the traveller himself and taken to his doctor when attending for vaccination. The Travel Agency will usually supply the necessary form but in case of difficulty it may be obtained from the Department of Health, Alexander Fleming House, Elephant & Castle, London, S.E.1, Tel. 407 5522.

Doctors may also supply these forms, and in genuine cases of emergency they can be obtained from Environmental Health Services, 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, **Tel. 385 1212.**

The doctor's signature on a vaccination certificate must be authenticated by the Director of Health Services. Certificates signed by doctors practising or residing in Hammersmith can be authenticated at the Town Hall, King Street, W.6, 233 Hammersmith Road, W.6, and 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, and the Old Town Hall, Fulham, without charge, during the normal office hours.

NOISE ABATEMENT — NUISANCES

The Noise Abatement Act, 1960, and other legislation, make a major contribution to quieter living. In certain circumstances, a local authority can take measures to abate noise. Further, any three persons, each of whom is the occupier of land or premises, and is in that capacity aggrieved by the nuisance, may make complaint to a magistrates' court.

RENT ACT, 1968

This Act, consolidated legislation concerning rent restriction and control. It is an offence for anyone to evict a tenant without a Court Order, or to try to drive him out by threats, violence, or any other interference. Complaints can be made to the police or to the Town Hall, Hammersmith, **Tel. 748 3020.**

There is a system for regulating rents in unfurnished accommodation let by private landlords up to a rateable value of £400 in Greater London and £200 elsewhere. Local Rent Officers have been appointed to help landlords and tenants to agree on fair rents. If they cannot agree with the Rent Officer, he will refer the case to the Rent Assessment Committee who will settle it after hearing both sides.

Furnished lettings are dealt with by Rent Tribunals, which are able to fix reasonable rents for lettings with rateable values up to £400 in Greater London. They can also give tenants security of tenure for six months, after notice to quit has been served.

Under the Landlord and Tenant Act, 1962, it is obligatory for all landlords to provide a rent book where the rent is payable weekly for furnished as well as unfurnished accommodation.

Legislation regarding rent control is very complicated and the above is only a brief summary of the main provisions. More detailed information may be obtained at the Town Hall or the Citizens' Advice Bureau, Cobb's Hall, Fulham Palace Road, S.W.6, **Tel. 385 1322**, but where legal action is contemplated a solicitor should be consulted.

DISPOSAL OF THE DEAD

Under the Births and Deaths Registration Act, 1953, the disposal of a dead person or stillborn child is prohibited except on a Registrar's certificate or Coroner's order.

Anyone effecting the disposal of a body must, within 96 hours of the disposal, notify the Registrar of Deaths of the date, place and means of disposal. A body may not be removed out of England without notice to the Coroner.

Note: See "Disposal of the Dead" on page 10 for details of disposal.

HEALTH LAUNDRY SERVICE

The Council has a service available for the cleansing of bed linen and clothing in such a condition as is deemed likely to be harmful to health. The service is mainly for incontinent patients, not necessarily old people, but is of great assistance where relatives care for old people at home. Generally, two deliveries of laundry are made in a week. Applications should be made direct to Environmental Health Service, 2/6 Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, **Tel. 385 1212.**

DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION

The premises also contain a Disinfecting Station for the treatment of verminous and infected articles. Disinfestation of rooms which are verminous is also undertaken by the staff of the Disinfecting Station.

MORTUARY AND CORONER'S COURT

The Council's Mortuary is in Fulham Palace Road, W.6, **Tel. 748 4913.** Free resting accommodation for bodies awaiting burial is available, with special arrangements for those of the Jewish faith.

SOCIAL SERVICES

GENERAL

Since 1st April, 1965, the London Borough of Hammersmith has administered the services for the blind, the elderly, and the disabled, which had been the responsibility of the former London County Council. Most of these services are provided under powers conferred by the National Assistance Act, 1948, the Chronically Sick and Disabled Persons Act, 1970 and other legislation.

A team of qualified and experienced social workers are under the direct control of the Director of Social Services, and an experienced administrative and professional staff supply the support necessary for their field-work colleagues.

All those who are blind, elderly, or physically-handicapped, and who are known to the various Services, are visited regularly by social workers who, when necessary, call for any other assistance needed.

The Domiciliary Services for the blind, elderly or physically-handicapped; and the Social Services for children, are as follows:—

ADAPTATIONS

These may be carried out to assist blind, elderly, or disabled people to cope with their handicaps at home. Such adaptations as ramps, wider doors, and banister or grab rails, are frequently requested.

AIDS, APPLIANCES, AND GADGETS

Certain aids, which make for easier living, are kept in stock; others may be obtained on request. Examples are white sticks and other walking aids, special cooking utensils, hoists, and many other similar articles.

CINEMAS

Cinemas in the Borough admit the elderly to seats in the stalls for a payment of 5p on production of their Retirement Pension or Supplementary Benefit Books. This concession is available from Monday to Friday until 4 p.m., but does not apply on Bank Holidays.

DEAF AND DEAF-BLIND

The Royal Association for the Deaf and Dumb are agents for the Borough in dealing with the deaf and the deaf-blind. The deaf have an excellent Social Centre in Old Oak Road, Hammersmith, W.12. Their church is there also. The deaf-blind meet on Wednesday afternoons at St. Vincent's, 49 Queen Caroline Street, Hammersmith, W.6.

EMPLOYMENT, OPEN OR SHELTERED, FOR THE BLIND OR DISABLED

The Department of Employment has, at its local offices, certain members of staff known as "Disablement Resettlement Officers". Their responsibilities include the registration of disabled people of employable age, whose names are entered on the "Disabled Persons' Register". They are helped in various ways—e.g. in securing alternative employment if they are incapable of following their normal occupations; or, possibly, by being sent on industrial rehabilitation or training courses to fit them for alternative employment.

The blind have similar facilities open to them and, in addition, can call upon the services, at local offices, of the "Blind Person's Disablement Resettlement Officer".

If the blind or disabled are not found suitable alternative employment under "Open" conditions—i.e. in the normal commercial or industrial professions or trades—they may be considered for "Sheltered" employment, i.e. in special workshops to which entry is reserved for them.

ENTERTAINMENTS

From time to time the Civic Entertainments Officer of the Council arranges special shows or social activities especially for the elderly. Publicity is given beforehand both on noticeboards and through the Clubs.

EXAMINATIONS FOR REGISTRATION AS BLIND OR DISABLED

In order to be entered on either Register, those persons suffering from defective vision who are thought to qualify for the Blind or Partially-Sighted Register, must have eye examinations carried out by an eye specialist approved, and paid, by the Borough.

Likewise, in order to qualify for entry on the Register of Disabled Persons kept by the Department of Employment (and thus obtain the many services of that Department), applicants must satisfy their requirements which may include examinations carried out by the Department's medical staff.

Blind children are the responsibility of the Council until they are two years of age, when the Inner London Education Authority arrange their education and training. At 16 they are either taught a trade (anyone likely to succeed may be trained for a profession), or are taken again under the wing of the Social Services.

FIREGUARDS

These are available on loan to families with children, the blind, and the elderly. Applications should be accompanied by recommendations that the fireguards are essential.

HANDICRAFTS

Instruction is given in various handicrafts both at home and at day centres. A "Handicrafts Shop" at 553/561 Fulham Road, Fulham, S.W.6 (next door to the Old Town Hall), stocks supplies of handicrafts materials and also sells the finished articles to the general public.

HOLIDAYS

Holidays for the blind, the elderly, and the physically-handicapped are arranged throughout the Summer months, from late May to September. The elderly must be able to walk. Small hotels at seaside resorts are chosen. Transport and luggage collection are also included in this service.

Recuperative holidays in which the emphasis is on rest, good food and fresh air are provided for adults, including expectant and nursing mothers

and children. Arrangements for such holidays for school children are normally made by the Medical Adviser to the Inner London Education Authority, usually at one of the Authority's holiday homes. The holidays are provided on medical recommendations which are subject to approval by the Director of Health Services.

In addition, holidays are arranged for those who attend the various training centres run by the Mental Health Services of many of the London Boroughs. These holidays, which have become well-known because they are the result of a co-operative effort, are referred to as "Training Centres Organised Holidays", and the place chosen is St. Mary's Bay Holiday Camp, Dymchurch, Kent.

HOME HELP SERVICE

Home Helps are provided during domestic emergencies, e.g. illness, confinement, or infirmity. The Home Help does the ordinary domestic work and the running of the family home, usually undertaken by the housewife. A limited service of Home Helps is also available to sit in with chronic sick patients at night. The charge is in accordance with family circumstances.

"Child Helps" can also be provided to live with the family during temporary absence of the parents because of sickness. Free home help is given to women suffering from toxæmia of pregnancy, so that they may rest as much as possible.

HOME TEACHING AND VISITING OF THE BLIND AND PARTIALLY-SIGHTED

The Council employ a Social Services Adviser for the Blind, Partially-Sighted, and Disabled. This officer is a well-qualified and widely experienced Home Teacher of the Blind, under whose guidance the blind, the partially-sighted, and the handicapped receive instruction in Braille and Moon and in Handicrafts. Help is also given in a variety of other ways, including advice on such diverse subjects as education and training; guide-dogs; outings and holidays; income-tax rebates; concession rates and discounts; post-war credits; rehabilitation courses (both social and industrial); and the hundred-and-one other things on which the blind, the partially-sighted, and the physically-disabled need a helping hand.

INCONTINENT LAUNDRY SERVICE

See "Health Laundry".

INVALID MEALS

These are provided where there is a proved need, and if the invalid produces a medically-certified diet sheet. About 100 meals a day are provided.

LIBRARY BOOKS

See "Library Service".

LICENCES (DOG AND WIRELESS)

Blind people may apply for exemption from payment of dog and radio licences. Further particulars may be obtained by applying to the Social Services Adviser for the Blind, 553 Fulham Road, Fulham, S.W.6, Tel. 385 1212.

LUNCHEON CLUBS

There are luncheon clubs for the elderly at a number of addresses in the Borough. They provide hot meals at low cost (8p); and allow the elderly to meet each other regularly and share club activities and enjoy companionship. The Clubs are:—

MEALS ON WHEELS

"Mobile Meals", enable the housebound to take advantage of the midday meal service, for the same charge as in the luncheon clubs. About 1,500 meals are supplied every day from Monday to Friday and, by means of these, useful contact is maintained with a great many elderly men and women who would otherwise not get one good meal a day, and whose other needs can easily become known. There is also a "Week-End Meals Service" for a small number who, without it, might easily go without cooked food from Friday lunch-time to Monday lunch-time.

MENTAL HEALTH

Social Workers are available to visit people suffering from mental illness and where necessary, in conjunction with the patients' doctors, may make arrangements for admission to hospital for observation or treatment. These social workers provide a 24-hour service and may be contacted as follows:—

A community care service is also provided which includes home visits, arranging hostel accommodation, recuperative holidays and general supportive help for those with psychiatric problems.

A Day Centre for 30/35 mentally-ill patients is held daily at Emlyn Gardens, W.12, with a social club on Wednesdays from 4.30 to 8.30 p.m. The "Open Door Club" is held at Bishop Creighton House, Lillie Road, S.W.6, every Tuesday from 7.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m.

MENTAL SUBNORMALITY

The Council also provides community care for the subnormal and severely subnormal and takes steps to secure admission to hospital, or guardianship, for long-term residential care if necessary. Short periods of residential care can be arranged during family crisis, i.e. when parents fall ill or during mother's confinement.

On 1st April, 1971 responsibility for the education of these children was undertaken by the Inner London Education Authority, who have taken over Fulham Junior Training Centre and Special Care Unit at Brook Green. The social work will continue to be undertaken by the Council's Social Services Department. The Adult Training Centre, College Park, N.W.10, remains Hammersmith's responsibility.

OUTINGS

River and coach trips are arranged, during the Summer, for blind, elderly and handicapped persons and, in the Winter, theatre and other entertainment visits. From time to time special shopping evenings are organised. Those who are on seaside holidays frequently enjoy trips to nearby resorts, and other excursions.

NURSERIES AND CHILD-MINDERS REGULATION ACT, 1948

This Act requires anyone who intends to open a private day nursery or, with few exceptions, a school for children under five years of age; to apply to the Council for registration. Any person who is not a relative and who undertakes the care of a child under 5 for more than 2 hours a day must notify the Social Services Department of their intention to do so.

REHABILITATION COURSES

Various courses are run for the blind, the partially-sighted, and the physically-handicapped. Some are residential and are undertaken by statutory bodies (e.g. the Department of Employment); or by voluntary agencies such as the Royal National Institute for the Blind. Other courses are non-residential.

Courses are either "Vocational" i.e. intended to enable those who attend them either to resume their former employment, or take up alternative work; or they are "Social", i.e. so organised that people can more easily come to terms with the problems of daily life, and undertake household tasks as easily as possible in their changed circumstances.

GENERAL

The Children's Services provide for the care and upbringing of children who have no parents; whose parents cannot look after them properly or who have been committed by the Courts to the care of the Council.

Further functions of the service are:

- the finding and supervision of foster homes for children in care;
- a wide range of adoption duties;
- a preventive service to promote the welfare of children by reducing the need for them to go into or remain in care or to appear before a juvenile court;
- the protection of children placed apart from their parents.

ILL-TREATMENT, NEGLECT OF CHILDREN

It is the duty of the service on being informed that a child may be in need of care or control:

(i) to inquire into the case, unless satisfied that such inquiries are unnecessary;

(ii) to bring before a juvenile court any child who appears to be in need of care or control which he will not receive unless the Court makes an appropriate Order.

Other Local Authority services and other statutory bodies notify the Social Services Department of cases where their intervention appears to be called for and the Department follows up such notifications, bearing in mind their duty to provide a preventive service intended to lessen the need for children to be removed from home. The main emphasis of this work is to help children and their parents by offering social work and other support. Parents are encouraged to seek advice from the Department about difficulties they experience with their children.

PROVISION FOR CHILDREN IN CARE

In general, the needs of those children who are received into care are met by placing them with foster parents or in residential homes. Some of the foster parents are in the Borough, but more are scattered in adjoining Boroughs and in the Home Counties. There is a continuing need for foster parents.

The residential homes owned by the Borough are mostly in and near Hammersmith. Arrangements are also made with voluntary and private homes for the care of children who are the Borough's responsibility, where these homes offer more appropriate facilities for a particular child.

FOSTER PARENTS

Anyone who becomes a foster parent by private arrangement with any other person is required by law to notify the Council 14 days beforehand or within 48 hours if the child is received in an emergency. The Council has a duty to supervise such private fostering arrangements.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE CARE OF CHILDREN

During office hours, normally 8.45 a.m. to 5 p.m., any applications for help should be addressed to the appropriate area office (see page). Outside office hours, however, if urgent action is needed for any child, the facts should be reported by telephone to the Borough's Duty Officer, Tel. 748 8588, who will contact the social worker on standby duty.

The duties outlined above used to be undertaken by the former Children's Officer and the Children's Service. They are now part of the responsibilities of the four Area Teams.

SOCIAL WORK

This covers a wide range of duties under the supervision of the Director of Social Services and his senior staff.

The day-to-day work is carried out by the four Area Teams and covers such diverse subjects as child care; home visiting on behalf of children, the blind, the partially-sighted, the elderly and the disabled; family case work; homeless families; mental health in the community; protection of property; receivership; and general Social and Welfare Work of many other kinds.

SURGICAL APPLIANCES

Items are lent for home nursing purposes (particulars are given under "Aids, Appliances and Gadgets"), but specific surgical appliances—artificial limbs, boots and such-like—are provided only through the National Health Service on the recommendation of a doctor.

A list of pharmaceutical chemists entitled to dispense medicines, supply drugs and appliances is given in the Medical Services Section of this Guide; and immediately after it, a list of "Suppliers of Appliances", and also a list of "Contractors equipped and staffed to provide trusses".

TALKING BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND DISABLED

The Talking Book Service for the blind is available to the registered blind, and a similar system now enables the house-bound disabled who can no longer read print to enjoy talking books at home.

TRANSPORT

Transport is in such demand and is used for such a variety of purposes that only a few can be mentioned here. They are:

These books, of which much greater use could and should be made, are available for use in private or residential homes; and can also be borrowed direct from Borough Libraries.

VISITING

Home visits are made for a great many reasons and Social Workers devote a large proportion of their time to this work. The principal work undertaken is of a health, social or welfare nature.

VOLUNTEER HELP SERVICE

The Borough has a Volunteer Help Service which encourages volunteers to help the blind, the elderly and disabled in such tasks as gardening, shopping, escort, transport in emergency, decorating. ORANGE CAR BADGES

A registered disabled person may apply for an orange car badge which can be affixed to a car windscreen or window which allows parking concessions in the Borough.

RESIDENTIAL SOCIAL SERVICES

Most Residential Social Services are provided under the National Assistance Act, 1948. They are administered by the Social Services, as distinct from the Health Services.

They are:

Flatlets for the Elderly

Certain of the Council's Homes have flatlets for the elderly. They are associated with the particular Home, the elderly tenants are admitted from the Council's housing list, and they may make use of the various amenities and facilities of the Home.

Flatlets for the Elderly — Warden/Caretaker Service

The Council also has certain flatlets for elderly people who are not too infirm. They are under the watchful eye of a Warden/Caretaker, who can provide any necessary services.

Homes for the Elderly (Local Authority)

The National Assistance Act, 1948, gave specific powers to local authorities to provide residential accommodation for the elderly, the infirm, and all those in need of care and attention.

The Council now has eight Homes, both in the Borough and outside it. Each is staffed by trained and experienced personnel.

The Homes make a charge for each resident, but the payment is calculated according to the individual's ability to pay.

HOMES FOR THE ELDERLY (VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS)

A large variety of Residential Homes are run by voluntary organisations. These include Homes for people in need of care and attention, but also for the blind, and those suffering from other handicaps. There are also Homes for those who belong to certain religious, professional, or similar organisations, e.g. Methodist Homes, Homes for Aged Seamen, and Homes for Ex-Service men and women.

Admission may be secured by residents in the Borough through the Council, which might, in case of need, subsidise the charge.

HOMES FOR THE DISABLED

There is no Home in Hammersmith specifically for the disabled, but talks have been going on with neighbouring Boroughs about the provision of a Home for the young disabled. At the moment a Home especially for the young disabled exists in the London Borough of Hounslow, but the quota of persons there for each London Borough concerned is strictly controlled.

HOMES FOR CHILDREN (LOCAL AUTHORITY)

Hammersmith, in common with similar local authorities, maintains a large number of children in homes of various kinds, e.g. Homes inside the Borough, Homes outside the Borough, and Stamford House* (which is a special case). There are children in reception homes, in residential nurseries, small family homes, and other types of Homes but, in almost every case, these are outside the Borough. There are children in other Inner London Authorities' establishments, in Educational Centres of the Inner London Education Authority, and in premises run by other Councils both in and out of London.

* See "Homes for Children" below.

HOMES FOR CHILDREN (PRIVATE AND VOLUNTARY)

These include children in establishments ranging from boarding special and boarding schools to hostels and homes for handicapped children, to foster parents, and in lodgings.

HOMES FOR CHILDREN (STAMFORD HOUSE)

Stamford House is the largest remand home and classifying centre in the country, and has accommodation for 130 boys. The needs of adolescent boys are assessed, usually following an appearance at one of the Inner London juvenile courts. Recommendations are made on treatment and placement, and full reports may be made to residential establishments to which boys can be sent.

HOMELESS FAMILIES

Families in danger of becoming homeless are helped by social workers. If it becomes necessary temporary accommodation is provided for homeless families. HOSTELS

The Greater London Council maintains hostels for men and women who are employed, studying, or training in London. It also maintains three lodging houses for men. For further particulars, application should be made to the Director of Housing, Greater London Council, County Hall, London, S.E.1, Tel. 928 5000.

HOSTEL FOR THE MENTALLY-ILL

Premises for this purpose, in which 8 to 10 residents with a warden could be accommodated, have been sought for a long time. A suitable address has now been found at 56 Harwood Road, Fulham, S.W.6, and it is hoped to have the premises ready for occupation at the end of 1971.

HURLINGHAM LODGE HOSTEL

Hurlingham Lodge Hostel is for 28 ambulant, homeless, infective, tuberculous men; and is one of three in London of which the others are in Islington and Lambeth. Residents who are fit to work are encouraged to find employment. Recommendations for admission are received from Chest Physicians in London, and also from hospitals inside and outside the London area. The address is:

MOTHER AND BABY HOMES

The Council, in conjunction with other Local Authorities and also with voluntary organisations, helps to find accommodation, and may accept financial responsibility, for unmarried mothers both before and after confinement.

TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION

GENERAL MEDICAL SERVICES

THE FAMILY DOCTOR

Everyone is entitled to a family doctor under the National Health Service. Most people have registered under the scheme, but there may be some who, having recently come to live in this country, or for some other reason, have not done so. It is advisable that everyone who has not already registered with a doctor should do so at once *and not wait until they are ill*. All that has to be done is to select a doctor who has agreed to provide general medical attention under the National Health Service: a list of doctors is available at every main Post Office, Public Library, and Town Hall Information Centres. Particulars of all doctors providing National Health Service in the Hammersmith area are included in this booklet (page 32). Having chosen a doctor, you should go to him and complete a form E.C.1.(REV.) which he will provide. He will need to know your National Health Service number (if you have one). If the doctor accepts you on his list, he will forward the form to the Executive Council who will issue to you a medical card. If the doctor you have chosen is unable to accept the registration, you can choose another, or ask the Executive Council* to put you in touch with one.

MEDICAL CARD

You should always take your medical card with you when you go for treatment. If you cannot produce it, the doctor is entitled to charge you a fee, but if you make a claim to the Executive Council* within a fortnight, you can have the fee refunded if the Council are satisfied that you are actually on the doctor's list. If you need a visit, please ask the doctor *early* in the day.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS

If you have moved to a new address and wish to continue with your existing doctor, you must tell him immediately of your new address, and ask him if he would visit you there if it were necessary. You should also let the Executive Council* have your new address. (See * Note at the end of "Availability of Health Service to Private Patients".)

If your doctor is not prepared to visit you, you should find yourself a new doctor, as described in the next paragraph.

- (i) by getting your present doctor's consent to the transfer; or
- (ii) by sending your medical card to the Executive Council* together with a letter stating your wish to transfer to the list of another doctor. The Council will return the card to you with slip (E.C.4B) fixed to it, showing the earliest date upon which the transfer can be made.

(Your doctor has a similar right, subject to certain conditions, to ask for your name to be removed from his list.)

ABSENCE FROM HOME

When you are on holiday, or away from home for any other reason for less than three months, you may, if necessary, apply to any local doctor providing general medical services under the National Health Service for treatment as a temporary resident. You should produce your medical card or be able to give your National Health Service number.

ACCIDENT OR EMERGENCY

If neither your doctor nor his deputy is available when required in cases of accident or other sudden emergency, you have the right to call any local doctor included in the Executive Council's list. During absence from home, or in cases of emergency when treatment is required, it should be made clear to the doctor attending that treatment is required under the National Health Service. Arrangements are made for patients to be attended in the absence of their own doctor. If you ask your own doctor what to do when he is away, he will tell you.

AVAILABILITY OF HEALTH SERVICE TO PRIVATE PATIENTS

Although a National Health Service doctor cannot treat you as a private patient while your name is included in his National Health Service list, the other services provided under the scheme (except the provision of drugs and appliances), are available to you.

You are, of course, quite free to choose to be or not to be on a doctor's list, but if you do not do so and prefer to receive private treatment, you will have to meet any fees incurred.

*** Note:** If you are in doubt on any question in connection with general medical services provided under the National Health Service, you should communicate with the Clerk to the Council, Inner London Executive Council, Insurance House, Insurance Street, WC1X 0JB, Tel. 01-837 7833.

DENTAL SERVICES

No authority or application form is required before you ask for treatment. Make an appointment with any dentist who provides treatment under the National Health Service Act. It is important to tell him that you wish to receive treatment under the National Health Service.

You will have to sign a form (E.C.17), which the dentist will provide, saying that you wish to have treatment under the Service. You will be asked to give your National Health Service number, which is on your medical card.

The dentist will give you an acknowledgement form that he has accepted you under the National Health Service.

The provision of partial dentures is authorised by the Dental Estimates Board only if the patient is willing to undergo treatment (such as fillings) which the dentist considers necessary. Some treatment and the normal repair of artificial teeth can be put in hand by the dentist at once, but other special, expensive, or prolonged treatment, and in certain cases the supply of dentures, cannot be started until the approval of the Dental Estimates Board is received.

Patients who are not exempt pay for half the cost of their dental treatment under the N.H.S. The maximum charge for any one course of treatment, including the cost of dentures, is £10.00. No payment is made for examination and report, repairs to dentures, or arrest of bleeding.

Everyone under 21 years of age, expectant mothers, and mothers who have had a child during the preceding twelve months are exempt from all charges on signing a declaration on the form E.C.17; except that young persons between 16 and 21, unless they are at school full-time, have to pay the charges for dentures.

If you require to be supplied with a denture or dentures you will be charged on the following scale:—

	<i>Amount</i>
1, 2 or 3 teeth (per denture)	£3.25
4-8 teeth (per denture)	£3.75
More than 8 teeth (per denture)	£4.25
Maximum for two dentures	£7.00

If you ask for something more expensive than the dentist considers necessary you will be asked to sign a document to confirm this and an additional fee will be payable. The dentist may ask you to pay your contribution in advance.

If a denture is lost, broken through carelessness, or becomes useless through not being worn, and has to be replaced you may be called upon to pay all or part of the cost.

If treatment is required by children under 16 then the parent or guardian signs on their behalf; and a relative or other person in charge can sign on behalf of someone too ill physically or mentally, to sign themselves. The statutory charges are payable for *each* course of treatment.

The maximum charge for dentures and other treatment is £10.00. A person who is unable to meet the charges *may apply for assistance to the Department of Social Security.*

OPHTHALMIC SERVICES

SIGHT TESTING

If his family doctor recommends it, a person is entitled to have his sight tested by an ophthalmic medical practitioner or ophthalmic optician whose name appears on an approved list prepared by the Executive Council (see below). The doctor's recommendation is only required on the first occasion. If it becomes necessary for a person to have his sight re-tested he may consult the ophthalmic medical practitioner or ophthalmic optician without a doctor's certificate.

SUPPLY OF SPECTACLES

When a patient's sight has been tested the doctor or optician will send a form (O.S.C.2) to the Executive Council which will return part of the form to the patient. This should be taken to any ophthalmic or dispensing optician whose name appears on the Ophthalmic List.

A person of 16 years of age or over is required to pay towards the cost of his glasses. The statutory charges payable for single vision and bifocal lenses are related to the power and types of lenses prescribed, subject to a maximum of £3.50 per lens. A charge is made for the supply of a N.H.S. frame. The charge varies from £0.76 to £1.80 depending on the frame chosen. A patient may request N.H.S. lenses in a privately-supplied frame (for which he must pay the appropriate cost), providing it has surrounding protective rims conforming to N.H.S. lens shapes. If such a frame is of metal or metal-combination type, the optician may charge extra for glazing, or any subsequent re-glazing.

Children under 16 years or older children receiving full-time school education may be supplied (without charge for lenses or frames) with glasses using standard children's frames.

Children aged ten or more and either under 16 years, or aged 16 and over who are still receiving full-time school education, may be supplied with lenses without charge if these are fitted to any adult-type National Health Service frame.

A person who is unable to meet the cost of spectacles may apply for assistance to the Department of Social Security. Full details on claiming exemption, or assistance in meeting dental or optical charges may be found in the Department's Leaflet F.11.

PHARMACEUTICAL SERVICES

DRUGS, MEDICINES AND APPLIANCES

There are arrangements to ensure that every person receiving treatment from a doctor or from a dentist can obtain drugs, medicines, or appliances prescribed by the doctor or dentist. (If, however, a patient has a private doctor, i.e. a doctor who has not accepted him under the National Health Service Scheme, he will have to pay for them in full.)

As in the case of doctors, dentists and opticians, the Executive Council maintains a list of chemists who will dispense medicines, and supply drugs and appliances in connection with the service. Particulars of chemists in Hammersmith included in the list are given below:—

List of Pharmaceutical Chemists (entitled to dispense medicines, supply drugs and appliances)

MINIMUM HOURS OF BUSINESS

All places of business on the pharmaceutical list are normally required to be open for the supply of drugs and appliances on the days and at the following hours:—

Weekdays (other than early closing days and

Public Holidays) 9 a.m.—6 p.m.
(with an optional hour's closing for lunch)

Early closing days ... 9 a.m.—1 p.m.

Where necessary one or more chemists are open in certain districts until 7 p.m. and particulars of these arrangements will be found on the cards exhibited at chemists' premises.

Urgent prescriptions can also be dispensed after normal "Rota" hours provided the doctor marks the prescription "Urgent" and enters the time of issue. These chemists are marked "U". A non-urgent prescription which requires immediate dispensing between 12 midnight and normal opening hours may be dispensed by chemists on this list. The applicant will be

requested to confirm the date and time of dispensing by signing the prescription. This is a voluntary service established to help doctors and the public in times of REAL EMERGENCY ONLY. A list of such chemists has been made available to all doctors, police stations, town halls and information centres in the London area.

REVISED CHARGES

Regulations implementing the new National Health Service charges came into operation on 1st April, 1971.

Flat rate prescription charge of 12½p has been raised to 20p, except for elastic hosiery, which now costs 25p for an anklet, legging, kneecap or thigh piece, and 50p for a stocking (£1 a pair).

The new cost of a prepayment certificate, entitling the holder to claim exemption from charges for all prescriptions, is £2 for six months and £3.50 for a year. The old cost was £1.50 for six months and £2.75 for 12 months.

Exemption of charges for those in low-income categories is continued and extended.

The 20p prescription charge is an interim measure. Cost-related charges, but with a ceiling, were being considered at the time this Guide went to press.

From 1st April the following charges were introduced for hospital out-patients: bespoke wigs £7.50; stock wigs £2.50.

For dental treatment, patients now pay about half the cost, subject to a ceiling of £10. The initial examination and repairs to dentures continue to be free.

The old charge for full dentures was £6.25. The new charge is £7 in most cases.

Sight testing continues to be free, but charges for lenses have been increased to cover, broadly, their total cost. The charge will vary according to the nature and power of the lens, but a maximum charge of £3.50 a lens and £3.85 for contact lenses has been set.

Help with health service charges on income grounds is available from the local office of the Department of Health and Social Security.

The following are examples of gross income levels up to which people now qualify for exemption from prescription charges and full remission of charges for dentures, dental treatment, glasses, wigs and fabric support.

Allowance of about 35p (7s) has been made for rent and expenses in connection with employment.

HOSPITAL AND ALLIED SERVICES

GENERAL HOSPITALS

Responsibility for hospital treatment for Hammersmith residents rests upon the North-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, the South-West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, and the Boards of Governors for Hammersmith and St. Mark's Hospitals, and the Charing Cross Group of Hospitals.

A patient is admitted as an in-patient:—

- (a) By his own doctor ringing or writing to the hospital, stating the nature of the case, and requesting admission.
- (b) By a hospital consultant recommending admission if the patient has been attending one of the out-patient clinics.
- (c) From the Casualty Department, if the patient has attended there as a result of an accident, or emergency; and it is deemed advisable to admit at once.
- (d) As emergency by
 - (i) The patient's doctor ringing the hospital;
 - (ii) The patient's doctor ringing the Emergency Bed Service.

Hospital treatment under the National Health Service is provided free of charge. A number of beds, however, are available in single rooms or small wards for (a) patients prepared to pay the full cost for private beds, and (b) patients who need privacy in hospital for reasons other than medical needs.

Any person prepared to pay the full cost should ask his family doctor to arrange this through the hospital consultant. Not all hospitals have private pay beds and their availability depends on whether such beds are needed by patients primarily on medical grounds.

Charges for full-cost beds, when provided, vary in different hospitals according to the actual costs involved.

Where amenity beds are available, the charges are fixed at a maximum of 150p per day for a bed in a single room and 75p per day for a bed in a room with two or more beds.

To ensure the admission to hospital of an infectious patient, the doctor must leave at the house a certificate stating the name, age, sex and address of the patient and the disease from which the patient is suffering. This certificate should be collected by the ambulance attendant.

The Fulham Chest Clinic, which has full X-Ray facilities, is also at Western Hospital.

The South-West London Chest X-Ray Service, (Mass X-Ray), is also based at Western Hospital. Further particulars of this Service, and of the Chest Clinic, are to be found on page 49.

Queen Charlotte's is a maternity hospital of international repute. It is linked with Chelsea Hospital for Women to form a postgraduate teaching hospital.

Women seeking admission are seen by appointment only. Patients booked for admission attend normal ante-natal clinics which are conducted each morning and afternoon, from Monday to Friday, Bank Holidays excepted. A consultant is in attendance and prospective patients are expected to bring with them a letter from their own doctors.

Every effort is made to admit emergency cases where hospital treatment is required, but it is frequently impossible to take patients suffering from threatened or actual miscarriages.

The out-patients facilities of the hospital are available to general practitioners requiring a consultant's opinion, notwithstanding the fact that the patient concerned does not require to be booked for hospital confinement.

The hospital is hoping to arrange Family Planning Clinics in 1971. For particulars of these, reference should be made to Family Planning elsewhere in this Guide.

ATTENDANCE AT HOSPITALS

Transport

Where a patient has to attend hospital for treatment and is unable, for medical reasons, to walk there, or use public transport, application for transport to and from the hospital may be made to the London Ambulance Service by the patient's doctor for the first attendance. For subsequent attendances, if still necessary, arrangements for transport will normally be made by the hospital

Expenses in attending hospital

Where a patient has to attend hospital and is unable to pay the cost of public transport, application for assistance in paying fares may be made to the local office of the Department of Health and Social Security. In such cases the patient should first apply to the Medical Social Workers of the particular hospital for the special form on which application is made.

Where a person has to visit a relative in hospital and cannot afford the fare for public transport, application should be made to the Medical Social Workers of the particular hospital, who may be able to assist.

Escorting patient to hospital

Where a patient has to attend hospital but is unable to find anyone to accompany him (e.g. in cases of blindness), escorts can sometimes be obtained by applying to voluntary associations such as the Women's Royal Voluntary Service. In case of difficulty, application for an escort can be made to the Medical Social Workers of the particular hospital concerned.

Personal problems connected with hospital attendance

Where a patient attending or entering a hospital has personal or social problems connected with his illness he should ask to see the Medical Social Workers for the Department concerned.

DISEASES OF THE CHEST

HAMMERSMITH CHEST CLINIC

All aspects of respiratory disease and the tuberculosis problem are dealt with at, and can be referred to, the Chest Clinic, Hammersmith Hospital. The administration of the Clinic is the responsibility of the Board of Governors, Hammersmith and St. Mark's Hospitals. It is a unit within the Royal Postgraduate Medical School and takes part in the teaching of postgraduate students. Two consultant physicians supervise the clinical work.

The Clinic, its associated radiography facilities, and 27 beds, are housed in the same building and are run as an integral unit. A consultant diagnostic service for all chest diseases is provided for local doctors who may send patients for full consultation (with letter of introduction); or for x-ray only (by special form of reference). This latter service provides a rapid means of obtaining a chest radiograph without the formality of being examined by a hospital physician.

Out-patients are seen (by referral and appointment), from 9.00 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. A tuberculosis contact clinic is held from 5.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m. on Mondays and babies are seen for vaccination on Tuesdays between 2.00 p.m. and 4.00 p.m. The "X-Ray only" service (without appointment), is held daily from Monday to Friday between 9.00 a.m. and 11.00 a.m.

During the treatment, rehabilitation, and re-settlement of cancer, bronchitic, and tuberculous patients, many social and financial problems arise. To provide adequate help and advice in these circumstances, a fully-equipped social welfare department forms an integral part of the Chest Clinic service. This department is in the hands of a Medical Social Worker, who is in contact with many statutory and voluntary agencies through which advice and assistance can be provided.

A comprehensive management scheme for patients with chronic respiratory illnesses, including tuberculosis, is in operation in Hammersmith. Patients are treated as out-patients and visited in their own homes by the Health Visitors of the Clinic. Visits to the Clinic are arranged by ambulance if need be, and patients are admitted as necessary to the associated beds for investigation, chemotherapy, and thoracic surgery.

Pre-vaccination clinic skin test is done on the last Friday in every month. Post-vaccination skin test is done on the second and third Fridays in the month. Patients are both X-rayed and seen by the doctor at the one appointment.

Patients can only be seen by appointment, by letter or telephone to the clinic. In addition, a letter from the patient's doctor is necessary.

Welfare Services are provided for patients at the clinic, and advice and assistance on patient's personal, domestic, and financial problems.

Health Visitors are attached to the clinic and visit patients' homes to check on contacts (in the case of T.B.) and advise on various problems arising from chest disease. This service, of course, covers the whole of the Borough.

THE SOUTH-WEST LONDON CHEST X-RAY SERVICE

The following centres in South-West London provide **FREE CHEST X-RAY** examinations for anyone of fifteen years and over, regardless of where they work or live.

Every Monday (2 to 4.30 p.m. and 5 to 7 p.m.) a mobile unit is stationed outside Dibden House, Maida Vale, W.9, on the corner of Carlton Vale. No appointment is necessary. People wanting to be X-rayed should be over the age of 15 and should take prepaid self-addressed envelopes for confidential results to be posted to their private addresses.

The Board has also established a static unit at the Central Middlesex Hospital, Acton Lane, N.W.10, Tel. 965 5733. Members of the public may attend on Mondays to Fridays between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. and on Saturdays between 9 a.m. and 12 noon. There is also a static unit at the West Middlesex Hospital, Isleworth, Tel. 560 2121, open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays. No appointments are necessary and there are no special sessions for men and women.

The South-West London Chest X-Ray Service have a Central Chest X-Ray Centre at the Western Hospital, Seagrave Road, Fulham, S.W.6, Tel. 385 9311, of which particulars are given above.

Ante-natal patients and children under 15 can only be X-rayed on a doctor's recommendation, and special appointments are necessary, which can be obtained by telephoning 385 9621.

RHEUMATISM

West London Hospital Rheumatism Department

This department for the treatment of rheumatic diseases is attached to the West London Hospital, Hammersmith Road, W.6, and out-patient sessions are held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays each week starting at 9.30 a.m.

New patients should apply for an appointment Tel. 748 5810. A doctor's letter should be brought by the patient. Eight beds in the hospital are at the disposal of the Rheumatism Department.

Hammersmith Hospital Rheumatology Unit

AMBULANCE SERVICE

In these circumstances ambulances can only be ordered by doctors, hospitals or other authorised people.

Mothers booked for admission can **DIAL 999** for an ambulance. Otherwise, only doctors, hospital staff or midwives can call an ambulance.

SOCIAL WELFARE

NATIONAL INSURANCE SCHEME

Under the National Insurance Act, 1946, the Government has accepted responsibility for insuring everyone against *"The main attacks which economic ill-fortune can launch against the individual well-being and peace of mind"*. The insurance scheme applies in general to everyone over school-leaving age.

There are three classes of insured persons under the Act—employed people, self-employed, and the non-employed. They all pay weekly contributions, which vary according to the category. The bulk of the contributing population fall in the "Employed" category for whom the weekly flat-rate contributions are:—

Graduated contributions for employees aged 18 or over range from 1p for those earning just over £9 per week to 97p for those earning £30 or more per week. The employer pays an equal amount. Graduated contributions, which are collected with P.A.Y.E. income tax, count only for the graduated part of the retirement pension.

The graduated part of the pension is at the rate of 2½p for every £7.50 (£9 for a woman), of graduated contributions paid personally by the employee.

REDUNDANCY PAYMENTS SCHEME

Employees with at least two years' service who become redundant and satisfy certain conditions are entitled to receive payment from their employers.

The money from employers' contributions (collected with national insurance contributions) goes into a central fund, from which a redundancy payment may be reclaimed.

Employees will not have to pay anything towards the cost of the scheme.

Employers must tell their local offices of the Department of Social Security at least two weeks before redundant employees are dismissed—and four weeks in advance if ten or more employees are entitled to payment.

The local Social Security office will be pleased to answer enquiries about contribution rates. Enquiries about the Redundancy Payments Scheme should be made at any local office of the Department of Social Security.

BENEFITS

The National Health Service provides medical treatment and attention for all persons whether insured or not. The National Insurance and Industrial Injuries Schemes provide cash benefits, under certain circumstances, in return for regular weekly contributions. The following benefits are provided:—

HOW TO CLAIM BENEFITS

Claims for benefit should be made immediately circumstances give rise to entitlement to it. Forms are provided on which claims to benefits can be made and, to avoid delay in payment, these should be carefully completed, dated, and signed.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE VARIOUS BENEFITS

SICKNESS BENEFIT

On becoming incapable of work you should ask your doctor, when he examines you, for a national insurance medical certificate (Form Med.3). This certificate may take either of two forms. It may be a "Closed" certificate, which will cover any number of days up to but not exceeding seven and will give the day on which, in your doctor's opinion, you will be fit to return to work. Or it may be an "Open" certificate, which will cover a period of days or weeks not exceeding 28 days* during which, in your doctor's opinion, it is expected that you will remain incapable of work. You should read the instructions on the certificate and fill in the appropriate sections on the front and back.

You must always enter your name, address, and national insurance number in the spaces provided on the front of the certificate. If the certificate is the first in your present illness, you should also complete Sections A and C on the back of the certificate; and also Section B if you think that your incapacity is due to an injury at work or to one of the prescribed industrial diseases. If you wish to claim an increase for dependants remember to mark the certificate in the space provided on the back.

If the certificate is not the first, you should only complete the spaces which apply to you on the front of the certificate. The completed certificate should be sent at once to your local Social Security office. When you do this you will be claiming benefit for the period covered by the certificate.

*** Note:** If you are still unfit for work after four weeks and your doctor thinks your illness may be prolonged he may issue a certificate covering a period as long as 13 weeks.

The standard weekly rates are:—

Men, single women and widows, aged 18 and over	— £6.00
Married women aged 18 and over	— £4.20
Young people under age 18	— £3.30

The rates of personal benefit may be increased by earnings-related supplement and can also be increased for dependants.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES — CONTACTS AND CARRIERS

If you are stopped from working on the certificate of a Medical Officer of Health of a local authority and are under medical observation because you are a carrier, or have been in contact with a case of infectious disease, you are regarded as being incapable of work and can be paid sickness benefit. Special arrangements can be made if you are placed in quarantine.

You should not ask your doctor for a national insurance medical certificate in such circumstances. All he can do is to put you in touch with the Medical Officer of Health.

UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFIT

On your first day of unemployment you should report to your nearest Department of Employment Office or, if under 18 years of age, to the Youth Employment Office, and claim benefit on the form provided. MATERNITY BENEFITS

There are two maternity benefits—maternity grant and maternity allowance. Both benefits may be paid for a confinement provided the conditions are satisfied.

Maternity Grant

This is a lump sum payment of £25, and may be claimed at any time from nine weeks before the week in which a baby is expected to three months after its birth. The grant is paid if you or your husband satisfy the contribution conditions for it or if you satisfy the contribution conditions for maternity allowance.

It is also paid for a still birth if pregnancy lasted at least 28 weeks, and can be paid for *each* baby born at a confinement provided *each* survives.

Maternity Allowance

Unless you have been working and paying full flat-rate national insurance contributions at some time during the 15 months before your baby is due you can qualify only for maternity grant.

If you have worked and paid the necessary contributions you may qualify for the maternity allowance. This allowance—

- Can be claimed only on your own insurance.
- Is normally paid for the 18 weeks starting with the 11th week before the week in which the baby is expected.
- Is not payable for any days or weeks of paid work.
- Should be claimed not earlier than the 14th and not later than the 11th week before the week in which the baby is expected.
- May be increased by allowances for dependants.

How to claim

The form to use for claiming is BM4. You can get a copy from your local Social Security Office or from a Maternity or Child Health Clinic. Full instructions are given on the form about when you should send it to the Department's local office and what to send with it. One thing which you are asked to send with your claim is a certificate from a midwife or doctor. This is form Mat B1 if you claim before confinement of Mat B2 if you claim after confinement. You can, however, send the baby's birth certificate instead of the Mat B2.

RETIREMENT PENSIONS

You will usually receive a claim form four months before minimum pension age (65 for men and 60 for women), whether or not you intend to retire at that age. The form must be completed and referred to your local Social Security Office as soon as possible and, in any event, not later than one month after the date you wish to be considered retired.

WIDOW'S BENEFIT

Claim forms are available at the local Social Security Office, and claims should be made there within three months of the husband's death. When the death is registered, the Registrar of Deaths will normally provide a special death certificate (free of charge). If available, the marriage certificate, widow's birth certificate and, if the widow has only one child, the child's birth certificate, should also be sent with the claim.

CHILD'S SPECIAL ALLOWANCE

This is a benefit for women whose marriages have been dissolved or annulled. It is paid on the death of a former husband if the woman has a child towards whose support he was contributing, or was liable to contribute.

The rate of the allowance is £2.95 per week for the first child, £2.05 for the second, and £1.95 for each other child.

Claim forms can be obtained from the local Social Security Office, and claims should be made within three months of the former husband's death. If available, marriage certificate, evidence of divorce, and of payments by the former husband should also be sent.

GUARDIAN'S ALLOWANCE

Claims should be made within three months of the date on which the claimant becomes entitled to the allowance. If a claim is late, payment of the allowance will normally be made only from a date three months before the date on which the claim was made.

Forms of application are obtainable from the local Social Security Office, and they should be completed and returned without delay. The rate for each child is usually £2.95 per week.

DEATH GRANT

A death grant is payable on the death of an insured man, his wife, child, or widow; or of an insured woman, her husband, child, or widower. It is normally paid to the personal representative (executor or administrator), or next of kin, or to the person who paid the funeral expenses. When the death is registered the Registrar of Deaths will normally provide a special death certificate free of charge; and this should be taken or sent to the local Social Security Office, with the deceased's National Insurance Card, birth and marriage certificates (where applicable), and the undertaker's account or estimate if these are available.

INDUSTRIAL INJURY AND DISABLEMENT

The Industrial Injuries Scheme provides special insurance for employed people against accidents at work, or against certain prescribed industrial diseases. There are three main types of benefit: Injury, Disablement, and Death. Full details of these are given in a series of leaflets obtainable at local Social Security Offices.

Any person who meets with an accident at work should report it at once to his employer. This is extremely important.

MISCELLANEOUS BENEFITS AND OTHER INFORMATION SUPPLEMENTARY BENEFITS

The Supplementary Benefits Commission is required to assist people of 16 years of age and over who are not engaged in full-time work and who are without resources; or whose resources (including benefits and pensions receivable under the National Insurance Acts), are insufficient for their needs. Supplementary Benefit is calculated in accordance with Regulations approved by Parliament.

Able-bodied persons between 16 and 65 years (60 in the case of women), are required to register at the local office of the Department of Employment. Those who wish to claim may do so by submitting Form O.1, obtainable from any Post Office. If registration is undertaken at the local office of the Department, Form B.1 will be completed on request. If there is any urgency a call should be made at the local office.

Dependants of a claimant for Supplementary Benefit will be included in the allowance on the scales authorised. Special scales are provided for persons registered blind.

Those who, for age or other good reasons, are not available for work are paid by Order Book cashable at a Post Office. Those available for work are paid at the local offices of the Commission.

The rent paid, up to a reasonable amount, is taken into account when a claimant's needs are calculated. When the claimant has a non-dependant living with him, a contribution not exceeding the non-dependant's share of the rent is assumed.

Payment for charges under the National Health Service Act—i.e. for dentures, spectacles or prescriptions—as well as the cost of fares to visit hospitals for treatment, can be made to persons in receipt of Supplementary Benefit; and to persons whose income is near this level. In addition to the normal scales, special allowances can be given to meet extra needs due to illness, e.g. especially nourishing foods, extra fuel, laundry charges, and similar items.

A person who has previously applied for Supplementary Benefit and found to be ineligible, may qualify for it due to a change in his financial circumstances, e.g. by an increase in his rent, or fall in other income, or combination of such things.

FAMILY ALLOWANCES

These are cash payments to families with two or more children. The rates are £0.9 per week for the second child below the age limits, and £1 per week for the third and for each younger child. No allowance is payable for the first (or only), child below the age limits.

The age limits are 15 years for children who leave school at that age; 16 for certain incapacitated children; and 19 for children who remain at school, or are apprentices.

Special leaflets and claim forms for Family Allowances are obtainable from any local Social Security Office. They cannot be paid for any period more than six months before the date on which a claim is made.

DIVORCED WOMEN AND WIDOWS

There are special rules for women whose marriages have been dissolved or annulled, and also for certain widows, to help them to qualify for sickness and unemployment benefits, or for retirement pensions. Full particulars may be obtained from the local Social Security Office.

NEW ATTENDANCE ALLOWANCE

A new Attendance Allowance is now paid for very severely-disabled persons who need day and night attention. Up to 50,000 people are expected to qualify for this new benefit of £4.80 per week tax-free. Typical cases would be disabled housewives and children over two years of age. Full particulars may be obtained from the local office of the Department of Health and Social Security.

RELATED SERVICES

HOUSING

Both the Hammersmith Council and the Greater London Council have responsibilities in regard to housing under the Housing Acts, and both are actively engaged in providing accommodation for those in the greatest need. A number of housing schemes in different parts of the Borough have been completed during the post-war years and further schemes are in progress.

In Hammersmith at the present time the Borough Council acts as landlord for nearly 12,000 principal tenants. The properties managed include houses, flats, pre-fabs and acquired accommodation.

RATE REBATES

A tenant or owner-occupier whose income is small and whose rates are not already fully covered by Supplementary Benefit may qualify for rate rebate. You may do so if your recent gross income averages no more than—

£10 a week if you are single, widowed, separated, or divorced;

or

£12.25 a week if you are married plus, in either case, £2 a week for each dependent child.

The rebate is normally two-thirds of the amount by which your rate, or the rates included in your rent, in the half-year exceeds £3.75.

You can apply at any time after 1st August for the October-March rating period; and at any time after 1st February for the April-September period.

Every birth must be notified within 36 hours to the Director of Health Services, Old Town Hall, Fulham Broadway, S.W.6, by the doctor, the father (if in residence at the time of birth), or by any person in attendance at the time of birth or within six hours after.

THIS NOTIFICATION IS IN ADDITION TO THE REGISTRATION OF THE BIRTH, which must be carried out within six weeks.

PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS — ROAD SAFETY

Every year in this country over 20,000 people die quite unnecessarily and of these, very nearly 7,000 die on our roads — approximately 20 every day or one every hour!

Hammersmith has an active Road Safety Committee, consisting of Council members and representatives from other interested bodies. A full-time Road Safety Officer with an Assistant Road Safety Officer are employed and among the many road safety facilities offered to the public are children's cycle training and testing, and talks to clubs and organisations. "Tufty" clubs for children under the age of five, film shows, loan of suitable films, supply of posters and literature, exhibitions, organised visits to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents Training Centre — all these are available on request.

Pre-driver and motor cycle training are given in senior schools and advanced driving courses are held regularly. An R.A.C./A.C.U. Training Scheme Centre for learner motor-cyclists and scooter-riders is organised at 233 Hammersmith Road, W.6 every Saturday from 2.30 p.m.— 5.30 p.m. Practical driving or riding are the main features of these courses.

The Section also carries out accident analyses to try to find out the causes of road accidents at specific spots.

At national level the Council co-operates with the Department of the Environment, the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, Police Forces, and with all other bodies interested in road safety.

PUBLIC BATHS AND LAUNDRY SERVICES

Lime Grove Baths, Shepherds Bush, provides facilities for bathing (slipper baths), showers, swimming and laundry work.

The Fulham Baths, North End Road, provides facilities for bathing (slipper baths), showers, swimming and laundry work.

The Sands End Baths, Wandsworth Bridge Road, provides for bathing (slipper baths), showers and laundry work.

There are two swimming pools in the summer and one in the winter at the Lime Grove Baths and three swimming pools in the summer and two in the winter at Fulham Baths. In addition to adequate public swimming sessions, space is allocated in all pools to the Inner London Education Authority who employ qualified swimming teachers to give instruction to organised school classes.

Evening sessions up to 10 p.m. are provided for hire of pools to local swimming clubs and other organisations for training and recreation. The pools may also be hired for galas, and are the centre of many local and school events, particularly during the summer months.

From mid-October to the end of March, one indoor pool at the Lime Grove Baths and another at the Fulham Baths are converted into use as public halls and are available for hire for meetings, concerts and dances. Certain periods are available for badminton and indoor bowls at Lime Grove and for bowls and table tennis at Fulham. In addition, facilities are available at the Lime Grove Baths for the staging of boxing and wrestling promotions.

The open-air bathing pool at Bloemfontein Road, Shepherds Bush, W.12, provides during the summer months facilities for swimming and sun-bathing and is open daily, including Sundays, from late May to the end of August or later according to weather conditions.

The water in all swimming and bathing pools undergoes continuous purification and sterilisation by means of filtration and chlorination, thus ensuring a high standard of hygiene and safety. In addition, the indoor pools are automatically controlled to give a water temperature of 24 to 25 degrees Centigrade at all times.

PARKS AND CEMETERIES

There are a number of parks and open spaces for public enjoyment in Hammersmith.

In the Hammersmith area there are Wormwood Scrubs (total area 190.62 acres), which is maintained by the Greater London Council, Little Wormwood Scrubs (21.65 acres), Shepherds Bush Common (7.52 acres), Brook Green (4.60 acres), Hammersmith Park, White City Estate (7.23 acres), Ravenscourt Park (32.44 acres), Wormholt Park (8.40 acres), Wendell Park (4.26 acres), Furnivall Gardens (4.54 acres), St. Peter's Square (1.58 acres) and a number of smaller open spaces with a total area of 6.21 acres, all of which are maintained by Hammersmith Council.

In the Fulham area, Bishops Park (26.75 acres) has a Summer Theatre with seating accommodation for 1,500 people and Pryor's Bank Pavilion is used to provide refreshments. Other open spaces are South Park (20.4 acres), Lillie Road Recreation Ground (8.675 acres), Langford Gardens (0.95 acres), Gwendwr Gardens (0.83 acres), Margravine Playground (0.62 acres), Eelbrook Common, Parsons Green Open Space, Hurlingham Park and Normand Park, all of which again are maintained by the London Borough of Hammersmith.

Tennis courts, bowling green, children's play areas and similar facilities are available in several parks, and football, cricket and other

games amenities are provided in Bishop's Park, South Park, Lillie Road Recreation Ground, and in Wormwood Scrubs. For further particulars on the facilities available, application should be made to the Manager, Parks and Cemeteries, Bishop's Park, Fulham, S.W.6 (Tel. 736 7152/3 and 736 4728).

CEMETERIES

Interments at Margravine Road Cemetery can only be arranged in existing private graves; no further burial space is available. This also applies to Fulham Palace Road Cemetery, except that there is a limited number of non-private graves available. Only interments of residents of the Borough are permitted in these non-private graves.

CREMATION

Cremation is regarded by many as a desirable alternative to earth burial, and to meet the demand for this form of disposal of the dead, the Borough Council, in conjunction with some other West London Boroughs, opened a Crematorium in 1939.

The Crematorium adjoins the Hammersmith Cemetery. The main entrance is by way of Townmead Road, off Mortlake Road for vehicles, but pedestrian access is available through the Hammersmith Cemetery, and the 290 bus service (every day including Sundays) from King Street, Hammersmith, is the most convenient one to use.

The site covers some six-and-a-half acres, of which some three-and-a-half acres have been laid out as a Garden of Remembrance. In the centre of the Garden, a formal flower garden has been laid out; paths run through the Garden and seats have been provided so that people may rest and meditate amidst the quiet charm. The Chapel has seating for 135 persons. In it any form of religious service or ceremony desired by the relatives may be conducted. Church of England and Nonconformist Chaplains are available, but anyone appointed by the relatives may act.

There are within the Chapel Books of Remembrance which provide a lasting record of those cremated. Miniature copies of the Books are also available.

LEGAL PROBLEMS

If you want advice on any document which you do not understand you should see a solicitor without delay. If you are worried about family matters (including divorce), a landlord and tenant problem, a hire purchase agreement, a motoring offence, a right of way over your land, or any other matter relating to the law, you may need to obtain Legal Advice without delay.

If you are over the age of 16 you may obtain Legal Advice from a solicitor whose name is on The Law Society's Legal Advice Panel list. But you must tell the solicitor before the interview, or at the very beginning of the interview, that you are seeking his advice under one of the Legal Advice Schemes.

If you cannot go to see the solicitor yourself because you are ill or for some other reason, then you can ask a friend or relative to go and discuss your problem for you.

How to get Legal Advice

You can go to see a solicitor in his own office, but you must choose one whose name is on the Legal Advice Panel list.

You can see a list of the solicitors on the Panel at Citizens' Advice Bureaux, Court Offices or at The Law Society's Legal Aid Offices.

If you think that you are entitled to advice, either free or for 12½p, then either get an application form from a Citizens' Advice Bureau, from a Court Office, or from one of The Law Society's Legal Aid Offices before you go to see the solicitor; otherwise ask the solicitor for a form when you get to his office.

If you find that you are not entitled to Legal Advice either free or for 12½p and are able to pay £1, make it clear to the solicitor that you want advice under the Voluntary Legal Advice Scheme. You will be entitled to one interview of up to half an hour on payment of £1 and do not need to complete a special form concerning your means.

Telephone or write for an appointment first. The solicitor may not be able to take on a new client and not every solicitor deals with every type of case. If he cannot see you, then choose another solicitor from the Panel List. Take any papers you may have concerning your problem with you, or give them to the person who is going to the solicitor for you.

A second opinion

If you have already received Legal Advice, either free or on payment of 12½p, under the Statutory Legal Advice Scheme but want to consult another solicitor *on the same matter*, you must first obtain permission from The Law Society. You do not require permission to do this if you paid the first solicitor £1 and received advice under the Voluntary Legal Advice Scheme.

YOU CAN OBTAIN LEGAL ADVICE FOR £1 during an interview lasting not more than half an hour, whatever your means and without completing a form. This is under the Voluntary Legal Advice Scheme.

IT WILL BE FREE if you are receiving Supplementary Benefit from the Department of Health and Social Security and if you do not have more than £125 in savings. This is under the Statutory Legal Advice Scheme.

IT WILL COST YOU 12½p under the same Scheme if you are able to answer 'yes' to both of the following questions:—

- 1) Is your capital (with the additions or deductions referred to below) £125 or under?
- 2) Has your income (with the additions or deductions referred to below) been not more than £9.50 during the seven days up to and including the day on which you apply for Legal Advice?

ADDITIONS AND DEDUCTIONS

In answering questions (1) and (2) you will have to add on to your own capital and income the capital and income of your wife (or husband), unless you are either living apart from her (or him) or you wish to be advised about a matter in which she (or he) will be your opponent.

In working out your capital, you can ignore the value of your house, its contents and the value of clothing and tools and implements of trade.

If your wife (or husband) is living with you or is maintained by you, you may deduct from the total income £3.05.

You may make the following deduction for each child maintained by you, according to his or her age:—

when the child is under 5 years old...£1.40, under 11 years old...£1.65, under 13 years old...£2.05, under 16 years old...£2.20.

For any other adult person maintained by you, you may deduct £3.05.

In addition you may deduct from the total income any income tax and any National Insurance, Industrial Injuries or National Health contributions paid or payable by you or your wife (or husband) during the week immediately before the date of your getting Legal Advice.

The length of your interview with the solicitor

If you are receiving advice free or for 12½p then you can have up to one and a half hours with the solicitor in the first place (which may cover more than one interview) but if more time than this is needed, the solicitor must first obtain permission from The Law Society.

If you are paying £1 under the Voluntary Legal Advice Scheme and more than half an hour is needed to deal with your problem, then you should ask the solicitor what the extra cost will be.

Advice—not legal action

Under the Legal Advice Schemes, the solicitor will not be able either to write letters for you or to draft documents (e.g. a Will) or to represent you in Court. He will, however, be able to tell you what your rights at law are and to give you some idea of what it will cost to take the matter further. If he thinks that legal action is necessary, he will also be able to help you to apply for Legal Aid. This Legal Aid may be free of charge if your means are very small, but otherwise you will be required to make a payment, which will be worked out in accordance with your means.

The address of the nearest Legal Aid Office of The Law Society will be found at any Citizens' Advice Bureau. The Bureau or The Law Society's Office will be glad to help you fill in the form of application for Legal Aid under the Statutory Legal Advice Scheme.

If you want more information about the Legal Advice and Legal Aid Schemes or if you are not sure whether your problem is one over which a solicitor can help, then the Citizens' Advice Bureau will be glad to talk the matter over with you.

CHEAP BUS FARES — FOR ELDERLY, BLIND AND DISABLED

In common with other London boroughs, Hammersmith introduced a scheme in 1971 to allow old-age pensioners, the blind and the disabled to travel on red London buses at children's fares between 9.30 and 3.30, Monday to Friday. The destination and length of journey does not matter as long as the journey *starts* during this period.

Permits can be purchased either from Hammersmith Town Hall, King Street, W.6, or the Old Town Hall, Fulham, London, S.W.6.

There are two rates of charge:—

- The blind, the disabled and pensioners who are over 75 or who are receiving either supplementary benefits or rate rebate pay £1 for a permit for one year.
- For women aged 60-75 and men 65-75, the cost of a full year's permit is £2.35.

Note: Those who buy a permit for cheap bus travel after the start of the financial year, will be asked to pay proportionally less. For example, someone buying a £1 permit in July will be asked to pay only 75p, the permit expiring at the end of the following March.

Hammersmith has some 34,000 residents who qualify to benefit from this scheme, and at the time this Guide went to Press negotiations were taking place between the London Boroughs' Association and the London Transport Executive (part of the Greater London Council) to improve and extend it.

Some residents may only want to use the facility in the summer months. In this case they may buy a permit and then return it to the Borough Treasurer's office at either Town Hall when they have no further use for it. A refund for the unexpired whole months will be posted to them.

BARGAIN RAIL FARES FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

The "Senior Citizen" ticket is a real bargain in rail travel and costs much less than the normal reduced adult fare. It is a golden opportunity in your Golden Years to visit friends and relatives—those you may not have seen for some time. Or to go again to places which hold happy memories. You can travel on Tuesdays, Wednesdays or Thursdays all the year round (except Christmas week) between any of the stations shown at the price and by the train services specified in this folder and return on these days, by the services shown, at any time within one month. Break of journey is not allowed.

All you need is your pension book (or if you do not hold one, your identity card)—to be shown at the time of booking, and on the journey if requested. If there is a Restaurant Car on the train, why not take advantage of a special two-course meal at a reduced price of 75p (just show your pension book or identity card). Enjoy fast comfortable rail travel at coach-level prices!

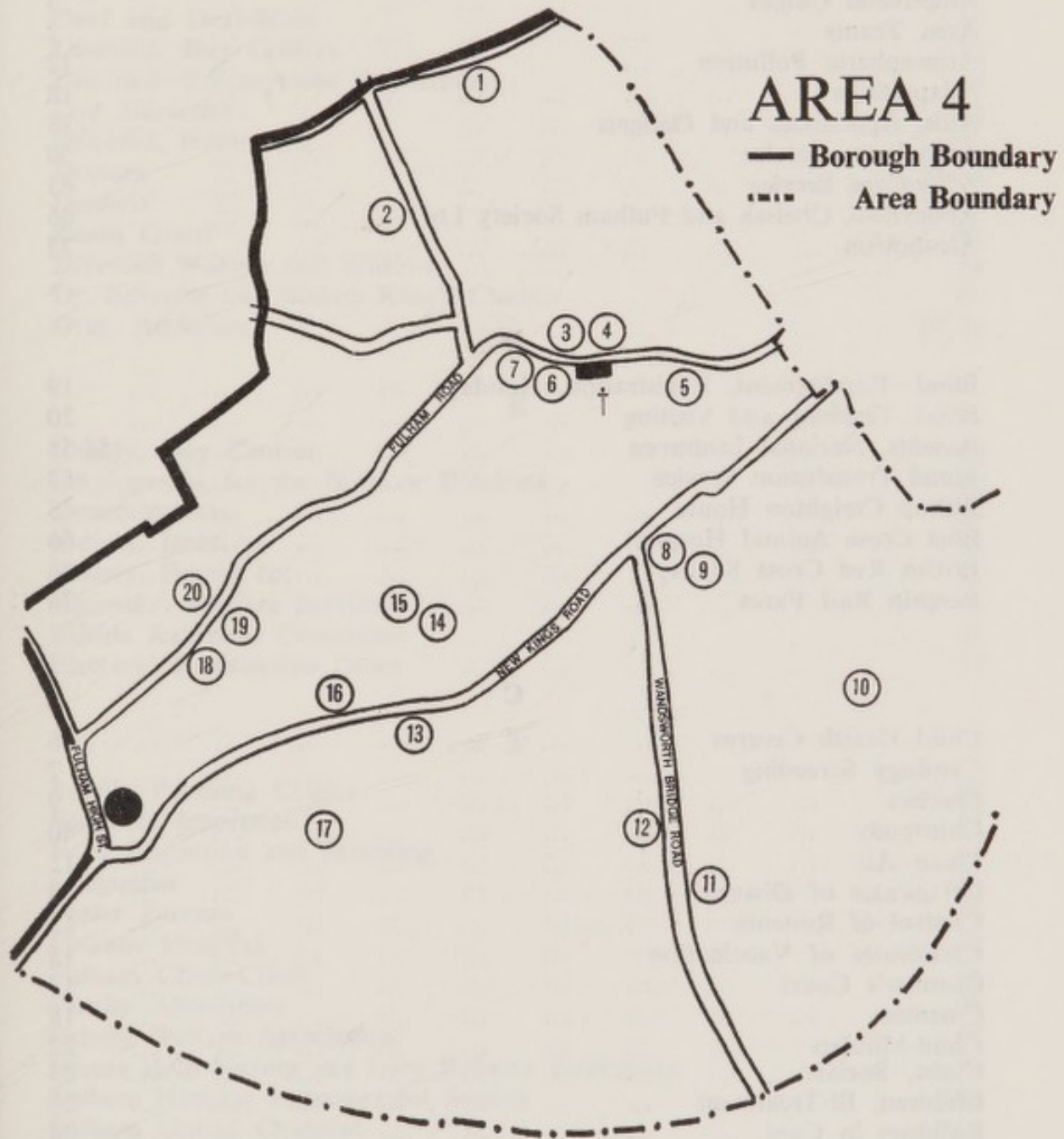

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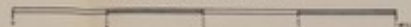
