# Dalrymple House, Rickmansworth

Report of the Medical Superintendent for the year ending 31st January, 1921.

### GENTLEMEN :

I have the honour to present to you my report for the year ending January 31st, 1921.

As in my reports previous to 1916, there is appended a series of tables presenting various particulars concerning those dis-

charged. These tables deal with 1,486 cases. The after history percentages refer only to those who have been under my care in the Sanatorium during the past 21 years.

ADMISSIONS. Not including re-admissions, there have been 56 persons admitted during the year, as private patients, and 23 under the Inebriates Act.

Both for the patients and their friends I consider admission under the act preferable in a larger number of cases. There is no kind of distinction made between either class, but while Private Patients can terminate their stay at any time, and sometimes do leave prematurely without giving themselves a chance of success, those under the act must remain in residence until the period for which they have signed expires, unless previously discharged, or unless they go away on leave of absence under the act.

In my report for 1919 I referred to the number of young men I had admitted, whose alcohol indulgence was due to army life and war strain, and during the past year a considerable percentage of the applicants for admission have ascribed the origin of their trouble to these causes. Only one gave navy life as the exciting cause. He was unaccustomed to spirits and the rum ration was his undoing.

DISCHARGES have numbered 81. Of these I found 6 unsuitable for treatment, 9 went away on account of urgent private affairs, 4 on account of ill-health. Two patients are away on leave of absence and during the year several others have finished their period under the act on leave. In certain circumstances this is a useful method of practically discharging a patient and of still keeping in touch with him and of being in a position to assist him and his friends, should a relapse occur.

TREATMENT. I continue to adopt no single form of drug therapy in all cases, for I know no treatment that is universally applicable. Each case has to be studied and such treatment as is considered appropriate is adopted.

Alcohol is given at first to those who require it but after the first two or three days it is rarely demanded ; for drug habitués gradual reduction is usually employed.

My object is to wean a man from alcohol, or from the particular drug for which he has an addiction, with as little discomfort to him as possible.

Subsequently the first consideration is to cure him, when possible, of any diseased condition that may be at the root of his drink or drug impulse, and restore him to a sound physical condition, and whether such a cause is discoverable or not, to train his mind to resist any such impulse by cultivation of self control, to strengthen his will power and determination and to make him realise that part of his cure lies in his own hands, and that total abstinence from alcohol (and of course from drugs in the case of a drug taker) is an absolute necessity.

With regard to liberty to leave the grounds. In the case of some a considerable amount of freedom can be given a few days after admission, the large majority can be given parole after two to four weeks' residence. My object is to make life as pleasant as possible consistent with the necessary control.

The health of the patients has been on the whole excellent. There have been only two cases of serious illness, one patient

died a few days after admission from coma due to cirrhosis of the liver.

I wish to express my thanks to the House Committee for the great assistance they have given me.
