THE Board herewith present their report for 1944, the ninety-third year of the Hospital's life and the fifth of war. Paper restrictions continue to necessitate curtailment of the record but the Secretary will be pleased to give Subscribers any further information that they may want.

Though the Report deals with 1944, it has not gone to press until after the end of the War in Europe. This gives the Board the opportunity, after realising the devastation that has been the lot of so many Hospitals, to record devout thankfulness to the Divine Providence that has brought our Hospital through all the perils and dangers of the last five and a half years without the loss of a single life owing to enemy action, and with material damage, serious indeed, but luckily by no means irremediable.

They also wish to record their profound gratitude to the Medical Staff in all its branches, the Matron and the Nursing and Domestic Staffs, the Secretary, the Clerical Staff, the Departmental Assistants, the Engineers, Porters, Firewatchers and all who have laboured in, or for, the Hospital with unfailing zeal, and often at no little personal risk, to enable their work to be carried on without pause or interruption in accordance with all the high past tradition of the Hospital.

It is with very great regret that the Board record the death of H.R.H. The Princess Beatrice, for many years Vice-Patron of the Hospital and always keenly interested in its work and welfare.

It is difficult to express adequately all that the death on the 18th July of Lt.-Colonel Stanley S. G. Cohen means to the Hospital and to his colleagues. During the twenty years that he served as a member of the Board, Vice-Chairman and Deputy Chairman, he proved himself to be one of the truest, most generous and most energetic friends that the Hospital has ever had. He rightly won the admiration, esteem and affection of all who had the privilege of working with him.

Mrs. Stanley Cohen has with universal approval been lately elected as Vice-President, to carry on the greatly valued family association with the Hospital and its work in which she has for many years taken a keen interest.

By the death of Sir Thomas Barlow, Bt., in his hundredth year the Hospital loses a physician of international eminence who was a member of the Medical Staff in various capacities for no less than seventy years. He continued to take personal interest in the work long after his retirement from the active list and periodically visited the Hospital up to within a few years of his death. In its history he held a unique position, for he was the last personal link with the founder, Dr. Charles West, under whom he served in his earliest years.

Another distinguished physician and very good friend has been lost by the death of Dr. Hugh Thursfield, for thirty-six years an active, and subsequently Consulting, member of the Staff.

During the period of the flying bomb and rocket attacks as many children as possible were accommodated for reason of safety in the various war-time country branches, but all the beds which could be made available in London have at all times been fully occupied. The Hospital fortunately suffered only minor damage as a result of the attacks, while the Casualty Department rendered service to many injured adults and children from outside.

It is pleasing to refer to the magnificent help given to the Hospital by its many friends at home and abroad; in particular to the efforts made by Schoolchildren, who, whilst living in safety, were not unmindful of those still living in danger. The Schoolchildren of the Transvaal sent substantial funds to name a cot in perpetuity, and the Schoolchildren of Santiago, Chile, gave generously, too, and ask that their gift may be used to defray the cost of new equipment for the ward destroyed by bombs in an air-raid in 1940. These and other gifts are a lasting tribute to all that this Hospital has done in peace as well as in war.

The Board think it advisable not to give figures relating to the volume of work done nor to compare Income or Expenditure with those of other years, for in such abnormal times the comparison would only prove misleading. It is, however, with satisfaction that they say that, by the help of many supporters the Hospital has fully met its obligations and has been able to carry forward funds to be held in reserve for the very heavy expenditure that will need to be met in the future, both to complete the new building and to maintain it.

For the Hospital's work under existing conditions in London and in the country a large increase in the nursing establishment has been necessary; but this at any rate has the satisfactory result that more and more young women are well trained and equipped to go out into the world to conquer sickness and disease among children.

The Board desire to put on record their appreciation of the outstanding services rendered by Sir Lancelot Barrington-War, K.C.V.O., F.R.C.S., till lately Senior Surgeon, who, on reaching the age limit, has left the active Staff and has been elected, by the unanimous wish of his medical colleagues, to the Staff of Consultants. His acceptance of a seat on the Board enables the Hospital to continue to benefit by his experience and wise counsel.

The Board and the Medical Staff have during the past year been actively engaged in preliminaries for what it is hoped will become an Institute of Child Health. The Nuffield Foundation have very generously shown their sympathy with the project by offering £100,000 for the endowment of a Professorial Chair in Child Health, tenable at the University of London. The University have accepted this gift with their grateful approval of an undertaking which must have far reaching effects on the prevention and cure of children's diseases in this and future generations. The Institute will be officially linked with the University, but will be closely associated with our Hospital, where it is assured of assistance and encouragement in every possible way.

In conclusion the Board again thank those who have subscribed to the Hospital or who have come to its aid in other ways so effectively during the past year and hope for a continuance of their kindness.
