## THE NINETY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT (for the year 1946)

ALTHOUGH the period covered by the accounts now presented is the year to December 31st, 1946, I think it would be convenient and of interest to the Governors if the Board's Report this year were to be extended to include the period from January 1st this year up to the present time.

I am led to this conclusion by the thought that this is, in all probability, the last occasion upon which the Board, as at present constituted, will have the honour of reporting to the Governors under the existing constitution of the Hospital. To the best of our present knowledge the Hospital will, by this time next year, have become part of the National Health Service, with all the consequences which that transfer will entail. Much as we may regret the passing of the old system, which for nearly 100 years has served the public faithfully and well, and has brought to this Hospital a world-wide reputation among Children's Hospitals, it is manifestly now the duty of all concerned, whatever may be their own personal views or feelings, to place the welfare of the patients first, and I am convinced that all will give in the future their whole-hearted and devoted service to the Hospital under its new control.

The accounts now presented reveal a most satisfactory year's working. Despite increased and increasing expenses (particularly in salaries and wages), revenue exceeded expenditure by £67,000 without taking into account legacies received during the year. This result (probably unique among hospitals) is almost entirely due to the efforts of our colleague, Mr. W. Surrey Dane, and the Directorate and Staff of Odham's Press Ltd., carrying on in remembrance of Lord Southwood the appeal which he made with such wonderful success in his lifetime. To all of them we tender once more our profound thanks. The Governors will also see, on reference to the accounts, that our position in cash and investments is exceedingly strong, so that we can look forward with good courage to the day when rebuilding can once more begin.

The outstanding event of the year was the visit of the President, H.R.H. The Princess Royal, on November 4th, 1946, when she named the main hospital building "The Southwood Building" and unveiled a memorial tablet in memory of Lord Southwood. Subsequently Her Royal Highness graciously presented certificates and medals to the nurses. A large number of Governors were present to greet the President and we were very glad to welcome here, among others, the Mayor and Mayoress of Holborn, the Mayoress of St. Pancras (representing the Mayor who was unfortunately unwell), the High Commissioner for New Zealand, the Vice-Chancellor of the University of London and many other distinguished guests.

During the year we were happy to elect Lady Southwood a Vice-President of the Hospital. She continues to show her keen interest in the Hospital in many ways, and notably by continuing last winter the Staff Ball which Lord Southwood had been accustomed to give, and by her regular gifts of flowers from her garden.

A number of changes have taken place on the Board. Mr. A. C. Norman, after fifty-seven years' service, felt bound, owing to increasing years and failing health, to resign from the Board, and was unanimously elected a Vice-President. His colleagues accepted his resignation with profound regret, and I should like to take this opportunity of expressing to him formally on behalf of the Hospital our deep appreciation of his long and devoted services. He carries with him the deep regard and affection of all his colleagues.

Sir Alexander Roger and Mr. Gordon Hannen have also resigned from the Board; we are most grateful to them for all they did for the Hospital. The following new members have been elected to the Board:—

Unfortunately Colonel Worsley found, shortly after his election, that his duties at the University made it impossible for him to attend adequately to the affairs of the Hospital and he accordingly felt obliged to resign. We have asked the University to suggest another representative to take his place. The other new members of the Board, with wide experience in various fields of activity, are a great access of strength, and we cordially welcome their co-operation.

The question of accommodation is always with us. Two hundred and seventeen beds are now available at Great Ormond Street, apart from those at Tadworth Court and those temporarily retained at Hemel Hempstead, as against 161 in December, 1945. More beds cannot be opened until more accommodation can be found for nurses and domestic staff. I am glad to say that to satisfy this need we have acquired two properties, Rosslyn Lodge at Hampstead, which will house a substantial number of nurses, and 27 Guilford Street, for domestic staff.

We are grateful to the Borough Council of Holborn for facilitating our acquisition of 27 Guilford Street. When these properties are in full use the pressure on our available space will be largely relieved.

I am also glad to say that we have now been granted a licence for repairing the war damage on the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th floors, upon which work will be commenced very shortly and with its completion many more beds will be available for the children.

The problem of the increasing number of Out-Patient attendances remains acute; for example, in the month of March this year there were 10,128 attendances, which is by no means a record. We have good hopes that we may soon be granted permission by the Ministry of Health to do some rebuilding of our Out-Patient Department, which will alleviate, but not cure, our troubles. Further, we are in course of organising a system of appointments for Out-Patients, which will, we hope, have the effect of spreading the load, and reducing periods of waiting, and also, by eliminating unnecessary attendances, reduce their number.

The Hospital's Country Branch at Tadworth has been very active during the period under review. Its activities have largely changed from those of a

Convalescent Home to those of a Hospital dealing with acute and recovery cases. This has involved increases in the staff there to meet increased responsibilities. Moreover, a school, recognised by the Ministry of Education, is now in operation there with two whole-time teachers, which is of enormous advantage to children, who are compelled, by the nature of their complaints, to spend long periods there. The Committee of the Board, constituted to take charge of Tadworth Court, make monthly visits, and are thus enabled to keep the Board fully informed, and to see that the needs of Tadworth Court are not overlooked.

On January 7th this year, as a result of arrangements made with the London County Council, to whom we wish to express our gratitude, the Preliminary Training School for Nurses was transferred to the Brook Hospital, near Woolwich, belonging to the London County Council, and at that Hospital, also, nurses in training at Great Ormond Street are enabled to obtain their experience in the nursing of fever cases.

The Medical Staff have, as is usual, rendered distinguished and unflinching service during the period under review and merit our unstinted thanks. I should like particularly to refer in this connection to Dr. A. White Franklin and Mr. H. A. D. Small who have resigned during the year. The Governors will share the Board's regret that we are losing the services of Dr. Donald Paterson, who is returning to Canada. He has shed lustre on the Hospital and we can only speed him with our most cordial wishes. By his election as a Consulting Physician he will remain linked with us.

We regret to record the death in July last of Dr. A. F. Voelcker, Consulting Physician, who was on the active staff of the Hospital from 1889 to 1920.

It is impossible in the compass of a short report to refer individually to the many benefactors and friends who have helped us during the year, but I must specially mention a few :—

The Racing Pigeon Fanciers, also, up to the present have given £6,105 for the naming of a cot, being the profits of the Annual Show organised by *The People*.

In each of these cases we had the pleasure of welcoming at the Hospital representatives of the donors, who made the presentations.

The Mayor and Mayoress of Holborn, Alderman and Mrs. Mullen, who gave a Victory Tea Party on June 7th, 1946 to patients at Great Ormond Street and Tadworth.

The Ladies' Association, Lady Helen Murray and Mrs. Ernest Ward, for their gifts and personal services.

The Hertfordshire County Council and the Dacorum Board of Guardians, whose co-operation has made it possible for us to maintain a Children's Unit at Hemel Hempstead until more beds can be made available at Great Ormond Street.

And lastly, the staff, medical, nursing and lay at Great Ormond Street, Tadworth and Hemel Hempstead, who have given, as usual, devoted and unflinching service.

In conclusion, may I say one word about the future? When the Hospital Services are transferred to the State the main burden of the expenses will be transferred from private charity to the body of taxpayers, and it will therefore be unnecessary to make the heavy calls on our friends and supporters which we have made in the past, but we hope that our many friends will continue to

support us until the transfer takes place, and thereafter, though in a reduced degree, so that we may have funds available for additional comforts for our patients and staff, and possibly for activities such as particular pieces of research, which, while of interest and possible ultimate benefit to children, might not be considered a proper charge on public funds. On behalf of the Board, I thank them for all they have done, and are doing for the Hospital, but the reward they value is the consciousness of a share in the making of healthier and happier children.

## MEDICAL REPORT FOR 1946

THIS report, the first since 1941, cannot omit some reference to the epochal years which have intervened since the last issue. The months that immediately preceded the outbreak of war had seen the new Hospital block come into commission for In-patients and its value to the children had already been appreciated by September, 1939. The immense boon of the modern wards, particularly in the facilities offered for the isolation of infants, was already clearly shown by the remarkable drop in the incidence of infection and the improved results of treatment. To take one concrete example, the mortality rate for pyloric stenosis in infants changed at once from the 20 per cent., which had been the average among infants nursed in the large communal wards of the old Hospital, to 1 per cent. or less in the new building.

Unfortunately, when the war came upon us the old Out-patient Department had been completely demolished and the foundations of the new building were only just nearing completion. The work of the Out-patient and Casualty Departments was being carried out under great difficulty and discomfort in temporary quarters adapted in the relics of the old Hospital. This still remains the situation to-day, and its persistence can only be described as lamentable. Conditions for patients, medical staff and the large numbers of postgraduate students now attending, are truly deplorable, but until building restrictions are relaxed they will have to be endured. Meanwhile the number of patients attending this department shows no sign of any falling off.

In 1944 the Medical Committee formulated a plan for introducing an Appointments System for Out-patients which has been approved by the Board of Management and will shortly be implemented. It is confidently hoped that this will make for greater orderliness and comfort of parents and patients in the Out-patient Department, as well as ensuring that the services of the Medical Staff will be more properly employed in a consultative capacity.

The war years have been a dark age so far as the medical work of the Hospital is concerned. For a long period the magnificent new ward block was perforce empty except for a tiny unit for emergency cases. Costly adaptations to the buildings were made for the reception of air-raided casualties which, happily, never arrived in any great numbers (the total treated amounted to 517). The Hospital's work for children was mainly carried on at Hemel Hempstead, Cuckfield and Tadworth, in improvised units. The degree of efficiency ultimately achieved in the face of immense difficulties reflects the greatest credit on all concerned. For some years out-patients were seen at Watford by courtesy of the Watford Memorial Hospital, and this was a great convenience to patients coming from that side of London. As the risks from the air gradually declined, the child population returned to London and the necessity to provide commensurate Hospital facilities compelled continual modification of the general plan. Out-patients had to be dealt with in increasing numbers in London and wards in the parent institution had to be gradually reopened. The additional strain thus put upon the medical, nursing and administrative personnel was indeed a heavy one.

Through all these years of unparalleled difficulty, the Hospital was indeed fortunate in having the late Lord Southwood as its Chairman. His ready sympathy and understanding of our manifold problems and his courage, energy and vision in solving them, were beyond praise. The Hospital must ever be

grateful to his memory for the incalculable benefits of his administrative skill, as well as for the fruits of his financial genius. Throughout he had at his command the devoted service of members of the Board of Management, and the Medical and Nursing Staff would wish to pay a sincere tribute to all.

### Training of Nurses

Special reference must be made to the nursing aspects of the years of the war. It was resolved from the outset to maintain our Training School at full capacity at all costs and this has been done throughout as the following figures justify :—

To have maintained such an output of trained nurses for sick children under the circumstances is truly a magnificent achievement. The ever-expanding activities of the Hospital to-day might well have been seriously hampered had an adequate supply of nurses not been available. The wisdom of the Board's policy and the loyal support of the Matron and her colleagues implementing it, are showing a full dividend now.

### Tadworth

Improvements in the facilities at Tadworth Court, the provision of an operating theatre, etc., which the emergency of war compelled, remain, and, in consequence, more acute medical cases and many surgical cases requiring operation can now be dealt with there. The work of Dr. Sheldon and Mr. Denis Browne has been particularly valuable in this connection.

### Post War

Since the war ended every effort has been made to curtail distant commitments and to reopen the parent Hospital as fully as possible. The difficulties with equipment and with the rearrangement of nurses and domestic staff have been very great, but at the end of 1946 196 beds were again in use, while 52 beds are still available at Hemel Hempstead and 110 at Tadworth Court. In spite of this, the number of patients awaiting admission at the end of 1946 was 3,305.

### Pathological Department

Dr. Payne, having returned from the E.M.S., has resumed his full work as Director of the Biochemical Department with the modernised title of Chemical Pathologist.

Dr. Cathie, released at long last from his Prisoner-of-War Camp, is back at his post as head of the Bacteriological Section. Dr. Martin Bodian has been appointed Morbid Anatomist. The highly important pathological work of the Hospital is now therefore in full swing again.

#### **Radiological Department**

The Hospital sustained a grievous loss in the untimely death of Dr. Bertram Shires in 1941; he had devoted his exceptional skill unstintingly to the service of the Hospital since 1921. First Dr. Calthrop and later Dr. Blair took over the work temporarily, and Dr. Blair was appointed Director of Radiology in July, 1946; the Hospital owes him much for having maintained the high standard of the radiological work. His Department is placed under great difficulties pending further rebuilding; moreover the demands on this Department have grown inordinately.

#### **Department of Physical Medicine**

During the past year the Department of Physical Medicine has been inaugurated and the Board appointed Dr. Kiernander as Director. Already, in his capable hands, the Department is rapidly evolving in a manner which promises well for the future of this highly important aspect of the Hospital's activities.

#### **Department of Psychological Medicine**

In July, 1946, the Board appointed Dr. Mildred Creak (the first lady member of our Staff) Director of the newly created Department of Psychological Medicine. The importance of the treatment and study of the psychological problems of childhood needs no emphasis.

#### **Dermatological Department**

This Department, under the direction of Dr. R. T. Brain, remains one of the busiest in the whole Hospital. In his very large out-patient clinic Dr. Brain has the assistance of two senior and very experienced Dermatologists.

A large sub-clinic is held monthly when about 30 patients suffering from Nævi attend for treatment with Thorium X. Recognising the special needs of this Department, an in-patient unit of 10 beds was allotted to Dr. Brain in which children in sore need of special treatment for severe skin diseases can be provided for. This unit is proving of the greatest benefit to such children and is giving invaluable facilities for research, the training of Staff and teaching of post-graduates.

#### **Dental Department**

Dr. Claud Apperley resigned from the Staff in 1945 and Dr. Cradock Henry, after taking temporary charge, was appointed Visiting Dental Surgeon in 1946. Under his guidance and enthusiasm the work of the Department is expanding rapidly. Facilities for special orthodontic work have been made available for many children at the Eastman Dental Clinic, and the out-patient and in-patient dental work generally is keeping in step with the general Hospital momentum.

#### **Department of Surgery**

The surgical work of the Hospital has been extensively reorganised to conform with the modern trends of specialisation. The number of General Surgeons

has been reduced from six to four for the time being. Mr. G. H. Macnab was appointed Surgeon in October, 1946. The special problems of chest diseases have been recognised by the creation of a Department of Thoracic Surgery which is destined to become in the near future a most important unit. At the invitation of the Board of Management, Professor Pilcher was appointed Thoracic Surgeon to the Hospital and his services will be invaluable in the further development of this specialised branch.

#### **Orthopædics**

It is planned to segregate the orthopædic work into one Department of which Mr. Eric I. Lloyd will be in charge, and his title therefore changes from "Surgeon" to "Surgeon in Charge of the Orthopædic Department."

#### **Plastic Surgery**

Mr. David Matthews has been appointed Plastic Surgeon and may confidently be expected to prove an exceptionally valuable addition to the Hospital's surgical team.

#### **Ear, Nose and Throat Department**

The old "Aural" Department has been reconstituted and modernised to include all diseases of the ear, nose and throat. Mr. James Crooks continues his work with the amended title of "Surgeon to the Ear, Nose and Throat Department," and the Board have appointed Mr. H. S. Sharp as an additional surgeon to cope with the heavy demands of this Department.

#### **Institute of Child Health**

The Hospital played a leading part in founding the Institute of Child Health in co-operation with the University of London, the British Postgraduate Federation and the London County Council. The Institute is intimately linked with The Hospital for Sick Children and the Postgraduate Hospital at Hammersmith. Pending the provision of a separate building, the Hospital is supplying the temporary administrative quarters of the Institute and providing every possible facility for postgraduate teaching and research. The Hospital was honoured by having a member of its Staff, Dr. Alan A. Moncrieff appointed as first Professor of Child Health and another member, Dr. W. G. Wyllie, as Dean, with Drs. Illingworth and Bonham Carter as Assistants. Dr. Illingworth has since been appointed Professor of Pædiatric Surgery in Sheffield, and his place has been taken by Dr. D. Macarthy.

The Institute issues its own annual report.

In conclusion it may be said that the Hospital has played a worthy part during the years of national crisis, that it survives with remarkable virility and that it is well set to maintain in the future its great traditions of the past.

INSTITUTE OF CHILD HEALTH  
UNIVERSITY OF LONDON

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT, 1946

THE Institute of Child Health began its work, as a central activity of the University of London (later to become a member of the British Postgraduate Medical Federation) on January 1st, 1946. It is situated at The Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street, London, W.C.1, and is closely associated with the Department of Obstetrics at the British Postgraduate Medical School at the Hammersmith Hospital (L.C.C.). Although instruction in diseases of children had been given at The Hospital for Sick Children for many years the recent developments in the field of child health had clearly indicated that a broader conception was necessary to embrace the care of the child from birth to maturity, in health as well as in sickness. The new Institute therefore accepts as its general aim the teaching of child health in this broad sense and research into the problems of prevention and cure of disease.

The generous gift by the Nuffield Foundation of £100,000 endowed a Chair in Child Health which was filled by the election of Alan Moncrieff, M.D., F.R.C.P., who acts as Director of the Institute. Dr. W. G. Wyllie has been appointed as Dean, and in September 1946 two assistants to the Professor of Child Health took up their duties—Dr. R. S. Illingworth (since appointed to a Chair of Child Health in Sheffield) and Dr. R. E. Bonham Carter. All members of the medical staff of The Hospital for Sick Children are teachers of the Institute, and at the British Postgraduate Medical School, where one of the assistants is working, teachers in the Department of Obstetrics assist in connection with the newborn baby. A pædiatric registrar has also been appointed there since December, 1946.

It was obvious that the side of the work concerned with diseases of children was well prepared and therefore much of the development of the past twelve months has been in connection with the preventive services. A regular teaching round on the newborn baby at Hammersmith lays emphasis on the normal care of the infant at this stage of life. Collabora-



tion with the obstetric staff makes it possible to consider the child even before birth. In this connection also a department of genetics has been established at The Hospital for Sick Children under Dr. J. A. Fraser Roberts who has been appointed as a part-time lecturer on the Staff of the Institute and conducts a regular session to which parents can come with special problems of familial and hereditary disease.

The next stage concerns the care of the pre-school child, and arrangements have been made with adjacent Borough Councils (St. Pancras and Holborn) for active co-operation in enabling postgraduate students to visit welfare clinics and nurseries as well as receiving special instruction in this aspect of child welfare. Dr. D. H. Geffen (Medical Officer of Health for St. Pancras) has been appointed as a part-time lecturer on public health on the staff of the Institute and three assistant medical officers of health have been appointed as tutors in Child Welfare: Dr. W. Gibson (Holborn), Dr. P. V. Pritchard (St. Pancras), and Dr. S. Tracy (St. Pancras). A "Mothercraft Sister" (a trained Health Visitor), Miss O. E. M. Sharpe, S.R.N., S.C.R.N., is shared equally by the Institute and the Hospital. She instructs mothers in the out-patient department and wards of the hospital and takes part in the teaching of the Institute.

The organisation for instruction and experience in school health work is not yet completed. Each week a special teaching session called a "Child Health Conference" is held at which all aspects of preventive work and local authority provision are discussed. School Health work has been covered in some detail, but it will also be necessary to make arrangements for instructional visits.

Long-stay cases are seen by a monthly visit to the Branch Hospital at Tadworth. By the courtesy of the London County Council it is possible for students to spend periods of residence at special hospitals including those for infectious diseases.

The number of postgraduate students has grown steadily from the opening of the Institute. By the end of the year bookings had been made for 57 full-time and 37 part-time students to begin work at the new term in 1947, and applications are being made for over six months ahead. These students come from the United Kingdom, the Commonwealth and other parts of the world.

Temporary accommodation for teaching is provided in the Hospital together with a common-room, a reading-room and a library, all of which are inadequate to meet the present-day needs and must be improved at the earliest opportunity. The numbers of students made it necessary to seek the help of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Children for clinical teaching and in the morning sessions the students are divided between this hospital and The Hospital for Sick Children. This help from the staff of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital is most welcome. Arrangements have been made for representation of this hospital and of the local authorities already mentioned on the Committee of Management of the Institute and on its Academic Board.

Collaboration with the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine is closely maintained. Lecturers from the staff of this school are freely available for the Child Health Conferences at the Institute. Members of the D.P.H. Part I course are able to attend these Conferences if they wish. Members of the D.P.H. Part II course attend six special lecture demonstrations on the medical administration of a children's hospital. A special refresher course for school medical officers has been jointly arranged for the Spring Term, 1947. Preliminary discussions are being undertaken with the Institute of Education for similar collaboration.

Special lecture courses, open to all medical practitioners, have been arranged each term partly by the staff of the Institute and partly by visiting lecturers. Courses for 1946 were on the following: "Diet in Infancy and Childhood," "The Special Physiology of Infancy and Childhood" and "Embryology and Special Anatomy of Childhood."

Research projects have been under discussion during the year, but naturally there is not much to report during the first twelve months. Dr. Joyce Wright, a full-time worker for the Medical Research Council, has been allocated to work at The Hospital for Sick Children on bacteriological problems related to gastro-enteritis in infants. The Medical Research Council is also supporting Dr. Carey who, in conjunction with Dr. M. Creak, is investigating emotional disturbances in children as a result of the war. Dr. R. MacKeith, in collaboration with Dr. J. M. Watson of the Wellcome Laboratories of Tropical Medicine, has carried out investigations into the problem of

threadworms and they have published a joint paper on "The Diagnosis of Threadworms" in the Transactions of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine (Vol. 40, 1946). Various clinical studies have been made by members of the staff of The Hospital for Sick Children. An Interim Research Committee with the Director of the Institute as Chairman has been established to co-ordinate all research projects.

No account of the first year's work would be complete without mention of the great loss sustained by the death of Viscount Southwood in April, 1946. He had been intensely interested in the establishment of the Institute from the first and was Chairman of the Committee of Management. He had great vision and was full of plans for future developments, especially in connection with a separate building for the Institute. For his inspiration and keen enthusiasm all the staff have nothing but profound gratitude. Since his death Sir Archibald Gray, M.D., F.R.C.P., has been acting Chairman of the Institute, Mr. T. H. Bischoff is Chairman of the Finance Committee and Mr. T. T. Higgins, F.R.C.S., is Chairman of the Academic Board.

Throughout the past year the co-operation between the Institute and its parent hospital has been close and cordial. For accommodation, for constant help and advice, and for kindly tolerance those who have been organising and administering this new venture are very grateful. In particular the Board of The Hospital for Sick Children, collectively and individually have always shown the most generous spirit.

## THE ALMONER'S DEPARTMENT

### A SHORT REVIEW OF THE WORK DURING THE YEAR 1946.

In past years the certainty that results would be achieved in a reasonable period of time made it possible to give a fair record of the work done in the department in tabulated form. Now that shortages and priorities are ruling factors in our lives, and months of "assault and battery" are so often the only means of accomplishing what one sets out to do, figures cannot give any idea of the volume of work entailed in carrying out the simplest recommendation for the welfare of the patient.

The problems are, and will always be the same, varying in complexity and urgency with the individual. Everyone is finding that the cases needing institutional care have to take their place on an almost static waiting list. Housing Authorities patch where they would wish to build, and the summer brings its problems of finding vacancies in Convalescent Homes which, though growing in number, are woefully inadequate for present-day demands.

It is therefore heartening to be able to report that we have adequate staff with which to deal with the added work, that our own Convalescent Home, "Runabouts," Chipping Norton, has stood by us nobly, despite an epidemic and the difficulties of travelling during the arctic conditions of the early weeks in the year. The importance of having a small Convalescent Home attached to the Hospital to which children can be sent, cannot be over-emphasised. For example, treatment by diet is a routine matter in a Hospital, but at home, with the difficulties of rationing and shopping, it is often impossible for the average mother to carry out successfully. To be able to admit a child to "Runabouts" where it can have the special diet and at the same time the skilled supervision until routine is modified enough for it to return home, is indeed a godsend.

How the Health Bill will affect us in the future it is hard to prophesy, but we are well aware that it is going to bring us, as a Hospital, into contact with many new people. We are, therefore, very glad to welcome in our department Doctors who will probably be taking up posts in the Public Health Services. To be able to show them the normal work of an Almoner's Office will, we feel, help them to realise what we stand for and aim to do. At the same time, we ourselves learn from them in what way our services might be used to the best advantage in the Public Health Plan.

Conditions have been so abnormal as to render statistics unreliable, and for this reason they are not given. The following figures relating to the year 1946, however, serve to show the magnitude of the work undertaken during the year :—

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SOCIETY

The first part of the paper deals with the general principles of the theory of the structure of the solid state. It is shown that the structure of the solid state is determined by the balance of the forces between the atoms of the crystal lattice. The forces between the atoms are of two kinds, the attractive forces and the repulsive forces. The attractive forces are of the van der Waals type, and the repulsive forces are of the Pauli exclusion principle type. The balance of these forces determines the equilibrium distance between the atoms, and hence the structure of the solid state.

The second part of the paper deals with the application of the theory to the structure of the diamond crystal. It is shown that the structure of the diamond crystal is determined by the balance of the forces between the carbon atoms. The forces between the carbon atoms are of the same kind as the forces between the atoms of a general crystal lattice. The balance of these forces determines the equilibrium distance between the carbon atoms, and hence the structure of the diamond crystal.

The third part of the paper deals with the application of the theory to the structure of the silicon crystal. It is shown that the structure of the silicon crystal is determined by the balance of the forces between the silicon atoms. The forces between the silicon atoms are of the same kind as the forces between the atoms of a general crystal lattice. The balance of these forces determines the equilibrium distance between the silicon atoms, and hence the structure of the silicon crystal.

The fourth part of the paper deals with the application of the theory to the structure of the germanium crystal. It is shown that the structure of the germanium crystal is determined by the balance of the forces between the germanium atoms. The forces between the germanium atoms are of the same kind as the forces between the atoms of a general crystal lattice. The balance of these forces determines the equilibrium distance between the germanium atoms, and hence the structure of the germanium crystal.
