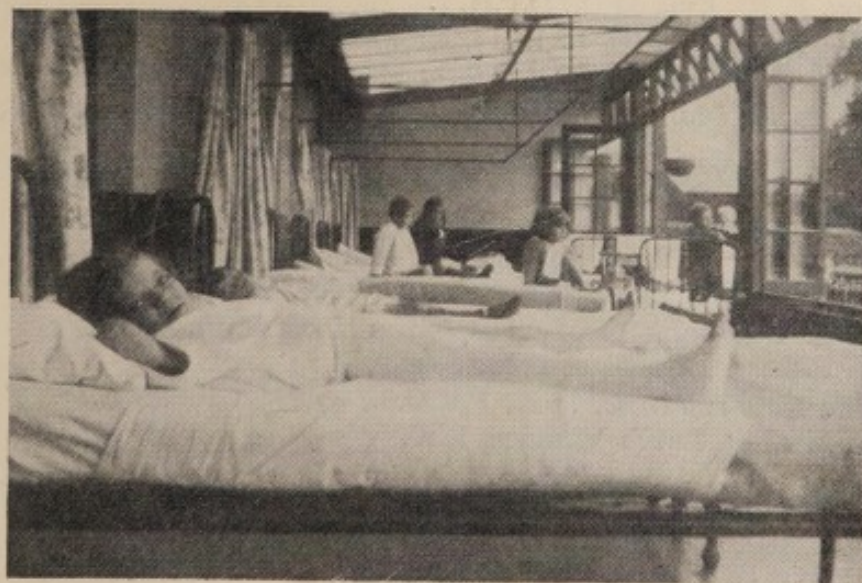
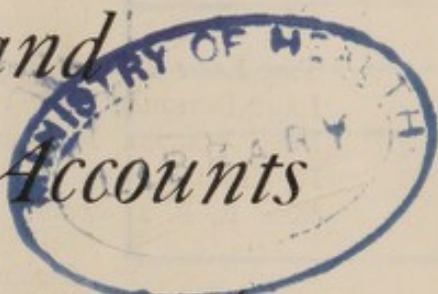

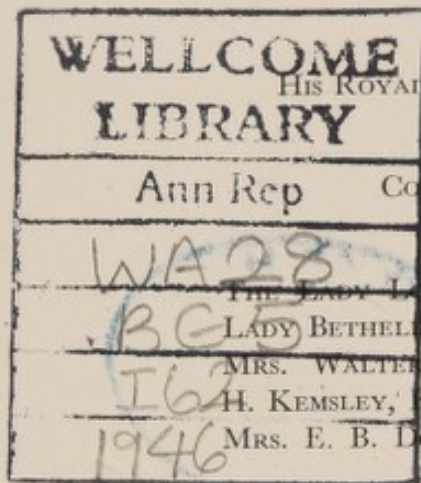

On that note I will conclude this brief foreword. May the children speak to you themselves—they have no need for any words of mine!

ANNUAL REPORT

THE Invalid and Crippled Children's Society has much pleasure in submitting the Annual Report of its work done during 1946. It again desires to offer sincere thanks to its many friends and subscribers as well as to its Surgical and Medical Staff, including Dr. Eva Morton, the Honorary Sunlight Physician. We are again indebted to Mr. Ryland of the Saint Club, for his continued interest and support, and above all to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for their unfailing help.

The Hospital is slowly regaining ground after its closure during the war years—we have an efficient, sympathetic and hard-working staff, including the nursing staff, co-operating under the guidance of Matron Miss M. Foste. A Resident Medical Officer has been appointed, Dr. Mary Shaw M.B.B.S., whom we welcome. Already it has been possible for a number of casualties to be admitted—we wish more local practitioners would avail themselves of our beds for their sick child patients and thus increase her and our general usefulness.

The Society has appointed a Matron, Miss F. Stone, to be in charge of the Sunshine Home, Shoeburyness. We are looking forward to reopening soon but necessary repair work after its occupation by troops during the war is taking time with all the problems of shortage of materials. Much of the furniture was lent to W.V.S. in Cambridgeshire for the use of evacuated children and must now be renovated or restored, as must the linen and stocks of children's clothing. It is difficult and expensive but must be done if we are to help back to complete health the many children on our waiting list. May we in conclusion appeal once again to our friends for their continued interest and support in all branches of the Society's work done in the Hospital and the Sunshine Home.
