Annual Board.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF TRUSTEES, held in the Board Room of the Institution, on TUESDAY, the 20th March, 1923, Dr. THOMAS H. BICKERTON, the President, in the Chair.

The Treasurer's Report having been read, the following Resolutions were passed :—

1.—That the Accounts for the past year, with the Report, be printed and presented to the Trustees and Subscribers as early as possible.

2.—That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Dr. Thomas H. Bickerton for filling the office of President, and for his handsome donation of One Hundred Guineas, and that he be re-elected President for the ensuing year.

3.—That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to Mr. Holford Harrison for his services as Treasurer, and that he be requested to continue in office during the ensuing year.

4.—That the thanks of this Meeting be presented to the Physicians and Surgeons of the Infirmary for the able discharge of their arduous duties, and also to the Consulting Physicians and Surgeons.

5.—That the title of the Honorary Medical Officer in charge of the Electrical Department be changed to Honorary Radiologist, and that the necessary revision be made where the title appears in the Rules.

6.—That the Meeting of the Trustees desires to record its appreciation of the services of Mr. C. Thurstan Holland as Honorary Radiologist for eighteen years, and that he be now appointed Honorary Consulting Radiologist to the Institution.

7.—That the Honorary Physicians, Drs. Abram, Buchanan and Hay; the Honorary Surgeons, Messrs. Thomas, Litler-Jones and Kelly; the Honorary Gynæcological and Obstetrical Surgeon, Mr. Blair Bell; the Honorary Surgeon to the Lock Department, Mr. Wilson; the Honorary Physician for Tropical Diseases, Dr. Stephens; the Honorary Oculist, Mr. Burroughs; the Honorary Laryngologist, Mr. Guthrie; the Honorary Dermatologist, Dr. McKenna; the Honorary Assistant Physicians, Drs. Owen, Matthews, and Wallace Jones; the Honorary Surgeons to Out-Patients, Messrs. Jeans and Woolfenden; the Honorary Assistant Surgeon, Mr. R. Kennon; the Honorary Assistant Gynæcological and Obstetrical Surgeon, Mr. Hendry; the Honorary Assistant Physician for Tropical Diseases, Dr. Yorke; the Honorary Assistant Laryngologist, Mr. Forster; be severally re-appointed; and that the following appointment by the Election Committee be confirmed and the Honorary Medical Officer re-appointed:—Honorary Radiologist, Mr. R. E. Roberts.

8.—That Messrs. J. Hartley Bibby, Arthur Crosthwaite, H. Wade Deacon, H. M. Fletcher, James E. Harvey, John B. Hinshaw, Elliot T. Nicholson, G. H. Pilkington, and J. J. Shute, Members of the General Committee who retire by rotation, be severally re-appointed; and that the following Members of the Election Committee who, in accordance with Bye-law No. 15, retire by rotation, be re-elected, viz.:—Messrs. Richard Caton, F. T. Paul, Bishop Chavasse, J. B. Gaskell, R. Hughes Jones, A. P. Eccles, Sir J. S. Harwood Banner.

9.—That the best thanks of the Meeting be given to Dr. Thomas H. Bickerton for presiding, and to the Lord Mayor for attending.

The PRESIDENT, Dr. Thomas H. Bickerton, in moving the adoption of the Report, spoke as follows:—

“MY LORD MAYOR AND GENTLEMEN,

It becomes my duty to move that the Report be adopted.

I spent last night in looking through the history of the Infirmary, as set forth in the Annual Reports, of which I have been a collector.

When I was placed on the Medical Staff at the beginning of 1887, then as now, the burden of the Treasurer's remarks was, decrease in subscriptions. Then as now, the Committee trusted the people. Then as now, they were planning a new building—at that time the erection of the building in which we meet to-day. When opened (October 29th, 1890), the Supervising Surgeon-General of the United States Hospital, reported to his Government that—'The Liverpool Royal Infirmary is to-day probably the best hospital in the world,' and he added, 'With two exceptions, Hamburg and Berlin, there is in my opinion no other hospital to compare with it.' In regard to some of our departments, he would probably say the same to-day.

From the Reports, I learn that the outstanding qualification for a hospital Committee-man is HOPE. But for the realisation of that hope, there would be no voluntary hospital system.

The Report presented to-day is, I think, a most hopeful and encouraging one, and it is a great pleasure to me to be here to listen to it. It has its dark side, which must not be lost sight of, in that though the ordinary income last year was £31,954, it was less than the total expenditure by £11,535. Further funds are urgently needed.

Mr. Holford Harrison mentions the advancement in all departments during the past year. To really appreciate our present position, we need to take a glance backward to see what hospital conditions were in days gone by.

When I was appointed (1887) the active Staff consisted of 3 Physicians, 3 Surgeons, a Gynæcological Surgeon, an Assistant Surgeon, a Medical and Surgical Tutor, a Pathologist, a Chloroformist and a Dental Surgeon—13 in all. To-day there are some 40 gentlemen serving on it.

To speak of 1749, the year in which the Liverpool Infirmary was opened, seems ages ago. But subtract 1749 from the present year of grace (1923) and as a matter of fact it is only 174 years. Less than four generations have spanned that time.

In 1745, long years before the opening of the Infirmary, a young gentleman named Henry Park was born in Water Street. At the age of 22 he was appointed Surgeon to the Infirmary. At the age of 64 he superintended at 62, Rodney Street—the present residence of our distinguished Physician, Dr. Thomas Robinson Glynn—the arrival of William Ewart

Gladstone on this planet. Mr. Park left this, for some other world in 1831—aged 86. Twenty-one years before Mr. Park died, Mr. Robert Bickersteth had been appointed (1811) Surgeon to the Infirmary. He, his son Edward Robert, and his grandson Robert Alexander—three generations of Bickersteths—spanned a period of 111 years. The lives of these four men cover the whole period from 1745 to the present day.

The Infirmary records show that from its earliest days the Medical Staff included the most progressive members of the profession in Liverpool—they were chiefly Scots!

A few years ago I heard from the Physician, Dr. Robert J. Banning, then aged 85, who, as a medical student, gained the first prize, a Gold Medal, value ten guineas, given at the Medical School for proficiency in all subjects taught. It carried six months' free residence in the Infirmary, and its acceptance by the Medical Director of the Army was a substitute for the qualifying examination for the service. He told me that one of the Physicians in former days was too asthmatic to mount to the upper wards, and he used to stand at the foot of the stairs, and call out to the nurse, who was always in readiness at the top, 'How are all to-day?' To which she would reply, 'All right, Sir, you need not come up.' I expect there has been an alteration in method of examination and diagnosis since those days.

Before passing on to speak of one or two matters included in our Annual Report, I think it only a matter of simple courtesy and justice to remind ourselves how great a debt not only the Royal Infirmary and its Nursing Staff, but the entire City of Liverpool owe to one of its oldest residential families, viz., that of Mr. William Rathbone.

The Nurses' Homes in Ashton Street were the outcome of Mr. Rathbone's desire to get nurses who would nurse the suffering poor in their own homes. He found one, but could not succeed in getting others. He consulted Miss Florence Nightingale, who suggested that instead of applying to London for trained nurses, Liverpool had better form a school to train nurses in its own hospitals. The Royal Infirmary had no facilities then for training. Mr. William Rathbone was asked to become a member of the Infirmary Committee, and he, finding that the greatest difficulty in starting a training-school was that the Infirmary could not accommodate either the nurses or probationers, undertook to build a School and Home, of which Liverpool has reaped the benefit for the last sixty years.

A memorable epoch in the history of the Infirmary was the gift of the Thornton Wards. Likewise, the magnificent gift of Mr. Larrinaga of £10,000 for the building of a Gynæcological Ward and Theatre, which will afford Professor Blair Bell the necessary scope for the exercise of his talent and genius, marks an equally important period in its history.

It is absolutely essential for every large teaching school and General Hospital to have a properly equipped Maternity and Gynæcological Department. Every large teaching school in London and many in the provinces have recognised this necessity for Maternity beds, not only for the sake of teaching students and enabling nurses to take the C.M.B. as a special subject after qualification, but also because of the large demands of the public for proper ante-natal and maternity attention. The advantage of having ante-natal work in a Hospital is that if it be a case of heart disease and pregnancy, a Physician can look after her with the obstetrician; if she have kidney affection a Surgeon can be called in, and so on. The benefits accruing to the patient are too obvious to need discussion. During the war, the only beds that were not interfered with in St. Thomas' Hospital were the obstetrical beds.

The Gynæcological Theatres now built to Professor Blair Bell's design, and almost completed, are probably the best in the world; and it is hoped will be the best equipped, as no doubt they will be extensively copied. It is by advances of this sort, and the work of the Staff, that a hospital becomes well and favourably known.

It is very important that there should be no delay in opening the new ward; and I think the most practical way of expressing our gratitude and appreciation of this splendid gift of Mr. Larrinaga and other generous friends would be by equipping the Maternity Ward at the earliest date.

'Salaries and Wages show an increase, due to the raising of the salaries of the Nursing Staff.'

In my opinion, we are getting good value for this increased expenditure. What is the use of an Infirmary with every up-to-date appliance and equipment without efficient and sufficient nurses.

In the year 1844, before Florence Nightingale had begun to make her wonderful presence felt, there were in the Infirmary only eleven nurses (with five assistants employed in scouring) to attend upon an average of 210 to 230

patients. Patients requiring attendance at night were often entrusted to the care of two convalescents—induced to give their services by the allowance of an extra supper. Sometimes it was necessary—from the want of nurses—to get friends of the patients to remain with them during the night. To put two patients into one bed was not unknown!

Matters had not greatly altered or improved by 1862—the year in which the Nurses belonging to the Infirmary were given over to the Nurses' Training School—but the number had increased to 20, with the five helps as before. The then salaries varied from nine pounds to sixteen guineas per annum. One extra special surgical nurse received £25, which was obviously too much for her as she left in a few months for 'want of steadiness.' The Physician before alluded to, says that the nurses of his day (1849—50) were a 'very scratch lot,' and the 'want of steadiness' was apparently contagious, for it accounted for the dismissal of a good many. These were the days of the 'Sairey Gamp' type of nurse, and Florence Nightingale's assertion 'that nursing was a work for gentlewomen fell like a bomb upon the people of England.'

From the nurses of the past to those of the present, what an advance! Yet they are being trained to still greater efficiency. We have our Nursing Staff; and they are worthy of the best we can do for their comfort, health and happiness. I am sure all will agree that we have a splendid case to present to the public in our appeal for the necessary funds for the building of the New Nurses' Home.

The facts that the Nurses' Bazaar was so successful in spite of all the drawbacks that the Clerk of the Weather could furnish, and that the Ladies' Linen League is increasing in membership and service, are only fresh examples of the happening of 'just what one would expect!' The ladies always do seem to carry things through in the most remarkable and efficient manner! Especially if they have a good leader—as they had in Miss Cummins. The Linen League speaks for itself!

Of course, we know, and the ladies would be the first to admit, that they could not do as much without the help of their fellow men; but when a woman makes up her mind to do, or not to do, anything, the result is a foregone conclusion. I am married, so I speak from experience."

Report for the Year 1922.

IT is refreshing to think that the Report presented by the Committee to-day shows an advancement in work done during the past year in all Departments within this Hospital, and our thanks are due to the Staff for the excellent way in which this has been carried out.

What is most satisfactory, by the kindness of friends, provision has now been made for further extension and developments. It is with great satisfaction we have to record a start has been made with the building of the New Nurses' Home, and also with the New Theatre and Ward for the Gynæcological Department.

During the year 4,477 In-patients were admitted to the wards, being an increase of 324 over the previous year, and the number of new Out-Patients was 26,821. Out-patient attendances reached a total of 181,014, which included 58,829 in the Orthopædic Department, and 5,088 (including 160 for radium) in the X-Ray Department. In-patient operations totalled 2,568, and operations in the Out-patient Department reached a total of 1,665.

It is interesting to recall that 33 children were born in the Thornton Ante-natal Ward.

Having in mind the activities set out in the previous paragraph, it is pleasing to record that the ordinary expenditure for the year shows a reduction of £3,860 over that for 1921, and the total expenditure, i.e., ordinary and extraordinary, is £5,620 less than the previous year. The chief reductions occur under the headings of Provision and Domestic, under which latter there is an appreciable decrease of £1,180 in coal. Expenditure under Salaries and Wages shows an increase, but this is due to the raising of the salaries of the Nursing Staff, which was referred to in the last Report. The above figures show that strictest economy has been exercised.

The ordinary income for the year was £31,954, or £11,535 less than the total ordinary expenditure. There has, however, been an extraordinary number of legacies during the year,

and from this source no less than £14,688 has been received. In addition, a grant of £2,665 has been received from the Voluntary Hospitals Commission towards the deficiency of Income in 1921, to which reference was made in the last Report, so that on the year's working, after applying the above-mentioned extraordinary income to the general working account, there is an excess of total income over total expenditure for the year of £5,392. It cannot be too strongly emphasised, however, that the true figures for reflection are the ordinary income and the ordinary expenditure which, as previously pointed out, record a deficit of £11,535 for the year, legacies being a very fluctuating source of income, and the grant from the Voluntary Hospitals Commission being a non-recurrent receipt.

This excess of income for 1922 has enabled the deficit of £22,978 for the years 1920 and 1921 to be reduced to £17,586.

It is regretted that there is a still further decrease in the Annual Subscriptions, and this is chiefly accounted for by the non-receipt of subscriptions of about £200 for 1921 and 1922 from various Welsh Churches and Societies, which have shewn a marked decrease since the rule carrying a reduction in the outside radius patients' charge for maintenance was withdrawn two years ago. The question whether the outside radius charge should be raised to meet this deficiency in income will be considered by the Committee.

It will be observed that, for the first time, contributions have been received from the National Health Insurance Approved Societies in respect of treatment of Members of the respective Societies. It is confidently expected that the income from these Societies during the next year will show a considerable increase.

The Hospital and Saturday and Sunday Fund contributed £4,000 this year, for which we are greatly thankful.

The Committee is grateful for a gift of £1,000 from the Misses Ellis Jones for the endowment of the "Ellis and Anne Jones Bed," in Memory of their Parents.

It is to be hoped more friends will adopt this form of permanent donation to the Hospital.

The Committee also wishes to record its most grateful appreciation of the generous gift of Mr. Domingo de Larrinaga of Operating Theatres and a Ward for the Gynæcological and Obstetrical Department. Good progress has been made with the building of these additions to the Hospital, and, in a short space of time the Operating Theatres will be ready for use.

As foreshadowed in the last Report, the Nurses' Bazaar, held at the Infirmary, in aid of the New Nurses' Home, took place on June 27th and 28th, and in spite of most unpropitious weather, the sum aimed at, viz., £3,000 was raised. The Committee offers its warmest congratulations to the Matron and Nursing Staff, and "Old Royalites," and other friends on the result of their efforts.

After some deliberation, the Committee decided to proceed with the building of the first Block of the New Nurses' Home, and the building operations are now in full swing. The cost of this portion is about £37,000, towards which roughly £28,000 is actually available. The Building is to proceed only in ratio to the money actually available for this purpose, so that to complete the first block a further £9,000 is required, and an urgent appeal is made for this amount, so that better accommodation may be provided for the Nurses, who are at present most unsuitably and badly housed in the dwellings in Ashton Street.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York has kindly consented to lay the Corner Stone of the Building, at a date to be decided later.

The Committee regrets to report the death of Dr. F. W. Bailey, D.S.O., who for 23 years rendered very valuable services to the Hospital as an Honorary Anæsthetist, and of

Alderman Louis S. Cohen, who was a Life Trustee, Member of the Election Committee, and at all times generously responded to the calls of the Hospital.

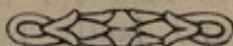
Dr. Hubert Armstrong, after 17 years, resigned the appointment as Honorary Anæsthetist, and the Committee wishes to record its appreciation of his services.

It is pleasing to record still further progress of the Ladies' Linen League, which has now increased its membership to 449. No less than 1,323 articles were contributed to the Hospital last year, in addition to £90.

The Committee is keenly appreciative of this substantial help.

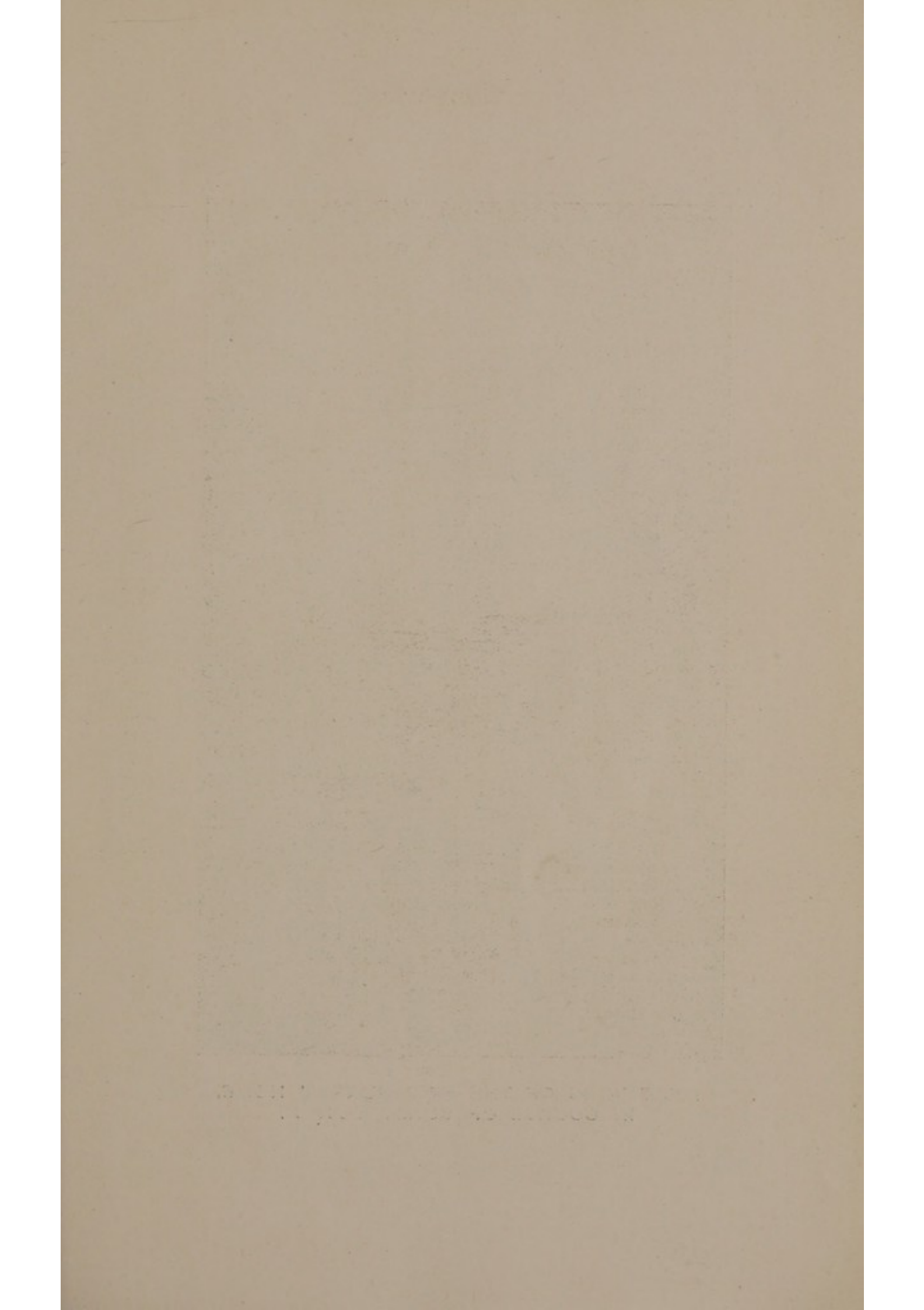

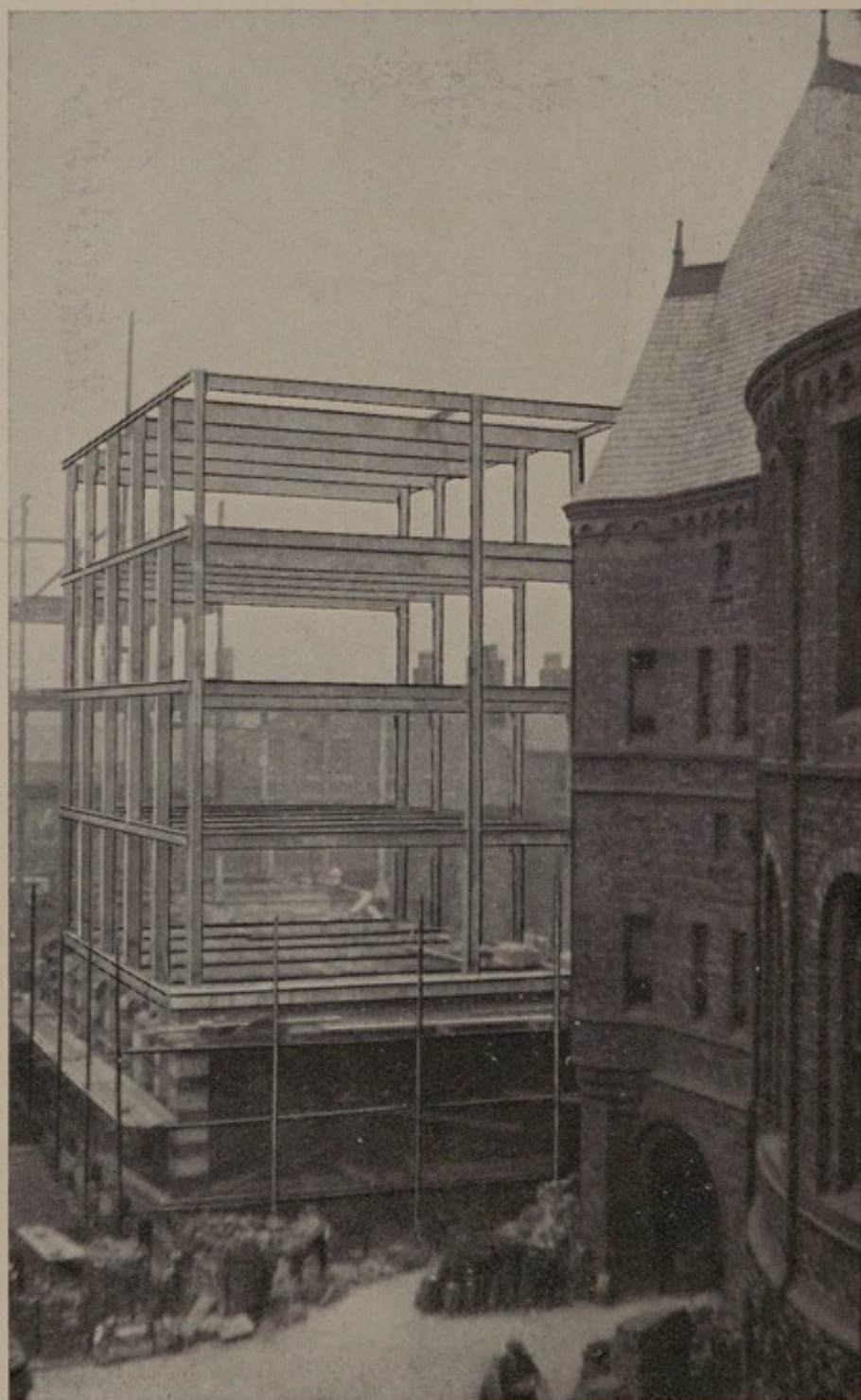

The erection of this has been, as our Subscribers know, one of the necessities that have been continuously in front of us for some years past, delayed as it was by the war, and, later by the exorbitant costs that such a building would entail. But it was no longer possible to postpone, through lack of a new Home, transference of the Nurses at present inadequately housed in private dwellings in Ashton Street. And so the Committee of the Infirmary gave their authority to a commencement of the work, and in this section which is now in process of completion we shall be able to accommodate all the nurses who are at present living in houses above referred to. It is necessarily a disappointment that we cannot go on with the erection of the whole of the Nurses' Home, but we feel that our subscribers will realise that it is better if you cannot have a whole loaf to have even a "quarter of one" to be going on with!!

We cannot pass away from this question without saying how very grateful the Committee feel to the Matron and Nurses who worked so hard and successfully for their Bazaar, held in June, assisted as they were by members of the Nursing Staff who had passed through the Royal in previous years, and who banded themselves together to aid the efforts of their successors. The Bazaar resulted in the very handsome addition of £3,000 to the funds. We are deeply grateful to all concerned for this magnificent result.

From the financial side the figures do not vary much except in so far as they show an increased salary list as a consequence of your Committee deciding to put the Nursing Staff on a standard of remuneration in accordance with the recommendation of a Special Committee of the College of Nursing. We think our subscribers will be with us in this expenditure, even although it entails a further financial burden to the Home.

We draw attention to the Matron's Report overleaf, and congratulate her, also her Assistant, Home Sisters, and the whole of the Nursing Staff, on the diligent discharge of their various duties during the past year, and on the splendid spirit which prevails throughout the whole of the Home.

We trust that many new subscribers and donors may still be forthcoming notwithstanding the numerous demands that are made on the pockets of those charitably disposed, and we suggest for consideration that no better way of commemorating some special occasion, or perpetuating a memory of a relative or friend can be found than in donating a sum sufficient to "name" a room, or a series of rooms, or, if possible, a wing in the New Home, of which this year has seen the commencement.



Matron's Report for 1922.

Because of two events, the Nurses' Bazaar and the building of the first Block of the New Home, 1922 should stand out in the memory of the Nursing Staff. As a result of the former a cheque for £3,000 was paid to the Treasurer, and the receipt is framed in the Home to be handed down. We appreciated greatly the kindly interest and practical help we received from many friends outside, as well as patients, past and present, and wish specially to refer to the Stall furnished by "Old Royalites" under the banner of Miss Bramwell and Miss Golding, this Stall realising £300. The abandonment of "43" would now seem to be an event of the near future.

Applications during the year have been sufficient to provide against any shortage or inconvenience. Forty Probationers entered, eight of whom left for various reasons—unsuitability or health chiefly.

Twenty-four Nurses completed their third year, eight of whom are Staff Nurses in Special Departments, and the remainder transferred to the Private Staff.

Twenty-six completed their fourth year certificated, two of whom were promoted to be Sisters, the others leaving—one to be Night Sister; four Sisters; one Health Visitor; one District Nursing; two in Nursing Homes; two to return to Scotland; and eight Private Nursing elsewhere.

Three Sisters left, two of whose vacancies were filled by promotions, and the third by the return of a Sister who had left.

There were seventy-two Nurses off duty during the year, four of whom contracted Diphtheria, two were operated upon for Appendicitis, and the remainder were minor ailments.

It was decided by a meeting of the Nursing Committee and Medical Board that in future the Senior Nurses, after sitting for our own examinations, should be finally examined each year—Written and Viva Voce, by Mr. Russell Howard, and in Bandaging and Practical Nursing by Miss Wolseley-Lewis; both these Examiners perform a similar function at many of the large London and Provincial Hospitals. To allow more time for coaching, the book-keeping and Private Staff Accounts have been taken over from the Home Sisters by the Secretary's Office.

The prizes were gained as follows:—Special Subjects, Nurses Ham and Meeson; Medical, Nurses Grace and Gavigan; Surgical, Nurses Belsham and Bebbington; Elementary Anatomy and Physiology, Nurses Carmen Johnson, and Prime; Matron's Lectures, Nurse Prime. Special Prizes were given by Dr. Buchanan and Dr. R. W. McKenna.

Through the instrumentality of the College of Nursing, by approaching Parliament, exemption from Unemployment Insurance was granted to Nurses, and is much appreciated by the whole profession.

The Tennis activities as regards matches were somewhat curtailed by the weather, but the Tournament resulted in the same victors, viz.: Ward IX., Nurse Lathom and Mr. Rutter, who thus retain the Cup for a second year. The runners-up were Sister Durant and Mr. R. L. Blair, Orthopædic Department.
