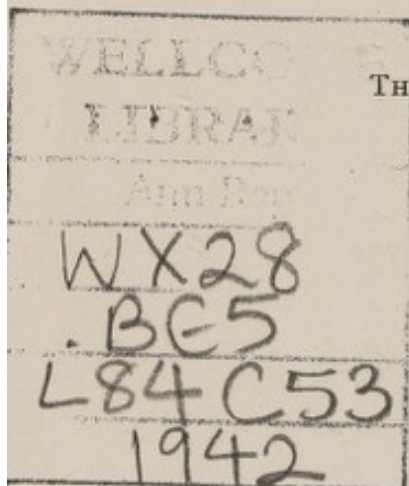

Sixty-seventh Annual Report

OF

The Committee of Management of Cheyne Hospital for Children,

For the Year ended December 31st, 1942.

IN presenting their Report for the year ended 31st December, 1942, your Committee has little change to chronicle in the activities of the Hospital as compared with the previous year.

The Treatment Centre for the children continued to function at Fanhams Hall, near Ware, in Hertfordshire, where it was established in May 1940. In the latter half of last year the admission of children was necessarily restricted by a persistent recurrence of the infective ailments to which most children are unfortunately susceptible; and whilst the majority of the cases were not of a serious nature, the work of the Hospital was considerably hampered. Nevertheless, the number of children treated was greater than in 1941, as the following figures show :—

During the year it was possible, with the kindly co-operation of our hostess, Anne, Lady Brocket, to provide accommodation for eight additional children by using the Library which is adjacent to the large Ward, although, owing to the quarantine restrictions indicated above, the maximum advantage could not be taken in the use of these additional cots.

The Hospital buildings at Cheyne Walk, Chelsea, which were damaged by enemy action in April 1941, remained unoccupied, except as Administrative Offices, and the use of the Rowland Baring Ward by the Committee of the destroyed Chelsea Old Church as a temporary Chapel, in which Divine Service continues to be held regularly each Sunday throughout the year.

Finance.

The financial position during the year has not been unsatisfactory, again owing to the continued decrease in expenditure compared with normal times; and it has thus been possible to supplement the Reserve Fund upon which it will undoubtedly be necessary to draw heavily for reconditioning later on.

Ordinary Income of £5,391, compared with £5,171 in 1941, and Ordinary Expenditure of £3,304 was £424 more than in the previous year. The cost of Provisions rose by £174, and Wages of Domestic Staff, etc., by over £100, whilst improvements to the heating system at Fanhams Hall involved an expenditure of £53.

Receipts from Legacies—always a fluctuating source of income—were, however, considerably less than in the previous two years, in each of which over £2,000 was received.

Education of the Children.

The Hospital School, which is conducted at the Treatment Centre at Fanhams Hall under the joint auspices of the Board of Education and the Ministry of Health has continued to function during the year, although for a shorter period than usual owing to closure for some months, consequent upon Staff Changes. Mrs. I. W. Bryant, of Hertford, is now in charge of the School having succeeded Miss E. M. Breeze, who acted in this capacity for a short period.

Medical Staff.

Dr. J. Robertson Colville, of Ware, who had supervised the medical treatment of the children since June 1941, and whose services were greatly appreciated, has taken active service with the Royal Air Force, and was succeeded by Dr. Helen MacKenna, and subsequently by Dr. Katherine Franklin.

Special thanks are tendered to Dr. John Franklin of Westminster Hospital, who has frequently visited the Hospital in a consultative capacity in regard to the treatment of diseases of the skin.

Nursing Staff.

The Committee also express their appreciation to the Matron, Miss E. M. Price Williams and the members of the Nursing Staff for their devoted services to the children, and for much good work, often carried out in circumstances of considerable difficulty occasioned by the absence of many facilities which, commonplace in a hospital in normal times, are not available in the present temporary accommodation.

Two valued former members of the Nursing Staff have passed away during the year. Miss Lucy Elam, who died in August within a few days of her 90th birthday, will be remembered by older friends of the Hospital as Lady Superintendent at Cheyne Walk until her retirement in 1914, when she had completed over 30 years' service. Miss Elam's long and valuable association contributed greatly to the development of the Hospital in its earlier years, and to the building-up of the Cheyne tradition which has become so marked a feature of the Hospital, and which it is always the policy of the Committee to maintain. "The Lucy Elam Cot" was named in 1896 as a mark of appreciation of her services, and your Committee are glad to be able to announce that it has been decided that this nomination, which would ordinarily have lapsed with her death, shall be continued permanently in remembrance of her services.

Your Committee also announce with regret the death in January of Miss G. A. Brady, who for over 20 years acted as Ward Sister at St. Nicholas Branch Hospital.

Vice-President.

It was with much pleasure that your Committee elected as an additional Vice-President of the Hospital Miss E. S. Peirse-Duncombe, a greatly valued friend and generous supporter who for many years had taken a close interest in all that pertained to its welfare.

Committee.

A cordial welcome is extended to three new members:—Mr. Leonard Pells, Squadron Leader L.W. Snagge, and Mr. E. Ruggles-Brise, the last-named having also become a member of the Finance Committee.

Two members have resigned—General Sir Walter Braithwaite, who acted as Vice-Chairman from 1932 to 1938, and now resides in Hampshire, and Mrs. Hugh Pritchard who had been a member of both the Committee of Management and the Ladies Committee for over 15 years.

Mrs. Pritchard, in addition to taking a close interest in the welfare of the Children and the Staff, was especially helpful in the organization of efforts for raising funds for the Hospital, and inaugurated in 1927 the highly successful Annual Pound Day which was held regularly until 1939, and had realised over £2,370 in gifts in cash, in addition to some 5,000 lbs. of groceries, etc.

To both these friends your Committee express their grateful appreciation and thanks for their kindly interest and support.

Your Committee records with regret the death of Mrs. W. H. Bradford of Upper Hardres, Canterbury, who for several years prior to the War was a very efficient Chairman of the Local Committee at St. Nicholas (Branch) Hospital.

The following three members of the Committee—Miss D. M. Macnamara, Mr. Douglas S. Young, and Mr. R. H. Hyde-Thomson—retire, in the order of the priority of their appointment, and are eligible for re-election at the Annual Meeting on June 23rd.
