WORKS GROUPS

This Scheme is designed for GROUPS OF MEMBERS at FACTORIES, MILLS, WORKS, OFFICES and all places of employment in Manchester, Salford and Stretford. **Benefit for employees** and their dependants may be obtained **anywhere in the United Kingdom** where there is a District Nursing Service.

SOCIAL GROUPS

Groups may be formed at any Meetings, Clubs and other social organisations. Members of these groups must live in Manchester, Salford or Stretford.

BENEFITS : FREE SKILLED HOME NURSING CARE by Queen's and other District Nurses where the members live, for all cases of illness, surgical conditions and accidents.

Some examples are :—pneumonia, bronchitis, rheumatism, heart trouble, ulcers, wounds, burns, cuts, abscesses and children's ailments.

(N.B. Not included are, maternity and midwifery, operations, night duty, massage, and certain infectious diseases.)

Nursing appliances may be loaned free, when available, but only if Nurse is attending.

CONTRIBUTIONS : 1d. A WEEK

(1/- a quarter, 2/- a half-year, 4/- a year).

THIS COVERS the member and others in the household whom the member supports, and who normally live with the member. **Girls** who live with their parents cover their **mothers** by their membership.

This Service covers both sexes and all ages. Members get the Service FREE : Non-members (other than necessitous cases, which are always nursed free) will be charged from 2/- a visit.

We welcome enquiries from Firms, Staff organisations and Social organisations, and will be glad to arrange for a speaker to explain the Scheme.

GENERAL REPORT

for the

Year ended 31st March, 1945

The Committee of the Manchester and Salford District Nursing Institution have pleasure in presenting their Seventy-ninth Annual Report.

This Report deals largely with the central work of the Institution, the Reports and Accounts of the individual Homes and Associations being published separately.

We deeply regret to report the death of Miss Louisa Blyton, Mrs. Irwin and Mrs. Marrian.

Miss Blyton, for a long time Hon. Secretary of the Harpurhey Home, was a member of the Council and the Committee of the Institution, and was one of the pioneers in forming the Lancashire and Cheshire Federation (now the North Western Federation) of Queen's Nursing Associations. Mrs. Irwin was for many years an active member of the Harpurhey Home Committee and Mrs. Marrian was a staunch supporter of the Northenden District Nursing Association.

HOMES AND ASSOCIATIONS

The Institution is comprised of 5 District Nurses' Homes, each in charge of a Superintendent, and 7 District Nursing Associations, one of which is in charge of a Senior Nurse.

QUEEN'S INSTITUTE REPORT

A report of Inspection has been received from the Queen's Institute which expresses satisfaction with the general progress made in all departments.

CASES AND VISITS

The total number of new cases nursed during the year was 7,220, involving 186,570 nursing visits. This is a decrease of 54 cases and an increase of 14,295 visits over last year.

These cases fall under the following main headings :—

STANDARD CHARGE PER VISIT

The Committee have raised the full standard charge per visit from 1s. 6d. to 2s. 0d. Necessitous cases will, as always, be nursed free of charge.

CO-OPERATION WITH HOSPITALS

Steps have been and continue to be taken to ensure the more speedy reference to our Nurses of patients leaving Hospitals who require the continuation of nursing treatment when they arrive home. We are glad to report that action to bring this about has been taken by the Manchester Municipal Hospitals and the Christie Hospital.

RECONSTRUCTION

The Committee have continued to give consideration to the reconstruction of the District Nursing Service and have reviewed proposals put forward by the Queen's Institute of District Nursing relating to national, regional and local reorganisation.

REVISED TRAINING SCHEME

The Harpurhey and Salford Homes have been approved as Key Training Homes under the National Revised Training Scheme for Queen's Nurses due to operate from May, 1945. A member of the staff of each Home has taken the Health Visitors' Certificate and has now returned to her Home to concentrate on Training. In order to carry out the new Training Scheme the Harpurhey Home requires a new District Room and we are glad to report that permission to undertake the necessary alterations has been given by the Ministry of Works.

HOME NURSING SCHEME

The experiment of a Group Contributory Scheme for Home Nursing has been started during the year and Miss Angela Lopez has been appointed as Organiser. Initial progress is evidence of both the need and the general desire for this Scheme and has revealed the fact that a large proportion of the workers, managements and members of social organisations enrolled had no previous knowledge of the home nursing service available for them. This Scheme is proving particularly acceptable in that the single contribution of 1d. a week paid through a Works or Social Group covers the contributor and all dependants, without restriction as to age or length of nursing treatment. The Committee wish to express their best thanks to the Hon. Group Secretaries, without whose great help the organisation of this Scheme would be impossible.

The Committee regret that their efforts to obtain a satisfactory arrangement for a joint Hospital-Home Nursing Scheme in conjunction with the Manchester and Salford Hospital Saturday Fund have met with no success.

NATIONAL FIRE SERVICE BENEFIT SCHEME FOR HOME NURSING

The Institution is participating in the National Fire Service Benefit Scheme for Home Nursing which came into operation in August, 1944, with approximately 1,000 members in the Manchester and Salford area. This undertaking is the first national scheme for home nursing to be organised and the Committee gratefully acknowledge a donation of £50 from its Committee for help given with the organising of the Scheme.

BRITISH MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

The Committee particularly acknowledge the help of Dr. J. I. Milne (Hon. Secretary) and the Committee of the Manchester Division of the British Medical Association in making the work of the Institution more widely known and appreciated amongst members of the medical profession and in supporting the Institution in its efforts to obtain closer co-operation with other health services.

MOBILE NURSING EXHIBITION

Queen's District Nursing is represented in a Mobile Nursing Exhibition arranged by the Manchester Corporation Public Health Department for presentation in schools. The Committee is deeply indebted to Miss G. N. Hopwood, a member of the Home Nursing Scheme Group at the Postal Censorship Department in Manchester, for kindly executing a beautifully designed and most suitable poster for the purpose.

SOUTH MANCHESTER ASSOCIATIONS

The supervision of the work in the single- and double-nurse districts in South Manchester continues to be carried out satisfactorily by one of the Institution's Superintendents.

BARLOW MOOR

The development of the local Provident Scheme on the Barlow Moor Estate has been satisfactory and has resulted in a membership of 1,002. The Association in this area continues to be operated from the central office pending its reorganisation or amalgamation with another Association, and the Committee wish to pay tribute to the work of Nurse Emes in this area.

WITHINGTON

The Committee are glad that the Withington Association has found it possible to engage a Queen's Nurse, and wish the local Committee every success with their plans for developing the District Nursing Service in Withington.

WYTHENSHAW

The Wythenshawe Committee have made good progress in rebuilding the work of their Association and the Central Committee have felt justified in making them a special grant to help on their efforts.

LECTURES

The extended courses of Lectures to Queen's Candidates, started last year, has been continued and will require very little alteration to conform with the revised syllabus advocated by the Queen's Institute in the new Training Scheme. New subjects in the courses include Ear, Nose and Throat, Eyes, Psychology, Food Values and Orthopaedics, and all lectures are open to fully-trained Queen's Nurses as post-graduate "refreshers."

THE STAFF

The Committee are deeply grateful to the Superintendents and Nurses for their loyalty and devotion to duty. It is to their great credit that the service to patients has been in no way disrupted by the difficulties of operating under wartime restrictions, particularly the shortage of domestic help in the Nurses' Homes. Thanks are also due to the organising and administrative staff for their efforts in carrying out the progressive policy laid down last year for the development of the home nursing service.

IN CONCLUSION

In conclusion the Committee tender their best thanks to the Hon. Auditors of the Central and Home Accounts, the Lecturers, the members of Home and Association Committees, the Voluntary Collectors in all areas and to all those who have in any way helped the work of the Institution by gifts in money, in kind, or in service.

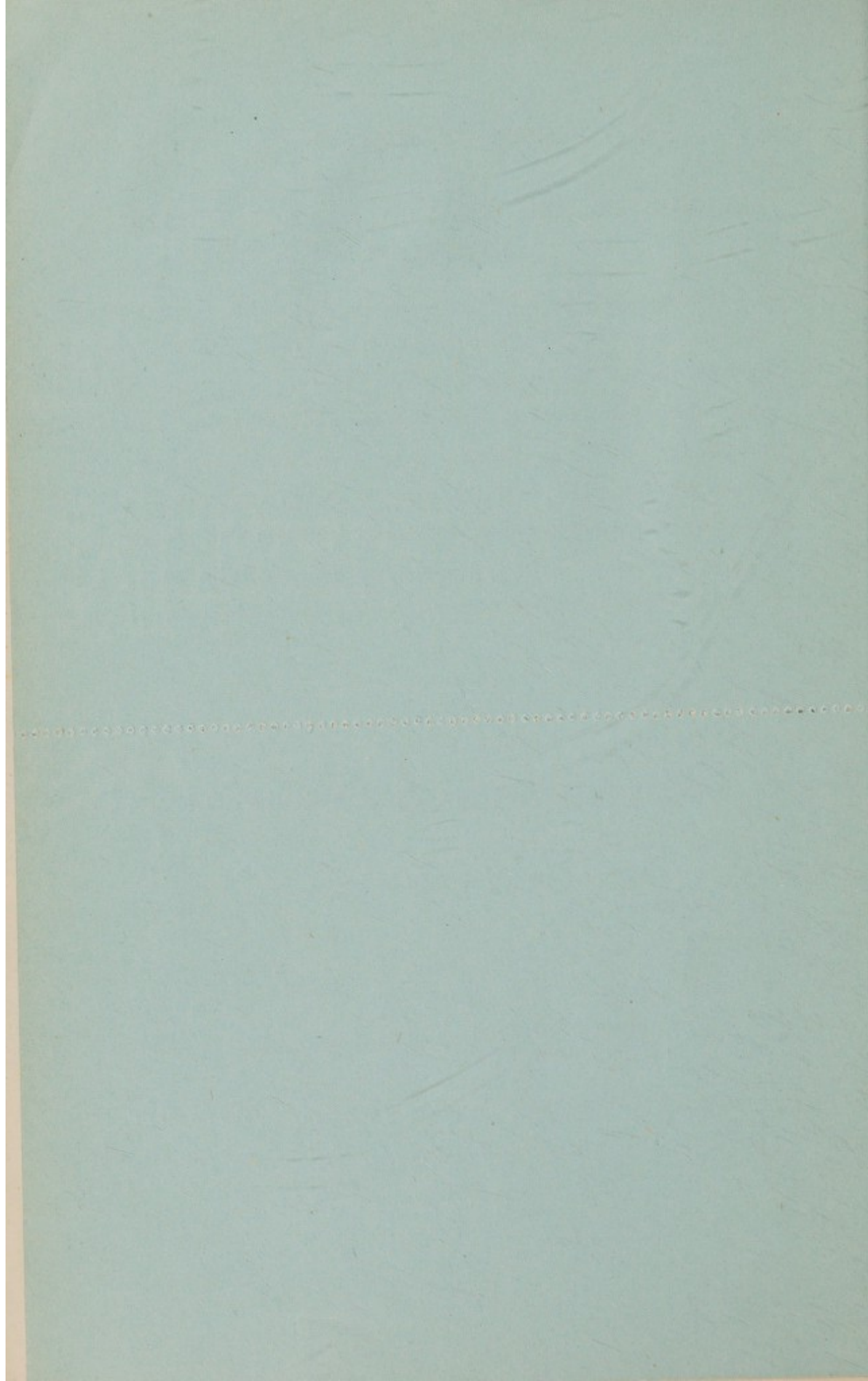

How to Use Your Home Nursing Service

THE SERVICE PROVIDES skilled visiting nursing by Queen's District Nurses, and covers both sexes and all ages. It includes all types of cases, both serious and slight, under the headings of Medical, Surgical, Gynæcological, Midwifery and Maternity, many infectious diseases, chronic illnesses, children's ailments, and minor operations in the home.

A QUEEN'S NURSE is State Registered before she undergoes the special Queen's training which fits her to apply the knowledge gained in Hospital to nursing in the home. She is the trusted ally of the Doctor and the friend and advisor of the family. The skill of Queen's Nurses has won them high tribute from the well-known medical journal, the *Lancet*, as "the cream of the nursing profession."

CALLING IN THE NURSE may be undertaken by any responsible person, providing a Doctor's instructions are obtained after the first visit. Prevention is better than cure — calling in the Nurse early may prevent a minor ailment from becoming an established illness.

HOSPITAL PATIENTS often need skilled "follow-up" treatment when they are sent home. The District Nurse can carry this out on a note of instructions from the Hospital Doctor.

FACTORY WELFARE DEPARTMENTS will find that this service dovetails into their welfare organisation. With Queen's Nurses available at home, personnel are relieved of the responsibility of looking after sick relatives or attending out-patients' departments.

THE COST of the service is approximately 2s. 3d. a visit, but patients are charged according to means, or are covered for free benefit through Contributory Schemes, etc. Necessitous cases are always nursed free.

TO YOU as an individual, to Doctors, Hospitals, Factory Welfare Departments and all other organisations, **this service is there for your benefit.** We ask your co-operation in supporting, using and helping to extend the Home Nursing Service in Manchester and Salford.
