THE CRUSADERS' EMBLEM AND ITS HISTORY

The use of the red cross with the double arms stretches back into Christian usage of the Middle Ages, when it was the emblem of the Second Crusade. It was employed by the celebrated Godefroy de Bouillion, who placed it on his standard at the capture of Jerusalem from the Infidel in 1099, and later had it incorporated in the arms of the House of Lorraine.

The use of this cross as an international emblem in the crusade against Tuberculosis dates from 1902, when it was recognised at the International Conference at Berlin.

Just as the great crusading movements of the Middle Ages unified Europe in the presence of a common enemy, this cross expresses the spirit of all countries of determined warfare upon Tuberculosis, the greatest plague that has ever devastated humanity.

Versions in the detailed form of the cross having crept in during the last thirty years, it has been decided to standardise its shape, and the representation on the cover of this report is that now adopted throughout the world.

OBJECT, MEMBERSHIP, AND METHODS OF THE ASSOCIATION

1. OBJECT.—The prevention of tuberculosis.
2. MEMBERSHIP.—The Association consists of Ordinary and of Life Members.
The contribution of Ordinary Members is 5s. annually. Those who subscribe annually a sum of not less than one guinea are enrolled as Subscribing Members. Life Members give a donation of five guineas.
3. METHODS.—
 - I. The education of public opinion and the stimulation of individual initiative by means of—
 - (a) A Central Office for the collection and distribution of information as to modes of diffusion of tuberculosis and measures of prevention.
 - (b) The circulation of pamphlets and leaflets setting forth in plain language the result of scientific investigations of the above points.
 - (c) Public lectures by men approved by the Council. Addresses at congresses and other public gatherings.
 - (d) Co-operation with other societies having for their object the promotion of public health.
 - (e) Co-operation with the Press.
 - (f) Periodical congresses and the issue of an annual report.
 - (g) The promotion of the establishment of open-air sanatoria for tuberculous patients.
 - II. The influencing of Parliament, County Councils, Health Authorities, Chambers of Agriculture, and other public and voluntary bodies on matters relating to the prevention of tuberculosis.
 - III. The establishment throughout the Country of local branches of the Association. Secretaries of branches are supplied with all literature at cost price.

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COUNCIL'S REPORT

To the 39th Annual General Meeting of Members of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, to be held in the Great Hall, British Medical Association House, London, W.C.1, on July 1st, 1938, at 4.30 p.m.

The year has been one of continuous activity in the anti-tuberculosis campaign both at home and abroad. The National Association has extended its sphere of operations by the affiliation of a number of fresh societies throughout the country and overseas. It has been in communication—exchanging reports and advice—with interested bodies all over the world. It has still further developed its special mission to the Island of Cyprus, of which a preliminary account was given in last year's Report. It has continued its support to the important work of Tuberculosis Nurse Commissioners in the northern counties of Scotland, which has been carried out with conspicuous success. Those, and other matters, will be dealt with more fully in subsequent paragraphs of the Report.

PRESIDENTSHIP

His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent has graciously expressed his desire to pay, for seven years, an annual subscription to the Association.

RESIGNATION OF SIR ROBERT PHILIP

Following the 38th Annual Meeting of the Association, from which he was absent owing to illness, the Council received intimation from Sir Robert Philip that, in keeping with doctor's orders, he must tender his resignation as Chairman of the Council.

In reply, the Council urged Sir Robert to reconsider the matter. This he accordingly did, with the result stated in the following letters which the Council resolved should be printed in the Annual Report:

LETTER SENT TO SIR ROBERT PHILIP BY DIRECTION OF
THE COUNCIL

March 21st, 1938.

DEAR SIR ROBERT,

The Council at their last meeting received with deep regret your letter informing them that, though much better in health, your physicians would not in future sanction recurrent journeys to London, and that you felt constrained therefore to advise the Council to accept your resignation of the Chairmanship.

In view of the considered opinion of your medical advisers the Council feel that they cannot ask you once again to reconsider your decision. They therefore, with profound regret, accept your resignation, though they hope that you will continue to remain a Member of the Council.

At such a moment the Council feel it is fitting to recall the great services which you have rendered the Association since its inception and over a period of some forty years.

Elected in 1899 an original Member of the Council shortly after the inauguration of the Association at a meeting held in Marlborough House, under the Chairmanship of the Prince of Wales, afterwards King Edward VII, you have served on the Council since that date until the present time; occupying the position of Vice-Chairman from 1913 to 1932, and from 1932 till to-day that of Chairman.

Throughout the whole of this period, your talents, energy and enthusiasm have ever been at the service of the Association, and it is but true to say that of the extensions of the work of the Society, which have gradually evolved, whether in the domain of education, prevention or treatment, the majority have received from you their inspiration, and each one of them your enthusiastic support.

The Council feel that they may justly claim that the work which the Association has accomplished under your guidance has played an important part among the factors which have led to the remarkable fall in the death-rate from tuberculosis, which has been so marked a feature of the past forty years.

Your colleagues are proud to think that your work is known and appreciated, not only by themselves, but by all who are interested in tuberculosis, whether in this country or indeed throughout the world; and that the "Edinburgh Tuberculosis Scheme," which you inaugurated, has formed the basis of the Governmental schemes for the control of tuberculosis, both in this country and in Scotland, and has since been widely followed elsewhere.

The Council regard it as a happy coincidence that the last development of the work of the Association, in which you took a personal share, was the extension of its activities beyond the borders of this Realm; and that the "Philip Dispensary" in Nicosia, the capital of Cyprus, will long perpetuate your name in that ancient and historic kingdom.

The members of the Council feel proud to have had the opportunity of working with you, and under your leadership, and it is in this spirit that they now with real sorrow accept your resignation.

REPLY FROM SIR ROBERT PHILIP TO THE ACTING CHAIRMAN
OF THE COUNCIL (THE MARCHIONESS OF TITCHFIELD)

DEAR LADY TITCHFIELD,

Your gracious letter of the 21st inst. has reached me. How can I adequately thank you and the Council for your kind thought and the very generous words you have used?

The unwillingness of the doctors to sanction the recurrent monthly journeys to London seemed to leave no course open to me save resignation of the Chairmanship of the Council. It was a severe wrench to realise that the period of almost forty years, during which I have enjoyed the happiest relations with so many dear, good friends, had reached its close.

Throughout those years we have worked together most pleasantly. Latterly when the larger responsibility was placed on me, first as Vice-Chairman and then as Chairman of the Council, what service I could render was at all times made easier through the cordial co-operation and support of the Council and the knowledge that any effort on my part would meet with sympathetic consideration and goodwill.

Your letter has reminded me of the early days of the Association, when Sir William Broadbent was first Chairman of the Council. From the beginning our aims were broad, yet definite, and included all measures whereby the incalculable damage caused to the nation by the inroads of the tubercle bacillus might be prevented, or limited to the utmost possible degree. I doubt if it was conceived by anyone in these early days that within the short period of approximately forty years the mortality from tuberculosis—and the associated invalidism, crippling and impoverishment—would have been reduced to so remarkable a degree—about 70 per cent.

Month by month throughout successive years many problems attaching to the subject have presented themselves. Slowly but surely the continuous trench warfare has proved successful and, as your letter suggests, the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, inspired in 1899 by King Edward VII when Prince of Wales, and fortunate in the Patronage of successive monarchs since that date, has contributed signally towards the education of public opinion, the stimulation of individual initiative, and the influencing of Parliament and public authorities.

The outcome has been development throughout the country of a co-ordinated plan for the prevention and care of tuberculosis, which is admittedly unsurpassed in any other country.

Both before and after the introduction of the National Tuberculosis Scheme, the Association's constant endeavour has been to stand by and assist the Government and statutory bodies by every means in their power.

The work that has been overtaken could not have been accomplished without large expenditure. We required large funds. I cannot refrain from referring again to your manifold labours as Chairman of the Appeal Committee, the magnificent success of which placed the affairs of the Association on a sound financial basis.

In vacating the Chair, I am consoled by the certainty that the great

adventure on which we are embarked can have but one termination, and that some of you may expect to see the final victory.

It will remain for me one of the happiest experiences of my life to have been so closely associated with the Council in the great endeavour and to have enjoyed your trust in the way your letter indicates. I shall always cherish the memory of your innumerable personal kindnesses. For everything I thank you, one and all.

ACCEPTANCE OF CHAIRMANSHIP BY THE MARCHIONESS OF TITCHFIELD

To fill the vacancy thus caused, the Council unanimously invited the Vice-Chairman (the Marchioness of Titchfield), whose warm interest in, and devoted service to, the Association are too well known to require further emphasis. Lady Titchfield has graciously agreed to take temporary charge of the affairs of the Association. The Council, in welcoming her to the Chair, would express the hope that her provisional acceptance will merge at the end of the year into a permanent occupancy of the seat for which she has so many claims and qualifications.

To fill the vacancy caused by Her Ladyship's acceptance, the Council have unanimously invited Sir Percival H-S-Hartley, whose interest in everything pertaining to tuberculosis is widely recognised and highly appreciated.

THE FACTORY ACT, 1937

Sympathetic reference was made in the last Annual Report to the Factory Bill then before Parliament. The Factory Act received the Royal Assent on July 30th, 1937, and becomes operative on the first day of July 1938.

The Council welcome the provisions of the Act which imply improvement in the environmental conditions of the workers and thereby tend towards their increased resistance to tuberculous disease.

The following provisions seem especially noteworthy:

Hours of work—The total hours worked, exclusive of intervals for meals and rest, must neither exceed nine in any day nor forty-eight in a week.

As from July 1st, 1938, forty-four hours is to be substituted for forty-eight in the case of young persons under 16, with certain specific exceptions.

Maximum period of employment.—The period of employment must not exceed eleven hours in any day, and it must not begin earlier than 7 a.m. or end

later than 8 p.m. (6 p.m. in the case of young persons under 16) or on Saturday 1 p.m.

Maximum spell of work.—The length of a spell of continuous employment must not exceed four and a half hours, and employment is deemed to be continuous unless interrupted by an interval of at least half an hour. If, however, an interval of not less than ten minutes is allowed, the spell may be extended to five hours.

Simultaneous periods and intervals.—The periods of employment and intervals for meals and rest must be the same for all women and young persons employed in the factory, except that the period of employment for those under 16 may end at an earlier hour than the period of employment for the others.

Further restrictions regarding factory employment are that women and young persons must not work on Sundays, overtime is allowed only during pressure of work, and, as indicated in the Council's last report, a young person (broadly speaking) is one between the ages of 14 and 18.

MILK—THE AGRICULTURE ACT, 1937

The importance of the part played by tuberculosis in dairy herds as a cause of human infection is growingly admitted. For long it was supposed that infection of bovine origin led solely, or chiefly, to the production of tuberculosis in bones, joints and glands. Recently it has been conclusively shown that milk-borne infection may lead to tuberculous disease in the lung and practically any organ.

The fact affords full justification of the campaign waged by the pioneer producers of tubercle-free milk. The Association has backed the aims of such producers to the utmost of its powers. It welcomed the establishment of the attested herd scheme, whereby financial benefit is conferred on producers of milk from cattle which have been guaranteed by independent authorities as free from tuberculosis. Every fresh herd coming under the attested scheme represents advantage to the health of the nation as well as to the owner of the herd.

The practical reception of the attested herd scheme has been various in different parts of the country. The curious fact has emerged that Scotland has taken more kindly than England to the provisions of the Agriculture Act (1937), as the following table regarding attested herds shows:

From the above figures it will be observed that the numbers of animals in attested herds has been multiplied approximately three times during the past year. While Scotland is much ahead of England in this respect, this is chiefly due to the concerted and intensive movement in the south-western area (Ayrshire and Lanarkshire). The position is very different in the northern counties where little progress has been made.

It is obvious that much remains to be done. However, the movement is spreading, and it is reasonable to assume that, if the effort be maintained at the accelerating pace, we are advancing surely towards the complete eradication of bovine tuberculosis in the country.

It may be further assumed that, *pari passu* with the elimination of the disease in the bovine animal, tuberculosis of bovine origin in the human subject will disappear.

From every point of view, the duty is obviously laid on us to *clean up our herds*.

EDUCATIONAL PROPAGANDA

The education of public opinion and the stimulation of individual initiative have been the fundamental methods of the National Association ever since its establishment. Accordingly, the Council warmly welcomed the decision of the Minister of Health to commence a campaign for popularising the health services of the nation. The campaign was inaugurated by the Prime Minister during the autumn of 1937. A definite period in the campaign was devoted to propaganda relating to tuberculosis.

While recognising that intensive methods during limited periods, with the exhibition throughout the country of posters and the like, are serviceable, the Council believe that the quieter continuous method of approach among groups of interested persons who will attend illustrated "talks" or cinematographic films will prove the more effective method and should be maintained and developed throughout the country.

NEW SOUND FILMS

The new sound film, entitled *The Conquest of Tuberculosis*, announced in last year's Report, has proved popular and has been shown widely throughout the country. It illustrates in happy fashion the various features of the National Tuberculosis

Scheme—describing fully the work of the Tuberculosis Dispensary, the Sanatorium and the Hospital. It is a *modernised* version of the well-known John McNeil Film, which was prepared by Dr. Halliday Sutherland to illustrate the methods in vogue in Edinburgh in 1910. The new film gives due prominence to the bovine aspects of the problem. It is a human document without horrors and is suitable for all types of meetings, for learned and simple folk alike.

The film entitled *Makers of Men*, which illustrates the great work of Burrow Hill Colony, has become a favourite since it was first shown five years ago. The film had a most favourable reception at Geneva when shown in connection with the Health Section of the League of Nations.

The original silent version will further be popularised by “sound” accompaniment. The Council realise the importance of modernising their teaching methods in all possible ways.

PROPAGANDIST MEETINGS

A list of meetings organised by the Medical Commissioner under the auspices of the Association will be found in Appendix II.

The meetings have been arranged with the co-operation of local health authorities, voluntary health societies, and other such agencies, the Co-operative Society, Rural Institutes, Women's Institutes, the Industrial Health Education Society, and similar bodies.

At one of the meetings during the National Health Campaign, at Kingston-upon-Hull, the Medical Commissioner had the good fortune to address an audience of some 1,900 persons. This remarkable gathering was the result of collaboration between the Co-operative Society and the Tuberculosis Officer.

THE NURSE COMMISSIONERS

The excellent work achieved by the two Nurse Commissioners in the northern counties of Scotland has been maintained with growing success, as the following facts indicate.

While there has been an appreciable decrease in the mortality rate from tuberculosis in all the Scottish counties, the decrease has been specially noticeable in the five counties covered by the activities of the Nurse Commissioners. This is evidenced by the

following table in which the death-rate from tuberculosis in 1926 is compared with that for 1936.

The recent Report of the Royal Victoria Hospital Tuberculosis Trust (Scotland) comments as follows:

"It would be unfair to attribute the striking diminution entirely to the Nurse Commissioners' work, but there is no doubt that by their visits to affected persons in their homes, their public addresses and talks to school children, and their friendly linking up of anti-tuberculosis effort throughout the communities, they have contributed much towards the happy result.

"One example of the work covered may be cited. One of the Nurse Commissioners, during five months last summer, gave 101 talks in 98 schools to 5,234 children, addressed 16 meetings, visited 74 'contacts,' and interviewed some 340 public health officers, doctors, education officers, nurses, and other people of importance."

Between them, the two Nurse Commissioners gave talks to 16,661 children, and conducted 2,494 interviews with doctors, other officials and home visits.

The Council are satisfied that in the work of the Nurse Commissioners is to be found the solution of many of the difficulties inherent to the spread of tuberculosis in widely scattered rural areas.

CARE COMMITTEES

The most fruitful development of the campaign at this stage is the establishment and development of Tuberculosis Care Committees throughout the country generally.

It has been for long, and continues to be, the urgent wish of the Council to see a more or less complete network of such Committees intimately linked to the headquarters of the Association. This would prove to their mutual advantage in many directions.

Such a liaison affords the best means of intercommunication between campaigners in different parts of the country, the various local Committees acquainting headquarters as to the results of their experience and any fresh developments which

may have taken place in the given area, while headquarters, in turn, would be helpful with suggestion and, where the circumstances warranted it, with financial assistance.

The Council have begun to hold Conferences of the members of Tuberculosis Care Committees from time to time at headquarters. Last March such a Conference was held and was attended by 150 delegates. A free interchange of experience and opinion and a useful discussion took place regarding the part played by such Committees and the best methods for their recruitment and maintenance. Abundant evidence was submitted regarding the great financial advantages of affiliation with the central Association, including particularly the benefits resulting from the Christmas Seal Sale.

One of the practical advantages of the liaison is to be found in the mutual benefit resulting from the reference of cases of tuberculous patients and their families from local Care Committees to headquarters and vice versa. By such means the help required for the particular need—perhaps not otherwise possible—may be secured. The result of their experience has led the Council to arrange for another Conference of Care Committees on the forenoon preceding the Annual Conference in June 1938.

PUBLICITY

For a number of years more or less regular measures have been taken by the Council to ensure the enlightenment of the public regarding the work of the Association and the various fields of activity concerned with the prevention and control of tuberculosis.

The Council desire to record their indebtedness to the British Press and to willing workers in different parts of the country who have aided the Association in this direction.

For two or three years the Council had the benefit of expert guidance from a leading firm of publicity experts. On grounds of economy, and with a view to self-containedness, the Council have now arranged to carry out publicity methods on their own account. They have accordingly appointed Mr. W. A. J. Clarke as a member of the office staff, the new plan taking effect as from January 1st, 1938.

Communications regarding facts, methods and local events bearing on the tuberculosis campaign, including more particularly the activities of local Tuberculosis Care Committees, will

receive the careful consideration of the Council. They should be addressed to the Publicity Officer, National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, Tavistock House North, Tavistock Square, London, W.C.1.

HANDBOOK OF TUBERCULOSIS SCHEMES

The new edition of the *Handbook of Tuberculosis Schemes* is in course of preparation and will be published in the autumn. The Handbook, which was begun some twenty years ago, constitutes now the most complete source of information regarding the operations of the National Tuberculosis Scheme in Great Britain and Ireland. It is revised from year to year with the greatest care and the information brought up to date.

Each successive edition has contained fresh features. The coming edition will afford fuller and more exact information regarding the times of attendance at each Tuberculosis Dispensary and the facilities available at the Dispensaries, e.g. X-ray examination, tuberculin tests, and the like. The sections dealing with the residential institutions have been greatly added to. The volume may be regarded as the standard guide and cannot fail to be of service to all serious workers in the field of tuberculosis, whether official or voluntary.

ACTIVITIES IN THE ISLAND OF CYPRUS

Since our last Report the work of Dr. Bardswell as Medical Commissioner, with the assistance of Nurse Jays as Nurse Commissioner, has been successfully continued. The original objectives of the undertaking, viz. an epidemiological survey of tuberculosis conditions in Cyprus, and assistance to the administration in the establishment of a sound anti-tuberculosis scheme throughout the island, have been in large measure achieved. Warm testimony to this effect has been offered from all quarters in Cyprus.

A specially valued tribute to the work of the National Association, and in particular to the principles which have inspired our Chairman's life work, was given in the naming of the first Tuberculosis Dispensary established by the Cyprus Anti-Tuberculosis League in Nicosia, 1937. Under the title of "The Philip Tuberculosis Dispensary" it will no doubt be a permanent feature of the anti-tuberculosis organisation and a constant reminder of the Association's activities through Dr. Bardswell and under the Chairmanship of Sir Robert Philip.

A dispensary has also been established at Larnaca. Dr. Bardswell and Nurse Jays have rendered valuable assistance in the organisation of its work.

The publication of Dr. Bardswell's interim report* on his mission has given concrete form to the many and varied results of his investigations. Its appearance in February 1938 was favourably received in all quarters, both British and Cypriot. It is recognised that the social and economic value of the Report is considerable. Further it offers a vivid picture of the rural life and conditions of the island and indicates the exceptional difficulties of an investigation conducted among a population whose outlook is more Asiatic than European and whose social habits and lack of education make progress of all kinds slow and uncertain.

The main conclusion of Dr. Bardswell's Interim Report is, however, satisfactory, and there is no reason to expect that his final views will modify it in any essential particular. Though the disease is fairly uniformly spread throughout the different administrative districts, compared with similar communities its incidence is not unduly large, nor is it of a virulent type.

Once again Dr. Bardswell records his appreciation of the unfailing zeal and intelligence shown by Nurse Jays throughout the two years of the mission. Without her special qualification as a linguist, and her understanding of the Cypriot character and conditions, his task would, in some directions, have been impossible of fulfilment.

Subsequent to the decision of the Council, at their meeting in May 1938, and the announcement to the Colonial Office that the mission under Dr. Bardswell would be terminated from the date of his departure from Cyprus in June—the following letters have been received:

SIR,

Mr. Secretary MacDonald understands that the two years' investigation by Dr. Noel Bardswell, M.V.O., M.D., F.R.C.P., F.R.S., into the problem of tuberculosis in Cyprus, which has generously been paid for by the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, is shortly due to reach a conclusion. He directs me to take this opportunity to convey to you, both on

his own behalf and on that of the Government of Cyprus, an expression of warm appreciation and gratitude for the work which has been done by Dr. Bardswell and by his assistant, Nurse Jays. Mr. MacDonald has no doubt that the work accomplished will prove to be of the greatest benefit to the Colony; and he trusts that, as a result of Dr. Bardswell's investigations and of the appointment of the special Tuberculosis Officer who is now to be made available for the continuance of the work, it will be found possible to take effective measures against the disease.

A copy is enclosed of a despatch from the Governor of Cyprus commenting on Dr. Bardswell's interim report, which Mr. MacDonald thinks may be of interest to the Association.

Mr. MacDonald is anxious that copies of Dr. Bardswell's report should be made available to the Colonial Advisory Medical Committee for their perusal and consideration. He has directed me to inquire whether the Association would be so good as to furnish him for this purpose with fifteen additional copies of the report.

SIR,

I have the honour to inform you that I have received a copy of Dr. Noel Bardswell's interim report on the incidence and means of control of tuberculosis in Cyprus, prepared under the auspices of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

2. This report is undoubtedly of great value, and it is reassuring to note that, while Dr. Bardswell is careful to record that his conclusions are not final, he does not consider that tuberculosis is so prevalent in the island or occurs in such a serious form as was previously supposed.

3. The references in the report to the dread with which tuberculosis is regarded by Cypriots and the difficulties with which the Department of Medical Services has consequently been confronted in endeavouring to control the disease are particularly interesting. It is to be hoped that the gratifying results of Dr. Bardswell's preliminary investigations, and his personal demonstration to Cypriots of the safety of association with consumptives under proper hygienic conditions, will lead to much less concealment of the disease and facilitate the task of taking care of sufferers and of protecting the community.

Steps are already being taken to carry out as far as possible Dr. Bardswell's recommendations (pages 115 to 119 of his report) for the establishment of dispensaries staffed by District Nurses or Health Visitors; and, in accordance with the approval conveyed in your despatch No. 1 of January 3rd, 1938, a District Medical Officer has been seconded to perform the duties of a Tuberculosis Officer responsible for the co-ordination of the whole scheme.

BURROW HILL SANATORIUM COLONY

During 1937, as in 1936, beds have been fully occupied. This full use of the Institution over a period of two years indicates that the special facilities available at the Colony meet a definite need in anti-tuberculosis work.

An interesting development during the year has been the entry of pupils for the London Chamber of Commerce examination. This provides opportunities for examinations throughout the year in addition to those formerly available under the auspices of the Royal Society of Arts.

In the Garden Course there have again been a fair number of boys who have entered for the examination of the Royal Horticultural Society. The number who have succeeded is also very satisfactory.

As in former years, London patients trained in gardening have been fortunate in having provided for them openings in the Parks Department of the London County Council. Of those patients who have completed a course, and of whom there is reliable information, no fewer than 88 per cent. are in employment.

In the report of the School for 1936, reference was made to the new venture of production of a magazine—the *Burrovian*. This journal has now passed beyond the experimental stage, and is a very creditable magazine.

CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE

Once more the receipts from the Christmas Seal Sale during 1937 have constituted a record. There is growing evidence of the interest of the community in the Christmas Seal Sale. This

is seen, on the one hand, in the addition to the number of affiliated bodies who have sought to be included among those enjoying the benefits of the scheme, and, on the other hand, in the amount of money obtained thereby in the areas which have been included. Interesting facts regarding such points will be found in the Foreword to the Christmas Seal Sale Calendar by the Marchioness of Titchfield. Copies of the Calendar may be had on application to the Organising Secretary of the Christmas Seal Sale, Tavistock House North, Tavistock Square, London, W.C.1.

Public interest in the movement was enhanced by an invitation to the press to attend a meeting regarding its object and methods, presided over by the Marchioness of Titchfield and addressed by the then Minister of Health, Sir Kingsley Wood.

Enthusiasm for the Sale reached its climax when Her Majesty the Queen ordered a quantity of Seals for use in her correspondence.

The Council desire most gratefully to record their loyal appreciation of the personal interest in the movement which Her Majesty has shown ever since she was graciously pleased, as Duchess of York, to become its Patron.

The Christmas Seal Sale constitutes one of the best forms of propaganda regarding the work of the Association, and it likewise affords the sinews of war to the combatants. It cannot be too often repeated that all money received through the Seal Sale in a given area is retained and spent within the area by the corresponding affiliated Committee.

Details of the method by which voluntary societies concerned with tuberculosis may become affiliated with the Association and share the benefits of the scheme will be found in Appendix IV.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE—BRISTOL, 1937

The Conference was held in the Physics Class-room in the University of Bristol on July 1st and 2nd, 1937. It was attended by 324 delegates and was eminently successful.

The subjects under discussion included the following: "Propaganda and Publicity Methods"—"Preventive Institutions, with particular reference to Open-Air Schools"—"Equipment and Activities of a Tuberculosis Dispensary."

Discussion was lively and practical. Besides delegates from

Great Britain and Ireland, representatives from the following countries were welcomed—South Africa, Jamaica, India, France and Egypt. The International Union against Tuberculosis also sent a delegate.

A large number of the delegates visited the lately erected Health Clinic in Bristol, and the Council would like to record their thanks to the Medical Officer of Health for Bristol (Dr. Parry) for arranging the tour of inspection and personally entertaining the delegates.

Visits were also paid to the Ham Green Hospital and Sanatorium and to Winsley Sanatorium. At the latter place the visitors were welcomed by Dr. Alexander who mentioned that the Sanatorium owed its establishment to a Branch of the National Association. In 1898 Sir St. Clair Thomson, then Hon. Secretary of the N.A.P.T., appealed to Dr. Watson Williams to form a Branch of the Association, and subsequently the Branch raised the money to promote Winsley Sanatorium.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE—1938

The arrangements for the 24th Annual Conference of the Association are well in hand. The Conference will be held in the Great Hall, Tavistock House, London, W.C.1, from June 29th to July 2nd.

The Minister of Health, the Rt. Hon. Walter Elliot, has kindly consented to open the Conference, over which the Marchioness of Titchfield will preside.

The Programme covers a large range of subjects:

1. The development and organisation of anti-tuberculosis activities in rural areas;
2. The Family and Tuberculosis: the discovery and protection of contacts in a tuberculous household;
3. The Control of Tuberculosis in Tropical and Sub-Tropical Regions;
4. The Mental Aspects of Tuberculosis.

The more formal discussions are to be preceded by a simpler Conference regarding Care Work in the widest sense, and the value and methods of the Christmas Seal Sale as a material aid to financing the work.

INTERNATIONAL UNION AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS

After considerable delay, owing to the Spanish situation, the

10th Conference of the International Union against Tuberculosis was held at Lisbon from September 5th to 10th, 1937. In spite of the disturbing circumstances there was a pretty good attendance. Unfortunately the delegates from the Association found themselves unable to attend.

The discussions were interesting, including:

1. The radiological aspects of the pulmonary hilum and their interpretation.
2. Primary tuberculosis infection in the adolescent and the adult.
3. The open case of tuberculosis in relation to the family and household.

Much to the credit of the local committee, a most complete and well-illustrated report of the meetings has already been published and widely circulated.

The Secretary-General of the Association is in close touch with the Secretary-General of the International Union and is in a position to transmit news of international interest for publication in the Bulletin of the Union.

FINANCE

The nett expenditure of the Association has been considerably higher this year, mainly due to increased expenditure in Cyprus and at the Head Office, but the profit on the sale of investments was considerable, and there was in consequence little shrinkage in the saleable assets. There has been no change of importance in the policy of the Association, but it is as well to note that its income is likely to shrink further, and the rise in the cost of administration to remain permanently higher.

MEMBERSHIP OF COUNCIL

It is with deep regret that the Council have to record the death, since last Annual Conference, of Sir William Younger, Bart., LL.D., and Sir Thomas Stanton, K.C.M.G., M.D., F.R.C.P.

Sir William Younger, who had been a member of the Council since 1910, took the keenest interest in many practical aspects of the tuberculosis problem. In his own county he was an inspiring force, and gave most generously of his time and money towards the erection and maintenance of institutions for the behoof of tuberculous sufferers. He was a most zealous helper in the activities of the Association and, in particular, was the means of launching the caravan crusade for the popularising of the subject.

Sir Thomas Stanton was invited barely a year ago to join the Council. As Chief Medical Adviser to the Secretary of State for the Colonies he had lent a most sympathetic ear to the proposal of the special commission to Cyprus, and was of the utmost service in bringing the scheme to fruition. The Council mourn the premature demise of one who, from his long experience in such matters, would have added strength and wisdom to the Council's deliberations.

The Council have much pleasure in welcoming two new members whose election falls to be confirmed at the Annual Meeting—namely, the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Dudley, M.C., D.L., Chairman of Brompton Hospital, and Dr. A. J. R. O'Brien, C.M.G., M.C., D.P.H., who has been appointed Chief Medical Adviser to the Secretary of State for the Colonies in succession to Sir Thomas Stanton.

APPENDIX I

BURROW HILL SANATORIUM COLONY

(a) Report of Medical Superintendent, 1937

During 1937, as in 1936, beds have been fully occupied throughout the year. This full use of the Institution over a period of two years indicates that the special facilities available at the Colony meet a definite need in anti-tuberculosis work. The fact that patients are sent from so many different local authorities throughout the country shows that the special function of the Institution is becoming more widely known.

In the report for 1936 attention was drawn to the increased interest displayed all over the country in the welfare and training of cripples. It was pointed out that this was reflected at Burrow Hill by an increase in the number of admissions in the surgical group. For such patients our clerical course provides a first-class opportunity in training. In this connection it is worthy of record that the film of the Colony (*Makers of Men*) was shown at the International Exhibition of the Work of Cripples held at Edinburgh in October 1937. The film was frequently shown and was the subject of much favourable comment. There could be no better opportunity of making the work of the Colony known to those who are concerned with the training and rehabilitation of the tuberculous cripple.

A more detailed account of the work in the School, the Commercial Department and the Horticultural Course will be found in the separate reports of the Schoolmaster and the Horticultural Instructor. The statistical tables indicate the excellent results achieved. Again it should be stressed that so many of our patients, particularly in the surgical group, have had education seriously interrupted by illness and prolonged hospital treatment. In view of this handicap the results are all the more creditable.

An interesting addition to the School curriculum during the year has been the entry of pupils for the London Chamber of Commerce examination. This provides opportunity for examinations throughout the year in addition to those formerly available under the auspices of the Royal Society of Arts. Thus, pupils have a chance to take certificates at more regular intervals and are less likely to miss an opportunity of taking an examination owing to the date of completion of course falling just before an examination is due.

In the garden course there have again been a fair number of boys who have entered for the examination of the Royal Horticultural Society. The number who have succeeded is also very satisfactory. It should be mentioned that success in this examination implies consistent study and a good educational standard. It is by no means within the scope of the ordinary pupil in the garden course even though he may be a very good practical worker.

As in former years, London patients trained in gardening have been fortunate in having provided for them openings in the Parks Department of the London County Council. This is a wonderful opportunity for the garden trainee who has proved himself to be satisfactory in his work and has completed a full course of two years' training. It is also, of course, a great incentive to keenness in work. If other local authorities could be persuaded to do something in this direction it would be of great assistance to us in the running of our garden course.

Results in terms of employment continue to be good, and are fully up to the excellent standard of last year. Of those patients who have completed a course, and of whose present condition we have succeeded in obtaining reliable information, no fewer than 88 per cent. are in employment. It should be pointed out that in fact the percentage of those employed may be even higher than this figure. Quite a number of our trained patients prove impossible to trace. They have ceased to attend Dispensary or Clinic, and, in some cases, have moved to other localities in which their address is not known. There is every reason to believe that such patients are well and at work. Indeed, in some few cases, one knows this to be the case, and then such patients can be included in our figures for employment, but others, who in all likelihood are well and at work, must be classed as untraced because we are unable to obtain absolutely dependable information regarding them.

In the report of the School for 1936, reference was made to the new venture of production of a magazine—*The Burrovian*. This journal has now passed beyond the experimental stage, and is a very creditable production. It appears three times a year and contains some excellent material. In addition to the work of patients in residence, we are pleased to find in its pages contributions from ex-patients. Not a few of these keep themselves informed of the news of the Colony by having the magazine sent to them. In course of time *The Burrovian* may prove a valuable means of keeping in touch with ex-patients.

We continue to have striking expressions of appreciation in letters received from ex-patients and their parents. Many of these are of too personal character for publication, even in the form of extracts. A few, however, couched in more general terms are quoted in the appendix to this report.

Still more satisfactory as an estimate of the value of our work and the cordial relations existing between patients and staff is the frequency with which we are visited by former patients. Some have grown and developed so much in the interval that they may have to introduce themselves. It is difficult to recognise in the young man of to-day the boy of a few years ago. Then, indeed, we feel that the Colony merits the title which was given to the film describing its work—*Makers of Men*.

"... after C— P— has been to the Colony we do not need any convincing of the value of its work. ..."

I often think of Burrow Hill Colony, and hope that the fine work is still going on as splendidly as ever. . . ."

Much credit, too, is due to the educational facilities provided by the Colony. Judging by his certificates they are indeed efficient. In closing, I wish your scheme every success for the future in carrying out the 'Making of Men.' . . ."

Report on the School Year 1937

The number of students in the School, particularly in the clerical side, remained very near to the maximum during 1937. Most of them had been sent for a period of two years, and with this longer time in hand it was possible for them to go through their School course more carefully.

There was little change in the distribution of good, bad, and indifferent scholars. The lowest group—in the Gardeners—was very backward in school training, with a lag of three to four years behind the normal standard. Although the personnel of the group changed during the year through admissions and discharges, the "average intelligence" of the group remained steady and low. This group, whose members usually have had years of broken schooling, seems to be a permanent feature.

On the other hand, there was an increase in the number of boys who were able to take advanced subjects. During 1937 four were at work in preparation for examinations in 1938, and there were several more who showed great promise for the months ahead. It was possible with these more intelligent pupils to leave much of their work to private study, and a great measure of their success must be put down to their careful management and industry.

We obtained much help from the Surrey County Library by the loan of expensive text-books. Numbers were borrowed dealing with the usual school subjects, and it was very pleasing to note how many boys were anxious to read more about a topic, and prepare themselves for the coming

stages. Many books, which dealt with the boys' hobbies, were borrowed for leisure reading: some of the subjects were Astronomy, Commercial Art, Internal Combustion Engines, Stamp-collecting and Wireless.

At Easter and Midsummer the Royal Society of Arts examinations were held, and the results were quite good. The details of the numbers entered, and the percentage succeeding, are given elsewhere.

There has always been, up to 1937, a big gap between the Midsummer examination of one year and the Easter examination of the following year. That gap has now been filled by the introduction of the elementary examination of the London Chamber of Commerce. This body has examinations in November and February, and thus there are tests at, approximately, quarterly intervals. The syllabus of the L.C.C. examinations is similar to that of the R.S.A. examinations, and the work for both can be carried on simultaneously. Pitman's shorthand tests also come four times a year.

The School magazine *The Burrovian* appeared at Easter, Midsummer and Christmas. It compares favourably, both in subject-matter and printing, with all the journals which I have seen, and which originate from similar institutions. Many articles were received from patients who had been discharged previously, and as many copies were sent out as were sold in the Colony. All the work entailed in the production was done by a number of youths in the School office. *The Burrovian* may be said to have passed its beginning stage now, and is established as an item of the School life. It seems to be well worth the extra work, and the contributions which it calls for have an undoubted educational value.

Report on the training of boys in horticulture at Burrow Hill Colony

It is satisfactory to note that, during the past year, the numbers of boys in training have been about normal and that the physique and disposition of new arrivals are about the same with, perhaps, a slightly better standard of education.

This gives the Instructors a much wider scope for instruction as we can devote more time to boys of equal educational standard by taking them in a class instead of having several such progressive classes.

Of the new arrivals to the Colony it is a pleasure to note both the physical and mental improvement which takes place after a few weeks in the gardens, thus assuring us of boys likely to prove suitable trainees, some of whom take very kindly to this class of work.

As in former years, the Parks Department of the London County Council have found employment for a number of boys from the London area and this fact has always proved a great stimulant to boys in training here. It is to be noticed that boys who may be considered as likely candidates for such posts are keener and more easy to teach.

We have, in recent years, turned out a number of boys who have entered for and passed the Senior and Junior examinations of the Royal Horticultural Society. During the past year four of our boys gained certificates in

such examinations and I am pleased to say we have entered three more for the Senior and three more for the Junior examinations. In our opinion, all of these have an excellent chance of passing.

We also hold our own local examinations twice yearly, with awards of prizes, which gives the boys something to work for; it also gives the Instructors an opportunity of finding out the boys most likely to be suitable for outside situations.

In addition to the boys already mentioned as having found work in the London County Council's Parks, others have been successful in finding employment in various private gardens, nurseries and institutions. Reports show that these boys are making good progress in their work and it would appear that the training they receive at the Colony proves a definite asset when they take up ordinary employment.

It is hoped that, in the future, an even larger percentage may be placed in garden work in order that the training which we endeavour to give may not be wasted.

(b) Lectures and Cinematograph Demonstrations

The services of the Medical Commissioner are available to Health Authorities and other organisations to give lectures illustrated by films and slides. He can make arrangements for showing the films with one of the Association's portable projectors in almost any kind of hall, provided that there are no sky-lights. Black curtains which will obscure the windows of all but the largest halls are carried. The Association's technical assistant will erect the screen and apparatus and project the films and slides.

Those who wish to arrange for these lectures are asked to write to the Medical Commissioner giving, if possible, a range of suitable dates and particulars of the size of the hall and the approximate number and size of the windows that will have to be darkened (if the meeting is held in daylight hours).

If there is adequate publicity, the public will attend these lectures in satisfactory numbers. By means of posters, newspaper advertisements, window cards, handbills and pulpit announcements it is possible to ensure that most members of any community will *know* of the meeting. If it be brought to their notice persistently a large number will attend.

Special gatherings of school children are usually held in the afternoon at about 3 o'clock, by permission of the education authority. Suitably chosen films which give the positive side of the subject and are free from disagreeable features are shown. These talks are very successful, and, apart from their intrinsic value, they help to advertise the public meeting in the evening.

No one need fear that people will be afraid to attend a lecture on Tuberculosis. If it is well organised and adequately advertised there need be no doubt of its success.

All educational work in Wales is carried out by the King Edward VII Welsh National Memorial Association. The Headquarters of the Association are at the Memorial Offices, Westgate Street, Cardiff.

HIRE OF CINEMATOGRAPH FILMS AND SLIDES

A full list of lantern slides and description of cinematograph films available for hire from the Association will be sent on application to the Medical Commissioner.

The Association's cinematograph films and slides cover the subject of the Prevention of Tuberculosis in its widest sense. There is material to illustrate lectures to medical students and nurses, as well as more homely talks to mothers and children.

The Association is anxious that these should be of the greatest possible value to anyone who is preparing a lecture on a special aspect of the subject.

The Medical Commissioner will, on request, offer suggestions as to the most suitable slides and films for any particular purpose, and will send type-written notes to form the basis of a lecture.

Cinematograph projectors taking films of standard and 16 mm. size can usually be obtained locally at a moderate charge. The current may be obtained from any electricity supply of over 50 volts, whether Direct or Alternating.

The films are non-inflammable, and may be shown without special licence or insurance in any hall.

Particulars of the cinematograph films which the Association lends are given in Appendix II (c). These are available in the usual standard size (35 mm.) and also in the sub-standard size (16 mm.). The list of films is being extended.

All the Association's films, in both standard and 16 mm. sizes, are made in non-inflammable material (aceto-cellulose), and may be shown in any hall without licence under the Cinematograph Acts.

APPENDIX IV

CONDITIONS FOR AFFILIATION OF OTHER BODIES TO THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

1. The Council of the National Association desire to extend widely among suitably constituted bodies dealing with tuberculosis the privilege of affiliation, both in the interests of these bodies themselves, and in order to emphasise the national character of anti-tuberculosis work.

2. Any Voluntary Society or Committee whose principal aim is the eradication of tuberculosis, and whose practical work to that end is approved by the Council of the National Association, shall be eligible for affiliation.

3. This definition includes voluntary bodies which are concerned in the treatment of individual cases and the protection of their families ; such as Tuberculosis Dispensaries, Care Committees, Sanatoria, Hospitals, Colonies, Settlements, Open-air Schools, Workshops and Classes for the training and employment of tuberculous persons, agencies for furthering the eradication of tuberculosis among cattle and the sale of milk from tuberculin-tested herds; provided that in each case they are approved by the Council.

4. The privileges of affiliation are as follows:

(1) Affiliated societies have the right to use the double red cross sign, and are requested to print it on reports, notepaper, etc. A block of the cross is supplied free. It is also requested that societies shall add after their names on reports, paper, etc., the words "affiliated to the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis."

(2) Literature is supplied at cost price.

(3) Individual cases requiring assistance which, owing to any special circumstances, cannot be dealt with adequately by the health authorities or other local agencies, and which are recommended by an affiliated society, receive the special consideration of the Association's Grants Committee.

(4) Affiliated societies have the right to send one representative each to the Association's Annual Conference without payment of a fee.

(5) The Council of the National Association are always ready to give advice or information.

There is no fee for affiliation.

5. Affiliation may, with the further sanction of the Council, carry with it the right to participate in the Christmas Seal Sale for Tuberculosis.

6. The privilege of affiliation shall be continued from year to year, and at any time the Council of the National Association shall have the right to withdraw the privilege, if the Constitution or Objects of the affiliated society are changed, or if, in the opinion of the Council, the work of the affiliated body does not reach the standard considered by the Council to be adequate. The affiliated society shall send a copy of its Annual Report and Balance Sheet to the Association.

7. Before granting affiliation, the Council shall consider the Constitution and Objects of the body seeking the privilege, and its latest Report, audited Balance Sheet, and other evidence of work accomplished.

APPENDIX V

MODEL CONSTITUTION FOR A COUNTY OR COUNTY BOROUGH VOLUNTARY TUBERCULOSIS CARE ASSOCIATION

1. This shall be styled the — Voluntary County Tuberculosis Care Association, affiliated to the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, and shall consist of representatives from the Tuberculosis Care Committees in the County and other interested persons.

2. Its object shall be the continuous care of patients suffering from Tuberculosis, and their families. Its activities may include the following:—

(a) To ensure that every person suffering from Tuberculosis in the county area is under the supervision of the local Tuberculosis Dispensary.

(b) To provide, where necessary and possible, improved housing accommodation and means of livelihood for tuberculous persons and their families.

(c) To provide means of occupation, open-air shelters, bedding, clothing, books, and other means of improving the patients' mental and physical environment.

(d) To provide, in Holiday and Convalescent Homes, accommodation for children and others in contact with cases of tuberculosis.

(e) To provide means whereby patients in sanatoria can be visited by their relatives.

(f) To provide extra nourishment for patients suffering from tuberculosis, and their families.

(g) To set up workshops and handicraft classes for tuberculous persons.

(h) To form fresh Voluntary Care Committees or area sub-Committees where necessary to carry out the above objects in various parts of the County.

In carrying out the above activities, full contact shall be made with the appropriate official and voluntary agencies.

The Association shall exist to promote the above activities either by assistance to existing Care Committees, the promotion of new Care Committees, or by direct administrative action.

3. The Association shall consist of — representatives from each Care Committee in the area.

4. The Office Bearers shall consist of a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and — members. In addition, — members of the County Council of — may be co-opted.

5. The County Medical Officer of Health and County Tuberculosis Officers shall be members *ex officio*.

6. The Committee shall apply for recognition to the County Council of — in order to become eligible to receive grants available for the care of persons suffering from tuberculosis.

7. An Executive Committee of the Association may be formed, consisting of the office-bearers, the Tuberculosis Officers and — members.

8. Any three members of the Committee resident in a particular part of the County may be formed into an Area Sub-Committee for that area, with power to co-opt two persons to their number, and such powers of action as the County Committee shall see fit.

9. The Association shall meet four times yearly in the months of January, May, July and November.

10. If, on the formation of the County Tuberculosis Care Association, there exist other local Tuberculosis Care Committees or bodies undertaking Tuberculosis Care Work for a part of the County less than the whole, but not affiliated to the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, the County Association shall agree to give them representation on its membership, provided the constitution and objects of such local Associations are approved by the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

Where such existing local Care Committees or other bodies undertaking Tuberculosis Care Work are affiliated to the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, they shall be admitted to membership of the County Association.

11. New bodies proposing to undertake Tuberculosis Care Work in the County may be given representation on the County Association provided that their Constitution and objects are approved by the County Association and by the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

12. The County Association shall publish an Annual Report and Balance Sheet.

13. The Committee shall apply annually to the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis for participation in the benefits of the Seal Sale.

14. All matters of doubt in the working of the County Care Association shall be referred to the Council of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.
