





ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1925.

THE year 1925 is marked by two events of first importance for the well-being of the Sailors in the care of the Seamen's Hospital Society.

The first is the completion of the Branch Hospital at Tilbury, the new Wards of which were declared open by Lady Inchcape and the Hon. Elsie Mackay, on the 24th of June. As was stated in the last Report the Society took over the small Cottage Hospital at Tilbury, which then contained 17 beds, with an average daily occupation of 7 patients. Now it has been enlarged to 65 beds, and during the last two months of the year there was an average daily occupation of 55.

This Hospital, which has been erected from designs by Mr. Stanley Hamp, of Messrs. Collcutt & Hamp, Architects, is built on a new principle, and is constructed of hollow triangular bricks throughout. The Wards contain 24 beds each in pavilions, approached from a central corridor. There has also been built a complete new Operating Theatre, Out-Patient Department, Kitchen, and Boiler House, in addition to a pavilion to accommodate 24 Nurses.

The whole of the new buildings are of one storey only, and their construction will facilitate administration and nursing.

The Hospital is equipped in the most modern method for dealing with the gravest cases of accident and disease.

The Lascar Ward, provided by Mr. P. G. Singhanee, of Poona, has since its erection been continuously occupied

by Eastern patients from the great Liners entering Tilbury Docks.

The Medical Staff has been augmented, and there are now two Resident Medical Officers, so that the Hospital is never left without a Doctor.

The Nursing Staff has been brought up to the requirements of the Hospital. A former Sister at the Dreadnought Hospital has been appointed Matron, and the Hospital has been recognised by the General Nursing Council as a Training School for Nurses.

Here, at the threshold of the Port of London, patients who have become ill or who have met with accident upon the high seas, can obtain immediate attention on the arrival of the ship. The quayside is in close proximity to the Hospital and therefore patients can be landed and tended without delay.

By the opening of this Branch, another important development of the work of the Seamen's Hospital Society has been accomplished, and it is proving of the greatest advantage to the shipping community and others.

The other event of first importance is the commencement of work at Greenwich, rendered possible by the Fund raised by Lord Devonport, which will bring this, the parent Hospital, up to modern requirements.

The re-modelling of the Hospital, provision of new quarters for the Nurses, erection of a pathological unit, are all matters which are being taken in hand.

The first step has been to commence work on the foundations of a new Nurses' Home (to be called the "Devonport Nurses' Home"), on the land recently placed at the disposal of the Society by the Admiralty. Excavations have already been made and necessary preparations completed for the laying of the foundation-stone. One hundred and thirty rooms will be provided for the accommodation of Nurses and other women workers, together with sitting rooms, recreation rooms, class rooms, and all the necessary adjuncts of a modern Nurses' Home.

The pathological and bacteriological unit will provide for the growing needs of science and the well-being of the patients in the care of the Society.

Then will follow the much-needed re-modelling of the old buildings.

Plans have been prepared by Sir Edwin Cooper, the Architect, and, when finished, the Dreadnought will be one of the most complete Hospitals in the country.

The great advantage afforded by the Angas Convalescent Home at Cudham in restoring men to health after having undergone serious operation or having been grieviously ill, is commented upon by the Medical Staff. Hitherto, it has not been found possible to give convalescent treatment to all those Sailors who have needed it, and therefore a new wing has been provided, which will afford accommodation for additional patients and a small unit of two beds for Nurses.

Mrs. Angas, the donor of the Home, declared open the new buildings on the 11th September, and contributed liberally towards the cost of the enlargement.

As regards the other establishments of the Society, it has been found necessary to provide further accommodation for Nurses, a new kitchen, and a lift at King George's Sanatorium for Sailors, at Bramshott. This work is now proceeding. The Society is also urged to make provision at that Branch for the treatment of tuberculous patients by ultra violet rays. Vice-Admiral the Hon. Sir Algernon Boyle, a member of the Board, to whom donations should be

sent, at 11, Cranley Gardens, S.W.7, is raising a fund to instal a complete light unit. Already three small lights are in use, but much more is asked for by the Medical Staff.

To provide adequately all that is needed in this direction will involve an expenditure of about £2,500, and additional annual output for maintenance.

The list of contributions which are made for the succour of those in the care of the Corporation, shows that the value of the work is recognised, not only by the great shipping interests and by those who realise what they owe to the Sailor, but also by Mariners themselves, who regard the old "Dreadnought" with feelings of deep gratitude and affection.

The total expenditure for general maintenance for the year is £77,337 13s. 6d., the highest figure yet expended on the work of the Society.

Tilbury has cost upwards of £35,000, and will involve an additional £8,000 per annum.


Bramshott, an additional expenditure of £4,500, and an annual increased output of £1,000; while Cudham has cost a capital sum of £4,000, and its annual expenditure will be increased by £500.

It is gratifying to be able to report that, except for the Ultra Violet Ray Process, referred to above, sufficient funds have been forthcoming to meet the expenditure of the Society, and that the year has closed without an adverse balance, but this has only been rendered possible by the generous assistance of the many friends of the Sailor who support the Society.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR 1925.

The Annual Court of Governors of the Seamen's Hospital Society was held at the Hotel Cecil, on Tuesday, the 10th of March, 1925, under the presidency of Admiral Sir Roger Keyes. The Chairman was supported by Captain Sir Arthur Clarke, Captain Sir Ion Hamilton Benn, the Rt. Hon. Lord Southborough, Mr. P. P. Cole, F.R.C.S., the Senior Surgeon at the Dreadnought Hospital, and about 700 people were present.

The Society has to deplore the loss of two of its Officers during the year that has just closed. Viscount Milner, who was elected a Vice-President in 1921, in recognition of the conspicuous service he rendered to the London School of Tropical Medicine, died in June, and the same month deprived the Committee of the assistance of Mr. H. T. Moore, who had served as a member of the Board since the year 1913, and who had also given his services on the Finance Committee.

The Committee record with much gratification the conferment by H.M. the King of the Knighthood of the Garter upon the Rt. Hon. Sir Austen Chamberlain, a Vice-President of the Corporation.

Captain E. Wildy, who has served on the Committee of Management since the year 1911, has unfortunately been compelled, by reason of ill-health, to resign his seat. His resignation has been accepted with much regret, for he was a constant attendant at the meetings, and also served on the Finance Committee.

Mr. R. T. Garrett, of the Orient Steam Navigation Company, has joined the Board, and is taking an active part in the affairs of the Corporation.

Mr. A. G. T. Fisher, M.C., F.R.C.S., who was appointed Surgeon with charge of Out-Patients four years ago, has resigned, and has been succeeded by Mr. R. Ogier Ward, D.S.O., M.C., F.R.C.S.

After thirty years' service, Miss A. M. Hall, M.B.E., has resigned the post of Matron at the Dreadnought Hospital. The Board have recorded their appreciation of her service and the excellent work she has done for the Hospital in her care.

Miss Janet Williams, A.R.R.C., a former Sister at the Dreadnought, and the first Matron at King George's Sanatorium for Sailors, Bramshott, has been appointed Matron at the Dreadnought.

In the early part of the year the Society took part in the Hospitals Fête organised by the British Charities' Association, at the Royal Botanic Gardens. Mr. John Goss and the Cathedral Quartet sang "Sea Shanties" and the Society's stall of work made by patients at King George's Sanatorium for Sailors, was presided over by Lady Hamilton Benn, Lady Jackson and Lady Bourdillon. The following Beds have been endowed in the various establishments during the year:—

A Bed has also been endowed during the year by the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee, a cheque for £1,000 being handed over to Sir Arthur Clarke, by Mr. H. Baron, J.P., on the 30th December; this is the fifth Bed endowed by the Aid Committee.

Mr. Bernhard Baron has given £500 as an endowment to provide medals and prizes for the Nurses' Training School at the Dreadnought Hospital.

Mrs. Ridley Prentice, Senior, made a gift of £40 towards the cost of providing an apparatus for artificial sunlight treatment at the Dreadnought Hospital.

King Edward's Hospital Fund for London, King George's Fund for Sailors, the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, the Hospital Saturday Fund, and the Hospital Welfare Society, have again afforded material aid in the maintenance of the various establishments of the Charity.

The Stock Exchange Dramatic and Operatic Society have kindly allowed the Society to share in the proceeds of their performances of the "Belle of New York," at the Scala Theatre, and in the Stock Exchange Lucky Dip.

The "Daily News Wireless Fund" have provided wireless installations at the Dreadnought Hospital, and at the Hospital for Tropical Diseases. The installations were handed over to the Chairman, Sir Arthur Clarke, by Mr. B. F. Crosfield, Managing Director of the *Daily News*. The

entertainment which a patient derives from "listening in" is found materially to further his restoration to health.

Following the example set in 1924 by ladies living near the Tilbury Hospital, who started the Ladies' Linen League in connection with that Institution, there was founded on the 11th November, 1925, the Dreadnought Ladies' Remembrance League.

The object of these organisations is to raise funds for the purchase of material which may be worked by the ladies who have joined the League, to help to provide all manner of linen for the wards of the Hospitals. This help is very gratefully received by the Matrons, and effects a real saving in the annual cost of linen.

These kind ladies are constantly organising entertainments of all sorts to augment the funds of their League.

ALBERT DOCK HOSPITAL.

The work in this busy little Hospital, lying as it does in the centre of the Dock District, has been carried on at high pressure during the year, and the generous assistance afforded by those who reside and work in that neighbourhood, is proof of the benefit that the Institution renders.

The Annual Entertainments at the East Ham Palace were attended with their usual conspicuous success, and the unfailing efforts of Mr. R. W. Vagnolini and his band of loyal helpers have resulted in a sum of £620 being handed over for the benefit of the Albert Dock Hospital.

Thanks are also due to Mr. J. Leary, Captain Windus, Mr. Dyble, Mr. Macdonald, and Mr. Woolterton, and many others, who have rendered great assistance to this Hospital.

ANGAS CONVALESCENT HOME, CUDHAM.

The New Wing of this Home was declared open by the founder, Mrs. Angas, on Friday, the 11th September. The premises were unlocked with a key presented by the Architect, Mr. A. Roberts, and were dedicated by the Rev. H. Percy Thompson, Hon. Canon of Rochester and Rural Dean of Beckenham, assisted by the Rev. Bryan O'Loughlin, Vicar of Cudham.

On Friday, 23rd October—the nearest possible day to Trafalgar Day—another interesting ceremony took place at the Home, when the tablet over a Bed endowed by Schoolboys and Girls throughout the Empire, was unveiled. The unveiling ceremony was performed by representatives of the boys and girls, and Canon H. Percy Thompson dedicated the Bed. Schoolboys and Girls are now contributing towards the endowment of a second Bed.

The Annual Fête at the Home took place on Saturday, the 4th of July. Mrs. Hughes opened the proceedings, and the occasion was attended with much success.

KING GEORGE'S SANATORIUM FOR SAILORS, BRAMSHOTT.

Admiral the Hon. Sir Algernon Boyle is raising a Fund to provide ultra violet rays for the Sanatorium. This essential adjunct to treatment in a sanatorium is much needed. It may mean the restoration to health of some Sailor afflicted with the dire disease of consumption. As soon as funds are available a complete installation will be set up, but the necessary cost is over £2,500, and less than half that amount is yet to hand.

During the past year the Sanatorium has lost the services of its Resident Secretary, Paymaster Captain F. H. Gerty, C.M.G., R.N., who held office since the opening of the Institution. Captain Gerty has had to resign in consequence of ill-health, and the Committee have appointed as his successor Paymaster Captain Harold J. D. Spriggs, O.B.E., R.N.

The Annual Tennis Tournament and Fête was held at the Sanatorium, on Wednesday, the 8th of July.

TILBURY HOSPITAL.

The Annual Fête was held in Tilbury Gardens, on Wednesday, the 10th of June, when Viscount Jellicoe and Lady Jellicoe were good enough to attend and declare the proceedings open.

As mentioned in the Report, the opening of the new Wards on Midsummer Day was performed by Lady Inchcape and the Hon. Elsie Mackay. Although the weather was not propitious, there was a large attendance, including many members of the Board, residents in the district and others interested in the Hospital.

Lady Inchcape was pleased to allow one of the new Wards to bear her name. The new buildings were dedicated by the Bishop of Colchester.

The Staff has been augmented during the year by the appointment of Mr. W. S. Rose, L.D.S., R.C.S., as Dental Surgeon, and Mr. F. F. Wheeler, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., as Medical Officer in charge of the Children's Clinic.

Many generous gifts and assistance have been accorded to this branch: the Tilbury Coaling Company have continued their generosity to the Hospital by supplying the Institution with Coal throughout the greater part of the Winter.

Although subsequent to the year under review, the Committee record with sorrow the death of Dr. Hugh Ridley Prentice, Physician and Medical Superintendent at the Dreadnought Hospital, who, after a long illness, borne with much courage and fortitude, died on the 3rd February.

Dr. Prentice was educated at Weimar and at St. Bartholomew's Hospital, took his English Conjoint Diplomas in 1906, the M.R.C.P. in 1912, and graduated M.B., B.S. Lond. in 1913. After acting as Resident Medical Officer at the National Hospital for the Paralysed and Epileptic, Queen Square, where he worked directly under Sir Victor Horsley, he commenced a consulting practice in Welbeck Street, and in 1914 was appointed Assistant Physician to the Dreadnought Hospital, and Physician in 1920. During the war he held a commission in the Royal Navy, and was seconded for duty at the Seamen's Hospital, where he acted as Medical Superintendent. He was permanently appointed to that office in 1919, retaining at the same time his position on the Honorary Medical Staff.

He was a Neurologist of note, and but for the handicap of ill-health, would doubtless have achieved a leading position in that branch of medicine.

His loss to the Dreadnought is indeed a heavy one, and he is deeply mourned by all connected with the Hospital; and many outside the walls of the Institution have lost in him a genial friend, and one whose sympathy was ever flowing to those in need.

Mr. William Hollins, of Over Wallop, Southampton, left £500 3 per cent. Reduced Bank Annuities (now 2½ per cent. Consols), under the following proviso:—"That the sum should be invested in the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain and 'kept apart as a fund to be called William Hollins Fund,' the dividends to be applied in carrying on and supporting the charitable designs of the Society." THE GEORGE STURGE FUND. 1884.

Mr. George Sturge, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, Kent, executed a Deed of Trust providing for the payment to the Seamen's Hospital Society of £653 Railway Stock, representing £750, under the following conditions, viz.:

"In giving the sum of £750 for a Samaritan Fund for the above Hospital, Mr. Sturge gives it on the conditions that this Fund shall be *hept entirely separate* from the general funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to or applied for such In-patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment or change of air.

"Mr. Sturge hopes that this Fund may be made known, and that others may be induced to subscribe to it." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of

THE JAMES DAVID DINSDALE FUND. 1891.

Mr. Dinsdale, of Whitby, York, bequeathed £100 to the Seamen's Hospital Society, with the following conditions:—"Upon trust to invest the same in any of the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, or upon Government or Real Securities in England or Wales and that the annual income of the last-mentioned sum of one hundred pounds shall for ever hereafter be applied towards the general purposes of the above Society." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 10s.

THE JOHN H. LUSCOMBE MEMORIAL FUND. 1897.

This Fund of £100 was established in the year 1897, to benefit sick Seamen on leaving the Hospitals of the Seamen's Hospital Society, and to keep in remembrance the name of the late John H. Luscombe, Esq., the interest whereof to be for ever applied in the above-mentioned manner by the Committee of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £89 1s 8d £2 15s. per cent. (now 2½ per cent.) Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 4s. 4d.

THE ANNE DU BOIS MEMORIAL FUND. 1902.

This Fund of £45 was established in the year 1902 by Miss Esther Du Bois, deceased, in "Fond Memory of Anne Du Bois." Invested in the purchase of £48 7s. 5d. £2 15s. per cent. (now 2½ per cent.) Consolidated Stock. A further sum of £40 invested in purchase of £49 16s. 6d. Consolidated Stock was received in 1910. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds," Income, £2 9s.

THE "ARGONAUT" BED. 1906.

This Fund of £1,000 was established by Sir Henry Lunn, the Passengers and Officers of the Steam Yacht "Argonaut," 1902-1906, to endow in perpetuity a bed in the Branch Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society. New South Wales 3 per cent.

It is a condition of the Trust that a Scotchman shall always have priority of right to this bed.

THE "ANNIE ZUNZ" FUND. 1910.

This Fund was created by a gift of £3,000 from the Trustees of the "Zunz Bequest" for the endowment in perpetuity of a Ward on the Somerset Floor of the Dreadnought Hospital, in memory of Annie Zunz. Invested in the purchase of £3,625 7s. 7d. India Three per cent. Stock.

THE "GEORGE BUSK" MEMORIAL FUND. 1911.

The Bed will be known as the "John Law" Bed, and is primarily intended for the use of natives of India. Invested in the purchase of £1,041 13s. 4d. India $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £36 9s.

THE "FRASER" FUND. 1911.

Mrs. Fraser, widow of the late T. H. Fraser, R.N., bequeathed £5,000 to the Society, and her Executors expressed a wish that the name of Fraser should be connected in perpetuity with the work of the Society. In accordance with their wishes, a Ward of four beds has been named the "Fraser" Ward. It was resolved to invest the Bequest as a separate Trust Fund, while as regards the use of the capital the power to approve or veto shall lie with the Deputy Master of Trinity House, the Chairman of the Committee of Lloyd's, and the Chairman of the Committee of Lloyd's Register. Invested in the purchase of £1,715 S.E. Railway 5 per cent. Debenture Stock and £2,130 Great Eastern Railway 4 per cent. Guarantee Stock. Trustees, "The Trustees of the Seamen's Hospital Society." Income, £170 19s.

THE DUNCAN MEDALS, 1912.

Dr. Andrew Duncan (Colonel, I.M.S.), a member of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Albert Dock Hospital, by his Will, dated the 23rd March, 1912, bequeathed the following Legacy to the Society:—

£100 to provide a Medal to be awarded to the Nurse at the Albert Dock Hospital who comes out first in the annual examination in Tropical Medical Nursing.

£102 13s. invested in New Zealand 4 per cent. Stock, 1943-63. Income, £4 2s. 1d. Trustees, "The Trustees of the Seamen's Hospital Society."

THE "STIDOLPH" TRUST. 1913.

This Trust was created by a gift of £1,000 from Mrs. STIDOLPH to endow in perpetuity a bed in the Dreadnought Hospital, Greenwich, in memory of her husband, the late EDWARD SPENCER STIDOLPH, a generous supporter of the Hospital, and a benefactor of all good works in Greenwich.
