



ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1927.

THE Board of Management present herewith their 107th Annual Report.

Again the Seamen's Hospital Society has been fortunate enough to meet its needs, the income for the year being £89,996: 2: 2 and the expenditure £82,978: 16: 8. Your Board desire to express to the many good friends of the Seafarer and generous donors their most sincere thanks for the support they have afforded, and for the confidence which they have shown in the work of the Corporation.

This work has in no wise fallen off, and both at the Dreadnought and all the other Hospitals of the Society the number of Seamen who have been restored to health has been as large as ever.

During the past year Sir James Michelli decided to ask the Board to accept his resignation of the post of Secretary, which he had held for forty years. It was with much regret that the Board received and accepted his resignation, but they decided that the time had come when Sir James might reasonably feel that he would like to retire to a less strenuous life. They are glad, however, that his unique experience and knowledge of Hospital administration will still be available for the benefit of the Sailor, as he has been elected Hon. Treasurer with Sir Robert Williams, with a seat upon the Board.

It was a lucky day for the Seamen's Hospital Society when, in 1887, the Board appointed Mr. Michelli (as he then was) as Secretary. Mainly owing to his indefatigable energy, foresight and administrative capacity has the Society grown

and developed during these forty years to a degree altogether beyond the ordinary.

In 1887 the establishments of the Society consisted of the Dreadnought Hospital, Greenwich, and one Dispensary. Within three years the first branch Hospital was established at the Albert Dock. In 1898, eight years later, came the founding of the London School of Tropical Medicine, which was housed in new buildings attached to the Albert Dock Hospital. In 1918 the Angas Convalescent Home at Cudham was opened. In 1920 there followed the transfer of the London School of Tropical Medicine to Central London, together with the opening of a new Hospital—the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, Endsleigh Gardens. In 1921 a Sanatorium for Seamen suffering from pulmonary and surgical tuberculosis was opened at Bramshott, in Hampshire. In 1924 there followed the Tilbury Hospital.

The total number of beds provided in all these establishments amounts to 557.

In 1887, when Sir James Michelli became Secretary, the income and expenditure averaged £12,000 per annum—now the annual income and expenditure exceeds £80,000 per annum.

The number of patients treated in 1887 was 7,361, while in 1926 over 28,000 were cared for in the various establishments of the Corporation.

Surely such a record of development is one that any man may be proud of.

The Board have appointed Mr. R. E. V. Bax, M.A., Oxon., Barrister-at-Law, to succeed Sir James Michelli. Mr. Bax had served as Assistant Secretary since 1919.

During the summer the Committee of the Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital at Marseilles opened negotiations with a view to entrusting the administration and management of their Hospital to the Seamen's Hospital Society.

A few words are necessary first about the establishment of this Hospital. A scheme for providing a British Hospital at Marseilles was started in January, 1918. The work of raising the necessary funds and carrying out the building and equipping of the Hospital has been done by a Committee in Marseilles under the chairmanship of H.M. Consul-General, and by a Finance Committee in London. It was not until September, 1927, however, that the Hospital was finished and equipped, and ready to receive patients.

Having achieved this, the Committee, as stated, approached your Board, and as a result of the negotiations which ensued, your Board decided to undertake the maintenance of the Hospital as from 1st January, 1928. They felt the more justified in doing so as the Hospital was always mainly intended for sailor patients, and was originally called "The British Merchant Seamen's Hospital." After the death of Queen Alexandra, H.M. the King graciously permitted the Hospital to be known as the "Queen Alexandra Memorial Hospital." By happy coincidence, our Royal President was already Patron, and H.R.H. the Duchess of York, Patroness of the Hospital.

The Hospital (a picture of which appears on the front page of this report) stands in its own grounds, and is situated in the higher part of the town overlooking the docks. In addition to the general wards it provides accommodation for Officers of the Mercantile Marine and a certain number of private patients. An important feature is a separate section for infectious or contagious cases. The total number of

beds is 60. A British Medical Officer is resident in the Hospital, and the Nursing Staff is composed of fully-trained British Nurses.

The Board have appointed the old Executive Committee in Marseilles *en bloc* as Local Advisory Committee; this body, with a resident Secretary, will be responsible to the Board for the details of administration.

Warm thanks are due to Mr. Spencer S. Dickson, H.M. Consul General at the present time, for his untiring services and invaluable help during the negotiations and in the completion of the transfer and since then, and it is with pleasure that the Board report that he has consented to continue as Chairman of the Advisory Committee at Marseilles. This is the first time that the Society has undertaken the work of caring for sick seamen outside the shores of Great Britain, and it is hoped that the Hospital may also be a boon to many travellers east or west on the highways of the sea.

In connection with the taking over of this Hospital, Mr. F. C. Goodenough, Chairman of Barclays Bank, Ltd., and Hon. Treasurer of the London Committee of the Marseilles Hospital, is submitted to the Governors for election as a Vice-President, and Admiral Ronald Hopwood, C.B., Chairman of the Committee in London, is recommended for election as a member of the Board of Management.

The Board record with deep regret the death of the following Vice-Presidents during the year: The Rt. Hon. Viscount Cowdray and Major-General F. L. Lessard, C.B.

Lord Cowdray was the senior Vice-President of the Corporation, having been elected to that office in 1896, the year of the opening of the Blackwall Tunnel, which was one of the many large engineering works with which his name was associated. He died on the 1st May, 1927.

Major-General Lessard was elected a Vice-President in 1896 in recognition of the valuable assistance he rendered in connection with Lord Devonport's Fund for the improvement of the Dreadnought Hospital, he having raised a sum of £7,000 for this purpose. General Lessard died in Toronto in August, 1927.

With sorrow the Board report also the death of two of their colleagues, namely, Sir John Wimble, K.B.E., and Admiral Sir Edmond Slade, K.C.I.E., K.C.V.O.

Sir John Wimble joined the Board in 1909. He was a member of the firm of Messrs. C. T. Bowring & Co., and his knowledge of shipping affairs was invaluable to the Society. Until his health began to fail he was a regular attendant at the Board meetings, and took an active interest in the work of the Corporation. He died on the 25th November, 1927.

Admiral Sir Edmond Slade, who died on 20th January, 1928, after only a few days' illness, had been a member of the Board since 1926. During this period he took an active part in the management of the Society, and was particularly interested in the Hospital for Tropical Diseases.

In addition to the losses already referred to, the Board have suffered by the resignation of Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Jackson, G.C.B., K.C.V.O., F.R.S., due to ill-health, and of Vice-Admiral E. R. Mansell, C.B.E., M.V.O., due to pressure upon his time in consequence of his election as Deputy Master of Trinity House.

Both these members will be much missed, but it is in the hope that their interest in the Society may be retained that their names are submitted to the Governors for election as Vice-Presidents.

The following have been elected members of the Board during the year: Captain H. C. Birnie, D.S.O., R.N.R. (elder Brother of the Trinity House), and, as already mentioned, Sir James Michelli, C.M.G.

Two eminent members of the honorary medical staff, whose names have been for many years connected with the Society, have passed away, namely, C. W. Daniels, M.B., F.R.C.P., who died in August, 1927, and Sir Dyce Duckworth, Bart., M.D., F.R.C.P., who died in January, 1928.

Dr. Daniels was one of the leading experts in this country on Tropical Disease, and worked with Sir Patrick Manson. He joined the London School of Tropical Medicine as Medical Tutor in 1901, and held this office until 1910. He was elected Assistant Physician to the Albert Dock Hospital in 1906, Physician in 1912, and Consulting Physician in 1920. He was also Consulting Physician to the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, Endsleigh Gardens.

Sir Dyce Duckworth joined the Dreadnought Hospital as Physician in 1905 and became Consulting Physician in 1917. He played a prominent part in connection with the foundation and development of the London School of Clinical Medicine, and his distinguished position in the medical world was a great asset both to the School and the Hospital.

All the various establishments have been kept busy during the past year.

The Dreadnought still continues to maintain its reputation among Seamen of all nations. During the past year the Trustees of the Devonport Fund have provided for additional bathrooms and lavatories in the building. The new Nurses' Home is now roofed in, and the pathological laboratories will be ready for occupation within the next month or two.

At the Albert Dock Hospital a plaque was unveiled on the 15th of March by the Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, the Minister of Health, in memory of Sir Patrick Manson. The plaque was put up in the ward in which Sir Patrick Manson worked and taught. On the 15th July, Admiral Sir Montague Browning, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., M.V.O., declared open, and the Bishop of Guildford dedicated, a new ward of ten beds at King George's Sanatorium, which, by the use of vita glass which admits the actinic rays, enables fullest advantage to be taken of such sunshine as the winter months in this country afford. At the same time another ward, which had been adapted for the purpose, was opened for the use of various forms of artificial sunlight treatment. As mentioned in the last Report, these improvements have been possible largely owing to gifts from officers and men of the Royal Navy.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR 1927.

The Annual Court was held at the Hotel Cecil on Monday, 21st February. Owing to the absence of the President of the Society (H.R.H. the Duke of York), the chair was taken by H.R.H. Prince George, and the fact that this was His Royal Highness's first appearance in public caused the meeting to be one of especial interest. Nearly 1,000 Governors and friends of the Charity were present, and the British Broadcasting Company kindly arranged for the Prince's speech to be broadcasted.

In the early part of the year Mr. F. A. Lyon returned from the East, and, as a result of his visit to Ceylon and India, the Society benefited to the extent of £2,800, of which £1,000 will probably become annual contributions.

Consequent upon the promotion of Mr. R. E. V. Bax to the office of Secretary, Mr. F. A. Lyon, B.A. (Oxon.), has been appointed Assistant Secretary, and Mr. J. P. Heming, B.A. (Cantab.), Steward.

DREADNOUGHT HOSPITAL.

Mr. J. K. Hasler, M.B., B.S. (Lond.), has been appointed Anæsthetist to the Dreadnought Hospital.

Dr. R. Donnellan, Senior Anæsthetist, has retired after ten years' service, and Mr. E. S. Rowbotham has now become Senior Anæsthetist. Mr. R. E. Bickerton, D.S.O., Ophthalmic Surgeon, has been appointed Honorary Surgeon to H.M. the King.

Dr. Richmond McIntosh, who was appointed Medical Superintendent in May, 1926, resigned at the end of the year in order to take up private practice. Dr. L. H. Savin, M.R.C.P., F.R.C.S., has been appointed to succeed him.

Changes have also taken place in the Nursing Staff. Miss E. J. Williams, A.R.R.C., Matron, has resigned in order to take over a private Nursing Home in London. Miss C. E. Hayden, Matron of the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, has been appointed Matron of the Dreadnought, and Miss E. Lloyd, formerly Assistant Matron at the Dreadnought, has been appointed Matron of the Hospital in Endsleigh Gardens.

The surgeons are pressing for a supply of radium, which will cost about £900, to enable them to combat the terrible scourge of cancer. Warm thanks are due to an anonymous donor, who has generously given £500 for this purpose.

On Saturday, the 18th June, Mrs. Spencer Stidolph kindly unveiled the tablet erected over the seventh bed endowed by the Seamen's Hospital Aid Committee. There was a large attendance, and Sir Arthur Clarke expressed the gratitude of the Seamen's Hospital Society for the generous support accorded them by this Aid Committee.

The first annual re-union of "Dreadnought" Nurses and presentation of Bernhard Baron medals took place in the grounds of the Dreadnought Hospital on Wednesday, the 22nd of June. Miss A. M. Hall, M.B.E., formerly Matron, presented the medals, and a large number of "Dreadnought" Nurses were present.

The Dreadnought Ladies' Linen League, which has done most excellent work during the year in repairing the Hospital linen and providing new articles, held a Market and Fair in the grounds of the Dreadnought on Saturday, the 23rd July. Lady Benn kindly declared the proceedings open, and the Fair resulted in a sum of about £120 being credited to the funds of the League.

A Masonic Service, organised by the "Borough of Greenwich" Lodge, was held at the Royal Naval College on Sunday afternoon, the 30th October, when the V.W. Brother, the Rev. W. P. Besley, M.A., M.V.O., P.G.C., Hon, Chaplain to the King, preached. The service was very largely attended. The offertory was divided between the Freemasons' Hospital and the Seamen's Hospital Society.

ALBERT DOCK HOSPITAL.

On Tuesday, 17th May, the new Chapel was dedicated by the Bishop of Barking. The Rev. Canon T. G. Steele, of the Church of the Ascension, Victoria Docks, the Rev. E. C. Stephens, of the Missions to Seamen, and the Rev. J. Bilby, Chaplain to the Hospital, were also present and took part in the service.

The Honorary Medical Staff of the Hospital has been augmented by the appointment of Mr. E. Wolff, F.R.C.S., as Ophthalmologist, and Dr. J. V. Sparks, D.M.R.E., as Radiologist.

The Port of London Authority have very kindly granted the Society some additional land, which has enabled it to provide a tennis court for the use of the resident staff of the Hospital. This is a great acquisition, which is particularly acceptable in that district, where there are no amenities for sport and recreation.

HOSPITAL FOR TROPICAL DISEASES.

A second bed in this Hospital has been endowed by residents in Ceylon. The tablet over this bed, together with the tablet over the Lindsay White bed, was unveiled on Thursday, 23rd June, by Brig.-Gen. Sir William Manning, G.C.M.G., K.B.E., C.B., ex-Governor of Ceylon, and dedicated by the Rt. Rev. E. A. Copleston, D.D., formerly Bishop of Colombo. A large number of those interested in the tropics were present.

Col. H. Kirkpatrick, M.B., B.Ch., has been appointed Ophthalmic Surgeon to this Hospital.

An Out-patient Department in connection with this Hospital was opened in March and is doing useful work.

Mr. Samuel Samuels has generously given a donation of £50 for the provision of artificial sunlight lamps, for which the Committee are very grateful.

TILBURY HOSPITAL.

Dr. G. Carmichael Low and Dr. P. Manson Bahr have been appointed Consulting Physicians to this Hospital.

A house adjacent to the Hospital, and formerly occupied by Dr. Fowler, has been acquired and converted into a Children's department, and has been named "The Violet Whitmore Ward for Children," in memory of a gentle and gracious lady who was a great friend and supporter of the Tilbury Hospital.

The Linen League has again rendered conspicuous service in maintaining the supply of bedding and linen for the Hospital, and the thanks of the Society are due to the members for their self-sacrificing labours.

ANGAS HOME.

During the year an additional field has been purchased at a cost of £770.


The Annual Fête was opened by Mrs. Hamilton on Saturday, the 2nd July, and the function was, as usual, a great success.

A beginning has been made in a modest way for training patients at the Sanatorium in handicrafts, and it is hoped that this may develop and become a self-supporting section of the work of the Sanatorium.

The "Daily News Wireless Fund" have presented a seven-valve Burndept Receiving set to the Sanatorium, which has proved a great boon to the patients.

The thanks of the Society are due to the Ladies' Linen League, whose members have worked indefatigably throughout the year, thereby effecting a considerable saving in the cost of bedding and linen.

IX.) the Society is empowered to receive any Moneys, Messuages, Lands, Tenements, Rents, Annuities, &c., whatsoever, not exceeding the value of £12,000 per Annum, in addition to any sums of Money to any amount, and any Goods, Ships, &c., of whatever value, which may be given or bequeathed to it from time to time.

If a Will has already been made, and it is afterwards desired to benefit the Hospital, it will be sufficient if the following form is filled up, detached, duly signed, and witnessed in like manner as the Will itself, and carefully attached to the existing Will.



Trust Funds of the Seamen's Hospital Society.

THE WILLIAM HOLLINS FUND. 1865.

Mr. WILLIAM HOLLINS, of Over Wallop, Southampton, left £500 3 per cent. Reduced Bank Annuities (now 2½ per cent. Consols), under the following proviso:- "That the sum should be invested in the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain and 'kept apart as a fund to be called William Hollins Fund,' the dividends to be applied in carrying on and supporting the charitable designs of the Society." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £12 10s.

THE GEORGE STURGE FUND. 1884.

Mr. George Sturge, of Woodthorpe, Sydenham Hill Road, Kent, executed a Deed of Trust providing for the payment to the Seamen's Hospital Society of £653 Railway Stock, representing £750, under the following conditions, viz.:

"In giving the sum of £750 for a Samaritan Fund for the above Hospital, Mr. Sturge gives it on the conditions that this Fund shall be kept entirely separats from the general funds of the Hospital, and that the income shall be paid to or applied for such In-patients as may be necessitous, and within three months from their discharge from the Hospital, and for the purpose of their having necessary nourishment or change of air.

"Mr. STURGE hopes that this Fund may be made known, and that othersmay be induced to subscribe to it." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £27 15s.

THE JAMES DAVID DINSDALE FUND. 1891.

Mr. DINSDALE, of Whitby, York, bequeathed £100 to the Seamen's Hospital Society, with the following conditions: - "Upon trust to invest the same in any of the Public Stocks or Funds of Great Britain, or upon Government or Real Securities in England or Wales and that the annual income of the last-mentioned sum of one hundred pounds shall for ever hereafter be applied towards the general purposes of the above Society." Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 10s.

THE JOHN H. LUSCOMBE MEMORIAL **FUND.** 1897.

This Fund of £100 was established in the year 1897, to benefit sick Seamen on leaving the Hospitals of the Seamen's Hospital Society, and tokeep in remembrance the name of the late John H. Luscombe, Esq., the interest whereof to be for ever applied in the above-mentioned manner by the Committee of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £89 1s 8d. £2 15s. per cent. (now 21/2 per cent.) Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £2 4s. 4d.

THE AMERICAN VICTORIA JUBILEE FUND, 1897.

To commemorate the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Victoria the American citizens in London contributed by means of the American Victoria Jubilee Fund, a sum of £1,000 for the endowment of a bed, to be named the "Queen Victoria Bed," in the Society's Branch Hospital in the Royal Victoria and Albert Docks. Invested in the purchase of £894 17s., £2 15s. per cent. (now $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.) Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £22 7s. 4d.

THE ANNE DU BOIS MEMORIAL FUND. 1902.

This Fund of £45 was established in the year 1902 by Miss Esther Du Bois, deceased, in "Fond Memory of Anne Du Bois." Invested in the purchase of £48 7s. 5d. £2 15s. per cent. (now 2½ per cent.) Consolidated Stock. A further sum of £40 invested in purchase of £49 16s. 6d. Consolidated Stock was received in 1910. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds," Income, £2 9s.

THE "ARGONAUT" BED. 1906.

This Fund of £1,000 was established by Sir Henry Lunn, the Passengers and Officers of the Steam Yacht "Argonaut," 1902-1906, to endow in perpetuity a bed in the Branch Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society. Invested in the purchase of £1,152 14s. 9d. £2 10s. per cent. Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £28 16s. 4d.

THE "BERTHA" FUND. 1907.

This Fund has been established by an anonymous donor towards the endowment of a cot in the Children's Ward of the Dreadnought Hospital, to be called "The Bertha Cot." £216 16s. Metropolitan Water Board 3 per cent. Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £6 10s. 2d.

THE WALTER ADAMS MEMORIAL. 1907.

"To commemorate his service of 35 years in the Seamen's Hospital, his fellow-workers have raised a fund to bear his name and to augment the benefits of the Samaritan Fund, which he managed with so deep and thoughtful an interest in the cause of sick and needy scamen." Invested in the purchase of £77 3s. 4d. $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Consolidated Stock. Trustees, "The Official Trustees of Charitable Funds." Income, £1 18s. 4d. A Memorial is also erected in the Dreadnought Hospital Chapel. He died on duty 6th of March, 1906.

THE LADY HARRIETTE ANN MCILWRAITH FUND. 1909.

This Fund was created by a gift of One Thousand Pounds from Lady McIlwraith, of Weldoes, Harrow Weald, Middlesex, to endow in perpetuity a Medical Bed in the Dreadnought Hospital of the Seamen's Hospital Society, in memory of her husband, the Honourable Sir Thomas McIlwraith, K.C.M.G., LL.D., who was three times Premier of Queensland, and who died in 1900. £1,134 15s. New South Wales 3 per cent.

It is a condition of the Trust that a Scotchman shall always have priority of right to this bed.


